Troops capture Arab hijackers, release 94 hostages unharmed

CAIRO (AP) - Egyptian paratroopers stormed a plane at Luxor, where Arab gunmen were holding 94 hostages, captured the hijackers and rescued the hostages without any injuries, the Interior Ministry said today.

The statement gave no details, but said a statement would be issued

First reports from Interior Ministry sources had said there were seven hijackers - five Libyans and two Algerians. However, the sources later

said there were only three gunmen aboard.

They had been demanding the release of five persons jailed in Egypt and enough fuel to fly to Libya, the

The hijackers claim to be members of a new organization called the Abdel Nasser Movement, named after the late Egyptian president.

The gunmen commandeered the Egyptian plane after it took off from Cairo for Luxor, 448 miles to the

News Agency reported the hijackers ordered the pilot to fly to Benghazi, in neighboring Libya. The report said the pilot told the gunmen he didn't have enough fuel and the plane landed

Security forces immediately surrounded the craft and Salem flew to Luxor to take charge of the

An Interior Ministry communique said 96 passengers were listed on the plane's manifest, including the hijackers, and the Boeing 737 had a crew of five. Fourteen of the passengers were Arabs, the airline said, and most of the others were French and Japanese tourists.

An official at the New Winter Palace Hotel in Luxor told The Associated Press by telephone that the hotel had sent lunch and drinks for 100 persons on request of officials at

He said tourists scheduled to leave Luxor had been barred from the

airport and passengers already at the field were ordered back to hotels.

Egyptian officials reportedly believed the hijackers had been trained and hired by the Libyan government. Libyan President Moammar Khadafy is Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's main Arab enemy and relations between the two countries are poor. Egypt has ac-cused Khadafy of directing a wave of terrorist attacks in Egypt in recent months. The Libyan leader has denied the charges.

North Korea warns U.S. action would force war

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - A U.S. Navy task force headed by the aircraft carrier Midway approached Korea today. North Korea said the warships were bound for its waters and warned that the move would 'force a conflict."

The five-ship naval force was or-dered from its base in Japan as part of the U.S. military response to the ax-slaying of two U.S. Army officers by North Koreans in the Korean neutral zone last week. The Navy would not give their exact location or destination but a Japanese pilot spotted them, shadowed by a Soviet freighter, and said they could be close


"It was a good thing that no big incident occurred at Panunjom for a long period. However, it is regretful that an incident occurred in the joint security area, Panmunjom, this time.

"An effort must be made so that such incidents may not recur in the future. For this purpose both sides should make efforts. We urge your side to prevent the provocation. Our side will never provoke first, but take self-defense measures only when provocation occurs. This is our consistent stand."

The message was delivered five hours after a U.N. Command force, acting on orders from President Ford, cut down the 40-foot Normandy poplar which the working party was pruning when the North Koreans attacked it. The tree cutters Saturday were guarded by 300 American and South Korean combat troops and an umbrella of American helicopter gunships, jet fighters and B52 bombers.

Blazes sweep bone-dry England

Six counties in southern England and Wales smouldered today after fire fighters battled through the night and put out two big forest fires and more than 200 smaller blazes that swept through the drought-stricken coun-

Fire brigade officers warned that the fires could break out again at any time, since Britain's worst drought in 250 years has made southern England and Wales "a giant tinderbox."

Authorities estimated that some 3,000 persons were evacuated Sunday, including 1,000 from a country club, 360 aged patients from St. Leonard's Geriatric Hospital, a nudist colony and holidayers in mobile home parks.

Twenty fire fighters were overcome

SOUTHAMPTON, England (AP) - by heat and smoke, and about 50 homes were destroyed, but no towns were threatened, police reported.

A dozen highways and three major

rail lines in southern England were closed as hundreds of troops, firemen and volunteers fought the fires, which were fanned by strong winds. The biggest blaze was in the Hurn

Forest, 15 miles west of Southampton, on England's south coast. Fire chiefs said an estimated six square miles were burned over.

"We stopped the flames only a few hundred yards from St. Leonard's Hospital," a fire officer reported. "It was terrifying. The flames leapt from the crowns of the trees 60 feet up and we couldn't always get at them. We nearly didn't make it."

The fire fighters used up thousands of gallons of water. The government has already warned that water will soon be rationed in many areas if rain does not fall and replenish dried-up reservoirs, rivers and underground springs.

The fires raged through tinder-dry forests and moorland in five southern counties — Hampshire, Dorset, Kent, Sussex and Norfolk — and Merioneth county in northwest Wales.

Another big fire raged on the holiday island of Guernsey, in the English Channel off the French coast. Firemen in Scotland's West Lothian county said they put out a fire Sunday night after it had burned for 40 hours.



And, as I've always said, the fun of chili cook-offery is in its absolute inconsequentiality. When it starts getting consequential it's time for me enough.



Reagan 'willing' to help, if schedule permits

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Ronald Reagan says he is willing to do anything he can to help President Ford's campaign, but his efforts will have to be fitted around his radio and public speaking commitments.

"I'll do what I can," Reagan said as he prepared to meet today with the producer of "American Viewpoint" daily radio show he discontinued when he started campaigning against Ford last year for the Republican presidential nomination.

The 65-year-old-former California governor, whose broadcasting career began as a baseball announcer for the Chicago Cubs before he broke into movies in 1937, hopes to be on the air in about three weeks with a daily five-minute political commentary. He returned to radio once before - in 1975 after leaving California's gover-

In an interview on the flight back to California after last week's Republican National Convention, Reagan said that looking back over his campaign, the only thing he would do differently is spend more time in Ohio and less in California.

Reagan won California's winnertake-all primary for 167 delegates in a 2-1 landslide. He polled 45 per cent of the Ohio vote the same day, but lost 91 of the state's 97 delegates.

The parks commission was to meet at 4 p.m. today to come up with recommendations to bring before

About a dozen residents of the park area appeared before the parks commission last week and protested the use of the park by "alcoholics, dope peddlers and young people who are being misled." The group objected to the park's reputation of a "hangout" and to the "deplorable" conditions which had arisen there over the past eight years.

Residents complained about speeding cars in the park area, double and triple parking on streets there, trash and the use of "foul" language, and suggested everything from a strictly enforced curfew to a complete shut-down of the park.

The city council also will reconsider a request by Paul Rochester for an amendment to a planned district on 155.32 acres at FM 868 and Midkiff Road for construction of a shopping

Council spent almost one and onehalf hours during its last session discussing the request made by Morris Shaw of Odessa on Rochester's behalf. Accompanying Shaw were representatives of Paul Broadhead and Associates of Meridian, Miss., who has an option to

develop the center.

The proposed developers expressed concern about restrictions the council had placed on the site - a minimum of 500,000 square feet to be developed before the center could open and a time deadline of Sept. 10, 1978, by which the project must be completed. Schools open today in cities troubled by racial problems

By The Associated Press School officials in Dallas were

oking for a peaceful opening of ublic schools after an advertising campaign to win acceptance of a new

desegregation plan calling for the busing of about 18,000 pupils.

Meanwhile, in the small Arkansas town of Eudora, school officials were promising discipline to prevent a repeat of the racial violence that ed their classrooms last spring.

Both school systems opened the school year today. Most of the more than 40 million children attending the nation's elementary and secondary schools will not return until after

Labor Day.

The Dallas desegregation plan called for the busing of about 18,000 pupils in grades 4 through 8 to schools outside their neighborhoods. Nearly 10,000 others are transfering voluntarily to "magnet schools" with special curricula designed to make them more attractive.

School officials said they expected no violence after an advertising campaign that urged acceptance of the plan and support for the public school system.

But they took precautions anyway.

"It's just like being prepared for war," said school district security

director Bennie Kelley. "You stay prepared, even if you don't think anything is going to happen." Some 550 school buses are tran-sporting students on rides averaging

20 minutes. A parent or school ad-

ministrator was assigned to each bus to help guard against violence. The district has an enrollment of 140,000. The ratio is 44 per cent Anglo, 44 per cent black and 12 per cent Mexican-American. A multiracial citizens group, the Dallas Alliance, drafted the desegregation plan, chosen from many submitted to U.S. District Court Judge William M. Taylor Jr.

School taxes were raised 8 per cent this year to help pay the estimated \$13 million to \$23 million the plan will

In Eudora, where rock-and-bottlethrowing racial fights forced schools to close early last spring, Eudora High School Principal Abel White promised to use strict, even-handed discipline, including spankings for any students caught fighting.

In Jacksonville, Fla., and Philadelphia, meanwhile, labor problems were the stumbling block as

In Jacksonville, Duval County public school teachers decided Sunday to give negotiators another week to reach a contract settlement.

There are 80 issues outstanding in the labor dispute. Salary is one, but other problems include seniority, transfers and teacher evaluation. The system has 110,000 students.

Negotiators for Philadelphia's public schools and representatives of the city's 13,000 teachers are planning to meet Wednesday to try again for a new contract. They've been trying since last October, and the current contract — reached after an 11-week strike four years ago - expires Aug.

Many of the teachers are "reluctantly resigning themselves to strike," said a spokesman for the Philadelphia Federation of Teachers. School for the 265,000 students begins

The protesters were carried or dragged to 10 school buses Sunday by about 100 state troopers after being told to leave the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire's construction site in Seabrook. They were held overnight at a National Guard armory in Port-

smouth. "No forced busing!" the protesters chanted as ses arrived and the troopers moved in to break up the demonstration against con-struction of the plant.

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The demonstrators came from throughout New England and New York State. About 1,000 persons gathered at Hampton Falls Common for a rally Sunday af-ternoon, and then about 200 of them went to the guarded plant site via an old railroad right-of-way.

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

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The whole of 'swaraj'

Critics of the press in America do not quarrel with the constitutional guarantee of press freedom, but focus on the degree of responsibility with which it is exercised.

Thus it is difficult for us, a people long accustomed to the blessings of liberty, to understand why Bombay publisher Rajmohan Gandhi is in trouble with his government.

He made the mistake of printing in his weekly newsmagazine a quotation from his revered grandfather, Mohandas K. Gandhi, in 1922 when India was straining at its bonds with Britain. "The restoration of free speech, free association and free press," said the leader in the founding of modern India, "is almost the whole of swaraj (independence)."

But in India's version of democracy, speaking out for civil liberties today is disloyal and betrays a lack of discipline "required by the times."

Under measures instituted by Prime Minister Indira Gandhi no relation - the publisher has been ordered to post a \$2,300 bond with the police commissioner, the first step in closing dissident

And Rajmohan Gandhi concedes that only his kinship with the architect of India's struggle for freedom has delayed official retaliation under the emergency measures order more than a year

The prime minister justifies the government's harsh actions as essential to India's ecomomic health. Criticism of government or government officials, therefore, is unpatriotic.

Americans, who have experienced the positive accomplishments of a free press in recent years and who are jealous of their freedom in general are more likely to agree with publisher Gandhi. "My very patriotism and discipline compel me to take this stand," he said.

It is improbable that Western revulsion will sway opinion in Bombay.

But the bleak outlook for freedom in India is a blunt warning to be wary of restrictions initiated in the name of democracy which must be the blueprint for democracy's

Get up very early if White House is goal

The presidential nomination

The presidential nomination campaigns of Jimmy Carter and Ronald Reagan demonstrated the necessity of long-range planning and hard work by those who seek to go to the White House.

No longer can a political hopeful campaign for several months before a convention and have any chance of being nominated. Even incumbent presidents have to spend more time and effort on campaigning than they did in previous years.

did in previous years.

Three or four years ago Carter started to run flat out to become the Democratic nominee and, hopefully,

He went all over the country setting p local organizations, enlisting

up local organizations, enlisting volunteers and contacting likely contributors. He spent hours talking with local politicians and city, county and state political machines.

He went from one end of the country to the other making speeches, giving interviews and getting himself on innumerable television and radio programs. He had a cleverly planned and well-orchestrated public relations nd well-orchestrated public relations

program.

Long before other candidates even thought of announcing for the presidency he was already lining up convention delegates and making certain that he would have the support of key areas.

Ronald Reagan did the same thing. All during the eight years that he was governor of California he had his eye on the White House and he campaigned vigorously, even op-posing Richard Nixon for the

In fact, Reagan leaped into national prominence when he made some effective and dramatic speeches in

support of Barry Goldwater in 1964.

Reagan also lined up his sources of campaign contributions, working with wealthy people in all parts of the country, some of the big industries and businesses. Once Reagan left the governorship in Sacramento he launched an all-out campaign. While in Sacramento he

spoke in many parts of the country, made trips abroad which were expertly exploited and collected IOUs North, South, East and West.

Another classic example of a presidential candidate was that given by John F. Kennedy.

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At Chicago in 1956 it looked as if he had the vice presidential nomination sewed up. He was leading Estes Kefauver but then the deal which had been made between Stevenson and Kefauver was put into action and Kennedy's margin dwindled. One by one large state delegations, such as New York's headed by Carmen de Sapio, left the floor, held caucuses and returned to switch their votes from Kennedy to Kefauver.

Jake Arvey, the political boss in Illinois at that time, worked out a deal whereby Kefauver withdrew from the presidential race and was promised the vice presidential nomination while Arvey would take care of many of Kefauver's unpaid bills around the

When Kennedy saw the tide turning rapidly he moved from the podium after making the nomination for vice president unanimous for "the great senator from the state of Tennessee.

Immediately he went down on the convention floor and began to buttonhole delegates on the right side of the auditorium while his brother, Bobby Kennedy, did the same along the left aisle. From that moment on JFK went on an all-out crusade to win the Democratic nomination.

So the lesson is that if you want to have to spend at least three or four years, and probably six or eight, to win. This is the reason young Jerry Brown, the governor of California, already is working on his nomination in 1980 or 1984.

Coldly realistic KC convention strategy triumphs

KANSAS CITY - President Ford's coldly realistic convention strategy reached its climax around 2:15 a.m. Wednesday when his managers, overriding Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's protests, finally accepted Reagan platform amendment implicitly disavowing Ford-Kissinger foreign policy.

That calculated surrender throttled

what scant hope remained of rallying Reagan's defeated legions on the ideological issues that triggered their original challenge to the President. Dovetailed with Reagan campaign manager John Sears'own strategy of fighting on procedural issues, this bottled up Reaganite passion and revented an ideological outpouring at Kemper Arena.

Lacking that passion, Reagan elegates were outmuscled by Ford lelegates who, surprisingly, maintained far superior discipline. Whereas Republican machines of the Northeast kept tightly leashed Ford delegates ready to vote for anything, unbossed Reaganites needed a holy cause. That they were denied that cause in Tuesday night's test balloting was a triumph for Ford convention manager William Tim-mons and a miscalculation by Sears.

Some test vote, on which delegates were not legally bound by primary election results, was Reagan's only chance of erasing Mr. Ford's slim delegate lead. With Sears committed to a non-ideological test, the foreign policy amendment was a sop to holster morale of Reagan delegates. The major effort was rule 16(c), equiring Mr. Ford to name his





Evans running mate in advance.

On Tuesday afternoon, just hours before the balloting, Sears informed his regional whips they had 1,160 votes — 30 more than needed — for 16(c), without even counting unfathomable Mississippi. More nervous than he let on, Ford delegate counter James Baker tallied a bare majority of 1,130. also without Mississippi. The discrepancy: Sears was counting Trojan Horse Reagan delegates in Northeast delegations.

Thus, neither side was prepared for

Mr. Ford's 1,180 votes on 16(c). When Sen. Clifford Case announced 62 of 67 New Jersey delegates against the rule, Sears was astounded; he demanded a poll of the delegation (which confirmed Case's count). Five Georgia delegates, bound by state convention to support Reagan on all matters, defected. Some 10 Ford delegates from Pennsylvania sup-posedly backing Reagan on 16(c) vanished in thin air.

Little Delaware was the Reagan disaster in microcosm. Sears expected that the 14-to-2 support there for Mr. Ford would be triffimed to 12 to 4 on l6(c); in fact, it was 15 to 1. Sears expected support and even a podium speech backing 16(c) from Thomas Evans, who, as former Republican national co-chairman, would have been the most prestigious Ford delegate to back the rule. But Evans, now running for Congress, informed Sears early Tuesday that he had personal assurances from President Ford of vice-presidential selection reform for 1980 and, so, would oppose 16(c) this time.

This hemorrhage of support may have been caused when Mississippi's afternoon causes delivered by

afternoon caucus delivered, by a three-vote margin, all 30 votes against 16(c) under the unit rule. But this reason, publicly advanced by Sears, reveals how shaky was his support on the procedural question in the first place.

Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois, and North Carolina delegation chairman Tom Ellis, their ardor for Reagan dimmed by Sears' non-ideological strategy, stormed after the vote that Reagan delegates needed an ideological rallying point. At least, Crane and Ellis added, they would have a chance to vote against the Ford-Kissinger foreign policy, even if it came too late to help Reagan.

But in a sky suite overlooking Kemper Arena, key Ford supporters were debating whether to accept the foreign policy amendment implicitly denouncing Mr. Ford's Helsinki treaty and his snub to Alexander Solzhenitsyn. Rank-and-file Reaganites would never accept, even if Ragan staffers would, a White House "compromise" deleting mention of Helsinki and Solzhenitsyn. So, the Ford choices! fight or

Dr. Kissinger, confined to Washington until Mr. Ford was safely

nominated, wanted to fight. That position was backed in the sky suite only by Vice President Nelson Rockefeller. Sen. Robert Griffin of Michigan, Sen. John Tower of Texas and delegate hunter Baker asked: why fight over a document nobody reads anyway? But when told over the telephone the amendment did not matter, Mr. Ford - backing Rockefeller and Kissinger - shot back: "The hell it doesn't."

On the floor, Sen. Jesse Helms of North Carolina was overheard telling Ford operative Tom Korologos h would leave the Republican party and back an independent conservative ticket if the White House beat the amendment. But with anti-16(c) delegates from Mississippi, Georgia. Delaware and elsewhere opposing Mr. Ford on this one, Reagan could scarcely lose. The President reluctantly agreed to surrender.

I know just the spot you're talking about, Lela It can truly aggravate. Let's cover the points that could cause trouble and hope we hit on the one that's bugging you.

When joining interfacing to one cuff section, place it next to the wrong side of the upper cuff section (the one that will be on the outside when cuff is finished). Be sure to mark and stitch carefully when joining the two cuff sections so you will have the right amount of seam allowance and cuff width. When joining cuff to sleeve, do not bring the sleeve all the way to the end of the cuff — fudge back a little. This will leave you more room to get all the seam allowances to the inside.

And, most important, be sure to trim carefully and as closely as possible. Grade seam allowances for less bulk - and less aggravation. Please let me know if you need further help. Dear Mrs. Kinser: I

How Channing Lowe — or "Chan Lowe," as he signs his art work — got to Shawnee was largely by that accident of his mother's appearance in Oklahoma City. When Carol Channing travels, she keeps a framed collection of her son's cartoons in her dressing

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Fed ponders new rules on credit discrimination

Associated Press Writer
The Federal Reserve System is condering new rules to implement laws rohibiting bankers, merchants and thers from denying credit solely ecause of age, race, color, religion, ational origin or receipt of welfare enefits.

A key section of the rules is designed to prevent discrimination against the elderly. Such discrimina-tion was banned by Congress earlier

this year when it amended the Equal Credit Opportunity Act. Supporters of the legislation said that elderly people — who grew up before the advent of the "charge-it" society and are used to paying cash — often are rejected when they do apply for credit late in life

(The Equal Credit Opportunity Act itself banned discrimination based on sex or marital status, and Federal Reserve regulations implementing Reserve regulations implementing those provisions took effect last Oc-

tober.)

The amendments to the law permit creditors to take age into account — if they can show statistics to prove that it "represents a pertinent element of creditworthiness." Creditors are not allowed to set a mandatory cut-off

age, however.

Here's what that means, according to a spokesman for the Fed's Office of Saver and Consumer Affairs:

A creditor who can show statistically that people aged 40 to 50 are better

credit risks than those aged 50 to 60 is allowed to use that information to give a 45-year-old applicant a better rating than a 55-year-old applicant. If statistics showed that the older age group paid more promptly and defaulted less often, the 55-year-old would have the advantage.

What the creditor cannot do, is set an arbitrary limit — say 65 — and refuse to give credit to anyone over

refuse to give credit to anyone over

Among the problems inolved in im-

plementing the law are deciding exactly what is meant by elderly and figuring out whether the age provision protects the young as well as the old.

The Fed is seeking comments from the public on the subject. The deadline is Sept. 1 and anyone who has an opinion should write to Secretary, Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, Washington, D.C., 20551. The finalized regulations will take effect next March.

In another area, the Federal Reserve System is trying to define what's meant by the phrase "adverse action" as it is used in the law. This is important because the legislation requires creditors who take adverse action against an applicant to let him or her know within a reasonable period of time and to give the reason, if asked

The Fed has proposed defining "adverse action" as the refusal to grant or increase credit.


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

TRICK DISAPPEARS

At this point East and South each held three trumps and one diamond. If East ruffed, South would discard the diamond. If East discarded, South would ruff with a low trump and cash the ace of spades as his tenth trick. Either way, East would capture South's diamond loser with a trump that was sure to win a trick anyway.

What happened to the setting trick? As my favorite Russian playwright once put it, "There's many a slip twixt the borscht and the lip!"



JOHANNESBURG. South Africa (AP) — Police opened fire on blacks trying to enforce a work boycott in the huge Soweto township today and killed one of them.

Thousands of Soweto blacks stayed home in response to a call for a three-day protest strike, and employers in Johannesburg said up to 80 per cent of their black workers were absent at the start of the work day. But later they reported a steady trickle of latecomers arriving for

The latecomers reported attempts to force them to stay away but said police action foiled these.

Deputy Police Commissioner D.J. Kriel said police opened fire three times on "gangs of in-timidators" in the vicinity of Soweto's Orlando railway station. There were unconfirmed reports that at least six other persons were wounded by the gunfire, the South African Press Association reported.

The dead man was the 253rd person reported killed in more than two months of black unrest and protests against the government's racial policy. All but three were black.

Soweto, eight miles south of Johannesburg, was reported "tense and unpredictable."

Pamphlets distributed among the million blacks living in the township called for a three-day strike and said homes of those who did not join in would be set afire.

Officials said the pamphlets were the work of the African National Congress, a militant black organization that is banned by the white minority government.

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

The city claims it suffered the damages when the gas companies charged higher prices than specified in a longterm gas supply contract signed in 1961. The city filed its suit more than four

years ago and it goes to trial today only after the city council rejected unanimously an out-of-court set-tlement from Coastal States.

Negotiations between Coastal States and the city are continuing. Judge Peter Michael Curry had numerous pre-trial motions before him this morning in his 166th District

Lawyers for both sides said it could take months to get through the preliminaries necessary before jury selection can begin in the case. Much of the early trial

maneuvering was expected to be out of public view, with lawyers arguing legal points in the judge's chambers. Among the pending motions were

requests by Coastal States to further delay the trial and to move it from San Antonio to Houston, its company into bankruptcy.

While rejecting the last settlement offer from Coastal States, which some officials said would be worth \$65 million to the city, the city council left open the door for further talks.

Coastal States president Harry Blomquist said last Friday he recognized "that some changes in the last plan may be necessary to ac-complish a settlement which will meet with approval by San Antonio and other necessary parties."

Natural gas may be real payoff in coast gamble by oil industry

NEW YORK - Natural gas, not oil, may provide the richest payoff in the n-dollar gamble that began last week when American companies put down their bids for the first off-shore leases in the Atlantic Ocean.

A number of oil company executives said they expect the 101 tracts lying off the coasts of New Jersey and Delaware to be more valuable for producing natural gas than for oil.

"There is probably both oil and gas down there," said J. R. Jackson of Exxon's exploration department, which has been examining the Atlantic's potential treasures for 16

"But I've been saying this for five years - tht there is a greater chance for gas than oil and I still believe it."

Exxon backed up its expectations with \$348 million in high bids here this week, buying 34 tracts to become the top bidder as the Government sold the first leases on the Atlantic's outer Continental Shelf.

More than \$1.1 billion was anteed up by oil companies, bidding either singly, like Exxon, or in groups.

The bidding was high, even though a number of company executives said

Harbor Island could be first superport

PORT ARANSAS, Tex. (AP) — Each year millions of barrels of imported oil quietly gush through pipelines snaking out of ship holds to dockside facilities at Harbor Island.

Crude oil tankers flying flags from all over the world make their way through a 45-foot deep channel, deepest of any Gulf Coast port, to Harbor Island some 20 miles east of Corpus Christi.
And Harbor Island could become

the nation's first superport, serving giant tankers unable to berth in other U.S. ports. Other contenders in the race to create this country's first superport are the proposed Seadock monobuoy off the beach at Freeport, and LOOP, the monobuoy proposed off the Louisiana coast.

Harbor Island could be the first because of its favorable location and economics, strong local and national support and multi-purpose development plans. It has received the strong endorsement of the Federal Energy Administration.

At one time port visionaries hoped a new 72-foot channel for handling much larger tankers would be finished some time this year, the 50th Anniversary of the Port of Corpus

But this project has moved at the same kind of deliberate pace as other major dredging proposals during a period in which the country has been reacting to a wave of environmental

Some experts have said the project could pay for itself each year in savings on crude oil transportation. Each of the big tankers can carry four to five times the payload of the present tanker fleet serving Texas

The project will be built by the Nueces County Navigation District, privately financed through revenue bonds backed by participating in-dustries. While money is considered no problem, the port backers must have an Army Corps of Engineers permit to go ahead—and that hurdle is yet to be cleared.

The Harbor Island deepwater port concept first surfaced in 1972 and has been in the planning stage since. It was conceived by port planner Duane Orr as a logical extension of the oil traffic already at Harbor Island.

Public hearings on the idea were held in 1973 with considerable opposition generated by local and San Antonio groups interested in preserving coastal estuaries and keeping the tourist village atmosphere in Port Aransas.

In spring 1974

in spring 1974 port authorities backing the project released a detailed study by Bechtel, Inc., a worldwide engineering firm, which concluded that the idea was economically and environmentally

It put a \$260-million price tag on the work, provided it gets started this year. Construction is expected to take three years.

Imported oil would feed the refinery complex in the Corpus Christi area and would be piped inland to refineries in West Texas and the

The Harbor Island plan is in three phases aimed at serving tankers and bulk carriers of 275,000 deadweight ton (DWT) class. The first phase would serve only oil tankers but later phases would provide a deepdraft channel for very large ore and grain

These giant tankers could off-load crude at the rate of 100,000 barrels per hour, an average unloading time of 24 hours and an average turn-around time of 36 hours in port.

U.S. Rep. John Young, D-Corpus Christi, feels the later bulk cargo stages are as important as the oil tanker facility.

He notes that energy imports are the key factor in the project's annual 100 per cent cost-to-benefit ratio and that in the long run oil imports, now 41 per cent of the nation's consumption, will dwindle.

"As a national policy we are striving for independence. And we will get independence all right—in about 30 years they aren't going to have it to ship over here anyway," he said of foreign oil. Young predicted the surge in use of

oil and gas is going to continue to increase rapidly while domestic supplies shrink.
The Bechtel plan for Harbor Island

calls for dredging an 80-foot channel nine miles into the Gulf of Mexico, a 76-foot channel between the jetties

here at Port Aransas and a mooring basin at Harbor Island with a minimum depth of 72 feet. A large tank farm and pumping station will be built at the site for receiving oil and piping it on to

refinery storage.

Harbor Island has a unique advantage over other points from Brownsville to Florida because the 80foot depth contour is closer to the shoreline here than at any other point.

The 275,000 DWT ships it would serve are not the 500,000 DWT supertankers that would tie-up at Seadock near Freeport but do make up a significant portion of the vessels

now being built.

Seadock backers and Corpus Christi port officials have not endorsed each other's projects but each side has said both are needed, and that they would not compete for the same oil traffic.

ENERGY OIL & GAS

The Harbor Island and Seadock proposals contrast sharply, however.
Harbor Island would be publicly
owned and operated. It would have an
inshore dock area, landlocked on
three sides, and could eventually handle other types of cargo in all

Seadock will be privately owned by an oil company consortium, will be a single-point mooring located about 30 miles from shore and will be confined solely to receiving imported crude oil. It could not operate during rough seas, however.

The floating monobuoy terminal would be connected by pipeline to tank farms and refineries onshore from Freeport north through Texas City and Houston. Environmentalists have argued

that if there must be a deepwater port in the Corpus Christi area it, too, should be a monobuoy. Bechtel concluded that a monobuoy in the Coastal Bend area posed a greater threat to resort beach areas than did

Operating proposals call for oil spill control safety booms to be in place across the mouth of the harbor at all times when tankers are in port. The Corpus Christi area also has an oil spill control association which is considered a model in the nation. "In contrast," Bechtel says, "no oil-

"In contrast," Bechtel says, "no ou-spill prevention procedures are practical for singlepoint moorings with the present state of the art, and oil spills from a southerly single point mooring would be driven by prevailing winds toward the attractive resort areas north of the Padre Island National Seashore."

Opponents have been specifically concerned about the destruction of wetlands in the Port Aransas area as a result of the extensive dredging

The Bechtel plan reduced the area of wetlands that would be covered by dredge material from several usand acres to about 250 acres. Port planners say they are concerned about the effects on the surrounding marine habitat and are prepared to take whatever measures are necessary to assure that the effects

are not unacceptable.
Young and others, however, have emphasized that environmental concerns must be kept in balance with the need for a healthy Coastal Bend economy and the demand for imported energy.
