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Reyes, Romero plea guilty **By MARSHALL STINNETT** Journal writer

Ismael Ramirez "Smiley" Reyes pled guilty under a plea bargain with the District Attorney's office for aggravated assault in District Court Tuesday.

Reyes was accused of severely beating Laura Orozco, his girlfriend, in a local motel where they were living together in February

Under the plea agreement, Reyes was sentenced by Judge Gordon H. Green to three years in prison and fined \$2,500 plus \$248 in court costs.

Fernando Romero pled guilty to evading arrest with a vehicle in a plea agreement with the District Attorney's office.

Romero was fined \$1,000 plus \$248 in court costs and sentenced to 219 days in jail by Judge Gordon H. Green under the plea agreement. Romero also is being held for the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

In April, Romero was found not guilty of assault on City Police Officer Rodney Stevens.

Ramirez continues to be tough,

Danny Ramirez, a former Muleshoe outstanding football player, walked on the University of New Mexico Lobos football team last year and has earned a place with the Lobos according to the Albuquerque Journal.

According to an article by Greg Archuleta in the Journal on April 5, "The 5'8", 180-pound sophomore from Muleshoe first impressed the coaching staff during practice last fall."

Archuleta goes on to quote

Lobo running back coach Curtis Loper. "He did a phenomenal job on the scout team (in 2002)," Loper said. "Coach (Rocky) Long promoted him at the end of the season. He practiced with the (traveling) squad for the last three or four games, and that was basically to give DonTell (Moore) a break in practice."

"But Danny shined," Loper added. "He's tough. He's aggressive and he is a change of pace (from DonTell Moore).'

Muleshoe head football coach David Wood told the Muleshoe

Journal, "Ramirez is a very smart young man." Wood said Ramirez was highly recruited by several Division II NCAA schools like West Texas, Eastern New Mexico and Abilene Christian.

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Wood said Ramirez chose UNM because of its school of architecture. Wood said Ramirez was not sure he could do the class work and play football, so he didn't go out until spring. Ramirez told the Muleshoe coaches he "missed it."

Ramirez was a running back

for Muleshoe. He scored 36 touch downs, including running back three punts for touchdowns. Ramirez totaled 3,007 all purpose yards and caught 15 passes.

Ramirez was second team All-State his senior year in 3-AA. He was the super running back on the Amarillo Globe-News Golden Spread Team and class 3-AA player of the year from the South Plains.

Ramirez is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Ramirez of Muleshoe.

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

Veneman announces details for crop

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman today announced that more details on disaster program benefits, including the Crop Disaster Program (CDP), are now available for producers.

"We are working hard to provide as much information as possible to help eligible producers sign up for these programs," said Veneman.

USDA's Farm Service Agency received over 600 e-mails with questions, suggestions, comments and concerns about the disaster programs, especially the Crop Disaster Program. In response, a significant number of questions have been posted along with answers at http://

disaster program disaster.fsa.usda.gov. As new questions are submitted, frequently asked questions will be updated on a regular basis.

FSA has also posted a two-page document that explains the basics of the CDP and how to calculate program benefits. Additionally, a spreadsheet can be downloaded that will calculate potential disaster benefits by entering a few pieces of data about crop losses. The spreadsheet will work for typical crop losses, but not under all cir-

cumstances. For example, the current spreadsheet does not handle "prevented planted" or "unharvested" acres, losses for crops with fresh and processed markets, such as apples, or production that has been affected by quality.

The formulas in the spreadsheet and the answers to the questions are for illustrative purposes and will not be finalized until the regulations are published in the Federal register. The tools represent the best information available today so producers and lenders may begin to understand how the program will work.

Actual calculations will be performed by the FSA Service Center once signup begins on June 6. The **USDA** Service Centers can also provide additional information once sign-up begins






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OWN THE STREET

The other day, my nine year old son wanted to know why we were at war. My husband looked at our son and then looked at me.

My husband and I were in the Army during the Gulf War and we would be honored to serve and defend our country again today. I knew that my husband would give him a good explanation.

My husband thought for a few minutes and then told my son to go stand in our front living room window.

He told him, "Son, stand there and tell me what you see."

"I see trees and cars and our neighbor's houses," he replied.

"OK, now I want you to pretend that our house and our yard is the United States of America and you are President Bush."

They are watching this but do nothing because they are kids and are afraid of their father. You see all of this, son. What do you do?"

Disturbed, my son said, "Dad?"

"What do you do, son?" my husband repeated.

"I call the police, Dad." "OK. Pretend that the police are the United Nations and they take your call, listen to what you know and saw, but they refuse to help. What do you do then, son?"

"Dad, but the police are supposed to help!"

My son starts to whine.

My husband continues, "They don't want to, son, because they say that it is not their place or your place to get involved and that you should stay out of it."

"Because, Daddy. The police are supposed to help people who need it and they won't help. You always say that neighbors are supposed to help neighbors, but they won't help either. They won't help me stop him. I'm afraid. I can't do it by

myself, Daddy. I can't look out my window and just watch him do all these terrible things and do nothing so I'm just going to close the blinds so I can't see what he's doing. And I'm going to pretend that it's not happening.

My husband looked at our nine year old son standing in the window, looking pitiful and ashamed at his answers to my husband's questions.

grabbed my son to his chest and hugged him tight and cried, "It's too late to fight him. He too strong and he's already at your front door, son. You should have stopped him before he killed his wife. You have to do what's right, even if you have to do it alone, before it's too late," my husband whispered.

Glen Stevens asked the caretaker to cut the bushes off his daughter's grave and it's never been done.

The caretaker needs to trim around the grave markers and put dirt on graves that have settled down. We need a man out there that can work five hours a day, five days a week, water every day, and mow the lawn every week.

They have a John Deere lawnmower out there and Kendall McDaniel said he would fix the mower. He said that if the cemetery furnishes the parts, he'll furnish the labor.

We'll let you know about a town meeting after the Easter holiday.

Chris Jackson, president of Samuel Jackson, commented on the selection of Flowers as the featured speaker by saying, "This workshop focuses on the benefits of fiber moisture control in the gin. Given all of the experience and success Dennis has had in his gin with this technology, he was a great fit for the program. We were very honored to have him speak at this workshop, giving participants the opportunity to hear from one of the top gin managers in the country."

Farmer's Cooperative Gin in Sudan utilizes many cotton conditioning tools, which offers benefits directly to the gin and its growers. Being the first manager to implement the Collider Drying

System on the High Plains, Flowers was a very active participant in the development of many drying related products. That progressive attitude reaps benefits every year, but especially so last season with all of the wet weather during harvest.

Bobby Harman from Griggs Gin in Pinehurst, Georgia said, "We've been making several improvements to our gin as well, so I could relate to what he had to say. But West Texas gins and Georgia gins can be different animals. It was interesting to hear how he man-

ages to process stripper-harvested cotton so fast. I wouldn't even want some of that cotton on my module yard, much less in my gin."

"Dennis' speech was definitely one of the highlights of the workshop," said Martin Mehner, vice-president of engineering for Samuel Jackson. "Not only did he relate the benefits of fiber moisture control in familiar terms for the ginners, it was a great opportunity for our employees to hear what is important to our customers."

Clay Whitley, a recent hire at Samuel Jackson, was one of the employees who learned a lot from Flowers' speech. "I started here back in January and have been getting up to speed on many of these products. I was surprised to learn how much development and research had taken place at Sudan."

Other guest speakers were Kelley Green, director of technical services for the Texas Cotton Ginners Association; Eric Hequet, assistant director of the International Textile Center; and Bruce Curlee, vice-president of ag-lending for American State Bank. The workshop also offered technical training on equipment, hands-on labs, and qualifies as a Continuing Education Credit (CEC) for participants of the Certified Ginner Program offered by the National Cotton Council.

Farmer's Cooperative of Sudan ginned 66,300 bales for the 2002 season and has over 300 customers. Flowers has been the manager at Sudan for 10 years and has overseen improvements that have taken his gin from an average production speed of 12 bales per hour to 45 bales per hour.




