

day introduced two measures make money by participating in amending present housing laws. the program." One bill would amen d the Housing Act of 1937, allowing tenants of low - rent public housing to purchase their home through an accumulation

of monthly rentals over a three - year period. This accumulation could be used as down payment. The tenant could purchase his own dwelling, or another suitale unit in any project of the public housing agency, subject to terms of the bill.

The other measure would amend the Housing Act of 1949 to provide for partial repayment, to the federal government, of the cost of urban renewal projects. This repayment would revenues derived by the local political subdivision. The bill calls for a payment of 10 per cent of the amount of increased revenue growing out of uran renewal projects.

Speaking of his proposal to allow tenants in low - rent housing projects to purchase their homes, Tower said:
