Republicans take issue with Carter tax views

By DICK BARNES

WASHINGTON (AP) - Jimmy Carter's views on tax reform are being assailed by Republicans and loom as a potential centerpiece of his debate Thursday with President

Carter discussed tax revisions in an interview with The Associated Press released Saturday. In a fresh statement of his intent Sunday, he said the purpose of tax reform should be to shift the burden to those with higher incomes and away from poor-and middle-income families.

Republicans, particularly vice presidential nominee Sen. Robert Dole, immediately asserted that Carter means to increase taxes for anyone making more than \$12,000 to \$14,000 a year, and termed his original statement a major campaign blunder.

But Carter replied Sunday that "the interpretation of what I said by Mr. Ford and Mr. Dole and the Republican spokesmen is certainly completely distorted." He said he had no quarrel with the AP accounts of his statements. They "are very ac-

I made a mistake in an early column about "Santa Rita No. 1," the discovery well of the Permian Field near Big Lake, Ford said, when I referred to the huge "rocker arm" still rocking half a century later. It's called a "walking beam," and it's attached to the "grasshopper" (the shorter piston-like arm) by the 'pitman.

Interestingly enough, many of the terms in the oil patch were adapted from the steamboat days on the Ohio River, whose technology for moving barges on liquid proved useful in moving liquid from the earth, says Chapman, who has moved lots of liquid in more than half a century in the oil patch.

The "horse head" is the horse headshaped structure at the end of the walking beam, the "saddle bearing" is the fulcrum point of the beam, and the "headache post" is the shorter upright in front of the "samson post" which bears the weight of the beam and its burden of oil.

A. That means people who have a higher income would pay more taxes at a certain level.

A. I don't know. I would take the mean or median level of income and anything above that would be higher and anything below that would be

Q. The median family income today is somewhere around \$12,000. Somebody earning \$15,000 a year is not what people commonly think of as

A. I understand. I can't answer that question because I haven't gone into it. I don't know how to write the tax code now in specific terms. It is just not possible to do that on a campaign

Carter said the aim of his program would not be to either raise or lower government revenues over-all

'The over-all effect would be to shift a substantial increase towards those who have the higher incomes and reduce the income (tax) on the lower and middle income taxpayers,'

Carter said. In a partial transcript of the interview, transmitted on AP wires Saturday for use in Monday afternoon newspapers, the words "and middle income" were dropped because of a transcribing error. After the controversy arose, a tape recording of the interview was reviewed and the

omission was corrected. White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen and William Greener, chief spokesman for Ford's campaign committee, said the Republican attack on Carter's tax comments was not affected by the transcript correction.

Dole interpreted Carter's statements as meaning the Democratic nominee wants to "raise taxes for half the American families.'

After Carter accused Dole and other Republicans of distortion, Dole responded Sunday night in Florida with a denial, contending Carter is 'on the hook now and he's going to try to wiggle off." Dole said Carter "should drop out of

the race" if he does not have a better understanding of the American economic system than Dole claimed Carter has demonstrated The Kansas senator told The AP in

an interview that Carter has "got a real blunder on his hands and it's probably going to be the major topic in the first debate, or should be the major topic." Domestic and economic issues are scheduled as the subjects of the first debate.

In any event, Congress must approve tax law changes. Carter said in his interview with AP (Continued on Page 2A)

Kissinger's mission said 'breakthrough'

LUSAKA, Zambia — American Secretary of State Henry Kissinger arrived here today and said he would report to Zambian President Kenneth Kaunda "considerable progress" in Kissinger's weekend talks in South

"I brought to South Africa the considerations that had been developed in consultation with the presidents of black Africa and with the United Kingdom," Kissinger said. "I believe that considerable progress has been made towards these objectives.

"I shall now present these conclusions - or the point we have reached - to President Kaunda to see what further steps will be taken.' Kissinger, who was met at Lusaka

Moderates chalk win in Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) - A coalition of three moderate parties ended 44 years of Socialist government in Sweden today with a national election victory that may also set back leftist parties elsewhere in Western Europe. Stocks in Sweden spurted upward on news of the moderate victory, which was interpreted as encouragement for private investment.

Prime Minister Olof Palme scheduled a meeting late this afternoon with his cabinet and said "We'll resign very soon." The new Sunday night. prime minister will be Thorbjorn

The burning wreckage caused a fire in the wooded area that kept rescue workers from reaching the wreckage for two hours.

The crash was the worst to occur inside Turkey's borders, but a Turkish airliner was also involved in the worst crash in aviation history. It was a DC10 that crashed near Paris in March 1974, killing all 346 persons on




Chart shows identifiable channels of federal and state money to MCAA

MCAA uses many grants

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Midland Community Action Agency has been in operation since 1966. During the ensuing 10 years, it received little public attention until events of recent weeks indicated the agency was having problems.

This series of articles examines the functions, operations and problems of the agency.

An annual allocation of \$33,000 from the Community Services Administration (CSA) in Washington is the Midland Community Action Agency's (MCAA) basic grant. It is not, however, its only one.

Adeline Rieger, at CSA, told The Reporter-Telegram the agency did not receive funds from CSA to run a summer recreation youth program this summer. But she added such a program might be funded by either of two Austin offices, the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) or the Governor's Office on

Migrant Affairs (GOMA).
MCAA did run a summer recreation youth program, funded by TDCA through West Texas Opportunities

(WTO) in Lamesa. It also ran a comes annually in four \$8,250 insummer work youth program (not the same thing as a recreation program), funded by GOMA, and a manpower special summer training program, funded by TDCA through the Permian Basin Regional Planning Commission (PBRPC)

The Midland Community Action Agency receives funds from a number of sources linked in an intricate

All the grants are contracts, said Leland Ammons of the Dallas office of the Community Services Administration. Money is almost always sent on a reimbursement basis, meaning money is spent before it is sent. Vouchers and invoices detailing expenditures are submitted to the funding body, and the agency is reimbursed.

There are exceptions to the reimbursement policy. Chuck Doremus of TDCA said programs like a recreation program, which requires equipment, receive money first, rather than on a quarterly reimbursement basis. But reimbursement is the norm.

The principal grant, that which runs MCAA, is the CSA \$33,000. It

stallments. (The fiscal year runs from April 1 to March 31.) The CSA is successor to the Office of Economic Opportunity and is not, Ammons said. part of HEW.

The CSA grant requires a 25 per cent non-federal share match. This requirement can be satisfied by in kind contributions. "Rooms, the gymnasium and auditorium furnished by Midland Independent School District seem adequate to fulfill this requirement," Andrew Reed, CPA, wrote in his fiscal 1974 audit.

Reed also said grants often have an audit clause, with monies set aside. He said he believes the state audits its own programs, that only the federal grants require an independent audit. Reed's audit included the CSA \$33,000, a TDCA-WTO \$2,911 and a

\$2,383 grant from GOMA. A \$10,000 supplementary grant from CSA was a one-time-only allocation, said Carol Burns, former MCAA director. It came in fiscal 1975.

The grants allocated from the Governor's Office on Migrant Affairs, in Austin, total \$70,674 since Oct. 1,

senior editors and reporters that he'll use his debate with Ford Thursday to try to convince American voters that he's not a radical.

Carter said he thinks the debate will "help to alleviate a lot of the concerns about me" by showing "that I am not a radical, that I am not completely ignorant about defense or foreign affairs, that I am a substantial person."

The Democratic presidential candidate said, however, that "unless President Ford or I make a serious mistake," the debates are likely to simply solidify candidate support and strengthen the commitments of voters who now are just leaners.

"President Ford is much better known than I am. He is much more predictable than I am. And I think the juxtaposition of myself with him in the debates will accrue to my own benefit if I do a good job in the debates

Despite odds, new New York lottery flourishing

NEW YORK — It is not true that New Yorkers will gamble on just anything. For example, only those with severely diminished faculties or nothing to lose in the first place will try to beat the odds against making a safe walk through Central Park after dark.

Perhaps because so much of the rest of life in the city provides such a mixture of random uncertainty and quick opportunity, a New Yorker comes naturally to a life of prospecting for the Main Chance, be it a hot tip from Hialeah or a short-sell on a downbound stock.

The latest longshot here is the possibility (about 26 million to one, actually) of winning \$1,000 a week for life (or a minimum of \$1 million; if

you die, your relatives get the rest.)

And all it costs you is \$1. That chance is the promise of New York state's new "instant lottery" game, which, in its first seven days of operation, took in almost \$19 million - with 45 per cent of the take, about \$8.8 million, going into the state's general revenue fund.

So far, from the point of view of both ticket buyers and state officials, the lottery has been a smashing success.

"Beyond our wildest dreams," according to John D. Kuinn, the director of the lottery.

Ticket buyers have the chance of winning \$2, \$5, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000. Certain "jackpot" tickets will guarantee the holder \$5,000, plus the chance to participate in a drawing that could win the grand prize of \$1,000-a-week for life. In addition, the ticket stubs are stamped for different letters of the alphabet, and anyone

able to collect letters spelling "New York" wins \$2,500 in groceries.

When the tickets went on sale Sept. 8, normally calm cigar shops and magazine stands in the city were scenes of pandemonium, with people standing six-deep around cash registers waving fistfuls of money in the air. Some high rollers made purchases of 50 and 100 tickets at once, and normally conservative-spending secretaries on tight budgets were squandering their lunch money for the week in one coffee-break lunge at

The lottery has also represented a bonanza for ticket sellers, who make 6 cents on each ticket they sell.

"I have to go to the bank four times a day now," said Jack Rose, who operates a cigar and magazine stand in the lobby of a midtown office building.

"The women love it." Rose said. "It's just like a slot machine. Right away, you find out whether you won

The first day of the lottery, Rose sold 5,500 tickets. In the first week, he sold 25,000, making his cut \$1,500.

Volume is tapering off slightly, Rose said. On Friday, his sales were down to about 4,000 tickets.

So far, the big problem in the lottery is that the state cannot print tickets fast enough to supply them to ven-

"If I had more, I could sell more," Bob Jallad, operator of a cigarette stand on Amsterdam Ave., said.

NEW YORK - It is not true that New Yorkers will gamble on just anything. For example, only those with severely diminished faculties or nothing to lose in the first place will try to beat the odds against making a safe walk through Central Park after dark.

Perhaps because so much of the rest of life in the city provides such a mixture of random uncertainty and quick opportunity, a New Yorker comes naturally to a life of prospecting for the Main Chance, be it a hot tip from Hialeah or a short-sell on a downbound stock.

The latest longshot here is the possibility (about 26 million to one, actually) of winning \$1,000 a week for life (or a minimum of \$1 million; if you die, your relatives get the rest.)
And all it costs you is \$1.

That chance is the promise of New York state's new "instant lottery" game, which, in its first seven days of operation, took in almost \$19 million - with 45 per cent of the take, about \$8.8 million, going into the state's general revenue fund.

So far, from the point of view of both ticket buyers and state officials, the lottery has been a smashing success. 'Beyond our wildest dreams," according to John D. Kuinn, the director

of the lottery. Ticket buyers have the chance of winning \$2, \$5, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000. Certain "jackpot" tickets will guarantee the holder \$5,000, plus the chance to participate in a drawing that could win the grand prize of \$1,000-a-week for life. In addition, the ticket stubs are stamped for different

letters of the alphabet, and anyone

able to collect letters spelling "New York" wins \$2,500 in groceries.

When the tickets went on sale Sept. 8, normally calm cigar shops and magazine stands in the city were scenes of pandemonium, with people standing six-deep around cash registers waving fistfuls of money in the air. Some high rollers made pur-chases of 50 and 100 tickets at once, and normally conservative-spending secretaries on tight budgets were squandering their lunch money for the week in one coffee-break lunge at Easy Street.

The lottery has also represented a bonanza for ticket sellers, who make 6 cents on each ticket they sell.

"I have to go to the bank four times a day now," said Jack Rose, who operates a cigar and magazine stand in the lobby of a midtown office building.

"The women love it." Rose said. "It's just like a slot machine. Right away, you find out whether you won or lost."

The first day of the lottery, Rose sold 5,500 tickets. In the first week, he sold 25,000, making his cut \$1,500.

Volume is tapering off slightly, Rose said. On Friday, his sales were down to about 4,000 tickets.

So far, the big problem in the lottery is that the state cannot print tickets fast enough to supply them to ven-

The present lottery is the replacement for one that was suspended last printing of hundreds of duplicate for education.

The present lottery was developed by Scientific Games, Inc., an Atlanta firm which has produced lotteries for 10 of the 13 states currently operating them. Representatives of the company say the lottery, controlled by a computer system, is virtually cheat-

So far, only one case of tickettampering, attributed to a vendor in Buffalo, has been reported. The vendor's tickets were confiscated, his license revoked and his name turned over to the district attorney.

The goal for the lottery was to collect \$60 million for the state treasury by March, 1977. According to lottery October by Gov. Hugh L. 



The hijacking of a Dutch depredations by hijacking an airliner by three Palestinian guerrillas over the Labor Day weekend shows why West European nations are on the right track in seeking cooperative efforts to cope with international

Before Cyprus police captured the hijackers the act of hijacking involved a Dutch airliner, the air space of France and Israel and, of course, Cyprus. The passengers came from many nations.

The 18 Western European nations hammering out a treaty to permit stern action against hijackers without stepping on national sensitivities have strong backing from the United States and the United Nations.

The treaty would set important precedents and mark the beginning of multinational efforts to control international gangs.

Heretofore, one of the problems has been the definition of a terrorist as contrasted with a political activist. The treaty draft solves the problem so simply that one wonders why somebody didn't think of it before.

Ministers from the 18 nations agree that any act which needs the assistance of bombs, hand grenades, rockets, automatic weapons and so forth, is not a legitimate political protest. Persons who use these weapons will be denied asylum in the countries which sign the proposed

However, that would be just a beginning. The European nations generally do not condone terrorism now and are vigorous in their prosecution of guerrillas.

Terrorism and hijacking, then, will not be eliminated until the most militant holdout countries like Libya and Uganda are brought into the fold, which brings the focus on the United Nations.

The activity in the hall of nations also is constructive. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim and U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger already have picked up the idea and are urging international cooperation.

In this annual report to the assembly. Waldheim urged action against terrorism, pointedly reminding members that unless they accede to majority rule the U.N. itself will be endangered.

The path ahead, quite naturally, is hard and long. But perhaps Israel's daring rescue of a French jetliner's passengers at Entebbe, in Uganda, which did establish a precedent in international law. will convince even the most militant U.N. members that a joint approach is safer than unflateral decisions.

U.S. site for PLO fund-raising

WASHINGTON - The Palestine Liberation Organization is raising funds in the United States for its guerrilla activities. On at least one occasion, money has been routed through the PLO's Permanent Observer post at the United Nations.

The funds collected from PLO sympathizers in this country have been deposited in a PLO account overseas. The account is used to finance PLO operations, presumably including terrorist raids and airplane hijackings

Through several intermediaries, we have obtained proof of the clandestine PLO collections in the United States. It consists of a thank-you note, written in Arabic on the stationery of the PLO's United Nations office. The letter is signed by Jacob El-Oubedi, the PLO's top fund-raiser in Beirut, and is addressed to the "Palestinian Committee in the State of Virginia."

It relates how the Virginians had collected \$4,084, which El-Oubedi said would go into the "PLO national chest." El-Oubedi's code name, by

the way, is "Abu Khaled." "We hope you will continue to work for our holy cause and a revolutionary victory," wrote El-Oubedi. He noted that the Virginian's money had been turned over to him by the PLO

director in New York, Zoher Tarazi. Tarazi acknowledged that El-Oubedi had been in the United States

Footnote: The PLO is registered with the Justice Department as a foreign agent, but only for "information activities," not fund collecting. There is no registration for El-Oubedi.

them than against me. In a recent letter to Treasury Secretary William Simon, Akins reported: "The Saudis intended to take up my dismissal when Kissinger was here and make a major issue of it. I asked them, as a personal favor,

not to do so. But Kissinger misinterpreted their failure to react, according to Akins. "Kissinger has concluded that their non-reaction shows they got his 'message' and are frightened.''

On the contrary, Akins related how the Saudis had been deriding Kissinger. Because the ambassador had tried to defend his boss, two top ministers, Zaki Yamani and Isham Nazer, "have been taunting me for the last week," he reported, "with my past staunch vigorous defense of Kissinger. Both of them claim they saw through him immediately and take great joy in quoting verbatim my defense of him and his policies."

Kissinger also had the mistaken idea, according to Akins' secret letter, that he had made a favorable impression upon the late King Faisal. The Saudis "find it hilariously funny," wrote Akins, "that Kissinger has claimed that it was he himself the King came to like and trust."

President Ford's silence on SALT attracts comment

By ROWLAND EVANS And ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - Quiet anxiety among hard-liners over what course on SALT President Ford will take if he is elected has been heightened by his failure to answer personally a request from a Capitol Hill supporter for his thinking about arms control.

Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, a conservative upstate Republican and budding expert on defense questions, wrote Mr. Ford Aug. 16 following a personal exchange with the President a week earlier. In the letter, Kemp repeated what he had asked in person: "The question...of whether the issue of SALT transcends all other considerations of relations between the United States and the Soviet

No answer was received from the President himself, and Kemp was not satisfied by an unresponsive reply last week from a senior presidential adviser. All this does not allay suspicion that Mr. Ford intends to negotiate a new SALT (stragegic arms limitation talks) agreement on terms that congressional and Pentagon hard-liners consider too favorable to the Soviets.

Indeed, fear has persisted that Mr. Ford and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger would still try to squeeze out a SALT II agreement before the Nov. 2 election. That is now unlikely in the extreme, thanks to the time squeeze and the Kremlin's caution in dealing with a potential lameduck.

But if Mr. Ford is elected, there is no doubt of a post-election push for a treaty likely to contain a concession totally unacceptable to the hard-liners: virtual abandonment of U.S.

cruise missiles. This apprehension is deepened by the probable departure of Dr. Fred Ikle, Arms Control Agency director who in his softspoken way has courageously fought against excessive concessions on SALT. Neither Mr. Ford nor Dr. Kissinger has been happy with Ikle's frequent dissents, and he will be gone after the election.

Like many other Republican critics of Kissinger's SALT policies, Kemp supports the President come what may and will serve as a Ford campaign "advocate." But less partisan hard-liners wonder whether Jimmy Carter, his position a mystery, can possibly be any worse on SALT than the Ford-Kissinger team. The President's non-response to Kemp only confirms those doubts.

The Ford-Kemp dialog began the week before at the Republican national convention when the President dined privately at the Capitol Hill Club with the Good Guys, an organization of conservative Republican Congressmen. All went smoothly until Jack Kemp rose

during the question period. Kemp questioned Kissinger's

presence in Moscow seeking a SALT agreement while the Kremlin was financing Communist revolution in Angola. More broadly, Kemp asked whether Mr. Ford's overriding desire for SALT II induced him to overlook not only Moscow's African adventures but also its refusal to obey the Helsinki tréaty, its violation of SALT I and its muscular quest for strategic superiority.

Jerry Ford, normally so patient with opposing arguments, was clearly irritated - just as he has been when Kissinger's views are contradicted in top secret sessions of the National Security Council. He lectured Kemp rather sharply, declaring he ought to know SALT is a far greater advantage to the U.S. than to the Soviet Union. Then, concluding on a softer note, he suggested Kemp write him as a prelude to further discussion.

That resulted in Kemp's three-page letter to the President Aug. 16. After detailing the Kremlin's massive arms advances, Kemp warned that SALT I actually "opened to the Soviets the possibility of achieving strategic superiority and a dangerous preemptive first-strike capability."

Kemp then expressed concern about the SALT II treaty taking shape, adding: "No treaty is preferable to one that allows the Soviet Union to maintain the momentum of its strategic programs while handcuffing the ability of the U.S. to redress the emerging strategic imbalance that is a great threat to

peace in the world." Kemp encountered the President publicly on two occasions after he wrote his letter. Mr. Ford each time reiterated his desire for a good, long chat on arms control. But not even a

written reply from the President, much less a long chat, followed Shortly before Labor Day, Kemp jogged the White House with a telephone call. The result: a letter received Sept. 14, not from the

President but from his national security adviser, Lt. Gen. Brent Scowcroft. Kemp considered it unresponsive. The President obviously wants no pre-election discussion of SALT.

Sharp dip in gold prices fails to reduce cost of most jewelry

The ups and downs of the gold market are sometimes reflected at the jewelry counter, but consumers are finding that Newton's law of gravity doesn't work so consistently in the marketplace as it does in

What goes up does not ALWAYS have to come down.

Intangibles — design, labor and fashion trends, for example - can be more important than raw materials in determining prices. At the end of 1974, an ounce of gold

cost almost \$200. There were predictions that the price would go still further with the end of a 40-year ban on Americans owning gold bullion.

The gold rush fizzled. Supply was stronger than demand. The price of gold started dropping and now is just more than \$110 an ounce, although prices rose slightly late last week when bids at the International ounces of gold were higher than ex- ago. By the early part of 1975, the

Shoppers are finding that the cost of some jewelry has declined, but the drops are limited to items which are simple in design and are all gold. The more elaborate pieces, with diamonds or other stones and complicated workmanship, have gone up rather than down in price.

'If it's all gold, then there has been a drop in prices." said Mort Weisenfeld of the National Wholesale Jewelers Association. "There's no question about it. But even there. labor and other costs have gone up.

"If you're talking about a solitaire ring with a diamond, the gold value is negligible ... and the drop in gold has been more than balanced by the increase in diamonds, which are up significantly."

A spokesman for Tiffany & Co., the Fifth Avenue-based jewelry store. said that a perfectly simple, 18-carat-

Monetary Fund's auction of 780,000 gold wedding band cost \$12 five years same ring cost \$35. Today, it's \$26.50.

> The price of the ring went up 121 per cent over five years; in the same period, the price of gold - which had been frozen at \$35 an ounce until 1968 - increased about 175 per cent and the government's Consumer Price Index of all items rose 41 per cent.

> Morton Sarett, president of the Jewelry Industry Council, said jewelry prices have stabilized in recent years. They haven't shown any sharp increases or decreases. And they're not likely to.

> Sarett said that jewelry is sold on the basis of craftsmanship, design and labor. Gold jewelry "has to reflect the cost of the raw materials." Sarett said, but only to a small

For more elaborate gold jewelry. Sarett said, the strength of the demand for the product is more important than the cost of the gold.

Publicity about high prices for gold actually helped boost demand, Sarett said, explaining that "consumers began to feel more comfortable about the investment value" of jewelry in a

Ford apparently gaining slight edge in Midwest

INDIANAPOLIS — President Ford has gained marginally over Jimmy Carter in the big states of the Middle West — Ohio, Michigan and Illinois and now holds an edge over his Democratic challenger in this region, according to views expressed privately by observers in both par-

If Ford is to win the election, it is widely believed that the area he is from, the Middle West, must provide the core of his electoral vote strength. The 13 states of the region have a total of 153 electoral votes, more than half the number needed for a national

In the last several weeks, there has been a shift in a number of polls taken in these states toward Ford, but it is generally in the magnitude of only a few points.

Observers caution that the electorate seems to be in a volatile mood and that the effect of the Ford-Carter debates or other developments probably will lead to further shifts, perhaps decisive.

Carter, a farmer by profession, is also credited with considerable strength in such farm states as Iowa, Oklahoma which have usually voted Republican in recent Presidential elections.

The former Georgia governor presently is given the edge in Minnesota, the home state of his Vice Presidential running mate, Sen. Walter F. Mondale, and a narrow edge in Missouri, a border state with a certain Southern orientation

Ford, on the other hand, is believed by the observers to have fairly solid running mate, Sen. Robert Dole, Nebraska and Indiana. He is given a narrower edge in North Dakota.

Critical in the Middle West, with 72 of the 153 electoral votes, are Michigan (21 votes), Ohio (25 votes) and Illinois (26 votes)

All three of these states have large Catholic ethnic groups, among whom Carter appears to be in some difficulty. 



Argentine government bans Jehovah's Witnesses

BUENIOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - A recent military government order banning activities of the Jehov alh"s Witnesses religious sect in Argenti na follows a surge of terrorist attacks in the last few months against Jews and Roman Catholic priests.

President Jorge Videla, a 51-yearold arms y general who led a bloodless coup that toppled Isabel Peron last March, signed the decree banning the Jehov aln's Witnesses, the first ban of a religious group in Argentina since national independence in 1810.

Police closed the sect's headquarters in Buenos Aires and all its temples in the country. The actions followed recent arrests of sect members and expulsions of sect children in several schools.

The reason given by the government for the ban was that the sect's activities went against the principles of nationhood, because members

refuse to join the army, salute the flag or sing the national anthem.

About 120 sect members have been reported arrested this year and are serving 3½-year terms in military prisons for refusing to enter the army, according to sect officials.

The sect president for Argentina, Charles Eisenhower of Sugarloaf, Pa., said he understood the ban was instigated by what he called "ultrarightist Catholic elements close to the government who have no religious tolerance."

'Jehov ah's Witnesses hav e been in Argentina for more than 20 years,' Eisenhower said in an interview. "So the ban is obviously instigated by a sector that doesn't like us.

He said some military officials told him the ban was imposed because the government feared the sect may have been infiltrated by leftist guerrillas or attracted men who did

no't want to enter the army.







Opium in Turkey now government-controlled

ANKARA - Turkey's second season of resumed opium poppy cultivation is drawing to a close here, and the Turks are proudly claiming that the experiment has been an unqualified success.

U.S. narcotics experts and U.N. officials who have kept a close watch on the poppy fields see no reason to disagree with Turkish assertions that none of the opium produced is getting

into illegal channels. "All the indications are that the Turks have the situation under control," one U.S. official said.

Turkey used to be a prime source of raw opium for the American market. Several years ago, during one of Turkey's occasional constitutional crises when the military stepped in briefly. Washington persuaded the interim government to ban cultivation of the opium poppy.

It was a hard blow for the country's impoverished farmers. Nonusers themselves, they depended on the few hundred dollars they got from poppy cultivation to supplement their miserable per capita incomes, only about \$500 per year in rural areas

The United States tried to soften the blow with \$35 million in transitional aid, but most of it reportedly never reached the farmers. Hence, when

Bulent Ecevit became prime minister three years ago, one of his first acts was to lift the ban on the poppy cultivation.

There was a predictable outcry in the United States, coupled with warnings that high-quality Turkish opium would begin pouring back into the United States.

It didn't happen, as U.S. narcotics control officers here confirm. The tight controls imposed by the Turks

appear to be working, and they are now confident enough that they are planning to increase opium production to meet expanding world pharmaceutical demands.



Stradivari's hometown remains violin center

CREMONA, Italy - Violin maker Giorgio Scolari leaned over his workbench, planing a delicately curved surface on the thin piece of wood, painstakingly shaping it into a superlative musical instrument.

"Every fine violin develops its own personality," he said, brushing shavings from his jeans, "and from this wood and varnish, you hope to create an instrument with a real soul.

"When I finish making a violin, I experience a great sense of satisfaction the instrument, I hope, will live longer than I. But I feel said, too, because the chances are that I may never see it

Scolari is only 24 but already he is acknowledged as one of the coming master violin makers in Cremona - a city renowned for the art since the days its sons Amati, Stradivari and Guarneri crafted superb stringed musical instruments here.

Scolari is one of the new-breed. trained and practicing in Cremona. who have contributed to the city's renaissance in high-quality violin

He produces violins for Milan's famed La Scala orchestra. He trains apprentices in his center-city atelier. Cremona's International School of Violin-Making, which recently moved into a renovated 16th-century palace.

As the school's technical director. Prof. Sergio Sartini, put it: "What we are trying to do in Cremona is train the best violin makers in the world. The goal is to fashion musical instruments with rich, live and brilliant

To call attention to its artisanship. Cremona, a pleasant Lombard city of 85,000 on the Po River in northern Italy, will hold an international stringed instrument festival starting Oct. 2.

Events will include an international violin-making competition, a display of modern and antique instruments, a trade fair and a series of concerts for strings.

"Cremona has become a fine city to teach and work in," said Nereo Zaniboni, head of the Antonio Stradivari organizing committee. 'We don't want Cremona to become the Fiat of violins. We want to encourage artisanship.

"While there may be only about 60 master violin makers in all Italy, a dozen are here in Cremona. They and their assistants make about 2,000 instruments a year, at anywhere from \$1,000 to \$5,000 apiece.

'We do not stamp out the parts as they do in mass production. Everything is done by hand, in the tradition of Stradivari.

Indeed, the presence of Stradivari, his teachers the Amatis, and his pupil Guarneri, pervades Cremona — not only in the streets and squares named after them, but in their instruments in the city's museums.

At the city hall, violin curator Andrea Mosconi took the incomparable violin called "the Cremona." fashioned by Stradivari in 1715, from under its glass case, and began to

'White gold' puts town on map

TINGO MARIA, Peru - A light spring green in color that contrasts with the dark mat of the surrounding jungle, the fields of coca bushes here roll away over the hills to the horizon in a twotone patchwork seamed by the muddy Huallaga River.

A visitor can have a sickly sweet Inca Kola at the Cafe El Gringo on the rutted main street and ask anybody - discreetly, of course - about the town's biggest industry, the coca leaf. It is raw material for the white joy-dust or cocaine, here called "oro blanco," or white gold. The growing American taste for it has been a financial bonanza for Tingo Maria.

A few years back, everybody grew tea or coffee or bananas. Not anymore.

'Well, the bananas would rot sometimes before we could get them out to market, especially in the rainy season. Then disease killed the coffee crops three or four years ago, and tea really is a lot of work for very little money," said a strawhatted farmer over his

Coca, on the other hand, he continued, takes virtually no care, grows well on the seamy near-vertical hillsides and brings in six crops a year. "You just strip the leaves and then poof, another crop in 58 days," he said.

Much of the coca in Tingo Maria is legal. Peru, according to the government's National Coca Enterprise, is the world's largest producer, growing an official crop of 10,450 tons on 40,860 licensed acres, an area the size of the District of Columbia.

The actual planting is probably about 57,000 acres. however, according to the enterprise's administrator, Alejandro Costa. Drug control sources estimate the dried coca leaf production at more than double the official level — perhaps 22,000 tons, or 70 per cent of the world's crop.

Soaked with kerosene in makeshift cement-lined pits, the dried leaves yield a rubbery scum or paste of about 1 per cent of their weight. The paste is treated in clandestine laboratories in Peru, Ecuador and Colombia to become cocaine hydrochloride at half or more the weight of the paste. In other words, Peru's estimated illegal leaf production of roughly 12.000 tons alone could yield 60 tons or more of pure cocaine, and probably does. Virtually all of it goes to the United States.

The crop of legal coca leaves theoretically has another fate, although much of it probably is also tons reduced to cocaine paste for Europe where it becomes novocaine and other anesthetics. The rest goes as leaves to U.S. companies such as the Stepan Chemical Co. of New Jersey, which produces nondrug flavorings for soft drinks. "How do you think Coca-Cola got its name?" asked Costa.

The rest of the legal leaves are all officially accounted for as chewed or made into tea by the country's 3 million native Indians, the vast majority illiterate and poverty-ridden.





WASHINGTON — For 45 years physicaveterans living in veterans' hospitals have been earning pin money and doing therapeutic work by putting together the little red crepe poppies that are handed out on street corners by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

Nearly everybody liked the program and thought it useful. It gave the hospitalized veterans work and a bit of pocket money, and it netted \$1 million to \$2 million a year for the organizations. The VFW and Legion plowed the profit back into rehabilitation services and other charitable causes for veterans

Nevertheless, early this year the veterans' organizations said the program appeared on the verge of extinction, as a result of a 1973 court ruling, a 1974 act of Congress and a Labor Department legal opinion.

They feared that the minimumwage law was about to be applied to the poppy program, and that the government might force the VFW and Legion to pay the hospitalized veterans considerably more perhaps up to the full minimum of \$2.30 an hour instead of a few cents a poppy for their work. That would have made the programs economically unfeasible, according to VFW and Legion spokesmen.

Nobody wanted to kill the programs, but events seemed to be sliding in that direction.

Last week the program was finally saved, but only after months of tough infighting and negotiations, heavy pressure from veterans' organizations and a firm stand by Senate assistant Republican leader Robert P. Griffin (R-Mich.), who threatened to hold up veterans' bills and open up the minimum-wage in a way opposed by organized labor

Griffin lined up 31 cosponsors for a floor amendment exempting the poppy program from minimum wage coverage.

Although they didn't oppose the poppy program, the labor unions and several organizations for disabled persons balked at Griffin's approach, according to several senators. The the idea of piecemeal exemptions to minimum-wage law being tacked onto unrelated legislation, opening the door to piece-by-piece erosion of

Sen. Alan Cranston (D-Calif.), an influential member of both the Senate Labor and Veterans' Affairs Committees was sympathetic to saving the program but said he was caught bet-

Veterans' organizations were pressuring him for the amendment, but labor unions and organizations of the disabled opposed it. Cranston wanted to avoid a floor vote: "People didn't want to choose between

veterans' organizations and unions." Griffin, meanwhile, stepped up the pressure, according to Cranston, slapping a "hold" on several key veterans' bills Cranston was trying to push through the Senate.

Cranston, Labor Committee Chairman Harrison A. Williams (D-N.J.) and senior Republican member Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.) then got hold of the Labor Department and Veterans Administration and said in effect, as Cranston describes it, "Find a way to resolve this without legislation.

Soon afterward the VA unearthed a 1962 law declaring that the VA "may utilize the services of patients and members in veterans' hospitals and domiciliaries for therapeutic and rehabilitative purposes at nominal remuneration.

The VA and the Civil Service Commission, with the Labor Department's assent, ruled that the poppy program constituted such utilization, and that it could continue without having the minimum-wage law applies to it.

The crisis was solved — by administrative methods. An ugly legislative fight that nobody wanted had been avoided, and the program had been saved without change.

The American Legion poppy program started just after World War I, the VFW program in 1922. The wire stems and crepe petals are purchased from commercial suppliers by VFW and Legion volunteers and are taken to the hospitals. The disabled veterans twist them into little flowers and receive up to 4 cents a poppy for their work.

The finished poppies are then collected by the VFW and Legion volunteers and distributed on street corners around Memorial Day and similar occasions, in return for dona-

In 1975, according to Griffin aides, the Legion program employed 3.871 hospitalized veterans, who received about \$300,000 for making 17 million poppies. The Legion spent several hundred thousand dollars for raw resisting groups reportedly didn't like materials and distribution and received more than \$1.9 million in donations for the poppies.

The VFW, according to Thorne (Tip) Marlow, employed several thousand hospitalized veterans, produced 15 million "buddy" poppies, realized \$2.5 million in donations and had costs and veterans' pay of about

New program reduces expense of foster care

No agreement on economy NEW YORK (AP) — The phases of the economy do

not evolve with the same regularity as the phases of the moon. There are no mathematical certainties. There is no assurance, not even for the President, that the future is known.

This being so, there is in this first year of recovery from the recession, in the final few weeks before a president is elected, a divergence of views on whether the economy is pausing or faltering. It is not that our esteemed economists are

withholding their views; they are not. But no matter how self-certain they seem, you have to wonder if their attitude is based on bravado or cynicism or The fact is the economic facts are mixed. Anyone

making a prediction today does so with a goodly number of his indicators in disagreement and with others indecisive. Just weeks before we make the major economic decision of all, that is to elect a president, we cannot say for sure if the economy is healthy or ill.

The econometric model makers geneally assure us that expansion should continue in 1977, but we are then reminded that any econometric projection, no matter how precise its answers, is based on at least a few hazy assumptions.

The big banks tell us they are optimistic, but we suspect that in a questionable situation they would naturally tend to take the bright view, that being the better for business. We know that Alan Greenspan and the coterie of Republican economists will take the most encourag-

ing view, but we have already seen one of their

forecasts, unemployment below 7 per cent by December, become improbable. Jimmy Carter's advisers, we may be certain, are not looking to praise President Ford's economic performance, and so their views will bend with bias, but

we have no proof they know any better how to improve things. We can assemble our own list of indicators and try to add them into a conclusion, but more likely we will one with columns of pro and con that neatly a.m. Saturday for Sunday editions. balance themselves out and leave us no nearer a

Houston strike ends after fifteen weeks

HOUSTON (AP) - Union electrical workers have voted to return to their jobs at Houston Lighting and Power Co. following a 15-week strike.

The union members voted Sunday 1,172 to 636 to accept the company's latest offer and go back work. About 2,600 electrical workers were involved.

Federal mediator E.D. Kincaid said the decision to submit the company's latest offer to the union was made at a meeting with representatives of he power company Wednesday. The striking linesmen and power plant workers had turned down four previous company proposals.

Sihanouk issue raised by death of Mao Tse-Tung

BANGKOK - The death of China's Mao Tse-tung ironically has raised new suspicions about the fate of Cambodia's onetime ruler, Prince Norodom Sihanouk.

That silence has continued at a time when Peking radio is endlessly broadcasting messages of condolences for Mao.

Diplomats in Bangkok, some of whom knew Sihanouk personally, insist that the prince certainly would have sent such a message if the were free to do so. He deeply grateful to the Chinese for their aid during his long years of exile in Peking during the war in Cambodia and had met with Mao on many oc-

Neither Peking radio nor Phnom Penh radio, however, has made any mention of a message from Sihanouk. Peking radio has acknowledged messages of sympathy from Cambodia's Communist Party chairman, Khieu Samphan. It is possible Sihanouk has sent such a message but

it was not publicized and Peking also remained silent out of deference to the Phnom Penh regime.

Whatever the reason, the silence is ominous. It indicates that at best Sihanouk is some kind of nonperson and under restraint. At worst, we might be dead, as the French Socialists feared.

Last July, there were reports circulating in Peking that Sihanouk and his wife, Princess Monique, had shaved their heads and that Sihanouk was following the life-style of a Buddhist monk. They were reported living in a small villa at Takmau in the southern suburbs of Phnom Penh. These reports have never been confirmed by outside sources.

As recently as last March, Phnom Penh radio hailed Sihanouk for his "historic role" in the "struggle against imperialism." ### Stocks log light gain, slip back

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market showed a small gain today after backing away once again from the 1.000 level in the Dow Jones industrial average.

The closely watched average of 30 blue chips, up more than 3 points in the early going, was ahead only .25 at 995.35 by noontime. The average had picked up 16.46 in the three previous sessions

Gainers maintained a 9-5 lead over losers among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues.

Brokers noted hopes for relaxation in the Federal Reserve's credit policy, and encouragement over prime rate reductions from 7 to 6% per cent by New York's Morgan Guaranty Trust and the First National Bank of Chicago today. But the advance faltered at

the Dow-1,000 level, just as more than a dozen others had since early in the year. Sony was the most active

NYSE issue, up 3/8 at 93/8 on sharply higher quarterly earnings. Trading in the stock included a 107,700share block at 91/4.

The Big Board's composite index of all its listed common stocks gained .05 to 56.74. On the American Stock Exchange, the market value index was up .24 at 103.62.

Volume remained active on the NYSE, totalling 10.03 million shares over the first two hours, but it had dropped off a bit from Friday, when 12.95 million changed hands by noontime. 3Carbon Industries, an Amex issue slated to be acquired by International Telephone, jumped 15% to 38. The merger plan calls for a swap of .85 share of an ITT preferred stock for each Carbon Industries share.

We know better, of course. It's a great help to see all of the cards. But South also should know better.

## Industrial accidents down in experimental program

Industrial accident rates have plummeted for a number of firms which award prizes to employes who don't hurt themselves. Some safety experts say the win-something-fornothing drive is more powerful than the instinct for self-preservation.

The National Safety Council says about 10,000 of its 15,000 industrial members use safety programs that rely on the American worker's sense of competition to cut down on-the-job

injuries. Jack Recht, head of the council's statistic division, says these plans called incentive programs - are good ones because it is necessary. continually motivate people to observe safety regulations.

The council estimates that only about 8 per cent of the more than two million Americans who were killed of suffered disabling injuries at work last year were victims of unavoidable accidents. The rest suffered about equally from unsafe equipment or hazardous working conditions and worker carelessness.

It is the latter — the more than 950,000 deaths or injuries that resulted when someone just didn't pay attention or ignored safety precautions that incentive programs are aimed at eliminating.

Ashland Oil Co., pioneered an industrial safety plan based on big prize give-aways to employes with the best safety records. The company has had a 50 per cent decline in accidents at its facilities throughout the United States

over the past 18 months.

In one peak period, time-lost accidents dropped 80 per cent and minor accidents, requiring on-the-scene first aid but no work time lost, went down 20 per cent.

David C. Williams, Ashland's vice president for environmental affairs, says on-the-job safety "is mostly a question of attitude.'

Williams and writer Gaylord Binder, who manages Ashland's programs and planning section, developed the company's campaign 'to accept the challenge of taking one of the dullest subjects in the world industrial - safety and making it interesting."

Binder created three major themes for various periods of the campaign to promote worker-consciousness about

The first was Think Zero Week, preceded by a period of mysterious posters and handbills advising that something was coming but not telling employes what it was. By the time the company unveiled Think Zero Week as a concentrated effort to eliminate all accidents, employes were primed and eager to participate. The result: The goal of zero ac-

cidents was not achieved. But out of more than 25,000 employes nationwide, only 20 work-lost injuries were reported during the week, a 55 per cent reduction from the same period the year before.

Then Binder came up with the Olympic Thinking contest encouraging employes to submit poems, lymricks and catchy slogans about safety. A comparable accident rate reduction was achieved over a monthlong period.

The current, and most ambitious, theme is a nine-month Major League Safety program patterned after the all-American sport-baseball.

Each of the company's 27 divisions was given a "team" title - Slicks. Racers, Binders, Compounders, Stickies, to name a few — and was placed in either the Major League East or the Major League West. Each month, safety records are posted as "team percentages" of wins and losses — the number of accidents reported.

The barrage of posters - which change from time to time and feature various employes dressed in baseball uniforms — and handbills and flyers in employe paychecks supplement the team postings.

But the big draw in the safety campaign under all three themes is prizes. Employes win anything from cases of motor oil to digital clock radios to a brand-new station wagon or a trip anywhere in the world if their divisions post the best safety records. Names of employes from winning divisions are drawn at random to win prizes, so it is advantageous for employes to watch out for others as

well as themselves. Since the new safety campaign began, Ashland has spent some \$45,000 on prizes, printing and mailings. It's difficult to gauge claims as a result of the reduced injury rate. "but it does have some financial returns, definitely," Williams says.

Employes are generally enthusiastic about the program. "It's very well publicized." one winner of a color TV set in the Think Zero campaign. Al Hamm, an

assistant controller at the firm's headquarters in Ashland, Ky. "It makes you very aware of safety on the job. Another TV winner, Anna Horvarth, who works as a lab technician for Ashland in Akron, Ohio, says her

coworkers are much more safetyconscious since the campaign began. "Now, every time someone slips or shuts a drawer on their hand, someone else says, 'Oh, do you think

we can still win?" she says. The immediate results look good but there is some dispute about whether incentive programs are

actually valuable over the long-run. At least one psychologist says giving away prizes to keep employes from having accidents is only a shortterm solution. Dr. Joan Guilford of Orange, Calif., who has done considerable research on accidents, says incentive programs usually peter out after a while.

The workers think someone's trying to do something for them, so they respond by trying to do the right thing," she says.
"But after a while, when the

newness wears off, it generally doesn't work. Recht, the National Safety Council statistician, agrees that "there is no

nice, neat study to show why this method works. "But." he says, "in the judgment of thousands of safety engineers, those programs are most successful, and that's why so many of them use them. If you could explain why they work,

you could take over the safety business right now.' Dr. Guilford and others believes that no amount of worker incentive is as valuable in longrange accident reduction as making sure employers provide safe working environments for their employes.

James Foster of the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration, the government agency which sets and enforces industrial safety standards throughout the country, says there are only 1,200 inspectors available to examine some five million work places for safety

conditions. "We haven't been able to inspect all of them once yet, and we probably won't for another 25 years," he says. "The equipment and facilities factor of industrial safety is the quickest and easiest for us to deal with. The people factor - woruer motivation - is a much more difficult and ticklish problem."

Foster say OSHA uses the basic equation People plus Hazards equal Accidents, and incentive programs can be valuable "in altering the people half of the equation." In that sense, he says, OSHA supports in-

centive programs. At Ashland, David Williams and Gaylord Binder can't explain why their program works either, but, says Binder: "We think we've proyen that people can work safely if they want
