## Prosecutors Seek Limits

 AMARLLLO, Teras (AP) - Prosecutors in the CullenDavis murder trial acted Saturday to restrict the millionaire defendant's freedom of movement both in and out of
the courtroom. "Ine courtroom. legtimate concern," Dist. Court Judge George
Dowlen told a reporter after a closed-door sesion with attorneys for both sides.
The meeting in his chambers occurred after a relative of The meeing in his chambers occurred atter a reative of trial for his life in the 1976 slaying of his young stepdaugh-
ter.
Davis has had almost total freedom to move about the
courthouse and does so daily, talking with friends, spectacourthouse and doess so daily, talking ith friends, specta-
tors, newsmen and anyone who wanders in off the street. "The overall problem is that we're so cramped up here

"But we have to take steps to see that there isn't any

that' . waterpron?"? that's 'waterproof?"' thot a fluoride fabric finish has been applied, which will make the fabric resistant to wetting, now waterproof. The
chemical additive forms a shield around chemical additive forms a shield around
each fiber, preventing the fibers from absorbing watery and oily substances. This
serves two purposes. It hells keep you serves two purposes. It helps keep you
dry in wet weather. The fabric also res. ists stains. ists stains.
You may ask, if the fibers are made
non-abortent, non-absorthent, why isn't that the same
was waterproofed. There are still open spaces in the weave, even though you
can't see them. In a pounding rain, water Can tee them. In a pounding rain, water
will penetrate the "pores" of the fabric. However, it's these open spaces that
make a water-reeellent garment more make a water-repelilent tarment more
comfortable than one that's absolutely comforabie than one that's absolutely
waterproo. In the first instance. the
open spaces allow the passage of air, disopen spaces allow the passage of air, disA waterproof finish is created by apply-
ing rubber. lacquer, linseed oil coming rubber, lacquer, linseed oil com-
pound or synthetic resin to the fabric pound or synthetic resin to the fabric.
These substances close the pores of the fabric making it impervious to rain. However, if worn for any length of time, body
moisture will condense inside the garmoisture will condense inside the gat-
ment creating discomfort. The waterproof cuating may eventually wear off. particularly along the seams. Some
these fabrics stiffen with drycleaning. Water repellent finishes are applied
mainly to tighty woven or knit fabric mainly to tighty woven or knit fabric.
This figures, as the smaller the space between yarns the better. The styling of a raincoat is significant.
A double yoke at the back of a coat over the shoulders provides extra protection, but the under layer must also be waterrepellent. Otherwise, it will serve as a
blotter and invite more water to penetrate. Another practical ploy is the loose
capelet across the shoulders a la police capelet across the shoulders a la police
officers and miltary. Water.repellency is a great idea. but
your cooperation is needed to maintain your cooperation is needed to maintain
its effectiveness. Wash the garment reguits effectiveness. Wash the garment regu-
larly or have it drycleaned if fabric or construction requires it. This prevents an
inordinate amount of normal wear soil inordinate amount of normal wear soil
build-up, which counteraets the water re. pellent feature.
Give prompt attention to oily or grease
stains. Usually, these may be remeved stains. Usually, toese may be reaing the
with a spot remover without leaving lamiliar cleaning ring. Fluoridized fabrics resist absorption and thus block the
'wicking" action that often spreads a stain.
When the article is washable, use water temperature and detergent suitable for
the fabric if untreated. Give special atlention to rinsing. It's absolutely necessary to remove all the detergent. The rea-
son? The detergent reacts to water opposite to the way fluorides act. Detergent pulls water into the fabric, welting it.
Remove the garment from the dryer, Rhile it's still damp and press it with the iron set at the normal temperature for
the fabric. This is a trick that helps pres the fabric. This is a trick that helps pres-

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## Rolling Stones Bounce Back From Adversity

The fact the Rolling Stones have remained together for almost 16 years is a testimonial to the band's elasticity. The Stones remain an enigmatic entity
though their image is not quite as controversial as it was during the much celebrated J987 cryag busts or when the media pinned a devil incarnate image on Guitarist Keith Richard was busted for cocaine in Toronto in February of this year and many said the calamity tolled the Stones 'eath nkel. But that controversy, which occurred at the height of the Margaret Trudeau one, gave Richard
plenty of time to weed through more than 200 hours of live recordings of the biend.
