Percy Armory was a chimney s' eep's helper who lived in London shortly before the birth of our own George Washington. his grimy work he found a diamond ring in the public street. Goiden Wedding Anniversary. Percy took the ring to a goldsmith's shop to find out what it was. There he placed it in the hands of the goldsmith's apprentice, who, under pretense of Mr.and Mrs. Jim Reese, and

be badgered about. He sought sa Monday. the services of a lawyer to sue for recovery of the ring and its jeweled set. The results of his su't have immortalized Percy's nand in the common law.

The goldsmith and his apprennice claimed that since Percy had only found the ring, he had no be er right to it than they did. The court felt differently about the matter and ordered the diamond returned "because the finder of a lost article has the right to hold it against the whole world except the true owner." This principle established by Percys case remains as effective today as it was over two centuries ago.

However, as far as the owner who lost the property is concerned, th efinder of lost goods is merely regarded as a depository, bolding the goods for the

The courtsdr aw a distinction between "mislaid" and "lost property. Lost property is property which the owner casually and thoughtlessly parts with, like the dropping of a wallet in a hurry to get on a bus. Mislaid property, on the other hand, is property which the owner has purposely laid down and then forgotten, leaving it where placed. An example of this would be a thandbag placed on a shop counter while a customer examines merchandise. A finder must leave mislaid articles with the proprietor of the place where found.
