## Seriousness of Kennedy conspiracy undetermined

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) or merely "idle, drunken talk,

Three persons charged with conspiring to kill the Massachusetts Democrat faced arraignment in court

David J. King, 31, of Springfield, told The Associated Press he was offered \$30,000 to help kill Kennedy while he campaigned here during the weekend for renomination in the Massachusetts Democratic primary on Tuesday

King and Sandra R. Rondeau, 37, of Westfield, were released on personal recognizance after being booked mind, police said.

Robert E. White, 42, listed as a resident of the Salvation Army's Rehabilitation Center here, was jailed in lieu of \$50,000 bail.

Policemen said Sunday that there was a possibility the whole affair was a hoax. One officer, who asked not to be identified, said it might have been "idle, drunken talk.

King, in an interview, said he met White on Aug. 8 at the Salvation Army Center and two days later was offered a chance to make "big money."

He quoted White as saying: "You Investigators today tried to determine whether an alleged plot to kill

Saturday by a district court clerk. can make \$30,000 altogether. All you have to do is kill U.S. Sen. Ken-Sen. Edward M. Kennedy was serious at \$50,000 each, but later changed his nedy... You get \$5,000 down and after the job you get \$25,000."

Kennedy appeared Saturday at a fund-raising breakfast at the Oaks Inn. Mrs. Rondeau worked there as a waitress for six months until she quit about a week ago, according to a hotel spokeswoman.

King said Mrs. Rondeau "was supposed to serve breakfast, and Mr. White was supposed to walk in right behind her. He was going to shoot Kennedy while he had breakfast,'

## Croatian hijackers 'proud' of actions

NEW YORK (AP) - The Manhattan district attorney moved formally today to bring murder charges against five Croatian nationalists whose bomb killed a police officer on the ground here while they were hijacking a passenger plane across the Atlantic

The accused hijackers, who apparently carried out their 30- hour capture of a Trans World Airlines 727 jetliner without actually being armed. were brought to the federal courthouse in Brooklyn by the FBI this

As they awaited arraignment on federal air piracy charges, an assistant from Dist. Atty. Robert Morgenthau's office filed a complaint with the U.S. marshal asking that the prisoners be turned over to local authorities to be arraigned for murder of the police officer, a capital offense

The hijackers, who demanded and won wide publicity for their cause of Croatian separation from Yugoslavia, surrendered in Paris on Sunday and were returned to New York. They had taken over the plane by threatening to blow it up with what they said were "explosives" wired to their bodies but which turned out to be modeling clay.

The prisoners, four men and a woman, were taken into custody by the FBI at Kennedy Airport and held overnight for arraignment today in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn on air piracy charges.

The offense carries a minimum 20year prison sentence, but if a death results from the piracy, life imprisonment can be imposed.

Paris police said that just before they gave up, the hijackers learned that a policeman was killed and three others injured in New York City while trying to dismantle a bomb they had planted in Grand Central Station in mid-Manhattan.

The leader of the hijackers said they were "proud" of what they had done.

French authorities said they had told the hijackers they would be executed if any passengers were harmed. They said they gave them a choice of being sent either to the United States or Yugoslavia.

All 53 passengers still held hostage on the hijacked plane were released unharmed, and most of them also flew back to the United States on Sunday.

Thirty-five passengers had been released when the plane landed in Gander, Newfoundland, early Saturday, the second stop in the hijacking escapade.

The hijackers were identified by the FBI as Zvonko Busic, 30, his wife, Julienne, 27, and Petar Matovic, 31, all of New York City: Frane Pesut. 25. of Fairview, N.J.; and Mark Vlasic, 29, Stamford, Conn. The four men were born in Yugoslavia and Mrs. Busic is a native of Eugene, Ore.

Dist. Atty. Mario Merola of the Bronx said he would seek first-degree murder indictments against them from a grand jury in the policeman's death. The slaying of a police officer in the line of duty is a capital offense in New York State.

The hijacking, which spanned four nations, was the first in the United States since April 1975, and the first successful one since November 1972. Chicago flight had taken off.

## Viking 2 failure preventing tests

mechanical arm of the Viking 2 lander is stuck between the openings of two small laboratories, preventing, at least temporarily, the beginning of experiments to determine whether organic matter is present at the Martian landing site.

Viking project manager Jim Martin said early today that the scoop on the end of the arm had successfully picked up a sample of soil and delivered part of it to the area inside periements were to be conducted.

But as the arm moved to another area where the rest of its load was to be deposited for X-ray tests the scoop failed to rotate, stopping dead in its

tracks. The first indication of trouble came when the collecting head of the arm failed to appear in a photograph Viking had taken to show scientists that the apparatus was moving in its correct sequence. Another photo showed that Viking had completed a

foot-long trench and had a soil sample

The lander is programmed to halt the moving arm whenever something goes wrong. There was no way of knowing this morning what the malady could be, and Martin said it probably would take more than a day to be certain.

The next possible step will come during the next communications link around 1 a.m. (PDT) Tuesday when scientists will send the lander an order to let them know what went wrong, probably through more photographs, Martin said.

"This could foul up the whole sequence," Martin said after a twohour session in which he met with project scientists to try to determine what had gone wrong.

Viking had been scheduled to make another digging expedition today, taking in another clump of dirt for deposit.

## Look out for the hippies

I've been surprised to see little commentary about Democratic presidential candidate Jimmy Carter's admission last week that all three of his sons have been users of marijuana at one time or another.


Isn't this a strangely Aquarian revelation of campaigning one-upmanship when one candidate says More of my kids have smoked pot than my competitor's?"

And, when you think of bloc voting, isn't the "youth vote" one of the biggest potential blocs in the country? I say "potential" because—contrary to fears of the opponents of the 18-year-old vote—I don't see great evidences of youth movements at the polling places on a national level.

The student vote figured heavily in last year's referendum that heavily decriminalized possession of marijuana in small amounts in the City of Oxford, Ohio, where students outnumber "townies" some four to one. (Oddly enough, on the same ballot, they rejected legalization of on-premises beer consumption, so they still have to drive ten miles to a place called "The Rusty Nail" for

anything stronger than 3.2 been.)

And a college student who failed to campaign heavily on youth issues got into a runoff for a city commission post in San Angelo this spring.



But most of the young people I've encountered recently seem to be voting with their feet—that is, by walking away from the polls. They either doubt their vote can do any good or they don't think the system is worth trying to affect. Now, those seem harsh views, but ask the next three college-age people you meet (particularly if they are college-age and not in college) and see if they're supporting the views you hear at the Chamber of Commerce or church or PTA. Or pick up a copy of the hugely popular "Rolling Stone" magazine and see if its subject matter doesn't scorch your sensibilities as its

vocabulary sears your eyeballs.

We are in the midst of what I think is the most significant generation gap in the history of the nation: on the one side the traditional white Anglo-Saxon protestant middle class middle-agers

less influential church and the vanishing neighborhood school and the small-town social and economic and political values and—above all-the almighty status quo; and on the other side the antigovernment, an-tiwar, antimilitary, anti-big business, and anti-status quo young people who like hair, pot, noisy music, little or no clothes, and one another.

I haven't seen any scholarly sociological studies on the matter, but I'd say the anti-Vietnam war and propot views of the young people of today may be among the most powerful factors in determining national attitudes of the future. ("Tiger" Teague and Strom Thurmond can't stay in Washington forever, and I can envision a time when what some Costevans now when what some Oestexans now characterize as "long-haired hippie freaks" may dominate the Congress.)

When a sitting president and a would-be president are bound to discuss the dope-smoking proclivities of their children, a hippie congress doesn't seem all that unlikely.

And it certainly ought to move more thoughtful residents of the older side of the "gap" to reassess convictions that it "can't happen here."

## City budget consideration heads lengthy council agenda Tuesday

The Midland City Council will be in for a marathon session Tuesday, with an agenda reflecting 56 items.

Great Hall of the People in Peking today to

Consideration of the 1976-77 city budget, plus an ordinance setting the city's tax levy for the year, will lead off the meeting, set for 1:30 p.m. in council chambers at city hall.

The proposed budget totals \$15,876,387, with no increases in taxes expected. Expenditures in the general fund total \$10,484,081, with expenditures in the water fund totaling \$4,470,572 and expenditures in the airport fund totaling \$921,734. The budget reflects an increase of \$1,727,380 over that of last year.

Council Tuesday also will discuss proposals for two major regional shopping centers, one planned for the intersection of Midkiff Road and FM 868 and the other for U.S. 80 and Holiday Hill Road.

Developers of one proposed shopping center, the one to be located at the intersection of Midkiff Road and FM 868, are seeking an amendment to a planned district on 155.32 acres of land. The area is now owned by Paul Rochester, but developers Paul Broadhead and Associates of Meridian, Miss-and Mel Simon and Associates of Indeanapolis, Ind., want to replat it to construct a mall and buy the property.

Spokesmen for other proposed shopping center, the one to be at U.S. 80 and Holiday Hill Road, are seeking annexation of 100 acres of land to be developed by General Growth Properties Inc. of Des Moines, Iowa. With annexation of the land, the city would need to determine the proper zoning for the area.

Another annexation matter facing the council is one on a portion of the Magnatex Corp. property north of the city's Air Park. Owners of that property are seeking voluntary annexa-

Schools, parks, roads and telephones also will come under scrutiny of the council Tuesday. The group will consider possible adoption of proposed standards for school crossings, possible curfew and parking restrictions in the city parks, program alternates in connection with the Midland-Odessa Regional Mass Transportation Study, and staff action to intervene in Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.'s rate increase

City Manager James Brown said, if Tuesday's session runs too late, council may consider a recess until Wednesday morning. However, the group may opt for finishing all business late Tuesday evening. In any case, all items to be considered under public hearing will be studied by the group on Tuesday.

### Aerosal flourocarbon affecting ozone layer

WASHINGTON (AP) - The reports were designed to Fluoroearbons from aerosol spray cans have damaged the earth's protective ozone shield and will have to be selectively regulated or banned. the National Academy of Sciences said today.

But two academy panels which studied the problem said any ban or regulation of aerosol spray cans should be delayed one to two years until completion of further studies on the ultimate effects of the reduction in the protective shield of ozone in the atmosphere.

The panels said the reduction in ozone, which shields the earth from dangerous ultraviolet radiation, could lead to increases in skin cancer and potentially great changes in the earth's temperature and climate.

resolve the controversy over the relationship between fluorocarbons and the earth's ozone layer. The panels said there was insufficient evidence to state precisely the extent of damage to the ozone shield. Philip Handler, NAS president, said

in a letter to the White House,"that a one or two year delay in actual implemenation of a ban or regulation would not be unreasonable."

However, he recommended the government begin immediately to establish the regulatory machinery that will be necessary to either reduce the use of fluorocarbons or ban them completely. The reports said if fluorocarbons

continue to be released at 1973 levels, 'an ultimate reduction in ozone of about seven per cent" would result. Half of this loss would occur in about 50 years, the panels said.

The panels expressed particular concern about climate changes that might result from a slight reduction of the protective ozone shield. Temperatues could increase on earth. This, in turn, would affect rainfall and evaporation of moisture. "Such changes could lead initially to a general shift of the earth's climatic belts, and ultimately to a significant melting of polar ice and a worldwide increase in sea level," the reports Any weather changes pose par-

ticular problems for agriculture.



### Soweto boycotts resume

JOHANNESBURG. South Africa (AP) - Thousands of blacks in the Johannesburg area today began the second three-day work boycott in less than a month to protest the racial policies of South Africa's ruling white minority.

"Soweto looked like a graveyard this morning," one resident of the vast black ghetto eight miles south of Johannesburg reported.

Police also said there was little black commuter traffic out of the Alexandra township in northern already has accepted that the Johannesburg.

## Canadian 'invasion' brings higher taxes, trouble

GLACIER, Wash. (AP) - The once sleepy Nooksack Valley threatens to become a battleground between local residents and thousands of Canadian recreationists trying to escape the crowded Vancouver area.

More than 5,000 condominiums, home sites and camping spots have sprouted since 1967 in the Mt. Baker area, with 2,000 more planned.

The land boom has aroused "Ugly Canadian" sentiments that ironically mirror Canadian fears about dominance by the United States.

Mt. Baker area residents Gerald and Neila Stewart have posted a "For Sale" sign outside their 80-year-old home, saying the property taxes and careless intruders are driving them

"We wanted to be here for the rest of our lives, but we've had it," Mrs. Stewart said. "People dump garbage on the lawn, park in our front yard

and trample the hay."

"We pay five times the property tax that we did eight years ago," her husband added. "I took it to the county assessor and asked why. He told me: 'It's because all the Canadians are coming in."

Of 8,047 property transactions here in 1975, 23 per cent involved Canadians.

The price of recreational land in Whatcom County has tripled since 1971, but remains about half what it is across the border.

The influx of Canadians has been caused by Canada's continued doubledigit inflation and the British

Columbia government's freeze on farmland development. Then, too, Vancouver is bursting at the seams, surrounded by mountains

and water which allow expansion only to the south. Land value has increased, and with

it Whatcom County property taxes. One man's property at Glacier, valued at \$22,900 in May of 1975, has been reassessed to \$41,000.

About 10,000 county residents, many of them farmers, recently signed a petition for property tax relief.

"But folks here are doubly old-fashioned," said one Bellingham college student who grew up in the valley. "They don't want development but they adamantly oppose land

use controls. "Dollars go further down here," said Fred Berg, one Canadian who

owns property near Glacier. But some people who have lived in the valley since before 1967 feel

crowded by Berg's and other trailers. "Unless they're in business, most people don't like to see it," said Glacier mink rancher Dale Moore.



"My research is very important to me, more important than mountaineering," said the 31-year-old biochemist from Berkeley, Calif., one of the two women in the 11-member American Bicentennial Everest Expedition. Huddled in a tent as the snow fell on

the base camp 11,500 feet below the peak of the world's highest mountain, Ms. Blum was reading over an advance copy of her article "Flame Retardant Additives as Possible Cancer Hazards." A runner had just brought it with the mail.

"My research on chemicals in the environment that may cause cancer is so satisfying," she said. "I think I can really help people this way. We spend so much money on trying to find cures for cancer but very little on

the prevention of it. I really was reluctant to leave my work to come to







#### Crisis in France

The French people accepted the disciplines of the Fifth Republic offered by Gen. Charles De Gaulle in 1958 because the nation was on the verge of civil war and strength was needed to avert the crisis.

Today France does not face the threat of a civil war but the crisis that it faces is as great or greater than that of 1958. It is on the verge of choosing between President Giscard d'Estaing's "advance socialism" and communism. If French people make the wrong decision it may be permanent.

In one sense the damage that a victory of the far left would bring would be even more damaging than the elevation of Italian Communists to authority.

Students of such matters point out that the Italian Communists offer a "historic compromise" a proposal to work together with the right for the reinvigoration of Italy. They purport to favor membership in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and democratic political processes.

Doesn't sound anything like normal Communist politics, does it?

The French left, however, is a totally different animal. The Socialist party which is affiliated with the Communists is radical. Together they pledge to end capitalism by nationalizing industry, total government planning and control and a head-on attack against "privilege."

This sounds more like the real

recognized around the world today.

Last spring, the coalition of the left was encouraged by its majority showing in the cantonal elections. It expects to repeat the victory in next spring's municipal elections. It reportedly is further inspired by a divided incumbent government, symbolized by the recent resignation of Prime Minister Jaques Chirac . Chirac is the leader of the Gaullist party which has the largest single bloc of members in parliament, 43 seats more than the Independent Republicans, the party of d'Estaing.

Hopefully, D'Estaing will be able to avoid an early election and gain 20 months in which to build a national coalition while his new prime minister, Raymond Barre, reverses France's sagging economic fortunes.

Considering the high stakes involved, the Western industrial nations should help as much as they can.

If they don't, France's "advance socialism" will become the most advanced of all socialism and collective security democracy will retreat another step.

Thus, the present crisis in France assumes crisis proportions for Western industrial

D'Estaing faces a real squeeze play, with high stakes involved. It is up to the people of France to make the right decision.

He has used this money to harass Sadat in Egypt, to contribute to the bloodshed in Lebanon by giving arms and money to the Moslems. His checks have turned up in the form of financial backing for insurgents as far afield as the Philippines and Northern Ireland. He also is a patron of hijackers.

In a long speech at the nonaligned summit meeting in Sri Lanka in mid-August, Khadafy denied emphatically that he supported any terriorist activities "except those involving the struggle of a people for independence." He said the blame for trumped-up charges that he bankrolls hijacking and subversion rests with "imperialism, international Zionism and racialism.

Less than a week after his denial, Arab gunmen hijacked an Egyptian airliner and ordered it to Libya.

Egyptian paratroops blocked the attempt, released the hostages and interrogated the captured hijackers. They admitted acting on Khadafy's orders.

Khadafy is a Bedouin, born in the desert. He seeks and finds justification for all of his policies in the Koran. In 1971, to support his stance on Palestine, he referred to the Sacred Book: "God would not prevent you from fighting those who had chased you from your homes.'

Born in 1942, Khadafy already was a young firebrand when Nasser was at the pinnacle of his influence in the Arab world. Khadafy grew up on an intellectual diet of radio and printed propaganda against Western imperialism and rightist Arab govern-

Khadafy entered the army and led the overthrow of Libya's weak monarchy in 1969

Khadafy was only 27 at the time. He said his policies for the advancement of Libya's economy and society would follow a middle path between "exploitative capitalism and blasphemous communism."

Khadafy has pursued his own vision of Arab unity with intensity. At various times he has agreed to confederations with Egypt, Syria and the Sudan and came close once to a linkage with Tunisia.

But his own unpredictability and eccentricities have scuttled one relationship after another.

Khadafy's Arab neighbors seem to feel that he must, at the very least, be contained. Overthrow supported from the outside is a possibility, but it would be a bloody undertaking, given the size of Khadafy's personal security force.

#### INSIDE REPORT: Candidate Jimmy Carter's Brookings 'connection'

WASHINGTON - A major reason why President Ford's agents tried to limit the first debate to defense policy is Jimmy Carter's dependence so far on military advice from soft-line experts at the Brookings Institution.

Although totally obscured by his headline-producing promise to pardon Vietnam draft dodgers, Carter's American Legion speech also contained some dubious defense costcutting schemes that have been kicking around Brookings for years. Brookings, a prestigious Washington think-tank which has housed a liberal Democratic government-in-exile since 1969, is clearly calling the tune on Carter defense policy.

Whether Mr. Ford has the will or the skill to turn this to his political advantage remains to be seen. Furthermore, hard-line Democrats insist that Carter's upbringing, background and instincts ultimately will prevail over the Brookings connection. Nevertheless, even these friends privately wish the Democratic nominee would seek more varied national security advice.

The basis of Carter's problem is faintly understood: despite his U.S. Naval Academy education and early career as a regular Navy officer, national security is his weakest area of expertise: his experience with nuclear submarines two decades ago scarcely equips him to wrestle with global military policy. Nor did he have time to immerse himself in defense complexities while

His early vague answers exposed his unfamiliarity with military budgeting. His worst blunder was proposing to eliminate Army engineers' spending on rivers and harbors, which in fact never has been included in the defense budget - an error persisted in by Carter until

When pressed to specify defense cuts, Carter would reply that the experts at Brookings called a five to seven billion dollar reduction reasonable. By July, he was getting specific proposals from Brookings. By August, Carter had adopted some as his own and on Aug, 24 unveiled

them to the Legionnaires in Seattle. Largely overlooked sections of the Seattle speech proposed, first, saving \$400 million a year by increasing the average military tour of duty by two months and, second, saving \$1 billion a year by raising the military teacher-pupil ratio from 1.5:1 to 3:1. Then Carter exploded his bombshell by implying he could save \$10.7 billion in cost overruns during the next five

The staff work was obviously hurried. An extra two months on duty tours, the principle of which is included in current Pentagon reforms, would save not \$400 million but \$180 million. The present teacher-pupil ratio is not 1.5:1 but 5:1. Total cost overruns on 45 weapons systems now being developed are \$13.4 billion, not \$10.7 billion. But that represents an annual overrun rate of 3 per cent, which compares favorably with acquisition programs in private industry and elsewhere in government.

Some Democratic defense experts on Capitol Hill feel Carter erred basically in swallowing old Brookings schemes. Even the most desirous administrative reforms cannot yield quick, one-year savings. Carter can get an immediate five to seven billion dollar cut only by major manpower reductions, which could change the world balance of power, or by radically reducing pay benefits and closing bases, areas where congressional consent is both necessary and unattainable.

Beyond details, these experts regret the near monopoly on military advice to Carter by Brookings and would prefer a wider range of advisers. The Carter campaign reply to such criticism invariably points to hard-liner Paul Nitze, former Deputy Secretary of Defense. Nitze does provide some counterweight, as in editing a Brookings-prepared briefing paper on strategic weapons which, in-credibly, neglected to discuss the new

Soviet SS-20 land-based mobil missile. But Nitze is a pitifully outnumbered hawk among Carter braintrust doves. This is not entirely mindless inadvertence. The Carter high command passed up a chance to consult Dr. James Schlesinger, a distinguished global thinker purged by Mr. Ford as Secretary of Defense.

# Kissinger running out of time on African crisis

WASHINGTON — For several mon-ths now it has been obvious that Henry Kissinger's tenure as secretary of state is coming to a close. Now time appears to be running out for him in the last major international crisis he has tried to manage.

The word among black African diplomats these days is that the crucial moment of decision in southern Africa, so long predicted, is down to a matter of weeks away. Early this autumn, the rainy season is due in Rhodesia, and intensified guerrilla warfare against the white minority regime in Salisbury is programmed to

Accordingly, in the face of all probability, a lame-duck secretary of state is preparing to commit the prestige of the United States to a diplomatic effort in Africa which is under political fire at home and subject to increasing skepticism in Africa.

IN THE COURSE of the trip that begins Monday, he must try to persuade the black African nationalist leaders to whom he promised a new American policy toward South Africa and Rhodesia that the Ford administration can still deliver such a policy. And he must do so in the face of evidence that conservatives in the President's own party, on whom he is dependent for reelection, will do everything in their power to thwart the secretary.

Still, Kissinger feels he must seek to persuade the Zimbabwe (Rhodesia) 'freedom fighters," as the guerrilla militants are called, to postpone their struggle and accept negotiation with a regime in Salisbury that up to now has yet to yield even the principle of maiority rule.

To do this, African officials say, he must offer a guarantee of success that goes even beyond what Kissinger promised in Lusaka, Zambia, last April, when U.S. policy in Africa entered its new phase. And the guarantee would have to be persuasive not only to African heads of state who are now skeptical, but to the guerrillas themselves, whose distrust of all white outsiders is total.

At best, then, Kissinger is embarked on one of the riskiest enterprises of his career. Even supporters of the new U.S. policy, such as Sen. Dick Clark (D-Iowa), put his chances at no better than one in 25.

Kissinger obviously believes the risk is worth it and has persuaded President Ford to back him. The alternative to a settlement in Rhodesia and the South African trust territory of Namibia (South West Africa), he believes, will lead not only to violence and bloodshed but to a massive Soviet expansion into all of the continent south of the Sahara.

KISSINGER HIMSELF sees his chances for success at "about 50-50" - a somewhat elastic formula he used to put forward in the palmier days of his diplomatic success, when he was undertaking shuttle diplomacy in the Middle East.

But even Kissinger accepts the reality that the southern African conflict in its present phase is even more intractable than was the Middle East in the aftermath of the 1973 war.

His attempt to open a dialogue with South African Prime Minister John Vorster has been relatively fruitful so far, by any diplomatic measure. But the racial divisions of the continent are so deep that the very fact he has done this is being cited against the U.S. effort in current Soviet propaganda. Kissinger's tentative plan to visit Pretoria, unexpectedly presented as a firm intention in the White House announcement Friday of the trip, is therefore a calculated risk,

Still more of a risk, however, is his plan to return to the scenes of his diplomatic triumph in Africa last spring and visit Julius K. Nyerere in Tanzania and Kenneth Kaunda in Zambia. In April his success was one of promise. Now he must deliver.

Already weakened by the political circumstances at home, Kissinger's African diplomacy also must overcome the fact that the black leadership is in disarray and steadily under Soviet and nationalist pressure to resort to violence as the only solution

to all problems. These are the main problems to be solved before strife in southern Africa can be averted - almost certainly, if at all, long after Kissinger has left of-

RHODESIA

It was Kissinger's belief that the danger of racial warfare loomed most urgently in Rhodesia that led him to give the problem of achieving majority black rule there the top priority in his landmark statement of Administration policy last April.

Kissinger's declaration of "unremitting hostility" to the Ian Smith regime in Salisbury, drew public applause at the time from Zambia's Kaunda in Lusaka, where the statement was given, and private backing from Tanzania's Nyerere. But since then, progress has been ambiguous.

Open hostility to the new policy from conservatives in the United States, especially among Republicans, not only endangered Ford's presidential candidacy during the summer but also eclipsed important aspects of the new policy.

THE PROMISE to press for congressional repeal of the Byrd amendment allowing chrome imports from Salisbury in violation of United Nations embargo won repeated lip service from Ford, Kissinger and other top Administration officials, but nothing was done and no action is now expected.

grew muted as anti-American sentiment among black Rhodesian guerrilla factions increased and as the Soviet Union stepped up its own propaganda campaign in southern

Mozambique, a major actor in the anti-Rhodesian front and an important new center of Soviet influence in southern Africa, remained off-limits to U.S. influence, and a Kissinger stop there on his new African odyssey is unlikely.

The only discernible progress on the Rhodesian front has been with the South Africans, and even this appears ambiguous.

During Kissinger's June meetings in Bavaria with South African Prime Minister Vorster, it became clear that the implied U.S. policy of enlisting South Africa in a campaign of stringent political and economic pressure on the Rhodesians had been sharply modified.

Instead, there emerged a negotiating formula of carrot-andstick: the South Africans were to be persuaded that peaceful evolution to black majority rule in Rhodesia was in their national interest, and were to be given a political and economic incentive to pass the message along to Salisbury.'

It soon emerged from other sources that Kissinger was referring to a scheme still under discussion to provide financial guarantees for the white minority: in part a guaranteed bounty of sorts for settlers selling their land and emigrating and in part a fund to encourage some whites to stay at least five years and ease the transition to black rule.

It was understood from the start that the British would be involved in the scheme, since Kissinger intends to have no direct contact with Smith's regime, which is internationally regarded a breakaway British colony still under Commonwealth jurisdiction. Some sources have speculated the fund would total as much as \$2 billion, with West Germany and other West European countries joining the United States as the main source of the money, but no details appear to have been worked out.

During Kissinger's most recent meeting with Vorster in Zurich just over a week ago, reports of the fund guarantee scheme circulated anew. This time the speculation was buttressed by reports that Vorster was willing to buy the plan as the best way to ease the political risks domestically of appearing to join a campaign against the only other white minority regime in Africa.

As a concrete token of Vorster's willingness to cooperate were the quiet withdrawal in late August of several dozen South African helicopter pilots who were reported to have flown spotter missions for Rhodesian armed forces. South African police units stationed in Rhodesia were withdrawn last spring.

Finally, there was the fact thaat Kissinger was publicly invited to Pretoria to continue the dialogue on his coming trip, and the fact that Vorster accepted Kissinger's priviso that he meet black leaders while in South Africa.

THE PROBLEMS lay with the Rhodesians, white and black, and perhaps also with the black national leaders to whom Kissinger needs



## Most citizens to benefit from upcoming tax law

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following is the first in a series of five stories explaining key provisions of the 1976 tax bill moving through Congress.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress is about to pass a tax bill that will affect everyone who files a federal income tax return. It continues this year's reductions for most Americans and offers new cuts for millions of others.

The bill continues through 1977 this year's individual tax credits, providing a tax reduction of \$35 for the taxpayer and each dependent, or 2 per cent of his first \$9,000 of taxable income up to \$180.

The election-year tax measure makes an effort to provide something for just about everybody. For instance, about two million American families are expected to take advantage of just one provision of the bill — one that would reduce taxes for working parents who hire babysitters.

While cutting taxes for most Americans, the bill also will lower federal revenues by about \$17.9 billion. The individual tax cuts will total about \$15 billion, and business tax cuts will reduce federal income another \$4.5 billion. This will be partly offset by \$1.6 billion in tax increases. levied mostly against the wealthiest Americans.

Congress is expected to give final approval to the bill this week, and President Ford is expected to sign it.

In addition to the child-care provisions, the assortment of other changes would make it easier to claim alimony payments as a tax deduction; would expand tax benefits in job-related moves and would clear the way for tax-deferred pensions for housewives.

Here is how these benefits work: CHILD CARE

On the tax return filed next spring for 1976, working parents can subtract from their tax 20 per cent of the first \$2,000 spent during the year for the care of one child, or 20 per cent of the first \$4,000 spent during the year for the care of two or more children. The maximum tax credit for one child would be \$400; for two or more, the maximum credit would be \$800. It is available to those families where both parents work, or where the only parent works.

The credit would be extended to those families using the standard deduction as well as those who itemize deductions. This is expected to double the number of families using child care tax advantages, from two million to four million.

The credit will be available to parated parents an when one spouse works only parttime. Relatives may be hired for the child care if Social Security taxes are withheld from the babysitting paychecks. The new credit may be calculated

on all qualifying child care payments

\$4,800 a year for expenses of hiring someone to care for a child under 15 or a disabled dependent or spouse while the parents work. There are several conditions in the old law: Both parents usually had to work full time; no deduction was per-

mitted for payments to relatives; the deduction was reduced \$1 for each \$2 of annual income above \$35,000. Most importantly, the old law required the expense be claimed as an itemized deduction on tax returns. The benefit has not been available to

the 60 per cent of Americans who use

the standard deduction. The bill changes the deduction to a credit. Deductions are subtracted from income; credits are subtracted from taxes owed.

There is another distinction. Up to incomes beyond \$35,000 a year, where it rapidly diminishes, the old \$4,800-aricher than to the poorer taxpayers. The tax credit is calculated the same for every taxpayer, no matter how much or little he or she earns. Here is how a family of four would

fare under the old law and under the new bill. The family includes two children under 15, has an income of \$15,000 a year with both parents working, has itemized deductions of \$1,700, and takes the maximum \$180 credit for individuals.

OLD LAW - If the family claims the maximum child-care deduction of \$4,800, the tax owed would be \$725,

NEW LAW - The child-care cost no longer would be a deduction and the family would use the maximum standard deduction. Without the childcare credit, this would mean a tax liability of \$749. But the maximum credit of \$800 for two children would reduce the tax bill to zero, a savings from the old law of \$725. The saving varies with income and child care expenses.

#### ALIMONY

This is another expense that could not be deducted under the old law unless the taxpayer itemized deductions.

The new provision allows a taxpayer to deduct alimony expenses with or without itemizing. The change would be effective next Jan. 1, meaning this provision cannot be used until the returns for 1977, filed in the spring

#### **MOVING EXPENSES**

Under certain circumstances the law has allowed a deduction from taxable income of some moving expenses if the move is required because of employment.

The maximum deduction has been \$2,500 for expenses of house-hunting, selling the old home and temporary lodging - if the new place of work was 50 miles farther from the old residence than was the old place of

In addition to these limited expenses, the taxpayer may deduct fully all reasonable expenses for moving furniture and for lodging for himself and his family while en route to the new home.

The new law will raise the maximum deduction to \$3,000 and cut the 50-mile rule to 35 miles.

The changes will become effective for moves on or after next Jan. 1, and the new provision will be used for 1977 returns.


**HOUSEWIVES' PENSIONS** 

This change, effective next Jan. 1, is generally viewed as the government's first step in rewarding the housewife's contributions to the economy and the nation's social struc-

It is a small step, likely to be broadened in coming years.

Present law allows a worker who has no other pension plan to set aside up to \$1,500 a year in an Individual Retirement Account. That money is not taxed until it is withdrawn; that generally would be at retirement when most persons would be in a considerably lower tax bracket.

The new bill will allow the worker to raise the total contribution to \$1,750 a year if the extra money is earmarked for a pension for a spouse who does not work outside the home.

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP) - The previous cruises. controversial cruise ship Vera Cruz I has departed from the Port of Galveston for Miami, leaving behind least 90 slot machines, a roulette wheel and several black jack tables.

### Argentine war toll increases BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - Leftist

guerrillas were blamed for 12 killings in Argentina Sunday, right-wing terrorists for two, and the toll of political violence rose to at least 947 this year.

An army communique said leftists blew up a busload of police in Rosario, 180 miles north of Buenos Aires, and then sprayed them with machinegun fire, killing nine policemen and two civilians in a car behind the bus.

Police sources said the policemen were returning to their barracks from a soccer game. As their bus passed an intersection, a bomb concealed in an automobile went off, and guerrillas in a small truck opened fire on the bus.


The army reported three other civilians injured. Police sources gave a higher casualty count, reporting 12 persons killed and at least 17 wounded.

## Island town booming despite hurricane threat

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Tex. (AP) - Residents and investors on this popular island resort are playing hurricane roulette-a dangerous annual game where losers lose millions. And the real losers lose their lives.

"It's really a big question mark," muses building inspector John Armeau. "We'll just have to wait until the next big blow comes through."

Although weathermen warn that a major hurricane would cover Padre Island with five feet or more of angry ocean waves, residents are betting their fortunes it'll never happen.

The last "big blow" to move over the island was Hurricane Beulah in September 1967 and it caused no deaths. But since then, the island town has experienced a building boom.

Since 1973, when South Padre Island became an incorporated city, more than \$27 million in building permits have been granted.

The town — five miles long and two miles wide - sits approximately two miles off the Texas mainland across from Port Isabel.

Although the island's population is "about 400," the sunsplashed stretch of beach annually attracts thousands of tourists. Armeau said the town is currently

rewriting its building codes trying "to get building designs that compliment mother nature. But we're just playing the odds.'

And the odds are formidable according to information supplied by Al Dreumont, the meteorologist in charge of the National Weather Service in Brownsville. Fortunately, hurricanes pose a threat for only three or

four months of each year. -'There have been 26 tropical storms within 100 miles of Brownsville since 1900," Dreumont Hurricane Center in Miami has predicted the conditions that might accompany a severe hurricane like Camille (1969) whose winds exceeded 200 miles per hour.

"If a Camille-type storm hits this area, the water surge (waves that proceed the eye of a hurricane) is estimated at 12 feet for Brownsville and Port Isabel," he said.

"When the water rises two feet on South Padre I've got to get the people off the island. When the water hits five feet, most of the island will be under water. Dreumont said nine of every 10 hurricane deaths are caused by drowning.

"If a 12-foot water surge hits the island," he added, "the lesser structures on the island such as singlestory, one-family dwellings will probably be destroyed. The multistorystructures should survive."

"You figure one cubic yard of water weighs 1,500 pounds and with 100 to 200 m.p.h. winds behind it, you've got a very destructive force.

"The crucial months for hurricanes in this area is August and September," he noted. "That's not saying we can't have one in July or October but the probability is very

"Nothing will sneak up on us. Our radar covers a 250-mile span. The people will have plenty of warning." Should Dreumont recommend—he

does not have the authority to order—the evacuation of South Padre Island, the town's officials have a bat-

We have just passed an ordinance that requires every person to evacuate in case of such a warning," said the island's police chief, Cleo Beauford. "In addition to the reports

"We have designated (highway) routes to the inland cities for our people and have colorcoded passes for residents and businessmen to use returning to the island which should keep out the looters.

"The public utilities-electricity, water and gas—will be turned off," he said. "We'll lock this office and get the hell outta here.'

Beauford has an added incentive for quick evacuation. City Hall-and his office-sit "a little more than two feet above sea

level.' Despite the seasonal threat of hurricanes and tropical storms, long-time residents of the island take the danger in stride.

"Look at the poor people in tornado areas," said Mrs. D. H. Christensen, a 28-year resident and the bookkeeper for one of the island's resort hotels.



### Gulf adds to volume

HOUSTON - Gulf Oil Corp. announced it has connected a new field which will increase deliveries of natural gas to Texas Eastern Tranmission Co.

Volumes are expected to reach 98 nillion cubic feet per day in the fourth quarter, according to Lewis A. Ramsey, president of Gulf Energy and Minerals Co.- U.S.

The addition of 98 million cubic feet would bring Gulf's deliveries to Texas Eastern to approximately 438 million subic feet per day.

The gas is being supplied from two new platforms in the Grand Isle Block 35 field, offshore Louisiana, about 100 miles south of New Orleans.

Ramsey said additional deliveries of approximately 40 million cubic feet per day are expected upon completion of a third platform in this field, scheduled for early 1977.

The platforms are in 200 feet of water.

Gulf has an average 45 per cent share of production from four blocks that make up the Grand Isle Block 95 field. The blocks were acquired in September 1972 and March 1974 at a cost to Gulf of \$26.5 million.

Gas could have been produced from this field in November 1975 but has been delayed until now due to a certification problem between the operator of the jointly-owned blocks and the Federal Power Commission.

The gas from the Grand Isle Block 95 field will move to Gulf's platform in South Timbalier Block 135 field where it will be separated and transported about 65 miles via existing pipelines to a Gulf gas treating and processing plant at Venice, La., for sale to Texas Eastern.

A contract entered into in 1963 provided for the delivery by Gulf to Texas Eastern of gas from the area of South Louisiana and Offshore Louisiana for a period of 26 years or been delivered, whichever occurred

Largely as a result of several factors, including over-estimating the reserves of an offshore Lousiaian gas field which was to be the main source of supply for this contract; this nation's overall gas shortage; and the fact that for almost 10 years, between 1962 and 1972, the federal government curtailed offshore leasing. Gulf has been unable since 1973 to deliver the full daily contract quantities to Texas


changes instituted by the 196265 Vatican II ecumenical conference and by the Pope.

## Fish, other fishermen fond of this angler

PACIFIC CITY, Ore. (AP) — When a gold-plated mechanical pencil, a Staff Sgt. Billie S. Mashburn Jr. goes thermos bottle, pots and pans and fishing he's not after a live catch.

The 30-year-old computer technician, assigned to nearby Mt. Hebo Air Force Station, skin dives in many Oregon rivers and often comes up with a treasure in lost fishing tackle and gear. Tackle boxes, rods and reels, knives, countless lures and hundreds of pounds of lead weights are among the items he finds.

Because the water is cold Mashburn wears a wet suit in addition to his snorkle and mask. An anchor attached to a rope prevents him from being swept downstream by the strong current.

"Searching a cold riverbed for six hours is not easy work, but it has its rewards," said Mashburn. Although he sold 1,200 pounds of lead weights for several hundred dollars one year, few people would do this for money "One of the most satisfying aspects

of my hobby is putting together a beautiful fishing rod from the spare parts I have cannibalized," he explained

Occasionally Mashburn will find a particularly worthwhile prize. He said he appreciates the time a thoughtful (or frustrated) fisherman left some beer and a can of soda. Other finds include cigarette lighters,

dozens of anchors.

Mashburn became interested in diving for tackle when a friend challenged him to a swimming race. 'I rented a wet suit and we raced," he said. "The next day I purchased a wet suit and haven't stopped using it He has given away more than half

of the tackle he fishes from river bottoms and he often repairs friends' gear with the spare parts he accumulates. Because of his unusual hobby, Mashburn's supply of tackle and gear is extensive.

Mashburn's hobby is often cold and usually demanding. He has gone on underwater tackle hunts when the water temperature was in the 30s.



"As yet the social programs have been invaded mainly by white collar crime," he said. "As the money flow swells, we can be reasonably surethat organized crime will figure out ways to get into the act."

"Perhaps," Schlesinger said, "the White House or the Office of Management and Budget should establish an inspector general with authority to inquire into everything from the conduct of an agency to the capacity of its officials to write an intelligible English sentence.

"Perhaps the FBI should move on from the Socialist Workers to social work and in-vestigate the ripoff scandals. Certainly one would wish for objective and thorough congressional oversight."

"I have no doubt," he said, "that the national government must remain the central authority in our quest for social rights.
