# Lazbuddie Bond Issue Carries: Board Meets With Architects

Monday's Lazbuddie School Bond Election carried by an overwhelming majority vote of 125 for; 52 against, giving the proposed building project the "go-ahead" signal.

Superintendent Albert Fuller said a meeting followed the outcome of the voting on Thursday night with architects and members of the school board for the completion of preliminary plans. However, Fuller said, it would be approximately 60 days

before all details could be worked out and bids opened for contracts.

Architects for the modernization and expansion program are John Ward and Associates, Amarillo.

The new \$235,000 improvement program will provide a modern all-purpose science laboratory, a new cafeteria and kitchen, a new homemaking department, three classrooms and related service and administrative facilities.

This bond issue came about at the conclusion of seven months of intensive study by the school board concerning the school curriculum and needs of housing facilities in order to provide for a well-rounded background education program for upcoming college students.

Cost of this proposed facility will be met by an increase of taxes by only one-seventh of the current tax rate without any

change in current evaluation. The bonded indebtedness of the district with the new facility, is to be retired in seventeen years.

Present housing, known in the community as "Old Red," has stood on the campus for the past 35 years and was deemed as "unsuited" for a modern program and increase of pupils.

Parham stated that the board members were very happy with the turnout, the interest conference shown in the plans and work done toward up-grading the school system. He further expressed the appreciation on behalf of the board who have worked together as a unit to attain this goal.

**Lubbock Meeting For Lutherans Slated: Church Founding Observance Highlighted**

Two meetings in Lubbock this area: the 10th anniversary of coming week will be of special the founding of Christ Lutheran interest to Lutherans of this Church in the southwest part of

the city, and a Lutheran Layman's Workshop at Redeemer Lutheran, corner of 22nd and Ave. W, reported the Rev. Herbert F. Peiman, pastor of St. John Lutheran Church, Lariat.

Three services will be held at Christ Lutheran, 50th and Knoxville on Sundays: 8:30 and 9:45 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. The Rev. Paul Elbrecht, first pastor of the congregation, and now professor at Concordia Theological Seminary, Springfield, Illinois, will be the speaker.

The Rev. Elbrecht arrived in Lubbock July 26, 1954, shortly after his graduation from the seminary, where he is now an instructor. Four weeks later he was ordained into the ministry by the Rerteh yenuCr?vh

at Redeemer Lutheran Church by the Rev. Orville Buntrock. By the following Sunday he had found a place of worship at 44-19 Thirty First Street. The first service was attended by 26 people on August 29, 1954.

When the attendance and membership increased the Mission Board of the Texas District of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod purchased a nine acre tract of land at the corner of 50th and Knoxville. Groundbreaking services were held on September 25. Building of the first chapel continued uninterrupted so that dedication ceremonies could be held during March 1955. This modest but attractive brick structure still serves the congregation as its house of worship. However in the spring of 1962 an educational wing was added to take care of the growing Sunday School and the Christian Day

School, which at present is composed of a Kindergarten and grades 1 and 2. Future plans call for adding another grade each year from first to the sixth grade.

Rev. Elbrecht resigned his pastorate in Lubbock on August 15, 1958 to assume his duties as instructor at the Springfield seminary. Two months later on October 12, the present pastor.

## Pleentiful Foods For December Listed With Turkey Supply Good

Turkeys, peanuts and peanut products top the U. S. Department of Agriculture's List of Pleentiful Foods for December.

Add to these apples, red tart cherries, cranberries, canned ripe olives, broiler-fryers and beef and you have a wide assortment of foods from which to plan your holiday menus. It's always good news to know that turkeys will be in plentiful supply for Christmas and New Year's dinners. And this year, you can also get turkey pieces and (at many places) turkey rolls. The rolls are all meat and no bone for easy carving and neat slices for buffet suppers, snacks and sandwiches. The pieces, of course, appeal to selective eaters — those who like that drumstick or that wish-bone.

As for peanuts and peanut products, the crop is large; so are current holdings. Try this peanut topper for ice cream: Combine ½ cup peanut butter with 1 cup marshmallow cream and ½ cup milk. Stir in ½ cup chopped peanuts. Serve over vanilla ice cream.

This year's crop of apples will yield 141 million bushels, more than in any year since 1937. A record large red tart cherry crop plus a record-large pack of frozen cherries will put cherries, cherries, and more (See Pleentiful Page 4)

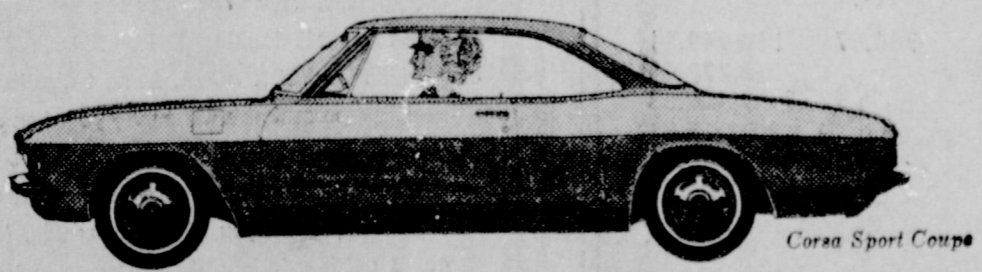

# Accent on Health

If you give your youngster a bicycle this Christmas — or if he has one already — don't send him off on a ride with a wave and a vague "be careful". Chances are a bicycle is a youngster's first experience as a part of the traffic. Discuss the finer points of bike-riding safety with him — or her — and see that he practices them.

Make sure your youngster rides a sturdy, well-equipped bike, and teach him how to take care of it.

Pass these admonitions on to him on having safe fun on a bike:

Know and obey traffic laws. Traffic lights and signs are for bike riders, too.

Ride with the traffic. A good bike rider always rides on the right hand edge of the road.

Give the proper traffic signals before stopping or turning, then take hold of the handle bars again.

Ride single file. If your friend has a bike and you ride together, ride one in front of the other, with plenty of space between.

When traffic is heavy at a corner get off your bike and push it across, following the crosswalks.

Light up at night. Do all your riding in the daytime if you can. If you must be out at night, be sure you have your white light in front and your red reflector and tail light on the rear, just as automobiles do. Wear clothing that is light colored or that shines in the dark so you can be seen easily.

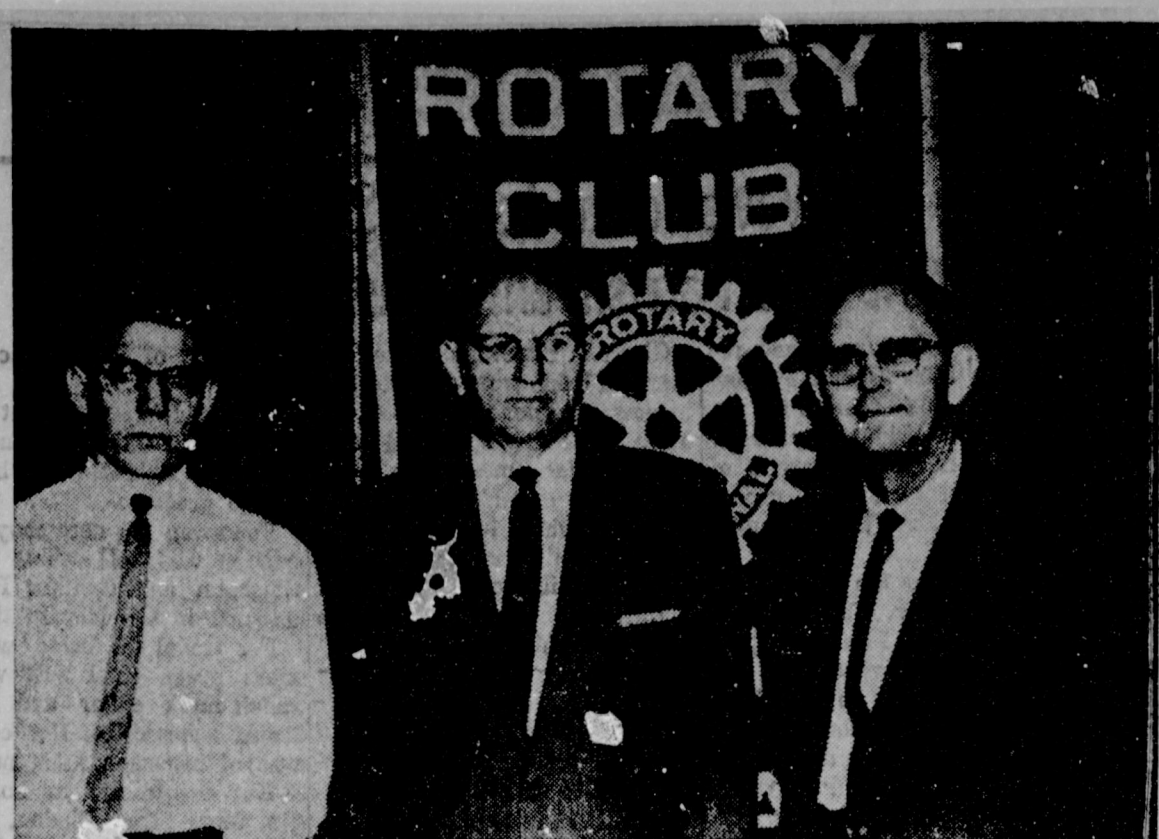
Use a carrier or basket for books and packages. If you have no basket or carrier, tie your books and packages to the frame.

Ride one to a bike — unless you have a special bicycle built for two.

One of the most dangerous things a bike rider can do is "hitch a ride" by a moving truck or car. You could be easily be thrown down — perhaps in front of a car of queezed against a truck or bus.

Playing games or racing on bikes should be done in empty lot or yards and not where people are walking or driving. Don't try hard stunts or you may hurt yourself.

Stop and take a look before riding out of alleys, driveways or from behind parked cars. A car can't stop as quickly as you can.

# TRIO FLY TO DALLAS FOR BRACERO HEARING

Today, Thursday, Virgil Nowell, President of the West Texas Farm Labor Association, Harold Allison, Director, and Eivon DeVaney, Manager, will fly to Dallas to present evidence from this area on the bracero situation before Clifford P. Grant, Hearing Examiner of the U. S. Department of Labor. Grant has been hearing evidence in Washington, D. C., Miami, Florida and after hearing evidence in Dallas, will proceed to California to hear more.

The purpose of the hearings according to DeVaney, is to collect evidence for the advisability of the U. S. Labor Department extending the present law for the admission of migrant labor from Old Mexico to help in the harvesting of crops in this area. Opposed to the law are the AF of L and the CIO, controlling the Teamsters' Union, who are doing their best to organize farm labor into a solid union. In California this year the Teamsters Union was approached by the Department of Labor with the request that they supply labor for the strawberry crop at Union wages. This they were unable to do, and as a result much of the crop was lost. Farmers in the Muleshoe area are anxious to avoid a similar situation in our area, and are bringing to the attention of the U. S. Department of Labor the importance of migrant Mexican labor to the area's economy.

In presenting their evidence, the three witnesses, through President Virgil Nowell will state:

Our main purpose is to serve the farmers in our area with farm labor. In the past years,

we have placed many hundreds of local and migrant labor in our fields. Due to the fact, that the type of domestic labor is so high in demand at different times of the season and the availability of such labor is so low, we have been forced to use supplementary labor from Old Mexico, Under Public Law 78.

Realizing that this law which has been very workable in the past, we submit this following statement.

My impression is that the need for supplementary labor in this country at this time is not Employment Service that there is a need.

Therefore, we are interested only on such matters as wages, housing insurance, and transportation expense.

Wages: Some three years ago wages were increased some 40 per cent to stop labor, but this did not help the situation. In trying to secure help we have offered more than this figure quoted by the Labor Department, with very little or no extremely hard to find, therefore, approximately 80 to 90 per cent success. Sprinkler Irrigators are 85 per cent to 90 per cent in our tomatoes, approximately 88 per cent, and other vegetables 70 to 85 per cent. The vegetable industry would die in our area, without outside help, no matter what the wages might be.

Housing: We offer housing with all utilities furnished to all workers and these houses are by no means sub-standard. We feel that no change

requirements are sufficient. If any changes are made, workers should be made free housing.

Transportation: These requirements also are sufficient that we offer as much as can be expected of any employer. If any changes should be made, the workers should be held responsible to perform and complete the work they are securing.

Insurance: Sufficient insurance is being offered at present in comparison to other industries. No change should be made.

In Conclusion: We recognize that a feasible program will take some time, also we point out that farming cannot wait, your speedy decision on this matter is urgent.

The people in our area feel that without some supplementary help that our economy would degrade to an unpredictable low.

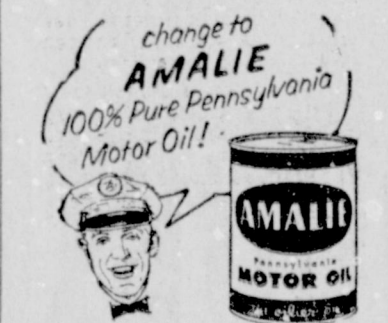

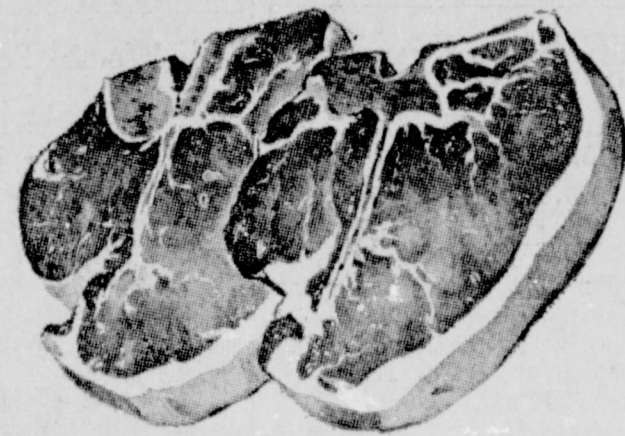
