Junblatt accuses Syrians of planning full invasion

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Leftist leader Kamal Jumblatt accused Syria today of preparing a large-scale invasion of Lebanon and called for foreign help to prevent it.

Jumblatt met with diplomats of the United States, France and the Soviet Union after President Hafez Assad threatened more Syrian military intervention in Lebanon, and Egypt warned the Syrians to leave Yasir Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization alone

HELSINKI, Finland (AP) - A

the way to occupying essential communications networks for a large-scale invasion of Lebanon," Jumblatt said in a telegram to Arab League headquarters in Cairo and Arab chiefs of state.

In Washington, a spokesman for the State Department declined comment on Jumblatt's charge.

In a warning apparently adressed to Junblatt, Assad told a political rally in Damascus Monday that he was prepared to move into Lebanon to protect any victim of aggression.

"We have complete freedom of

movement. We have the capability to take any position we want," Assad

Jumblatt, whose military drive for complete victory over the right-wing Christians was checked by another Syrian threat of intervention 11 days ago, claims that up to 6,000 Syrian troops already are in Lebanon along with 7,000 Palestinian guerrillas of the Saiga organization, which Syria finances and controls.

Syrian troops and tanks inside Lebanon control the three main paved highways from Syria and are blocking arms shipments to Jumblatt. The

Saiga guerrillas control the Beirut international airport, two of the three main ports and several key positions within Beirut.

Egypt's Middle East News Agency reported that Arafat had messaged Egyptian President Anwar Sadat that he feared the Saiga men would try to wipe out his PLO guerrillas, many of whom fought alongside Jumblatt's

Egypt responded with a warning that it will not allow any action that could lead to the liquidation of the PLO. The Egyptian news agency said Sadat, who returns to Cairo today from a tour of Western Europe, called a meeting of his National Security Council Thursday.

Relations between Egypt and Syria have been strained since Sadat signed another Sinai disengagement pact with Israel last fall without getting back any of Syria's Golan Heights territory from Israel.

Libyan President Moammar Khadafy said Monday his government also "rejects any foreign intervention in Lebanon." He promised unlimited aid to "the nationalist forces," apparently referring to the leftist

\$2 bill goes back into circulation today

The novelty of the \$2 bill is just

That's today, on Thomas Jefferson's birthday, when the 14,200 banks across the nation started the issuance of 225 million of the bills.

It will be first time in 10 years that the bill, which has never flooded the market or gained wide spending acceptance, has been printed by the U.S. Treasury's Bureau of Printing and Engraving.

Midland's banks are readied for the onslaught of bill collectors, the curious, and just plain ol' folks who want \$2 bills for the sake of holding, eyeing, maybe saving, and, so hopes the Treasury, for spending freely.

The bill is on sale at face price from teller windows at The First National Bank, The Midland National Bank, Commercial Bank & Trust Co., and at Western State Bank.

and head teller at The First National, said the Treasury Department is 'hoping for good acceptance" of the bearing Jefferson's portrait. Jefferson, the nation's third President, authored the Declaration of Independence in 1776.

Spokesmen for the banks in town said they should have ample supplies of the bills to meet the first-day demands. None would divulge the dollar amount of \$2 bills on hand.

"I hope we don't (have long lines),"

The nation's last printing run of \$2 bills was in the 1963-66 period when 18,560,000 of the bills were issued. After that, the bills eventually went the way of the old green World War II stamps: into disuse and virtual

Abilene man killed, funnel sighted as storm lashes Basin

Harsh weather conditions throughout much of the West Texas area Monday night resulted in a funnel cloud spotted near Midland and a death in Big Spring.

The funnel cloud, reported by the Midland County Sheriff's Department, was sighted two miles southeast of Midland and confirmed by Charles Cox of Cox Ranch. The National Weather Service at Midland Regional Air Terminal said the cloud never touched ground.

The Big Spring incident occurred when Frank Gibson, 68, an Abilene resident visiting the city to attend a funeral, was struck by lightning while walking in a residential area.

Gibson and his wife, Odessa, were injured when the bolt struck the metal shaft of their umbrella. The man died shortly after midnight in a Big Spring hospital where his wife is listed in stable condition.



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

U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter, at the request of defense attorney F. Lee Bailey, ordered the additional testing Monday.

As a formality, he sentenced the newspaper heiress to the maximum 35 years in prison - 25 years for armed bank robbery and 10 years for use of a firearm in a felony — to meet the requirements of the law allowing the extended psychiatric examinations.

But Carter made clear that he would reduce the sentence after the final reports on Miss Hearst's San Diego examination are submitted. "How much, I'm not now prepared to

say," he told attorneys. He noted that he has said before that the maximum sentence he would consider is 25 years, with any prison terms for the two counts running con-

He specifically urged Miss Hearst to cooperate fully with prison psyciatrists, saying it would be a factor in determining "the nature of the modification" of her punishment.

"The court finds that it requires more detailed information before it can make a final determination of

sentence to be imposed," the judge

The U.S. Bureau of Prisons will designate the psychiatrists who will examine Miss Hearst, 22, and submit a report to Carter. If necessary, Carter may extend the deadline another 90 days.

Midland funds on PBRPC list

The City of Midland's application for \$576,000 in Community Development funds will be reviewed at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday by the board of directors of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission

The application is being submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development and will be split in the amount of \$43,000 for rehabilitation, \$25,000 for code enforcement, \$28,000 for clearance and demolition, \$142,000 for acquisition of property for public use, \$205,000 for paving, curbs and gutters, \$100,000 for park conservation and rehabilitation, \$23,000 for planning and management and \$10,000 for contingencies.

Australia is preparing to defend its claims to three-sevenths of Antarctica — the world's only

nuclear-free zone. Antarctic policy is under close review because of new pressures from underdeveloped countries for access to resources throughout the area. Both sides of Australian politics want all nuclear fission permanently prohibited around the South Pole.

Emerging from the Law of the Sea Conference, Australia expects a new interest by many nations in the future economic scientific, metorological and defense value of Antarctica. The Antarctic treaty powers will meet in Paris in June and July of this year. The normal regular consultative meeting will not be held until 1977, in London. An earlier meeting is regarded as necessary by France and

Australia. Signers of the Antarctic Treaty of 1959 decided at their eighth meeting in Oslo last June that an exmination on resources

was urgent. Apart from the land mass under the ice, the seas around Antarctica are believed to hold many vital elements such as magnesium and carbon products, while Australia has seen traces of coal and hints of minerals. There is a conflict between the sovereignty claimants (Australia Norway, the United Kingdom, France, New Zealand, Chile and Argentina) and the two great powers - The United States and the Soviet Union backed by Japan, Belgium and South Africa.

The non-claimant states with special emphasis from the U.S. do not recognize sovereignty over the area and believe exploration should begin as soon as any organization or nation wishes.

The issue has been delayed by a decision of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations which decided last year to survey the southern ocean. This is now progressing. Australia, on the lines of the U.S. decision around its own continent, is claiming rights over a 200-mile economic zone around threesevenths of Antarctica which Australia insists is under its sovereignty.

The Soviet Union has had a base in the area for several years and in-stalled a new base there in 1975. Australia is keeping a closer watch on shipping activities in the southern oceans by both the Russians and the Japanese.

Australia's new study begins with priority on keeping the area nuclear free backed by the strongest resistance to occasional suggestions by some of the non-claimant states that nuclear waste should be dumped at the South Pole.

Politically, the issue has not become a controversy in Australia, but, by the time the treaty powers meet in Paris this summer, Australia will have defined its attitudes on defending its claims in Antarctica, sustaining the 1959 Antartic Treaty and persuading the Soviet Union and the Japanese that fishing activities must be regularly reviewed.

Through its diplomatic network Australia knows that underdeveloped countries are especially interested in possible access to petroleum in the Antarctic Ocean bed.

Businesses in the U.S. in Australia's opinion are also ready to exploit petroleum resources in the southern seas but do not wish to come into conflict with the Soviet Union, Artentina, Australia, New Zealand or France.

Sri Lanka proposed last year United Nations control of all or part of Antarctica. This has alarmed Australia and other treaty powers and lies behind the meeting in Paris which France is sponsoring. The Sri Lanka move was post-poned with promises of a scientific review.



has telephone records that prove a recruiter made required checks with law enforcement authorities to clear the way for induction of a Texas youth who later was killed in a training mishap.

The records show that the recruiter made calls from his Austin, Tex., office to the police department and the Angelina County district attorney's office in Lufkin, Tex., on Nov. 12, 1975. The Marines also say a third call was made to the county sheriff's office but there is no telephone receipt to prove it.

Local officials in Lufkin have disputed the Marines' claim that the inquiries were made about Lynn McClure, 20, saying they have no records and no recollection of any such calls. But they concede that it is possible the calls were received.

Controversy over the Marines' pre-enlistment screening of McClure arose after he suffered head injuries in a close-combat training exercise at San Diego in December and died March 13 without regaining consciousness.

Members of McClure's family and others have said the youth was retarded and of doubtful fitness for the Marines and that he had a record of mental illness and several minor brushes with the law that would have disqualified him for recruitment under Marine regulations.

The Marines claim the local authorities misled them about McClure's history and currently are conducting two investigations - one into his death and the other to find out how he came to be accepted for service after having failed the enlistment test on In addition, the case has spurred demands in

Congress for investigations of Marine recruitment and training policies, the program in which McClure was injured has been suspended, and his family has filed a \$3.5 million claim against the U.S. govern-Marine spokesmen here said the telephone receipts were turned up in the corps' investigation of

now "under evaluation" by senior officers at Marine headquarters here, they said. The spokesmen said the receipts from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. show two calls were placed Nov. 12 from the Austin recruiting office to Lufkin. One, costing \$1.40, was to the office of Dist. Atty. John Henry Tatum and the other, for \$2.39, was

McClure's recruitment. That inquiry is complete and

to the Lufkin police. The Marines said records show that M.Sgt. Harold Faulkner, the recruiter, checked the box for "no police record" on a standard Defense Department form he filled out for McClure. He indicated he spoke to a "Johnson" at the sheriff's office and "Ms. Walker" at the police department. No such persons exist, officials there said.

Faulkner retired from the Marine Corps last week after 20 years of service. Corps spokesmen said his retirement was scheduled and was in no way related

They said he was an experienced recruiting officer, serving his second tour in that capacity. As to exactly what questions Faulkner may have asked in his calls to Lufkin, the Marines said they didn't know. Faulkner himself could not be reached by

The Marines contend Faulkner did not enlist McClure simply to help make his recruiting quota for

"It was during the middle of the month and the quota pressure doesn't get to the recruiters until the end of the month," he said

McClure originally tried to join the Marines when a military "Mobile Evaluating Team" visited Lufkin in September of last year, but the Marines said he finished in the "seventh percentile" on the standard armed forces qualification test and was rejected.

But in November he applied for enlistment again,

this time at Faulkner's office in Austin, and was accepted after prliminary interviews, Marine spokesmen said. He was given a bus'ticket to San Antonio where he took a test similar or identical to the one he had flunked, this time scoring in the 59th percentile, they said.

"All of the procedures were observed and he was tested by the normal routine," said the spokesman, adding that it had been the judgment of Faulkner and others who met McClure that he could make the

McClure family believes corps cooperating now

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) - A family attorney says the Marine Corps is cooperating now in an investigation of the death of 20-year-old recruit Lynn McClure of Lufkin, Tex.

John Gyorkos, who represents McClure's family in a \$3.5 million wrongful death claim against the Marines, also acknowledged Monday that some earlier statements made by him apparently were

At Gyorkos' request, U.S. District Court Judge William Enright removed from his calendar a motion seeking an injunction for a right of discovery on the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here Gyorkos said he was satisfied that the Marine

Corps was cooperating with him but he retained the right to again ask for an injunction if the Marine authorities later blocked his investigation.
The lawyer said the 115-pound McClure suffered

his fatal head injury when drill sergeants forced him to fight several men in succession in combat drills. McClure died March 13 in the Veterans Hospital at Houston, Tex., without regaining consciousness after the Dec. 6 combat drill.






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

Federal regulations said stifling free enterprise

SAN ANTONIO - The free enterprise system will not survive in future generations if the trend of costly government controls continues at its present pace, Kenneth A. Peeler of Midland said Monday in addressing the annual convention of The Texas Oil Marketers Association.

Peeler is the retiring president of the statewide association.

He reviewed, in his address, the many and varied achievements of the nation during its 200-year history, and said that "in order to achieve this enviable standard of living, this nation had to be independent.

'Its people had to be free to utilize their individual talents, to cast their ideas ... free to invest themselves in the future of America. They had to perform in a free enterprise system.

"Yet, the system of free enterprise is in a struggle for its survival. The federal regulatory burden is stifling its very existence.

He lashed out at the ever-increasing prison sentence number of major regulatory agencies and at the tremendous amount of paper work required of businesses by the bureaucrats.

Oil marketers are burdened with the growing monster of bureaucracy. the Midland businessman and civic leader said.

He said the powerful bureaucrats have become virtual dictators. 'handing down rules and regulations backed up by civil and criminal penalties created from within their own agencies. These growing numbers of appointed officials are churning out 18 new or amended regulations for every single law passed by Congress.

Peeler pointed out that the nation's problems in the energy field today stem largely from the result of many years of federal control over parts of the petroleum industry

The nation, he said, for the first time in its history, imported more oil than it produced during the second week of March this year.

'This, my fellow marketers, is losing our independence," the Midlander said.

He called on his listeners to begin their own fight for petroleum independence, "beginning here at home not with arms, but with a renewed dedication to take part in our governmental affairs and to promote the free enterprise system.'

He suggested various means of waging the battle for petroleum in-

"Our only answer during these times is a positive attitude." Peeler said. "I am not against my nation and my government. We still have the

Mrs. Ford's press secretary, Sheilah Rabb Weidenfeld, called the complaints "erroneous." She said Mrs. Ford probably talked no more than two minutes and did use her call

But Stevens said, "We're going to fight this thing. We don't want the politicians moving in and using CB to campaign.

McKinney said there is a rule prohibiting the use of the CB band for "soliciting for the sale of goods and services," but he would have to hear Mrs. Ford's broadcast to determine if that rule was violated.

He said it might be necessary for the FCC to issue some sort of guideline for political use of CB. The FCC has normally issued CB licenses for political conventions and campaigning but not on the usual 23 channels assigned to CBers.

WASHINGTON (AP) - When President Ford resumes his campaign travels next week, he will try out a new tactic aimed at encouraging increased news coverage of his activities.

Since the primary election season began, Ford has done most of his traveling on Fridays and Saturdays a schedule compatible with the idea that his duties as President keep him close to his White House office most of

The President and his strategists have discovered, however, that

Saturday travel does not yield as much news coverage as they would like. Newspaper deadlines are early on Saturdays, and weekend television network news programs have far smaller audiences than those on

weekday evenings. The result is that Ford now plans to do his campaigning during the normal Monday-Friday work week, avoiding most if not all out-of-town appearances on weekends, White House

sources say. Next week, for example, Ford will make a one-day trip to Indiana and

Georgia, two states with upcoming primaries, prior to the weekend. The trip probably will be scheduled for

Then, on April 27-29, the President will make his second preprimary swing across Texas, after stopping enroute in Louisiana. This will be only his second three-day trip of the campaign.



LORAIN, Ohio (AP) — The man they called the Wizard of Westwood doesn't have time to savor retirement, but that doesn't mean Joh Wooden isn't

Wooden, whose UCLA basketball teams brought him more fame than any other college coach, retired after the Bruins won their 10th national title in

But it has not been a quiet year for the man whose UCLA teams built a 620-147 record in 27 years. "I'm enjoying myself very much," he said Monday prior to a speaking engagement here. "But I'm certainly not idle. I'm speaking to college groups and at coaching clinics, writing two books, doing some TV color commentary and traveling quite a bit."

Wooden's teams, with stars like Lew Alcindor, who became Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Bill Walton, Gale Goodrich Keith Wilkes, now, James Wilkes, and

Goodrich, Keith Wilkes, now Jamal Wilkes, and many others, made him a legend during his own

Asked if he is happy about his decision to retire, Wooden smiled his quiet smile and said, "I think it was a good decision."

Wooden announced his retirement after UCLA beat Louisville in the semifinals of the 1975 NCAA championships. The Bruins went on to beat Kentucky in the finals two days later. "You know, I knew long before that I was going to

retire, but it was a spur of the moment decision to announce it like that," Wooden explained.
"I thought about it a lot and I knew there would be a lot of conjecture," he said. "I figured, if we won people would say I had waited because we lost the

year before and I wanted to go out a winner. "If we had lost, people would have said I couldn't

Howard Hughes and Jean Peters

WASHINGTON - Sources close to the late Howard Hughes agree on at least one thing: Jean Peters was the only woman he ever loved and probably the only woman who ever

The brooding billionaire met her, according to our sources, at a party in the late 1940s. As she burst into stardom. Hughes assigned a bodyguard-spy to stick close to her when her filmwork took her away from Hollywood

This constant companion reported back to Hughes how the actress spent her time. Sometimes, she would step out with other stars such as Joseph Cotten and Marilyn Monroe. More often, she would stay in her room and work on crossword puzzles.

Our sources say Jean Peters was annoyed over the Hughes watchdog and the stage whispers he generated. But the billionaire insisted that the security man stay at her side.

In the mid-1950s, a man named Stuart Cramer sat down next to her on an airliner. They became friends and

Far off in Miami, holed up in the old Columbus Hotel, Hughes continued to keep watch on the attractive actress. Once he dispatched a security man to observe the Cramers on a fishing

It turned out to be a short, Hollywood marriage, lasting only about a month. About two years later, Jean Peters abandoned her acting career, became Mrs. Howard Hughes and disappeared into his shadowy

Our sources caught fleeting glimpses of their strange life together. They leased a home, for example, in Bel Air, Calif. But before Hughes selected the house, he ordered round-the-clock guards to keep people out of six prospective mansions. They remained empty for three months until Hughes was satisfied that they

Then Mrs. Hughes moved into one of the mansions, followed a week later by the quirky Hughes. He arrived, wrapped in a blanket, slumped on the floor of his limousine.

It is typical of the Hughes story that the description of his unusual arrival was provided by an associate who now won't talk about it. He is Mike Conrad, a private investigator who worked for Hughes for 18 years.

There is no question about the report he gave to others. But he wouldn't discuss it with our associate, Bob Owens, who located him at his home in Thousand Oaks, Calif. "I have a deal with the Hughes people not to talk about him," he said bluntly. "They own my house and I owe them money.

But from other sources, we learned that Hughes rarely emerged from his bedroom. Over his door was a red light, a throwback to his Hollywood producing days, warning others in the house to stay out. The light remained on constantly.

Once a nine-year-old visitor, a relative of his wife, burst in on Hughes in innocent disregard of the red light. The shocked billionaire, clad only in a sheet, called to an aide.

Washington becomes big time city; subway to boot

WASHINGTON - This federal reservation has suddenly become a big city. I mean, when there is a subway running and celebrities come here instead of New York, and the eastern seaboard's young people flock here as though it were an East Coast San Francisco, well, Washington is no longer a Friday-Saturday night town.

It wasn't long ago that it was ritual to moan there was no culture here. that the restaurants were only fair and that on week nights it was deader than Philadelphia. But in this past week, the Kennedy

Center has twice looked like an old opening night at Grauman's Chinese Theater in Hollywood. The biggest crowd in the history of the Kennedy Center crammed in for the premiere of "All The President's Men," and the media stars were as besieged as those who played their parts.

The night before, Liv Ullmann was here for the premiere of her new film. "Face to Face," and naturally Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger had to clutch her and thus be photographed grandly for the society pages where he spent most of the week anyway. In one photo, taken at the Iranian Embassy, Henry sits on the floor with Polly Bergen.

And then we had Sen. Edward Brooke, his fists waving, dancing the "hustle" with Elizabeth Taylor; and Liza Minnelli, according to the reliable Washington Post, swilling straight Scotch, washed down by Coca-Cola and wine. All very heady. Throw in some Russian ballet dancers

who fled the Soviet system, and some of filmland's hangers-on, and that's quite a week here. In terms of theater, music and the dance, the Kennedy Center matches

New York's Lincoln Center. Constitution Hall is packed for Artur Rubenstein. A dozen other theaters keep busy. Art galleries multiply and prosper. There are scores of sidewalk cafes, and flea markets have sprouted on downtown street corners. With the subway running underneath - though on a limited route - there is the feeling of vitality here. With millions of visitors arriving in the Bicentennial year. Washington is even livelier. We're scarcely into the tourist season. and already the streets are crowded with red, white and blue buses and vagrant cars, whose drivers are more accustomed to Peoria

Let us leave Peoria for a moment. Several months ago, the Pisces Club opened in Georgetown, and

many a soul warned its president. Peter Malatesta, that a New York City kind of private club would never make it in Washington. The Pisces offers backgammon, cards, dinner and dancing in rather high fashion for socalled "beautiful" people.

Malatesta's salon has been in the black since it opened. Among the 500 members are 21 ambassadors, 28 members of Congress and the top executive officers of 15 of the republic's largest corporations. The place is filled nearly every night of the week. To get a dinner reservation at the best restaurants here, people must usually call one day in advance.

Washington was always considered "work" town, where bureaucrats and congressional staffers labored into the long week nights, poring over words on paper. But Washington has become a "fun" city in recent years. Watergate, in an odd way, has contributed because of the drama, the cast of characters and the climax (the first President to be forced out of of-

Small wonder that the young come here, looking for villains to pursue, studying journalism and law, and maybe getting a job on Capitol Hill now considered the staging area for assaults on the White House. Many a tired legislator allows staffers to serve as surrogates at committee meetings, thus giving those decisionmaking sessions a youthful tone.

All through the recession, there was plenty of money spent here. The lob-

byists, well-paid singles in professional work, politicians blessed with money, the big income lawyers and corporation front men, all know how to live big.

Too many fine old buildings from the 19th century are crushed to wreckage to allow the temples of technocracy, in glass, steel, aluminum and prefab concrete, to rise to their limit of power - 13 stories (no higher than the Capitol). And yet adventuresome young professionals are buying noble but neglected old houses downtown, renovating them and creating new neighborhoods which will soon be fashionable.

All that's missing is a professional baseball team, but the hedonists here are too fast for baseball anyway.



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Henry Jackson, candidate of many No. 1 priorities



Sen. Henry H. Jackson Top priorities to spare. By PETER ARNETT AP Special Correspondent

The crowd at Elm and Main in Rochester, N.Y., cheered when the candidate declared: "As President of the United States my number one priority will be to put America back to work so people can buy things that are manufactured here in this town."

A mostly elderly crowd at Buffalo smiled happily when they heard their choice say: "I want to give top priority, first priority, to full coverage under Medicare for senior citziens. We don't have that now.

Supporters massed at the Frontier Fire Hall at Niagara Falls roared as the candidate said: "The first thing I will do is insist welfare be a national obligation, and, not put on the shoulders of the local people."

Three priorities, all number one. One candidate.

Senator Henry M., Jackson campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination in New York. Jackson emphasized these different priorities to different audiences as the political pressure grew in New York

from his two most serious opponents, former Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter and Rep. Morris K. Udall of

Arizona. And in the last days of the campaign the senator reached out for a broader constituency than his major supporters among the labor organizations, Jewish communities and regular Democrats.

Jackson speeded up his public appearances to include blacks, Puerto Ricans and other ethnic groups and in one 36-hour period made these pro-

Puerto Ricans: "If elected president of the United States I will have in the White House a special assistant for Puerto Rican affairs so that problems of Puerto Rico and their importance to the United States will not be lost in the bureaucratic jungle," he told the Puerto Rican chamber of commerce in New York.

Jackson also promised "a more diligent prosecution of the bilingual education program" to further assist Hispanic voters.

Canadians: "Canadians are wonderful, terrific people, great

neighbors. I want to see more emphasis in our foreign policy with reference to our neighbors here in North America. They've been neglected too long. We've taken them for granted," Jackson told a campaign meeting at Niagara County in upstate New York, a region that is heavily Canadian.

Blacks: "Medgar Evers died once, and I don't think we should lay the foundation for a second death," Jackson told 750 students meeting in the gymnasium of the Medgar Evers college in Brooklyn. The college, with a 98 per cent black student body, is faced with reduction to a two-year institution because of New York's financial problems.

Jackson told them also: "We've gone through the long civil rights struggle to bring about the right to vote, to bring about integration, equal employment opportunities and all of the other basic rights we're familiar with. The most important right is still denied, that of the civil right to a decent job and decent pay scale."

Much improved as an orator on this campaign, the grayhaired Washington state senator punches the air occasionally to emphasize his statements.

'We've got so much work to do in this country that everyone is going to be busy in the Jackson administration," he told a meeting in an upstate New York county with 14 per cent

unemployment. He has told other listeners; "Every time you reduce unemployment 1 per cent you have \$16 billion more in the Treasury. With full employment we'll have \$100 billion.'

No one asked him to explain his mathematics, or questioned him about how he would reduce unemployment to 3 per cent from the present rate of more than 7 per cent.

Not that there was much time for questions. Jackson made five campaign appearances one evening in Brooklyn, and his upstate New York trips were so tightly scheduled that the candidte could in all honesty beg off questions because he had to speed on to the next meeting place.

He was caught only at Medgar Evers College in Brooklyn. He moved among the student body to shake hands, only to be confronted by demanding students who insisted in knowing his plan to save their college. He didn't have one.

While Jackson had something special to offer each audience, he also had a major theme, and this seemed to be the promotion of a much more active federal role in health, education and welfare programs in America.

Jackson showed subtle differences in his comments on welfare payments. To a construction worker audience in Rochester, Jackson declared that there was "\$75 million a year in handout checks" given in various forms of assistance from state and federal authorities. "We're going to take welfare and put it where t belongs in the hands of the federal government and not on the backs of the local people," he told his cheering white audiences.

However, Jacksonnever mentioned handout checks in talking with his black and Puerto Rican audiences in New York City. He explained that 'when unemployment goes up 1 per cent we lose \$16 billion in revenue'

Certainly it was the most colorful, most skillfully staged and, by nearly any reckoning, most enthusiastically-received of any of the dozen or more dance evenings presented here during the last seven

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) -Apollo-Soyuz astronaut Donald K. 'Deke'' Slayton says workers in the nation's spacerelated industries should talk to their neighbors to drum up support for space programs.

"Stars and Stripes," utilizing music of famed John Philip Sousa as arranged by Hershy Kay, is a delightfully witty and insouciant work which, notwithstanding, makes some quite serious demands of its dancers. In the pas de deux here, Martin-Viscount and Miss Verdy performed with verve and dash but with very real skill, as one might expect. It's a fool-the-eye work- the the levity, the wit is there, but so is the deadseriousness of the technical demands. Miss Verdy and Martin-Viscount had excellent solo intervals and they also provided some fine duo work. They complemented each other very well in the piece and the applause they drew from the audience was deserved. The pair's costumes were splendid.

After discussion of several proposed pieces of legislation, however, Langdon said, "I feel you'd have about as much success if you called a special session to repeal the laws of gravity."

Wallace recommended a study of the feasibility of shifting the regulation of gas utilities to the utilities commission, and if that is not done, he said, the commission's gas utilities division should be reorganized.

The reorganization, he said, should include "mobile staffs to move about the state on call to assist cities without expertise in gas rate mat-

Wallace also said the subcommittee should consider legislation requiring cities to show on utility bills how much it actually cost to generate electricity and how much the cities were adding on to the bills for city

President Harry Hubbard of the Texas AFL-CIO said he suspected that legislative and administrative agencies had avoided public investigations of rising gas prices "to hide the real villains: the gas production monopolies."

A factor "in the creation of pricerigging practices has been the policies of the majority of the railroad commission, which historically has protected the private interest at the expense of the public interest," Hubbard said.

Lo-Vaca case heads for court settlement

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - Longstanding issues over gas rates charged by Lo-Vaca Gathering Co., major gas supplier in South Texas, appear headed for resolution in the courts.

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a final order Monday in the Lo-Vaca case, ordering the company to live up to its gas supply contracts unless all customers agree to an alternate formula.

Lo-Vaca has been able to recover its full natural gas costs, plus a nickle per 1,000 cubic feet (mcf), from customers under the commission's temporary order of Sept. 27, 1973.

Now the commission says LoVaca must stick with original contract prices that ran as low as 20 cents per mcf, compared with almost \$2 today.

But if Lo-Vaca's some 400 customers-including Austin, San Antonio and Corpus Christi-feel such an arrangement would threaten Lo-Vaca's ability to supply them with gas they have an option.

Lo-Vaca could pass on 85 per cent of its gas costs to its customers, plus at least a dime per mcf, but only if its customers agree unanimously. One holdout would force Lo-Vaca to

charge only the contract price.

The commission's 2-1 vote also allows customers to obtain refunds of the money paid to Lo-Vaca in excess of contract prices since September

The order makes Lo-Vaca's

profitable parent, Coastal States Gas Producing Co., jointly responsible with LoVaca to assure performance of the contracts.

Voting for the new order were commissioners Mack Wallace and Ben Ramsey. Commissioner Jim Langdon voted "no."



That was a key thought an oil company executive tried to get across to a somewhat skeptical audience at the National Press Club last week.

The speaker was K. C. Kauffmann, president of Exxon Corporation. The theme of his speech was divestiture, a move being pushed by some members of Congress to break up the big, integrated oil companies.

The point he sought to make was that the government has that power; but the question he raised was how this would result in more energy supplies for the consumer.

In effect he was saying that the companies can be made the whipping boy but that will not necessarily mean more wells will be drilled, more refineries built and more progress made toward developing stupplemental energy supplies.

He conceded that the petroleum industry didn't do a very good job of telling its story to the public, especially at the time of the oil embargo when lines of cars formed at service stations in many parts of the country and there was concern about the supply of fuel oil to heat homes, offices and industrial plants.

In any event, the industry got most of the blame even though many industry leaders had been warning that increased dependence on overseas supplies could mean that both price and supply would be subject to the whims of those outside the United States.

"It's really amazing that a whole nation can get so doggone mad at one industry," Kuffmann said in a light vein at the outset of his talk.

Part of the reason for the reaction, he confessed, was that the oil industry traditionally had taken a position

"We are finding out," Kauffmann told his Press Club audience, "that you can be hurt by failing to speak out on public issues.

Apparently many other industry officials have learned this lesson because more and more of them are speaking out these days when only a few years ago they would have remained silent.

'It is clear that in the current situation the burden of correcting misunderstanding falls heavily on the oil industry," Kauffmann said.

Technically, a person-or an industry-is innocent until proved guilty, but Kauffmann was conceding that in the present setting the industry has the job of proving its innocence because there is abroad in this country the suspicion that something s wrong with the way the petroleum industry is performing. In fact, with some people, there appears to be an eagerness to believe that this is so.

There is no doubt that the trend of public opinion is running strongly against the oil industry," Kauffmann

Are major oil companies too big and too powerful? Kauffman conceded they are, indeed, but he said that simply reflects the scope of the chores they are supposed to get done. That is, you can't send a boy to do a man's job.

He also pointed out that the only substitute for big companies to undertake the complex and costly problems of energy development is another and even bigger entity, the government itself.

A point of focus by some critics of the oil industry at present is on integration, either vertical from wellhead to service station pump or horizontal with oil companies getting into coal, nuclear and other energy

Kauffmann responded to this by pointing out that integration is a natural thing in almost any industry and this even extends to government oil companies around the world. Kissinger reveals he seriously thought of resigning in '73

WASHINGTON - Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger disclosed Monday that he thought seriously enough of resigning as White House security adviser at the end of President Richard M. Nixon's first term to have transferred certain private papers from the White House to a vault at Vice President Rockefeller's estate in New York.

The papers, according to a statement issued through the State Department press office, consisted of "Harvard files and personal papers covering the years before 1969," when Kissinger joined the Nixon administration. "No documents, memoranda or other records were removed from the White House files," the statement-

Kissinger returned all the papers to the White House "in the spring of 1973," after it "became clear he could not resign under Watergate conditions," the official statement added.

Kissinger was named secretary of state in August, 1973, as the shadows of Watergate lengthened over the Nixon administration, and he retained his White House office as national security adviser until last November.

The formal statement, prepared for the daily State Department press briefing and cleared by Kissinger personally, was unusual in that it formally confirmed what had often been rumored about Kissinger's desires to leave Washington during the political firestorm of early 1973, when his Vietnam peace efforts appeared in ruin and Hanoi was bombed daily by B-52s.

As such, it seemed a graphic reminder of the political pressure against Kissinger that is being generated now in the current presidential campaign.

At the same time, it reflected Kissinger's growing sensitivity to attacks on his stewardship of U.S. foreign policy for nearly eight years -

especially on his intense belief in the need to keep his policy-making secret. Kissinger's only previous serious

reference to a premature departure from office came in May, 1974, after a series of public charges that he instigated the wiretapping of some of his aides in an attempt to stem news leaks. He threatened publicly to resign if not exonerated, won endorsement from the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and was in early August declared indispensable by the newly inaugurated President Ford.

This time Kissinger was reacting to a charge in controversial new book on Nixon's last days in office by Washington Post reporters Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward. In their account, Kissinger so distrusted Nixon's White House inner circle that he moved "some of the most sensitive" papers and files to Rockefeller's Pocantico Hills estate.

When a legal adviser reminded him that it was against the law to store classified documents outside government facilities, Kissinger had the files returned to the White House," the Woodward-Bernstein book reports.

Amplifying further late Monday, Kissinger declared through a spokesman that the authors were "factually inaccurate on that point." Kissinger, department spokesman John Trattner said, "brought the papers back on his own" when he decided against resigning.

Trattner said Kissinger "talked to a lawyer later about the general problem, but his papers, including the Harvard papers, had already been brought back before his conversation with the lawyer.

What "general problem" may have bothered Kissinger was not explained, and aides close to the secretary declined to discuss the issue other than to stress that the papers which temporarily stored at the Rockefeller estate included no official

"If this bill were to become law, I believe pressures could be brought to bear on federal employes in extremely subtle ways beyond the reach of any anti-coercion statute so that they would inevitably feel compelled to engage in partisan political activity,' the President said.

'This would be bad for the employe, bad for the government and bad for the public," he added.

The bill, which would be effective Jan. 1, 1977, and thus not affect this year's elections, would allow civilian federal employes to run for local, state or federal office as Democrats or Republicans. The only exceptions would be employes of the Central Intelligence Agency and those holding "sensitive" positions in the Justice Department and the Internal Revenue Service.


