Carol Burns, executive director of the Midland Community Action Agency (MCAA), was fired by the agency's board of directors at a meeting Thursday night at the Carver school building. Myrtle Hall, director of the southeast side neighborhood association, was named temporary

Though the meeting was open to the public, debate and the vote on the motion to fire Burns were conducted in closed session. Included in the motion was a resolution that the agency write an official letter requesting help from the governor's office.

Dewey Williams, chairman of the board, said he was "sorry it had to come to this." But what matters most, he said, is "the benefit of the people involved." He expressed special concern for senior citizens, saying "if someone doesn't speak for the aged, we're lost." He said he is optimistic, that he believes now board members will work more closely with the new executive director.

Al Hernandez, president of the board, said only "I was hurt." Bar-

and said he felt "she (Burns) should
have had the right to defend herself."

# Ford, Dole consider Mrs. Dole's campaign status

VAIL, Colo. (AP) - President Ford and running mate Bob Dole are mulling over whether Dole's wife should resign as a Federal Trade Commissioner to allow her to actively campaign for the Republican ticket.

A campaign official said the future plans of Elizabeth Dole was "the first private talks between Ford and her husband, the Kansas senator.

The Doles arrived here Thursday

night within minutes of Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller and former Treasury Secretary John B. Connally. The three men joined the President and campaign strategists for a working dinner. They held more

Other than that, the "past" - at least here - simply hasn't faded. The fair proves that.

Here, this agricultural-oriented event seems to be thriving in a nation that is letting country fairs slip by the wayside and into the past.

But not here. The Stanton Jaycees, inspired by the Martin County Bicentennial Commission, last October ramrodded a one-day countywide fair. It was the first fair in this community in some 25 years.

"Were totally in the experimental stage," Jaycee Herb Sorley said of staging this old-fashioned community get-together.

"So, one of these days," he said, "we'll find the right combination to make it work .... We plan to continue it without a doubt."

Three-day fair, now into its second day, seems to be running quite well, despite Sorley's cautious optimism.

The fair, just west of uptown Stanton, reflects just what keeps Martin County in good stead with its creditors: a bountiful agricultural

There's a six-county steer show, displays of canned fruits and vegetables, and samplings of home-grown cotton, the county's economic mainstay.

The score or so of booths set up in the main fair barn are partitioned, appropriately enough, by burlap cotton bale wrappings that resemble

fishnets hung up to dry.
One booth, set up by the Martin
County Agriculture Stabilization-Conservation Service (ASCS). features a "for-real" miniature farm designed and built by George Glynn, the ASCS executive director here. Growing on the irrigated plot of soil

are seedling cotton, oats, and grain sorghum. Flat dab in the middle of the oat patch is spinning windmill. Unreal and sheep are about. To the south is an oilfield pumping jack at idle. And to the east are the

farm house and barns. Tractors and

other implements are in the distant But to the north, and along side the display, you might find Glynn or either of his two ASCS clerks: Bar-bara Roper or Herb Sorley, the Jaycee who helped put the fair

# Concerned citizens lay plans for busing battle

Representatives from 16 Midland elementary school parent groups, meeting as the Midland Council of Concerned Citizens, agreed Thursday to accept the free services of two Midland attorneys on a temporary

The attorneys, James P. Boldrick and Jay H. "Timber" Floyd, agreed to represent the group temporarily at

The group also voted to form three committees, one for data gathering. one for planning and an executive committee to be composed of the chairmen of each school's delegation to the council.

Council president Robert Southerland said the data gathering committee will accumulate information so the planning committee can begin working on desegregation plans that the group could consider.

scheduled meetings Saturday.

The executive committee will meet Monday night in closed session to consult with the attorneys.

At the beginning of the meeting, all those parents groups represented affirmed that their groups supported the neighborhood school concept but would be willing to work for a plan that involved voluntary or minimal involuntary busing

The Emerson delegation reported that they had conducted a survey in their area. Of those surveyed 1,105 said they were against forced busing and for neighborhood schools, seven said they were for forced busing and

138 refused to take either position. The group approved a motion to encourage other school committees to survey their areas.

Many of those present expressed support for the magnet school concept

if it involved voluntary action on the part of parents. Pat Baskin, spokesman for the Sam

Houston group, and Parker Humes, spokesman for the Bowie group, presented a plan involving creating zones in the city.

This plan would keep grades kin-dergarten through three in the present system. For grades four through six, the city would be divided into three zones containing six or seven elementary schools each.

One zone would be designated for fourth grade, with all city fourth graders attending one of the schools in that zone; one would be designated for fifth grade, with all fifth graders assigned to the schools in that zone, and one zone would be designated for

Baskin said there is "some reason to believe" the government and the court would approve a plan, which if otherwise satisfactory, would allow grades kindergarten through three to

niff them out?) reifully, I was accosted only by friendly people who pressed draft beer and popcorn and numerous sandwichlets on me and ushered me sandwichiets on me and ushered me to a seat for the raising of the make-shift, old-fashioned roller curtain and an evening of black-hearted villainy and pure-as-the-driven-snow nobility in what turned out to be a British version of the now-farce



melodrama—with music yet.

In fact, the songs by the energetic amateur company joined the quavery barbershop escapees of pianist Jane Covington for some of the high points

Barbara Iglehart's "I'm a Charmer" and "An Innocent Girl" elicited waves of empathy for the plight of a warm but maidenly "Miss Spindle," the "Down with Demon Drink" duet of hero Sid Williams and bartender Wayne Stacker offered the audience members their choice of the primrose path or the straight and narrow, and crowd-pleaser young Bob Gibson's "Some Mens Like Whiskey" summed

up the battle between innocence and temptation more concisely than grammatically. A later olio ap-pearance by Ms. Iglehart in the American saw "My Mother Was a Lady" eventually showed the fruits of purity.

Shirley Williams doubled in brass as mother and retardate sister, Diane

Toomey was a surprisingly stout-hearted wife, and Keith Pearson epitomized the show-must-go-on style of thespians everywhere when he lost his moustache in the middle of his big scene and retrieved it from the floor

scene and retrieved it from the floor and filed it in his pocket without missing a line. H. I. Iglehart was a more bumbling villain than usual, but he was decidedly nasty.

The Brian J. Burton directed farce was particularly well staged, with light, clever set pieces featuring stylized white caricatures on black flats.

Friends of the library moved about hall pressing sandwiches and beer on visitors, and none of the actors apeared the worse for popcorn, paper wads, and insults hurled over the

stay in the neighborhood schools. Baskin said it is essential that the burden of desegregation plans be borne equally by all schools to prevent white flight.

Glenn Redmond from the Bonham delegation pointed out that under this plan each student in the school district would attend at least seven different schools during the 13 years of public education. Thursday afternoon, school board

president Joe Dominey said the school board will accept plans from neighborhood groups but asked that they be specific in nature.

"The board of education is aware of the concern and the hard work of many neighborhood groups seeking a solution to our school desegregation. We would welcome their suggestions and plans at the earliest possible time. We would hope that any plans to be submitted in would be in writing after a careful study is made of the projected enrollments of each of the elementary schools for the current school year."

Dominey said projected elementary enrollment, including ethnic analysis of all elementary schools and capacities of these schools, is available from the school district administrative offices. Persons may pick up the information at the offices or call in and it will be mailed to them. In another vote at the Thursday

night meeting, the citizens council agreed to invite the school board and John Skogland, the court's special master in the case, to attend the next meeting of the council to listen to plans and the feelings of the group.

# MC plans permanent LBJ room

A Lyndon B. Johnson room will be constructed on the Midland College campus, college president Dr. Al G.
Langford said today, the 68th anniversary of Johnson's birth.
The room, to be called the LBJ
Educational Forum, is to be located in

the learning resources center (library) and will feature the life and times of the late President of the United States, who was born Aug. 27,

The concept for the room and space for the facility were approved by the board of trustees when the original building plans were drawn, on the condition that it be funded from private sources.

The room will be used as a teaching and research facility for the college and will be open to the public, to school groups and to serious scholars

Jack Scannell, history instructor at the college since its beginning in 1969, has worked closely with the planners and designers.

"First, I think we should explain that this proposed LBJ room is non-

Estimated cost is \$130,000. Several donations have been made or pledged toward the project already, Dr. Langford, college president, said. The room will be on the second floor

of the learning resource center. A bronze bust of Johnson, a wall plaque honoring major donors and a carpet silhouette of the late President are planned for the entrance.

A circular listening booth with notable quotations from Johnson on the wall as a visual background will allow visitors to listen to more than 100 recordings of men and women who made history during Johnson's

Space for a class of more than 30

students will occupy the center of the room, with tables, chairs and a teaching console. Teaching aids will include an overhead projector, 35 mm random access slide projector, adjustable blackboard and central control of lights and audiovisiual

An 18-foot wall mural depicting historical events which occurred during Johnson's lifetime and display cases containing a variety of articles pertaining to the time period will occupy one wall.

A video program center, including two 19-inch television monitors, will occupy another wall. These will be used for video-tapes of historic moments during the Johnson period as well as live programs of interest to

as well as live programs of interest to current and social science students.

Another section of the room will feature a painting of vignettes of Johnson, along with a grouping of photographs and documents. A movie depicting Johnson's interest in education, along with a planned diorama containing a figure of LBJ in his younger days in a classroom

setting will be shown on a central screen. An edited recording of his voice would describe his efforts to improve education.

The complete facility will be located in an area about 38 feet long

and 29 feet wide. and 29 feet wide.

"We have already received assurances from Mrs. Lyndon Johnson of her full support and cooperation in the project," Langford said, noting that some historical documents and mementoes already have been pledged to the project.

"There is no doubt that this room

will be an outstanding addition to our instructional program in the social sciences division and will provide an added dimension for our community," he said.

### 3.7 percent jobless here

AUSTIN — July unemployment rates in Midland were 3.7, while state rates dipped to 5.7 per cent, four-tenths of one per cent below the June

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A stone-throwing mob of blacks confronted police briefly in Soweto today, but the big ghetto south of Johannesburg was reported "reasonably quiet" after three days of battle in which at least 31 blacks were killed

Police said the mob was quickly

spersed. "The war is over," said a leader of the Zulu tribesmen who had been on a rampage since Tuesday. Chief Gatsha Buthelezi, the national leader of the tribe, arrived in Johannesburg, ap-parently to meet with Soweto Zulus. He appealed earlier to his people to calm down "so we can have a review

GRAND VALLEY, Colo. (AP) — Seventy rifles and pistols, including a loaded submachine gun, 150 sticks of dynamite and "thousands of rounds of ammunition" have been found in a house here, the county sheriff's office reported. President Ford's

vacation retreat at Vail is about 120 miles east of where the weapons were found. A Secret Service spokesman Washington said the agency was not investigating the discovery of the weapons because of the distance between Grand Valley and Vail. Garfield County Un-dersheriff Robert Hart

said a Secret Service agent did telephone Sheriff Ed Hogue to learn details of the discovery. Secret Service spokesmen in Vail and Denver refused comment. Hogue was not

The war in Soweto began Monday evening when militant supporters of the work boycott set upon a group of Zulus who had been to work in Johannesburg in defiance of the strike

called to protest the white gover-ment's racial policies.

The Zulus reportedly killed seven of the other blacks, and the next day a crowd burned a Zulu hostel. A mob of about 1,500 Zulus ran wild through the big black township south of Johan-nesburg, burning, raping and killing. Retaliatory attacks followed quickly, and the warfare spread across much of Soweto's 26 square miles.

The war cry of "Usuthu!" — "A united Zulu nation!" — rang through the streets as terrified women ran to police stations screaming, "The Zulus are coming! The Zulus are coming!"
Students fled from their schools as mobs attacked with knives and clubs.

A police officer said trucks carried "troops of Zulus" to districts of the township where their fellow tribesmen were hardest pressed,

raising the suspicion that the government was using them against its militant foes.

Police spokesmen repeatedly denied press reports indicating that the police were siding with the Zulus. The Johannesburg Star said its reporters, residents of Soweto, and members of a Zulu cultural movement called Inkatha "are all adamant that the police did not take vigorous action against the Zulu workers in the early stages of the

A police spokesman said the paper's report was "an infamous lie."

The killing raised the confirmed death toll in racial violence in South death toll in racial violence in South Africa to 283 since rioting against the government's apartheid policy of racial separation first erupted in Soweto in mid-June and then spread to most of the segregated townships in which nearly all the black workers in South African cities have to live.



## Conferees eliminate energy tax savings

The massive tax-revision bill now being considered by a Senate-House con-ference committee will not include a \$500 million package of energy con-servation tax breaks.

Committee agreed Thursday to drop the package from the bill and to reintroduce its energysaving provisions in a

separate energy bill.

The committee also voted to boost the 4-centa-gallon federal tax on gasoline by one-half cent for three years, saying it would offset the money the Treasury would lose if the energy conservation package is revived.

But the chances for passage of the energy bill particularly one raising the gasoline tax — before Congress adjourns for the fall elections appear slim. Earlier this month the Senate voted three-to-one against an attempt to raise the gas levy by a penny.

Both the House and

Senate have approved the essence of the energy conservation measures,

Several senators and committee aides said they expected the energy bill to die, and that it was just an elaborate way for the Senate to back down on the provision

The conservation program would allow a partial reimbursement for the cost of buying and





## Pilot program aims at putting deaf children in hearing world

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. (AP) - Joey Thompson beams as he pushes pegs nto a child's game. He may not be able to hear the other children around tim, but he is learning more because

of them.

Joey, 5, is one of 13 profoundly deaf children enrolled in a pilot, six-week preschool program at the South Dakota School for the Deaf. For the first time, children with normal hearing are mixed into the group.

From their play, puttering in the clay or piling blocks, the children all appear the same.

But the normal children act as models, both for the deaf children and for the deaf children's parents who

for the deaf children's parents who spend time in the classroom.

By comparing the deaf child of 5 to

"Subtle differences show up in the lack of being able to describe something, or concepts," said John Hudson, school superintendent.

"They know what a ball is — they can throw it — but they may not be able to name it. Therefore they won't be able to use it in conveying thoughts."

When a normal child reaches school age, he has a speaking vocabulary of 4,000 words, and recognizes perhaps 20,000 others. The average deaf child

# Calculators becoming school 'musts

The Associated Press Millions of parents spokesman said. getting ready to outfit the kids for fall are finding calculators right next to the crayons in the backto-school section. Sales of the electronic devices are soaring as prices con-

tinue to drop. R.H. Bruskin Associates, a market research firm, said a nationwide sampling of almost 2,600 persons showed more than 43 per cent of all American homes have a pocket-type calculator. That's the same percentage of homes that have a dog, according to the Bruskin

Bruskin also said ownership is greatest in upper income groups. Over 70 per cent of homes with incomes of \$20,000 and up own a calculator.

Retailers have started marketing the calculators as a back-toschool item. They are one of the few products that have decreased, rather than increased, in price.

"We may try low-end calculators," said one retailer quoted by Supermarket News, a trade publication. "We've been watching those companies that have had them and we think they might work for a back-to-school push if we can promote them for

\$8 to \$10." One manufacturer is pushing a new model that can handle fractions. Another advertises: "What has big green numbers, little rubber feet and follows you to school?" The answer: a

slide-rule calculator. Specific figures on calculator sales are difficult to come by. There is no separate association representing manufacturers and individual companies are reluctant to provide sales

The Electronic Ind u s t r i e s Association, quoting trade sources, says, however, that sales of all types of electronic calculators — hand-held and desk-top went from an estimated 2 million units in 1972 to 25

million units in 1975. Prices, meanwhile, dropped steadily. Electronic calculators first became a popular consumer item in 1971, according to the association. The price per unit was \$200 and up.

"They're almost disposable," said a spokesman for the Electronics Industries Association, explaining that if one of the minimum-priced calculators breaks after a few months, the con-sumer may find it hard to get it repaired. "Who's going to pay postage to send it back to Hong Kong?" he asked.

## Negotiators discuss proposals for television debate series

WASHINGTON (AP) -Negotiators for President Ford and Jimmy Carter are taking proposals for a series of televised debates back to the presidential candidates, with prospects likely for an initial debate n mid-September.

Representatives for both camps reported substantial progress toward arrangements for the debates after a 31/2-hour meeting Thursday with officials of the League of Women Voters, which has offered to sponsor the sessions. However neither side would discuss specifics.

The group was to meet again next Wednesday to iron out details.

All involved agreed that there definitely would be presidential campaign debates - the first since the 1960 meetings between John F.

and that the first debate would be sometime next month.

Ford has been pushing for a first debate shortly after Labor Day while Carter has favored holding it Sept. 28, as originally proposed by the league. With both sides talking of

movement toward a settlement, it seemed likely that the initial debate would be scheduled sometime between the days proposed by each candidate.

Dole flew to Colorado after an ap-pearance at the Iowa State Fair in Des Moines in which he charged that Carter's promise to end embargoes on foreign grain sales "once and for all" was unrealistic and out of step with

the Democratic platform. Dole also accused Carter of taking inconsistent stands on the issue.

Carter, during his own appearance at the fair Wednesday, said, "Under my administration, if I'm elected, there will never be another embargo that singles out farm products."

But in a subsequent interview with the Des Moines Register, he said about embargoes: "It would have to be an extreme case. If we don't have adequate grain stocks to meet our basic needs, this would have to be mandatory."







# Little being done to correct drop in school scores

Little is being done at either the national or state level to determine the cause or extent of declining student achievement and rising grade inflation in the nation's schools and colleges, as outlined by a Los Angeles Times investigation.

Most noticeably lacking is government-sponsored research into these two phenomena even though there has been growing evidence of its

existence for years.

Moreover, many school officials still refuse to acknowledge the decline exists (even though what research has been done has provided growing evidence of its existence). Others are attempting to minimize its importance. The relative few who concede, however reluctantly, that there is a decline channel the blame for it everywhere but within the walls of the everywhere but within the walls of the nation's high schools and colleges.

And although grade inflation is obvious throughout education, there has been virtually no official recognition of its existence in American high

GRADE INFLATION is widely acknowledged in the country's col-leges and universities. But at the na-tional and most state levels, such acknowledgement has led to little ac-

Here and there across the country, plans are being made or action has been taken to reinstate academic re-quirements which — in a rush toward

relevancy and appeal to students —
were dropped during the last 10 years.
And at some colleges and universities, steps are being taken to
establish or expand remedial instruc-

By no means, however, do these actions indicate the emergence of a na-

This undoubtedly is due in part to the fact that the scope of the decline and its pervasiness across most grade levels and all regions of the nation only recently became known as the result of efforts mostly outside the educational establishment

But it appears to have been equally due to the fact that state and national education leaders in general have made little or no effort to see the isolated instances of declining test scores readily available to them as

At the extreme, there are even some who argue that it is not really important that the abilities of American youth to read, write and do mathematics are declining. Such skills, they contend, are not needed nearly as much any more in a technological society that is coming to nd more and more on the visual

Powerful national and educational organizations, furthermore, have chosen not to assume a leadership role in a search for the causes of the decline. Instead, such groups as the National Education Assn. (NEA), and the American Assn. of School Administrators (AASA) have tended to either avoid or downplay the issue. Or they have taken the upbeat tack of sidestepping the decline by stressing current accomplishments of the ducational system.

At a recent national AASA meeting, for example, the focus was on the increasing achievement scores of the first three grades. Little mention was made of the decline in virtually every other grade above the primary level.

And an official of the NEA, the nation's largest teacher organization, dismissed declining achievement scores as insignificant.

"TESTS AREN'T that important and (their results) shouldn't be viewed with that kind of concern," he said.

Apparently, there are educators who don't think the test results should

be viewed at all.

"We have been criticized by some for releasing this information" about declining Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores, said Dr. Sidney P. Marland Jr., president of the College Entrance Examination, Board

#### Last of a series

(CEEB), which administers the SAT.
"Mindful of the discomfort and even the angry debate that the information has generated, we feel cer-tain that to have withheld this information, and sat upon it with a 'what the public doesn't know can't hurt them' attitude, would have been an act of extreme irresponsibility,

On the national level, the prevailing attitude about the decline appears much the same as that reflected by the various educational organizations. And, too, there is an attempt to stress the positive and to attribute the negative to a variety of factors outside the schools.

Among those most visibly associated with this attitude is Harold Hodgkinson, director of the National Institute of Education (NIE), which is the educational research arm of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Reports of the decline in student achievement, he said in an interview, have "been presented as if the schools are going to hell in a hand basket (and that) they can't do anything right (and that) students aren't learning

anything.
"I think it's just not a fair criticism.

"That's not to say for a minute that there are not areas (for) im-provement in the schools. But certainly if you compare them to almost any other educational system in the Western world and consider the magnitude of the job that they're asked to do and the fact that the American family has gone through some enormous changes and that we can't rely on parents to prepare students for schools in terms of values and attitudes, the schools have done, I think, an incredibly good job."

All in all, added Hodgkinson, "there's been a real problem I think in public misunderstanding of the fact that in a number of dimensions the schools are doing much better than they did."

While he recognizes that college entrance examination scores are down, Hodgkinson doesn't concede that it shows students are doing worse in school. Rather, he said, in many subject areas "they are doing bet-

RESULTS OF the The Times investigation show that the achievement levels of both high school and college students have dropped sharply over the last 10 years in such areas as English, mathematics, history and literature. This is reflected in a variety of national and state achievement test

As to the decline in the scores on entrance examinations - such as the

Scholastic Aptitude Test and the American College Test — Hodgkinson said: "I think people are looking for a simpleminded answer to a very com-

What might produce answers would be research into the causes. At the neither, according to institute of-ficials, although NIE did hold a con-ference last year to discuss the mat-

research and evaluation ought to be very heavily investing in much better information about achievement and knowledge and learning...

For example, although evidence gathered in The Times investigation shows that massive curriculum shifts

away from basic academic subjects are largely responsible for the decline, other factors such as television, changes in family structure and the impact of vocational education could have a bearing. Very little if any research has been done in these areas. CEEB has appointed a blue-ribbon panel to, as CEEB puts it, "assess various ex-planations that have been offered for the...decline."

However, no significant independent research into the causes or extent of the decline is expected from this group, which is slated to make its first report after the first of the year.

THERE ARE INDICATIONS that some school districts and colleges and universities are beginning to recognize the achievement decline for what it is and are doing something

The Bay Area Writing Project, a joint effort by the University of California at Berkeley and several San Francisco Bay Area school districts, for example, is attempting to combat the decline in student

Under the program, according to project codirector James Gray of UC programs for English teachers at various Bay Area schools.

Similar programs — involving both secondary and higher education — are being considered in other areas, including Los Angeles.

Within the last eight months, for example, the Los Angeles city school system — faced with glaring signs of worsening academic performance in high schools — has moved on several fronts.







### Budget vetoes (?)

of State Chambers of Commerce earlier this week released a progress report on congressional action on the federal budget for the fiscal year 1977.

The report, prepared by Eugene F. Rinta, director of research, concluded:

"Unless the President is successful in vetoing a number of unbudgeted appropriatioms (under consideration by Congress), they together with expected congressional inaction on the President's spending reduction proposals will bring 1977 outlays much closer to the target of \$413.3 billion Congress set for itself than to the Administration's \$400 billion estimate. In that event Congress will have chosen, as it did in its budget targets, to opt for bigger spending instead of greater tax reduction or a smaller deficit."

Copies of the report were distributed to members of Congress and to state and regional chambers, including the West Texas Chamber of Com-

Leading to the conclusions as stated, the council's study made these observations:

"In addition to the regular appropriation bills on which final

The Washington-based Council action is still pending, more spending measures have yet to come up for decision. As estimated by the staff of the Senate Budget Committee, the potential for further action by the Appropriations committees for 1977 is \$25 billion in appropriations and an estimated \$15.1 billion in 1977 outlays.

> "This potential includes some budgeted items but also several proposals opposed by the President which, if enacted, would cause outlays to greatly exceed the Administration's current estimates of \$400 billion. They include \$4 billion appropriations to fund the public works-jobs legislation which was enacted over the President's veto, another \$4 billion for public service jobs not requested by the President, and some lesser proposals.'

Congress, unfortunately, has given little if any indication of complying with the President's wishes in this regard.

It appears, therefore, as stated in the report, that the only liklihood of the President obtaining important economies he still seeks for 1977 will be successful vetoes of spending measures which exceed his recommendations.

The AAA recommends that parents help children learn safe walking rules, walking with them the first few days of school. Or if busing is in order, walk with them to the bus stop.



### Washington discovers the Dark Continent

KINSHASA, Zaire - Africa, both black and mixed, is excited about a new emerging U.S. role in its future. The character of this excitement varies from nation to nation; and it is in considerable degree determined by admiration of or antipathy toward Secretary of State Henry Kissinger. With the Republican convention

over in America and Jimrny Carter leading the presidential race. Africans realize that Kissinger is a lame duck or as one diplomat has said, a "dead duck." He will not be reappointed as chief of foreign policy regardless of who wins

However, what Kissinger has done will have a strong bearing on future U.S. policy - and on the future of Africa itself. This Kissinger stamp on policy concerns several aspects of Africa's future and its problems: 1. Aspirations of blacks. The

American secretary's wa rning to both Rhodesia and South Africa that white minority governments must go is a new dimension in U.S. insterest in the continent of the Third World.

2. Arms aid. His agree ment to build up the military potential of this underdeveloped country pl us Kenya and Ethiopia has won the United States admiration among some black nations and sent others; like Uganda and Somalia running to the Russians for matching weapons.

3. Food. His mixed reaction to the need for food in some horribly undernourished nations has won America praise and brought it condemnation.

Food resolution in Congress is a

negative case in point.

The view of America — and Kissinger — held by African nations is a visible measure of the complexity of any Western country's problems in dealing with a continent where the contrasts between potential prosperity and living agony are so great and so frequently seen.

The Angola situation in which Russia and Cuba rushed in to seize the government under the guise of a "war of liberation" while the United States gives Africans pause on American aims. However, the words of nearby Zambia's President Kenneth Kaunda

are worth weighing:
"Secretary Kissinger seems to be having difficulty selling his ideas to Congress and the public (on full independence of predominantly black African nations). That is sad. But, we are not discouraged. What I would like the Americans to know is that no matter what happens, independence is coming to these countries — Rhodesia, Namibia (South-West Africa) and South Africa. And, it is in the best interests of the American people that they should make friends with the majority of the people, not the minorities ... They (the Americans) should have understood better than anybody else the real meaning of minority rule.'

Kissinger, of course, has warned Premier Ian Smith of the isolated minority white Rhodesian ruling body that black majority control must come to that nation.

He has warned South African Prime Minister John Vorster that black His opposition to a global Right to segregation must pass in that nation.

He has won applause in Kenya, in Zaire, in Ethiopia, even in Tanzania. He has won more quiet admiration in other black nations. And, he has told American doubters, "The moral imperative behind our African policy (recognizing black aspirations) is reinforced by practical considerations.

'An independent and thriving Africa is essential not only to America's national interest and moral purpose but to global stability and progress as well.

As the architect of U.S. policy in what is frequently a strategic and diplomatic no-man's-land, Kissinger has gotten in trouble when he has talked loftily of "negotiated set-tlements of African problems by Africans without foreign intervention" but in the same breath has promised arms to Zaire, Kenya and Ethiopia totaling \$325 million.

There is, however, the fear of getting into an arms race with the Russians. Congress already has served notice it will take a hard look at the deals Kissinger and Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld welded in whirlwind June tours of important African capitals.

On the matter of food, the United States is doing a big job, both in government and private self-help projects.

But, President Ford and Kissinger have been denounced for failing to embrace a resolution asking that 1 per cent of the nation's gross national product be dedicated to what an organization called Bread for the World calls "the right to food." The administration insists America is doing more than its part already.

### John Dean, the thriving 'Rolling Stone' journalist

WASHINGTON - It was startling to see John Wesley Dean III, the stony-faced stool pigeon, perched among newsmen at the Republican National Convention. He was observing and taking notes for an article he's doing for Rolling Stone, a leftist journal for rock music fans.

After all, by Dean's own admission, he utilized his legal and other skills to thwart and spy on demonstrators and dissidents at the last Republican convention, where his boss, Richard Nixon, was nominated. In effect, Dean transpired to keep

the kind of people who read Rolling Stone out of that 1972 convention. Now, in 1976, he was inside the GOP convention to tell his Rolling Stone readers how it went for President Ford. Somehow, all this describes the ex-

ploitative mentality of our time and is argument that the Almighty Buck, not sinister outside forces, remains the authentic threat to the republic. "I need the money," Dean told me,

as he peered through a long-lensed camera at the noisy convention crowd. "That's why I write. I'm taking many notes, talking to delegates and will do a long, long piece. So John Dean is a journalist, though

it is also possible he has the distinction of being the only person in the land with three Roman numerals after his name who did time in a federal prison. He did only four months, and it was

in an easy lockup. Since being released early 19 months ago, Dean has earned an estimated \$500,000 from lectures, a forthcoming book and articles about his deep involvement in Watergate skullduggery, and how he turned informer by way of "saving my ass," as he once put it. His book, "Blind Ambition," could

earn him \$300,000 and more. His lecture fees were in the \$3,500 range. Rolling Stone won't disclose what his fee is for the convention article and another on the campaign. Sen. Barry Goldwater once told me

he couldn't understand why "that little bastard Dean" had to take \$4,000 out of the White House safe "because he always has had plenty of money.' The senator knows Dean through Barry Jr., who was his classmate at Staunton Military Academy, an intimate neighbor in Alexandria, Va., and best man at Dean's second wedding ceremony. At last week's convention, Dean

told me that he sees writing as his future career, that 13 months' work on his book toned him up for the magazine assignment, and that delegates he talked with were "most cordial." According to some delegates quoted in a Kansas City Times story. Dean was about as welcome as poison ivy at a nudist

"I handled those duties in Miami on orders from my superiors," Dean told me, and in a moment was apologetic for not granting a full-blown interview. "I'm on orders from my publisher not to give interviews," he explained with a straight face. Well, he has given interviews to sympathetic writers, and will undoubtedly continue to do so.

(R-Conn.), for \$1:35,000. Dean had to move to a lowly \$110,000 home in Beverly Hills, where Mo is seen driving a white Mercedes convertible. Dean gets

around in a Datsun. He professes admiration and sympathy for Nixon (though the crocodile tears don't show), while allowing that he could "easily understand" how Nixon might have taken to drink or talked to the portraits of Presidents during the final days of Watergate.

One of Dean's most ardent critics is Dick Tuck, who made his reputation as the funnyman who disrupted Nixon campaigns. Tuck claims Dean, "an ex-Creep," is in cahoots with Jimmy Carter's campaign thorugh a deal with Rolling Stone's associate publisher, Anne Wexler, a Carter backer. Editor Jann Wenner protests that Tuck's repeated charges are "lies," and that Dean was signed on to write about but not foul, the Republican campaign.

Dean just shakes his head over the furore, claims Tuck is friendly to him and told me: "I am a political independent. I haven't decided yet whether or not to vote for Carter.'





## New laser gun may give war games meaning

FT. MONROE, Va. — Hoping to add a touch of battlefield realism to its peacetime training exercises, the Army is developing a complex laser beam system that permits two forces to shoot at and register hits on each other without hurting anyone.

When the system goes into operation sometime in 1980, it will for the first time advance score-keeping in war games significantly beyond the level of children shouting "bang, bang, you're dead."

But according to the Army's Training and Doctrine Command here, the significance goes far beyond determining whether the "red" or "blue" force was the winner of a mock battle.

"The individual soldier who becomes a 'casualty' finds out the mistake he made and determines not to

finds out the mistake he made and determines not to do the same thing again," Lt. Col. James J. McDevitt

In more traditional exercises, he added, junior of-ficers and enlisted men all find it difficult to get

serious because mock combat just is not realistic.

When fully developed, the system will use laser beams to simulate fire from rifles, machine guns,

tanks, anti-tank rockets, artillery and close-support aircraft. Men and equipment will carry sensors that will record "hits" from the beam.

The lasers will be coded so that the beam from a rifle will not affect a tank but the beam from an antitank rocket will knock the vehicle out of the competition.

According to training command officials, a laser-aided war game will start with two equally matched forces, probably with armor, artillery and air sup-port on each side.

Infantrymen will wear laser sensors on their chests, backs and helmets. Tanks and other vehicles will have sensors placed on vulnerable areas.

When a rifleman spots an opponent and fires at him, a "hit" will produce some sort of signal that will put the "casualty" out of the action. A "near miss" will set off a buzzer that will give the target the same sort of warning that a bullet whistling past his ear would provide in combat. would provide in combat.

Tanks, trucks and other large targets will be rigged with smoke pots, and a hit will set off the smoke, ndicating the vehicle is out of the game and adding a touch of realism.

'Soldiers turn on to this because it is fun McDevitt said. The game produces a winner and a loser. It counts on the competitive instinct of the players to maintain

interest and overcome the boredom of training. More important from the Army's standpoint, the system produces an incentive for learning military skills in peacetime when the likelihood of actual combat seems remote. Some Army historians believe that the losses the United States suffered in the early days of World War II and the Korean war were due, in part to the inability of reldiers to the inability of rel

in part, to the inability of soldiers to get serious about training until after the shooting had started.

On the second floor of a World War II-style barracks building at Ft. Eustis, just north of here, Charlie Harris and his associates proudly

demonstrate the prototype of the laser rifle.

Mounted on a "demilitarized" — in this case a euphemism for worn out — body of an M-16 rifle, the laser looks like a small black cube, about three inches to a side.

At the other end of the room, feet away but scaled small to look like the silhouette of a man 300 meters distant, is the target.

Squeezing the trigger produces a faintly audible click. If the shot is a good one, the target drops, then reappears.

Col. C.J. Shay, the cigar-smoking chief of staff of the Army Training Support Center, compares the

system to the electric-eye shooting games in penny Shay says he would like to put a laser rifle in every mess hall. A soldier would have to knock down a target before he could grab a tray and join the chow

The present generation of laser rifles was developed recently in an Army "toy shop" where Harris and others work at turning out training aids.

In addition to the rifles, the "toy shop" has pro-

duced monopoly-type war games to be played by men ranging from battalion commanders to tank drivers. Harris said the lasers cost about \$100 each but if

used to replace even a small percentage of the present "live firing" target practice, they could soon save far more than their cost — in ammunition alone. Harris said the 45-volt battery used for the laser can power about 250,000 shots. The battery costs about \$2.50. At 7 1-2 cents a cartridge, that many shots using real bullets would cost \$18,750.

Shay says a laser range could save an even scarcer commodity than bullets: land.

"With the encroachment (of civilian population) at all military installations, we've got to look for other ways to train soldiers," Shay said. There just isn't

enough room any more to have men shooting live bullets at targets in crowded urban areas.

Shay said the army will continue to need large installations where trainees occasionally can get the feel of using live bullets. But much of the training can be done on the laser range, he said. The laser system should be especially effective for Reserve and National Guard units. and National Guard units.

A laser shot has no recoil and makes almost no noise. Army officials concede that a soldier trained exclusive on a laser might be thrown off by the "kick" of a real rifle. However they note that the light caliber M-16 has much less recoil than the M-1 used in World War II and Korea.

Lt. col. Phil Davis, a Marine Corps training officer, said the Marines are also evaluating the laser rifle. He said it may be used for marksmanship training. But he said the Marines have no plans at present to use the full battlefield simulation system.

use the full battlefield simulation system.

Both Davis and Shay emphasized that the lasers used in the new equipment will not damage eyes or other parts of the body. Eye-safe lasers have been available for about five years, Shay said.

As a concentrated beam of light, a laser can produce enough energy to cut through steel plate. But the fire simulators are not nearly that strong.

While awaiting development of the full scale combat simulator, the Army and Marines are using an intermediate stage system which trainers say is far more realistic than previous methods.

Called SCOPES, an acronym for Squad Combat Operations Exercise Simulation, the system consists of putting numbers on all of the players. If a rifleman can spot the number of an opponent in his gun sight, he calls it out. The umpire then assesses a casualty.

After one full-scale scopes exercise in Europe

After one full-scale scopes exercise in Europe earlier this year, participants said they found the training far more useful than earlier methods.







# Garbage food being created

Not unlike the alchemists who tried to coax gold out of lead, con-temporary scientists attempting to make food from garbage have met

However, as more and more effluent-based foodstuffs flow from laboratories around the country, it is becoming clear that one problem—the "garbage explosion"—may be part of the solution of another—food shorteness. shortages.

Fish and shellfish are being raised on coal-slurry waste water from power plants, prime rib and chicken are being produced from feed com-posed partly of sewage, and crops are being grown in fields irrigated with sanitized water flushed from toilets. Bread has been fortified with proteinrich whey, heretofore a wasted by-product of cheese making, and cookies have been made with flour that is more than 90 per cent protein and made of chicken feathers.

Enjoy! At the University of Georgia, these "chicken feather cookies" have been taste-tested by a panel of 15 people, only one of whom thought he could tell them from regular cookies.

Ten per cent of the flour in the cookies has been replaced by a feather distillate that is mostly pure protein.

Dr. A. L. Shewfelt, head of the university's food science department, believes that, if "masking agents" such as raisins and nuts were included in the cookies, the feather powder could replace even more than 10 per cent of the flour.

Like wheat flour, feather powder is not a complete protein; it is short on lysine, one of the eight amino acids the body can't make itself. Experiments indicate that the lysine content may be increased by applying heat to the feather powder, Shewfelt said, although more research is needed to determine the amount of heat required.

In another sector of the scientific front, manure is being used as a basis of feed for cattle and other livestock. This program frees grain for human consumption, lowers feeding costs

and makes use of a product that now simply accumulates in feedlots as smelly, polluting and often diseasepromoting waste.

So prepare for beef without a side order of guilt. All you must do is recognize that a steak from a manure-fed steer is just as tasty and nutritious as one that traces its origins to grain.

When Dr. David Seckler, a Colorado cattleman, first advanced the idea more than 20 years ago, many of his fellow cowpokes thought feeding cattle with their own manure was

pretty funny.

Through several years of frustration and gales of laughter,
Seckler tried to develop the proper process for turning manure into gold.

In 1973 Bill Gaynor, an associate, developed a machine that separates the manure into a roughage feed and a protein supplement (plus fertilizer and a fuel as by-products). That year, as many other cattle raisers were forced out of business by rising prices, Seckler's Ceres Ecology Corp. put its first herds on manure-based feed. The laughter began to subside. Today, with 10,000 head deriving 15

to 20 per cent of their diet from waste, Seckler's idea is making him rich. Other cattle feeders are rushing to catch up with this iconoclastic dreamer whose "residue to riches" story now includes a plant in France, with others planned in California and Mexico.

Ceres Ecology Corp. can market the beef as long as it meets Food and Drug Administration purity standards, which it does, and as long as the product tastes like any other beef. What cattle eat - grain, manure or a combination - affects the taste little.

Seckler described the unique process in an essay he entitled, with only a trace of the mockery he endured for so many years: "A modest proposal for feeding the world's poor, reducing the U.S. balance of payments deficits, eliminating the largest source of solid waste pollution and lowering domestic prices of

The title reflects what would happen, Seckler believes, if all or most of the tons of wastes produced each year by farm animals were subjected to the "Cereco Process."

## National study includes Travis

Travis Elementary School will be one of 326 students and instructional practices of school per-schools throughout the country to participate this sonnel. year in a nationwide study of compensatory edcua-

The purpose of the survey, made of schools receiving direct or indirect federal aid for compensatory education, is designed to find which kind of compensatory education is most effective in improving children's reading and mathematics skills, Jack Hightower said.

Students in grades one through six will be given achievement tests in reading and mathematics, a test of practical achievement and a measure of at-titudes toward reading and mathematics in the fall and spring of this school year.

Results will be reported by number to the cor-poration conducting the survey so that both the schools' and the participants' names will be con-fidential. Hightower said he will be the only one who will be able to match numbers to names.

Also to be collected during the survey are data on the amount and kinds of instruction received by

Hightower said the study will last four years but a decreasing number of schools will be used each year.

The study is sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education and is being conducted by the System Development Corporation of Santa Monica, Calif.

Beyond the value of the survey itself, Hightower said the test results will provide a valuable set of permanent data on each student and might be used in determining which instructional areas need concentrated attention.

Dr. F. William Sunderman Jr., who headed a research team at the University of Connecticut, suggested the highly toxic gas as a possible cause when he reported finding poten-tially fatal levels of nickel in tissue samples taken from five victims of the disease.

Dr. Lewis Polk, acting city health commissioner, Thursday called it an "interesting theory," but only a "longshot possibility at best." "If it was nickel car-

bonyl gas in the air as the Connecticut study postulates, they why didn't all the thousands of other persons in the city at that time get sick?" asked Dr. Polk. "They all breathed the same air." In Atlanta, a

spokesman for the federal Center for Disease Control called the Connecticut findings "inconclusive."

Tests similar to those done by Sunderman were conducted by researchers at the center, said Don Berreth. Some tissue samples showed higher than normal levels of nickel, he said, but others did not.

Meanwhile, two per-sons who died after attending the International **Eucharistic Congress at** Philadelphia have been added to the list of disease victims.





# Hymnal spawns hot controversy

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Pentagon admits that including a con-troversial modern hymn in an armed services hymnal was a mistake, but it does not intend to tear the verse out of the half-million books in print.

The Pentagon also said Thursday that it would not immediately order a new edition of the hymnal, which has cost more than \$1 million to print since it was first published in late

Some congressmen and church groups have charged the hymn, a Good Friday verse called "It Was on a Friday Morning," is blasphemous. Protests began to trickle in last November and reached a crescendo recently.

The words in the hymn, written by Sydney Carter, are uttered by one of the thieves crucified alongside Jesus Christ. The objections center on a line that reads: "It's God they ought to crucify instead of you and me."

The latest objection came Thursday from the Women's Christian Temperance Union, which sent President Ford a telegram demanding that the offending hymn be stricken from the armed forces Book of Worship.

Several weeks ago the Veterans Ad-ninistration Chief of Chaplains James Rogers ordered the hymn torn out of the VA's 15,000 copies of the 815page hymnal.

A Pentagon spokesman said that, "it is clear that including the hymn ... was a mistake," but he said no order would be given to excise the hymn.

However, he added that, "we are conducting a search for a replacement hymn to appear in subsequent versions of the hymnal."

That could be a long way off. Prior to 1974, the hymnal had not been revised in more than a decade. The hymn also has its defenders. Officials of the United Church of

Christ and the American Baptist Churches have protested Chaplain Rogers' decision to tear the hymn from the VA's books. The Pentagon spokesman said the

hymn "was not included to be blasphemous or to destroy faith, but to provide the vehicle for dealing deeply and thoughtfully with the death of Christ in order to encourage

and strengthen faith in God."

The Pentagon said the hymnal was the product of "four years of labor by many chaplains and respected civilian churchmen."



NEW YORK (AP) — The sweltering summer has taken the bloom off the optimistic spring talk that this city would have its first subway series since 19:36.

The New York Yankees, moving to the top of the American League East like a northbound express train, could be in the 1976 baseball World Series. 13ut the New York Mets, derailed deep in third place in

the National League East, won't be.

The last time the Mets were in first place was on May 8, while the Yankees have been at the top of their division every day since May 4, leaving first place just seven days the entire season.

Everybody loves a winner, so the for the first time since 1963, the Yankees will outdraw the Mets. The Yankees, playing their first season in rebuilt Yankee Stadium, have drawn 1,740,072 in their first 62 home dates, while the Mets have attracted 1,172,966 for their first 55 home dates.

The Yankees' currrent success on the field has spilled over to the ledger books, which are expected to show a profit for the first time since 1964. The Mets, who refuse to divulge financial figuress, are said to have turned a healthy profit in the 1970s.

Criticism of the Mets has been intense, espe cially because the Yankees are doing so well. Praise of the Yankees has been prolific, especially because the Mets are not doing very well.

The major charges against the Mets are that they do not spend their money to buy talent and M. Donald Grant, the Wall Street executive who makes the decisions at the top of the Met hierarchy, is not a o born-andbred baseball man. On the other hand, the Yankees have been suc-

cessful with their open checkbook policy, whi le their owner leaves the wheeling and dealing to Gabe Paul, a baseball man for half a century.

The Yankees landed Catfish Hunter, baseball's

first highpriced free agent, with a fiveyear contract valued at more than \$3 million. They went a fter free agent pitcher Andy Messersmith, losing him in = hassles over contract language. The Yankees bought Vida Blue from Oakland owner Charles O. Finley for \$1.5 million before Commissioner Bowie Kuhn nullified the sale.

The Mets didn't land Hunter, although Grant, O chairman of the board of directors, maint ains their offer was better financially for Hunter than the Yasnkees'. They didn't go after Me ssersmith because, after having traded for Mickey Lolich, they said they didn't feel they needed any more help at that position. They couldn't buy Blue or Finley's other sale items, Rollie Fingers and Joe Rudi, because the interleague trading deadline had passed.

"We have tried to acquire players for money, said Mets General Manager Joe McDcnald, wh bought home run star Dave Kingman from San Francisco and offered players and \$300,000 for prize 0 young infielder Jerry Royster, but was tur ned down.

"From time to time we've made offers: of money but the response of most of the clubs is 'I can't play money," McDonald said. Paul, president of the Yankees, is the builder behind the club's recent success, but he's the first

one to admit that he couldn't do it without his benefactor, Yankee owner George Steinb renner.
"Money is most important," said Paul, who will nail down his first pennant ever if the Yankees don't fold up entirely in the stretch.
