# COUNCIL SETS AIRPORT MEET

The City Council has set up a special airport meeting to be held October 23 at City Hall, 2:30 p.m. All interested persons are invited to attend.

This open meeting was set up in order to allow all aspects of the airport problems to be discussed, such as runway lighting and radio facilities.

John Mock applied to the Council last Monday for rental space at the airport in order to construct a private hanger.

At this time, the city has not established a policy for private hangers, so it was decided to hold a public meeting and to check on the city's position.

Also the council approved an ordinance regulating the Subdivisions of land in the City of Muleshoe and within a five miles of its Corporate limits.

Subdivisions as defined in the ordinance is as follows: SUBDIVISION — "Subdivision" means the division or proposed division of a parcel of land into two or more lots or parcels for the purpose of transfer of ownership or building development; provided, that a division of land for agricultural purposes into lots or parcels of five acres or more not involving a new street or alley shall not be deemed a subdivision. The term includes resubdivision and, when appropriate to the context, shall relate to the process of subdividing or to the land subdivided.

This ordinance will effect subdivisions that have not yet been approved by the Council.

Other items under discussion were: Consideration of Plat of Richlands Addition, Number 2, to the City of Muleshoe and the

discussion of street lights on Highway 70 and Highway 84 and also a street light request of East 7th Street and Avenue F where the Assembly of God Mission Church is located.

## Cotton Received Termed As 'Good'

The quality of the cotton received at the Lubbock Office so far this year has been very good. Approximately 65 per cent of the cotton received graded Middling or better, and the average staple length was 31-32 inch. Micronaire readings also have been high with approximately 95 per cent being 3.5 and better.

Fiber strength tests, as indicated by Pressley readings in cooperation with the Texas Tech Fiber Laboratory, showed approximately 80 per cent of the cotton tested to be above average.

The USDA's Agriculture Marketing Service reports that very few bales of new crop cotton has sold, at prices being paid averaged about 50 points over CCC Loan Rates. Prices to farmers for cottonseed, in standard grades, were reported at 45 to 47 dollars per ton.

## J. E. Haley Backs Book

H. R. Gross, Iowa, introduced in the House of Representatives and read into the Congressional record of the 88th Congress, a statement made by J. E. Haley at a recent press conference.

Last week, James L. Sullivan, Nashville, Tenn., Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention ordered the sale of Haley's book, "A Texan Looks at Lyndon" banned at Southern Baptist Book stores after protests from several church leaders.

The book was reportedly banned on the basis that it did not contribute to the spiritual welfare of its readers.

Haley's statement made to the press in Los Angeles and read by Gross is as follows:

"I have been asked to come to you to explain some of the background of the publication of my latest book, 'A Texan Looks at Lyndon,' which is a study in illegitimate power, and how it came to be written.

This book was conceived, researched, and published as a sound, historical study, not as a campaign document. No group, no organization, and no party has had anything whatever to do with its inception, financing, or

circulation. I conceived it, I wrote it, and I alone financed it from the very first and I'm still financing its publication.

Briefly, in this book, 'A Texan Looks at Lyndon,' I have:

1. Set forth the illegitimate pressure and power by which, in a constitutional republic, John-

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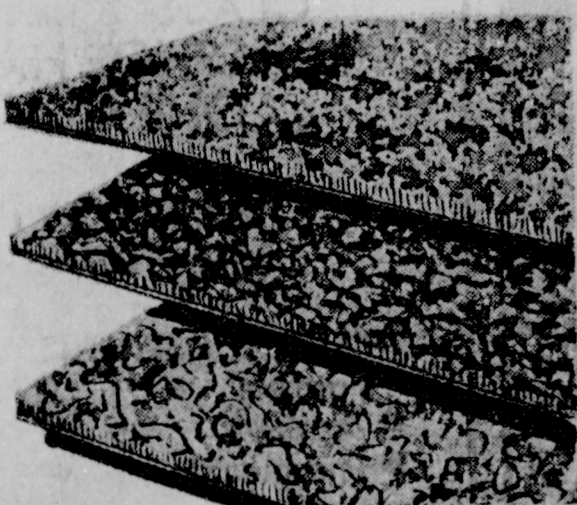

son was originally put into the U. S. Congress as a protégé of extreme liberal faces of the original New Deal.  
2. I have briefly set forth the fraudulent nature of his claim of a distinguished World War II record, and how he returned to his "plis - lined fox hole" in the Washington as a lieutenant commander in the Navy.

3. I have told with irrefutable and unchallengeable proof how he, and his political henchman, and their confederates stole a closely contested U. S. senatorial election in Texas in 1948; a story with all the tragic aftermath of continued fraud and presumed assassinations.

4. In this book, which is a study in illegitimate power, I have proven the false, the shallow and shoddy nature of the claim that the origin of the Johnson family's multimillion - dollar fortune was founded on his wife's inheritance. It was, instead, laid with the acquisition of a radio and television monopoly in Austin, through the illegitimate use of power to ruin the owner of the station, which fell as an over-ripe plum into Lady Bird's lap, to put her husband and his family on their way to immense wealth.

5. I have detailed the methods, the men and the means by which Government contracts and political favors on one hand, and protection from tax problems and Federal harassment on the other, were used to enrich Johnson's big corporate backers in Texas, like Brown and Root

of Houston, while on the other hand oppressing and even destroying those of humble origin and status who, with sufficient character and courage, have resisted his illegitimate power.

6. I have pointed out Johnson's intimate connections with such wheeler - dealers as Billie Sol Estes. One man after another, with intimate knowledge of the fantastic fraud, or with close connections with the principals involved, led sudden, mysterious, and violent deaths, while the profitable, tangible assets of the Estes empire were, without financial risk, handed virtually as a multimillion dollar gift to a friend and supporter of Johnson.

7. In this "Study in Illegitimate Power," I pointed out that a Pecos citizen, a locally prominent, successful doctor who discovered, and exposed this gigantic fraud by printing the story in a Texas county newspaper, was ruined financially, and professionally, while Billie Sol Estes, with more than \$18 million in Federal tax judgments against him and with two prison sentences for fraud imposed by Texas courts, is still free, living in a plush \$50,000 home, driving a 1964 Cadillac, and living high off the hog of political influence.

8. I have again brought attention - with added detail - to Johnson's close connections with Bobby Baker. In this connection, I have presented evidence of his undoubted ability in Senator Fulbright's apt phrase - "to manage Congress" - and to suppress any inquiry anywhere on Capitol Hill, from that of Billie Sol Estes to Bobby Baker.

9. I have factually detailed the ruthless, vindictive and dangerous nature of this power - mad man, elevated through malevolent fate into the most powerful office in the world at the most critical period of America's history. All I have done is to bring my years of knowledge of the Texas scene and my ability as an academic investigator and historian to dig deep into the intimate and reliable sources of information. Having done this, I stand unafraid of what may follow - even the most ingenious and most effective technique that illegitimate power has historically invoked - because I believe in the sanctity of the printed word, well - knowing that

### Draft Quota Up Over Oct.

The state draft quota for November calls for 307 men, compared to 236 or October. Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

The state quota of 307 for November is the Texas share of a national call for 8,600 men, all for the Army.

The state Selective Service director also announced that draft boards will forward around 2,900 males for Army mental-physical examinations in November, all of whom will be 18 - year-olds.

These tests for 18-year - olds are the result of President Johnson's action early this year which ordered the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly - registered men who are out of school and available for service. Males married at age 18 and those known to be in school at that age will not be examined.

Colonel Schwartz stressed that these youths will not be considered for armed forces service at this time. Normally, draft for service is about age 22.

The 18 - year - olds who fail the Army' mental examination will be referred by draft board letters to local offices of the Texas Employment Commission.

Youths who get the letters are under no compulsion to visit the TEC offices, but may do if they feel the government can benefit them.

The November quotas already have been figured and sent to the state's 137 local boards.

### MULESHOE SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SUBDIVISION OF LAND IN THE CITY OF MULESHOE, TEXAS, AND WITHIN FIVE (5) MILES OF ITS CORPORATE LIMITS; REQUIRING AND REGULATING THE PREPARATION AND PRESENTATION OF PRELIMINARY AND FINAL PLATS FOR SUCH PURPOSE; ESTABLISHING MINIMUM SUBDIVISION DESIGN STANDARDS; ESTABLISHING FINAL PLAT APPROVAL REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING MINIMUM IMPROVEMENTS REQUIRED PRIOR TO ACCEPTANCE OF FINAL PLAT; PROVIDING FOR INSTALLATION OF UTILITIES; ESTABLISHING VARIANCES AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF ITS PROVISIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MULESHOE:

#### ARTICLE I. TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known as and may be cited as "The City of Muleshoe Subdivision Regulations".

#### ARTICLE II. INTERPRETATION AND PURPOSE

So as to provide for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare, the interpretation and application of the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be the minimum requirements as adopted, hereby intending to provide for the City of Muleshoe a permanent, well organized and wholesome community environment, including adequate public utilities, sufficient open space and safe streets.

#### ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY AND JURISDICTION

SECTION 3.1 In accordance with the provisions of Article 974A of the Texas Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, the City Council of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, does hereby adopt by Ordinance the following Subdivision Regulations.

#### SECTION 3.2

From and after the date of adoption these regulations shall govern all subdivisions of land within the corporate limits of the City of Muleshoe and within a distance of five (5) miles from the City Limits.

Any owner of land within the limits of said subdivision jurisdiction wishing to subdivide land shall submit to the City of Muleshoe Planning Commission a plat of the subdivision which shall conform to the minimum requirements set forth in these regulations.

No plat of a subdivision lying within such territory or part thereof shall be filed or recorded in the office of the County Clerk and no subdividers may proceed with improvements in said subdivisions until such subdivision plat shall have been approved by the City Council and such approval entered in writing on the final plat by the Mayor of the City of Muleshoe, Texas.

#### ARTICLE IV. DEFINITIONS

SECTION 4.1 The following words and phrases as used in this Ordinance shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

ALLEY - The word "Alley" shall mean any minor way which is used primarily for vehicular service access to the back or the side of properties otherwise abutting on a street.

ARTERIAL STREETS AND HIGHWAYS - "Arterial streets and highways" are those which are used primarily for fast or heavy traffic.

CITY REPRESENTATIVE - The "City Representative" is that person, persons or department so designated by the City Council to represent the City.

COLLECTOR STREET - "Collector Streets" are those which carry traffic from minor streets to the major system or arterial streets and highways, including the principal entrance streets of a residential development and streets for circulation within such a development.

LOT - "Lot" means an undivided tract or parcel of land under one ownership having access to a street, either occupied or to be occupied by a building or building group, together with accessory buildings, which parcel of land is designated as a separate and distinct tract, and is identified by a tract or lot number or symbol in a duly approved subdivision plat filed of record.

LOCAL STREETS - "Local Streets" are those streets providing for local traffic and direct access to abutting property.

PLANNING COMMISSION - "Planning Commission" or commission shall be deemed to refer to the Planning Commission of the City of Muleshoe.

SHALL, MAY - The word "Shall" shall be deemed as mandatory; the word "May" shall be deemed as permissive.

STREET - The term "Street" means a way for vehicular traffic, whether designated a street, highway, thoroughfare, parkway, thoroughway, road, avenue, boulevard, lane, place or however otherwise designated.

SUBDIVIDER - "Subdivider" means a person who causes land to be divided into a subdivision for himself or others or seeks authorization therefor.

SUBDIVISION - "Subdivision" means the division or proposed division of a parcel of land into two or more lots or parcels for the purpose of transfer of ownership or building development; provided, that a division of land for agricultural purposes into lots or parcels of five acres or more not involving a new street or alley shall not be deemed a subdivision. The term includes resubdivision and, when appropriate to the context, shall relate to the process of subdividing or to the land subdivided.

#### ARTICLE V. PROCEDURE FOR APPROVAL OF PRELIMINARY PLAT

SECTION 5.1 In order to prevent hardship on the subdivider through possible required plat revisions, a preliminary plat of the proposed subdivision at a scale not smaller than one hundred (100) feet to the inch shall first be submitted to the City Planning Commission for approval before the preparation of the final plat. SECTION 8.2

**STREET IMPROVEMENTS** — Before approval and acceptance of any final plat, the City of Muleshoe shall prepare, or have prepared, complete engineering plans of streets, curb and gutter, storm sewers, and drainage structures for the area covered by the final plat. The developer may have these plans prepared by his own engineers subject to approval of the plans by the City of Muleshoe. An estimate shall be made of the cost of providing these improvements and the cost of engineering work provided by the City shall be included in the total cost of preparing the hereinabove, described plans and engineering.

**OTHER IMPROVEMENTS** — Before approval and acceptance of any final plat, the City of Muleshoe shall prepare, or have prepared, complete engineering plans of water and sewer lines and structures for the area covered by the final plat. The developer may have these plans prepared by his own engineers subject to approval of the plans by the City of Muleshoe.

An estimate shall be made of the cost of providing these improvements and the cost of engineering work provided by the City shall be included in the total cost of the improvements. The developer shall place a sum of money equal to his share of the total estimated cost of the improvements (as determined by the Water and Sewer Extension Policy Ordinance) with the City of Muleshoe.

The City of Muleshoe shall either do the necessary work in this area or contract for this work to be done.

**ARTICLE IX. INSTALLATION OF UTILITIES**  
SECTION 9.1

**REQUIREMENTS** — In addition to the water and sewer main extensions, a tap charge will be required for both water and sewer in the amount set by the City

Council. These amounts to be paid by the developer at the time the application is made for the tap. In addition to these amounts the meter deposit shall be required.

The City will furnish the necessary engineering and furnish supervision of construction at cost to the developer.

After the final plat has been approved no building, plumbing, or electrical permit shall be issued by the City of Muleshoe to the owner or any other person, with respect to any property in said subdivision, and the City shall withhold all City improvements of whatsoever nature including sewerage and water service from any subdivision or re-subdivision covered by this ordinance until:

(A) Such time as the developer and — or owner has fully completed and paid for the improvements required to be made by the terms of this ordinance, including the installation of streets with proper paving, curb and gutter, drainage structures, storm sewers, alleys, fire hydrants, water and sanitary sewer mains, all according to the specifications of the City of Muleshoe; until such times as

(b) An escrow deposit sufficient to pay for the cost plus engineering of such improvements as determined by the City Representative computed on a private commercial rate basis has been of the City of Muleshoe, accompanied by an agreement signed by the developer and — or owner authorizing the City to make such improvements at prevailing private commercial rates or have the same made by a private contractor and pay for the same out of the escrow deposit.

**SECTION 9.2 THE CITY WILL:**  
(A) Make all water and sewer charge for such service.  
(B) Install or construct all water and sanitary sewer mains approved on the plans either directly or by contract. The water and sewer lines as completed become the property of the City of Muleshoe and the developer or builder shall have no right or

title in same and the City of Muleshoe will maintain said lines at its own expense. Extensions of said lines may be made at any time the City may desire.

The City of Muleshoe shall never be liable for payment of interest on any deposits, payments or refunds provided for herein.

The builder or developer shall never have the right to demand payment hereunder out of any fund raised by the City through taxation.

(C) The City will reimburse any part of the money being held in escrow in excess of the actual cost of constructing paving, curb and gutter, drainage structures, storm sewers, fire hydrants, water and sanitary sewer mains.

**SECTION 9.3 FINAL ACCOUNTING** — Final accounting of each project will be the basis of final settlement with the developer for actual sewer mains, and will, in all cases be in accordance with the water and sewer extension policy as established by the City of Muleshoe.

**SECTION 9.4**  
The City may furnish temporary water service to houses under construction. Temporary water service may be provided upon application at any desired location. The developer shall be required, upon application for such service to pay all unrecoverable cost of such temporary service, to pay such tap charges as required by the City of Muleshoe for water service, and to make a meter deposit before such service is provided and, upon requesting a disconnect of the temporary service, he shall be required to pay the cost of the amount of water used.

**ARTICLE X. FLOOD AREA**

**SECTION 10.1 FLOOD AREA** — Areas within the jurisdiction of the Planning Commission subject to flood conditions, as established by the City Representative, will be considered for subdivision purposes, until adequate drainage however, that drainage facilities may be provided in compliance with the then current regulations as established by the City Council.

**SECTION 10.2 DRAINAGE REPORT** — A drainage report prepared by a licensed registered engineer shall accompany the preliminary plat. This study shall show the acreage draining into the subdivision, points of run off concentration, areas subject to flooding, the method for draining the run off through and away from the subdivision and other pertinent information as required by the City Representative.

**METHODS AND DATA USED**

FOR calculations of run off shall be as required by the City Representative.

**ARTICLE XI. SECTION 11.1**  
These rules and regulations are the standard requirements of the City of Muleshoe.

**SECTION 11.2**  
Such other certificates, affidavits, endorsements or dedications as may be required by the Planning Commission for the enforcement of these regulations may be required.

**SECTION 11.3 COMPLETE NEIGHBORHOOD** — The standards and requirements of these regulations may be modified by the Planning Commission, provided adequate public spaces and improvements for the circulation, recreation, light, air and service needs of the tract when fully developed and which also provided such covenants or such other legal provisions as will assure conformity to and achievement of the plan.

**SECTION 11.4 CONDITIONS** — If it appears these requirements will work undue hardship on the developer, or made impracticable or impossible by unusual circumstances, the City Planning Commission may grant such change or variations it deems just and proper, in granting such variances and modifications, the Planning Commission may require such conditions as will, in its judgment, secure substantially the objectives of the standards or requirements so varied or modified.

**ARTICLE XII. REPEAL**  
All Ordinances and amendments thereto in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall be and are hereby repealed.

**VALIDITY AND SEVERABILITY**

If for any reason any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

**ARTICLE XIV.**  
Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate any of the provision hereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine in any sum

It is my opinion that Chaplains should be sustained in the military service and in Congress.

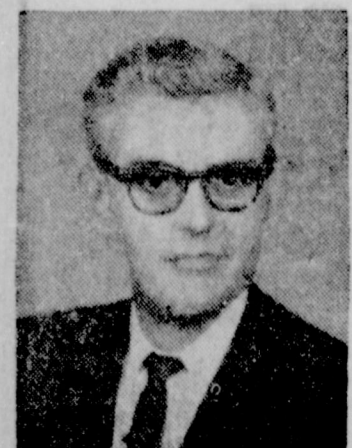

 The designation "Preliminary Plat", must be filed in the office of the City Representative at least ten (10) days prior to the meeting at which the plat is to be considered and will contain the following information:  
 (A) The subdivision name (which must not duplicate in any manner an existing subdivision name), the names and addresses of the owners, and of the designer of the plat who shall be a registered engineer or registered surveyor.  
 (B) Date, approximate north-south line, and scale.  
 (C) The location of existing and platted property lines, streets, buildings, water courses, railroads, sewers, bridges, culverts,

drainpipes, water mains, any public utility easements and any other easement both on the adjoining land and immediate adjacent subdivisions and property lines.  
 (D) The names, locations, widths, and other dimensions of proposed streets, alleys, easements, parks, reservations, blocks, lot lines, and building lines. The names of streets shall conform whenever possible to existing street names and lots shall be numbered in a systematic arrangement.  
 (E) Topography of the entire plat showing (1) foot contour intervals. If a natural water course traverses the property the center line of the water course shall be shown as well as the estimated high water flood line.  
 (F) If the proposed subdivision

does not lie within the force and effect of an existing zoning ordinance, the preliminary plat shall be accompanied by a plan indicating the proposed use of the lots.  
**SECTION 5.2**  
 Prior to the Planning Commission consideration of a preliminary plat the City Representative shall transmit a copy of the proposed plat to the Electric Co., Gas Co., Water Dept., School Administration and any other interested municipal or county department for review and recommendation in relation to specific service problems. The Planning Commission, shall, within thirty (30) days, act thereon, as submitted or modified, and, if approved, the Planning Commission shall express its approval or conditional approval and state the conditions of such approval, if any or if disapproved shall express its disapproval and its reason therefor with a recommendation to the City Council. However, recommended approval of the preliminary plat shall not be deemed final acceptance but rather an expression of approval of the layout as submitted on the preliminary plat and shall serve as a recommendation to the City Council for their final approval, subject to the stated conditions.

shall be determined by the City Planning Commission.  
 No street dedication shall be less than 60 feet wide, and paving shall not be less than 40 feet from back to back of curbs when paved.  
 All new streets shall be continuations of existing streets and where possible, at the same or greater width and having the same names. Where continuation of a street is not possible, there shall be a minimum offset of 150 feet. In the event the City requires a paving width greater than forty (40) feet, back to back of curbs, then the City will pay the cost of such additional paving.  
 Dead end streets may be platted where the land adjoins property not subdivided, in which case the streets shall be carried to the boundaries thereof. In the instances where dead end streets are otherwise necessary, a cul-de-sac with a minimum radius of 50 feet shall be provided.

**SECTION 6.2**  
**STREET INTERSECTIONS** — Insofar as practical acute angles at street intersections shall be avoided. Where an acute angle of less than seventy-five (75) degrees occurs between streets at their intersection, the Planning Commission may require the property lines to be rounded or otherwise set back to permit curb construction of desirable radius without curtailing the sidewalk at the street corner to less than normal width.  
**SECTION 6.3**  
**CURVES IN STREETS** — Where a deflection angle of more than ten (10) degrees in the alignment of a street occurs, a curve of reasonably long radius shall be introduced.  
 Streets shall be platted to allow two tiers of lots with an alley between. Intersecting cross streets may not be more than 1200 feet apart, nor less than 300 feet apart.  
 In blocks over one thousand (1000) feet in length the Planning Commission may require a public cross walk of not less than ten (10) foot right-of-way, and having not less than a six (6) foot concrete walk.  
 Streets shall be platted with appropriate regard to the County roads, lake areas and other topographical features lending themselves to attractive treatment.  
 Where plats are presented for approval which adjoin unplatted property, the owner of the proposed subdivision shall provide his pro rata part of boundary streets.  
**SECTION 6.4**  
**ALLEYS, RESERVE STRIPS**  
 Alleys shall be laid in the rear of lots fronting on adjoining streets. The minimum width of an alley shall not be less than twenty (20) feet and shall be graded and leveled.  
 No subdivision showing a reserve strip of land controlling the access to public ways or adjoining properties will be approved.  
**SECTION 6.5**  
**LOTS AND BLOCKS** — In general, lots shall conform in width, depth and area to the pattern already established in the adjacent areas, having due regard to the

character of the neighborhood its particular suitability for development for residential purposes and also taking into consideration the natural topography of the ground, drainage, sanitary sewerage facilities and the proposed layout of the streets.  
 It shall be unlawful for the Building Inspector to issue a permit for any residence, in a zoned residential area, utilizing as a building site the rear portion of any corner lot, or the rear portion of any corner lot merged with a portion of any adjoining lot, to produce a plottage of sufficient size to meet the minimum requirements for a permissible residential use.  
 Lots shall have minimum widths and measurements as required by the Zoning Ordinance for one-family dwelling as follows:  
 — Will refer to deed restrictions until zoning ordinance is passed.  
 The area of the lot shall be computed by taking the average width of the lot times the average depth of the lot measured from the street line to the rear lot line.  
 All sidelines of lots shall be at right angles to straight street lines, or radial to curve street this rule would, in the opinion of the City Planning Commission, give a better lot plan.  
 For private housing projects and shopping villages, it will not be necessary to subdivide tracts of land. Site plans, however, must be filed showing the arrangement of the project in detail, together with essential requirements such as adequate parking facilities, locations of buildings and the other uses to be permitted.  
 All proposed subdivisions shall conform to the comprehensive plan of the City of Muleshoe. Whenever a tract to be subdivided embraces any part of a highway, major street, secondary street or parkway, so designated on the major thoroughfare plan, such part of such proposed public way shall be platted by the subdivider in the same location and at the same width as indicated on the Major Thoroughfare Plan.

**ARTICLE VII**  
**FINAL PLAT APPROVAL**  
**SECTION 7.1**  
 Two copies of the final plat together with a reproducible tracing, the cost of the reproducible tracing to be refunded to the subdivider upon presentation to the City of Muleshoe of a paid receipt from the reproducing company, shall be submitted to the City Council within six months of date of approval of the preliminary plat or such approval shall become null and void unless extension of time is applied for and granted by the Planning Commission. A set of proposed construction plans for all improvements shall be prepared and submitted to the City Council for review at least ten days prior to the meeting of the City Council at which the plat is to be considered. The final plat shall be drawn at a scale of one (1) inch equals one hundred (100) feet on sheets eight and one-half inches by seventeen inches, seventeen inches by twenty-two inches, eighteen inches by twenty-four inches, and twenty-four inches by thirty-six inches, and where necessary may be on several sheets accompanied by an index sheet showing the entire

subdivision. The final plat shall show or be accompanied by the following information:  
 (A) The final plat shall conform substantially to the preliminary plat, as approved, and if desired by the subdivider, it may constitute only that portion of the approved preliminary plat which he proposes to record and develop at the time; provided, however, that such portion shall conform to all requirements of these regulations. In cases where a final plat is submitted for approval and where no change from the approved preliminary plat has been made, it may be submitted directly to the City Council for approval. When it is not necessary for the Planning Commission to consider the approval of a final plat because no change has been made from the preliminary plat, such final plat shall be recommended for final approval to the City Council of the City of Muleshoe. The City Council shall not consider final approval of said plat unless said plat has been delivered to the City Representative on or before the ten (10) days immediately preceding the regular meeting of the City Council.  
 (B) An accurate boundary survey of the property, with bearings and distances, referenced to survey lines and established subdivisions, and showing pertinent data concerning property immediately adjacent thereto in dashed lines.  
 (C) Rights-of-way lines of streets and alleys; property lines of residential lots, parks, and other sites, with accurate dimensions, bearings or deflection angles, and radii, arcs and central angles of all curves.  
 (D) Name and right-of-way width of each street or other right-of-way.  
 (E) Location, dimensions and purpose of any easement.  
 (F) Purpose for which sites other than residential lots are dedicated or reserved.  
 (G) The location of minimum building set-back lines from all streets on lots and other sites.  
 (H) A certificate of dedication of all streets, alleys, parks, easements and other land intended for public use, signed by the owner or owners and by all other persons, firms or corporations owning an interest in the property subdivided and platted, and shall be acknowledged in the manner prescribed by the laws of the State of Texas for conveyance of real property. A certified copy of all deed restrictions filed for record in Bailey County shall be furnished to the City of Muleshoe at the time recording same.  
 (I) Receipts indicating that current taxes have been paid on the property to be subdivided and a certificate that no delinquent taxes exist against the property.  
 (J) All lots in subdivision shall be numbered in numerical order.  
 (K) A waiver of claim for damages against the City of Muleshoe occasioned by the establishment of grades or the alteration of the surface of any surface of any portion of existing streets and alleys to conform to the grades established in the subdivision.  
 (L) SURVEYOR'S CERTIFICATE, produced on the plat according to the following form:  
 KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:  
 That I, \_\_\_\_\_, do hereby certify that I prepared this plat from an actual and accurate survey of the land and that the corner monuments shown thereon were properly placed under my personal supervision, in accordance with Section 8.1 of the Subdivision Regulations of the City of Muleshoe, Texas.  
 (M) Certificate of Approval by the City Council to be placed on plat as follows:

 (N) In the event that changes or alterations are made to the plat before submitted as a final, the final plat shall be filed with the City Representative in the City Hall, not less than five (5) days before the meeting of the City Planning Commission at which it is to be considered.  
 Upon approval of the final plat, the Mayor and City Secretary will sign the reproducible tracing and the developer will then have the plat filed for record and a certified copy returned immediately to the City Secretary before any work is started by the City.  
 Permanent concrete monuments, not less than six (6) inches in diameter, and not less than eighteen (18) inches long, having a copper or brass bolt set in the concrete with the survey point being clearly marked by punch mark or cross, shall be set at the outside perimeter corners of angle points of subdivision.  
 If the terrain is such that the corner or angle monuments on the same azimuth are not visible from each other, an intermediate monument, or monuments, shall be set so that two or more monuments are visible from each other.  
 Monuments shall be set at angle points and at the beginning and end of all curves on boundary streets, alleys and interior streets.  
 —ADD TO ORDINANCE  
 The top of monuments shall be set approximately six (6) inches below the finished grade of the ground after any necessary area or other grading work is completed.  
 A 3/4" iron pipe not less than eighteen (18) inches long shall be set at all block and alley corners, the pipe shall be driven flush with the ground, and a one inch by two inch guard stake driven by the pipe.  
 All monuments and pipe must be indicated on the final plat along with the azimuth and distance between the monuments or pipes.

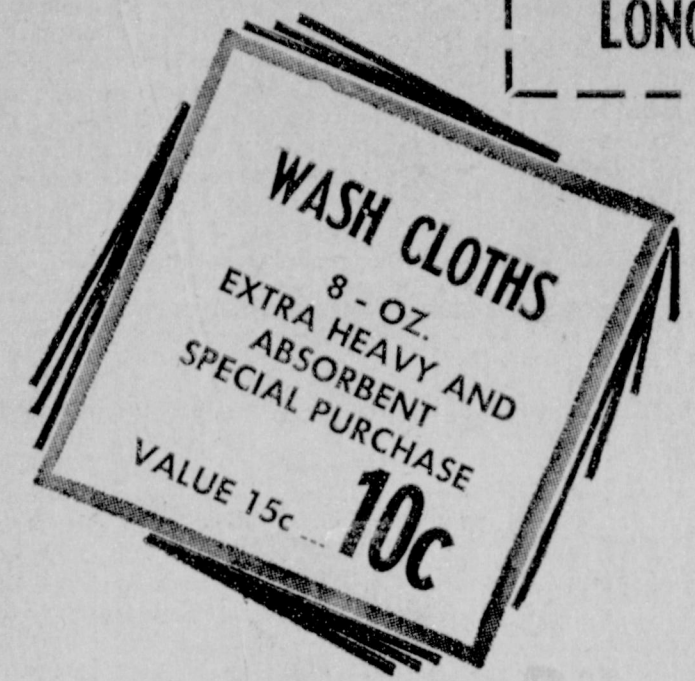

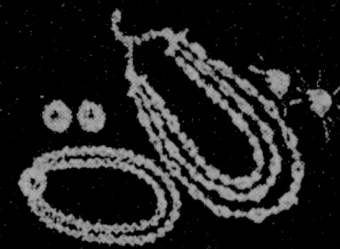

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN, Tex. — A top finance authority on state government is hopeful that the tax bill written by the 1965 Legislature will be smaller than many advance predictions have indicated.

Jim McGrew, research director for Texas Research League, said \$35,000,000 a year in new revenue ought to cover the bulk of Gov. John Connally's higher education program, teacher pay raises and about 40 per cent of the budget increases sought by state agencies.

McGrew, who addressed Austin's chapter of Sigma Delta Chi professional journalism fraternity, made these "guess-timates": —About \$625,000,000 will be available for general revenue spending next biennium, including an \$83,000,000 surplus at the end of the present fiscal period. That's \$153,000,000 above the present level.

—With no new taxes at all, the Legislature could provide up to \$120,000,000 in additional general revenue spending for higher education and maybe \$45,000,000 more for state departments and agencies.

—An added \$600,000,000 plus in revenue (per biennium) would finance the state's \$74,000,000 share of a \$45-a-month pay raise for public school teachers as well.

Texas Commissioner on Higher Education recommended \$89,000,000 more for higher education from general revenue. Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School recommended an increase of \$165,000,000. But it suggested doubling tuitions which would reduce the

general revenue hike to \$120,000,000. State Hospitals and Special Schools, the judiciary and other state agencies have put in for \$112,000,000 more than the current budget.

Asked where additional money likely would come from, both McGrew and his boss, League Director Alvin A. Berger, noted that restoration of the \$2.75 coproportion franchise tax rate, removal of exemptions in the present sales tax or raising of the rate would be big revenue producers. They made no recommendation.

**JOBS FILLED** — Larry Temple, 28, formerly of Plainview, was named by Governor Connally as his executive assistant to succeed Howard Rose, who returned to law practice in Midland. Connally appointed Edward H. Hartne, publisher of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times, to succeed Vann Kennedy, Corpus Christi radio executive, who resigned from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

**AG OPINIONS** — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr clarified an earlier opinion and held that a county can spend money on transportation surveys for development of county road systems.

In a torrent of other opinions released recently, Carr held that:

County judges are required to call elections for creating mosquito control districts on petition of 200 voters. . . . A veteran discharged at his own request before termination of his enlistment is not eligible for benefits that:

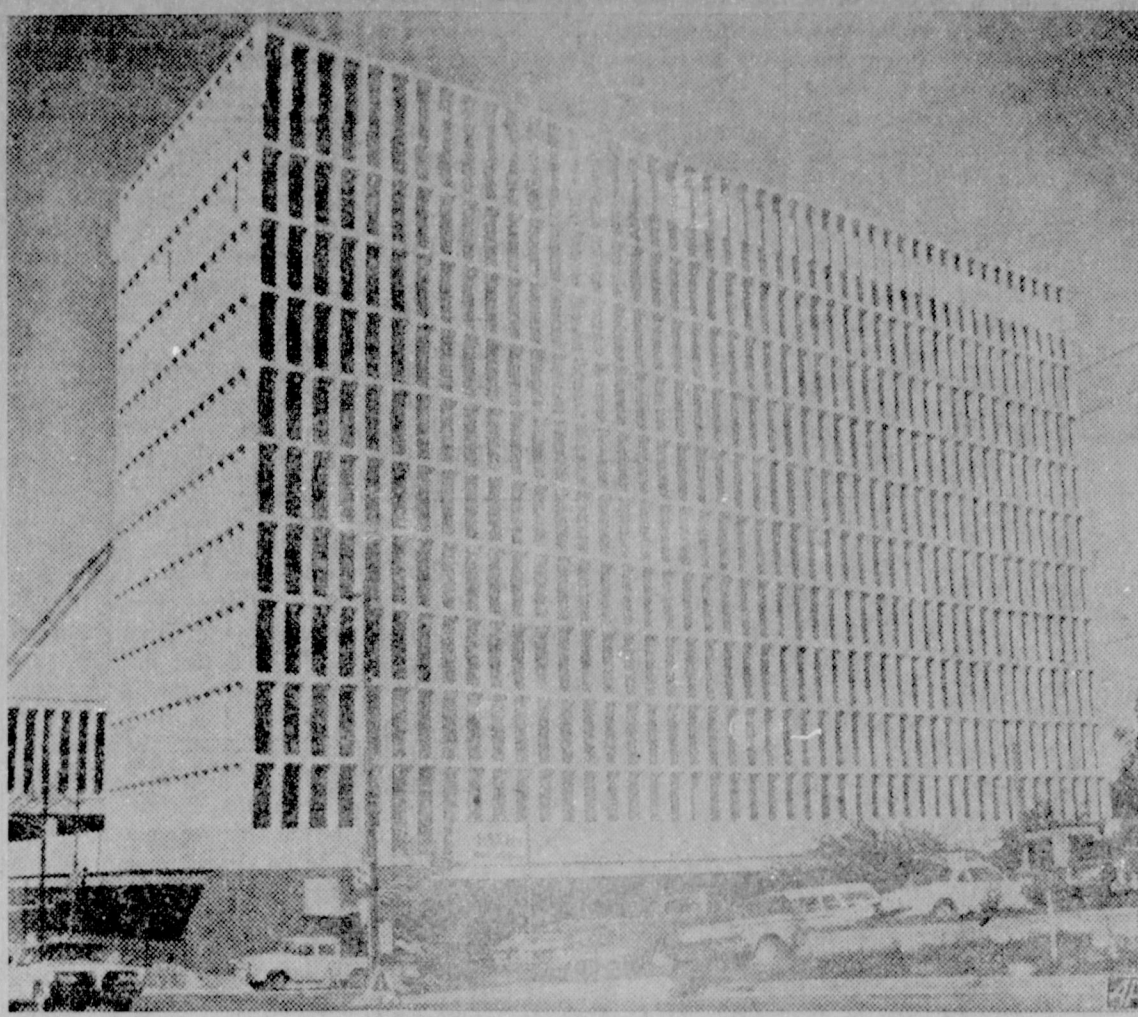
under the Hazelwood (aid to college students) act. . . . Galveston County can accept roads and public ways of the Treasure Island subdivision without further dedication. . . . Property optioned for prelease after January 1 should be listed for taxation in optionor's name. . . . State Veterans Land Board may adopt a rule or regulation authorizing veteran's loans to be repaid at any time, with interest charged only to date of final payment. . . . Galveston County can pay for gasoline in private boats used by the sheriff for official duties. . . . Salary must be paid to persons serving out the unexpired term of a county school superintendent even though the post has been abolished by vote. . . . Property tax funds can be used for purchase of right-of-way for federal state and county highways and lateral roads. . . . A sheriff has authority to award commutation of time for good conduct to a county jail prisoner. . . . A corporation is entitled to a license from the Texas Liquor Control Board if 51 per cent of its issued stock is owned by persons who have been U. S. citizens and Texas residents for three years and possess other qualifications. . . . Mosquito control tax levies, must be part of the 80-cent constitutional limit. . . . Special fuel tax refunds may be made where fuels have been lost by accident.

**CONNALLY APPLAUDS REPORT** — The Warren Commission report on the assassination of President Kennedy has received Governor Connally's approval. Connally, who was seriously wounded by the assassin, stated that reading the report brought back memories he had tried to put aside. Carr's summation on the assassination followed the Warren report. Several volumes of exhibits, consisting of evidence and information collected by Texas officials, are a part of the state report and will be displayed in the state archives.

Connally told newsmen he supports tighter security measures by state and local police guarding major public officials.

**ESTES PROBE** — A State Department of Public Safety investigation of Billie Sol Estes will continue "until all ramifications" are cleared, Connally told a press conference. Sen. Ralph Yarborough has challenged authority of the DPS to look into allegations that he received \$50,000 from Estes, who now faces prison sentences for swindling.

Connally said of the DPS: "It (See HIGHLIGHTS Page 4B)

Use Cotton Harvest - Aid Chemicals Wisely

Defoliant and desiccant have a place on the High Plains. But unless they are used properly—end when cotton is ready for their application—they can do much more harm than good.

Older, more mature cotton frequently can be prepared for machine harvest before frost, says Shelby Newman, Agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock. Experience shows that proper use of harvest-aid chemicals permits earlier harvest of mature cotton before exposure to weather damage, reduces the grade or actual field losses due to bad weather. Research shows that open cotton left in the field generally deteriorates one grade and around 1-32 inch in staple per month of weathering.

"When" is the key word in using harvest-aid chemicals. For example, if a desiccant or defoliant is applied before cotton is fully mature—more than 60 percent of bolls open and preferably 80 percent—not only yield decreases but also detrimental effects to seed and lint quality are possible. The more immature the cotton, the greater the losses. In any event, harvest-aid chemicals should be used only when at least 60 percent of the bolls are fully open, indicates research at the Center.

Proper timing of harvest-aid chemical use has been easier to non-irrigated and light-irrigated conditions than under heavy irrigation. This is because dryland or light-irrigated cotton generally matures 30-40 days before frost. Economics is the biggest consideration when debating between harvest-aid chemicals or

According to John Seibert, Extension Area Farm Management Specialist, it is up to each producer to determine, under his conditions, whether or not use of harvest-aid chemicals is profitable. From all indications, concludes Seibert, it is often hard to economically justify their use. Where such things as earliness of harvest for debt retirement and risk of adverse climatic conditions are of primary consideration, then economics—or more net income—is secondary.

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**

KNOW WHAT IT COSTS TO BORROW

There are many factors that a person about to make a personal loan from a bank or finance company should understand. These are important in deciding whether the loan is on reasonable terms and worthwhile. First, what will the loan cost? Cost includes not only the interest but any "extras" such as closing costs and credit investigation or service charges. Is credit life insurance required? Are such costs added to the loan or paid in advance? Is the interest — or such charged deducted from the amount borrowed and only the net amount paid over?

Does the lender require collateral or co-signers? If so, what can the borrower do to meet the requirements? Collateral or co-signers may enable one to borrow on more favorable terms.

When does the borrower get his money? Must he apply and then wait? What about repayment? Is it by installments, or all at once at the end of the loan period? Can there be prepayment? What about renewals or extensions of the loan? What penalties if the borrower is late in making payment?

Few borrowers stop to realize that when loans are repaid in installments the quoted interest of 6 percent, for example, may be misleading. The true interest could be approximately 12 percent, which might make the borrower reconsider.

The reason for this is simple: If you borrow \$100 to be paid in 12 monthly installments, on the average you have the use of only \$50 for the year. Interest of 6 percent computed on the entire \$100, as is customary in some lending agencies, is actually 12 percent on the \$50 you had use of.

Likewise, a 1½ percent a month carrying charge on a store account doesn't seem high — but that is 18 percent a year, which is mighty steep interest.

Rather than charging or financing something involving a carrying charge, it may be far cheaper to borrow the money on

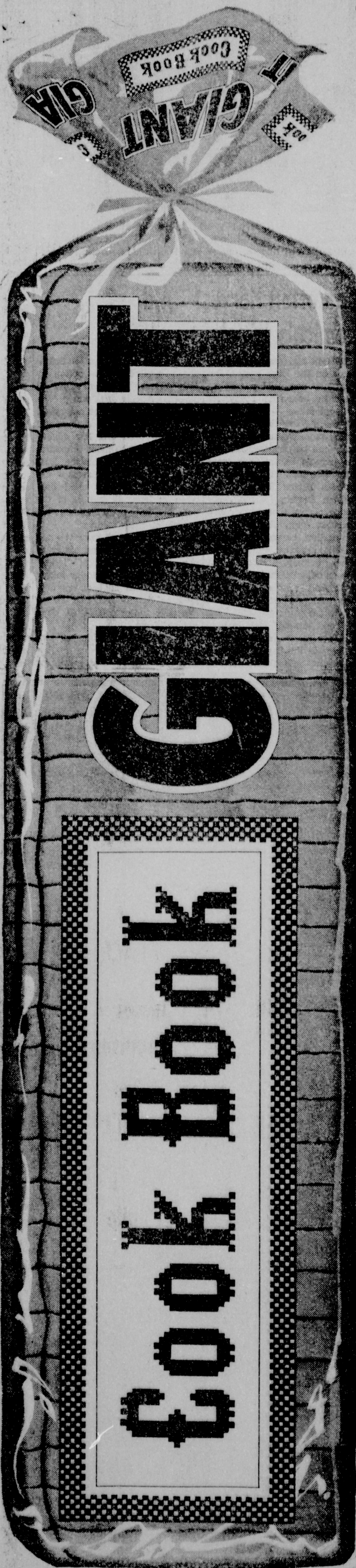

WATER PROJECTS - Representatives of eight East Texas soil conservation districts have been conferring with Texas Water Commission staffers about a proposal for a Southeast Texas

Resources Conservation and Development Project. They are mapping a plan for coordination of all existing water projects in their jurisdictions, as well as others being projected, so that recreational, flood control, drainage, levee and soil conservation units will be utilized to the fullest.

Counties involved are Newton, Tyler, Hardin, Polk, Jasper, Jefferson, Orange, Chambers and parts of Liberty and San Jacinto counties.

It is expected that the districts will go next to the State Soil Conservation Board. They hope to present a plan to the U. S. Department of Agriculture which - if approved - would designate an agency to do the actual designing. Designated agency probably would be the Soil Conservation Service.

Assistance plan, called the Resources, Conservation and Development Act, was passed in 1962. But it just now is getting underway.

District wants to increase reservoir capacity of the project to 488,760-acre feet. Lower Colorado River Authority has objected to the amended application. Commissioner set October 26 for hearing the application of Houston Lighting and Power Company to take 3,600,000-acre feet of water a year from Dickinson Bay for industrial purposes. GREEN BELT DAM CHANGED - Texas Water Commission approved the request of Green Belt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority to move its proposed dam and reservoir site from the Salt Fork of the Red River upstream to a point about five miles from Childress. Engineer S. W. Freese said the relocation was necessary because clay material in the bottom of the Salt Fork location were not strong enough to bear the proposed dam. State Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress says that any site is all right with his constituents, just so long as they get water soon. Rogers said, "People in Childress have started hauling back water, because if they use local water they smell worse after a bath than before."

In Great Britain, the amount a candidate may spend on his campaign for office is severely controlled by law, about \$2,000 for each candidate. The idea is to obviate personal wealth as an advantage.

The coming of cold weather may pose a potential hazard for your child that you haven't even thought about.

As your toddler stays indoors during winter, he'll be exploring — tasting, chewing, nibbling — on most anything in sight, even the woodwork and window sills.

It is this "curious" appetite that causes hundreds of children to be poisoned each month.

Perhaps the most insidious poison of all is lead poisoning. It results from toddlers eating small chips of old paint, chewing on window sills or nibbling on crumbs of chipped plaster containing bits of lead paint.

Paint on older houses is more apt to be deadly. Much more lead was formerly put in interior paints than is used today. Off the exterior paint — containing considerable lead — was also used indoors.

Toddlers eating flakes of this old paint or chewing it off painted woodwork or furniture are not made ill immediately. Lead poisoning is accumulative, that is, it builds to a toxic level over a period of time.

Since toddlers are usually confined indoors during the winter months, acute symptoms may develop as the stored lead is mobilized and distributed to sensitive organs of the body. Nerve cells are particularly vulnerable.

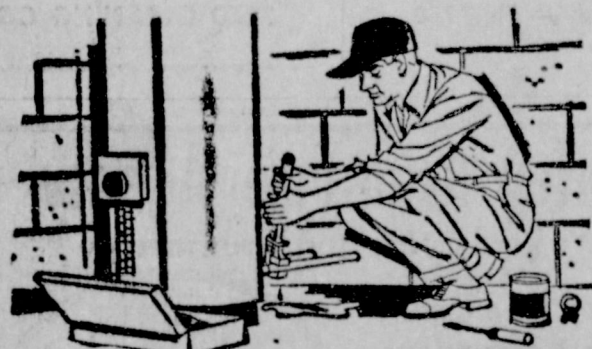
These wrecks accounted for eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,678.00.

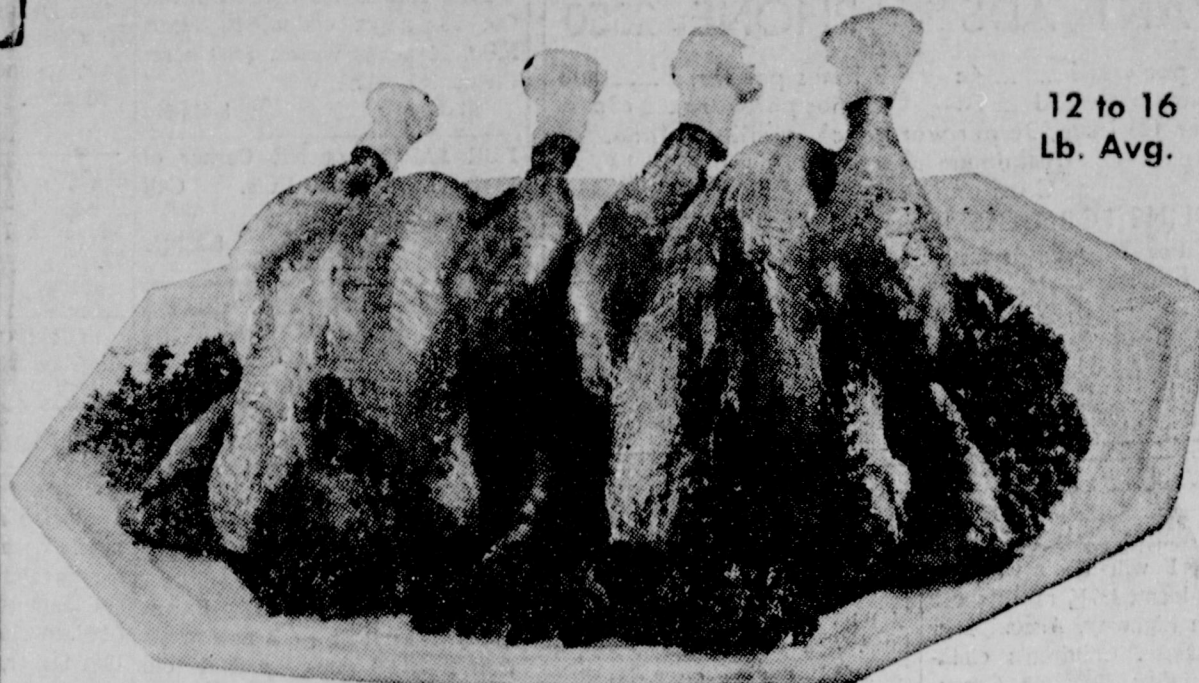
