The Labor Department is forming 12 eight - man crews from their own personnel to recruit domestic workers. For farms in this area, three such teams will operate in Texas.

Western Labor says it will continue to operate, although on a more "domestic" basis in the past. That organization has brought in thousand of low-priced labor for farm use in this area. Under the new plan, Western will attempt to continue to fulfil the needs of farmers, and will act as a go - between for farmers and the labor depart-

ment," DeVaney explained. "It will mean that we will have to anticipate the farm needs well in advance. When the farmers come to us for help we will seek to find laborers for them. The farmer, for his part, must determine well in advance the exact day he will need help (See BRACERO Page 6)
