Radical assassins shoot, kill Bolivian envoy to France

shot and killed the Bolivian ambassador to France, who was in charge of the forces which tracked down and killed Cuban revolutionary Ernesto "Che" Guevara in 1967. A group calling itself the Che Guevara Brigade claimed responsibility for the

Gen. Joaquin Zenteno Anaya, 53, who had also been Bolivia's foreign minister, was shot to death at pointblank range as he walked to his car, parked alongside the Seine River, police said.

in a communique issued to news organizations, a spokesman for the Che Guevara Brigade said it shot down Zenteno Anaya with the same weapon it claimed to have used in seriously wounding the assistant Spanish military attache, Capt. Bartolome Garcia Plata Valle, in an ambush last October at his Paris apart-

The police had no comment on the Zenteno Anaya was the third am-

bassador killed in Europe since Oc-

An embassy employe shouted to a reporter that the assassins "got him

Turkish Ambassador Ismail Erez was shot and killed at close range in the same neighborhood last October. French police believe he was killed by an Armenian liberation organization. No arrests have been made in that

Turkey's envoy in Vienna, Denis Tunaligil, was shot to death in his office two days before Erez was killed. Sources close to the Bolivian Embassy said Zenteno Anaya had recent-

ly shaved off his prominent moustache, possibly fearing an at-

Police and a witness gave conflicting versions of the killing. Police said Zenteno Anaya was shot in the back, apparently by two men.

However, a secretary who watched the shooting from the terrace of a sidewatk cafe said she saw only one assailant and that he fired from in front of the ambassador.

"I saw a man walking along the street and suddenly another man ran up from behind and shot him several times from the front," said Veroni-

que Mykulinczuk, 22. "The assailant seemed to be alone. He fired several shots and the victim collapsed on the spot. He probably just had time to see who was attacking him. Immediately after, the man ran up the steps to the metro station located on the bridge.

Zenteno Anaya was in charge of the military region in Bolivia where Guevara was killed. He had been foreign minister from 1964 to 1966.

After his success in tracking down Guevara, he was named army chief of staff in October 1971 and armed forces chief of staff a few months later. He took up his post in Paris in October

## Ford asks disaster aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford today asked Congress for \$25 million in disaster relief funds to help earthquake survivors in Italy "rebuild their lives and to help the Italian nation recover from this tragedy.'

In a special message, Ford also said he has directed Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller to "visit Italy this week to receive a firsthand report on the impact of the earthquake and on the ways in which the United States can best be of assistance."

Officials in Italy say 914 bodies have been recovered and 400 persons are missing in the aftermath of the earthquake, which struck the northeast part of the country last Thursday. Estimates of the homeless start at

Ford said that administrator Daniel Parker of the Agency for International Development will ac-

company Rockefeller to Italy. "Based on the firsthand assessment resulting from this mission, I will immediately inform the Congress should there be further steps required to permit the United States to assist as fully and effectively as possible,' Ford said.

# Italian quake relief becomes political issue

UDINE, Italy (AP) - Italian authorities reported the first cases of looting today in the rubble of earthquake-ravaged northeastern Italy and Premier Aldo Moro accused his critics of exploiting the quake for political purposes.

Aftershocks continued to rattle Friuli Province, but officials reported no new damage or casualties.

Authorities said they had discovered several cases of pillaging in the afflicted area. They said that at Melze, three youths who had arrived with rescue teams from Naples were found looting in the rubble and were sent back under guard.

Moro charged Monday night that critics of the Christian Democrats' handling of the relief and rescue operations were trying to make political capital for the June 20 national elections.

"Partisan speculations and unrestrained polemics are in shrieking contrast with the gravity of the hour that the fatherland is living through," the caretaker premier said in a nationwide telecast.

Moro made his broadcast in answer to criticism of the government's relief. efforts by newspapers, survivors of

the disaster and a Communist party delegation touring the quake area. Late. Monday night the cabinet appropriated \$140 million to begin the rebuilding of homes, public buildings and industrial facilities destroyed or damaged by the killer quake last

Officials said 914 bodies have been recovered, and 400 persons were still missing. However, many of the bodies had not been identified, and there was speculation that these were among the missing. Estimates of the

homeless started at 80,000. The chief of the Communist delegation touring the area, Alessandro Natta, accused the government of "delays, disorganization and inefficiency .typical of the methods and instruments of the state machinery."

Early Nebraska voter turnout moderate to heavy the primary campaign, and he acknowledged that he was forced to

wage an uphill battle against Carter. Ford and Reagan also battled in a preferential vote in West Virginia, but most of the major Democratic candidates were not entered. The voter turnout was described as light.

Connecticut Democrats voted in a party-run primary that is just the first step in selecting national convention

Going into today's elections Reagan had won four primaries in a row. Besides the Ford-Reagan preferential battles, 25 GOP delegates are being selected in separate congressional district contests in Nebraska. West Virginia is choosing 28 delegates, but state law requires them to go to the convention as uncommitted

delegates. Reagan went into today's primaries with 396 delegates to Ford's 309, with 1,130 needed for the nomination and ,207 yet to be chosen.

The major Democratic contest was in Nebraska. There were 11 candidates on the Democratic ballot but only Carter and Church campaigned for the state's 23 delegates.

Sen. Robert Byrd, running as a favorite son, was considered the favorite in West Virginia's Democratic primary although, by law, the state's 33 delegates are uncommitted. The only other candidateon the ballot was Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace, whose campaign in the state was hampered by a lack of

In Connecticut, Democrats voted in a party-run primary to choose delegates to June 12 congressional district conventions that will in turn pick the state's 51 delegates to the national convention.

Carter, Rep. Morris K. Udall of Arizona and Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington were the main contenders there, though Jackson announced over a week ago an end to his active campaign.

Carter led the Democrats before

this week's voting with 569 delegates to 199 for Jackson, 187.5 for Udall and 138 for Wallace. Another 1,453 are to be chosen, with 1,505 needed for the

nomination. Voting in West Virginia was from 5:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. CDT, in Connecticut from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. CDT, and in Nebraska 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. CDT.

Ford and Reagan spent considerable time in Nebraska, but Ford was in Washington the day before the election, Reagan in California.

Ron Nessen, the President's press secretary, said Ford was optimistic about his chances in Nebraska and West Virginia, but felt both would be

Carter was at home in Plains, Ga., Monday, while Church continued his push for votes in Nebraska. In an election eve telecast, Church said, "In this country, it's never too late and the odds are never too great."

The Idaho senator, who entered the race late, conceded in an earlier interview victory over Carter in Nebraska would be a "political miracle." But he added, "Miracles sometimes happen, though rarely."

# County votes \$17,000 for alcoholic facility

Prospects for a \$75,000 drying-out facility for alcoholics and problem drinkers got an uplift Monday when the Midland County commissioners passed a resolution to funnel \$17,000 more or less - toward the treatment

The amount of funds, however, will depend on the maximum grant the county is allowed in community development funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The proposed treatment center include dormitory units operated by the Permian Basin Community Centers for Mental Health and Mental Retardation (MH-

Adjacent to the dormitory would be the existing kitchen and dining room facilities of Park Place, an alcoholic treatment center owned by Herman

The privately-owned Park Place is located at 1505 E. Hwy. 80. Appearing before the commissioners in requesting the grant application were Robert Freeman, president of the Midland Council on Alcoholism; Bob Dickson, executive director of MH-MR, and Watson LaForce, MH-MR treasurer and board menber.

Initially, the men had requested that the county channel \$37,500 of its anticipated \$54,000-HUD grant toward the treatment center project. However, the county's expected allotment of that federal money has

been downgraded to \$17,000. Commissioner Charlie Welch proposed that the money be used "to educate the public that they may need this (drying-out) facility if they don't

curtail their drinking habits. LaForce said additional funds would be raised to net the \$75,000 to build the dormitory space at Park Place.

# Caution: eyedrops may blur vision as they clear it up

RESTON, Va. (AP) — Marijuana eyedrops effectively relieve symptoms of glaucoma and are ready for tests on people suffering from the eye disease, researchers say. But those taking the drops will have to put up with a side effect - "getting

A Medical College of Georgia researcher said Monday that animal tests show liquid marijuana "is as good or better than any anti-glaucoma medication currently

Dr. Keith Green, associate professor of ophthalmology, said research emphasis was being placed on substances related to or derived from marijuana "that hopefully won't have the euphoric side effects.'

Addressing a science writers' seminar sponsored here by Research to Prevent Blindness, Inc., Green said a new antiglaucoma drug would give patients a valuable alternate treatment to the few drugs now available for this purpose.

Glaucoma is a condition in which the fluids of the eye do not drain properly, causing a buildup of pressure within the eyeball. This pressure can damage the optic nerve and distort the structures of the eye. leading to loss of vision.

The condition is the third leading cause of blindness in the United States and affects an estimated two million persons.

If detected early, drug treatment can slow down or arrest glaucoma. But if this fails, frequently surgery is the outcome.

Green said he became interested in marijuana as a possible glaucoma drug in 1971 after a report by researchers at the Jules Stein Eye Institute in Los Angeles. That study found that volunteers who smoked marijuana showed a drop in pressure within the eye.

"The clinical potential of this

finding was immediately obvious, although my approach was rather skeptical at first," Green said.

The researcher found that a single drop of marijuana's most active ingredient, called THC, dropped eye pressure in rabbits for five hours. The rabbits also got a marijuana "high." In the latest studies, rabbits

venders serving those on welfare and nursing-home patients who medically demand more than the three "free" prescriptions paid for through the Texas Dartment of Public Welfare

"They have multi-pathological disorders," Wood said of the older folks. "You can't live to 80 years of age and have nothing the matter with you. You're remarkable if you do.'

He said welfare doles out \$25 per month to each indigent nursing-home resident. However, that money, intended for buying personal articles, is insufficient for purchasing the additional drugs the person needs to continue life and well-being-

He asked that the county increase its budget for drugs in order to help cover the cost of prescriptions.

"My concern," Wood said. "... (is) these people are going to have to have their medicine. They will get their medication, and we (druggists) will get paid."

He estimated the number of indigent nursing-home patients at 225. The commissioners, who last year budgeted \$4,500 for drugs for the indigent, agreed to take care of the cost



# Danish queen not just like other royalty

COPENHAGEN - She has been known to walk to the center of town to buy books or shop for clothes accompanied only by a single companion.

She and her French husband have friends over for a late snack in the kitchen. She likes to wear jeans. She could throw a man

with her jujitsu skill.

Her friends call her Daisy, and the men who run her life much of the time call themselves "the

Tall and blonde, she is Queen Margrethe II, heir to the oldest throne in Europe. Monday, the Danish royal yacht Dannebrog glided up the Potomac River bringing her to Washington for one of the many royal visits of the bicentennial year. She will be in Los Angeles May 23 and 24.

Americans, who hardly know one king or queen from another, are likely to become blase about all the foreign visitors before the year is over. Most of the remaining 10 royal rulers of Europe have visited or will visit the United States this year, along with many of the political heads of government or chiefs

But the Americans are likely to find the Danish queen just a little different from the others. For one thing, Margrethe can say that a true popular mandate put her in office. For another, in an age when power is nearly a religion, she doesn't seek it. "I knew when I was 13 that this was someday going

to happen to me, but I wasn't very happy about it, she told a group of visiting reporters last week. "If someone said to me then, 'someday you are going to be the queen,' I would have run a mile."

Now, more than four years after becoming queen, Margrethe admitted the job is "fun." "I am enjoying it," she said. "But it is not a lark." The queen's reception for reporters was a rarity, both for Denmark and the world of royalty. Europe's

surviving monarchs carefully guard their private lives. They rarely give interviews. While it seems to be an anachronism in an age of revolution and radicalism, royalty is still fascinating

for many people, and its members continue to make This year has seen the restoration of the monarchy in Spain, and in the Netherlands the government has ordered an investigation into the private business

Margrethe and her husband, Prince Henrik, said that they follow the fortunes of the other European monarchs but that nearly all their attention is directed to their official duties and raising their two sons, Frederik, 7, and Joachim, 6.

Her future was determined in 1953, when the people voted to change the law of succession. Her father, Frederik IX, and his wife Ingrid had three daughters and, until the referendum, only male heirs could succeed to the throne.

Frederik's family, the house of Schleswig-Holstein-Soenderborg-Gluecksborg, traces its origins to the 9th century and King Gorm the Old. Margrethe I ruled in the 15th century.

The queen's father was trained as a sailor and he retained the simple reigning style of his famous father, Christian X, who stayed on in Copenhagen during World War II, becoming a symbol of resistance to the Nazi occupation.

Asked the inevitable questions about her limited role in political affairs, the queen pointed to the training provided by her father and mother. "Not wielding power is different now than it was in

the old days," she went on. "Not wielding power when power was there is

different from not wanting to wield power because of one's upbringing. "From the age of 13, I studied for this job with my

There are official duties - meeting regularly with the prime minister and his cabinet, reading diplomatic dispatches, presiding at official functions representing her country abroad.

The law bars Margrethe from voting, and official protocol prohibits her from discussing public issues except in the most general terms. Her conversation is filled with the kind of cliches taught by court

But the spontaniety of the queen's personality has not been submerged. Asked about her trip to the Soviet Union last year, the first such visit by a ruling monarch since the 1917 overthrow of the czar, she

"It went very well; but then of course they would not have invited me if they didn't think they could make it go well."

Margrethe and her family live in one of the four identical palaces surrounding Copenhagen's Amalienborg Square. She has official chambers at Christiansborg Palace.

She also has two private country palaces, a small hunting cabin and an undisclosed private income in addition to the equivalent of \$2.1 million a year in state allowances.

Two-thirds of the allowances go to pay the "courtniks" and other staff — a total of about 80. The amount has been fixed, and increases annually with the official estimate of inflation.

The performance of the Danish family has won it the endorsement of 80 per cent of the population, according to the most recent opinion polls, a higher rating than either the Norwegian or Swedish kings.

The Danes place great importance on Margrethe's three-week American visit but are afraid she will be unable to gain much attention in a year when the United States is distracted by a national election.

Like other friends of the United States, Denmark is sponsoring a series of projects in honor of the bicentennial. One of the proudest will be the appearance of the Danish three-masted training ship, Danmark, which will be second to the USS Eagle in a line of tall ships to enter New York Harbor on July 4. The honor went to the Danes because their ship was used to train U.S. Coast Guardsmen during World War II.

Denmark is the only foreign country to sponsor regularly a 4th of July celebration on its own soil. This year the annual event at Rebild is expected to be hinder than over



# U.S. is aiding Chilean junta

By JACK ANDERSON with LES

WASHINGTON - In defiance of both Congress and the United Nations, the Ford Administration has gone behind the barn to bolster the military dictatorship of Chile.

The UN, following up our own reports of repression and torture inside Chile, has condemned the junta for violating human rights. And only last week, the respected Inter-American Human Rights Commission denounced the junta for its torture tactics. Congress reacted by imaid for Chile this fiscal year. It was the intent of Congress, clearly, that the aid should go directly to needy people. Other nations have also refused to extend credit to the beleaguered dictatorship.

Nevertheless, the Administration has shaken loose hidden money to bail out the junta. Here are the hush-hush developments:

- The Overseas Private Investment Corporation, a quasi-official U.S. institution, has quietly agreed to begin insuring companies that invest in Chile. The State Department, according to our sources, twisted OPIC arms. This should stimulate a flood of investment capital into the . country.

- Both the State and Treasury departments have also encouraged 14 U.S. and Canadian banks to loan the military dictatorship \$100 million to \$125 million. The loan is needed to pay off short-term obligations to other countries. Britain and Italy have refused to reschedule Chilean debt payments because of the regime's human rights violations. New York's First National City Bank will put up most of the money for the junta, with

# Long trump suit is big advantage

By Alfred Sheinwold

The obvious advantage of having a long-string of trumps is that you don't have room in your hand for many losers in the side suits. Another advantage lies in the fact that you can make it difficult for the opponents to defend properly.

East takes three heart tricks and must then shift. If East could see all of the cards he would shift to a club or

a spade, but in actual play both of these suits look very dangerous. It is quite natural for East to shift to a trump at the fourth trick, largely in the hope that he will know how to defend as the hand progresses.

South wins in his hand with the ace of trumps and leads out four more rounds of trumps. Declarer first discards a couple of spades from dummy and then parts with some of the clubs. This gives the defenders all the time they need to come to the conclusion that dummy's long club suit is the key to the hand.

LAST FIVE CARDS By the time each opponent has to come down to five cards, each will save his three clubs and will therefore hold on to only two spades. Now South can cash the ace of spades and give up a spade. The three of spades is then good for a trick, and South still has his last trump to regain the lead.

DAILY QUESTION Dealer, at your right, bids one heart. You hold: S1094 HJ84 DQ CAJ8532. What do you say.

ANSWER: Pass. Your clubs are not strong enough for an overcall. Avoid overcalling in a badly broken suit unless you have at least a seven-

# Sergeant to face court-martial June 14

SAN DIEGO (AP) - A drill sergeant who headed a special punishment platoon will be the first of four Marines to face court-martial in the death of Pvt. Lynn McClure.

The court-martial of S.Sgt. Harold L. Bronson of Freeport, Fla., was scheduled Monday for June 14 by Lt. Col. W. D. Draper, a Marine trial judge stationed at Camp Pendleton, 50 miles north of here.

Bronson, 30, is charged with involuntary manslaughter, aggravated assault and maltreatment of a recruit. He also is accused of dereliction of duty and violating a general order.

McClure, a 20-year-old recruit from Lufkin, Tex., died March 13. He never regained consciousness after being knocked senseless Dec. 5 during a close combat drill with canvaspadded pugil sticks at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego

Draper set a June 28 court-martial date for Sgt. Henry E. Aguilar of Hanford, Calif. and scheduled a July 17 court-martial for S. Sgt. Henry C. Wallraff of St. Croix, Minn. Aguilar is charged with negligent homicide, aggravated assault and maltreating a recruit. Wallraff is charged with dereliction of duty and violating a general order.

A Marine colonel also received a letter of reprimand in the case and a San Diego Marine captain faces nonjudicial punishment scheduled for

Bronson was the drill instructor in charge of the Motivation Platoon, a special unit for men singled out as problem recruits. A spokesman for the recruit depot said McClure showed a poor attitude toward Marine

Both Bronson and Aguilar, 23, were accused of not stopping the pugil stick bout when McClure dropped his stick and was knocked down. Bronson also was accused of allowing other recruits to smash McClure with their sticks while he was on the ground.

Aguilar is accused of failing to report violations of Marine procedure during the drill and failing to send McClure to a doctor after he apparently had been hurt.

Wallraff, meanwhile, was brought up on charges for allegedly failing to supervise the bout and failing to assign an experienced drill instructor to oversee the fight.

An attorney for the McClure family, John Gyorkos of Oceanside, Calif., is pressing a \$3.5 million wrongful death claim against the federal government in McClure's death and has accused the Marines of a "possible cover-up" in the recruitment of McClure, who has been described by his parents as mentally retarded.

Midland's employment during March was 35,890, slightly up from February's total of 35,720 and March 1975's total of 34,300.

The TEC said Midland's unemployment figure was the only one in 23 Texas cities to be in three digits - the remaining areas were in four or five

Unemployment in Midland during March was 910, considerably down from the 1,110 from February and 1,040 from March 1975.

Midland's unemployment rate of 2.5 per cent during March also was the lowest across the cities surveyed. San Angelo's unemployment rate of 3.0 per cent was just above Midland's figure; rates ranged all the way up to 15.6 per cent for Laredo.

# Tony Oliva's knees hate to run

After seven knee operations, Tony Oliva can still hit but he can't run. Monday night he learned that if he hits the ball far enough, he doesn't have to run very fast...or very far. -

The 34-year-old Oliva, a three-time American League batting champion, spends most of his time these days as Minnesota's first base coach, with only an occasional trip to the plate.

Several times in road games he has been listed in the line-up as the leadoff hitter and second baseman to give him one hopefully productive turn at bat, but when the Twins take the field someone else takes his place. Manager Gene Mauch is hesitant to use him with runners on base and less than two out because a ground ballalmost any ground ball—means a certain double play.

But Monday night Oliva was sent up as a pinch hitter to start the 10th inning. He belted a drive off Marty Pattin that would have been a triple for even an average runner—and Oliva was once very much more than average-but could only limp as far as second base in his bulky knee brace with his first hit of the season. One out later, Lyman Bostock came through with a pinch single that scored pinch runner Jerry Terrell from second base and gave the Twins a 5-4 victory over the Kansas City Royals. Oliva said his knee brace is "like the one Joe Namath wears. "I can hit on it, but running...there's just no

Elsewhere in the AL on a light baseball night, the Chicago White Sox ended the Texas Rangers' club record eight-game winning streak 7-6 in 11 innings and the Oakland A's trimmed the California Angels 6-3.

In the only National League contest, the Los Angeles Dodgers shaded the St. Louis Cardinals on Ron Cey's tworun homer in the ninth inning.

Oliva's pinch double was no surprise since his career average as a pinch hitter is right around .400. But he's a different kind of hitter now.

"You've got more pressure on yourself knowing you've got to have a clean base hit," he said. "Before, I used to be able to beat out an infield hit. Now I've got to swing for the long ball. On the first two pitches I was swinging for the long ball. On the last pitch I was just protecting myself. I think I hit a pretty super pitch, low and inside. You have to be lucky."

The Royals sent the game into extra innings with a run off Bert Blyleven in the bottom of the ninth on Fred Patek's triple and Al Cowens' double. 



# **Flyers** expecting comeback

MONTREAL (AP) - The first round of the National Hockey League's championship prize fight is over, with the Montreal Canadiens holding a slight edge over the Philadelphia Flyers entering tonight's second round at the Forum.

As two boxers spend the first round of their fight seeing what tactics will and won't work, so did the Canadiens and the defending titlist Flyers spend Sunday night's opener.

"It was just a game of feeling each other out," said Flyers goaltender Wayne Stephenson, who lost the 4-3 decision with 1:22 remaining when Montreal's Guy Lapointe blasted home a 20-footer.

But Stephenson, like the rest of the Flyers, was anything but depressed over the defeat.

"How can you be down just because of the fact that they got the break and we didn't?" he asked.

"We just made too many mistakes," added Philadelphia right wing Gary Dornhoefer.' "We got caught too often on two-on-one and three-on-two breaks.'

Flyers Coach Fred Shero agreed. "We can't have two wings floating against one defenseman all the time like we did Sunday. In the second period we weren't pulling back with them right away, and that gave them an awful lot of chances.

Montreal capitalized on two of the chances after falling behind 2-0 in the first period on Philadelphia goals by Reggie Leach and Ross Lonsberry. But, settling down from a messy first session, the Canadiens charged back with tallies by Jim Roberts and Larry Robinson to tie it in the second.

Larry Goodenough restored the Flyers' lead early in the third period, but Jacques Lemaire beat Stephenson with a backhander that glanced into the net off the goalpost and Lapointe scored the winner in the closing minutes.

'The guys were a little tight," said Montreal's Yvan Cournoyer in explaining his team's slow start. "We've got six or seven guys who have never been in the Stanley Cup final and they were nervous.

"Part of the problem early on was we played nervous hockey," added Canadiens goalie Ken Dryden. "When that happens, you're more tentative with your plays; you're thinking more slowly, and consequently the other guy is on you more.

"In the second period, we were more assertive. That made it harder for the Flyers.

And tonight Montreal will concentrate on being more assertive from the start against the two-time Cup winners. "We know what we've got to do," said Cournoyer.





claimed April 8 the state could obtain 300 million cubic feet of gas each day for cheap sale to hard-pressed cities by demanding royalties in gas instead

In a May 7 letter that he distributed Monday, the land commissioner told Mengden that state lands produce only 80 million cubic feet of gas a day which goes into the interstate market.

Of that total, Texas has no right to half of it, or 40 million cubic feet, Armstrong said.

'Of the remaining 40 million cubic feet a day of interstate royalty gas, we have been advised on numerous occasions by intrastate pipeline companies that they would not accept any interstate volumes of gas into their system" unless the transaction were approved by the Federal Power Commission, Armstrong said.

Mengden also had advised Atty. Gen. John Hill to drop lawsuits against major oil companies to get royalties in gas- instead of moneyand to simply tell Armstrong to start

## Probers seek cause of fire

DEER PARK, Tex. (AP) - Investigators sought today to determine the cause of an explosion and fire that left one man dead and six others injured at the Shell Refinery and Chemical plant here.

One of the injured was listed in critical condition.

The explosion Monday night shook the area surrounding the complex and the fire sent up black smoke that was visible for miles.

The dead man was identified by Shell officials as H. S. Arthur Jr., 30, of Friendswood, Tex., a Shell em-

Listed in critical condition at a Galveston hospital was H. M. Culpepper of Deer Park, also a Shell employe. He was reported to have suffered third degree burns over 95 per cent of his body.

Other Shell employes injured were B. S. Roopnarine of Baytown, in fair condition, and R. B. Strahan and E. L. Stubs of Pasadena, both believed to

have suffered only minor injuries. Two other workers, employed by a maintenance firm, were treated at a Pasadena hospital and dismissed.

The explosion occurred about 6:30 p.m. and the cause was not determined at once. The fire it produced was extinguished about 9 p.m. and it was then that the charred body of the dead man was found.

A Shell spokesman said the fire was confined to the company's "paraxylene unit", which produces chemical solvents. This unit consists of several towers and numerous pipelines connecting them.

Nell Kelley, who operates Shell's restaurant, said it "sounded like a loud crack of thunder.

"I felt the building come up and go back down," she said. "It knocked pans off the kitchen shelves.'

Bill Arnold, a delivery truck driver. was headed into the plant when the explosion occurred.



# Testimony reveals meat inspector bribes

WASHINGTON (AP) - Army meat inspectors learned to steal, took bribes and were furnished with the services of prostitutes to assure that they would not "hassle" packers who were selling the Pentagon inferior meat at sirloin prices, according to testimony before a Senate panel.

Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla chairman of the Senate Government Operations subcommittee on federal spending practices, said at Monday's hearing that lack of discipline, fraternization between officers and enlisted personnel and lack of training for military inspectors resulted in a "rotten" military meat procurement system.

Edward Kehl, former supervisor for the now-defunct G&G Packing Co. of Boston, testified Monday that the firm regularly filled army orders for choice beef with lower priced upgraded meat and substituted tough cuts for tender.

Kehl agreed with a calculation by Chiles that the substitution of knuckle for sirloin tip butts by G&G could have resulted in illegal profits of up to \$192,000 a day.

He said young, inexperienced Army meat inspectors never detected the substitution because of the way the

meat was cut. Kehl said knuckle was substituted for sirloin, worth \$2.40 a pound more, in 50 per cent of Army steak orders from G&G. He said the firm also sent knuckle to Blue Ribbon Frozen Foods of Hamden, Conn., to fill that firm's

Army contracts. Both New England meat processing firms, now closed, were owned by

Harry and Frank Goldberg. Charles Reidinger, former army supervising inspector in the Boston area, testified that Harry Goldberg started paying him \$200 a month in the fall of 1974 and later raised it to \$400. He said he was told the company 'just wanted no major hassle, no nitpicking.

And Reidinger said Frank Goldberg furnished him with prostitutes about 10 times over a 10-month period.

# CRMWD delays action on district financing

BIG SPRING - Directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District (CRMWD) last week delayed action until May 19 on a request by General Tire and Rubber Co. of Odessa for district financing of \$1.5 nillion in water pollution control bonds.

If issued, the bonds would be fully indemmified by General Tire and Rubber Co. and would not involve the district's regular debt service requirements. The district performed a similar service for the cities of Midland and Andrews, but this is the first request of an industry in response to requirements by the Texas Water Quality Control Board.

Proceeds would be used to construct shallow solar ponds which would evaporate waste water from General Tire's Odessa plant.

CRMWD directors agreed they needed more information from bond attorneys and underwriters before taking action on the matter. The board approved \$25,000 to

construct chlorination facilities on the district's supply lines to free them of organic buildup which increases friction on the line and reduces its carrying capacity. The district had been using portable equipment for this function. CRMWD directors also approved a

lease on 1.47 acres to Shell Oil Co., which is expanding a tank battery on the south side of Lake J. B. Thomas, and a lease on four acres to Maurice Duncan and Robert Lee for development of a mobile home park at Lake Spence. Administrative assistant R. A.

# Commission says union discrimination wide

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. Civil Rights Commission said today that widespread racial and sex discrimination prevails throughout the nation's building trades and trucking unions.

Despite numerous federal laws, court decisions and government programs, these unions "continue to restrict the employment opportunities of minorities and women," the commission said in a 291-page report issued today. The commission said the

discrimination "is less frequently caused by clear intent than it was a decade ago and more by apparently neutral, but still discriminatory, institutional practices." The report contained 15 recom-

mendations for strengthening federal employment opportunity programs, including one that would require unions that have agreements with federal construction contractors to set goals and timetables for the hiring of minorities and women.

Another recommends that the Interstate. Commerce Commission require regulated trucking firms to submit affirmative action programs with goals and timetables for hiring and promoting minority and female

Officers said Monday three men have been arrested. Two are charged with prostitution and one with aggravated promotion of prostitution.






