# **Elevator Explosion Fatal For Young** Petersburg Resident

Avalanche-Journal Staff PETERSBURG - A 26-year-old father mid-afternoon explosion which ripped through the Petersburg Co-Op grain ele-

Mike Morales, who reportedly had been employed at the Petersburg Co-Op for the past three years, suffered extensive burns when a flash fire and explosion rocked this quiet community of 1,300 about 2:30 p.m.

Morales and another worker had been transferring harvested maize from an area east of the 100-foot elevators, then placing it in a dryer before it could be stored in a nearby steel tank

As Morales worked alone in the 18-by-40-foot enclosed, concrete room, an explosion, followed by a second blast 'sentresidents running toward the elevators

Volunteer Mike Hollums, assisted by Bill Isbell, were the first on the scene at the smoke-filled room where Morales re- the elevator

## Prince Says Trip Aging

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Prince Charles said Wednesday that the "unseemly haste" with which he has been touring the United States has transtormed him from a real live prince into a semi-dead one.

But on the second day of three in southern California he managed to fit in a look at the space shuttle, prehistoric tossils and a shopping center display of goods from back home

In the past week I have rushed with unseemly haste around several cities in the nation." he told 1,500 persons at a Los Angeles World Affairs Council

I have been given the opportunity to discover how extremely friendly and welcoming the American people are and how interested American people are in - dare I say it? - a real live prince. Or. in this case, a semi-dead one

The prince's day began with the successful test flight of the space shuttle Enterprise

Charles, who has piloted British jets and helicopters, was supposed to fly by helicopter the 110 miles from the desert test site to City Hall for the traditional key ceremony, but a thick fog diverted the craft to Van Nuvs

Hollums, who had sped to the site from of three died here Wednesday following a the northeastern side of Petersburg, said he sprayed a water hose into the choking smoke in an attempt to find Morales.

After an ambulance sped the critically injured man to West Texas Hospital in Lubbock, firefighters sealed off the area tearing further explosions

Dies In Hospital

Morales died at the Lubbock hospital about 5 p.m. a spokesman said.

The tall superstructure stands about 300 yards east of the Petersburg Independent School where scores of pupils were present for 6th-period classes. However none of the students was injured. Pupils closest to the elevator were

evacuated to the north side of the school and many huddled in hallways as a preaution against further explosions.

According to Hollums, "the blast seemed to follow the tunnel structure of

Spilled corn could be seen on three ides of the elevator storage legs. On the south side of the elevator a pyramid of corn 18 feet high and about 30 feet wide had spilled from a gaping hole in the structure Chunks of reinforced concrete were visible as as far as 300 feet from the

Late in the afternoon, volunteer firemen and firefighters from Abernathy and Hale Center continued to monitor the area and turn back cars that tried to enter the vicinity

Firemen Jackie Swanner, Orville Martin and Eugene Green scaled the structure and attempted to put out small fires in the upper reaches of the building with hand-carried extinguishers

Roof Displaced

A roof on the structure had been displaced several feet after being lifted by the concussion Pieces of glass littered the ground and splintered wood lay near where Morales had been found

Aside from Morales, no other serious injuries were reported. One man reportedly suffered heart problems following the blast and fireman Martin suffered a

Officials had not determined the cause of the apparently spontaneous explosion Wednesday, but Hollums theorized volatile maize dust had been touched off by the dryer or a truck Morales had driven to the elevator

Services for Morales were pending with Lemons Funeral Home in Plainview.

# President Hints Gas Price Veto

Carter indicated Wednesday he will veto the energy bill if it raises natural gas prices higher than the \$1.75 per thousand cubic feet level he originally proposed, a delegation of congressmen said.

'The \$1.75 figure is as far as we should go. It should not be amended," Rep. Andrew Maguire, D-N. J., quoted Cater as telling the group.

The current price is about \$1.46 per thousand cubic feet.

"The President told us that he would veto a bad bill, that he agrees with us that we don't need a bill just for the sake of having a bill and if the bill tilts too much toward the oil company interests, he certainly would not support it," said Rep. Anthony Moffett, D-Conn.

Commitment Seen Spokesmen for the group told reporters they came away feeling they had a commitment from Carter that he would veto any measure with higher gas prices.

Carter has said previously he would veto the bill if it is not acceptable. This was the first time he indicated what is not ac-

Congressional sources had indicated during the Senate debate on natural gas pricing that Carter would accept a ceiling of \$2.03 per thousand cubic feet level on tederally regulated natural gas even though he originally proposed raising the price to \$1.75 per thousand cubic feet. House Backed

However, the congressmen said he told them Wednesday that he supported the House version of the energy bill and would support their efforts to hold natural gas prices to the \$1.75 level in the final energy bill.

The House agreed to the \$1.75 figure while the Senate voted to deregulate the price of interstate natural gas, thus letting oil and gas companies set the price level. The final bill must be written by a House-Senate conference committee.

In other energy action Wednesday, Senate liberals said they will try to kill a sec tion of a \$40 billion energy tax credit bill that would guarantee the off and natural gas industry profit incentives to look for new reserves

Tax Credit Fight The liberals, led by Sen. Henry M Jackson, chairman of the Senate Energy Committee, also were preparing an effort to cut out \$33 billion in energy tax credits for business.

The disclosure of Carter's comments came after a meeting in which six House members handed Carter a letter signed by 67 members, some of them Republicans, who declared they could not vote for compromise energy legislation that would significantly boost natural gas prices above the \$1.75 level, or that would contain "plowbacks or other tax giveaways to the oil companies.

Switch Speculated If only 34 of the 67 signers of the letter switched from their earlier support of the House-passed energy bill, their votes would be enough to defeat compromise legislation unless some original opponents of the House bill also switched

By thus threatening to scuttle energy legislation, Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., argued. "We are giving him (Carter) another weapon that he can use in his arsenal" to win acceptance of a bill meeting administration specifications

Markey said the President made it clear "he doesn't want a bill at any

Disturbed By Report

The delegation members said they were disturbed by the speculation that Carter might accept a regulated natural gas price of as much as \$2.03 per thousand cubic feet

Moffett said the President also said he would stand firm in favoring full rebates to consumers of any crude oil equaliza-

The letter delivered to Carter conclud-

'We do not look forward to the possi-

bility of having to vote against the energy bill, but we feel we must alert you that

We urge you to continue to stand firm in supporting the fair and equitable policies contained in the House-passed national energy act.

In the Senate, Jackson urged elimination of a section in the bill passed by the Senate Finance Committee which requires members of a Senate-House conference committee to approve only taxes which provide "tax and other economic incentives for energy conservation, conversion and production

The move was a direct challenge to Sen Russell Long, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee. That committee

posed in President Carter's energy plan and replaced them with \$40 billion in tax

In reply to Jackson's move, Long said. Unless we put together a bill that couples some of the taxes in the House bill with incentives to produce more energy, then there is going to be no bill." Long has urged the Senate to accept the

bill as written by his committee and has promised that some of the taxes will be restored by House-Senate conference committee negotiations.

# Testimony Ends In Nowlin Case

SEYMOUR - Closing arguments will be presented here this morning in Judge R.J. Balch's 50th Dist. Court in the felony theft by check trial of former Childress cotton broker Vaughan B. Nowlin.

Nowlin is being tried here on charges he issued a worthless check for about \$43,000 on March 5, 1976, to cotton farmer Prentiss Fields allegedly as payment for 187 bales of cotton.

Following final arguments, the case is to go to the seven-man, five-woman jury tor deliberation.

Testimony Ends

Nowlin, who now lives in Durango, Colo.. could face a 2-to 20-year prison term and a fine of up to \$10,000 if convicted. Testimony in the case ended shortly after noon Wednesday after the prose-

cution produced testimony by more than three dozen witnesses The defense, while coming forward with only one witness, nevertheless ended the day with a punch in the form of

stipulated testimor Says Checks Unredeemed

Defense attorney Richard Bird of Childress quoted from a part of a civil suit filed by 31 Paducah area farmers against Nowlin, claiming his company failed to redeem checks totaling about \$375,000 given them in exchange for warehouse receipts representing about i.800 bales of cotton.

Nowlin is being tried on an indictment alleging that on March 5, 1976, he unlaw-

ued at \$43,002.49 from Fields, a Cottle County farmer.

The indictment alleges Nowlin issued a check on First State Bank of Childress to Fields for \$43,002.49. Nowlin did not have sufficient funds on deposit, and payment was subsequently refused by the

Twelve other such indictments are pending against Nowlin involving a total of 1,230 bales of cotton and \$198,415.92.

Bird rested the case for the defense at 1:25 p.m. Wednesday and moved that Judge Balch grant an instructed verdict of not guilty.

Motion Denied However the motion was denied.

Testimony Wednesday brought out that Nowlin met with an attorney and spokesman for the farmers in Bird's office in Childress on March 18 and that Nowlin brought a cashier's check for \$100,000 and produced a deed to a motel in Ver-

But when Douglas Yarborough, manager of Farmers Co-op Gin and a farmer himself, was asked by the district attorney if "this was not enough to cover the outstanding checks that day," Yarborough replied, "that is right."

Balch is due to read his charge to the jury at 10 a.m. today. Attorneys' arguments in the case will follow and jury deliberations in the case will then begin.

# Interconnect Ruling Postponed By Board

THE ELECTRIC Utilities Board voted Wednesday to recommend to the city council that a decision about whether to interconnect Lubbock Power and Light (LP&) with another company be deferred for a "reasonable length of time" or two years, whichever comes first.

After lengthy discussion and the killing of a motion to recommend an intercon nect for emergency power, the board suggested the delay until

-The federal government formulates a national energy plan:

—The pros and cons of a single contin gency interconnect line versus a multiline arrangement are resolved.

-The city's financial status is determined; and. -The possibility of other power op-

tions are explored Adequate Until 1984

Based on Federal Power Commission projections, LP&L's generating capacity should be adequate until 1984. Because no more than two years would be needed to negotiate an interconnect contract and build the line for emergency power or four years to build a new generating plant, the board decided a decision on which route to take will not have to be made until 1979 at the latest.

Board members indicated the postponement doesn't mean the interconnect proposal is dead Jack Powers' motion that an intercon-

nect be recommended and that it be financed by a lease/purchase agreement died on a 4 to 2 vote after LP&L Director Bill Wood noted that several issues remained unresolved and a decision on the interconnect could safely be delayed. Proposed In 1973 In making his motion, Powers said he

believes "we're obligated here" to build the interconnect, which had been proposed in a 1973 electric revenue bond election. The bonds, slated for electrical system expansion, were approved, but plans for the interconnect were dropped when construction costs for the Holly Avenue addition spiraled.

Interest in the interconnect proposal was revived by an FPC report recommending a tie-in and was boosted further by an LP&L blackout in August.

Board members Wednesday could not agree on any aspect of the linkup proposal, including whether there should be one, the part it would play in LP&L's fu-

ture and the extent of service Opinions ranged from wanting a inter connect immediately to prevent higher

construction costs later because of infla

tion, to wanting a delay because a linkup

could hurt LP&L. Board Chairman George Meenaghan questioned whether the interconnecwould "really be the beginning of the end

of LP&L "I think each of us has to answer that on our own," he said. But board mem-

AT THE request of Democratic Party officers, County Judge Rod Shaw says he will seek to break up Lubbock's most populous polling precincts into several smaller boxes.

Party officials said the proposal would

cut down on long lines at the polls, en-

courage more people to vote and bring Lubbock County into compliance with a state law that limits each polling precinct to 2,000 voters. Shaw agreed, so long as the plan does not necessitate changing the overall boundaries for election of state legislators, county commissioners, justices of

cials chosen to represent specific dis-Shaw said he would refine the Democrats' proposal to split the largest voting precincts in two, for submission to the U.S. Justice Department, which under the federal Voting Rights Act must ap-

**Specifications Ordered** Commissioners instructed the county election board and purchasing agent to draft specifications for both lever-type and punch-card voting devices.

The proposed specifications are to be reviewed by the commissioners court Nov. 14. If approved, the specifications will be released to election system dealers. Commissioners said they hope to open bids in December, compare costs and other features and decide which de-

Under the tentative timetable, a me-

chanical election system could be available for local party primaries and city and school district elections this spring.

The Democratic Party used the punchcard devices of Computer Election Systems (CES) in primary voting last year. Wednesday, Madison Sowder, chairman of the Lubbock County Democratic Executive Committee, told commissioners he generally favors the punch-card plan over the lever-style voting machines.

"Most of all, I hope you decide to buy something," he said. "Whatever the commissioners court decides, we'll be better off than we are now.

Largest Paper Ballot County Lubbock is the largest county in Texas still using paper ballots. The practice has been under fire for decades as outmoded. inefficient, error-riddled and requiring

too many election workers. Questions about the lack of voting privacy also have been raised, because the paper ballots traditionally are marked on table tops in view of other voters.

# Reporter Tells Of Heart Attack Recovery

NEW BRITAIN, Conn. (AP) - It was six months ago that a couple of Bristol cops loaded my bones on a stretcher and gave me an ambulance ride to the hospital, right from the doctor's office where I had gone in some distress. The verdict: heart attack.

The next morning he pronounced wat he called my "sentence." I was going

to make it, but I would be out of circulation three months. The analogy a heart patient hears many times is that the damage is similar

to a broken leg. It takes that long to heal. So now I am half way through a year in which the charts say I have an 88 percent chance to make it, as long as I go by the book, keep popping the var-

ious pills and don't overdo anything. Cardiac patients don't live by bread alone. Most of them have their little collections of pill bottles. I take 14 pills a day.

I guess I am something of a disappointment to the specialists. My doctor is a believer in the "by-pass" open heart operation. But as long as the pills are

working and the progress reports are favorable, he isn't pushing it I'm for the medication route, and so far that has been doing the job. Maybe

because I've been a good boy and have observed most of the rules. You cannot overeat, and I do not. You have to take it easy, and I do, most

of the time. I tire easily, and the answer to that is sneaking in snoozes when-

but I haven't advanced that far yet.

There was one setback during those first six months. Late in June, as I was on the mile walk I have measured in my neighborhood -carefully avoiding

houses where there are dogs -I had a minor seizure.

I was hoofing along as usual, sniffing the good spring air and congratulating myself on how well I was doing, when bango the old pressure hit without

Heart patients know what it's like. You get this arresting pressure -not really what you would call pain in the upper chest as it feels as though you are being strangled. You start to perspire and you have to stop in your tracks.

I inched along back toward the house, feeling as though every kid on the block and every housewife and every guy working on his car or in the yard was watching. I took out a notebook and faked reading it, to make it look as though I had a reason for just standing there.

My doctor wasn't amused. That's how I got to spend Fourth of July weekend in the hospital for more tests.

The big one was the surgical procedure — a routine one — called catheteriza-

culation and the old ticker.

Catheterization isn't exactly a fun time, but it is nothing to fear and it really gets - pardon the expression - to the heart of the matter.

Heart trouble, you see, is usually the result of "occluded" vessels carrying blood to the heart. Occluded means the plumbing has gone bad and the circulation is shut off. The catheterization tells the doctors where and to what extent.


The procedure is to make an incision inside your arm just above the elbow. They run a tiny tube inside a vein all the way into your heart. Then they squirt a dye into your heart and watch a fluoroscope picture on a screen like early television to see where the blood is gurgling along properly and where it is hitting a

You don't associate what you seeby the look of ton screen with your own body. I was fascinated by the look of this fishhook in my heart, and the black blobs that appeared when one of the doctors would give another the direction to

The report was that three of four blood vessels were blocked. The main aorta was okay. So that is why the doctor recommends that some day I have the bypass operation. But I show up well on pulse, blood pressure and other tests, so

it's more or less a standoff with the doctor. There are good days and occasionally bad ones when I feel wiped out. Maybe

one day I'll go for the by-pass operation. It's commonplace now. But the recuperation period takes eight weeks. And who would want to miss two months of New Britain politics in a city election year?

Their souls are believed to return at night, so the Garcias will shoot off firecrackers outside the house to attract their attention, and to make sure they find their way

Nov. 2. All Souls Day, is the day of return for the adult souls. Early in the morning of this national holiday the Garcias will participate in the mass offered for the dead in the cemetery chapel. Then the family will visit the graves of relatives, cleaning headstones and adorning the grave with flowers, candles and other

Afterward there is a party in the home, often with special places set for the departed souls at the family dinner table. Throughout the country a special bread

called pan de muertos is baked for the occasion - some in round loaves with crossbones on top, other loaves in the shape of skeletons and coffins. It is eaten only on these two days.

# 'Deficiencies' At Cited Nursing Homes Listed

Although two Lubbock nursing homes recently were cited for deficiencies and placed on "vendor hold" by the state's Department of Human Resources, administrators at both establishments downplayed those deficiencies and said they'll be ready for any future inspec-

Jewell's Holiday House and Colonial Nursing Home were told Oct. 14 they will not be permitted to collect federal money for Medicaid patients until problems are

Following a Sept. 7 visit by Department of Health inspectors, Colonial received a

ell's Holiday House likewise was advised of 11 problem areas after inspectors showed up Sept. 30.

Fred Raby, certification officer for the health department, characterized the deficiencies at both homes as "sanitation problems.

Raby said Colonial was cited for "a general type" of deficiencies. Included in his letter was a statement noting "there was not a sufficient nursing staff on duty at all times to assure that each patient received treatments, medications, and diets as prescribed, and that the patients are kept comfortable, clean and well groomed

Ten deficiencies at Colonial involved

ter said medications were being administered after expiration dates, physicians' orders were not being followed when the medicine was given or during certain treatments, certain drugs were not properly labeled and deceased patients' medicines were not being turned in for

According to the letter, a nurses' station at the home prepared medications three hours in advance, but failed to protect the exposed medicine from contami-

In one example cited by the letter, a patient's ointment, prescribed for a lesion on the right elbow, was not being applied, and the home had supplied no doction nor did it indicate whether the wound was healed.

Other deficiencies noted by health inspectors included: "Adequate isolation techniques were

not used to prevent the spread of infec-Disposable catheters were all opened

"which indicated possible reuse of this equipment' -Physical restraints were improperly

applied -Odor control was inadequate and beverages were taken uncovered to pa-

tients' rooms. At Jewell's Holiday House inspectors say they found the kitchen floor unclean and flour and oil in uncovered containers, a "strong, noticeable odor" in one wing and patients smoking without supervision.

"One bathroom had a dried feces smear on the floor by the bathtub and the shower chair in shower had dried feces on it," the letter continued.

Mildred Parnell, administrator at Jewell's Holiday House, said the state action was "one of those things.

She said the home was cited for "minor things due to personnel not showing up" the day of the inspector's visit.

'They wrote what they saw," she said, "but we're ready for them now." The administrator said she assumed the job several days after the inspection.

We also have a new director of nurses and a new office manager." she said. Lillie Elder, administrator for Colonial Nursing Home, labeled as "common deficiencies" the 20 faults listed in the department's letter.

'We offer good care here." she said. "I live here and the director of nurses lives

The recent furor over nursing homes, the administrator said, has "put them under a microscope. That makes our work doubly hard.

Although she allowed that "people who do the inspections have their jobs and every-day, 24-hours-a-day job."

Until they're removed from "ve hold," the two nursing homes will not be allowed to collect fees for services rendered to their patients who are on Medi-

caid until defects are remedied. Health department inspectors generally make a followup visit to homes about a month after the vendor hold notification

If inspectors find the deficiencies corrected, Medicaid money is released. However, the department may choose to pay the home at a lower rate for the period it is on vendor hold if it is determined that patient care was substandard during

# Santa Rosa Mayor Seeks Aid For City's Water Problems

example set by Crystal City, the mayor of this impoverished Rio Grande Valley town has asked Sen. Edward Kennedy to help Santa Rosa obtain federal funding for a new water and sewage plant.

Mayor James E. Cameron wrote Kennedy last month calling the senator's attention to the \$310,000 federal grant given Crystal City after that South Texas town had its gas cut off for refusing to pay its bill, and to the \$630,000 granted to nearby Harlingen for a new city audito-

Certainly you will agree that our water problems deserve just as much atten-

tion," read the Sept. 29 letter. Santa Rosa officials siad the town's predominately Mexican-American populaton is forced to pay \$3.50 for bottled drinking water or drink the "salty, stinktasting" water from the town's well.

Our water well is in a sand formation and the previous well caved in," noted Carl Arnold, an administrative assistant to the mayor. "We're afraid this one will

Arnold added that in one month the town had been cited for 12 violations by the Texas State Department of Health

The state will not approve another water well and the present well doesn't satisfy the state standards," continued Arnold "It's not like we're not trying to help ourselves but we just don't have the tax base to fund a new water plant. And water without sewage is like talking about an arm of a man - they go togeth-

Santa Rosa officials said they need "about \$350,000" to rejuvenate their water

Santa Rosa is largely a migratory town," said Arnold, "People come here to put their kids in school and the famihes leave during the summer. The latest census figures show Santa Rosa with a populaiton of 1,466 with a per capita income of \$1.268 Our actual population is probably 2,500 but we are close to the border and a lot of people didn't want to be counted The town is 99 per cent Hispanic and that's a conservative figure.

Arnold also said the city needs funds to purchase a new garbage truck. "We have old one that we hought second-hand and it won't last much longer

The town received \$6,202 in federal government revenue-sharing funds last year to compliment "about \$10,000" in collected city taxes

Most of that money goes to street maintenance," explained Arnold. "You could call Santa Rosa a bedroom com-

### Success Seen In Pneumonia Research

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - University of California researchers reported Wednesday a 100 per cent success rate in testing a vaccine against pneumonia in children

Dr Arthur J Ammann said he believes that eventually the vaccine would be given all children, just as they now are vaccinated against polio and other diseases.

The research involved 77 black children weakened by sickle cell anemia and 19 other children weakened by loss or damage to their spleens. A healthy spleen acts as a trap to catch bacteria as they invade the blood stream.

One in 15 young sickle cell patients get pneumococcal infection despite, in some cases, daily use of antibiotics. Once stricken with the illness, a sickle cell patient's chance of survival is only one in

A pneumococcal vaccine was developed in the 1930s, but scientists lost interest in it because of the development of sulpha and penicillin drugs. With antibiotics it seemed there was no need for the vaccine.

But in recent years interest revived because pneumonia was found often to strike children and old people too quickly for the antibiotics to do their job. Also, some research suggests that pneumococcal bacteria may be becoming resistant to antibiotics.

Ammann and Dr. William C. Mentzer experimented with a vaccine developed by the Eli Lilly Co. under a contract with the National Institutes of Health. The vaccine contains material from pneumonia patients that develops eight kinds

of antibodies. With further tests, it is expected the vaccine will produce 14 antibodies and protect against 95 per cent of pneumo-coccal infections. The vaccine does not

defend against viral forms of pneumonia. Ammann said the vaccine is safe, produces no complications and, "We just haven't had any problems with it."

Although antibiotics remain a powerful weapon after a child gets pneumococcal infection, Ammann said, "We have concluded that it would be better if children don't get the infection in the first place."





# So Much For Carter's Pledges

IT IS MOST ironic that two of President Carter's major goals may be sabotaged by the President's own policies-or lack of

As a candidate, Mr. Carter made much ado about his plans for a balanced budget and low unemployment by 1981 at the end of his first term in office.

Today, some of his close economic advisers reportedly are telling him that neither goal is likely to be reached

AS A RESULT, the President reportedly has opted for a program seeking an unemployment rate of below 5 per cent while sacrificing his oft-repeated campaign pledge to balance the budget.

From a realistic, as well as political, point of view he is taking the wiser course.

The truth of the matter is that few voters probably really believed Candidate Carter when he made his promise about the budget in the first place.

But, the unemployment pledge was something more real, especially to the farmers. the jobless and to communities beset by economic ills. All were looking to the new man in the White House to solve their problems.

TODAY, A MAJOR measure of disappointment has set in. Realizing this, the White House is reorienting its goals.

Mr. Carter now reportedly will shoot for a jobless rate below 5 per cent and settle for a 1981 budget deficit in the \$20 billion to \$25 billion range. With the economy facing a slowdown from its near boom rate, even those goals may go by the board.

As long as the administration continues to pump money into wasteful, non-productive welfare programs and does not come to

grips with a realistic energy policy, then we are in deep trouble. And so is the President and his campaign



WASHINGTON-No government official, not even the President, is as secretive—so much of a private person—as a Supreme Court justice

Still, there are expert Court attaches who have compiled an excellent record of knowing what the justices think almost as soon as a thought intrudes on those prestigious minds.

So. after consultation with these observers, it seems a reasonable gamble to put a couple of bucks on one Allan Bakke, who has claimed before the highest bench that the University of California Medical School at Davis improperly turned him away in 1973 and again in 1974 solely because

Bakke's suit is a test of whether it is racial discrimination for a medical school to give favored treatment to blacks and other minorities in admitting new students. The school has an affirmative action program which set aside 16 places mainly for blacks, regardless of relative merit.

NOW THEN. THE aforementioned mind readers say their bosses have tipped their hand in Bakke's favor. They base their conclusion on brief Court order to both parties in the case "to file within 30 days a supplemental brief discussing Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 as it applies to this case.

'I'd have to say it's in the bag for Bakke." said one veteran Court functionary. "Title VI says so. with no if's or but's

A California trial judge ruled for Bakke on the ground that the special admissions program violated both Title VI and the 14th Amendment. The California Supreme Court affirmed the judgment, but confined its decision to a ruling that Bakke's constitutional rights had been violated

THUS, DURING oral arguments, Justice John Paul Stevens asked Archibald Cox, counsel for the university, whether the Court "must consider the Title VI question before getting to the constitutional question?" Cox replied, "No, because the Supreme Court of California ruled on only on

the constitutional question. To the justices, that must have seemed a weak response

The argument can be made, of course, that the medical school's affirmative action program provides equal protection for blacks and other minorities

But I wouldn't buy that. The term "equal protection" is a broad one

MOREOVER, THE Supreme Court historically has tried to avoid basing its rulings on constitutional questions, preferring instead to decide cases on whether they are controlled by federal stat-

Then there is Joseph Rauh, Jr., who represents 40 organizations that have urged the Court to uphold the medical school's program.

The Court's order directing both sides to discuss Title VI in supplemental arguments, said Rauh, leaves him "very troubled."

Contemplating Rauh's feelings, Las Vegas would make Allan Bakke at least a two-point fa-

us Prepared to sell his fellow Tories on the virtues of the Panama Canal treaty, he now opposes it himself. To this Texas politician, Carter has branded himself "just another ultra-liberal even if he is from the South.

We found that attitude prevalent among Democratic politicians we questioned in the oil-producing states of Texas and Oklahoma the week after the President's "rip-off" charge.

Those presidential advisers who see anti-Carter resentment here limited to big oil do not appreciate the hostility among moderate-to-conservative Democrats who last year embraced the peanut farmer from Georgia as one of their own

That the President's difficulties in this region stem from more than oil policies can be seen in the disaffection of three early Carter backers Oklahoma Gov. David Boren and Gov. Dolph Briscoe and Lt. Gov. William Hobby of Texas Their stories possibly point to reasons for the President's national decline

HOBBY: AN ADMIRER of Carter since visiting him in 1971 to observe his reforms as governor of Georgia, the widely respected lieutenant governor has no channel to the administration.

He has been unable, for example, to contact Energy Sec. James Schlesinger. Hobby says he reacted with "sorrow" to Carter's blast at oil but his private reactions are markedly stronger

Briscoe: He was friendly from the start toward the Carter candidacy and risked his own prestige to carry the state for Carter last November.

The phlegmatic governor is genuinely outraged by the President denouncing Texas politicians for supporting natural gas deregulation which had been promised by candidate Carter.

BOREN: THE aggressive 36-year-old governor of Oklahoma represents a highly dramatic change of relationships with the President

The first governor west of the Mississippi to back Carter for President, Boren elicited the now repudiated pledge for gas deregulation Boren was completely cut off from the White

House before the energy program was unveiled last April, his telephone calls unanswered At no time has the President explained to the

governor, much less apologized for, breaking his word on deregulation.

Thus the President's Southwestern slump is caused not only by his stand on oil but how he has taken that stand.

While not trying to soften the blow among his supporters, the President implied that anybody opposed to him is more interested in appeasing the greedy oil companies than in furthering the national interest.

NOR IS RESENTMENT limited to politicians allied with the giant oil corporations, as the White House supposes Govs. Briscoe and Boren to be

Texas state land commissioner Bob Landis Armstrong, a liberal and Carter's Texas campaign chairman, opposes both the substance and the rhetoric of the Carter energy program. Needless to say, his advice has not been asked.

Even more striking is Robert A. Hefner III of Oklahoma City, an independent oil producer and political foe of both the big corporations and Gov Boren

The President's "rip-off" statement is "a theatrical attempt to gain emotional support," Hefner

That sentiment has poisoned the political well, far beyond just oil industry executive suites, for Carter in Texas and particularly in Oklahoma.

Even with this disagreement over oil and unhappiness with his position on farm questions and illegal aliens, the President could restore his position in the Southwest-if he began rebuilding burned bridges to the Borens, Briscoes and Hobbys. The alienation of the Southwest is no less a matter of decaying personal relationships than of unpopular policies, perhaps a hint of what has gone wrong with the Carter presidency.







Years ago, you stayed with one company until you retired," says John standing manager can no longer count on Schleuter, executive director of the Association of Executive Recruiters, a trade and consulting group. "Now, a top executive normally has moved at least three times before he becomes president of a major corporation

It used to be that aspiring executives were willing to work all their lives in the same company, said Schleuter. "but the word lovalty isn't as meaningful as it used to be

People want not just money." he said in an interview. "They want the challenge of moving up, and if they can't do it in their present structure, they will go elsewhere

Companies pay search firms to find executives at salary levels ranging from \$25,000 to more than \$300,000, Schleuter said And more companies are hiring such firms now than ever before

Roger M. Kenny, a senior vice presi dent of Spencer Stuart Associates, one of the world's largest executive search firms, agreed that the stigma once attached to a "jobhopper" has virtually disappeared

In fact, he said, it's no longer considered desirable for an executive to spend all of his productive time at one firm. Young executives now should plan to change companies several times during their careers, he said

We used to get clients saying they don't want a jobhopper, but that definition has changed." Kenny said. "The person today referred to as a jobhopper in a derogatory sense will be one who lists a new firm on his resume every year.

It is not a stigma now to move five or six times in one's career." Kenny said. A person who is unhappy with his job no matter how long he's been there is more apt to move on today.

Kenny said an aspiring manager used to think he had to endure any hardship to work his way to the top.

Now, the executive is likely to crank other considerations into his career decisions," he said. "A most important factor is the relationship with his superior. Another important factor is his family. Still another is the advantage offered by a particular geographic area at a certain stage

**Employe Evaluations Flawed** companies had done pilot tests of their formal evaluation systems to see that

they measured what they were supposed

to. Only one-third conducted job analyses of all positions that were appraised and about one quarter of the supervisors performing evaluations received no training

on how to go about it. In addition, the recently published

study found that most companies use the formal employe evaluation for a variety of purposes: to provide a method of giving workers feedback on their performance; to decide whether a merit raise is warranted; as a basis for promotions; and for identifying developmental needs of employes.

Use of information for such a range of purposes leads to inherent conflicts, say the study's authors. Robert I. Lazer and Walter S. Wikstrom of The Conference Board research staff.

"It is known ... that many managers 'adjust' their ratings of employe performance on appraisal forms in order to justify compensation decisions they wish to make for reasons other than 'pure merit.' Such 'fudged' appraisals then form a poor basis on which to identify the employe's developmental needs," the authors wrote

In addition, the authors said, comments indicated a widespread feeling that supervisors who were required to discuss their evaluation with the employe tended to omit or distort unflattering portions of the report.

"Many managers resent the time it takes to do the job well and, where the system requires that their appraisal be

discussed with the subject, some managers are known to ignore the whole procedure when they can — or else fudge their comments to avoid the embarrassment inherent in criticizing a subordinate's performance on what they consider to be shaky grounds."

Despite such apparent shortcomings, the survey found formal performance appraisal systems are seen by management as necessary and effective.

The survey found 66 per cent judged their lower-level management programs to be effective. The vote of confidence was 63 per cent for middle management evaluation programs and 71 per cent for companies having programs at top management levels

The study found a variety of evaluation techniques in use, ranging from openended essays to check-lists of traits and systems based on ranking competing employes within a department.

But it said among those systems begun within the past year, techniques aimed at defining and rating performance along specific job and management goals appeared to be emphasized more than evaluations of personality traits or leadership qualities. Although employe reviews are not a

new corporate practice, the study said, recent fair employment and discrimination challenges have led to fairly narrow interpretations of the justification of such systems in several federal administrative decisions and court cases.

This, the study suggests, may lead to a need for thorough corporate reviews of employe evaluation programs to make



"If a great many management decisions are being made on the basis of per-formance appraisal data, and the data are at least partially invalid, then the compa nies are making an unknown number mistakes in important manageme

"For this reason a few managers have suggested that companies either abandon the attempt to appraise performance else devote the considerable time and effort needed to develop truly valid systems.

"Things just ain't the same since she's been here." Mrs. Root said. "We were married for six years before we had her and things have changed so much. I don't know how we ever made it without her.

Parents of premature babies, heartened by Pepper's development, have corresponded with the Roots from as far away as Washington state, New York and

"One of them said to 'dad and mother of miracle baby." said Mrs. Root, showing off Pepper's scrapbook.

ELOY, Ariz. (AP) — A geologist whose wife and two children hadn't seen him since his bloodstained van was found in the desert last year says he faked his own death to escape an unhappy home life and the "materialistic, status-seeking" world he lived in. Philip M. Blacet, who was 39 when he disappeared last November, turned up this week in this small Southern Arizona town, where he is living with a waitress and working as \$1.25-an-hour cotton pick-He had left behind his family, a \$90,000 home in Palo Alto, Calif., and a \$26,000-ayear job with the U.S. Geological Survey. "I was unhappy with my home life, even though I still love my wife and kids

very much." Blacet said in an interview with the San Francisco Chronicle. His whereabouts came to light because an anonymous tipster contacted the local sheriff's office.

"I was unhappy with my job. I was very unhappy with the artificial, materialistic, status-seeking sort of world I lived in." he said. "I was running around in circles, not getting anything accomplished.

"By last November, shortly before I abandoned my van, I was in a state of hysteria. I panicked. I tried to think of a way out, and I could only think of one disappearing

He said he parked his van on an Indian reservation, where he had been sent on a geological expedition, cut his thumb with

a knife, dripped blood on his seat and vanished. "I thought that if people would take me for being dead, it would be the kindest thing I could do.

Police in Palo Alto said no criminal charges had been filed against Blacet. His wife, who could not be reached for comment, reportedly had gone to Eloy to see

her husband. Blacet said that after leaving his van, he camped out in the Eastern Arizona mountains for a few weeks. When his food ran out, he said, he contacted 30year-old Frankie Charvarria, a waitress he had met earlier that year and with whom he had fallen in love.

After 10 days of hiding out in a cave near here and living on supplies brought to him by the woman, Blacet moved into

"At first ... I used an alias," he said. "But after a few months, I thought that was unethical, so I used my real name. No one was searching for me any more.'

Blacet said he is enjoying his life as a common worker, although he plans eventually to return to geology.



By United Press International Citing the possibility of violence between Ku Klux Klansmen and members of the para-military Brown Berets if both groups patrol the Texas-Mexico border this weekend, third parties Wednesday asked that everyone leave patrolling for illegal aliens to the Border Patrol.

There were indications the controversy might be merely rhetoric by both sides. Representatives of three other Mexican-American groups issued a statement in Austin condemning any "vigilante" activity and suggesting the Klan might be seeking publicity to increase its dwindling membership combined with over-

reaction from some Chicano activists. "A lot of people see the activities of the KKK as media seeking," said Linda Del Toro, representing La Raza Unida Party. The American GI Forum and National Organization of Hispanic Priests joined

Many observers believed the expanse of 1,933-mile long border, half in Texas, and the thin ranks of the Klan seem to

prevent the Klan patrols from having any

significant impact on illegal entries.

Klan leader David Duke last week by announced in San Diego, Calif., that unarmed Klansmen would patrol for illegal entries and pass the information onto the Border Patrol. Texas KKK spokesman Louis Beam Jr. of Houston said Klan patrols of up to 200 persons would patrol by land and air along the Texas border beginning Friday night.

Immigration authorities, however, said they would refuse to accept any such information, and reaction was immediate from Texas to Mexico City condemning the KKK's proposal.

U.S. Ambassador Patrick J. Lucey in Mexico City said Wednesday "the full force of the law" would be applied to Klansmen who attempt to act against Mexican citizens crossing the border into the United States and Mexican consulates along the border were asked to monitor

rets announced they would patrol for against Mexican aliens or any harrassment of Texans of Mexican origin.

"We'll just ask them (Klansmen) to get out," said Gilbert Herrera, 30, of Lubbock, who identified himself as the prime minister of the Brown Berets of Texas. "The police will put them in jail. We just hope they don't shoot. We're not for violence. I prefer to stop them through talk. There are some people out there who are trigger happy. If we don't stop them, a lot of innocent people will get hurt."

Herrera predicted 1,500 Mexican-Americans would meet in Brownsville Friday night to begin their own patrols. "If they're (the Klansmen) armed, we'll be armed," he said. "We will be



"I think the Kianamen are definitely sick. We get along here with all racial groups," Cortenas said. "I think what they're doing is creating more problems between the Anglos and the Mexican-American community.

"They don't really reflect the local thinking of the local Anglo community. They may be doing it for a publicity stunt, maybe to perk up their membership rolls. It may be a public relations thing to give their membership a shot in the arm.

"I think there may be a large Klan membership area in some areas, maybe East Texas (400 miles or more from the border), but those people are probably

## **Arabs Urged** To Freeze Oil Prices

KUWAIT (AP) - U.S. Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal advised petroleum exporting countries Wednesday that it was in their best economic interest to freeze oil prices at present levels.

Blumenthal, in turn, heard Kuwait Finance Minister Abdul Tahman Atiqi express concern over the steady decline of the dollar and the consequential effects on Kuwait's oil earnings.

A high-ranking Kuwaiti official told a reporter that the dollar's decline certainly would be taken into account when the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) meets in Caracas, Venezuela, on Dec. 20 to decide whether to increase prices or freeze them.

Kuwait is one of OPEC's 13-member states which pegged the price of oil at \$12.70 a barrel.

Winding up an overnight visit to this oil rich emirate, Blumenthal said he outlined to Kuwaiti leaders the steps being taken by the Carter administration to fight inflation and stimulate the econo-

"We think with stable oil prices in the world, that will further help us to reduce inflation," Blumenthal told reporters before flying on to Iran.

# 'No Frill' Products Help Save Grocery Costs

CHICAGO (AP) — By settling for soda cans with no pop-tops and peas that are a star Markets of Boston began a similar lighter shade of green, the grocery shopper can save 10 to 35 per cent on the price of nationally advertised food and household basics, a major food chain said Wednesday.

Jewel Food Stores introduced a nobrand name line of goods for 88 products ranging from shortening to corn flakes that attempts "to peel away all the frills," said Jane Armstrong, vice president of consumer affairs for the city's largest food chain.

The idea is not unique. One of the largest supermarket chains in France introduced a no-name, no-frills line of prodprogram earlier this year.

Miss Armstrong said the Jewel pro-gram features one-size packaging stripped to its basics, carrying no brand name and using standard - or lower quality - grades of products rather than fancy or extra fancy grades. The label is olive green and black and carries no pho-

tographs of the products.

"After an introductory advertising program, we are not going to be promoting the product. We are not offering variety," she said.

For instance, we're removing the perfume from the bathroom tissue, and it fered only in white. The canned peaches are slices, in a light syrup as opposed to an extra-heavy syrup in extra fancy brands.

"Instead of using top-grade, full grain rice, our rice has about 50 per cent broken kernels in it, good for stuffed peppers or whatever. "Our canned peas might be larger and a duller green. You'll find some broken

grapefruit sections in our product. The food is all wholesome and nutri-

Fruit and vegetables are graded by gov-

ernment standards based on ripeness, blemishes, bruising and other factors. Hence, a lighter green pea and a lighter orange-colored peach may mean a less ripe and less tasty product.

Jewel has been market-testing the noname brands since January and found a 'generally, quite favorable" response.

Food prices have become so high that consumers have become very conscious of cost and value," she said. "We felt we would like to broaden the spectrum of quality and price for customers.

Much of the savings comes from lessexpensive packaging.

The dog food is in a plain bag with no plastic inside lining. The vinegar comes in a plastic rather than glass container,"

The no-name brand of soda pop sells for 15 cents for a 12 ounce can, with the difference being lack of a pop-top. A 16.75-ounce can of peas will sell for 19 cents, and four rolls of the bathroom tissue will go for 59 cents.

Fifty-three stores in the Chicago area, four in Rockford and 14 in Milwaukee will begin marketing the goods.

# Federal Reserve Head Urges 'Bold Tax Policy' Revisions

SPOKANE, Wash. (UPI) - Federal Reserve Chairman Arthur Burns said Wednesday "a bold tax policy" to encourage saving and investing would propel the national economy into "an age of sustained progress."

Without a reduction in taxes, especially for business, Burns hinted that another recession was possible. He said an excessive tax burden on business amounting to some \$12 billion in 1976 alone has slowed capital investment.

Without an end of taxation on illusory profits and easing inflation, Burns said it will become "more uncertain whether the expansion is going to continue at a sufficient pace to bring unemployment down significantly, or, for that matter, whether the expansion itself will long

Burns appealed to the White House to adopt a tax policy similar to that enacted by President Kennedy in the early 1960s. Kennedy cut the corporate tax rate from 52 to 48 per cent, instituted investment tax credits and liberalized depreciation among other initiatives that led to more than a decade of prosperity for the Unit-

"If we were able to launch a policy response now that was just as unambiguously positive in its implications for profitability, I for one would have little doubt about our economy's capacity to shake off its malaise," Burns said.

"If we have the good sense to create hospitable conditions for saving and investing, I truly believe ours could become an age of sustained progress in em-

ployment and well-being," he added. Burns' views came in a major speech at Gonzaga University in Spokane. An advance of his text was released in Washing

He said other important issues are energy policy, environmental laws, government regulation and inflation

But Burns said the excessive tax burden on business lies at the heart of the current economic malaise. Unless business is willing to invest in plants and equipment for expansion purposes, there can be little or no improvement in unemployment and national economic health.







# South African Arms Ban Seen By U.S.

Carter will support a U.N. embargo on arms sales to South Africa to demonstrate American distaste for mass arrests and the banning of black publications by the Pretoria government, it was learned Wednesday.

U.S. Ambassador Andrew Young consulted on Wednesday with French, British, West German and Canadian diplomats in New York in an effort to frame a joint strategy within the Security Council for dealing with the South Africa issue.

The council is debating a request by Af-

rican countries for a mandatory arms embargo and a resolution calling on all governments to halt new investment in South Africa

But an informed source at the United Nations said Young was meeting resistance from at least two of the four na-

The source said a key issue was whether to impose the embargo immediately or to issue an ultimatum to the white minority government of South Africa.

One proposal the Western allies were considering, the American source said.

ately, but with the stipulation that it would be lifted at a later date if South Africa meets certain conditions. He did not specify those conditions.

He said another proposal would have the council threaten to impose an embargo at a certain date if reforms are not put into effect by then

High-Level Decision "This is a decision only heads of government can make," the source said. "The instructions are still dribbling in."

Young said earlier this year that sanctions on new investment for fixed periods might be an appropriate course of action against South Africa's policy of racial segregation. In his discussions he is exploring that kind of approach, but it is known that the Carter administration is not ready to support a massive assault on the South African economy.

U.S. economic sanctions could have a more serious impact on Pretoria than support for a global arms embargo since the United States is South Africa's largest trading partner.

American Sales Last year American firms sold South Africa \$1.35 billion worth of goods. U.S. firms have an investment of about \$1.5 billion in the country

Carter is expected to discuss his South Africa decision at a news conference this afternoon. In the meantime, informed officials at the White House and State Department were instructed to guard against any "leaks."

The United States and Britain already observe virtually air-tight arms embargoes of their own against South Africa. But some police equipment and other 'gray-area" gear such as spare parts for old C130 transport planes, are sent to South Africa from the United States.

French Role

France has been a prominent arms supplier for the African nation, but U.S. officials said they understood that country also is now observing an embargo.

A world confrontation with South Africa has been building over the death last month of Steve Biko, a black power leader, and the subsequent crackdown on blacks, their newspapers and white supporters. A final autopsy report concluded on Wednesday that the cause of Biko's death while in detention was "extensive brain injury.

#### Ford Motor Eyes Experimental Car

DETROIT (AP) - Ford Motor Co. is building an experimental car using graphite fibers that will weigh 1,250 pounds less than the same car built with conventional materials, the firm said

Fibers of graphite, a form of carbon, are used in the aerospace industry to give added strength to materials in which they are embedded, much as steel

Lee Iacocca, Ford president, said the 1979 prototype will have as many graphite fibers as possible in its body, chassis and power train. It will weigh 2,750 pounds instead of 4,000 pounds.

the splitting of large polling precincts does not present such complications. Approval Expected

"I believe the U.S. Attorney General's office will approve our reducing the number of voters in any one precinct by dividing that precinct in two," Shaw said. This won't change any of the candidates' boundaries or put any voter in a new district for electing a state representative or other official.

Shaw said he would look at dividing the polling precincts with more than 2,000 voters if additional voting places can be found for the newly created precincts.

# Women's Meet **Agenda Heavy**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Delegates to next month's National Women's Conference will vote on proposals calling for a cabinet-level Women's Department abortion rights for poor women and more protection for battered children and wives.

They also will take stands on proposals backing the proposed Equal Rights Amendment, expanded legal rights for lesbians, a "full employment" policy for women and stronger health safeguards against new drugs, devices and cosmet-

The issues are contained in a draft blueprint released Wednesday by the National Commission on Observance of International Women's Year. The commission coordinated 56 state and territorial women's meetings earlier this year and is in charge of the national conference in Houston scheduled for Nov.

An estimated 2,000 delegate and 10,000 observers are expected to attend the session, the first of its kind.

Former New York congresswoman Bella Abzug, the conference leader, told a news conference that despite prospects of disruption by conservative groups, the Houston convention "will reflect an honest coming together of women" of all views and ages and background.

The agenda calls for votes on proposals for better enforcement of affirmative action laws on the books and more help for homemakers displaced by divorce, desertion or widowhood. In addition, the draft plan calls for a

change in laws relating to marital property and inheritance based "on the principle that marriage is a partnership in which the contribution of each spouse is of equal importance and value.

In addition, there is proposal calling for a stronger Food and Drug Administration to protect women from hazardous, unsafe or ineffective drugs, devices and cosmetics and for broadening current health plans and planning in future ones to meet the health needs of individ-

Carter Upsets Texans With 'Bought' Remark WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, in defending the proposed Panama

Canal treaty last weekend, said something that has upset a few Texas historians. Speaking to audience in Denver about the canal, Carter said, "We have never brought it, it has not been ours. We are not giving it away. There is no semblance between the status of, say, the Panama Canal Zone and Texas or Alaska that were bought and paid for and over which we have always had sovereignty. Carter's view of Texas history runs counter to that of nearly every school child

in the Lone Star State, in which the story of Texas's battle for independence from Mexico is handed down from generation to generation. "The United States certainly did not pay for Texas," said Dr. L. Tuffly Ellis of the state Historicl Association, when apprised of Carter's remarks.

A White House spokeswoman, Claudia Townsend, said Carter was referring to payments made by the United States to both Texas and Mexico after the Mexi-

can War. "We paid Mexico for it," she said. Texas, in 1850, was paid about \$12.7 million for some 73 million acres that became parts of New Mexico, Kansas, Colorado and Wyoming.

The payments to Mexico, totalling about \$21 million, were part of the settlement that ended the Mexican War in 1848. In return, Mexico relinquished its claims to the land that is now Texas and the American Southwest, land which it had already lost in war.

But to say that Texas was purchased is revisionist history of the worst sort, said Ellis. The compensation paid to Mexico in 1848 was for the land that became Colorado, Arizona and other southwestern states, not at all for Texas, he

"Texas won its independence and became a republic in 1836 after the Battle of San Jacinto. It was recognized by Great Britain, the United States and other countries, even though Mexico never recognized it. Then it was annexed and joined the union in 1845," Ellis said.

STUTTGART, West Germany (AP) -State investigators reported Wednesday that some circumstances of the deaths of three imprisoned anarchists last week remained a "mystery," but upheld an autopsy report calling them suicides.

The official inquiry report said investigators failed to determine how the pistols that killed Andreas Baader and Jan-Carl Raspe got into their cells. It concluded visiting lawyers might have supplied them but acknowledged there was no evidence of this.

Leftists claiming the terrorists were murdered held protest marches and bombed West German property throughout Europe last week. A fourth jailed terrorist who officials said stabbed herself denied Tuesday there was any suicide pact. The 40-page report by Baden-Wuert-

temberg state prosecutors and police officials said they found no evidence of murder in their interviews with 90 per sons and depositions by two doctors who took part in the autopsy The autopsy report said Baader, founder and co-leader of the Baader-Mein-

hoff gang, and Raspe shot themselves in

the head, and Gudrun Ensslin, Baader's

mistress, hanged herself with an electrical cord from her cell window The three were found dead in their cells at the maximum security Stammheim prison here Oct. 18, hours after West German commandos in Somalia foiled an air hijacking staged to enforce

#### Ehrlichman Due **Parole Hearing**

SAFFORD, Ariz. (AP) - Watergate conspirator John D. Ehrlichman is scheduled for a parole hearing today, the first anniversary of his arrival at a federal prison camp in southeast Arizo

U.S. Parole Commmission hearing officers will review a report by the Swift Trail Federal Prison Camp before interviewing Ehrlichman in a closed session.

Ehrlichman was convicted, along with former White House chief of staff H.R. Haldeman and former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell, of conspiring to cover up White House involvement in the Water-

Ehrlichman also was convicted of violating the civil rights of a psychiatrist for Pentagon Papers figure Daniel Ellsberg by ordering White House-sponsored burglars into the doctor's office.

Federal judges reduced Ehrlichman's sentences earlier this month from a possible maximum of eight years to as little as one year. The hearing officers probably will in-

form Ehrlichman only that his case falls under "original jurisdiction," requiring a recommendation by a regional parole commissioner and a final decision by two other commissioners in Washington. said Ben Baer, a commission administrator.

"Ordinarily, we get a decision back in 21 days," said Baer.

# Oil Well Fire Today

raging oil well fire spewed unchecked into the sky Wednesday as a crew headed by firefighter Red Adair made plans to use plastic explosives to snuff out the blaze which killed three trapped work-

A searing column of tre towered more than 100 feet over the ruptured well near this southern San Joaquin Valley community. The flames were fed by a virtual bottomless pit of fuel - the estimated one billion gallons in the nation's third largest oil reserve outside Alaska.

The three workmen, dangling helplessly in a basket 15 feet in the air, were killed Tuesday afternoon when the well exploded at the Elk Hills Naval Oil Reserve. 140 miles north of Los Angeles.

"It could burn from here to eternity, said Kern County Fire Dispatcher Charles Conner

The blaze posed no threat to nearby persons or structures. Connor said the nearest community was five miles away Adair arrived from Houston early Wednesday and said he would send for explosives, more specialists and additional equipment. Adair, the subject of a movie in the 1960s, has fought more than 1,000 "hellfires" in oil wells since 1938.

Connor said firemen could do little until the attempt to blow out the fire, set for 9 a.m. CDT today. Firefighters continued to douse nearby equipment and the wellhead with water to prevent them

from melting in the searing heat. Commander Roger Martin, head of Naval operations at Elk Hills, said Adair decided to try extinguishing the fire with an explosion because drilling paraphernalia was stuck in the hole and the explosion could free the debris as well as extinguish

The measure also would force more than six million workers covered by other pension plans to join the system.

The alternative was backed by Rep. Joseph L. Fisher, a Democrat whose district includes the Northern Virginia suburbs around Washington where large numbers of government employes live.

The tax hike was proposed because of the financial troubles of the Social Security system. In recent years the system has been paying out more money in benefits than it has collected in taxes, and govern-

ment and private experts say Social Security will be broke in several years unless changes are voted.

The House Ways and Means Committee voted to make participation mandatory for more than six million employes of federal, state or local governments and of nonprofit organizations. These workers are the last remaining major groups not under Social Security.

Experts say that without money the additional wage earners would pay into the system, taxes higher than those con-

Under the present law, the tax rate is 5.85 per cent of wages up to a maximum yearly income of \$16,500.

# Nurse Testifies In Davis Murder Trial

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - A young British-born nurse testified Wednesday that she overheard Gus Gavrel Jr. say he knew it was millionaire Cullen Davis who shot him because he recognized his voice.

But he said he couldn't see him because it was too dark," Paula Cockrum, 26, testified outside the presence of the jury in Davis' capital murder trial

She said the remark was made at a Fort Worth hospital two or three days after two died and two others, including Gavrel, were wounded in a 1976 shooting pree at Davis' \$6 million mansion

State District Judge George Dowlen indicated he would permit Mrs. Cockrum to repeat the testimony for the jury Thursday. The detense called the nurse to help lay the groundwork for testimony by Tommy Jourden, who shared a hospial room with Gavrel.

Jourden said in a sworn statement he werheard Gavrel tell his father he did ot know who shot him and that his fath-

Well, the girl out there said it was Cullen, so if you're asked, that's what you're supposed to say.

Within hours after the shooting, the elder Gavrel filed a multi-million dollar civil suit against Davis in his son's behalf.





Almost three out four Americans would like to see friendlier relations between the United States and the People's Republic of China, according to a recent Harris Survey of 1,536 adults nationwide. Moreover, by 62-17 percent, a majority favors official recognition of the Communist Chinese regime. In 1971, the margin was 55-20 percent.

One of the factors standing in the way of improved relations is Peking's continued objection to this country's recognition of the Nationalist Chinese regime on Taiwan (Formosa). That regime, with which the U.S. has had a defense treaty for many years, claims to be the legitimate government of all of China, including the 800 million Chinese on the mainland.

Despite the protests of Peking, a 62-11 percent majority of Americans thinks that this country should continue our diplomatic recognition of the Nationalist Chinese government on Taiwan, a country of approximately 20 million people. However, a 46-23 percent plurality believes that some of the problems with Peking could be eased if the U.S. would recognize Taiwan as a seperate country, not having any connection with mainland China. As for the defense treaty, a 57-12 percent majority would like it to continue.

Hike In Trade Wanted Besides their wish to recognize China and to exchange official diplomatic missions, the American people would like to see much closer relations on a broad

-By 75-13 percent, a majority would favor "more exchanges of sports teams between the two countries." The breakthrough in relations between the U.S. and China began with ping-pong, and in recent years, soccer and other sports By 76-12 percent, a majority of Americans wo of cultural missions between the two countries."

Among the key reasons people give for wanting wider relations between the U.S. and Communist China are these:

—An 83-9 percent majority feels that "they are a major world power with atomic bombs and it is better to work for peace with them."

—An 81-7 percent majority holds the view that "we might eventually come to agreement with them on the control of nuclear weapons."

—A 65-16 percent majority agrees that it is important to improve our relations with Peking because "they need to industrialize and modernize their country and could buy much from us in increased trade between them and us."

—A 62-17 percent majority feels that since Communist China is a "competitor and rival of Russia in the communist world, it is our interests to keep Russia and China separate."

Finally, by 45-27 percent, a plurality believes that a key reason for improving relations is that "the Chinese and American people have always liked each oth-

All in all, if the problem concerning recognition of Taiwan can be surmounted, the mood in this country could not be better for a more open and active relationship between the United States and the People's Republic of China.

# City Schools Offer Training For Handicapped Students

Avalanche-Journal Staff

Handicapped students are learning how to be hotel maids, garment workers and assistant chefs under a new vocational program offered by the Lubbock Independent School District

And the youngsters, attending Lubbock's Ballenger School for the trainable mentally retarded, aren't waiting until graduation to apply their job skills

They're making everything from shoebags to weekly lunches for Ballenger faculty and patrons, helping out more with family chores - and volunteering their work at a local nursing home and in other community service projects.

Of course, the final test will come when the students are ready to enter the job market. Even though the Vocational Education for the Handicapped (VEH) program is just a few months old, teachers



are confident their pupils will do well in the employment world.

"As long as they are assigned to a position for which they've been trained, our students will be able to compete with other workers," said Pam Steen, who

heads up the program's food service unit. "In fact, I find that our kids are much more conscientious about doing a job right and following it through to the end

than 'normal' students are." she said. The new vocational training program, open to Ballenger students 14 and older, is divided into three units.

Mrs. Steen's component teaches students about the preparation, handling and serving of foods. After completion of the course, which involves experience in a model commercial kitchen now being installed at Ballenger, youngsters can be qualified as salad makers, dishwashers, assistant chefs and other food service em-

Currently, students are doing practice exercises at the school and taking field trips to various local food service establishments, Mrs. Steen said. When Ballenger's training kitchen begins operation in the next few weeks, the class hopes to offer weekly lunches at the school for teachers and visitors.

Shirley Castle is in charge of the program's general housekeeping unit. which provides training in laundry, ironing, vacuuming and floor care, and related clean-

She hopes to place her graduates in commercial and residential housekeep

ample, in private homes, hotels, motels

Mary Langford teaches the clothing services component, where students learn embroidery and other commercial

Already, her youngsters are at work making aprons - for their classmates in the food service unit - and such products as appliance covers, coasters, shoebags, placemats and napkins.

Ballenger principal Tommy Herring said persons who want to order items from the clothing services class should call the school at 747-3381.

Each class meets for two hours a day. as part of the regular curriculum at Ballenger. By the time they are ready to graduate from Ballenger, most students will have completed all three courses of study and be trained for employment in several different areas, teachers said. Prior to graduation, many students will

be given experience in summer and afterschool jobs. Perhaps the most important aspect of


the program is to give these kids some self-confidence, to develop their self-concept," Herring said.

This is especially important for handicapped students," added Mrs. Steen. They've met with failure so many times in their lives already that it's a big temptation for them to throw up their hands and say, 'I can't do it.'

#### TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

DR. GEORGE C. THOSTESON

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Would you please explain body histamine?

My daughter was diagnosed as having vascular motor instability at about a year of age. She broke out in welts after being exposed to cold. She doesn't seem to have the problem anymore. But she does have bad sinus attacks, and seems to have gas in her bowels. Is all this connected with her body histamine? She's active, and except for these problems almost perfect. Should I have listed these conditions when enrolling her in school? What about sports participation? - A

Histamine is a chemical in all cells of the body. It's produced from the amino acid histidine

In many respects it is still a mystery substance, but appears to be one of the body's important protective mechanisms. When cells "recognize" an 'enemy" in the environment, histamine is released. Some people are more sensitive than others and produce more of it.

It is a powerful dilator of blood vessels. hence, the welts when she was exposed to cold (cold allergy). Dilating the tiny blood vessels allows liquid to escape to the skin surface, causing welts.

There can be an indirect histamine relationship to the sinus problem (allergies). If she has specific ones they should be listed when enrolling her in school. A food allergy can be involved in digestive problems, also.

There is no apparent reason to forego sports participation. The histamine problem often takes care of itself as the child grows older and each of the potential

"enemies" is met and warded off. For example, your daughter is no longer sensitive to the cold, as she once was

By JON-MICHAEL REED HOLLYWOOD — Most serial writers shudder to admit their shows contain melodramatic plot devices. They prefer to describe their shows in high-falutin phrases, like "soap operas mirror life" and "the new-fashioned serials keep up with society.'

Soaps have been a viable form of entertainment for more than 40 years. They have attracted millions of ardent admirers. They don't need such lame excuses for their existence any more than any other form of entertainment does.

The new-fashioned soaps often deal with contemporary problems. They occasionally dispense valuable information about health care problems and ways to confront everything from alcoholism to child abuse. But in truth soap operas are most effective as entertainment when they don't shun their good old-fashioned melodramatic roots, the kind that makes a show riveting. Relevancy is a bonus, but without fantasy thrills and chills, soap operas become grating bores.

A recent storyline on "Days of Our Lives" involved twin sisters Marlena and Samantha who exchanged identities through a series of ploys by the sinister Samantha. The plot is a throwback to the so-called "women's movies" of the 1940s wherein a Bette Davis or a Joan Crawford would switch positions with her twin. To a modern audience the melodramatic plot can be fully entertaining without concern for realistic details. But it can also be revolting to other members of the audience, as a recent letter-writing storm of protest proves. One viewer asks.

# Space Shuttle Passes Final Test

(AP) - Pilots Fred Haise and Gordon Fullerton guided the Space Shuttle Enterprise through its final test flight Wednesday while another pilot, Prince Charles of Britain, nervously watched the bumpy but safe landing.

The one minute, 55 second flight was the shortest and steepest of the shuttle's five test runs. The purpose of the test glide was to determine how well the shuttle's landing and braking system would handle a concrete runway, the same type that will be used when the craft first returns from space in early 1979.

The landing was more dramatic than the first four, which involved smooth touchdowns on the hard, dry lake bed on this huge desert base. On this first try at a concrete runway and bounced back into the air, its stubby wings swaying from Announces Grants side to side.

After one more little hop, the 93-ton craft touched down smoothly and rolled quickly to a stop with 2,000 feet of run- work-study programs for students, the way remaining.

Prince Charles, a former pilot who had day. practiced landing the shuttle in a Houslanding, said NASA official Stan Miller, the Office of Education said.

Haise, who piloted two of the other test flights, said Wednesday's bumpy landing made the test "somewhat of a personal disappointment, because you always want to do the right thing, and in this case, the right thing was to put it down right on the line "

'Overall, however," Haise added. "I'm very happy beause we got the vehicle on the ground safely."



The shuttle flown Wednesday will now be sent to the Marshall Space Flight Cen-ter at Huntsville, Ala., where it will be tested for vibration and stability in prep-aration for vertical launch.

An identical craft now being assembled in Palmdale, Calif., will actually be the first to enter space in the 1979 flight. By the 1980s, space shuttles will be well into their duties — carrying cargo and men into orbit and back in reusable craft.







### Appeals Court **Deerturns** Local Verdict

AUSTIN - The conviction of Everett Joe Hooper in Lubbock County for resisting arrest was overturned Wednesday by the Texas Court of Criminal appeals. which sent the case back to district court for a new trial.

Although the appeals court said it had no transcript of the trial and that no briefs had been filed in behalf of Hooper. the court records indicate that Hooper was not represented by an attorney at his

Noting that there is no indication that Hooper "made a knowing and intelligent waiver of counsel." the appeals court said the conviction and 90-day jail sentence must be reversed

The appeals court upheld the following

Lubbock County judgments: The conviction of Willie Pearl Thomas for misdemeanor theft. Thomas

had been assessed a fine of \$50. The three-day jail sentence and \$100 fine assessed Natividad Villareal for driving while intoxicated;

- The driving while intoxicated conviction of Juan Galvan, who was assessed three days in jail and a fine of \$150.

- The conviction of Joe Bruce Atkinson, fined \$100 for carrying a handgun.

- Eulogio Martinez Guerrero's conviction for driving while intoxicated Guerrero had been assessed 10 days in jail and a \$200 fine

The appeals court denied the appeals of Demesio Mendoza, revoking the Deaf Smith County man's probation in five cases in which Mendoza had pleaded guilty to burglary of a motor vehicle. The sentence in each case was nine years in

AUSTIN — The 99-year prison sentence assessed an Ector County man for delivery of methamphetamine was thrown out Wednesday by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and the case sent back to district court for a new trial

The appeals court, however, said the trail court erred in refusing to allow Parr to explain his previous guilty pleas since it was the prosecutor who first broached the subject of the details behind the convictions.

"We are unable to say that the error was harmless in light of the 99-year punishment assessed the appellant by the jury," the appeals court said in reversing the judgement.

#### Unique Raffle Questioned By State

LAKE WALES, Fla. (AP) - City Manager Kenneth S. Nipper is raffling off prizes to city employes who contribute to a local charity. But the state attorney's office says the prizes may be illegal - days off from work with pay.

Nipper authorized the sale of raffle tickets to raise money for the local YMCA. Tickets sell for 25 cents, 50 cents, 75 cents or \$1. Winners get one, two three or four days off, depending on the price of the ticket. A drawing is set for Friday

Nipper had raised \$700 by Tuesday, when Quillan Yancey, Polk County state attorney, caught wind of the raffle.

Asst. State Atty. James Horrell said it might constitute "two violations in that it's not only a lottery, but state property is being offered as the prize He said tax money is used to pay salaries of city employes, so offering a prize

of time off with pay is like offering state property Nipper said he didn't know the raffle might be in violation of state law. Under the city charter, he said, "as the city manager, I have the authority" to grant people time off for various reasons

Nipper also said he sees nothing wrong with using public money as an incentive for people to donate to a private fund-raising drive

"The money is going to a worthy cause," he said. "If I'm wrong, I'll discontinue it. If I'm right, I'll go ahead.

NO PASSES NO HAPPY TIMES Today Show Host Likes Role

a little more than a year since former White House correspondent Tom Brokaw became one of America's most closely watched and listened to people as host of NBC's Today Show. How has he adjusted to the celebrity status?

"Well, I'm not mobbed (out on the streets) but there is a higher level of recognition," he said in a recent interview. The fact is, I don't let it interfere with my private life."

Brokaw, 37, and his wife, Meredith, 36 - a former Miss South Dakota - live in a Manhattan apartment with their three daughters. They knew each other in high school in Yankton, S.D., and were married after graduating from the University of South Dakota.

"I try to be as pleasant as possible when people approach me," Brokaw said. "I'm always flattered when people
















say they watch the program. If that's part of the price of doing it, it's a small price.

Brokaw said he finds his new job more enlightening than the White House assignment. "The difference is that there I was concentrating really on one man and one institution — the White House which has a lot of different dimensions.

"But here I'm covering a much greater range of issues and personalities and situations. I think it's more broadening, personally, doing what I'm doing now.' Brokaw covered the dramatic unravel-

ing of the Watergate scandal and former President Nixon's resignation. He also accompanied former President Ford on trips to Japan and China.

Brokaw began in broadcasting at 15. After basketball practice each night he

would rush over to KYNT in Yankton for

announcing work.

After graduating from college in 1962, he went to work for KMTV, the NBC affiliate in Omaha. He was transferred to WSB in Atlanta, where his civil rights coverage attracted the notice of network executives. After three years there, he became NBC News correspondent in Los Angeles and anchorman for the local affiliate, KNBC. Then, four years ago, he got the Washington assignment.

Brokaw's workday begins shortly be-fore 5 a.m. and generally ends by 11 p.m. He said he usually leaves the studio each day by about 4 p.m. after preparing the next day's show, but often takes work

home "It's a never-ending job. But actually I see a great deal more of my family now

## Rare Fish Die In Transfer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ninety-lour rare snail darters died during a transplant operation designed to save the endangered species of fish, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service said Wednesday.

The cause of death is unknown, but it is believed a small dip net used by biologists introduced a toxic substance into the water in which the snail darters were being tent while being transplanted, a

being kept while being transplanted, a service spokesman said. The snail darters had been captured Tuesday below the Tellico Dam on the Little Tennessee River and were to b

transplanted above the dam. But soon after biologists put a dip net into the foam plastic containers in which the fish were temporarily housed, the snail darters began turning belly-up, a

The snail darter is one of America's rarest fish, and is the central issue in a court battle over whether the Tennessee Valley Authority should be permitted to close the gates on the Tellico Dam and inundate the spawning ground of the spec-

It's no miracle. Maybe the whole thing's been exaggerated," said the University of Pittsburgh's Matt Cavanaugh. who calmly makes option pitches despite a surgical screw in his left forearm

There's no way I could play with a compound fracture or something like that, but I can play with pain," said the Pittsburgh Steelers' Terry Bradshaw, who never missed a practice after cracking a small bone in his left wrist

While Bradshaw and Cavanaugh stress they are not supermen, they have been able to play because they pass righthanded, because doctors have given okays, because their trainers have built special protective splints - and because they've been determined to play.

"I wanted to come back as soon as possible. I took my health into concern, but I

was very anxious," said Cavanaugh. "I've always had a lot of pride in being able to take pain," said Bradshaw." Even when I was a little boy. I thought if you don't cry you were like daddy, and I

wanted to be like daddy Cavanaugh sustained his injury in Pitt's opening game with Notre Dame. He fell hard on the wrist as he was knocked to the turf after releasing a touchdown pass.

The major forearm bone, the radius, was snapped just above the wrist. The bone was reset, a surgical screw was applied and the forearm was placed in a plaster cast.

Originally. Pitt doctors said Cavanaugh would be out six weeks. He had the plaster cast off in two weeks and was throwing in practice the third week

The next week, he started against Florida wearing a special forearm splint of foam rubber that was heated and molded

to the contours of his rm. The splint material was soft. Hard plastic casts are not allowed in college football for fear they may be used as weap-

"I can see why they have the rule, but in this instance it was not protecting the athlete," said Jay Irrgang. Pitt's assistant head trainer. "Harder stuff would have

been more effective for Matt. Cavanaugh has practiced this week with no splint, only a pad. He hopes to

play that way Saturday against Tulane. The splint hasn't hurt his passing. Last week against Syracuse, he hit 17 of 26 tries and rallied 13th-ranked Pitt to victo-

Yet he also fumbled seven times. He had similar problems in two prior games, and once again he blamed his concentration - not the cast or stiffness in his


"People have been using the cast as an excuse, but it's really my fault," said Cavanaugh. "I'm not concentrating enough

The senior guard had aggravated a back injury earlier in the game on the screenpass play that accounted for Texas Tech's first touchdown versus the Aggies. He tried to continue, but he was forced out of action two series later on the same play that Allison suffered his leg injury.

"I was doubled up when I came off the field," the 6-2, 235-pounder said. "I couldn't stand up for a half."

Wessels first injured his back lifting weights about three weeks before fall practice began and missed much of fall drills. After the A&M game, the injury was diagnosed as a ruptured disc, and he wasn't able to return to practice until last

"I've been running through all the plays, and I went through pass protection drills Tuesday," Wessels said. "I did pretty well on that. My back didn't bother me much at all.

Of course. I haven't had to do a lot of straight-ahead blocking in practice since I've been back, so I'm not sure how my back will react to that. But I was encouraged because I could hit a pretty good lick on that pass protection, and my back

"I'll make the trip and suit out, unless something happens between now and then," he said, "but, if I play, I'm sure it will be sparingly."

Wessels says he's in decent shape, despite the layoff. He hasn't lifted weights since first injuring his back, but has been exercising and feels "fairly strong."

"I haven't gained any weight, which kind of surprises me. Actually, I've lost three or four pounds."

Wessels was expected to be a mainstay in what was a veteran Tech offensive line. The loss of him and quick quard Greg Davis (out for the season with a knee injury) and other injuries in the line have reduced the line's size, experience

"I've been traveling to all the games, but it hasn't been any fun standing on the sidelines," he said. "Especially with Rodney not in the lineup, some of us linemen could have helped provide some experience and leadership. Between Greg, me and (Kenny) Thiel, we had a lot of ex-

Thiel, the starting quick tackle at the beginning of the fall, suffered a severely sprained ankle during two-a-days and hasn't yet regained his original form. Thiel started some last year. Davis had started for two years prior to this season and Wessels had a year of starting time



Wessels said the injury has put pressure on some nerves, so there is some numbness in his left leg below the calf, which causes some awkward moments.





### Pate Returns To Pensacola Course

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — Jerry Pate, a runaway winner last week, has a little something extra going for him in the \$125,000 Pensacola Open Golf Tourna-

"This is my home course," he said after a practice round over the tree-lined, 6,-549-yard, par 71 Pensacola Country Club layout. "I grew up on this course. I've played it hundreds of times, maybe thousands. Over the course of a tournament. that local knowledge might be worth as much as two shots

He didn't need any advantage in the Southern Open, winning by seven shots, the largest margin of the year.

'You can't predict what you're going to do, or how you're going to play, but I don't see any reason not to keep on playing good," said Pate, whose wire-to-wre victory capped a comeback from ailments that threatened his career.

"It was very, very gratifying," said the 24-year-old Pate, who won the U.S. and Canadian opens in his rookie season of

"I won Phoenix this year, the first tournament of the year, and then I got this neck and shoulder thing (a pinched nerve) and I was out quite a while, couldn't play much at all during the summer. I worked awful hard to get it back. I guess the hard work finally paid off.

"Now, I just want to keep it going." Although consecutive victories are rare on the PGA Tour, he's the favorite in the 156-man field that begins a 72-hole chase Thursday for the \$25,000 first prize in the

last official tournament of the season. Major contenders include PGA champion Lanny Wadkins, Johnny Miller, Arnold Palmer, defending title holder Mark Hayes and Ray Floyd, a two-time winner

The field also includes 1977 title winners Jerry McGee, Andy Bean, Bill Kratzert, Dave Eichelberger, Danny Ed-

wards, Miller Barber, Mike Hill, Jim Si-

mons and Gary Koch. As the last official event of the year, the tournament serves as the last chance for players to gain a spot on the top 60 money winners and an exemption from qualifying for next year's events. Roger Maltbie currently holds the No. 60 spot with \$51,462. Ed Sneed, No. 61, is recovering

from surgery and is not competing. Kermit Zarley, No. 62 with \$50,391, needs to win \$1,071 more than Maltbie to move into the top 60.



years ahead of their invasion." he added.

The research will investigate the related ant species in West Texas and the potential for crossbreeding to occur between the fire ant and the other species, and ranchers and a health hazard to all persons in the infested areas, according to a report by the state agriculture de-The fire ant has infested more than 160 Sanders said.

Tech scientists will examine temperature, humidity and other related environmental conditions within the fire ant nest and the ability of the ants to alter these conditions. The research also will identify any potential predators or parasites that could halt the fire ant spread

Fire ants have been spreading at about five to 12 miles per year over the ninestate region, from Florida and North Carolina to Texas, state agriculturists report.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station has investigated methods of controlling the pest for several years through genetics and chem-

"The genetic research is aimed toward developing a sterile male ant," Brown pointed out.





## INVESTORS' GUIDE

Q. You have not discussed the prob-lems of the increasing number of middleaged professional couples with two in-comes who must diversify and also cope with heavy income tax obligations.

A. I think you will find that this problem has been discussed even though I can't get into the subject of individual tax returns, especially in the case of two-income couples. That is a problem for your tax adviser.

However, the highly taxed incomes of middle-aged earners (husband alone and wife) are a problem often presented to this desk.

The answer lies, first, in a highly individualized tax-sheltered program - whether the medium is in the form of a deferred annuity, or in the various tax-sheltered leasing, oil drilling or real estate programs, or in low-yield growth stocks, or in tax-exempt bonds.

The mixture, it seems to me, can be determinated only by a "made-to-order" investment program which not only must take your tax problems into account but - even more important - your ages, resources, family responsibilities, living standards, temperament (ability to assume risk) and your access to tax-sheltered investment advice you can trust.

For example, you say you are worried about having all your eggs in one basket - an aggressive growth stock portfolio managed by one individual. If that worries you (and I can understand that) the program is wrong. I can suggest only that you reduce that growth portfolio to the "sleeping point" — to a level which may limit the hope of some future growth in exchange for less worry today. In your high tax bracket that would mean a partial retreat to the comfort of top quality

tax-exempts. If you can get, for example, 5 1/2 per cent you have the equivalent of at least 11 per cent, taxable and that is not a figure easily come by, year after year, in the equity market. In fact, a longterm (60-year) study of the market shows the average annual reward (dividends plus capital gain) to be about 9 per cent.

The tax-sheltered operations must be entered into only with a broker or agency you trust 100 per cent and must be ac-companied by the understanding on your part that while losses are tax deductible they are not necessarily the perfect goal of any investment. I never said it was ea-

## Last Ditch Try To Save Many Species Underway

Pacific News Service FRONT ROYAL, VA. (Special) — Zoos - long criticized for unnaturally caging animals for human pleasure - may now be the only hope for saving many rare and endangered species.

It is with just that hope that the U.S. National Zoological Park has opened its new Virginia Conservation and Research Center near here in the eastern slopes of the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Rare, endangered or extinct in their natural habitats, more than 160 mammals and birds representing 19 species have been transferred from traditional American zoos to this new "breeding park" in a last-ditch effort to prevent their total eradication.

But officials of the park, a venture of the Smithsonian Institution, concede that their new-age zoo is only a "stop-gap"

"The present loss of animal species and subspecies is proceeding at a rate of one year while dinosaurs vanished at a rate of one species every 1,000 years," says curator Dr. Chris Wemmer

"Industrial civilization is destroying wild animals on an unprecedented global scale, and it is a moot point whether or to what extent the trend can be dimished. No doubt many more large verterate species will perish.

At the new Virginia park, herds of wild zebras, kangaroos, camels, deer and monkeys are allowed to roam and graze freely over some 3,000 acres of rugged rangeland. They are disturbed only occasionally by jeep loads of curious researchers, including college students assigned to specific projects. The public is exclud-

The only similar operation in the U.S. is the San Diego Zoo's five-year-old Wild Animal Park. Unlike the Virginia facility, the San Diego park includes unendangered as well as endangered species, and the public is allowed to view the animals by way of an around-the-park railroad.

Though complimentary about the San Diego program, Wemmer is critical of the role most municipal zoos have played in the past. "While a few zoos can boast of having saved a handful of species," he says. "the representatives of many more dving species trickled through zoological gardens in the twilight of their exist-

Yet, he adds, "we now realize that zoos are the only salvation for a large numberof species.

Wemmer speaks of a new type of zoo one designed not for public entertainment, but to provide a "semi-natural" habitat and sophisticated techniques for animal breeding. We're raising wild animals like you'd raise cows or sheep." he says of his facility. "The meaningful unit here is the population rather than the specimen.

We're hopeful that self-sustaining captive populations of exotic wildlife might span future uncertainties indefinitely at least until world ecological conditions

For more than a decade, the National Zoo in Washington, D.C., had been interested in setting up such a breeding farm to "sustain gene pools of exotic wildlife." But it wasn't until 1975 - when the Government Service Administration declared surplus the Virginia park's current site, a former World War II prisoner of war camp and later a Department of Agriculture cattle research center - that the Smithsonian acquired permanent title to the land, making it available to the Na-

Former cattle pastures quickly were fenced and barn facilities renovated and expanded. By the time the first animals arrived a year ago from the National Zoo and municipal zoological gardens throughout the country, the Virginia research center had been equipped with barns, 11 huge paddocks and some seven miles of eight-foot chain-link fence

Although the park's acreage produces as much as 300 tons of feed (seleniumrich hay) each year, last year's particularly severe winter proved a trying period of adjustment for animals and park officials

"We found our situation to be like that of farmers in an alien land "Wemmer recalls. 'Even though we supplied extra food during the winter months, the animals overgrazed. It was touch-and-go for awhile. Food production for exotic species is still an infantile science. We're trying to feel our way to the best solu-

In recent months, park researchers have been studying an assortment of experimental techniques in range utilization and food management. They plan, for instance, to begin rotating pasture use

While the park is still in its infancy. there has already been breeding of many of the species represented. Wemmer is particularly excited at at "surplus production" of Pere David's deer, which are extinct worldwide in the wild. "The idea is not just to maintain the population, but to increase the number each year," he

Wemmer terms the park's goal an "enormous challenge," but says breeding is proving to be easier in this nearly natural environment than in the closely con"A more complete expression of behav-

ior is allowed," he explains, "because the coexistence of several males in a small confined space is impossible at traditional zoos, the decision of who mates with whom becomes the curator's prerogative." 
Closed circuit television is used to monitor family interactions within each species, and one particularly intriguing research project is studying the communication system among wild dogs.

"Besides giving the species a chance to survive, we're beginning to learn a lot more about their natural behavior patterns," Wemmer says.


