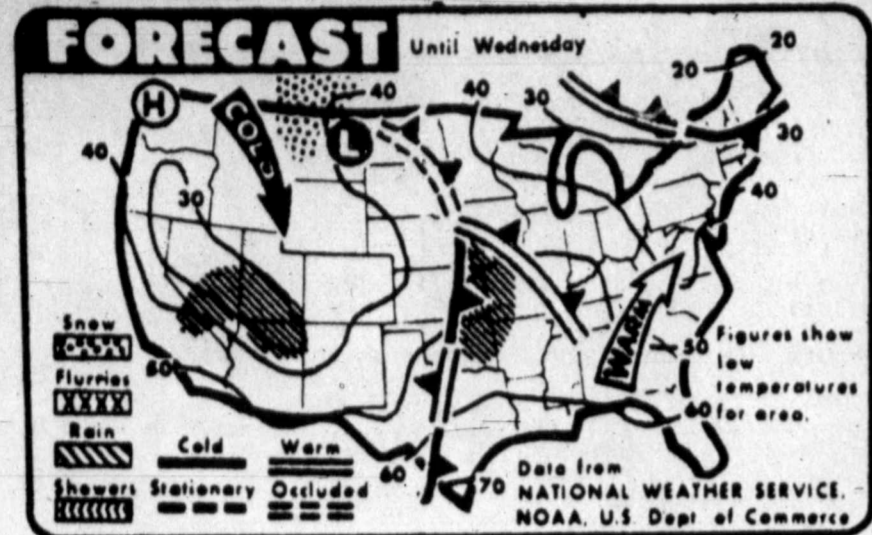

Judge orders psychiatric testing of Hearst

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Patricia Hearst, her final sentencing for armed bank robbery delayed, prepared today for a 90-day psychiatric evaluation that could be crucial in her bid for freedom.

Authorities plan to take Miss Hearst from the jail cell that has been her home for seven months and fly her to Los Angeles Wednesday for a pre-trial hearing on state charges of kidnap, robbery and assault. The charges stem from a crime spree there a month after the San Francisco bank holdup of which she was convicted.

After what is expected to be a brief court session, she will move on to the

Metropolitan Correctional Center at San Diego where she will undergo a lengthy court-ordered psychiatric examination.

U.S. District Court Judge Oliver J. Carter, at the request of defense attorney F. Lee Bailey, ordered the additional testing Monday.

As a formality, he sentenced the newspaper heiress to the maximum 35 years in prison — 25 years for armed bank robbery and 10 years for use of a firearm in a felony — to meet the requirements of the law allowing the extended psychiatric examinations.

But Carter made clear that he would reduce the sentence after the

final reports on Miss Hearst's San Diego examination are submitted. "How much, I'm not now prepared to say," he told attorneys.

He noted that he has said before that the maximum sentence he would consider is 25 years, with any prison terms for the two counts running concurrently.

He specifically urged Miss Hearst to cooperate fully with prison psychiatrists, saying it would be a factor in determining "the nature of the modification" of her punishment.

"The court finds that it requires more detailed information before it can make a final determination of

sentence to be imposed," the judge said.

The U.S. Bureau of Prisons will designate the psychiatrists who will examine Miss Hearst, 22, and submit a report to Carter. If necessary, Carter may extend the deadline another 90 days.

The judge's options of sentencing the one-time kidnap victim range from a maximum penalty to simple probation.

Carter, however, strongly hinted during Monday's 35-minute court session that he is not leaning toward leniency at this time.

He said the weight of the evidence

during her eight-week trial supported the verdict that Miss Hearst willingly joined her Symbionese Liberation Army kidnapers in a terrorist bank robbery on April 15, 1974, 10 weeks after her abduction.

She was convicted March 20, even though she tearfully testified she was threatened with death if she did not participate in the holdup.

Bailey spoke briefly on behalf of his client, saying that he doubted society needed to be protected from Miss Hearst, and he urged that "retribution by society" should be avoided.

U.S. Atty. James L. Browning Jr., who prosecuted the case, did not speak and had no comment for reporters.

Senate votes \$412.6-billion spending lid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate is backing President Ford's request for a record peacetime defense budget but is making no moves to cut domestic spending that the administration finds "unnecessary or undesirable."

In adopting an over-all \$412.6 billion federal spending ceiling for fiscal 1977, the Senate beat down an attempt

to cut defense programs by \$500 million.

The Senate on Monday gave Ford nearly all he asked for defense, trimming only \$300 million from the \$101.1 billion he requested. The \$500 million additional cut proposed in an amendment by Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., was beaten by a 58-27 vote.

The House only last Friday in-

dicated its support for a high level of defense spending, passing a \$33.3 billion military weapons procurement bill at a level \$1 billion more than Ford requested.

The resolution setting congressional spending ceilings now goes to the House for consideration after an Easter recess ending April

26.

The \$412.6 billion over-all budget compares with \$395.2 billion recommended by Ford in January.

The Senate Budget Committee, which had recommended cutting the \$300 million in defense spending, calculated that its ceiling for 17 categories of expenditures would produce a deficit next year of \$50.2 billion. But this figure was disputed by administration officials.

The administration's budget calls for a \$46.6 billion deficit on figures also disputed by congressional budget experts.

Budget director James T. Lynn said after Monday's vote that the Senate

budget target will produce a deficit of \$54 billion next fiscal year.

"The truth is that the Senate budget adds at least \$16 billion in unnecessary or undesirable federal spending," Lynn said in a statement.

In addition to refusing to slash defense spending, the Senate also defeated attempts to increase or to reduce domestic program expenditures recommended by its Budget Committee.

The House Budget Committee has approved a congressional budget resolution calling for \$413.6 billion in over-all federal spending next year, with an estimated deficit of \$50.6 billion.

Callaway lambastes subpanel

WASHINGTON — Howard H. (Bo) Callaway, in a bitter tirade against a Senate subcommittee, denied Monday that he had improperly attempted to influence the U.S. Forest Service in behalf of his Colorado ski resort.

The former Army secretary, who resigned two weeks ago as President Ford's national campaign manager, acknowledged only that he may have been "naive" at one point in the affair but insisted, he had done nothing wrong.

He accused the subcommittee chairman, Sen. Floyd Haskell (D-Colo.), of impugning his motives, denounced as "trash" a document which prompted the investigation of him, and wound up telling the subcommittee members:

"The U.S. Senate is not well served by abandoning its sacred heritage today."

In a display of passion mixed with exasperation, he asked the subcommittee to exonerate him. Citing his southern family's long history of business success and philanthropy, Callaway declared, "I have too much of a birthright to sell it for a mess of porridge."

Callaway suffered another setback Monday when the subcommittee, over his protestations, recessed until mid-May without interrogating him after an angry dispute over calling three of his adversaries as witnesses. He had pleaded not to be left "twisting in the wind" for a long period of time and asked that the hearings be completed Monday.

Ford might okay jobs bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A scaled-down \$2.5 billion public works jobs bill before the Senate stands a good chance of being accepted by President Ford as long as Congress doesn't increase the price tag, a Senate public leader says.

But Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., assistant minority leader, also warned that expensive amendments could make Senate consideration of the bill "a futile political exercise."

The Senate today was to begin work on the measure designed as an alternative to the \$6.1-billion jobs bill vetoed earlier this year by President Ford.

Two expensive programs contained in the vetoed measure were left out of the new version, but efforts are expected to be made to tack them on again during floor debate.

Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, has indicated he intends to try to revive a \$1.5-billion anti-recession revenue-sharing program to aid local governments in times of high unemployment. That measure was in the vetoed bill, as was a \$1.4-billion program of new federal grants for waste treatment programs also missing from the proposed compromise.

Schoolboy shot fatally

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Juvenile authorities held a 15-year-old suspect today while police investigated a shooting in a high school hallway which left one teen-ager dead and another wounded.

Lorenzo Kneeland, 15, died in a hospital about two hours after the shooting Monday afternoon at the city's O. D. Wyatt High School here. Police said he had been shot in the chest and abdomen.

James Christian, 15, a freshman, was in stable condition Monday night with a gunshot wound in the hip.

In a Senate speech Monday, Griffin said the scaled-down version, which backers say could generate 50,000 to 100,000 new jobs, mostly on construction projects, is "a lot closer to the mark" than the vetoed measure.

But he urged senators to unite behind the bill and fight off attempts "to turn it back into a budget-busting bill."

Ford vetoed the earlier bill on Feb. 13, calling it "little more than an election year pork barrel." The House voted 319 to 98 to override the veto, but the Senate failed by three votes to achieve the required two-thirds majority.

The public-works jobs bill is the second measure designed to create jobs up for congressional consideration this week. Congress sent to the White House on Monday a bill carrying \$1.2 billion for public service jobs designed to maintain through January 1977 the present level of 315,000 persons employed in special programs by state and local governments.

The bill also carries \$528.4 million for 888,000 jobs for youths this summer, a proposal requested by Ford, \$55.9 million for 15,000 jobs for elderly persons and \$23 million for summer recreation and community programs.

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Midland funds on PBRPC list

The City of Midland's application for \$576,000 in Community Development funds will be reviewed at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday by the board of directors of the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission (PBRPC).

The application is being submitted to the Department of Housing and Urban Development and will be split in the amount of \$43,000 for rehabilitation, \$25,000 for code enforcement, \$28,000 for clearance and demolition, \$142,000 for acquisition of property for public use, \$205,000 for paving, curbs and gutters, \$100,000 for park conservation and rehabilitation, \$23,000 for planning and management and \$10,000 for contingencies.

PBRPC directors will also study an application for \$50,493 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's administration on aging by Midland College. The application is for a three-year education and pre-retirement service project designed to provide senior citizens with information and referral services, and pre-retirement counseling.

The board will discuss the grant application of the Midland Community Action Agency for \$33,000 with a contribution of \$8,250 for a project total of \$41,250 for general community programming.

In other action, PBRPC board members will consider:

— An application by the Pecos County Community Action Agency for \$26,848 from the Community Services Administration with a local contribution of \$10,152 for a project total of \$37,000 for general community programming;

— An application by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation for \$467,900 from the Federal Highway Administration to bring a county road up to state standards;

— Two grant applications by the Permian Basin Community Centers for MH-MR, both for \$50,000 with local matching portions of \$16,667 from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, for two phases in community follow-up as an aid to treatment of alcoholism;

— A grant application by the Permian Basin Community Centers for MH-MR for \$40,000 from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism with a local match of \$13,333 to provide services to minority residents with alcoholism problems in Midland and Ector Counties;

— An application by the City of Big Spring for \$50,000 from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism with a local match of \$18,838 for continued operation of the Big Spring Detoxification Center;

— An application by Howard College for \$28,328.35 from the Criminal Justice Division of the State of Texas with a local match of \$10,650 to expand its campus police system;

— Two budget requests by Permian Basin Planned Parenthood to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare through the Public Health Service for \$105,000 with a local match of \$311,258 for expansion of clinic sites to Gaines and Dawson Counties and for \$86,300 with a local match of \$302,941 which excludes this plan;

— An application by the Texas Tech University School of Medicine for \$24,500 from HEW for continuation of the family practice preceptorship program;

— An application by the Texas Tech School of Medicine for \$364,000 for a family medicine training program;

— An application by the City of Odessa for \$1,234,043 from the Environmental Protection Agency for step II of a sanitary sewer extension and an environmental assessment;

— An application by PBRPC for \$35,234 from the Criminal Justice Division for continued operation of the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Academy;

— An application by PBRPC for \$45,784 from the Governor's Committee on Aging for continuation of activities of the Permian Basin Regional Office on Aging, with a cash contribution of \$17,681 for a project total of \$63,465;

— An application by PBRPC for \$19,000 from the Texas Commission on Alcoholism with a local match of \$6,590 for continuation of the Region 9 Alcoholism Authority;

— Approval of the 1976 "Regional Plan for the Prevention, Treatment and Control of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism";

— A resolution supporting the nomination of Midland County Judge Barbara Culver as president of the National Association of Regional Councils, and

— A resolution supporting the continued operation of Webb Air Force Base in Big Spring.

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Aussies review policy

Australia is preparing to defend its claims to three-sevenths of Antarctica — the world's only nuclear-free zone.
Antarctic policy is under close review because of new pressures from underdeveloped countries for access to resources throughout the area. Both sides of Australian politics want all nuclear fission permanently prohibited around the South Pole.
Emerging from the Law of the Sea Conference, Australia expects a new interest by many nations in the future economic, scientific, meteorological and defense value of Antarctica. The Antarctic treaty powers will meet in Paris in June and July of this year. The normal regular consultative meeting will not be held until 1977, in London. An earlier meeting is regarded as necessary by France and Australia.
Signers of the Antarctic Treaty of 1959 decided at their eighth meeting in Oslo last June that an examination on resources was urgent.
Apart from the land mass under the ice, the seas around Antarctica are believed to hold many vital elements such as magnesium and carbon products, while Australia has seen traces of coal and hints of minerals. There is a conflict between the sovereignty claimants (Australia, Norway, the United Kingdom, France, New Zealand, Chile and Argentina) and the two great powers — The United States and the Soviet Union backed by Japan, Belgium and South Africa.
The non-claimant states with special emphasis from the U.S. do not recognize sovereignty over the area and believe exploration should begin as soon as any organization or nation wishes.
The issue has been delayed by a decision of the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations which decided last year to survey the southern ocean. This is now progressing. Australia, on the lines of the U.S. decision around its own continent, is claiming rights over a 200-mile economic zone around three-sevenths of Antarctica which Australia insists is under its sovereignty.
The Soviet Union has had a base in the area for several years and installed a new base there in 1975. Australia is keeping a closer watch on shipping activities in the southern oceans by both the Russians and the Japanese.
Australia's new study begins with priority on keeping the area nuclear free backed by the strongest resistance to occasional suggestions by some of the non-claimant states that nuclear waste should be dumped at the South Pole.
Politically, the issue has not become a controversy in Australia, but, by the time the treaty powers meet in Paris this summer, Australia will have defined its attitudes on defending its claims in Antarctica, sustaining the 1959 Antarctic Treaty and persuading the Soviet Union and the Japanese that fishing activities must be regularly reviewed.
Through its diplomatic network Australia knows that underdeveloped countries are especially interested in possible access to petroleum in the Antarctic Ocean bed.
Businesses in the U.S., in Australia's opinion, are also ready to exploit petroleum resources in the southern seas but do not wish to come into conflict with the Soviet Union, Argentina, Australia, New Zealand or France.
Sri Lanka proposed last year United Nations control of all or part of Antarctica. This has alarmed Australia and other treaty powers and lies behind the meeting in Paris which France is sponsoring. The Sri Lanka move was postponed with promises of a scientific review.

Marines say phone records back up claim

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps says it has telephone records that prove a recruiter made required checks with law enforcement authorities to clear the way for induction of a Texas youth who later was killed in a training mishap.

The records show that the recruiter made calls from his Austin, Tex., office to the police department and the Angelina County district attorney's office in Lufkin, Tex., on Nov. 12, 1975. The Marines also say a third call was made to the county sheriff's office but there is no telephone receipt to prove it.

Local officials in Lufkin have disputed the Marines' claim that the inquiries were made about Lynn McClure, 20, saying they have no records and no recollection of any such calls. But they concede that it is possible the calls were received.

Controversy over the Marines' pre-enlistment screening of McClure arose after he suffered head injuries in a close-combat training exercise at San Diego in December and died March 13 without regaining consciousness.

Members of McClure's family and others have said the youth was retarded and of doubtful fitness for the Marines and that he had a record of mental illness and several minor brushes with the law that would have disqualified him for recruitment under Marine regulations.

The Marines claim the local authorities misled them about McClure's history and currently are conducting two investigations — one into his death and the other to find out how he came to be accepted for service after having failed the enlistment test on a previous try.

In addition, the case has spurred demands in Congress for investigations of Marine recruitment and training policies, the program in which McClure was injured has been suspended, and his family has filed a \$3.5 million claim against the U.S. government.

Marine spokesmen here said the telephone receipts were turned up in the corps' investigation of McClure's recruitment. That inquiry is complete and now "under evaluation" by senior officers at Marine headquarters here, they said.

The spokesmen said the receipts from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. show two calls were placed Nov. 12 from the Austin recruiting office to Lufkin. One, costing \$1.40, was to the office of Dist. Atty. John Henry Tatum and the other, for \$2.39, was to the Lufkin police.

The Marines said records show that M. Sgt. Harold Faulkner, the recruiter, checked the box for "no police record" on a standard Defense Department form he filled out for McClure. He indicated he spoke to a "Johnson" at the sheriff's office and "Ms. Walker" at the police department. No such persons exist, officials there said.

Faulkner retired from the Marine Corps last week after 20 years of service. Corps spokesmen said his retirement was scheduled and was in no way related to the McClure case.

They said he was an experienced recruiting officer, serving his second tour in that capacity. As to exactly what questions Faulkner may have asked in his calls to Lufkin, the Marines said they didn't know. Faulkner himself could not be reached by telephone.

The Marines contend Faulkner did not enlist McClure simply to help make his recruiting quota for the month.

"It was during the middle of the month and the quota pressure doesn't get to the recruiters until the end of the month," he said.

McClure originally tried to join the Marines when a military "Mobile Evaluating Team" visited Lufkin in September of last year, but the Marines said he finished in the "seventh percentile" on the standard armed forces qualification test and was rejected.

But in November he applied for enlistment again, this time at Faulkner's office in Austin, and was accepted after preliminary interviews, Marine spokesmen said. He was given a bus ticket to San Antonio where he took a test similar or identical to the one he had flunked, this time scoring in the 39th percentile, they said.

"All of the procedures were observed and he was tested by the normal routine," said the spokesman, adding that it had been the judgment of Faulkner and others who met McClure that he could make the grade.

McClure family believes corps cooperating now

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A family attorney says the Marine Corps is cooperating now in an investigation of the death of 20-year-old recruit Lynn McClure of Lufkin, Tex.

John Gyorkos, who represents McClure's family in a \$3.5 million wrongful death claim against the Marines, also acknowledged Monday that some earlier statements made by him apparently were incorrect.

At Gyorkos' request, U.S. District Court Judge William Enright removed from his calendar a motion seeking an injunction for a right of discovery on the Marine Corps Recruit Depot here.

Gyorkos said he was satisfied that the Marine Corps was cooperating with him but he retained the right to again ask for an injunction if the Marine authorities later blocked his investigation.

The lawyer said the 115-pound McClure suffered his fatal head injury when drill sergeants forced him to fight several men in succession in combat drills.

McClure died March 13 in the Veterans Hospital at Houston, Tex., without regaining consciousness after the Dec. 6 combat drill.

Gyorkos said Monday he apparently was wrong when he said earlier that McClure was mentally retarded and forced to fight without the standard protective gear.

An investigator for Gyorkos said he talked with a Marine private at nearby Camp Pendleton who was one of "six or seven" men who allegedly fought McClure, one at a time.

The report by Pvt. R. A. Perry said McClure merely held the heavily padded pugil stick and provided himself with a "minimal defense," investigator Irving Rinhards told reporters.

By the time they fought, Perry said McClure had battled with two other Marines and "was pretty groggy and could not effectively defend himself."

Gyorkos said McClure tried to flee several times but was ordered back into the ring. His helmet was knocked off several times but each time a drill instructor stopped the bout and allowed McClure to replace it, Gyorkos said.

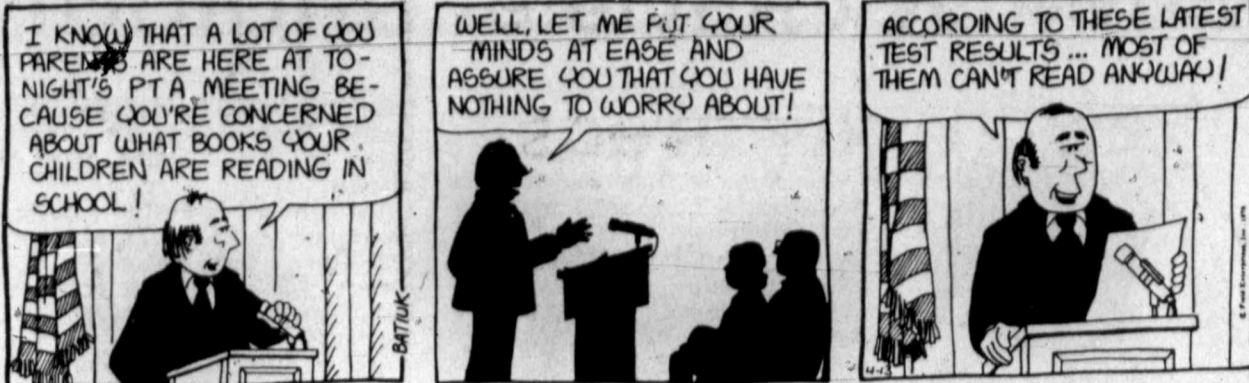

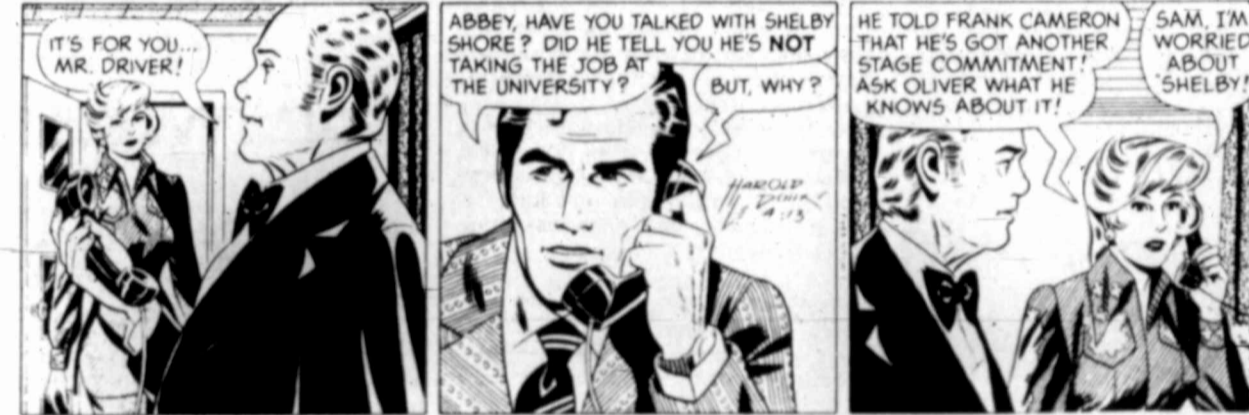

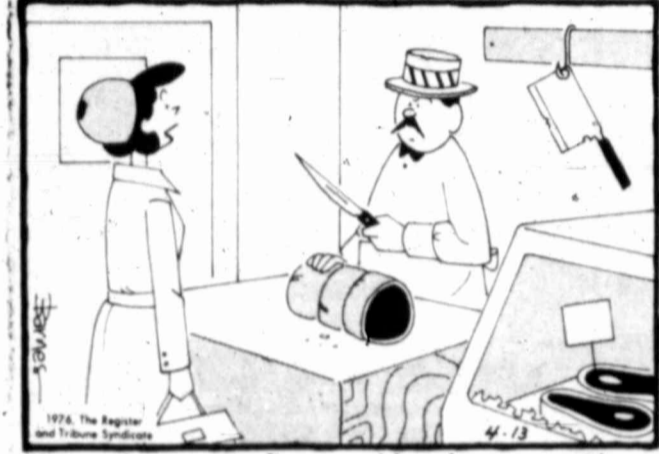
