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Something Old... Something New

"We're going to use the box, and put a truck under it," Jackey Wayne Burris, Bailey County EMS director, said Monday about his recommendation to refurbish the ambulance service's 1993 ambulance.

Previously, the EMS and Bailey County Commissioners Court had planned to purchase a new ambulance, using county funds along with a \$35,000 state grant; however, Burris informed the court during Monday's regular meeting that for the first time since the ambulance service had been applying for the state grant it didn't



receive the additional funds, leaving the EMS scrambling to decide how best to replace the 18-year-old unit.

The answer, as presented to and approved by the court Monday, was not to replace the unit... entirely.

Burris explained how the county, working

through Kem Bales of Professional Ambulance and the Houston, Galveston Area Council, could refurbish the '93 ambulance's existing box and place it on a new truck for \$100,025.

"The box doesn't give us any trouble," Burris said, which wasn't the case with the '93 truck it had been placed on.

Since the work would be through the HGAC, Burris said, the county won't be required to bid out the project.

Previously, Burris said he had been opposed to refurbishing an ambulance, explaining that the problem had been with having an ambulance out of service for the approximately

90 days required.

In August, the purchase of a new ambulance because of the "questionable reliability" of the 1993 ambulance was one of the items that drew heated discussion because it required the commissioners court to approve the higher rollback tax rate of .8102.

At that time, Precinct 1 Commissioner Butch Vandiver suggested taking whatever steps were necessary to hold to the effective rate and push back a tax increase for another year — even offering to cut his precinct's budget and asking the other commissioners to do the same.

The county's newest ambulances are a 2000 model with 210,000 miles and a 2006 model with 144,000 miles in August.

"I hate to go another year without an ambulance," Precinct 3 Commissioner Joey Kindle said during the budget discussions.

"We'll have to go up on equipment repair if we don't get a new ambulance," County Judge Sherri Harrison said.

"I think we're setting ourselves up for disaster," the judge said in August. "We're looking at a six-year-old ambulance with \$150,000 miles... and that's the first out."

Council Considers Curfew

Curfews... are they proactive policing or restrictions on the rights?

Although not an "action item" on Monday's Muleshoe City Council agenda, discussion of what will most likely be a lengthy debate at future meetings over the proposed passage of an ordinance setting a curfew for local youth has begun.

Although a member of the city's youth advisory council, local high school student Garrison Myers expressed his personal

opinion at such a proposed ordinance.

"Freedom does not require proof to justify one's decisions," Garrison said, apparently quoting from the National Youth Rights Association at www.youthrights.org. "If a teen wants to take a stroll and gaze at the moon, that's her decision. If a teen wants to go to the park and count blades of grass at 3 in the morning, from what harm do we suffer? Freedom is not the result of exceptions to the law, the laws are the exceptions to freedom."

Littlefield Remains In Sales Tax Allocation Lead

For the second month in a row, the City of Littlefield roared into first place in the race for sales tax dollars, nudging up last month's 32.16 percent by .7 percentage points, and topping last year's allocation for the same period by \$24,293.98.

Of the 10 area communities whose monthly sales tax allocations are monitored by the Muleshoe Journal, Littlefield topped its competition in both percentage points and

actual dollars.

While Muleshoe fared better than Bovina, Olton and Sudan, respectively, it's sales tax allocation — an increase of \$3,100.69, put it in seventh place in the percentage of increase, but still allowed it to garner second place in the actual allocation dollars.

In the same way, Muleshoe is in second place in the year-to-date sales tax dollars, with \$498,654.04, an increase of 3.45 percent when compared to the same period in 2010, but in last place according to

the percentage of sales tax increase.

Littlefield, with its 2 percent tax rate — the

same as Bovina and Friena — also leads in the year-to-date totals, at \$850,548.20, an increase

of 17.63 percent from last year.

Following Littlefield in the year-to-date percentage race are Friena and Earth, both with a 17.55 percent increase. Of the two, Earth has collected \$55,652.04 for the year, and Friena has collected \$297,086.78.

November sales tax allocations were the result of September sales that were reported to the state in October.

According to the office of Texas Comptroller Susan Combs, the state sales tax revenue in October was \$1.87

billion, up 15.9 percent compared to October 2010.

"Strong growth in business sectors such as the oil and natural gas industry boosted sales tax revenue for yet another month," Combs added.

"State sales tax revenue has now increased for 19 consecutive months. Sales tax also grew in the manufacturing industry, as well as consumer sectors such as the restaurant industry and retail trade."

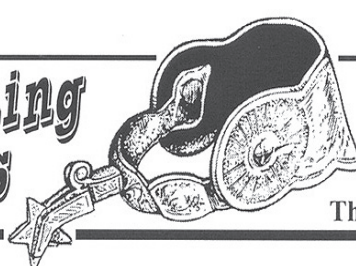
You may now count me among the faithful. Having braved Sunday's weather to successfully marinate my taste buds, I'm hooked, and I'll be back.

Regarding the YAC, Garrison said the youth council members still held differing views on the issue, and would be discussing it at their next meeting.

The initial response from the council members to Garrison's statement was expressed by Gary Parker, who said, "The city is limited on how much money we have to spend," referring to Garrison's suggestion that additional police officers patrolling at night would be a better solution to the problems the city hoped to alleviate through the enactment of a curfew.

"Our police chief would love to have more officers to put on the street," he added.

While Parker admitted the youth attending Monday's meeting were most likely obedient and responsible citizens of Muleshoe, some of their peers were not.

"If we decide to do it,"

Parker said regarding passage of the curfew ordinance, "don't take it personal."

Mayor Cliff Black also responded to Garrison's statement to the council, noting that every one of the reasons for passage of such an ordinance could be solved at home by proper parenting.

He admitted it wasn't fair to punish the youth who do act responsibly by passage of ordinances aimed at controlling those who don't.

"It takes a lot of assistance from a lot of people to make it work," he said.

At city Manager David Brunson's suggestion, a public hearing will be held at the city council's January meeting to seek additional information from local students, parents and members of the community.

In other business, the city council:

- Approved an \$1,830 reimbursement to the Muleshoe Rotary Club from the city's motel and hotel fund at the

recommendation of the municipal staff.

- Approved a \$2,000 reimbursement to the Muleshoe Roadriders for expenditures from its annual motorcycle rally. This reimbursement will also come from the city's motel and hotel fund at the recommendation of the municipal staff.

- Postponed action regarding an ordinance to tax "tangible personal property in transit" at the request of City Councilman Eric McElroy, who wanted additional information on the agenda item.

A public hearing was conducted earlier in Monday's meeting, but no one addressed the issue.

- Approved the minutes from the council's Sept. 12 and 19 meetings.

- Received a report from the youth advisory committee.

- Reviewed the city's investment policy, and received the city's investment summary.

But when they publicly announce that "our aim and our efforts are to defeat the president" I don't see much chance for either of them to do much good.

I always listen to the debates. But it sometimes is hard to tell if they are running "for" the office, or are they campaigning "against" someone because they seem to be against the other

candidates of their own party — and the president.

Frankly I believe in our system of government, and I have respect for the officials that we have put in office. But, as it is with me that can make mistakes, they can do wrong, they are doing wrong, and, I suspect they know it.

Heading home, we detoured three miles south of Hereford. Out in the middle of a field are the only remains of the old POW camp — a large concrete water tower and, lovingly built, a small chapel crafted by the Italian prisoners in memory of five of their comrades who died as captives.

When the war ended,

all of the prisoners were shipped home to Italy, but some chose to bring their families back here to live in the United States, pointing up a massive difference between the experience of American POWs in Germany and Japan, and Axis POWs here.

Draw your own very important conclusions.

A remarkable story. War and all kinds of strife separate people. But those who honor Christ can share his love and beauty even in very difficult times.

Sharing some good sausage and sauerkraut doesn't hurt, either.

Texas October Cattle On Feed Numbers Are Up

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.95 million head on Oct. 1, up 12 percent from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was up two percent from

the Sept. 1 level.

Producers placed 560,000 head in commercial feedlots during September, down three percent from a year ago and down 10 percent from last month.

Texas commercial feeders marketed 490,000 head during September, up three

percent from last year but down nine percent from last month.

On Oct. 1, there were 2.51 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 85 percent of the state's total.

The number on feed across the area was up 10 percent from last year and up one percent

from the September total.

September placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 478,000 head, down 13 percent from the August total. Marketings were down 10 percent from last month to 431,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter

market in the United States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 11.3 million head on Oct. 1.

The inventory was five percent above October 1, 2010, and the second highest Oct. 1 inventory on record.

Placements in feedlots during September totaled 2.47 million head, slightly above September 2010.

September placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 685,000 head; 600-699 pounds totaled 415,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 504,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 865,000 head.

Marketings of fed cattle during September totaled 1.81 million head, one percent above 2010.

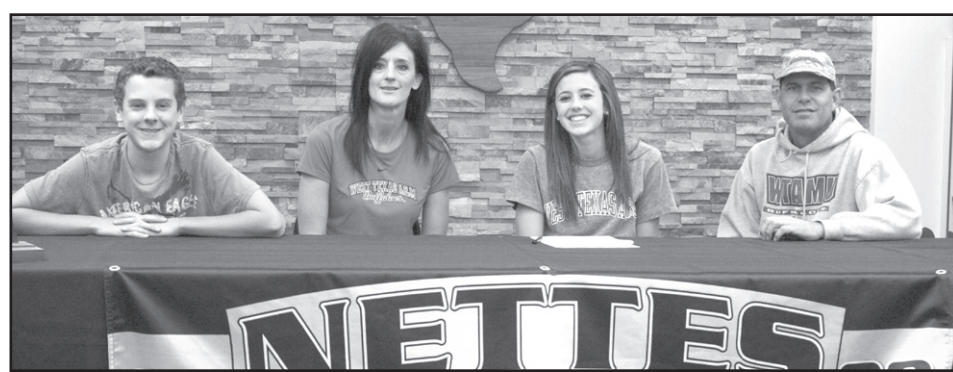
Logan Signs With Texas A&M

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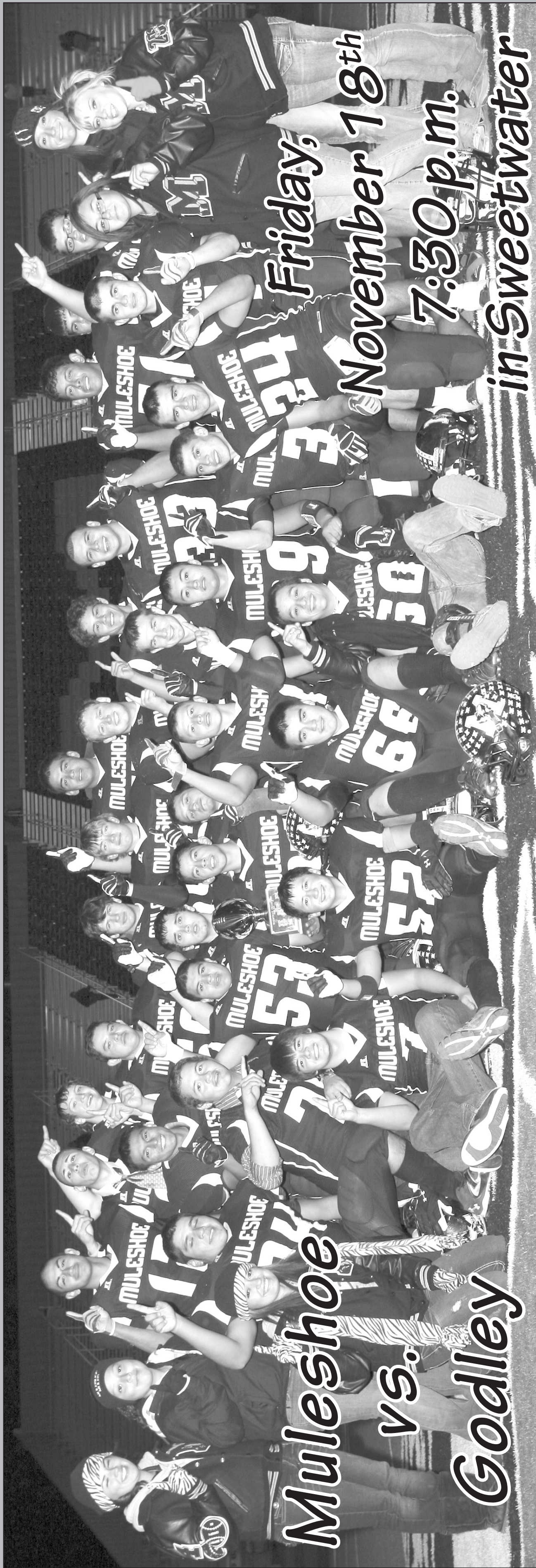


