# 50-state Peace Run passes Muleshoe on westward leg

Peace runners passed through Muleshoe on Tuesday, carrying a torch for the cause of world peace.

They were greeted by David Tipps, president of Muleshoe's Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Lonnie Adrian, a local businessman Tipps calls an "exercise fanatic," ran with the international runners near Muleshoe.

The peace relay spans the United States and is dedicated to world peace. The flaming torch represents the goal of peace through sports.

Tipps said that Clinton and Evelyn Pete supplied rooms He said that Joe Rhodes of Joe's Boot Shop entertained the runners with a tour of his farm and Victor Leal provided a free meal at his restaurant for the runners.

A spokesman for the runners said that the run is related to world peace because of the spirit of cooperation between runners of many nations and because the runners like to talk to school children along the way about expressing kindness and caring instead of anger and ha-

The 11,000 mile U.S Peace Run is part of the 70-nation Sri Chinmoy Oneness-Home at the Heritage House Inn for Peace Run, which has been

The non-profit Peace Run was inspired by world peace ambassador Sri Chinmoy, who has dedicated his life to promotion of peace.

He has written and lectured extensively on peace, offered hundreds of free peace concerts and met with many world figures to advance the cause of international harmony.

The global Peace Run was kicked off April 15 with a relay run through all five boroughs of New York.


missions examination such as the ACT or SAT. These students demonstrate high motivation, initiative, integrity, intellectual depth, leadership qualities and exceptional judgement.



# MHS to administer TAAS tests in July

be administering the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) during the month of July. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in school and who have not previously met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test, but have met all other graduation requirements, may retake the necessary section(s).

Individual who wish to take the TEAMS (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) Test must also register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements. Outof-school examinees and enrolled students who wish to test at a site other than their home district must register. Students who were enrolled in Grade 12 in the spring of 1995

Muleshoe High School will are considered enrolled students, not out-of-school exam-

> All individuals who wish to take the TAAS or TEAMS test. may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office. or education service center. The test registration form must be completed and returned in the pre-addresses envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa no later the 5:00 p.m., June 9.

The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. To ensure that individuals are registered, forms should be sent either by registered mail or certified mail. Questions concerning the spring exit level testing should be directed to Linda Marr, Muleshoe High School, 272-7571.

I have no stock in Exxon, and I'm aware that neither individuals nor corporations always live up to their own highest standards. But I have respect for those who try. What follows was Exxon's policy a few years ago, and I assume it still is. It should be ours also.

"The policy of this corporation as stated by the Board of Directors years ago and reaffirmed by the

Board [1975 meeting] is one of strict observance of all laws applicable to its business.

"Our policy does not stop there. Even where the law is permissive, Exxon chooses the course of highest integrity. Local customs, traditions, and mores differ from place to place, and this must be recognized, but honesty is not subject to criticism in any culture. Shades of dishonesty simply invite demoralizing and reprehensible judgments. A well-founded reputation for scrupulous dealing is itself a priceless company asset.

"An overly ambitious employee might have the mistaken idea that we do not care how results are obtained as long as he gets results. This person might think it is best not to tell higher management all that he is doing, not to record all transactions accurately in his books or records, and to deceive the corporation's internal and external auditors. He would be wrong on all counts.

"We do care how we get results. We expect compliance with our standard of integrity throughout the organization. We will not tolerate an employee who achieves results at the cost of violation of laws or unscrupulous dealing. By the same token, we will support, and we expect you to support, an employee who passes up an opportunity or an advantage which can only be secured at the sacrifice of principle.

"Equally important, we expect candor from managers at all levels, and compliance with accounting rules and controls. We don't want liars for managers, whether they are lying in a mistaken effort to protect us or to make themselves look good. One harm which results when a manager conceals information from higher management and the auditors, is that subordinates think they are being given a signal that the company policies and rules, including accounting and control rules, can be ignored whenever convenient. This can result in corruption and demoralization of an organization. Our system of management will not work without honesty."

Neither will our society.


