





# GOP won't challenge Yarbrough at polls

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — State Republican Chairman says the GOP will not challenge the Texas Election Code by nominating a candidate to oppose Don Yarbrough.

The decision was reached for several reasons last Friday, Hutchison told a news conference Monday, including the damage he said it would do to the party.

Yarbrough, a Houston lawyer with nearly the same name as Houston lawyer Don Yarbrough, who ran for governor three times, won the

Democratic nomination May 1 for a seat on the Texas Supreme Court. The Republicans ran no candidate, and the election code prohibits nomination after the February filing deadline.

Yarbrough reportedly is the defendant in at least 15 law suits. A grievance has been filed before a Harris County grievance committee, and the state securities commissioner is investigating a gold and silver business deal involving Yarbrough.

Hutchison said the Republicans would not challenge the election

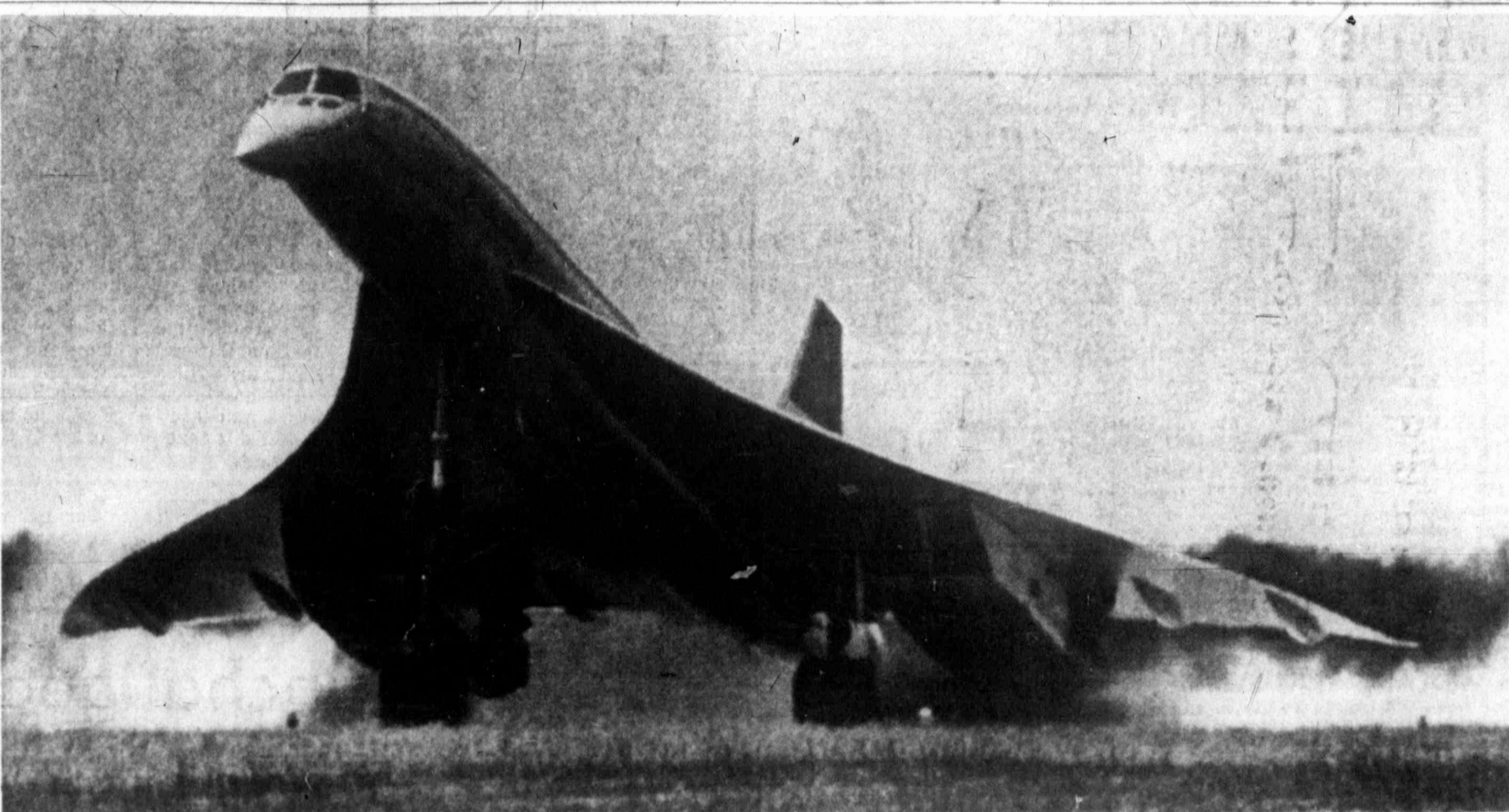
code in the Texas Supreme Court because, among other reasons, "We would be placing the court in a very, very difficult position. The court would be called on in essence to determine the question of one of its own members."

Democrats, as well as Republicans, have asked Hutchison to put the GOP behind a challenge in order to keep Yarbrough off the court.

But "many people believe that would be a very coarse and ill-advised course of action," he said.

Asked if he thought Yarbrough was qualified to sit on the bench, Hutchison said, "I wouldn't vote for him."

Hutchison said people are outraged by many of the provisions of the election code, which he said is "principally designed to protect the incumbents."

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## Boot camp commanders to supervise Marine recruiters

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At its most basic level, the change means a recruiter takes the blame if he signs up a man who can't hack it in training. Previously, the recruiter got credit for a live body and the boot camp had to take it from there.

Brig. Gen. William B. Fleming, the Marines training director, said in an interview that the change was in the works before the training death of Pvt. Lynn E. McClure, of Lufkin, Tex., who died March 13 of head injuries suffered during close-combat training at the San Diego Marine Corps Recruit Depot.

But Fleming conceded that the McClure case had dramatized the need to improve recruitment and training procedures.

"We should eliminate getting a kid there (to boot camp) who should never have been there in the first place," Fleming said.

The new procedure goes into effect nationwide on June 1.

The Marines, like the other armed services, may face some severe recruiting problems in the years

ahead if the country continues to recover from the most severe recession since the 1930s. The Defense Manpower Commission reported last month that prosperity will make the all volunteer service less attractive to youths with other job options.

Fleming said the Marines would rather fall behind their authorized numbers than fill out units with men who are unqualified.

The Marines conceded that McClure probably should have been ineligible to join because of a minor police record and a stay in a mental institution. His intelligence level was apparently marginal at best.

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Pvt. Harry W. Hiscock was scheduled to testify today before the House personnel subcommittee.

Hiscock and drill instructors at the Parris Island, S.C., training base testified at court martial proceedings last February that the instructors forced him to shout obscenities and degrading things while groveling on his hands and knees before he was accidentally shot.

Sgt. Robert F. Henson, 26, a senior drill instructor, pleaded guilty to the accidental shooting. He was given a bad conduct discharge.

The drill instructor said he pointed his M16 at Hiscock during the hazing to frighten him and it fired. He said he thought he had taken the powder out of all bullets in the rifle.

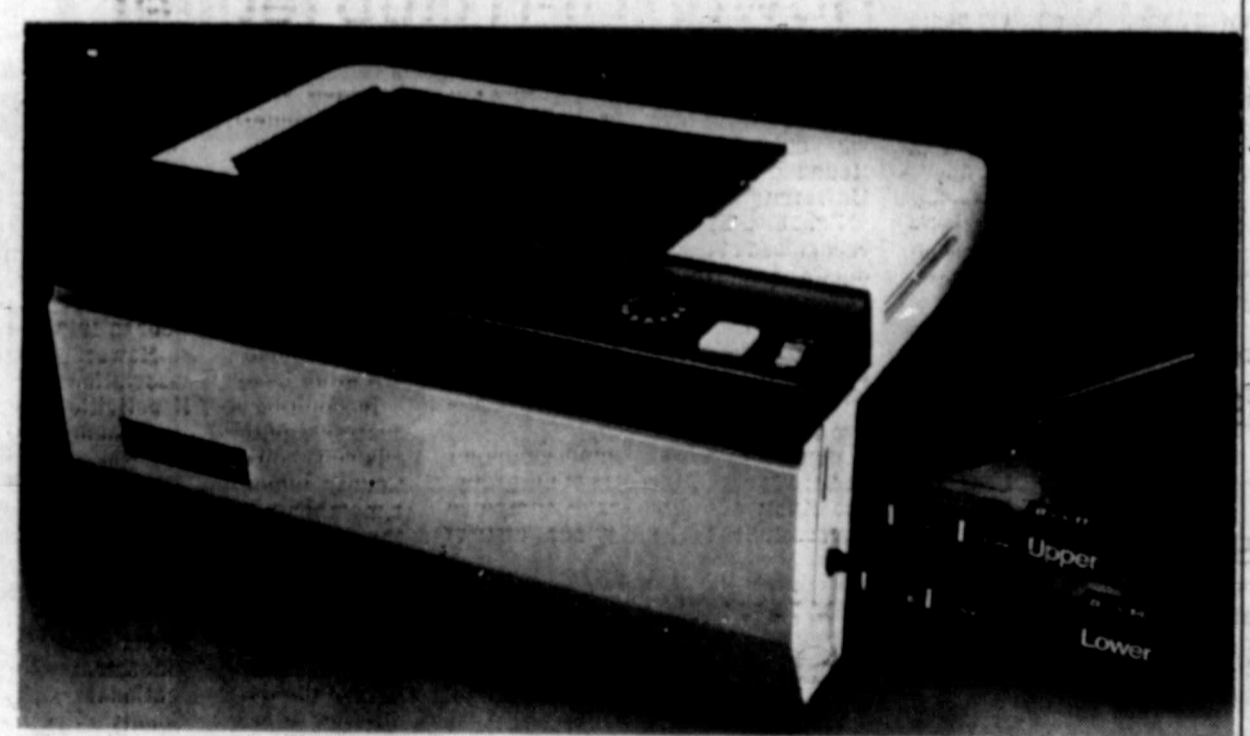

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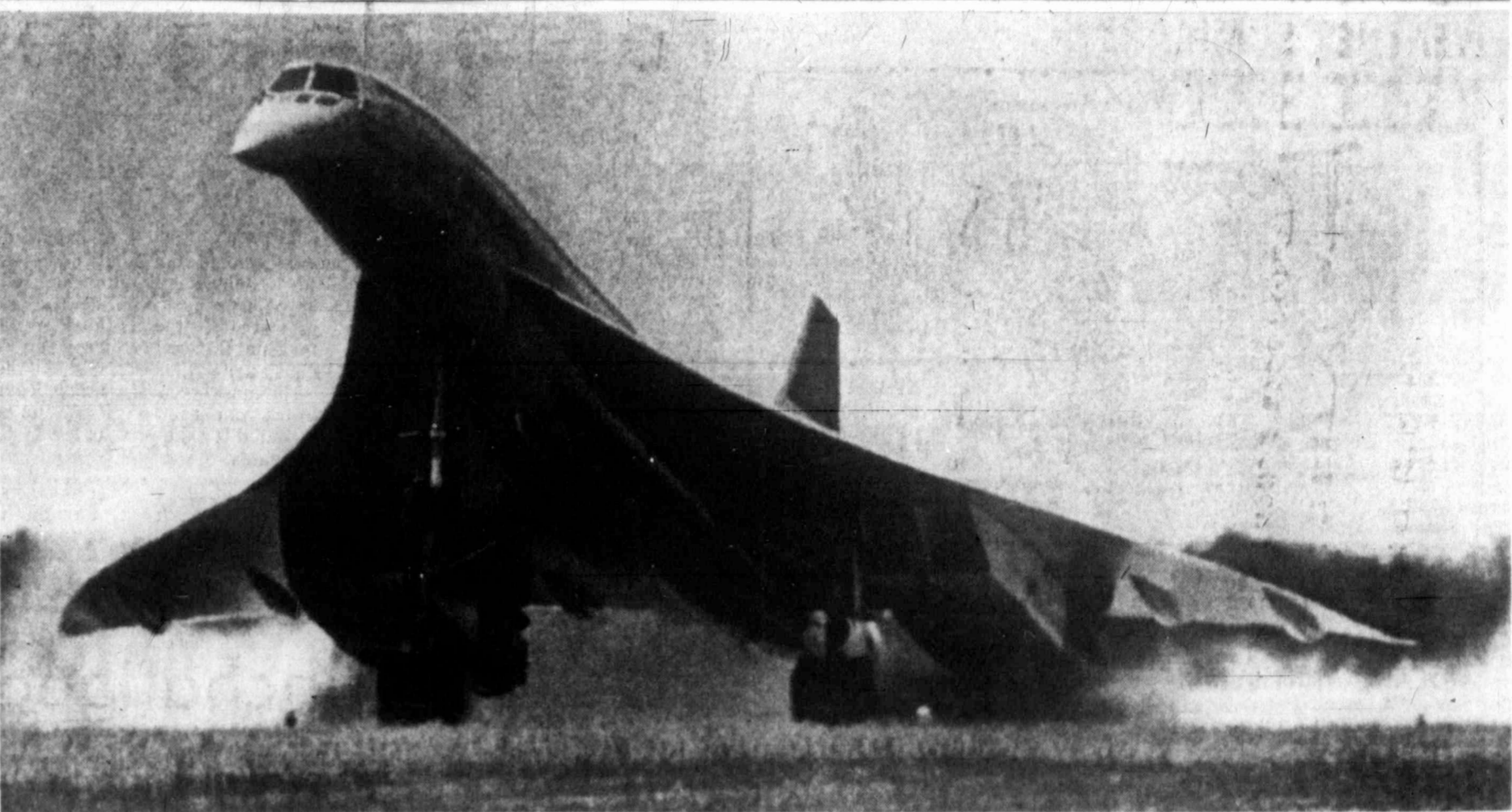
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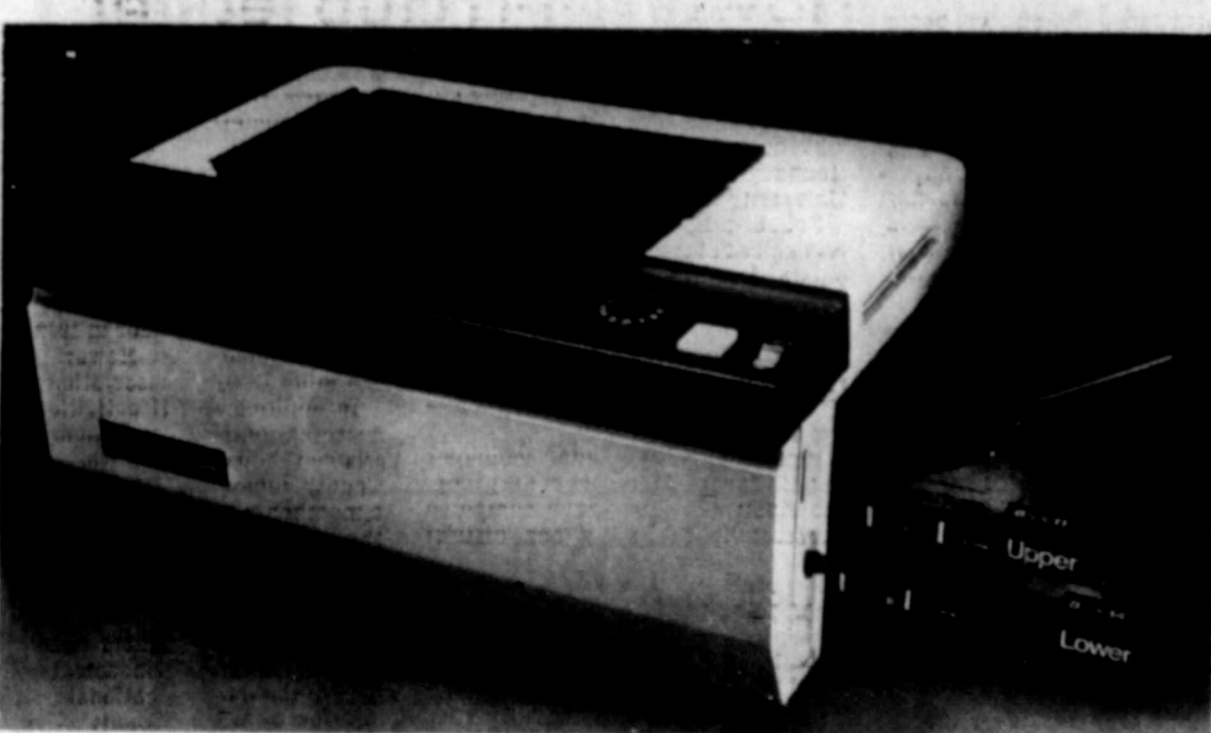
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# FBI probing allegations against Hays

WASHINGTON — The FBI has started an investigation of allegations by a woman who says she was paid \$14,000 a year in public funds to serve as mistress of Rep. Wayne L. Hays (D-Ohio), it was learned Monday.

The probe was ordered by the Justice Department after The Washington Post, in its Sunday editions, detailed the charges by the woman, Elizabeth Ray. She said that Hays, chairman of the Committee, House Administration, had placed her in a staff job with the Oversight Subcommittee in exchange for sexual favors.

Hays, 65, who has denied the charges, Monday fired Ray from the subcommittee. He also issued a statement calling Ray "a very sick young woman" and charged that "The Washington Post has sought to ruin my congressional career for some time."

In a phone conversation with a Post reporter on Saturday, Hays said that he had never been in Ray's apartment "except once, months ago." However, the manager of Ray's apartment house in Arlington told The Post Monday that Hays had visited Ray frequently at the apartment building.

FBI agents are known to have questioned the manager on Sunday about Ray and her visitors. The woman, who asked that her name not be used, refused to discuss her interview with the FBI, but she told the Post:

"Everyone at the (reception) desk knew who he was because he made no secret of it. He'd come in here and say he was Congressman Hays and ask to be connected to her room."

In addition to talking with the apartment manager, FBI agents were known to be seeking an interview with Ray. However, informed sources said that as of Monday night, they had been unable to locate her.

The sources said the Justice Department had ordered the FBI into the case in order to determine whether any violations of federal statutes might be involved.

In addition to the FBI inquiry, there was the possibility of House probes of his relations with Ray. The Accounts Subcommittee of Hays' Administration Committee and the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, also known as the ethics committee, are studying the situation.

Accounts Subcommittee chairman Rep. Frank Thompson (D-N.J.), who Sunday had said that he would schedule an investigation, Monday backed away from that position.

Thompson issued a statement saying, "I feel the House Committee on Standards of Official Conduct would be the appropriate forum for this investigation."

Noting that he is the second-ranking member of the Administration Committee and in line to become chairman if Hays is removed, Thompson said any action by his subcommittee would raise questions of a conflict of interest.

"Clearly something must be done," he said and added: "I have no doubt that complaints will be filed with the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct."

However, a spokesman for the ethics committee said that as of late Monday it had received no report or complaint about Hays and — following its standard procedures — would not act without a complaint.

Rep. Mendel J. Davis (D-S.C.), chairman of the Oversight Subcommittee and Ray's employer for a brief period last summer in his congressional office, said he had been unaware, until a couple of days ago, that Hays had assigned her to his subcommittee staff last Nov. 1.

Davis added that he had checked with his top subcommittee staff executive, who said that Ray had never done any work for him.

Monday, Hays signed an order striking Ray off the Oversight Subcommittee payroll. Some House sources said that the lock on her office door apparently was changed.

In addition, Hays issued a statement that said in part:

"Let me say that I have never maintained Miss Elizabeth Ray or any other woman on any payroll as a mistress. This totally untrue report has caused much anguish for my bride of six weeks whom I love very deeply.

"Miss Ray has been under the care of a psychiatrist, Dr. Albert Messore, and in the past I have spoken with him about Miss Ray. I feel very badly, but she is a very sick young woman.

"Further, let me emphasize that The Washington Post has sought to ruin my congressional career for some time. And in recent months, The Post has engaged in a personal vendetta against me. It is indeed unfortunate to see an irresponsible newspaper team up with an irrational woman to produce such flagrant yellow journalism.

"I will be consulting with my attorneys this week to determine the possibility of filing suit against The Post for this malicious article. Until then, I feel it proper to withhold any further comment."

Asked by reporters about Hays' charges, Benjamin C. Bradlee, executive editor of The Post, replied: "That's a lot of bull—. The facts speak for themselves. Nobody's denied anything."

## Being left out miffed 'mistress'

WASHINGTON — Elizabeth Ray, who says her only responsibility while working for the House Administration Committee was to sleep with Chairman Wayne Hays, decided to tell her story seven weeks ago after Hays ordered Capitol police to escort her out of his office.

Hays has denied Ray's charges, saying she is "a very sick girl."

The incident on April 6, Ray said, stemmed from a refusal by Hays (D-Ohio) to invite her to the wedding reception to follow his marriage to the secretary from his Ohio office, Pat Peak.

Immediately after her expulsion from the Capitol grounds, Ray called a reporter she had known for a year and a half and said, "I'm scared to death. Hays just had me escorted out of the House by two Capitol police. I'm ready to talk."

At lunch that same day, visibly upset, sometimes crying, Ray explained that she had gone to Hays' office to ask him why she had not been invited to his wedding reception "when every single other person on his staff had been invited. It's not that I care so much about him getting married, but it looks bad that I'm not invited. I was good enough to be his mistress for two years, but not good enough to be invited to his wedding."

Ray said that Hays told her to leave because his fiancée was on her way to his office.

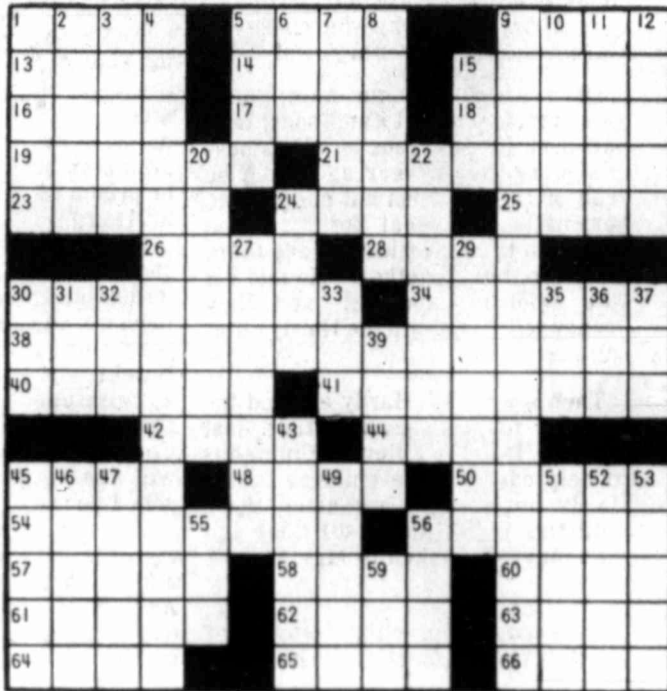

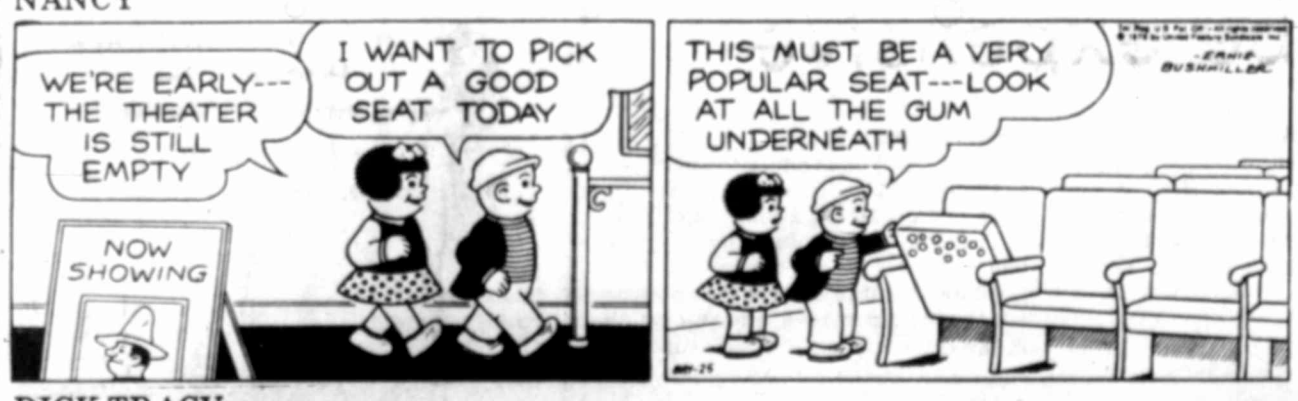

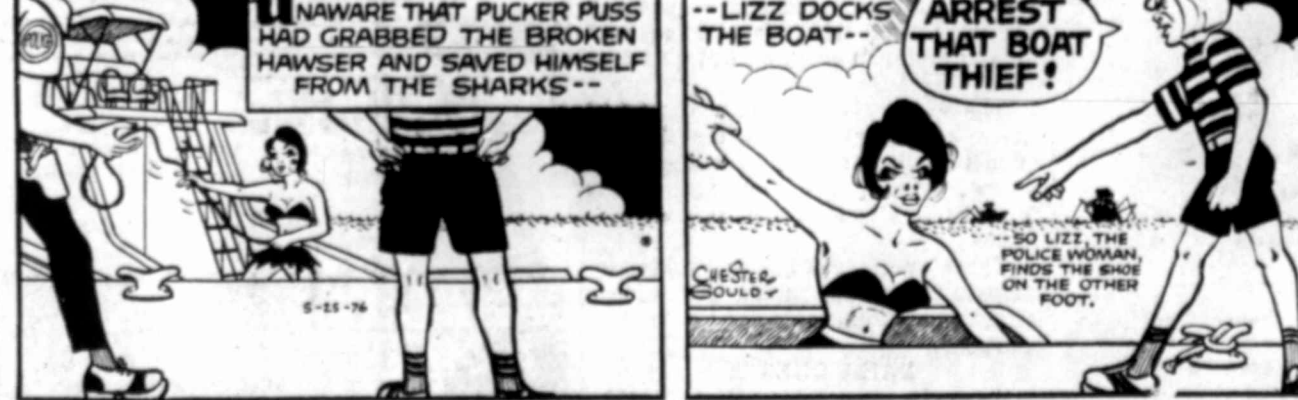

Bid to lift barge fails

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The first attempt to raise a sunken barge at the mouth of the Mississippi River failed Monday night when cables snapped aboard a 170-ton floating crane.

The 70-ton Tri-Lift II, a supply barge, capsized early Sunday with seven persons aboard. Three were rescued, including Ray Jordan, 43, of Marrero, who floated seven hours in an air pocket inside the submerged vessel.

The body of John Stuart, 23, of Couthatta was recovered. Rogers, who was in the wheelhouse when the barge overturned, said the salvage barge would first have to turn the sunken barge upright before raising it.

"When it sank, it went down on its side," he said. "I'm told they thought they had the barge free and ready to raise, but then the cables broke," said Rogers.

Jenkins hits nails on heads

NEW YORK (AP) — When it comes to finding a way to observe the nation's bicentennial, Lou Jenkins has hit the nail on the head — 1776 nails, in fact.

That's the number of 5/8-inch brass nails he hammered into a slab of wood in creating a "stringwork" duplicate of the U.S. flag, using about 1,100 yards of red and white thread against a blue velvet background. The flag is 25 by 45 inches, dimensions he came up with after figuring out how big the flag would have to be to get that many nails. The nails outlining the stripes and the 11 that form each star are set exactly a quarter of an inch apart.

"The number needed to make the design came out to 1,775, so I added an extra one in a corner," Jenkins explains. "I don't expect anybody to actually count them but I wanted it right for my own satisfaction."

First step was to draw a pattern on graph paper, showing where each nail would go. Then he covered 9/16-inch plywood with the velvet, placed the pattern over it and started hammering in the nails — 106 of them to each long stripe and 51 to each short one.

After they were in he tore away the paper and was ready to start the intricate job of winding the string back and forth across the nails to produce the red and white stripes and five-pointed stars.

"If I got confused and started going counterclockwise instead of clockwise the pattern would go off and I'd have to unwind and start over again," Jenkins says.

"But the hardest part," he adds, "was getting the nail in exactly the right depth. Each nail had to stick out just one quarter inch."

Jenkins, 53, got interested in stringwork art when his daughter, who teaches in a day care center, began teaching it to the children.

"She brought home a pattern from a kit and asked me to make duplicate patterns for the kids," he recalls. "I thought it might be interesting to try it myself and I made a few things from patterns before I decided to design some of my own."

Jenkins, who works as a stock room clerk, has always enjoyed making and fixing things. He recently remodeled the kitchen of his house, doing all of the work himself.
