50-state Peace Run passes Muleshoe on westward leg

Peace runners passed through Muleshoe on Tuesday, carrying a torch for the cause of world peace.

They were greeted by David Tipps, president of Muleshoe's Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Lonnie Adrian, a local businessman Tipps calls an "exercise fanatic," ran with the international runners near Muleshoe.

The peace relay spans the United States and is dedicated to world peace. The flaming torch represents the goal of peace through sports.

Tipps said that Clinton and Evelyn Pete supplied rooms at the Heritage House Inn for

the runners on Tuesday night. He said that Joe Rhodes of Joe's Boot Shop entertained the runners with a tour of his farm and Victor Leal provided a free meal at his restaurant for the runners.

A spokesman for the runners said that the run is related to world peace because of the spirit of cooperation between runners of many nations and because the runners like to talk to school children along the way about expressing kindness and caring instead of anger and hatred.

The 11,000-mile U.S. Peace Run is part of the 70-nation Sri Chinmoy Oneness-Home Peace Run, which has been

held every other year since 1987.

The non-profit Peace Run was inspired by world peace ambassador Sri Chinmoy, who has dedicated his life to promotion of peace.

He has written and lectured extensively on peace, offered hundreds of free peace concerts and met with many world figures to advance the cause of international harmony.

The global Peace Run was kicked off April 15 with a relay run through all five boroughs of New York.

The runners left Muleshoe with momentos of the community provided by Joe's Boot Shop and the Chamber of Commerce.

She has received President Clinton's award for educational excellence and the UIL scholar award.

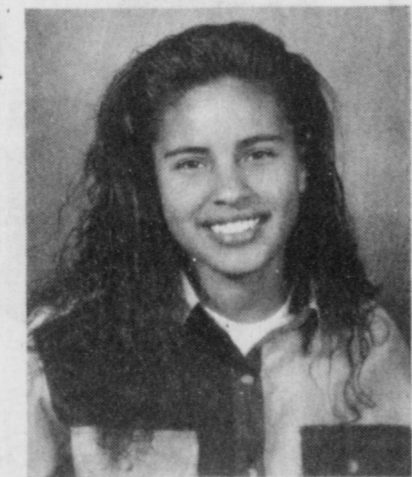
At Lazbuddie High School, Rachelle Rice, the daughter of Doug and Linda Rice, was named valedictorian with a GPA of 97.61.

She has been active in vol-



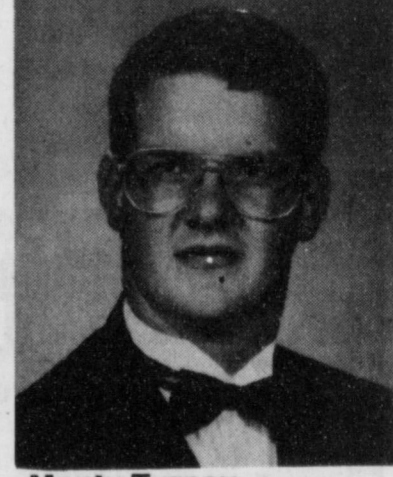

MHS to administer TAAS tests in July

Muleshoe High School will be administering the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) during the month of July. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in school and who have not previously met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test, but have met all other graduation requirements, may retake the necessary section(s).

Individual who wish to take the TEAMS (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) Test must also register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high school graduation requirements. Out-of-school examinees and enrolled students who wish to test at a site other than their home district must register. Students who were enrolled in Grade 12 in the spring of 1995

are considered enrolled students, not out-of-school examinees.

All individuals who wish to take the TAAS or TEAMS test, may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office, or education service center. The test registration form must be completed and returned in the pre-addresses envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa no later the 5:00 p.m., June 9.

The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. To ensure that individuals are registered, forms should be sent either by registered mail or certified mail. Questions concerning the spring exit level testing should be directed to Linda Marr, Muleshoe High School, 272-7571.

The bride is graduate of West Texas State University, and she is employed as a nurse

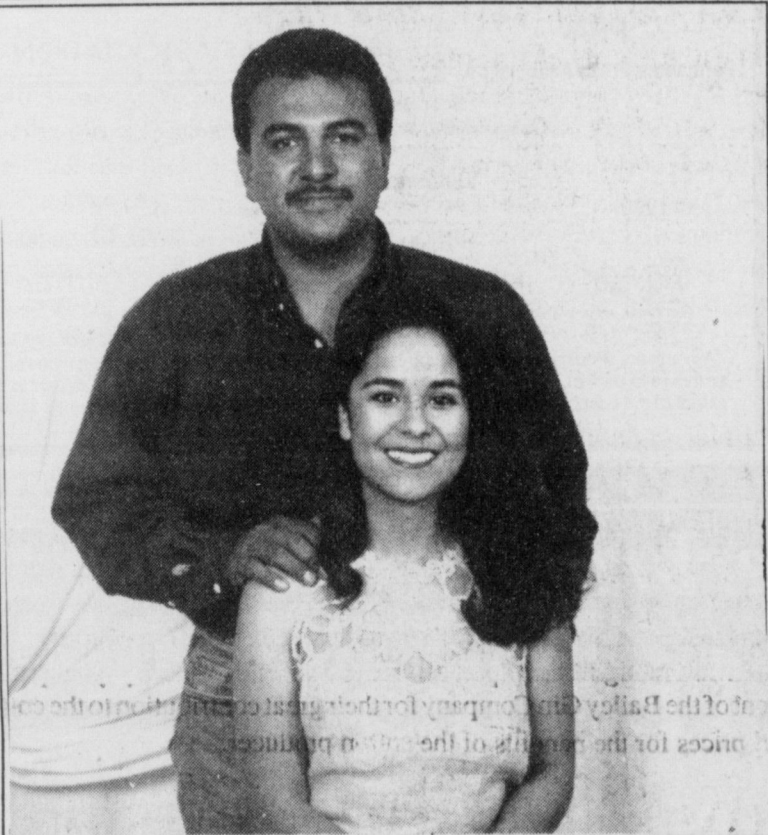

The choir is accompanied by Debby Vester, music assistant/organist for St. Luke's United Methodist Church.

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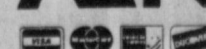

Principal Hardy Carlyle presented the Spirit Award to Ivette Reyes and Guy Nickels for their extraordinary efforts.

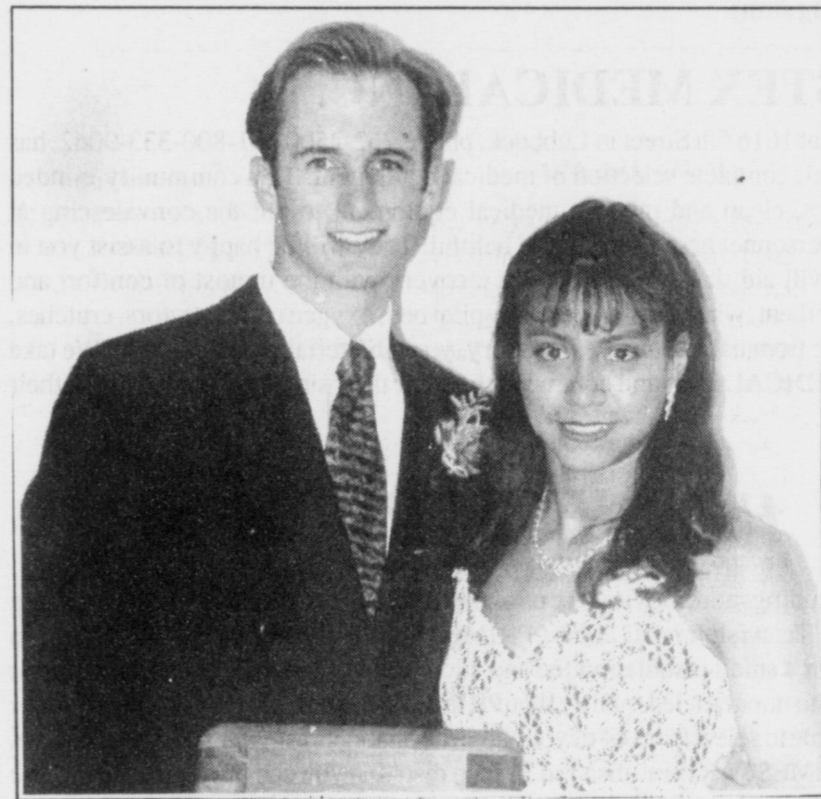

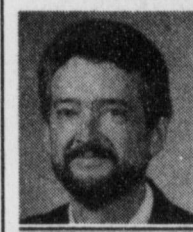
"The policy of this corporation as stated by the Board of Directors years ago and reaffirmed by the

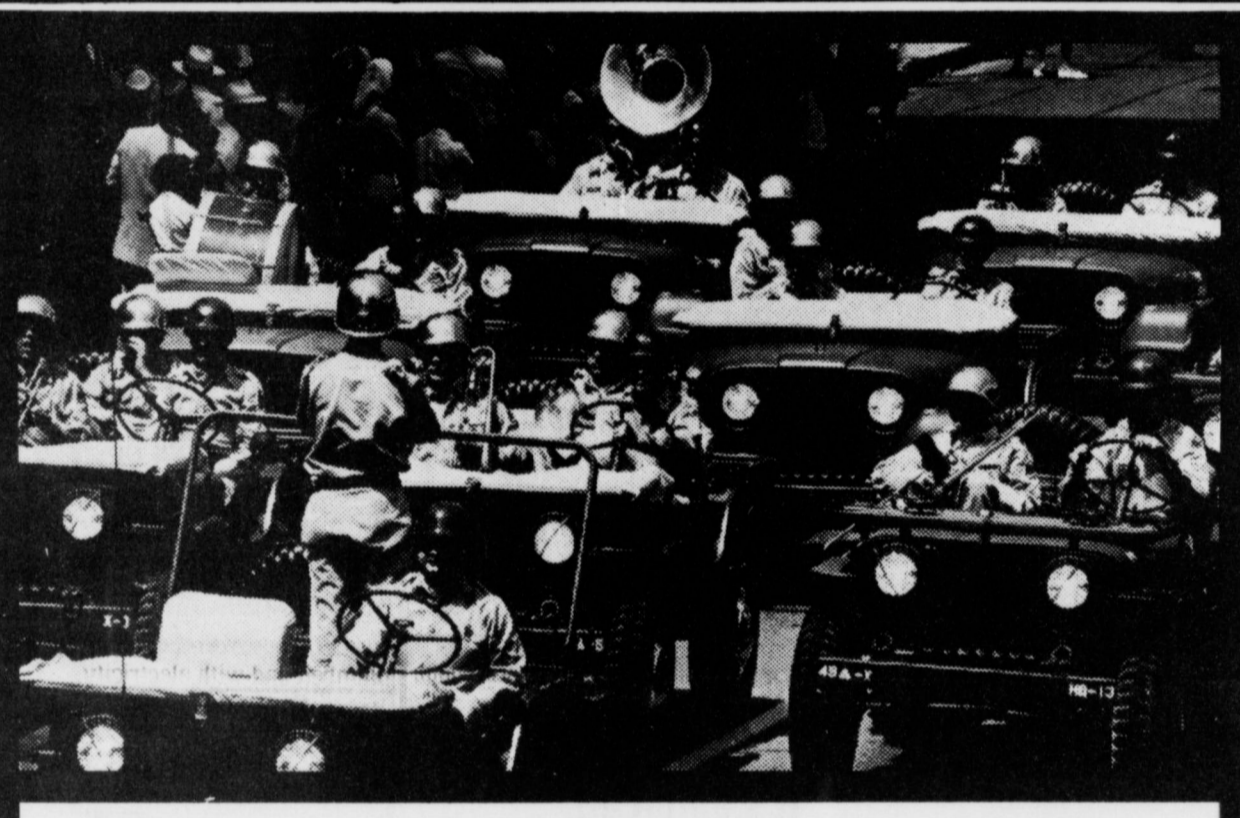
