

Pilot Of Big German Jet

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) - Hijackers killed the pilot of a West German airliner, forced it to land in Somalia today and threatened to blow up the plane with the 86 remaining hostages unless an extended ransom deadline is met, officials said.

A West German government spokesman said in Bonn the pilot was apparently shot dead before the Lufthansa Boeing 737 jet took off late Sunday from South Yemen. His body was dumped on the runway shortly after it landed without permission in Mogadishu, the Somali capital.

The four hijackers have demanded the release of 13 terrorists imprisoned in West Germany and Turkey and payment of \$15 million. No effort to meet the demands was reported as the hijackers extended their deadline first to 10 a.m., EDT, then to 10:30 a.m., EDT, then to 8:30 p.m., EDT (3 a.m., Tuesday, in Somalia.)

The West German government let a Sunday deadline pass without any attempt at compliance. However, it sent negotiators to the airport in Mogadishu in an effort to save the hostages, who include a California woman with a heart condition and her 5-year-old son.

The American ambassador in Somalia said German and Somali negotiators convinced the hijackers to extend the dead-

Armed soldiers surrounded the plane at a distance in front of the main terminal in the Somali capital - the jet's sixth stop since two Arabic-speaking men and two women commandeered it over the French Riviera last Thursday.

The West German government said it could not confirm beyond doubt that the dead man's body was that of the chief pilot, Juergen Schumann. But a spokesman said the dead man had a notebook containing the name Monika Schumann, the chief pilot's wife.

Monika Schumann, who has sons aged 11 and 2, told a German newspaper fast week that her husband had expected his his plane might be hijacked some day.

Mark White **Quits Post**

AUSTIN (UPI) - Secretary of State Mark White Jr. resigned that office today and announced he will seek the Demoeratic nomination for attorney general next year.

White, in a news conference on the Capitol lawn, sharply criticized his opponent in the attorney general race - former Speaker Price Daniel Jr. - and accused Daniel of attempting to use his father's reputation to win election to the statewide office. Price Daniel Sr. is a former governor and now a member of the Texas Supreme Court.

Dozens of White's employes left their offices and stood on the shaded lawn to applaud White's stinging criticisms.

Motorists Stranded In Snow

An early autumn snowstorm, striking with midwinter ferocity, today maroone hundreds of motorists and knocked out power to thousands of homes in Pennsylvania. Travelers were stranded all the way from upstate New York to Great Smoky National Park in Tennessee and North Carolina.

But Texans were much more fortunate, with temperatures in the 80s today and forecasts that a weak cold front Tuesday will only drop the high readings to the

The New England storm system played its mischief in the form of gale warnings off the southern New England coast early today and rain and snow from New York state and Pennsylvania into the lower Great Lakes and upper Ohio Valley. The snow forced officials to close the entire 105-mile Skyline Drive in Virginia and U.S. 441 in Great Smoky Park.

Cars backed up for eight miles and snowplows were wheeled out to clear Interstate 80 and 81 near Hazleton, Pa.

About 3,100 persons were without pow er at Williamsport, Pa. Some schools closed in Williamsport, Scranton and

Meanwhile, Lubbock temperatures climbed from a tolerable 45 degrees the low for the day - at 9 a.m. to 65 by midmorning. Winds were light this morning, but National Weather Service predictions called for breezes of 15-20 mph later today, changing from westerly to nor-

theasterly readings of 10-15 mph tonight. High today is expected to reach the low 80s for the Lubbock area. The passage of the weak front should keep the mercury in the mid-70s on Tuesday. Lows tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court cleared the way today for landings of the Concorde supersonic jetliner at New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport. An airline spokesman said the plane would be test-landed Wednesday and might begin daily flights Nov. 22.

British Airways and Air France said through spokesmen in New York that they would conduct a joint familiarization flight to Kennedy Airport Wednesday morning on a Concorde taking off

from Paris. The carriers said they hoped to begin daily service from London and Paris to Kennedy by Nov. 22.



On Sept. 29, the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New York rejected two requests by the port authority to overturn a federal trial court's ruling that Concorde operations at JFK could begin Oct. 20.

In its ruling, however, the appeals court said landings could begin "forthwith," and spokesmen for both airlines had said they intended to touch down the first of a series of test flights sometime in mid-October.

But after being asked by the port authority to temporarily postpone the effect of the appeals court ruling, the Supreme Court on Oct. 7 ordered that the landings be delayed while it considered the request.

In that request, port authority lawyer Patrick Falvey said the appeals court's ruling would cause irreparable harm because it would permit Concorde operations "before the authority has determined that such flights will not result in successful noise suits.'

Falvey described JFK, situated in the New York borough of Queens, as "one of the busiest international airports in the world situated in a noise-sensitive community of almost 500,000 homeowners."

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is unwilling to accept any compromise energy bill that contains any form of natural gas deregulation, the chairman of the Senate energy committee said today. Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., said that as a result, there may be no natural

gas legislation enacted this year. "The administration is going to be very tough and I'm pleased," Jackson said in

House and Senate conferees begin work on Tuesday on hammering out a compromise energy bill. Jackson is the head of the Senate's team of conferees.

Although the House has passed Carter's

cards," Jackson said. "Either there is no bill and the price remains at \$1.46 or if there's a bill with deregulation, the President will veto it."

And Jackson said the administration has indicated it would prefer no bill at all


to the Senate-passed measure. Jackson had offered a "compromise" on the Senate floor during the natural gas

Jackson's proposed compromise had been viewed as a possible middle ground for the House-Senate conferees to adopt. But Jackson said today that even this phased form of deregulation would probably be vetoed by the President.

He said he doesn't intend to even bring

it up again. The natural gas issue will be the last item the conferees consider.

By JUAN O. TAMAYO NEW YORK (UPI) - Marta Martinez was a weeping 8-year-old the day she left Fidel Castro's Cuba in 1962. She's now a doe-eved 24-year-old beauty who wants

to return to seek out the Latin heritage

that still stirs her heart. The day we left Cuba was a grueling day. I cried a lot and when I got on the plane I knew I was not going — I mean I thought I was not going back," she says.

Marta is part of a swelling number of young Cuban exiles who grew up in America and now want to visit the island. Some are Castro sympathizers. Most are just plain homesick

Some have drifted away from the fierce hatred of communism voiced by the great majority of the 800,000 Cubans in America, and still regard the island as home and Castro's government a reality that must be lived with.

A few have already gone back for a first-hand look at the 16-year-old-Communist regime while others are anxiously sweating out the long process of getting Cuban visas.

Marta has yet to apply for a visa, but her dark eyes glow when she discusses the prospect of a flight to Cuba from New York — where she works for a suburban newspaper — to search for her heritage. Her years in Cuba and in America have left her in a cultural limbo, "sort of like you don't belong to them, but you don't belong to the Americans. I've got to go ... I still think of it as home, as

Rene Rodriguez, a 27-year-old doctor, uses almost the same words to explain his burning desire to return to Havana after 15 years in Connecticut, Washington, D.C., and finally southern California.

"I'm too acclimated to the United States to say 'Yes, I'd like to go back to stay," but it's not out of the question," he says. "I've got to find my roots. I feel sort

If he goes, Rene would take along his American girlfriend to "show her the island and tell her, 'This is what made me," he says.

Rene says he believes Castro "has done more good for Cuba than anyone before." but both he and Marta point up his alleged human rights violations as their key reservation about the Communist re-

Two other Cubans who want to return but refused to be identified are pair of New Yorkers active in a pro-Castro magazine. Areito. Its Miami offices have been bombed more than once.

Both said the Vietnam War and civil rights movement of the 1960s - turbulent eras that disillusioned many young Americans - did the same for them and led them to reconsider the role of Castro in Cuba.

'Vietnam had much influence on me. It opened my eyes in the sense that the United States was backing a tyrannical government in the name of democracy," said Zenon, a 31-year-old social worker who grew up in Pittsburgh.

"Looking at the poverty that existed in this country and the lack of equality, it began to break the aura that the United States had of democratic equality, that everyone lived right," he said.

Maria, a 26-year-old sculptress, says she is a "socialist" who supports Castro's revolution and will go back for a visit in December "to see how the socialist system works. I want more information

Asked if she was bothered by Castro's imprisonment of political dissidents, she said, "I have worked in this country's jails and there are political prisoners there, though no one mentions it.

Son Wants Parents **Evicted From Home**

SEATTLE (AP) - Thomas Rhodes Jr. says he owns his parents' home and wants them evicted. But Thomas and Sarah Rhodes claim the home is legally theirs and their son "will have to throw

The dispute has spilled over to neighbors in the quiet Green Lake area where the house is located Petitions are circulating and there has been talk of violence if the elderly Rhodes are forced to move.

"I have lain in bed at nights and just wondered what he is mad at me for." said Sarah Rhodes. "I just don't quite understand it. If you can't trust your son, then who can you trust?

Court records indicate the case dates back to 1968 when Thomas Jr., now 39, tound the house for his parents. During that summer, the house was purchased for \$19,000, the father putting up \$1,000 and the son \$2,000 as a down payment.

Records show all the legal papers for the house were signed by Thomas Rhodes Jr. and his wife, Julia. But the father has testified that it was actually he who signed the son's name and his wife who signed for the daughter-in-law. Last year the son and daughter-in-la

filed for divorce and listed the house as part of the community property settlement. Until then, the elderly Rhodes had been paying the son \$140 a month for what they believed was a house payment.

Lawsuits subsequently were filed by father and son, each contending they owned the house. The father said he had signed the home over to the son so he would inherit it. The son claimed his parents were only acting as agents for him when he signed the papers.

On Sept. 30, the parents found an evic-

tion notice on the door. "My wife and I have been going through this nightmare for the past two hell out of here." said the father. "Somehow this all got twisted around.

King County Superior Court Judge Robert Elston last month handed down a judgment giving the title to the son, plus court costs.

He found, among other things, that the father did in fact sign the son's name to the real-estate contract, but under his own free will," and it shows the son as the legal owner.

Federal Reserve Has Distressing Economic 1

NEW YORK (AP) - The news from the monetary front is somewhat distressing. After big advances in the money supply in recent months, the Federal Reserve now feels it has overextended itself and must pull back.

Too much money chasing too few goods leads to inflation, you see, or maybe you don't. How can anyone today be convinced there is too much money? It's like saying we have too many bullets for the number of enemy.

But the monetary generals have studied this issue in depth, and the answer is a bit more complex than that. Inflation is a modern scourge. It is a foe that must always be watched. And to the Fed, the time to do so is now.

This of course suggests some belt-tightening, and is even encouraging some fifth columnists to pronounce the onset of a

Oil Industry Tabbed As Villain

WASHINGTON (AP) - In order to wage the moral equivalent of war, you need the moral equivalent of an enemy Without villains, there's no way to keep

So President Carter has fixed his sights for the new phase of his energy campaign, zeroing in on the oil industry he accuses of plotting history's biggest ri-

The issue may not be quite that simple, and the tactic may not gain congressional approval of the legislation he wants. But

at least it will be more colorful now that he's settled on somebody to campaign

As is the case in time of war, there is potential war profiteering in the impending energy crisis," Carter said last Thursday. "This could develop with the passing months as the biggest ripoff in

He went on to suggest that only the enactment of his energy program will insure the American consumer against robbery by the oil and gas companies.

And that was just for openers in a campaign Carter said will take most of his time during the next few weeks. He'll be pushing his energy plan during a five-state swing later this month. Vice President Walter F. Mondale and Cabinet members are to be deployed to push the administration's energy cause.

The White House plans to summon political and business leaders to a series of energy conferences, hoping that kind of persuasion will put pressure on members of Congress - especially the balky Senate - to vote for the Carter package.

One White House aide said there are more than a few people in policy and image-making positions who would like nothing better than to take on the oil indus try with tough talk and tougher pro-

They've been cautious so far, lest they get ahead of the President on the issue Now Carter is ahead of them, speaking more harshly than his speechwriters would have dared propose

Carter's real problem is in the Senate. which has stripped away the key elements of the energy program the House approved. His energy price and tax pro-

posals are in grave trouble. Carter used to blame the Senate, suggesting at one point that it was too responsive to lobbyists, and warning that it should look after its own reputation. Then he blamed lobbyists for all the trou-

But none of that had the political punch of his slap at the industry itself. Furthermore, his challenges to Congress tended to make congressmen angry, which was counterproductive.

So in the new campaign, he speaks kindly of the people who will be voting on his energy bills. According to Carter, even his Senate opponents are working long and hard to come up with an acceptable energy package.

Carter will take part of the blame for past failures, and the American people will have to share it because they waste too much energy.

Nor is the whole problem the fault of the oil companies. Just enough of it to make them the prime administration tar-

It's all there in the campaign textbook. Franklin D. Roosevelt denounced the "economic royalists" as he accepted his second presidential nomination. Theodore Roosevelt said that "malefactors of great wealth" were partially responsible for panic on Wall Street 70 years ago.

The candidate who declares in the springtime that he campaigns for his own programs, not against anybody else, often winds up denouncing his opponent in the fall.

When the crunch comes, it helps to have a target. And for Carter the crunch is approaching on energy, the crucial program of his first year in the White House.



After collecting thousands of dollars in accrued sick leave and vacation pay, they went right back on the state payroll.

All were taking legal, albeit questionable, advantage of an over-generous fringe benefit package that taxpayers have endured in silence for far too long.

This one tantalizing loophole has been closed, but the whole sick leave-vacationpaid holiday policy needs to be tightened.

IN THE CASE of Hugh Yantis, who retired on Aug. 31 as director of the Texas Water Quality Board after his job was merged with another, he was appointed two days later to the Insurance Board post

In the meantime Vantis had taken a lump sum payment of \$11,256, before taxes, for his accumulated sick leave and vacation time, according to news service reports.

His public information officer at the water board also quit his job, collected \$2,691, then followed his old boss into the public information job at the Insurance Board:

One of Sen. McKnight's assistants collected \$5,923 and the other took \$3,384 in lump sum payments when they "quit" in August only to be rehired in October.



(First of five columns)

ONE IDEA PILED on top of another for solving Social Security's financing ills has been high-

lighted in the headlines of recent months. Some have been full-blown blueprints to take us from now through the next 75 years; others have called for merely a "quick-fix" payroll tax hike with solution of the long-range problems de-

Still others have been ingenious suggestions for putting the funds in better shape without raising taxes and risking damage to the economy

Prospects for congressional action on the proposals have waxed and waned, lit up and dimmed, all through this session. Now, as adjournment nears, both houses of Congress are working to beat the deadline.

The job isn't easy.

OVER DECADES OF amendments, the Social Security law has become exceedingly complex, although the basic concept of Social Security remains simple.

During your working years, you pay Social Security taxes—a percentage of earnings into trust

Then, in retirement, or in case of death or disability, payments are made from the funds to you, the worker and your dependents, or to your survivors.

That kind of arrangement would require so huge a buildup of funds that the whole economy would be dislocated.

Instead, taxes are intended to bring in each year funds to pay benefits to those now on benefit rolls and to create just enough reserves to take care of contingencies. In effect, it's pay-as-you-

COLLECTION OF SS taxes began in January 1937, with the first monthly benefits paid in January 1940. For more than 40 years, the SS program

has been self-supporting. In almost every year until 1975, the system col-

lected more than it paid out in benefits. The excess was invested in the interest-bearing U.S. securities and the interest was added to the

trust funds-separate funds maintained in the U.S. Treasury. At 1974's close, \$45.9 billion had been accumu-

lated in the two cash benefit trust funds.

BUT SINCE 1974, unemployment side by side with inflation has wiped out \$4.7 billion in SS reserves. In '77 again, the system will go \$6.6 bil-lion in the red, slashing reserves to \$35.5 billion. Part of the shrinkage in reserves is due to lost SS taxes that would otherwise have been collect-

ed had jobless and underemployed workers been getting paychecks. Part is due to galloping inflation and benefits to

the 33 million on the rolls are automatically hiked to keep up with the cost of living.

Every I per cent increase in the inflation rate swells the annual benefit payout by about \$666 milllion. In addition, all benefit payments in the future will be permanently higher because of past infla-

tion and because the interest earnings lost by the trust funds due to shrunken reserves cannot be HAD THE JOBLESS rate-now above 7 per

cent-risen to no more than 5 per cent, a Social Security Administration study shows, the cash benefits trust funds would have grown by \$25 billion between '75 and '81, instead of dwindling!

If nothing is done about replenishing these trust funds, reserves in the disability insurance trust fund will wash out in 1979.

The much older, larger Old-age and Survivors Insurance Trust Fund will exhaust its reserves by

In the meantime, however, the contigency reserves in those funds are serving the purpose for which they were intended—to carry the program through temporary periods when income sinks

NEVERTHELESS, IT is indisputable that the sooner balance is restored, the easier it will be to rebuild the reserves.

Each report about a deficit in the funds shakes the faith of younger workers in the program's payoff for them.

Each report erodes the sense of security among the elderly-and undermines the "psychic income" that has accompanied each monthly bene-

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I know we are supposed to love people, but I find it very difficult to love certain people who are just too obnoxious. Surely there must be The other thing I suggest you do is pray a limit to love, don't you think?-W. T.

DEAR W. T.: Yes. I know it is difficult to love some people. In fact, humanly speaking, it is often almost impossible. But let me suggest two things to help us grow in our love.

In the first place, realize that there were no limits to God's love. The world is in rebellion against God, and from a human standpoint there is no reason why God should not simply wipe us off the face of the earth. But God loves us anyway. God loves the very person we find so obnoxious.just as much as He loves us. The Apostle Paul said. "Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous man, though for a good man someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his love for us in this: While we were yet sinners. Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7.8 disciples.

New International Version). He also said, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ" (Philippians 2:5).

that God will give you love for other people, and that He will give you opportunities to express that love. After all, love is fruit of the Holy Spirit's work within us. We do not have enough love within ourselves: only God can give us true love. Often I have found in dealing with people that I can really begin to love them only when I begin to understand their problems. On the surface they are very unattractive, but the more we deal with them the more we come to see that God loves them also, and He alone can meet their deepest needs

I suggest you study the four Gospels and particularly look at how Jesus loved people, many of whom were unattractive or even outcasts. But He loved them all, and calls us to do likewise if we are His

Lawyer For Joan Little Says Allegations Probed

for Joan Little, who escaped from her campus-like prison dormitory, says authorities had been investigating several allegations against her since last month.

Miss Little, who would have been eligible for parole next month from a seven-to 10-year sentence for burglary, is believed to have scaled a fence at the minimum security North Carolina Correction Center for women Saturday. She still was at large early today.

Miss Little, a black, was acquitted in 1975 of murder in the ice pick stabbing death of Beaufort County jailer Clarence Allegood, who was white. She argued that she had acted in self-defense after he sexually assaulted her. The trial drew national attention, and Miss Little became a cause celebre for feminists and civil rights activists

Her attorney during the trial, Jerry Paul, said Raleigh police had been investigating several possible offenses both in and out of prison, but he declined to say what they were. Police said they were investigating another inmate's allegation that Miss Little had kept the \$200 from a money order she had been asked to cash.

Miss Little, 22, had been in the prison's work release program with a job as an assistant to a Raleigh dentist. She was suspended from her job privileges and confined briefly last week after prison officials said she did not go to work at least one day when she was out of the prison, returned to the prison late and broke oth-

Miss Little and her Raleigh attorney, David Best, denied the charges and appealed the work release suspension. Paul said Miss Little was under pres-

The body of Bing Crosby was being flown home today in a dark brown coffin topped by a crucifix as fans, friends and family said prayers for him in memorial services on two continents.

Crosby's 19-year-old son Harry accompanied the casket on the commercial flight from Madrid, Spain, where the singer died Friday of a heart attack after a winning round of golf, his favorite pas-

Crosby listed his age as 73, but baptismal records put it at 74.

After a stop in New York, the body was to be taken to Los Angeles for a funeral Tuesday with only family and close friends invited.

At New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral, Terence Cardinal Cooke planned to offer a Mass of the Resurrection today for the entertainer, a devout Roman Catholic.

A Mass was held Sunday at London's Westminster Cathedral, attended by 2,-000 people. Canon Oliver Kelly called Crosby "a gentle soul who gave such pleasure with unaffected modesty to so many" and recalled that the singer attended mass there two weeks ago while in London for performances at the Palladinm

And in Hillsborough, Calif., where Crosby lived with his second wife, Kathryn, and their three children, his fellow parishioners at Our Lady of Angels Church remembered him with a prayer Sunday

"Above all things he was a Christian man that never lost sight of God even though he was among the stars," the Rev. Gerald Barron reminded the earlymorning congregation of 150.

Crosby's widow attended the Mass with son Nathaniel, 15, and daughter Mary Frances, 17, and said afterward in a telephone interview that the service was very meaningful to the children and

Father Barron said Mrs. Crosby had asked that a special Mass also be said in Hillsborough on Tuesday.

In Madrid, Harry Crosby, who had flown to Spain on Saturday, was accompanied to the airport for his mission home by a group of American and Spanish friends and U.S. Embassy and Consular officials Also shipped home were the golf clubs

Crosby used in the final match. He collapsed outside the clubhouse of the La Moraleja course after playing 18 holes with three Spanish professional golfers. An autopsy performed during the

weekend by Spanish medical authorities backed up the initial diagnosis that Crosby suffered a massive heart attack. Tuesday's funeral services will be at St.

Anti-Smoking Plan Proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Surgeon General Julius Richmond is proposing a "National Don't Smoke Day" on which no cigarettes would be sold or smoked in the United States.

It was one of a series of "preliminar suggestions" of a federal task force in a memorandum to Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph Califano

Richmond said the government also could issue a new surgeon general's smoking report as "a media event which would go far in publicizing the healthdamaging effects of smoking." The last such report was issued 12 years ago.

The memo offered such other antismoking suggestions as giving government employes time off from work to break their smoking habits; government encouragement of private suits against tobacco companies by individuals; ending price support programs for tobacco: increasing federal excise taxes on cigarettes; requesting a ruling on whether nicotine can be federally controlled as "an addictive and dependence-producing substance.

Limited Blockage Not Bad

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB-My husband had a heart bypass operation. They told us one artery was completely blocked, two were partially blocked. They only did the one artery that was completely blocked and never explained why they didn't do all three. Also I would like to know if there is

cholesterol in veal liver?

DEAR READER-A limited amount of obstruction of a artery does not decrease the blood flow through it. As long as 70 per cent of the opening is still there the fatty cholesterol deposits won't make that much difference. There is a critical level of blockage that starts causing problems. The doctors probably felt on the basis of what they could see at the operation that a bypass around the partially blocked arteries would not significantly improve your husband's circulation

to the heart. You can improve his condition though by helping him eliminate or avoid obesity and having him on the proper diet. If he smokes he should stop. The success of many bypass operations depends on what kind of progam a person follows after surgery. If the person persists in eating the wrong foods, being obese and smoking, the end result is not so good.

Yes, veal liver contains cholesterol, about 300 milligrams in a 100 gram (three-and-a-half ounce) portion of raw liver. That small serving alone will take up all the allowed cholesterol for the whole diet for one day. All forms of liver are moderately high in cholesterol content.

To help you with a diet plan I am sending you the Health Letter number 1-3, Diet, Preventing Atherosclerosis. It will give you the general principles you need to follow. DEAR DR. LAMB-I am 26 years old but the growth of hair on my chest is very scarce. There is more hair on the right half of my chest than on the left. Is there some way that more hair will develop on my left side or on my upper chest as a whole? Is there a chemical imbalance that may create this problem? Would cutting or shaving the hair I have create more? The hair growth in other areas is adequate although not in large quantities even in the pubic region. I hope

DEAR READER-The best advice I can give you is to forget about it. I suspect your friends don't even notice

Before you have hair on the body

you can give me some advice to help

you have to have hair follicles. It is an inherited characteristic for some people to have fewer follicles than others. A normal male in all respects may have little hair on the body. Some rare males are born with no significant amounts of hair anywhere, so hor-

mones are not the answer. Shaving your sparse hair will not help. It might cause your skin to itch but that is about all. What hair there is may be shorter and stiffer like a stubble but when it grows out it will be the same. Cuting hair does not affect its growth despite the old idea that it stimulates growth. I presume you have an adequate amount of hair on your head. Be glad you have it there rather than on your body.

Armed Bandits Kidnap Elephant

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) - Armed bandits have kidnaped the employe of an American company and are holding their victim for \$1,500 in ransom in the southern Thai jungles, police sources said to-

day.

The six-ton elephant — probably the world's largest kidnap victim - was used by Munford Inc. of Atlanta to haul rattan until the beast was abducted at gunpoint almost two weeks ago, the sources said.

According to still fragmentary reports, the elephant was used to pack rattan from the jungle to roads for transport to Bangkok, where it was used in making

Using an elephant in the rattan business is new, although Thais work hundreds of trained elephants, mostly in moving teak logs and other timber in the

The kidnaped beast, police said, was bought two months ago for \$3,000. The company reportedly owns other elephants, but the kidnaped pachyderm is the largest. The bandits, according to reports

reaching Bangkok, chased off a security guard at a jungle camp owned by the firm and made off with the animal. The camp was in Chumphol Province.

240 miles south of Bangkok. The province borders on Burma. Police believe the elephant was taken to Burma, and Bangkok newspaper re-

ports indicated the Burmese police have been alerted. News reports quoted a company spokesman at Munford headquarters as saying Burmese police have promised to

Little Lamb Gave Turkeys A Boost

CHICAGO (AP) - America's \$501 million-a-year turkey industry has much to give thanks for in poetess Sarah Josepha Hale (1788-1879), a prominent magazine editor in the United States during the 1800s and author of the children's poem, "Mary Had a Little Lamb."

Mrs. Hale — who, as editor of "Godey's Lady's Book," helped shape the tastes of thousands of women in this country - is credited with persuading President Abraham Lincoln to declare Thanksgiving a national holiday, according to the World Book Encyclopedia.

After Lincoln's proclamation in 1863, which called for the last Thursday in November to be "a day of thanksgiving and praise ...". each president, until 1938. declared that Thanksgiving be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. President Roosevelt made it one week earlier to help Christmas business. Finally in 1941, the fourth Thursday of November was declared Thanksgiving Day.

History Professor Makes Acting Debut

NEW YORK (AP) - Professor John Kouwenhoven gets that rare chance - to step back into time and "live" the history he once taught - thanks to the magic of television make-believe.





Carter Steps On Toes Of Nation's Industries

tous day President Carter got the stee companies off his back, and then stepped on the toes of that other symbol of industrial might, the nation's oil produ-

And in doing so he sent a shiver through all private enterprise, which has been campaigning for its very life against the mistaken notion that everything it takes in somehow swells the bank accounts of a favored few.

Some \$50 billion, he said, would "go into the pockets of the oil companies themselves" if Congress rejected his program to continue regulating oil and gas prices.

But later the President's figures were shown to be quite literally in gross exag-

geration. The President, it appears, made the same error so many others also make: He confused gross revenues with net income. The truth is that petroleum and coal product companies, according to the President's own economic report to Con-

gress this year, took in as profit during

1976 only eight cents or so for every dol-Those profits went not to a few but to millions of investors. All the rest of revenues went for salaries, taxes, investment in facilities, transportation and general

No matter what their feelings about oil, therefore, there is consternation in the business community today because, in toprice increase by U.S. Steel chairs Roger Blough, he referred to his father

warning that businessmen are SOBs.

But there is a vast difference between Kennedy and Carter. Kennedy's remark

was spontaneous; Carter's was calculated. Kennedy's remark was an eruption of hot emotion; Carter's considered remarks cut like cold steel.

What Carter said was the very thing that businessmen hoped they wouldn't hear from a President. They are fully aware of the impact of a president's re-marks. "If he said it, it must be true." Or so some people will say.

The impact, therefore, is difficult to

dispel. It is one thing to counter general misimpressions, even though much of the business community feels it is failing to do so, but another to take on a President.

The Business Roundtable, made up of the nation's top corporate chief executives, can advertise in the Reader's Digest for an entire year about the role of profits in creating jobs, and still achieve only limited success.

Food Fair Lacks U.S. Exhibition

By BERNARD BRENNER WASHINGTON (UPI) — Well, Mr.

President, it's this way. The reason your Department of Agriculture didn't sponsor an American dis-play at a big international food fair in Germany last summer is that trade experts decided they could get more sales promotion for their government dollar in other kinds of exhibitions.

The issue arose recently when Carter met with members of the Newspaper Farm Editors of America. Michael Carr, farm editor of the Decatur, Ill., newspapers and president of the group, reported that Illinois leaders had complained about the lack of national representation at the German fair.

A two-man agriculture team sent to promote Illinois farm product sales in Europe stopped at the fair, Carr said, and reported they found that the United States was about the only major nation which did not have a national display.

"... And they thought that was, in the

eyes of many of these nations, a loss of face in some way," Carr noted.

"Do you think we ought to have fied effort like that?" he asked. "Yes, I do," replied Carter, scrawling a quick penciled note to himself on a pad.

"And I would just about guarantee you that the next time such an occasion arises, we will have a display there." he said. Carter said he had not known about the failure to have an exhibit at the fair held in Cologne.

"I will contact (Secretary of Agriculture) Bob Bergland this afternoon and find out why we didn't," he promised.

The answer cume to Bergland from Thomas R. Hughes, recently-appointed administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service.

Hughes said the Cologne fair is one of a number of big international food exhibitions in which government sales promotion agencies participated heavily in earlier years. The Agriculture Departme had an exhibit at every one of the Cologne fairs from 1955 through 1971, he

More recently, however, the official said that American farm commodity organizations promoting overseas sales have become less dependent on trade shows. And foreign buyers began showing more interest in building up direct commercial contacts with Americans than in going to "taste and see" exhibits.

As a result, Hughes said, the Agriculture Department shifted its emphasis to programs aimed only at foreign traders.

Currently, our major trade efforts take place in the ballrooms of leading hotels (abroad) ... We are able to invite those traders with an interest in the products being shown and conduct a modest public relations program with total costs for the shows running about \$25,000 to \$40,000," he explained.

In contrast, the cost of operating a 10,-000. square foot exhibit at the Cologne ANUGA fair would range from \$200,000 to \$250,000, he said.

"Based upon our experience ... we are very much of the openion that such an amount of money will result in a greater amount of sales if expended on trade-only shows," Hughes added.

Because of these factors, Hughes said the Foreign Agricultural Service has cut its participation in big international food fairs to about two such shows a year. The official said records indicate that

in 1965, the service spent \$215,583 for an exhbit at the Cologne fair and \$235,410 for an exhibit at a similar fair in Brussels. The two fairs led to estimated American farm product sales of about \$3.4 million during the succeeding year.

In contrast, Hughes said the government sent \$41,968 to conduct a trade-

only meat and poultry exhibit in Tokyo in October, 1976. Sales resulting from the promotion over the succeeding year were estimated at \$40 million, he said.



1978 Auto Sales Show Increase

DETROIT (AP) - Auto industry analysts say it's too early to gauge consumer reaction to the 1978 models, but the first sales figures seem to indicate they are getting a good reception.

The big three U.S. automakers reported the second highest sales ever for the Oct. 1-10 period, the first to reflect 1978model sales by all four domestic carmak-

Domestic sales for the period totaled 267,324, compared with 232,186 last year. Based on the daily rate - the industry yardstick for computing sales - this year's 33,416 trails only the 33,781 cars sold each day in early October, 1972.

Ford Motor Co. registered the highest gain - 25.3 per cent over year-ago figures. And the totals reflected only two days of 1978-model sales. Ford's new models went on sale Friday.

Only American Motors Corp., which started selling new models Sept. 19 compared with Oct. 1 last year, was below year-ago figures. Analysts said that's to be expected as buyers shift their attention to the latest model introductions. Ford's big increase was partly attribut-

ed to the fact that a year ago, the No. 2 automaker was in the midst of a nationwide strike by the United Auto Workers. Ford had big stockpiles of autos to draw from at the time, however.

Ford sold 83,165 cars compared with 67,321 last year. A spokesman said more than a million customers had visited showrooms since the new models went

"This was a good introduction period in what we see as a good model year," said Bennett E. Bidwell, a Ford sales vice president. "There is movement toward the smaller, more fuel-efficient cars."





McKuen Urges Information, Protection

By ROD McKUEN NEW YORK (WNS) - For the record,

what most of us want as individuals and, as organizations attempting reform is the following:
(1) Those mothers who give their

children away should be protected. They should continue to have assurance that this will be so until the child becomes an

(2) Adoptive parents need protection and assurances, too.

Every child growing up has a love-hate relationship with his or her parents; it may only extend to the threat of running away from home when asked to clean up one's room. Nevertheless, adoptive parents do feel threatened - suppose a child had another set of parents to run to, good or bad.

(3) It stands to reason that at some age, probably 18, every adopted child or those children born out of wedlock should have access to their records.

(4) We don't believe information should be general and be given to anyone. Only that child who has become an adult and desires more knowledge of himself or herself. But the knowledge should be as complete and as extensive as possible.

(5) It should be against the law to destroy, tamper with, or give misinformation to the individual involved. The information should not be available to credit agencies, the United States government, or anyone other than that specific individual.

Unless you were born or brought up under anything but ordinary circumstances, it is impossible to understand how much some of us with no parents. one good parent, two bad parents, or even two exceptionally fine adoptive parents, need to know about our origins. Not to know and to be aware that something happened back there is to feel not only unwanted but also incomplete. To know, however painful the knowledge might be, is everything

If I'd known how difficult reliving my life was going to be. I might not have written "Finding My Father."

It was not that I did not want to open any old wounds. The only wound I had had never healed. Certainly that was the reason I began looking for my father again after having given up the search so many years ago. No matter how medicinal the medicine of success, how comforting it has been to know that I was brought up, taken care of, and really loved by my mother, there was still that gap, which couldn't be filled until I knew something - anything - more about my father and myself.

What a connotation the word "bastard" has - unwanted, unintended, and, in a time when planned parenthood is all the rage, even unnecessary. But I have never looked in the mirror and thought of myself as a mistake nor have I. for a long time now, felt less a human being because of my dubious origins. Whatever my identity problems were, until her death six years ago, my mother was always able to solve them just by being there. She was a friend when I needed one, the truest counsel I ever had, a woman who would do anything to ensure I was brought up in the best way she knew. I never wanted for anything especially love.

In my mid-teens, I discovered I'd been born out of wedlock. I began to seek information about my father. As I grew older, having looked in so many hundreds of directories and so many thousands of obituary columns, never finding a man who even spelled his name the same way I did, I finally despaired of ever learning who he was. As my work - composing, writing,

and performing - brought me more and more into the public eye, the questions I'd always asked my mother about my father seemed increasingly painful to her so I began to think to myself. "Why not respect her wishes and give up looking." That was the least I owed her for trying all these years to make me a decent human being. Even after her death and the terrible

void left in my life. I no longer pursued that phantom of a man who may or may not have been named McKuen, who might or might not be still living. who could or could not have known about me and, if so, did or did not care.

Over the years, many stories and interviews have been printed about my origin, most of which I tried to keep from my mother. In that time. I've had perhaps two dozen "fathers" and/or "relatives" turn up who, once carefully checked, turned out to be pranksters or

Toward the end of 1975 when I began to look again actively. my friends almost

The "why" didn't merely address itself to my reasons for the search, but went on to include - Why expose yourself by bringing up the past? Why risk, by admitting to being a bastard, whatever security or, as some called it, celebrity, you've attained?

What some of my friends didn't know was that all my life I've been looking in obituary columns, telephone books, around corners, hoping to find the man who more than 40 years ago abandoned, was driven off, or didn't know about his expected child.

Every day of every year I've thought about my father, wondered if he were tall or short, intelligent or a man of common sense, beautiful to look at or plain, a criminal or barrister, a teacher or a bum, or a retired gentleman jingling a gold watch in his pocket, the reward of three-score years of faithful service to the same company.

Suppose he needed me? Suppose he were in trouble and I could help? Selfishly. I thought, wouldn't it be something after all these years to be able to help the man who helped to bring me into this world? I needed help too. I wanted to know who I was and what I was. It seems that everybody everywhere I went

knew who I was but me. In November, 1975, I met Dick Carlson, an Emmy Award-winning producer of documentaries. Dick involved me in a television special he was writing about people who were trying to find their relatives. In addition, he put me in touch with a firm of private detectives who would eventually help uncover a whole new world for me

Because of the beaureaucratic walls I ran into trying to open the files of so many years ago, one California senator. William Campbell, asked my help in drafting a new bill that, in California at least, would have made access to personal records à lot easier for the adopted and those who need to know their origins. It got all the way to the governor. only to be vetoed.

Sen. Campbell drafted yet another bill this year. It passed the senate floor in Sacramento as well as the California Assembly. It was referred to as the Rod McKuen Bill. I'm proud of that. I would have been prouder had the bill passed. Gov. Brown again defeated it

I don't believe that bastards are born know quite a few and it has taken most of them a great deal of effort to get there. Only liars and con artists are ille gitimate. I try hard not to lie or put myself in a position where I have to question my motives. Still. like everyone else, I have my illegitimate days.

I live in California so it's particularly upsetting to me that the governor of this state vetoed two important bills among more than 1,000 that were waiting on his desk for attention during the summer and autumn of 1976.

In the summer he was away conducting a last-minute campaign to become the Democratic nominee for president

Bill 4200, as proposed by Sen. Bill Campbell and passed by all the California committees of the Senate and Assembly, would have made it possible for an adoptee and a natural parent to meet each other, under supervision, if they both desired to do so. It posed no threat to adoptive parents, but Gov. Brown vetoed the bill because he said. "There is currently a court procedure that takes care of it" - tell this to Jerry Hulse. travel editor of the Los Angeles Times who almost lost his wife because of the sealed records policy in California

The "court procedure" in California. like those in most states, provides that you can find out your origins if there is a pressing reason Presumably, to many judges this means you have to have a bottle of plasma hanging from your arm as you enter the courtroom. One thing is certain: the courts, adoption agencies and even the governor of the state continue to conspire against the Jerry Hulses of the world.

How many wives, like Jody Hulse. have husbands who work for major newspapers or other means for circumventing laws, the inadequacies and inequities, that will not only deprive them of their birthrights, but even kill them in the process? Few, probably

There is no way of telling how many troubled children grow into troubled adults and, most importantly, do any of us know who we are? Is it any wonder that the teen-age suicide rate in America is up 250 per cent from seven years ago? The figures are only slightly less in Great Britain and Commonwealth coun-

Sen. David Roberti's Bill 1586 would have provided every Californian access to his file and dossier regardless of the agency involved. It is similar in scope to the national Access to Information law that came about because of Watergate. Roberti's bill has a curious history.

Early in December 1975 the governor's office was approached and told of the proposed legislation. He was asked if there was anything he, himself, would like included in the bill. The senator's office received no reply. At the end of December Roberti wrote the governor a letter. No response. On Feb. 4, 1976 another letter was sent with a draft of the bill. It too was ignored.





Finally on April 5 (by this time the bill was being much talked about in Sacramento) the Secretary of Agriculture and Services detailed the Brown administration's objections to the proposed legislation. Many had nothing to do with the bill at all. But despite any of the Brown administrations objections, 1586 breezed through both the Senate and Assembly easily. When it arrived on Brown's desk he refused to pass it on grounds that it would cost nearly four million dollars a year to implement.

Roberti countered with a new proposal that would have cut that amount in half. Brown's office then replied that their previous calculations had been wrong and the law, if passed, would cost California taxpayers nearly eight million dollars a year.

I don't know who the governor is protecting, but he shows very little human understanding for a man with a Jesuit background.

One wonders where America's most populous state's governor's priorities really are, if indeed they exist. While ignoring these two bills he signed into legislation a law "requiring doctors to take all reasonable steps to save a fetus that survives an abortion.

Zan Thompson, a syndicated columnist writing in the Los Angeles Times pointed out. "This is an appalling instance of skewed thinking. After the fetus has been scraped, dragged or perhaps removed by curettage" — such a pretty word, curettage — "presumably the doctor will pop it into a respirator. 'if it has a chance for a normal life. How can it - the "it" is a baby - have a chance for a normal life? The woman has decided to get rid of it and the doctor has decided to perform the removal. Maybe by suction. Do you suppose it's something like a Plumber's Friend?

But singling out Gov. Brown isn't quite fair. He can only be added to the list of those people many of us believed in, worked and voted for, who turned out sadly lacking in compassion The previous governor of California. also a presidential candidate, closed and abolished scores of asylums and mental health centers in California. turning many patients loose to fend for themselves, and those still in the process of being cured to prey on others.

The Superior Court, prompted by the news and information media, is currently conducting an exhaustive investigation that has turned up more than a hundred deaths which cannot be accounted for Indictments are being brought in slowly. and they may go all the way to Sacramento, the state's capital, and beyond

It is no secret that our priorities in this country are somewhat confused. One of them should certainly be a federal law that makes it possible for every adult human being in this country to know his or her origins if he so wishes

Mrs. Mondale also delivered a plug for the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution. Three more states must ratify the amendment in the next year and a half before it becomes law

We have a big struggle ahead, but I'm optimistic. I think we're going to make it. We're going to make it because women need equal rights and men need equal rights," she said.

Mrs. Mondale thanked the caucus for liberating political wives" to take an active part in politics.

Thank you for pushing, pulling and prodding more women into leadership roles," she said. "Keep pushing, pulling and prodding. The administration is lis-

Proceeds from the dinner went to the caucus, to help elect women to office. The organization was established in 1970, and now has 300 state and local affiliates and 35,000 members.



lamaica Split Over Castro



promulgated," Carter told the panel, which met with him in the White House.

The committee includes business and labor leaders, former military officers and members of past administrations who banded together specifically to support the treaty, under fire from foreignpolicy conservatives.

Assault Case Jury Sought

AMERICUS, Ga. (UPI) - The man accused of slamming his sportscar through the crowd at a Fourth of July weekend Ku Klux Klan rally in President Carter's hometown of Plains went on trial today on charges of aggravated assault.

Lillian Carter, the president's 79-yearold mother, is among those subpoenaed as defense witnesses.

Although about 30 persons were injured in the fracas, defendant Buddy Cochran was charged with eight counts of aggravated assault. Prosecutors said when he was indicted those eight represented area residents hurt in the July 2 incident.

Cochran, 30, has been free under \$50,-000 bond pending trial in the Sumter County Courthouse Jury selection began today

The Americus truck mechanic and a man who disrupted Klan rallies in Columbus. Ohio, have been making joint public appearances on behalf of anti-KKK organizations since Cochran was released on bond. In addition to the assault charges. Cochran faces damage suits from several of those injured.

San Antonio Blackout Blamed On Transmission Line Blaze

SAN ANTONIO (UPI) - A fire in power plant transmission lines caused a twohour electrical blackout Sunday night in the nation's 10th largest city.

A few persons were trapped in elevators by the blackout and several minor traffic accidents occurred because of the loss of signal lights

But no deaths or injuries attributable to the blackout were reported, and no arrests were made in sporadic outbreaks of looting in parts of the South Texas city. Police and firemen quickly manned intersections when traffic signals went dead. lighting flares and directing traffic with flashights, amd most area hospitals used emergency generators to maintain life support systems.

Tom Berg, chairman of City Public Service, said the blackout wus caused by a fire in transmission lines of the Calaveras Power Plant, located on the southern edge of the city, but cause of the fire was

Residents in the area of the power plant reported an explosion and sparks shooting from the overhead power lines leading from the plant. CPS officials did not confirm the reports of an explosion.

The blackout occurred at 7:05 p.m. and lights dimmed and then went out across the metropolitan area of 1 million residents. CPS officials had told the news media

last summer at the time of the New York power failure that San Antonio did not have to worry about such outages because of its regional network arrangements. They said, after power was restored Sunday night, the San Antonio blackout was caused by the transmission line difficulties and not by an overload such as occurred in New York.

"The whole thing was black," CPS general manager Jack Spruce said of the cit-"There is no evidence of any problems inside the Calaveras plant.

Berg called for a special committee in-

vestigation of the power outage and how to prevent a future one. He said three of the affected power lines at the Calaveras plant wrapped themselves around relay circuits which could have prevented the power loss

"Normally this should have been cleared by the relays." Berg said.

CPS restored electricity section by section, beginning at 8:37 p.m. on the north side and working through the downtown area. In some sections, overloads caused restoration to take longer.

Police chief Emil E. Peters said most residents responded to requests to stay home and no major law enforcement problems were encountered.

"We have some looting, but really nothing serious." Peters said. "We might get some calls in the morning.

Several of the city's radio stations which did not have emergency electrical generators went off the airuntil power was restored.





WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Tire Industry Safety Council is warning that chilly autumn temperatures can cause auto tires to become "seriously and dangerously underinflated.

"Cold weather reduces tire inflation pressure approximately one pound for every 10-degree drop in temperature," said Council Chairman Malcolm Lovell Jr. Sunday. "Tire pressure should be checked frequently during winter months to be sure inflation is at the level recommended by your car owner's manual."

A seriously under-inflated tire is four or more pounds of air pressure below the recommended amount, according to the National Bureau of Standards.

Lovell said properly inflated tires can add up to 5 per cent to gasoline mileage because they roll easier. Soft tires also can cause "erratic steering and excessive tread wear." he added



Joseph Rensch, president of Pacific Lighting Corp. of Los Angeles, said in an interview last week that the Southwest is in an ideal position to get gas from reserves in the Pacific Basin.

Rensch said studies by his firm have indicated there is more gas than oil in the world, with tremendous reserves found in Southeast Asia, Australia, Malaysia, South America and Alaska.

"Japan is our only real competition for it," he said. "It is too uneconomical for the European market because the trans-

But getting the gas from those fields is a major undertaking, he said.

Rensch said his firm, whose subsidiary, Southern California Gas Co. serves 12 million customers, signed an agreement to import Indonesian gas in 1973, estimating construction of a receiving terminal might begin in 1979 and be in operation

"Japanese interests signed for supplies from Indonesia three months after we did," Rensch said. "The Japanese have gone ahead with facilities and received first deliveries in July.

However, Pacific Lighting is still waiting for a decision from the Federal Pow-

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - There's plen- from the State of California under legislation passed this year, he said.

"We are now five years behind, at best," he said.

According to Rensch's figures, southern California is heavily dependent on natural gas, using it for 95 per cent of residential water heating, 92 per cent of home heating and 76 per cent of cooking. Like Arizona, southern California has had a declining supply of natural gas from traditional sources, down 27 per cent in the last seven years.

Pacific Lighting also is working on a coal gasification project in New Mexico, Rensch said, and plans to bring in gas from both the northern and southern parts of Alaska. However, he said the projects are embroiled in delays and becoming more expensive daily.

"We started out with a \$400 million budget on the coal gasification plant. Now it's \$1 billion. Each day we're delayed, the price goes up another \$300,-

Rensch said he expects a bill recently passed by the House which would allow the price of gas to go up will prevail over a Senate-passed measure that would deregulate the price of natural gas because it conforms to President Carter's energy

Destiny's Darlings?

THERE WAS A LOT of whooping and hollering at Texas Stadium late Sunday afternoon as the Dallas Cowboys chalked up another victory over their old rivals, the Washington Redskins. The 'Pokes have several good feuds going now with other NFL teams, but the Redskins still top the list.

It was a typical Dallas-Washington tussle in many respects. There were a lot of hard hits, some brief scuffles between the gladiators and many big plays. What was different was the obvious confidence of the Cowboys, even in the face

This is a different kind of Dallas team, without question. The '77 Cowboys don't have the mechanical precision of the teams which went to Super Bowls V and VI, and they don't appear to be the rah-rah type of team that lost to Pittsburgh in the Big One just two years ago. The Dirty Dozen have come of age

now, and they don't act like college sophomores What they do is win, with big plays on offense and a savage defense. And they are at their best when the chips are down in the fourth quarter. This may be the toughest Cowboy team — mentally as well as physically — of all time.

BUT IT IS A difficult team to understand. In the locker room before the Washington game, there was a surprisingly relaxed atmosphere. In previous years, the dressing room had the ominous atmosphere of a troop ship on D-Day in the hours before a duel with the Redskins. Not so Sunday morning.

D.D. Lewis, the veteran linebacker, was a little concerned about the lack of grim faces before the contest. "I wish of Lee Roy (Jordan) would come by here before the game and get us fired up." Lewis remarked to a visitor. "We could use some of his spirit for this

Another pre-game visitor to Cowboy quarters was Sam Huff, the former New York Giant linebacker who now is in the broadcasting game. He asked Coach Tom Landry for a brief interview, and Landry broke tradition by agreeing. Sir Thomas doesn't like to take even five minutes away from his schedule on game day, but his association with Huff goes back a long way. All in all, it was just another day at the office.

FOLLOWING THE DALLAS victory, the Cowboys and their coaches adopted the same low profile. One of the golden throats asked star safety Charlie Waters if he wasn't thinking of a 14-0 season and a Super Bowl. "No, we can't think like that. You get that attitude, and you are going to get beat! We won No. 5, now we have to think about No. 6. And the Super Bowl doesn't even exist, at this stage of the season.'





Surprise! Denver Routs Oakland 30-7

By The Associated Press Jim Turner has to be higher than Denver, which is a mile high to begin with. The 36-year-old placekicker caught a touchdown pass in the Bronco's surprise rout of the Oakland Raiders.

Denver was leading Oakland 14-7 in the second quarter Sunday when Turner trotted on for a field-goal attempt. But it was a fake. Holder Norris Weese, a reserve quarterback, took the snap and rolled right to pass.

"I looked first for Riley Odoms (a tight end)." said Weese. "But you can't waste time on the play and I saw Turner wide open . . . and couldn't believe it."

Turner had drifted to his left and was standing alone in the end zone where he caught the 25-yard pass that gave the Broncos a 21-7 halftime lead en route to a 30-7 victory. It boosted Denver to a 5-0 record and a one-game lead over Oakland in the American Conference West.

"I ran into the end zone out of fear," said Turner. "Speed wasn't involved."

While Turner's first touchdown in 14 National Football League seasons was certainly a highlight, it was the Denver defense that did in Oakland, intercepting seven Ken Stabler passes, three by linebacker Joe Rizzo, and recovering a fum-





it was three weeks ago.
"Boy, you bet," Sloan concurred. "Things don't look nearly as bleak now as they did then.

Three weeks ago, the Raiders had suffered a significant 33-17 conference defeat at the hands of Texas A&M and had lost outstanding quarterback Rodney Allison to injury. The task then was to win their next three games that led up to this week's open date prior to the important battle with Texas Oct. 29. That has been

"I tell you what. North Carolina was a

tough one (a 10-7 win). And then we had to go to Arizona, and that's like going to

The Raiders are now 5-1 for the season and 2-1 in SWC play. The open date is coming at a very opportune time for them because the injury toll has been high. The Tech staff hopes a number of players can recover in time to play

Allison, of course, is a key figure. He is off crutches and has begun rehabilitation of his left leg, in which he suffered a cracked fibula against A&M. He is still expected to be able to perform versus the

Quarterbacks Mark Johnson and Tres Adami have been bothered by leg and ankle injuries. Adami reinjured the ankle he first hurt in fall drills and was operating about "about half-speed" Saturday,

Linebacker Mike Mock will miss sever-

groin muscle. Strongside guard Greg Mahoney has a severely pulled hamstring and will miss at least a week. The guard position is very thin now because of injuries to Mahoney and original starters Greg Davis and Greg Wessels.

Sophomore cornerback Willie Stephens suffered a back injury against Rice. Sloan said Sunday that a vertebrae is "possibly" broken, but the seriousness of the injury is undetermined now. Stephens will be x-rayed again.

"Hopefully, we can get some people well during this time and improve some as a team. Because of our injuries, we're really lucky to have it now," Sloan said. "I think it's good to have an open date around the middle of the season. It gives you a chance to regroup.

Against Rice, Tech played well defensively, shutting the Owls off, except for their scoring drive at the beginning of the second half. Rice gained just 38 yards on

passes, but gained only 139 yards through the air. Most of their passes were in the flat to their backs and were only short

The defense set up two Tech scoring drives in the second half versus Rice by intercepting a pass and blocking a punt.

"The defense did well, overall," Sloan said. "We've only allowed 58 yards rushing in our last two games.

'Of course, we'll be severely tested when we play Texas," he added with a laugh, referring to UT's potent ground game spearheaded by Earl Campbell. Offensively, the Raiders couldn't get

moving early in the game, but had one touchdown drive midway through the second period and improved in the second half. Tech had 478 yards, 356 on the ground and 122 passing.

Early in the game, Tech had trouble getting the ball into the end zone, as it did against Arizona. Penalties also ham-

'Everything just happened," Sloan said. "We just couldn't score. We had penalties, and we missed a couple of field

SWC Sets *Survival* Battle'

Houston and Arkansas tangle in a Southwest Conference battle for survival Saturday while league co-leaders Texas A &M and Texas hit the road again after surviving games decided in the final minutes last week

Second-ranked Texas knocked Arkansas' No. 8 ranked Razorbacks out of the unbeaten ranks 13-9 in a nationally televised shootout in the Ozarks.

Texas stayed unbeaten under new coach Fred Akers but it wasn't easy, and the Longhorns catch Southern Methodist in Dallas after the Mustangs shocked Houston 37-23 with a three-touchdown avalanche in the last four minutes.

The Texas Aggies, who survived a great Baylor rally to outlast the Bears 38-31, are at Houston to meet lowly Rice-a 42-7 loser to Texas Tech.

Texas and A&M are 2-0 while SMU and defending co-champion Texas Tech are 2-

Arkansas and Houston are 1-1 and another loss just about kills any title hopes. Houston, of course, can't go to the Cotton Bowl because it was put on probation.

Houston must play the emotionally drained Razorbacks in Little Rock Saturday night. The Cougars, defending SWC co-champs, suffered their only league loss to Arkansas last year.

Texas and A&M don't meet until Nov 26 in College Station and the Aggies still have a game to play after that on national television Dec. 3 against Houston. But the meeting between the Aggies and Longhorns looms as perhaps the biggie of the

A&M somehow almost frittered away a 35-14 halftime lead at Waco against Baylor as the Bears rallied behind freshman quarterback Scott Smith.

The Aggies scored only three points in the second half but coach Emory Bellard said "Our play selection was justified by the fact that we got seven more points than they did.

Walker added "I didn't think we let down in the second half. We were trying to score, score, score. But we just didn't do it. I think it was a typical Baylor team —it never gives up

Texas ran a fake reverse screen pass to Earl Campbell to setup its winning touchdown over Arkansas. The play from Randy McEachern to Campbell covered 28 vards.

New Baby Boom **Predicted** For Next 50 Years

* WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States may be on the brink of a new population expansion equal to the baby soom that followed World War II. Zero Population Growth says.

"At current fertility, legal and illegal Immigration rates, our population will grow by 107 million people in the next 50 years," the group said in a recent state-

It said studies show the number of women of childbearing age will increase # per cent in the next three years and surweys of birth expectations among all women suggest a rise in the birthrate.

"The large number of women born during the baby boom years 1946-61 are currently in their prime childbearing years." the group said. "If these women have an average of two children each, as surveys indicate they expect to have, the total fertility rate could increase to 2.1 by 1980," compared to the current level of 1.8.

If young women bear an average of two children, the group said, "The number of annual births could reach four million by 1980, approaching the 1957 peak of the post war baby boom when 4.3 million children were born."

The group urged the government to limit immigration and encourage "voluntary reduction of fertility rates" through family planning centers, contraceptives for teenagers, voluntary sterilization, and development of safer and more effective methods of contraceptives.

Broadcast Proposal Shelved In House

WASHINGTON (AP) - Plans for broadcasting proceedings of the House have been shelved in the wake of a backlash against revision of House procedures and standards, Speaker Thomas P.

After years of discussion and months of experimental closed-circuit televising of the House, a resolution to institute regular television and radio coverage and make it available to commercial broadcasters was expected to be approved by the House Rules Committee.

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) - Sgt. William Spencer was eager to return home to North Carolina after a four-year stint in the Marines. One night of racial violence changed all his plans. Spencer, 24, of High Point, is one of 14

black Marines from Camp Pendleton,

Calif., charged in connection with a barracks attack on a group of six white Marines, three of whom were seriously wounded. His general court-martial on charges of attempted murder, aggravated assault and conspiracy to commit aggravated assault began today at Camp Pendleton.

Spencer faces up to 20 years in prison and a dishonorable discharge. "William was, in a sense, proud to be a Marine," said his father, William Spencer Sr., a former Marine. "Why did it happen to him? It's unbelievable that it happened to him.

attacking a meeting of a Ku Klux Klan group, which they said had been abusing black personnel on the base. An investigation determined that none of the six whites in the room was a KKK member - they were having a beer party, not a Klan meeting. But a Klan recruiter lived next door to the room attacked. 

WASHINGTON (AP) - Esther Peter- to the job. She held the post for three son says she is convinced that the drive for an independent consumer protection agency will succeed, despite recent setbacks. "I'm not going to say when," she adds, "but I certainly think in this Congress that decisions will be made."

Mrs. Peterson is President Carter's special assistant for consumer affairs. Her mission, she explained in a recent interview, "is ... to help get this bill (establishing a consumer agency) through Con-

That job is proving more difficult than most people expected earlier in the year. Both houses of Congress passed similar bills last year, but, in the face of a threatened veto by President Ford, failed to produce compromise legislation.

With Carter's support, backers of the concept predicted victory in 1977. They now concede they would lose if the issue came to a vote today. Mrs. Peterson said the reason for the problem is twofold. Number one, it was a very safe vote

for people in the other administration because many people who voted for it knew lot of those people changed when it became a reality." They changed, she said, because of the second reason, which is the extremely strong opposition that has come from (part of) the business com-

She believes the trend will turn around before the end of 1978. She said there is a growing realization in government that the consumer's voice is important and a growing realization in business that consumerism can be profitable.

Comparing the consumer movement to the drives for organized labor, civil rights and women, Mrs. Peterson said, "My feeling now is the consumer movement is the next of the popular movements ... 

C Average Required At School

NEWTON, N.C. (AP) - There will be no diplomas handed out to students in the Class of 1980 at Newton-Conover High School who do not have at least a C average, the school board has decided after hearing complaints about semi-literate graduates.

Last spring, 22 of the schools's 187 graduating seniors received diplomas even though they had D averages. By 1980, the new rule will require what school officials call a straight-C average. meaning that a student with all C's except for one D would not qualify for a diploma. A's and B's only will offset D's.

William Zimtbaum, chairman of the school board, said officials adopted the C average requirement because some graduating seniors could not perform at high school levels

'We heard gripes from employers who were hiring high school graduates who couldn't read or write." Zimtbaum said. 'We want this to happen less frequently and one way is through the stiffer requirements

But some national and state officials along with some local teachers say the plan will not make students work harder.

"I can't think of any high schools in the nation that have gone to a grade-point requirement," said H.T., Conner of the state Department of Public Instruction. "In a typical high school in North Carolina, this sort of thing would increase the number of students who don't get diplo-

The policy affects students who are now sophomores and school officials said when sophomores' averages are computed for the grading period that just ended, those who need extra help will be identified. Officials say they will try to provide extra help for those not meeting the grade requirements.

The substitute certificates given to a student who did not meet the requirements for a diploma will specify that the student technically did not graduate, and some teachers feel that having only a certificate would hurt a student's chances of getting a job.

But Jermoe Ingle, principal of the high school, said he liked the new grade re-

"I think all the students will buckle down and meet the average. They're all certainly capable of it," he said.

Sweden Plans To Forgive Nations' Debts

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) - Sweden plans to forgive \$200 million in debts it is owed by poor nations and has challenged the United States and other Western powers to do the same.

"We are undertaking this action in the firm hope that it will be followed by similar decisions of other countries." Ola Ullsten, minister for international development cooperation, told the General Assembly's Economic Committee recently

Ullsten said his government would need the approval of parliament before writing off the \$200 million in debts.

The announcement was welcomed by Third World delegates as a major breakthrough toward the creation of a new international economic order. One of the major demands by Third World nations has been for a moratorium on repayment of the estimated \$200 billion they owe to Western governments and banks.

Many governments, such as Peru. Turkey and Egypt, have been forced to implement severe austerity measures to pay their debts, sparking civil disorders and Ullsten said poor nations owe \$20 bil-

lion - one-tenth of their total debt load to the Western governments participating in the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development

"If all donor countries joined in an action to cancel ... debts to the poorest, it would mean a nearly 20 per cent increase of aid to these countries," he said. "For the rich it would mean foregoing a mere 0.02 par cent of their gross national

Many U.N. delegates have predicted disastrous economic repercussions if Third World countries are allowed to drift into subsistence

In a statement before the General Assembly. Foreign Minister Rujaratnam of Singapore predicted "a great depression - far more catastrophic than that of the 1930s - within the next few years," if industrialized and Third World countries cannot get together on creating a "sane world economy

'We who are lucky enough to be born in countries of rich opportunities should now and then remind ourselves that our efforts to keep up our already extremely high living standards can in no way be compared with the vast burden of the vast majority of people in the underprivileged parts of the world," he said.



Carter Avoids Fight On Water Projects

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter is backing away from another fight with Congress over the water projects he tried to kill earlier this year, a House member says.

Rep. Dan Marriott, R-Utah, who met with Carter along with other members of Congress from western states, said the President indicated he would consider pushing the projects to completion.

The President said he did not intend to continue fighting with Congress over water projects." Marriott told reporters after the White House meeting. "He indicated he would consider expediting them to avoid inflation and other costs

The decision marks Carter's final move in what has been a running battle with Congress since early spring over some members' pet projects - including dams, canals and irrigation systems in their home states.

At one point, Carter cited funding for the projects as a candidate for his first veto. But 10 of the projects were saved in a compromise with House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill.

Carter signed a \$10-billion public works bill including the 10 projects during an August vacation in his hometown of Plains. Ga. But he said at the time: "I remain very concerned about these pro-

One administration official in Plains with the President added: "I wouldn't be surprised if you haven't heard the last of water projects, even for this year." He left open the possibility that the President would send Congress a recision and deferral message.

In such a message, Carter could have listed congressionally approved spending he wanted either to delay or delete from the budget. The move would have forced Congress to vote once more on any projects Carter included in the message.

The President's decision not to send any such message ends his contention with Congress over the issue at a time when he needs to build support for other initiatives, mainly his energy policy and ratification of the new Panama Canal

Another bruising battle with members of the House and Senate over water projects could have harmed his efforts in those areas

Lebanese Youths Pay Mental Price For War

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - "We'll

blow your brains halfway across Beirut," scowled the 13-year-old with a pistol cocked at his victim's head.

The boy fired, said a fellow militiaman, and joined the thousands of adolescent murderers who dminated a 19-month civil war that killed at least 25,000 Lebanese and Palestinians.

Youths comprised the overwhelming majority of Palestinian-Lebanese leftist and Lebanese rightist militias that fought in the war, which ended last November. Now psychiatrists say Lebanon is be-

ginning to pay the mental price for the war, and the adolescents may pay a good part of the bill. Some small children traumatized by the daily shower of shellfire still stutter. wet their beds, squint and shake uncon-

trollably Adults, unable to sleep, ingest sizeable amounts of valium, librium and other

tranquilizers. "It's their way of coping . . . There's no war now. But there's no real law, no security, either," said Dr. Fuad Antun, a

prominent Beirut psychiatrist. The adolescents are a problem apart. We used to get the normal run of anxiety disorders during the war," said Dr. Amin Faris, a neurologist and colleague of Antun's at the teaching hospital of Beirut's American University.

The young child - and adult - disorders may pass once Lebanon's non-war is replaced with something more akin to peace, Lebanese psychiatrists agree. At least, they say, it is too early to tell.

But "the adolescents were the exception, during the war," said Faris. "I had teen-agers, young kids, who were fullblown schizophrenics. Faris was pressed into service by the

hospital's psychiatric staff when many doctors fled Beirut. The adolescents may face even greater problems now that the war is ended, said another prominent Lebanese psychiatr-

ist, who asked to remain unidentified. Deprived of the omnipotence of firearms, Lebanon's child killers will turn either criminal or neurotic in peacetime Beirut, the psychiatrist predicted.

He said the only other alternative was "rehabilitation." Ironically, the psychiatrist said "the overwhelming numbers of kids involved, the size of the problem' left only one potential tool for rehabilitation: a national military draft to allow rehabilitation within the disciplined and organized life of the army.

During the war, these adolescents found themselve in a situation totally foreign to their constitution," he said.

Suddenly, they had authority, the authority of pistols and grenade launchers independence from the looting.

"And most of all they had power, omnipotence almost, because they had the tool of fear. And everyone, absolutely everyone, was scared of these child executioners.

Lebanon's war-torn government has yet to replace the teen-age gunmen with alternative authority, psychiatrists interviewed agreed

The Montgomerys, former owners of Noah's Ark, a roadside zoo about two miles southeast of Lubbock, auctioned off their animals, furniture and curio shop Saturday

Almost 1,000 visitors, including residents in search of unusual pets, zoo owners from Colorado and Texas, and the curious, attended the two-day affair which netted \$8,700 from animal sales alone.

Close to \$1,300 from the auction was donated to the Lubbock State School for the purchase of electric wheelchairs. Total proceeds to benefit the school were estimated

"It was just so beautiful, totally unexpected and unsolicited," Donny Kelsey, volunteer coordinator of the Lubbock State School, said about the donation. "He (Montgomery) is one of the most generous, kindest men I've ever come across," she added.

The Montgomerys sold 27 exotic animals, including two lion cubs which went for \$525 to a Tech student and \$575 to a 14-year-old Ropesville girl.

A Spur family bought the most expensive animal auctioned - a trained chimp named Tammy who sold for \$2,200.

George, a Dromedary camel, was bought by the Amarillo zoo for \$1,875, while a llama brought \$600. Despite newspaper ads by the Lubbock Humane Society discouraging residents from buying exotic animals for pets, about 350 bidders showed up to view the menagerie.

All bidders reportedly were interviewed by auctioneer John Faulks to determine whether they had proper facilities for the animals and knew how to care for them. However, several of the animal purchasers were heard to ask the Montgomerys what to feed their new pets and where to keep

Rhonda Cantrell, 14, of Ropesville bought one of the four-monthold lion cubs. She hopes to "let it be a house pet and keep it in my room." She plans to feed it harnburger meat and will build a cage

The other owners of one of the cubs, Stacy Timmons, 21, of Brownfield and Shane Mousa, 21, a Tech student, "just wanted to have

"We'll probably keep him on the farm (in Brownfield) and feed him raw meat with a cereal blend,' Timmons said.

Silence filled the room as Tammy, a favorite pet of the Montgomery's, was auctioned for \$2,200 to Paul and Mannafay Hagins of Spur. The auctioneer looked at the pet snuggled close to him and said, 'Don't cry Tammy, I thought you were worth more too."

Montgomery, after the auction, briefly instructed the Hagins about Tammy's care. "Treat her just like

Potential Sweetener Found In Grapefruit

WESLACO, (UPI) - The peel of a grapefrut may one day be more valuable than the fruit itself if saccharin is banned as an artificial sweetener, a researcher

Dr. Calvin Lyons, a citrus specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, bases his prophecy on the potential of naringin, a bitter chemical found primarily in the skins of grapefruit, as a sweetener to replace saccharin in some products.

After it is altered through a process known by chemists as "alkaline cleavage with condensation," naringin - which gives grapefuit its early season bitterness - ironically emerges as a super sweetener with a strength 1,500 times that of sugar, Lyons said.

After the conversion, naringin emerges with a new name, Neohesperidin dehydrochalcone, which mercifully has been abrevcated to neo DHC

Lyons said on the basis of current prices and yields, the value of naringin has been calculated at about \$40 a ton by Dr. Jim Kesterton, of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences at the

University of Florida. Based on South Texas grapefruit production estimates of 138,000 tons, naringin would have added a value of \$5.2 million to the 1975-76 grapefruit crop had it all been recovered, representing a 28 per cent addition to the value of the \$18.6 million harvest last year, Lyons said.

He said growers discouraged by depressed juice prices, however, must be forewarned that at least two hurdles remain before they could begin cashing in on naringin's value as a sweetener: receiving clearance from the Food and Drug Administration to use neo DHC in consumer products and gearing Lower Rio Grande Valley facilities to extract the compound from grapefruit peelings.

The Valley currently has none of the specialized equipment for the task and "no one has expressed a serious interest" in installing it. Lyons said.

Only Sunkist of California presently has extraction capabilities, Lyons said, and

Should Florida and Texas both gear up to extract naringin, the price likely will dip unless demand increases dramatically, he added

Naringin already is used commercially to impart a bitter flavor to beverages, confections and marmalade made from sweet oranges and it also has been suggested as a raw material for dves.

Lyons said it had no therapeutic prop-

Dr. Bruce Lime of the U.S. Department of Agriclture's Crops Utilization Laboratory in Weslaco also cautioned growers that neo DHC leaves a sweet licorice aftertaste that lingers for several minutes. He said although probably undesirable in a diet drink, for instance, the chemical could be used in chewing gums.

Lyons said two manufacturers in New Jersey and California have applied to the FDA for permission to use neo DHC in toothpaste, mouthwash and chewing gum products.

If approved by the FDA, such use, could well signal the beginning of increasing returns" to grapefruit growers,

Achievement Tests Please School Officials

The aptitude and achievement tests are scored on a range of 200 to 800 points. The tests are taken primarily by collegebound students. Last year, the SAT was administered to

about one million of the nation's high school seniors - including about 50,000 in Texas. Of Lubbock's approximately 1,-860 graduates, 737 took the SAT and were included in the current test report.

The CEEB achievement tests, which are used for advanced college placement, are taken by a more select group, both here and nationally. Only a few hundred local seniors last year took the achievement tests, though Morris said this was in proportion to the number on the state and national levels.

Interpretation of the statistics-laden testing report is difficult because scoring trends are so conflicting. State and national averages have dropped consistently over the years, but Lubbock scores show a "roller-coaster" pattern.

For example, Lubbock's 1973 graduates had an SAT-verbal score of 438. The national average for the same year was seven points higher - 445.

Since then the national average has plunged to 429 in 1977. The Lubbock average on the SAT-verbal has been up and down, resting at 431 for last year

Thus, Lubbock's score last year was seven points below the local 1973 average. Yet, due to a much sharper decline nationwide, the local class of '77 topped the national average on the SAT-verbal for the first time in the five-year period studied

A similar pattern emerges on the SATmath.

Lubbock has scored well above the Texas average on both the verbal and math portions of the SAT for the past two

In the area of CEEB achievement tests, the state and national averages don't come close to Lubbock's English and math marks.


The local math achievement average was 598 in 1973, 580 in 1974, 582 in 1975, 591 in 1976 and 602 in 1977. National scores have fluctuated in the 537-to-547 range: the state means have been in the

On the English achievement test, Lubbock's average has dipped from 566 five years ago to 559 in 1974, 557 in 1975, 540 in 1976, and 541 in 1977. However, state and national averages have stayed in the 515-to-520 range.

On only one CEEB achievement test -American history - did Lubbock score below the national and state means. Local 1977 seniors had an average score in this area of 466, compared with a 492 national average and 495 state average.

Generally, the women coming out of

the city's high schools score higher than the men on verbal aptitude. In 1977, the women held an edge of 432 to 430. On the SAT-math, however, local male graduates continue to hold a big lead. For Lubbock's high school students, the average male's math score was 492, compared with the average female's score of

Carter Requests Defense Review

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter has ordered a major attack on critical defense command and management problems which he said "have resisted change for many years.'

In a recent memorandum to Defense Secretary Harold Brown, the President called for a "searching organizational review" and told Brown that "often, our own personal involvement will be needed" to get results.

Carter's order sets in motion still another in a series of efforts dating back about 30 years to make the giant, complex and often sluggish defense establishment function more effectively and economically in peace and war.

The most recent major attempt in that direction was made by the Nixon administration. It created a "blue ribbon defense panel" which recommended in 1970 a drastic overhaul of the defense leadership structure, both military and civilian.

But few of its fundamental proposals were adopted, apparently because the Nixon administration feared friction with the military and with elements in Congress while the Vietnam War was in prog-

In outlining key issues for study now, the White House "reorganization project staff" warned Carter he would face resistance from the military services and intense political pressures resulting from base closures and various consolidations.

The responsiveness — or the lack of it in crises - has been a major concern since the Vietnam War, and particularly since the North Korean seizure of the U.S. spy ship Pueblo in 1968 disclosed a virtual paralysis in the responses of mili-

tary and civilian authorities. "Serious questions persist about the effectiveness of the command structure for the conduct of war, for peacetime activities and for crisis management," said Carter's reorganization staff in a paper the President forwarded to Brown.

Among other things, the staff voiced concern about the capability of the Joint Chiefs of Staff "to provide guidance (to the President and the secretary of defense), to review contingency plans and to resolve differences between com-

Without going into detail, the paper said that "several conflicts that were not easily resolved have occurred between the Readiness Command and other unified commanders over matters of contingency planning and the conduct of opera-

The White House staff also focused attention on the perennial problem of trimming down and simplifying the management structure, principally organized around the secretary of defense and his top civilian assistants.

The memorandum said that basic questions yet to be resolved include overlapping and duplication in staffs and, in effect, the growth in various bureaucratic

practices which blur responsibility. Brown has made some limited changes at the very top of the civilian organization in the Pentagon, but Carter obviously

wants him to go further. Another major area of concern to Carter involves management of about \$36 billion, or about one-third of the Defense budget, in the area of what are called 'support services." These include supply, maintenance, training, health care and base operations

"There is much evidence that these functions are more expensive and less effective than they might be," Carter's

staff told him. The thrust of the reoganization staff's memo on this point appears aimed at the separate supply, training, medical and recruitment organizations maintained by the individual services. The staff apparently believes many of these should be

consolidated. "Each military service in the defense structure will work to protect its base of support activities," the staff memorandum said.

"The services' concern will be that reorganization of functions will impair readiness.

"Any changes in medical-health care delivery will arouse great concern and may meet resistance from retirees and

Califano Cites Waste Of Medicaid Money

WASHINGTON (AP) - Federal and state governments are wasting \$1 billion in tax money a year in ineligible Medicaid payments, says the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. said Sunday that 4.7 million ineligible claims totaling \$229 million were paid between April and September 1976.

Now, if you project that for a year that is just federal dollars - that is almost half a billion dollars, and the states are matching those payments; that is another half billion dollars." Califano said "So just in terms of ineligible payments, we are throwing \$1 billion a year away in

this country The figures, taken from HEW's computerized review of Medicaid transactions, include payments to health care providers, such as doctors, and to recipients. Califano commented on ABC-TV's "Is-

Firefighters Cope With 'Disaster'

LANSING, Mich. (UPI) - A cloud of rich black smoke billowed over Capital City Airport recently and firemen raced to the aid of victims trapped inside two airplanes.

But the whole scene - including National Guard rescue helicopters, firetrucks, wildly burning jet fuel and the victims themselves - was a fake. The extravaganza featuring a cast of

hundreds, was a training exercise to teach hospitals, firemen, police and emergency medical teams how to respond to a runway airline collision.

The two planes which were sur to be a Chicago-bound 727 and a turbo prop headed for Detroit, were positioned near the airport's real runways for the

Two hundred fifty gallons of aviation fuel were ignited and smoke bombs were set off, sending columns of fire and black smoke hundreds of feet into the sky. Airport firefighters dressed in protec-

tive silver suits raced to the scene and extinguished the flames with foam. Then, on cue, more than 50 victims trapped inside the two planes began screaming and

Firefighters and emergency medical teams arrived and began pulling the victims from the make-believe wreckage. placing them on stretchers and taking them to hospitals.

According to the script, 100 persons were supposed to have died in the collision. 45 were seriously injured. 20 had slight injuries and another 20 suffered from shock. Makeup and ketchup provided survivors with ghastly wounds.

One victim stumbled out of the plane and collapsed on the ground with all the style of a silent movie queen. Another supposedly suffering from shock, fought with firemen and screamed, "I want my ball. I want my ball.

At one point, a few newsmen sneaked away from the drill observation area to interview victims and firemen. An airport security worker tried to shoo them

"But hey, if this was a real disaster. we'd really be here," one photographer

protested. "Yeah, I know," the guard shot back, "and that's exactly what I mean. Get out of here.

WASHINGTON (AP) -It started a quarter an hour 40 years ago, and now the minium wage is about to go to \$2.65, with economists and politicians still arguing among themselves over its real impact on the market.

The question that hasn't been answered yet is whether a higher minimum wage is justice or folly; a boon to the working poor or a menace to their jobs

There is no shortage of studies, dissertations and analyses of that issue. They abound in the fine print of the congressional debate, on both sides.

Given the facts of life at the supermarket, the current minimum wage of \$2.30 an hour doesn't add up to much of a living for anybody who makes it and no more. It adds up to \$4,784 a year. Even at the increased rate, the minimum will be lower than the govern-

ment's poverty line for an urban family

of four. The minimum wage earner would get \$5,512. In 1978, the poverty level is expected to be about \$6 200 That would seem to make it all very simple: boost the rate and help the lowpaid, unskilled worker. But there's more to it, for as the cost of unskilled labor zoes up, so does the prospect that em-

er workers. Economist Edward M. Gramlich assessed that risk in a paper published by the Brookings Institution:

'As the minimum wage is increased beyond its historical range of 40 to 50 per cent of the median wage, more and more workers confront the grab-bag combination of a higher wage but a reduced probability of having a job.

The younger the worker, the worse it gets. Unemployment in September stood at 6.9 per cent of the labor force - but at 18.1 per cent for teen-agers, and at more than twice that for black teen-agers.

For all their differences on the broader question of minimum wage effects, the economists generally agree that it doesn't help the youthful job-seeker. He's more likely to be unable to find a job, or to lose one, than to get the higher hourly wage.

The liberal Republican Ripon Society likens it to attempts at healing by blood-

just as pernicious as medieval bloodlet- to any person's labor," said Sen. Harriting," the Ripon analysis said. For while the law can raise the wage, it can't raise worker productivity. And if the price of an hour's work exceeds the product, the job isn't likely to last.

By a single vote, the House rejected an amendment that would have set a special

wage rate, below the adult minimum, for workers under the age of 20. The Senate rejected four attempts to write in differentials so as to make it easier for young people to get or hold jobs.

Sponsors of the bill argued that there are better ways to generate work for unemployed youths. They also contended that cut rates for young workers would lead some employers to hire them instead of adults.

Americans Low On Activity

BOSTON (AP) - Many Americanswmay be leading such sedentary lives that they are "virtually motionless." moving about little more than if they remained in bed 24 hours a day. Dr. William Kannel director of the famed Framingham Heart Study, said here re-

Kannel said 16 percent of men and 21 percent of women in a group studied in Framingham achieved activity scores of 29 or less. He said that spending 24 hours in bed rates a score of 24.

Now known as the Boston University-Framingham Heart Study, the project has involved studying several thousand Framingham residents for 27 years, first under federal sponsorship and since 1971 under private auspices.

Kannel told a symposium on leisure time sponsored by the Massachusetts Medical Society that even in the group scoring the highest levels of activity, with scores higher than 36, few would qualify for a high level of physical fitness.

But it is also unjust for somebody who wants to work to be earning nothing at all, for lack of a job.

But those aren't the only issues involved. The minimum wage is a factor in the welfare equation. If welfare pays better than work, the administration's reform package is not going to accomplish

The arguments will continue, on those and other points, even though the law is set for at least three years, and perhaps four. The House and the Senate agree that the rate should go to \$2.65 an hour next year. The Senate bill would increase it in stages to \$3.40 in 1981. The House version would raise the minimum to \$3.05 in 1980. Congressional negotiators are working out the differences now.

For the economists, there's never a last word. If there was, it should be assigned to the First National Bank of Chicago, whose economic researchers report:

Every few years, the United States goes through the ritual of adjusting minimum wage laws. And just as regularly, the business and labor communities engage in exaggerated discussions about either the dire consequences or marvelous benefits that can be expected ...
