Angeles May 2 and Americans, who hardly know one king or queen

the remaining 10 royal rulers of Europe have visited or will visit the Uuited States this year, along with
many of the political heads of goverment But the Americans are likely to find the Danish queen just a little different from the others. For one
thing. Margrethe can say that a true popular mandate put her in office. For another, in an age "I knew when I was 13 that this was somedeay going
to happen to me, but I wanst't very happy about it,"
she told a group of visiting reporters she told a aroup of visiting reporters laspt week.
