It is a policy of the Board of Education that a child entering the first grade for the first time must present a birth certificate and also a signed statement from your doctor that the child has had a smallpox vaccination and has been innoculated for polio, diptheria, tetanus and whooping cough. (In the Muleshoe schools we will temporarily accept the Baptismal certificate. Also, if your child is in the process of taking his shots, bring this evidence and we will enroll him provided you complete the series of innoculations in a reasonable time.)

If you are financially unable to pay for these shots, you may get the forms from any principal's office or at any ist at the West lains Hospital and you may obtain your physician's office and take these blanks to the receptionchild's shots free of charge.

If you took your child's birth certificate and the record of his shot's to the school last spring when you pre-enrolled, it is not necessary to present them again when you come to register your child on August 28th.







Crime in the United States is big business, and persistent efforts by the Federal Government are required if it is not to become



The cost of illegal gambling alone, for instance, has been estimated as high as \$7 billion or more. The cost of narcotics, prostitution and other forms of organized crime is enormous. Furthermore, cost of crime is often much higher than the money involved. The damage resulting from the corruption of public officials-which is often a part of the successful operation of organized crime—is impossible to measure.


