## Peace Leaders, Prisoner Aid Group To Get Nobel Prizes

OSLL, Norway (AP) - Two women antiwar activists in Northern Ireland and Am-
nerty International , he Loondon-based organization that worts on behali of political prisoners, won Nobel peacce prizes Monday.
The Nobel committee of the Norwegian partiament awarded the 1976 prize to Betty
 Williams, 33, and Mairead Corrigan, 32, for organzzing a broad-obased "Peace Peoand Catholicertremists.
The women launched the campaign more than six months after the Feb. 1 deadiline
for peace prize nominations last year, when all 50 candidates were rejected and no Yor peace prize nominations sast year, when all 150 candidates were rejected and no
award was given. Soviet disssident Andree S Sakharow won it in 1975 . The committee awarded the 1977 p prize to Annesty International for 16 years of ef-
forts to win freedom for "prisoners of conscience" and abolish torture and the death Torst to
penalty.

Amnesty's general secretary, Martin E'nnals, told a London news conference the Desty International has promoted since to itc incepton in 1961 .
The organization appealed to the pubtic evertybere to sign its petition to every government and the United Nations seeking the release of prisonener who on ono advocate

Mrs. Williams told reporters in London: "Weve only been going 14 months and other people have been going for years. But I know how hard we worked and perhaps after all we have earned it"

sehalf of everyone throughout the world who works and longs for peace (and) the nany people who have suffered and have been jailed in the interests of promoting Teace.

Amnesty was the 1oth orgnization to win the peace prize. In selecting it over 53 oth-
er candidates, the Nobel committee called 1977 "the year dedicated to prisonera of conscience."

#### Abstract
