# **Kidney Transplant Unit In Prospect** For New Hospital

BY APRIL, Lubbock could be the first and only spot in West Texas where kidney transplants are performed, a local surgeon has predicted.

Dr. Richard Lawton, the city's only transplant surgeon, said a "certificate of need" was filed this week with Medicare

## **Cold Spell Due To Be Only Brief**

A SHORT-lived cool spell, which started temperatures dropping Sunday night, is expected to bring chilly weather today with warmer temperatures expected to resume by Tuesday.

No snow flurries or other precipitation are expected to accompany today's winter-like weather, according to a National Weather Service spokesman.

The mercury this afternoon is expected to struggle up to a cool mid-50s, before plunging into the mid-30s tonight East and southeast winds are forecast to blow at 10 to 15 mph today.

Front To Move On

A warming trend with temperatures in the 60s will sweep the South Plains. Tuesday as the front moves off the Texas coast, according to the NWS.

Texas Tech University football fans possibly will be treated with "dry and quite warm weather with temperatures in the low to middle 70s," an NWS forecaster said, when Tech meets University of Arkansas Thanksgiving Day at Jones Stadium

Skies were generally fair Sunday behind the northeast cold front which stretched from south of Wichita Falls, westward to the Lubbock area and into New Mexico.

Temperatures varied across the state Sunday as 30-degree readings were recorded in the northern Panhandle, while north of the front and West Texas enjoyed mild 70-degree highs and the remainder of the state registered readings in the balmy 80s

No problems are seen in gaining approval from either federal or state agencies, said Dr. Lawton, one of the country's leading transplant surgeons and vice chairman of the Texas Tech University medical school's department of surgery. In a March interview, the white-haired doctor said the city's first transplant was scheduled for the summer of 1977, but Medicare did not recognize Lubbock as having the facilities for such an operation at the time, so the transplant was

scratched Medicare Pays Expenses

Dr. Lawton said Medicare is essential because it pays all the expenses while the patient is in the hospital and 80 percent of the cost for at-home treatment. The Texas Department of Health picks up the rest of the tab up to \$1,800 while the person is receiving post-operative treatment outside the hospital.

Dr. Lawton said he feels certain the county hospital on 4th Street, which is scheduled to open in February, will be granted a transplant unit because it is the only facility in West Texas where medical services of every phase are offered under one roof.

Another point in favor of a unit here, the doctor said, is that West Texans are not offered a nearby transplant center. the closest being Parkland Hospital in Dallas, "and that's overworked.

Other transplant facilities in Texas are located in Houston, San Antonio, Galveston and Austin.

'It seems heartless to send a person needing a kidney transplant to Dallas or Houston ... you can't send the whole family out there," Dr. Lawton said. "People living far away from a transplant center just don't get transplanted.

Performed Iowa's First The surgeon, who came to Lubbock last November from Iowa, where he performed that state's first kidney transplant, said there are about 300 West Texans plagued with chronic kidney diseases

and estimated another 200 cases would

come up within a vear Dr. Lawton said about 40 percent of kidney disease patients in West Texas should have transplants. The doctor added, however, that Lubbock's facility could handle only about 10 percent the first year, 15 percent the next year and 20 percent the third year. Lawton recently was presented the Chairman's Award by the National Kidney Foundation for his clinical research and other contributions to NKF The core of Lubbock's transplant team would be Dr. Lawton, Dr. Glen Stanbaugh, a nephrologist who would determine who needed to be put on the artifi cal kidney machine (dialysis) which cleanses the patient's blood, and Dr. Lynn Avant, a urologist who specializes in the kidney draining system and would be vital in a patient's pre-and post-operative care. Dr. Lawton, who has 300 transplants under his belt and also performs cancer surgery, said transplantations involve a variety of specialists, including a pathologist, gastroenterologist, or stomach spc-

# **Talks Trigger Mixed Reaction**

JERUSALEM (AP) - In an act unthinkable less than two weeks ago, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat stood in the parliament of Israel Sunday and declared: "We accept to live with you in a lasting and just peace.

The declaration broadcast around the globe was the closest any Arab leader has come to recognizing Israel as an independent nation in 30 years of intermittent wars. Sadat's mission captured the imagination of millions, but infuriated Palestinian and other Arab militants to the point of calling for his assassination as a traitor.

"No Hands To Beat The Drums Of War"

Greeted at the Knesset by a fanfare of trumpets, Sadat read solemnly in Arabic from his text: "When the bells of peace ring, there will be no hands to beat the drums of war. Even if they existed, they would be soundless.

**Israel Must Withdraw** 

He insisted in his 55-minute speech that Israel must withdraw from Jerusalem and other lands occupied in 1967 and that uprooted Palestinians must receive a homeland.

Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin, following Sadat to the rostrum of the Knesset, hailed the Egyptian president for his "courage of heart" in coming to Israel and invited other Arabs to follow his path. Begin said he personally was prepared to go to the capitals of his Arab neighbors.

He called on Arab leaders to open peace negotiations and declared: "Everything must be negotiated and can be negotiated.

Begin conspicuously avoided any mention of Palestinians and, referring to oc-cupied territories, said: "We did not take any strange lands. We only returned to our own land No Political Shifts

The failure by either leader to make any shift in political position disappointed many Israelis and Egyptians. But from the outset few outside observers had expected any significant new proposals in the public speeches.

The immense significance of the day was not in its speeches, but in the symbolism. Never before had an Arab leader journeyed to Israel, let alone stood before its parliament to say:

'I wish to tell you today and I proclaim to the whole world: We accept to live with you in a lasting and just peace.

In Washington, President Carter prayed for the success of the Sadat-Begin meeting and said the Egyptian's mission to Israel "might very well break down the barrier to peace.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat personally appealed for a Palestine state before the Israeli parliament, defiant Palestinians Sunday screamed for his blood and denounced him as a traitor.

"Spill the traitor's blood. Spit in his face," demanded Zuheir Mohsen, leader. of the pro-Syrian Saiqa Palestinian guerrilla group

Saiga distribued thousands of leaflets in Beirut refugee camps calling on the Egyptian army to "oppose this treason" and for all Arabs to "follow the traitor Sadat to the ends of the earth, to spill his blood and carry out the just sentence."

Hundreds Demonstrate


In Damascus, hundreds of Syrian and Palestinian demonstrators stormed hrough the capital's streets and refug camps and shouted, "Kill the traitor. Kill the traitor

Yasser Arafat, chairman of the Palestine Liberation Organizaton, spoke short-ly after dawn to some 3,000 Palestinians at a guerrilla cemetery in Beirut and sharply attacked "Sadat's abominable visit," which he said betrayed the Amb cause

But the guerrilla leader, dressed in dark green combat uniform and wearing a military cap, added: "I hereby chail lenge Begin and his friends. Even the shock of Sadat cannot sink the Palestinian revolution.

George Habash, leader of the radical Popular Front for the Liberation of Pal. estine (PFLP), said in a rare press state; ment that the Sadat visit, and his address to the Israeli knesset, represented greatest and most dangerous defiance of our Palestinian masses and Arab nation' since the 1948 birth of Israel **Excessive Moderation Blamed** Habash said the Sadat visit was made possible by excessive moderation by some Arab regimes and by the PLO and called for a wide radical front joining Are ab and Palestinian forces. PLO information department director Vasser Abed Rabbo said there was a "Sadat-Begin plot" to seal a separate peace, and called on an urgent summit grouping the PLO, Libya, Iraq, Sigeria and South Yemen to counter the Sada visit. Most of the vehement and violent anti-Sadat demonstrations around the world had spent themselves by Sunday and most wrath and anger was contained only in newspapers. ### Vance Begins Trip In Buenos Aires

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) -Secretary of State Cyrus Vance arrived in Buenos Aires Sunday on the first stop of a three-nation South American visit and said he plans to have "serious discussions" with Argentine officials on human rights and arms proliferation.

Vance said he believes the discussions will lead to an increased mutual understanding between the two nations. Vance will spend Monday meeting

with Argentine officials, including President Jorge Videla

Israel greeted Sadat as a hero, turning out the entire cabinet to greet him at the airport Saturday and decorating Jerusalem with thousands of Israeli and Egyptian flags.

After worshipping at the Al-Aqsa mosque, visiting a Christian church and touring the Yad Vashem monument to Jewish victims of the Nazi holocaust, Sadat arrived at the Knesset hall accompanied by Israeli President Ephraim Katzir and Knesset speaker Yitzhak Shamir.

Military trumpeters sounded a fanfare and the members and visitors rose to their feet and applauded. Then for the next 55 minutes the rabbis in skullcaps, Arabs in flowing headcloths, army generals who had battled Egypt, current and former government leaders, diplomats and journalists sat in silence, listening through earphones.

"You would like to live with us in this region of the world, and I tell you in all honesty that we welcome you among us with all the security and peace," Sadat said.

His message, he said, "constitutes an important juncture in the history of the world."

#### **Admits Past Rejections**

He acknowledged that in the past the Arabs had rejected Israel, refused to meet its representatives, rejected its legitimacy and communicated only through mediators.

Vice President Hosni Mobarak and millions of other Egyptian Moslems turned to face Mecca at dawn and knelt in prayer, asking Allah for a successful conclu sion to Sadat's historic trip during Id al Adha, the feat commemorating Abraham's willingness > sacrifice his son, Isaac, to God

For the first time since the overthrow of the monarchy in 1952, Egyptians were able to hear the Arabic broadcasts of Radio Isarael clearly and wityhou interference

The government apparently stopped jamming the broadcasts for Sadat's visit. It was not known if interference would resume after he returns today

Egypt's Coptic Christian minority also prayed for Sadat. The Coptic pope, Shenuda III, was reported to have expressed the wish to visit Jerusalem himself on the first visit permitted after thie president's return from the Holy City.

The daily Al Ahram said Sadat told Egyptian reporters accompanying him to Isarael that he was brought "detailed and important" proposals for Middle East settlement, and was optimistic he could win Israel's agreement.

## Lubbock Man **Slain; Five Held In Jail**

MINUTES after a 22-year-old Lubbock man was stabbed to death early Sunday Lubbock police had five men in custody in connection with his murder.

Police investigating a stabbing in the area of the 3900-block of 20th Street about 2 a.m. Sunday found a 19-year-old youth only slightly injured lying in the roadway near there.

But witnesses assisting the youth told officers another man lay dead at the intersection of 20th Street and Miami Ave-

Steven Lee Cook of Rt. 7 was pron ounced dead about 3 a.m. in Methodist Hospital by Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy. LeCroy ruled his death homicide

Five witnesses at the scene were taken to the police station for questioning and a short time later, officers arrested five Mexican-Americans at the intersection of 34th Street and Memphis Avenue in connection with the death.

The other injured youth, 19-year-old Mike C. Cummings of 2207 7th St. No. 108, was in satisfactory condition late Sunday in Methodist Hospital.

Police said the altercation apparently began when Cook and Cummings, who were traveling together, noticed "four or five" Mexican-American men creating a disturbance.

# Women Debating Action **On Abortion**, Gay Rights

HOUSTON (AP) - The National Women's Conference faced two of the most divisive social issues - abortion and gay rights - as delegates worked Sunday on recommendations designed to eliminate sex discrimination in the United States. Those two issues were among 15 subjects on the agenda on the second full working day of the federally funded meeting

The delegates also faced decisions on homemakers' rights, international affairs, welfare and a federal women's department.

Recommendations approved by the delegates will be forwarded to President Carter and Congress for consideration. The conference, which drew representatives of American women from every state and territory, is sponsored by the National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Vear

Recommendations placed before the delegates were a compilation of proposals adopted in 56 state and territorial meetings which preceded the national conference. The IWY Commission added the women's department proposal. The draft recommendations are known as a National Plan of Action.

Another of the most controversial issues was cleared Saturday night when a majority of delegates endorsed the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

The endorsement caused an extended delay in the proceedings as delegates cheered and shouted their approval.


They also backed recommendations on battered wives, child abuse, child care, and employment.

The resolutions the conference passes are not expected to differ greatly from those in the draft plan of action. But there is organized opposition to this plan. Indiana state Sen. Joan Dubbins claimed that about 20 percent of the delegates share her conservative viewpoints. They have drawn up an alternate set of resolutions

Some of Mrs. Dubbin's supporters have attempted to amend nearly every proposal put before the conference. But they have been unsuccessful.

Mrs. Dubbins conceded she and her allies were unlikely to have any of their recommendations endorsed by the conference because of their numbers.

Their chief points of opposition were to the ERA, to federally funded day-care centers, to provisions for gay rights, and to abortion in general, and especially to federal funding of poor women's abortions

## **Women's Leaders Contend ERA 'Momentum' Growing**

HOUSTON (AP) - Three leaders of the Equal Rights Amendment ratification movement claimed Sunday that their side has the momentum to pass it in three additional states in order to add it to the Constitution.

Liz Carpenter, co-chairwoman of ERAmerica, said the proposed amendment is being blocked by a few legislators in a few crucial states.

Mrs. Carpenter said a boycott by ERA supporters of convention cities and states that have not ratified it is expected to have a great impact.

"I think that states that drag their feet...are not going to be considered very hospitable places to go," she said. Eleanor Smeal, president of the Na-

tional Organization for Women, defended the move to extend the ERA ratification period from seven to 14 years.

"It is not a change of rules in the middle of the game," she said. "The Constituition does not have a time limit." When Congress passed the ERA, it set a time of limit of seven years for its ratification by the states. That expires March 22, 1979.

Audrey Rowe Colom, immediate past president of the National Women's Political Caucus, said the three needed states "can be obtained. The momentum is growing.

The three women spoke on a special edition of NBC's Meet the Press program, held in connection with the National Women's Conference.

The conference delegates on Saturday night endorsed the ratification of ERA. The amendment has been ratified in 35

states. But three of those states, Idaho, Tennessee and Nevada, have voted to rescind their ratifications. The Justice Department has said that rescissions are not permissable.

The three women are all members of the National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year. which is sponsoring the conference.

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Margaret Mealy, immediate past president of the National Council of Catholic Women and IWY commissioner, voiced opposition to the ERA.

Phyllis Schlafly, president of Stop ERA, claimed that the amendment wouldn't have any good effect in terms of employment or education.

She said it would lead to federal preemption of powers that rightfully belonged to the states. Mrs. Schlafly also criticized the Nation-

al Women's Conference and the IWY Commission in particular. She said Congress should not have ap-

proved \$5 million for the conference. We think that it is a gross misspending of tax funds." she said. "I don't think the federal goverment should be giving money to a special interest group to pursue its goals.

# **In Madeira Crash**

FUNCHAL, Madeira (AP) - A Portuguese jetliner with 164 persons aboard overshot the runway and exploded during landing Saturday, killing at least 70 persons and injuring 39, authorities reported. They said 55 were missing.

Witnesses said the Boeing 727 touched down near the mid-point of the runway during stormy weather and the pilot was unable to bring it to a stop. A series of explosions ripped the aircraft apart, blowing the forward portion of the fuselage to the edge of the sea.

The injured were taken to the Funchal district hospital. Medical officials said 10 persons died in the hospital or were dead on arrival. Bodies of the other dead were taken to a chapel in the nearby village of Santa Cruz

The airport is located between the mountains and the sea on this popular resort island. Airline officials would not

speculate on the cause of the crash but in-the past pilots complained that the runways are short and urged they be extended. High winds and seas have hampered rescue workers in the search for more survivors. The runway was littered with debris and the airport was closed after. the crash.

Flight controllers said rain and 12 mph winds had reduced visibility to 21/4 miles, when the TAP jet landed at 10 p.m (5 p.m. EST). The airport had been closed earlier in the day because of the storm. officials said. But it was reopened later.

Officials of the national airline said the plane carried 156 passengers and eight crew members. The flight originated in Brussels, Belgium. Most of the passen-gers were believed to be Portuguese.

Madeira is located 400 miles off the coast of Morocco and 600 miles southwest of Lisbon.

## Sunday Meeting **Delays Bus Strike**

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) - Negotiators for Greyhound Lines and the strikeprimed Amalgamated Transit Union were to meet in a motel room Sunday in hopes of heading off a walkout that could strand Thanksgiving Day travelers across the nation

Union members voted 10,313 to 1,304 Friday to reject Greyhound's offer of a \$300 bonus and continued cost-of-living provisions, said Owen Jones, president of the AFL-CIO union's Grevhound Council.

Jones met with company bargainers and U.S. mediator Sam Franklin for part of Saturday morning before both sides adjourned to separate meeting rooms and agreed to reconvene Sunday at 4 p.m. (EST).

Neither union nor company officials would comment on Saturday's session. Greyhound has said its earnings dropped 50 percent in the past five years and that it could not afford to go beyond the \$59 million contract package offered Oct. 27. The old three-year pact expired Oct. 31 but has been honored on a dayto-day basis during strike voting and subsequent negotations.

Greyhound drivers and terminal workers walked out for nine days before arriving at the 1974 contract which provided a 16 percent wage increase. Workers make about \$6.21 an hour, or 25 cents a mile.

Don Rhodes, vice president of the union's Greyhound bargaining council, said no wage increase had been requested prior to Friday's strike vote. "We had only asked that the cost of living be paid to us, to make up for whatever we lost," he said.

However, negotiators were bargaining on 109 pages of revisions to the 400page contract which covers four geographical areas, Rhodes said. The pact contains two pension programs and two health and welfare programs, he said.

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

## **Methane Gas Leaks Plaguing Landfills**

DENVER (AP) - Recent laws restricting the outdoor burning of trash have created a new problem, officials say - methane gas that leaks from buried landfills

In the past year, two persons have been killed and 11 seriously burned in explosions caused by methane seeping from buried garbage in the Denver area, according to authorities.

The problem is not restricted to the Denver area. The National Association of Counties says that methane from buried garbage has caused explosions in Richmond Va. and Louisville, Ky

Methane, an orderless gas, is produced when buried organic material decomposes. It often moves hundreds of yards along gravel-lined trenches dug for utility lines, said Don Kennerson, a fire marshal in the Adams County suburbs north of Denver

Kennerson and Bob Bowland, acting supervisor for the Tri-County Health Department, said the problem is compounded because most communities have not charted the location of underground landfills.

Beyond that, they said, there are no laws and little money and equipment to deal with the problem.

Two construction workers were killed and five others injured in June when methane exploded in an underground water line they were building in Commerce City. Six youngsters were badly burned in Sheridan last year when methane ignited in a storm sewer in which they were playing.

In both cases, officials said, the gas came from buried garbage, the source also of gas detected in the past year in six buildings in Brighton. There were no explosions in those buildings, but officials notified building owners who since have installed ventilators and alarms.

"There is no specific statute giving responsibility to any agency" for dealing with the problem, said Bruce Wilson, environmentalist with the Tri-County Health Agency that operates in Adams, Arapahoe and Douglas counties around Denver.

The problem of leaking methane could exist anywhere in the state, he added, and officials of several agencies have asked Gov. Richard Lamm to put before the legislature next year a bill to establish at least minimum controls on landfills that could produce methane

## Schlesinger Urges 'Serious' Attitude

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) - Although Americans are coming to accept that the country has an energy crisis, the question remains "whether we're going to be serious about it," says Secretary of Energy James Schlesinger.

The energy crisis will last until technology develops a substitute for oil, he told a news conference Saturday before attending a testimonial dinner for U.S. Rep. Robert Giaimo, D-Conn.


Schlesinger defended his department over published reports that claim the department's effectiveness is hindered by its preoccupation with energy legislation rather than administration.





To grasp the awesome momentum of this buildup, consider these facts brought together in a recently declassified NATO study:

IN THE FOUR years ending last December, largely for Central Europe, the Soviet Union has produced 13,850 front-line battle tanks, including the newest T-72 model, against U.S. production of 2,345; 6,500 long-range artillery pieces, the latest of which is believed capable of firing a nuclear explosive, as against 800 in the U.S.; 5,500 fighter aircraft against 2,800 U.S. fighters.

European members of NATO-particulary the British and West Germans-have been eyeing the ground-launched cruise missile as perhaps the onpossible counter to this immense Soviet buildup in Central Europe.

Indeed, both London and Bonn perceive in the presumably hard-to-shoot-down cruise missile a partial answer to vastly increased Soviet 'theater" firepower, with its thick anti-aircraft defenses, and to the new SS-20 intermediaterange mobile ballistic missile.



FOR LUBBOCK Patrol Officer "Pat" Patterson, it is a story he has "read" before. The ending is never quite the same.

The life and death drama this time is Pat's search for the driver of a hit-and-run vehicle involved in the death of 18-year-old Rebecca Ann Hairston.

Miss Hairston was struck down as she crossed University Avenue just north of Sixth Street the night of the Tech-TCU Homecoming football game. She died of her injuries four days later.

Becky, a 1977 graduate of Lubbock High School, thus became the unlikely 39th victim of traffic mishaps in Lubbock this year.

And while her death already was far above the record for one year, at least five more persons were to join her via the traffic death route even before this weekend arrived.

ALL TRAFFIC Deaths are tragic. But that of Becky Hairston has an added note of irony.

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Even though the busy thoroughfare was filled with pedestrians and motorists, and at least one driver reportedly followed the suspected "death car" for several blocks, no one remembered to take down the license number!

This is the frustrating thing to Pat Patterson, who in his 25 years in the traffic patrol division of the Lubbock Police Department has tracked down more than one suspected hit-and-run case.

The task this time has been a bit more difficult, for a number of reasons. One of the main ones, however, is that no one did the simple thing of copying down the tag on the white pickup which had run up on the University Avenue median, then swerved back into the traffic heading south only moments before striking the girl.

AS THE WEEKEND approached, Pat continued what to him had been an almost 24-hour job, still checking every small clue he could find.

'Any help we can get, we will appreciate," he said. "We're looking for a late 1960's or early 1970's model, white pickup, with the back body over the fenders' and possibly a slight dent on the right front grill ...

The search for such a vehicle has taken Pat and some of his fellow officers all over the city, to practically every parking lot in town, up and down streets, night and day ... "I keep having the feeling that someone beside

the person who was driving knows what we are looking for," Pat said as he shuffled through a stack of notes. "Someone, somewhere.

If his search has been a success before this appears, it will be due to his tenaciousness. In any event, Pat, who has a son and daughter of his own, welcomes any help he can get.

PAT'S JOB AND that of others seeking ways and means of doing something about Lubbock's gruesome accident death toll points up one overriding fact-the average citizen indeed does have a role to play in what sort of city he is to live in.

This translates into: "If you are going to save your life, protect your property, not infringe on others' rights, then you have got to shoulder your share of the burden.

When you climb into your car each day, that means you and you alone are responsible for obeying the law, not cutting corners, not speeding, and above all, "watching out for the other fel-

Summaries of 70,000 messages between Berlin and German commanders in the field, which had been intercepted by British intelligence's fantastic Operation Ultra, are being made available to historians and journalists for the first time.

The story of how Ultra geniuses cracked the German secret code by duplicating the Nazis' Enigma encoding machine became public knowledge some time ago.

But the 70,000 messages are the first to be released from a file that began to be accumulated as early as February 1940.

IT WAS MONTHS, however, before Operation Ultra was fully cranked up, during which Hitler scored some of his most stunning successes, such as the blitzkrieg through the Lowlands and France in May 1940.

But eventually, the Allied high command was reading virtually every message the Germans sent out on the air, sometimes even before they reached their intended recipients. The intelligence ranged:

. From the tactically significant to the strategically crucial: and

· From the camouflaged positions of planes on a German airfield, for example, to the extent of German strength opposing Allied troops begged down on the Normandy beaches on D-Day.

A NUMBER OF tantalizing questions have been posed by the Ultra revelations.

But chiefly, since the Nazis were in effect fighting with one hand behind their back, at least in the latter part of the war, why did it take so long to smash them?

Or was the war shortened by Ultra, and if so, by how much?

Could it conceivably have been lost without Ultra?

THE DOCUMENTS now being made available are not expected to result in any fundamental rewriting of the story of World War II.

But the knowledge of what the generals and strategists on both sides knew, and when they knew it, may shed new light on individual operations of the war.

"LONDON WANTS A ground-launched cruise of 2,000 kilometers, the French and Germans about 1,500 kilometers," one NATO expert told us. "That would bring Western Russia, where the SS-20 is believed most deployable, within range." But pressed by Moscow, the U.S. is perceived here to have tentatively agreed to a 600-kilometer range limit

With high government officials in London, Paris and Bonn reviving their first thorough briefing on these classified matters two weeks ago there is no doubt at NATO headquarters that only a hard-line European appeal might now deflect President Carter from the agreement he seems wedded to:

No transfer of U.S. cruise missile technology to the Europeans and no "circumvention" permitting deployment of medium-range cruise missiles in Western Europe.

The Carter administration belittles these European fears. Gelb, according to experts here, is saying that the ban on a 600-plus kilometer range will last only three years.

The NATO experts counter privately that if the European appeal is tough enough, Carter will be compelled to ease the non-transfer and non-circumvention language.

FEW HERE PREDICT that the huge Soviet buildup of Central European miltary power threatens sudden attack. The fear is different:

That politics depends on perceptions and that, with Warsaw Pact military power clearly moving so far ahead of NATO's, the Soviets are now perceived as approaching the kind of superiority that could insensibly lead Western Europe to buckle to Soviet economic and political pressures.

That is the answer to the recurring question of "why

Why is Moscow spending 14 percent of its gross national product on arms and why has its conventional firepower in Central Europe almost doubled in the past four years?

AS THE EUROPEANS see it, the answer is eventual brutalization of Europe by stockpiled military power skillfully manipulated for political and economic ends.

For example, French planners say Finland's absorption-in the political and economic sense -by the Soviets has advanced much further than generally understood.

They add that Moscow wants an economically healthy Western Europe-not one devastated by war-to provide the Soviet Union with an endless stream of technology and experts.

This is the heart of the argument now heating up between Europe and Jimmy Carter.

It is a military argument that today centers on the cruise missile, tomorrow on something else that the U.S. will be pressured by Moscow to withhold from its allies in the interest of superpower diplomacy.

Foreseeing this, top NATO officials here are betting on "an explosion within NATO" on the cruise missile issue by early next year-one that will severely test U.S. desires for strategic arms pacts with Moscow at the expense of U.S. loyalty to the Europeans.

THE OTHER DAY, Mayor Roy Bass called a meeting of some top City officials, traffic people and members of the media.

The subject was the City's alarming death toll on its streets, which if projected on a per capita basis would make Lubbock one of the worst for such things in the state.

Mayor Bass was seeking ideas on how to stop the street slaughter. He didn't say it, but the more than 40 dead in traffic mishaps are just as dead as if they had been gunned down by a wild man. And in some instances, it has almost amounted to that.

What makes the job more frustrating is that the death toll has cut across all age lines, all hours of the night and day, and at numerous places over the city. Rich and poor, Anglo, Black, Mexican, Men, Women, Children-all share a common fate when metal strikes metal or flesh.


THE TROUBLE with safety campaigns is that those of us who read about them, even promote them think that we are immune to what we are talking about.

# **Houston Mayoral Runoff Set**

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston residents elect a new mayor on Tuesday, following a million-dollar campaign that had most voters yawning until recent days when it turned into a name-calling contest.

The candidates in the runoff election are Frank Briscoe, 51, a former district attorney, and Jim McConn. 49, a builder and former city councilman.

The election is nonpartisan, but both men are Democrats. The winner will succeed Mayor Fred Hofheinz, who did not seek a third two-year term.

Briscoe led McConn, 54,472 to .37,621. as the two survived a 12-person Nov. 8 general election which drew only 23.7 percent of registered voters, including only 18.4 percent of the normally powerful black vote.

Through last Tuesday, McConn had reported \$546,022 in campaign expenditures, Briscoe \$533,586.

Hofheinz and two black organizations ignited the runoff fireworks last Monday with blasts at Briscoe, Gov. Dolph Briscoe's cousin

Hofheinz blamed Briscoe, his runoff opponent two years ago, for planting rumors about him that led to a grand jury investigation earlier this year.

The jury ended its investigation by saying no evidence could be found to support allegations a high elected official was arrested in a drug or vice raid and released after a top-level police official intervened. Hofheinz said he is considering filing a slander suit against Briscoe.

At about the same time, top officials of the two black groups, the Harris County Council of Organizations and the Black Organization for Leadership Development, accused Briscoe of being a racist. Briscoe denied the allegations and

charged that McConn had orchestrated.

the accusations. McConn responded by calling Briscoe a "sick man." As the name-calling heated up, resi-

dents quickly lost what interest they had in such issues as fiscal responsibility and mass transit.

The powerful Council of Organizations endorsed McConn for the runoff after issuing no endorsement in the Nov. 8 general election.

Observers believed the black turnout could be a major factor Tuesday. Compared to the 18.4 percent turnout two weeks ago, 45.6 percent of the registered blacks cast ballots two years ago and 97.5 percent of that vote went to Hofheinz.

Though he blased Briscoe, Hofheinz did not endore McConn. However, he said it was obvious for whom he plans to

Hofheinz said his criticism of Briscoe was prompted by his presence in New Orleans when about 75 percent of voters turned out for that city's Nov. 12 mayoral runoff. He said something needed to be done to excite the people about the Houston runoff



# **V** Supports Research For Cousteau

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The usual order of things is stood on its head by Jacques Cousteau's research ship Calyp-

It is, Cousteau says, the only research project in the world supported by a television series.

"This is a strange mixture," he said. The scientific research is a byproduct of the television series, rather than the television being a byproduct of the scientific research. We turn the world upside down.

"For us, this is good. Because the other way, the cameramen become the intruders. We integrate the filming with the research and that way we get a better sto-

He said a year's research by the crew of the Calpyso in waters off Greece, in cooperation with Greek archaeologists, produced important discoveries.

"But our prime purpose was to bring back a film on the scientific discoveries," he said. "We use only the income from our television distribution in more than 100 countries and never accept scientific

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money. It would tie our hands and we would have to come back and make a report to some committee.

Cousteau's latest film, one of four in The Cousteau Odyssey" to be shown on the Public Broadcasting Service this season, airs Tuesday, Nov. 22. It is "Calypso's Search for the Britannic" and tells of finding the British hospital ship that was torpedoed and sunk in the Aegean Sea on Nov. 21, 1916.

He agreed that searching for the ship was a departure for the series, seen for 10 years on ABC and on PBS for the past vear

"We did explore sunken Japanese ships on the island of Truk, but here there are two major differences. First, the depth of 366 feet required elaborate techniques and sophisticated diving gear.

"And second, we were making an inquiry about why such an unsinkable ship had gone down so fast? Was it carrying war materiel? How was it that a single explosion sank a ship built to resist any damage in just a few minutes?" The Britannic was a sister ship of the

Titanic, another unsinkable ship that from a submarine at that depth." sank after hitting an iceberg in 1912. The Britannic was constructed after the Titanic and was further reinforced against sinking.

Cousteau said that after 68 dives exploring every section of the ship, and more than 30 submarine dives, it was concluded that the damage was too extensive to have been caused by a single torpedo

By chance, we had a star, Mrs. Mitchell," said Cousteau. "We were looking for a survivor as a witness. But we had no idea we would find someone of such appeal to the public. She is an extraordinary lady

Sheila Macbeth Mitchell, now 86, was a nurse aboard the Britannic at the time of its sinking. She viewed the ship from the Calypso's submarine.

Asked about the best-selling thriller soon to be a movie, "Raise the Titanic," Cousteau said finding the Titanic would be easy. "We know where it is. But it is so deep - 4,000 feet - that it would not make a good film. You could only view it

Other shows in the series will be telecast in March.

The second also takes Cousteau to the wreckage of a ship, this one a Roman vessel that went down while taking plunder

from the city of Pergamon, in what is now Turkey, in 88 B.C. "Pergamon revolted against the Romans in 86 B.C. and two years later the Romans sent a punitive expedition to de-

stroy the city," Cousteau said. "One of the ships bringing back the city's art treasures sank. We found the ship and were able to learn of the story thanks to the coins aboard. The artifacts are now at the University of Athens.

In the final shows, the Calypso searches for Atlantis, the legendary lost continent first told of by Plato.

"We explored in good faith and we tellour story in an unconventional way." he said. "The usual way to tell about Atlantis is by sensationalism, and we avoid that. We take the public by the hand and tell them how a legend is formed around a core of truth.

Some scientists have speculated that Plato's story was fashioned from the prehistoric destruction of the island of Santorini, near Crete.

Did the Calypso find anything? "I think so," Cousteau answered. "The public will judge. But I think it's quite convincing. We give space in our film to all ideas. We try to be fair."

Cousteau said he spends about four months a year in stretches of two or three weeks at a time aboard the Calypso, then spends about four months preparing the

four annual shows, which are seen on television in more than 100 countries. The remainder of the year he devotes to the Cousteau Society.

Prior to entering television in 1966, Cousteau produced 25 theatrical films, winning three Academy Awards. He said he could not begin to count the Emmy awards he has won.

Cousteau said in the past few years his television films have become more concerned with humans, rather than merely showing the ocean and marine life.



# **Davis Trial Judge Declares**

AMARILLO (UPI) - If every trial lasted as long as the recently completed, 20-week T. Cullen Davis capital murder trial - Texas' longest - the state's judicial system could not survive, according to the presiding judge.

We could not have that type of situation, it would be too, too tough," District Judge George E. Dowlen said in a weekend interview

The millionaire defendant was acquitted Thursday by a Panhandle jury of the charge that he shot and killed his 12year-old stepdaughter during the burglary of his estranged wife's Fort Worth mansion Aug. 3, 1976.

"I think, no, the system couldn't survive if every case took 20 weeks to try," Dowlen said. "However, you'll find very, very few cases where the prosecution and the defense have put the money into a case that obviously was put in on this one.

Davis, 44, claimed his defense cost about \$2 million and Tarrant County spent \$500,000 in its unsuccessful prosecu-

"I really don't foresee another case quite like this one coming along," Dowlen said. "It was inconceivable to me that any case could last over six or eight weeks." Testimony he described as "bizarre" prolonged it even

further "You remember the testimony of Priscilla Davis and

Beverly Bass," Dowlen said in reference to the two prosecution witnesses who identified Davis as the gunman. 'They just wouldn't answer - they wouldn't answer the questions. And by not answering the questions, it prolonged it on and on 'I lived through it. That was bizarre, really bizarre." He said Miss Bass, 19, "is smarter than she appeared to be on the stand. I think she was so nervous and had heard so much about Racehorse (defense attorney Richard Haynes) that she was going to be very careful before she answered anything.

they had. They had to put Priscilla Davis on. And, you know, the jury could believe her - they could believe her or not believe her. But when you have an eyewitness, you have to put them on.

"I think that they (jurors) went in there and made up their minds the state hadn't proved it. They had a reasonable doubt and that was it. That jury would not turn loose anyone they believed killed a 12-year-old child just because they didn't like the mother. That bunch would not have, in no way, shape or form.

Dowlen said Haynes of Houston and co-defense counsel Phil Burleson of Dallas deserve their reputations.

"Certainly they're the best I've ever seen," he said. Burleson had the ability to say, 'Okay, Race, you be first chair and I'll be second chair,' and it worked out great and they made a solid team. I don't think it ever could have worked out the other way ... because of their two, separate personalities. Race could not be second chair

Dowlen, an easy-going 43-year-old bachelor with a reputation as a ladies man, said the trial drained him emotionally and affected his lifestyle.

It just really assaulted me," he said. "I haven't really let down yet and I probubly won't for a couple of weeks. Yeah, it affected my lifestyle, it sure did. I would just be beat. #### By LOUIS HARRIS

By 43-34 percent, a plurality of Americans feels that the quality of life in this country has grown worse compared with 10 years ago, with another 19 percent who feel it has stayed about the same.

The results of this latest Harris Survey of 1,533 adults nationwide are roughly in line with the prevailing mood of the country over the past four years. Briefly last April, with a new administration in Washington, the number of Americans who thought the quality of life was improving started to climb. But now, a sense of pessimism has once again taken

When Americans are asked why they feel the quality of life has grown worse. many city the unusual experience of having a high inflation rate occurring at the same time as a high unemployment rate. This continuing phenomenon of the 1970s has had a deeply discouraging effect Americans. Equally discouraging is the sense that the physical environment has not improved, despite efforts to clean up fouled air and polluted waters.

A third factor contributing to the pervading sense that the quality of life has deteriorated is the public's growing lack of faith in the justice of the economic marketplace As consumers, the people feel by a wide margin of 3 to 1 that they are consistently shortchanged on product quality and product safety, by shoddy repairs, by warranties and guaranties that are not what they are supposed to be, and by manufacturers who are perceived as generally not really caring about the customer. This country is in the throes of a deep-seated consumer revolt, which is likely to grow and have a greater impact in the years ahead.

Although people feel that the quality of life has grown worse, they still believe that they can make things better by their own actions. A sizable 63 percent report that they have had a bad experience with a product purchased in the past year.

· Education makes a difference. By 54-20 percent, those who did not go beyond the eighth grade feel that the quality of life has deteriorated. But by a narrow 41-39 percent margin, those with some college education report that things have improved.

· Professionals, by a close 39-37 percent, hold the view that the quality of life has gone up, while by a 50-36 percent margin white collar people feel it has deteriorated.

· Men and women have somewhat dif fering perceptions of what has happened to the quality of life. By 47-32 percent, women feel it has declined over the past decade. Men agree, but by a much closer 39-37 percent.

In sum, it is evident that younger. mnore affluent, better educated people are more optimistic about the quality of life. Older people, those with less education, those with white collar jobs and lower incomes, women and white Catholics are most pessimistic.

What is striking about these results is the disenchantment of the lower middleincome and white collar groups. Traditionally, these people have not been the progenitors of change in this country. Yet it is evident from these results that they are most unhappy with the quality of life in 1977.

There is still plenty of time to take losss, although there is no reason to wait until the jam-up at the close of the market on Dec. 30

It is not too soon to begin reviewing our portfolio's tax figures now. A study by Bache Halsey Stuart Shilds reminds investors that the amount of capital losses which can be used as a deduction from ordinary income was increased to \$2,000 for 1977 from \$1,000 in 1976. (A further days, thus doubling your chance for profincrease, to \$3,000, will become effective in 1978.) Short-term capital losses may be subtracted from ordinary income at full value, whereas long-term losses can be used only "half-strength" - that is, \$4,-000 of long-term losses will offset only \$2,000 of ordinary income.

There also has been a change in the holding period for determining long-term capital gains and losses. It has been exlended to nine months and one day from the previous six months and a day. This holding period will be extended again to one year - on Jan. 1, 1978. It is imporlant to note that stocks bought after March 25, 1977, will not qualify for the long-term designation in effect this year.

What action do you take? A .- Pass. Remember, partner did not have enough strength to respond to your opening bid. You can expect to find him with nothing more than a long dia-mond suit-at least six cardsand inadequate heart support.

Q.2-As South, vulnerable, you hold: ◆K83 ♥9 ◊753 ◆J109762 The bidding has proceeded: West North East South Pass 1 NT Pass 10 Pass Dble. Pass 2 4 Pass 2 Pass What action do you take? A .- Pass. Think for a moment What hand could partner possibly have that would warrant a pass of an opening one heart bid at his right followed by a strong cue bid on the third round of the auction opposite a partner who could be very weak? There isn't any. So the only explanation for the bidding is that partner has a heart suit

Q.3-Both vulnerable, as South you hold: ◆AJ1062 ♡76532 ◊9 ◆74 The bidding has proceeded: North East South 1 0 1 + 2 What do you bid now?

A .- This is close. We would be inclined to bid a quiet two hearts. However, we do not object to the more aggressive four hearts -there are a number of mini-mum hands partner could hold that would give him excellent play for game. The one thing to avoid is a penalty double. That action is seldom sound when you have length in partner's suit. and here it could drive the opponents to a better

Q.4-As South, vulnerable, you hold: ♦Q107 ♥AQ8652 ◊QJ5 ♦K The bidding has proceeded: South West North East 1 Pass 2 Pass 2 0 Pass 3 + Pass

What action do you take? A .- Pass. Partner's rebid is not forcing. In fact, it tends to show a hand that is rather weak in high-card points for its original two over one response but with a long suit as compensation. Partner can't be as good as six clubs to the A-Q J and an outside entry. Indeed, if he does not have the ace of clubs, his hand might produce almost no tricks at a no trump contract.

#### Q.5-Both vulnerable, as South you hold:

◆AQ10962 ♥953 06 ◆AK6 Your right-hand opponent opens one diamond. What action do you take?

A .- Since you have a solid opening bid, we would not fault you greatly if you first doubled, in-tending to bid your long suit at your next turn. However, we your next turn. However, we feel that your chances of making game are slim unless partner can act voluntarily, so we would opt for a quiet one spade over-call to see how things develop.



## **TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH**

#### DR. GEORGE C. THOSTESON

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Whatever happened to the old-fashioned idea that you can catch cold or influenza from exposure to cold or wetness? Do doctors still believe this? If it's not true, can such exposure have any effect at all, direct or in-direct, on the sickness? - D.B.

I was waiting for this perennial ques-

You're right, it is an old-fashioned idea - and incorrect to boot. Yet believers far outnumber doubters despite all the evidence against it. Studies with human volunteers who exposed themselves to all sorts of drafts and coldness have shown you just cannot get a virus infection that way. The medical reasoning is sound. Colds and flu are caused by any one of dozens of viruses, and if the virus isn't around you can't get sick. Humidity is a more realistic factor, making membranes more prone to infection.

I can almost hear your next question: How does this square with the fact that many people report symptoms of a cold so suspiciously soon after exposure to elements? And I must frankly admit this has appeared to be true with myself and members of my family

You just have to lay it to coincidence and some common sense factors. For example, colds and flu symptoms crop up at the time of year when we become most susceptible to virus exposure - in the fall and winter months Children are exposed in close quarters at school, and we ourselves are indoors more and closer to children and others in the family. It's just a coincidence that all of this happens at the time of year when the weather becomes nasty in most parts of the country. But it's just that - a coincidence.

You ask if exposure to elements can make a cold worse. Again, I would have to say no, it won't. But I have to qualify that. No one denies that general comfort and rest are important for recovery in any ailment. For this reason, no one would suggest that you can expose yourself without any effect. The virus infection must run its course. For the fastest recovery, nutrition, rest, and lots of liquids play greater positive roles than the weather

I have no good definition of "resistance," a term you hear often in connection with this subject. I suppose it means that if you are in good physical condition, you'll weather a virus infection better. I'll buy that.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is a trophic ulcer, and what is the treatment for it? -JTN.

. . .

The word ulcer means death or deterioration of tissue. Trophic refers to nutrition. A trophic ulcer is one caused by poor nourishment of that particular area. Bedsores are an example. They form because of poor blood supply. Poor nutrition, such as lack of vitamins, may contribute to it. This is why it is important for bedridden persons to get proper nourishment

Also, the disruption of blood supply to any pressure area must be guarded against. Cleanliness is important, and the patient should be rotated off his or her back when possible. Heels and ankles should be supported by cloth "doughnuts." If there are varicosities (sluggish veins) these must be watched as well

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have pernicious anemia and am taking vitamin B-12 shots for it. I am 73, very active, and have a great appetite. Can you tell me about pernicious anemia? How long will I need the shots? - M.R.

. . .

There are many kinds of anemia, which is the lack of red blood cells or lack of iron content. The causes range from poor nutrition to diseases of blood-forming organs. In perniciuos anemia the problem is the lack of certain secretions in the stomach which make it possible to absorb vitamin B-12 in your system. No matter how much you eat, that situation won't change and you will still be defi-cient in that valuable blood-forming substance. It can result form an illness or

occur with age. You may need the vitamin injections for the rest of your life.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can heart palpitations be caused by not enough potassium in the body? - D.L.

Yes. Potassium is important for muscles, including the heart. It's not an uncommon symptom, particularly for those using strong diuretics (water pills or anything that causes increase in urination), Magnesium lack can cause it, too.

year-old Egyptian leader. "But I wish to tell you today and I proclaim to the whole world: We accept to live with you in a lasting and just peace.

Egyptians traveling with Sadat had indicated he was bringing new proposals to Israel, but none of these surfaced in his speech. However, Begin and Sadat held several private meetings and it was possible some new initiatives were discussed at these.

Sadat insisted he was not in Israel to seek a separate peace, and Begin said he did not intend to "drive a wedge" among the Arabs.

Commenting on NBC-TV, former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger said: You could not expect Sadat to deviate from the Arab positions when he has already made this enormous move by visiting Israel. And it is unlikely that Begin would make concessions from the rostrum of the parliament.

#### **Risks** Political Future

Sadat made clear he had risked his political future and defied Arab unity not to further the political debate, but to rip down the psychological barriers that had blocked Mideast negotiations in the past. There is a "complicated psychological barrier between us and you." he told the Israelis, "a barrier of skepticism, of revulsions, of the fear of deceitfulness, of delusions about any action or decision that's to be taken."

This wall was 70 percent of the Mideast problem, Sadat said.

'And I would like to ask you today Why don't we extend our hands in hones-

"The time of the flight between Cairo and Jerusalem is short. But the distance between them was, until yesterday, quite large," he said

President Sadat passed this great distance with courage, heart-felt courage. We Jews know how to appreciate this courage of heart and we will know how to appreciate our visitor's courage.

Begin called for a peace agreement that would end the state of war between Israel and its Arab neighbors, leading to full relations and economic cooperation. "All Can Be Negotiated'

"Everything must be negotiated and can be negotiated," he said. "We shall conduct these negotiations as equals there are no victors or vanquished.

As negotiating partners he listed only Egypt, Syria, Jordan and Lebanon, and not the Palestinians.

That prompted two Communist members to interrupt and shout, "What about the Palestinians?" Begin did not reply.

From the Knesset, Begin and Sadat went to a working dinner. It was their third meeting since Sadat arrived Satur-

In Jerusalem, many Israelis were disappointed with Sadat's speech. "Sadat's speech was aimed mainly at the Arab world," said an Israeli official who called the address "much tougher" than anticipated.

Sadat arrived at the Knesset after early morning worship at the Al-Aqsa mosque, a visit to the Christian Curch of the Holy Sepulcher and a tour of Yad Vashem, the massive monument to Jewish victims of Nazi Germány

#### After he left, a few hundred Arab youths began shouting: "Sadat, don't block the Palestinian cause for money. They were dispersed by police and several demonstrators were arrested.

#### Declines Scull-Cap

The Egyptian declined to don a scullcap for the visit. But he wrote in the guest-book in Arabic: "May God guide our steps toward peace. Let us end all suffering for mankind.

The tour of the shrines of Islam, Judaism and Christianity underscored what Sadat called the "sacred" character of his trip. It was a theme to which he returned in his Knesset speech:

"All of us on this earth, this earth of God, we are all Moslems, Christians and Jews, we all worship God and the commandments of God and the principles of God are all true and pure and they mean beace." he said

All across the Arab world, life came to a standstill as millions of people listened to Sadat's offer of peace to the Israelis. The Syrian-backed Saiga Palestinian

organization issued a statement in Beirut calling for Sadat's assassination. "Sadat has committed the ugliest treason in the history of the Arab nation, so the blood of the traitor must be shed." Saiga said.

But Egyptian newspapers sang Sadat's praises in banner headlines. "The whole world watches the hero of peace," read

one in Al Akhbar.

# **LEAA** Program Sends Career **Crooks** To Jail

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Spotting career criminals and giving them "special handling" is helping route repeat offend-ers to jail instead of back on the street, a federal agency said Sunday.

The payoff for the pilot projects financed in 59 American cities by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration was an increase in criminal convictions and a greater drop in crime rates than the national average

The program helped achieve the goal of all prosecutors - swift conviction and certain punishment. Under the project, prosecutors had a 94.5 percent conviction rate involving 7,979 crimes. The career criminals received sentences averaging 14.3 years.

A unit in the Bronx County District Attorney's office in New York cut the average of 400 days from arrest to disposition of a case to just 97 days, the LEAA said.

22 Cities Receive \$11 Million For 22 cities which received a total of \$11 million for the pilot program, median time from arrest to disposition was 103 days, far shorter than in the past. Projects in the other 37 cities were fi-

nanced from LEAA block grants. The LEAA analyzed the results of the program in 22 test cities between May 1975 to Aug. 1, 1977.

In 17 of the cities for which crime figures were available, the LEAA said robberies dropped 12.4 percent in the first quarter of 1977 from the first quarter of 1976, compared to an 8 percent reduction nationwide.

Burglaries were down 9.1 per cent in the 17 cities during the same period compared to a national reduction of 7 percent, the LEAA said. 'Public Was Fed Up'

'The criminal justice system and the public were fed up with the revolving door syndrome involving many hardened professional criminals," Acting LEAA Administrator James Gregg said.

"The new programs can pinpoint the repeat offender, give him special handling and, if conviction follows, get him off the streets for a long time. In this way we can reduce serious crime and protect the public by setting an example for other repeaters."

The results were achieved in a number of ways. The cities set up special prosecution units handling half the case load a prosecutor normally faces. Courts cooperated to speed trials with clear benefits for prosecutors.

In Detroit, the number of cases that had to be dismissed because witnesses disappeared or refused to cooperate dropped from 49 percent to 17.4 percent for the career-criminal cases

The pilot federal program prompted at least one state to launch its own comparable program. In September, California

became the first state to enact legislation creating a career criminal program, the LEAA said

It will provide \$3 million a year for career-criminal units in district attorneys' offices throughout the state.

In the 22 cities in which projects were funded directly, 5,107 defendants identified as career criminals had a total of 64.-361 prior arrests and only 29,155 prior convictions.

About half were on probation, parole, bail or personal bond for previous crimes when rearrested.

Programs were in operation in cities such as Boston, Albuquerque, N.M., New Orleans, Kalamazoo, Mich., San Diego and Providence, R.I.

The county hospital also has a nurse coordinator who would play a big part in a transplant, he said.

Mike Rosson, a perfusion technologist who is responsible for preserving organs from living donors, was added to the hospital staff about a month ago.

About two months ago, an \$8,000 perfusion machine was donated to the hospital by the Telephone Pioneers of America. This means living organs can be received in Lubbock and shipped to various areas where transplants have been scheduled. Marty Kollmar, a blood bank technologist trained in tissue typing, is also a part of the hospital staff, making it most capable of undertaking transplant operations, according to Dr. Lawton.

The hospital also has received a \$5,000 dialysis machine and will set up a center for persons having an acute kidney dis-ease which, with treatment from the center, could be reversed. This facility, in part, would be used for patients who had received kidneys and need to be put on the dialysis machine to help the organ adapt to its new body.

Dr. Lawton said the dialysis center would cost about \$40,000 yearly to maintain.

The city now has a dialysis center at 1907 Ave. Q which is headed by Dr. Stanbaugh. Dr. Lawton said that facility is used by kidney patients whose diseases cannot be cured and are in need of transplants.

**Cost In Thousands** 

Dr. Lawton said he would like to start out performing a relatively simple transplant which would involve a member of the patient's direct family donating a kidney. Such an operation would cost be-

## Fleet's Visit **To Egypt** Said Normal

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) - Official Damascus radio said Sunday said the U.S. 6th Fleet had been ordered to proceed to the Egyptian port of Alexandria. A U.S. Navy spokesman in Naples said the fleet was making "usual port visits."

In Washington, a Pentagon spokesman denied the report, saying that one of the fleet's carrier task forces was in port and the other was at sea in the central Mediterranean, far away from Alexandria.

The Syrian bulletin announcement, interrupting normal newscasts, said an order had come from Washington for the fleet's port call in Alexandria but that there was no immediate explanation for the move

A U.S. 6th Fleet spokesman in Naples said "fleet operations are continuing normally" when asked about the Damascus broadcast.

The fleet is at sea at the moment and going through a schedule of the usual port visits," he said. "If any ships call at Egyptian ports in the next few days, these will be routine calls scheduled some time ago.

The spokesman pointed out that 6th Fleet warships have previously been in Egyptian waters, including the flagship USS Little Rock which was at the reopening of the Suez Canal in June 1975.

The Damascus report followed intense Syrian and other Arab criticism of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's visit to Isråel.

Radio Damascus carried briefly after its 6th Fleet bulletin a report from Beirut's leftist newspaper As Safir that the Egyptian military had been on alert for the past 12 days after the purging of some 130 officers who opposed the Sadat visit to Israel.

But the radio did not suggest a link between the two reported moves.

'When I got out (of the military) I started looking around. There was reaslly no one in the family working there - nor had there been for some time," Moseley says. "I thought there would be an advantage to being in a firm with the same name.

Moseley took that job in 1955 after reaching an agreement with the managing partner.

"You can have a job here, but you'll be treated just like anybody else; and if either one of us thinks he would be better off elsewhere, we'll say so," Moseley quotes the managing partner as saying at the time.

After leading F.S. Moseley & Co. through four mergers, today, at 49, Moseley is chairman and chief executive officer of Moseley, Hallgarten & Estabrook Inc., one of the oldest brokerage firms in the Northeast

"It was obvious to me that we were going to have to augment our capital and our talents — and the opportunity to merge came along," he says.

"The easiest thing in the world is to have my position, as long as you have intelligent people around you." Moseley says. "The person sitting here is responsible for the interrelationships of people within the organization. The ideas come up from below.

"The thing I like best is working with people who are intelligent and ambitious and who really want to work. The atmosphere is very stimulating.

Moseley has watched the family firm grow from nine offices and a net worth of \$5 million in 1955 to more than 30 branches, including internatonal offices in London and Geneva, with capital of \$13 million. What makes the firm successful?

"It's all a function of having the right person heading a department or talking to a customer. Customers are much more intelligent than in years gone by," he

PARIS (AP) - Romanian dissident Paul Goma arrived Sunday with his wife and son on a "one year touristic visa," and said he wanted to pay hommage to the Western press for its support of human rights causes in Eastern Europe.

Goma, one of Romania's leading authors, has been an outspoken supporter of the Charter 77 human rights group in Czechoslovakia

Brzezinski was born in Warsaw 49 years ago. His father Tadeusz, now 81 and living in Montreal, was a career diplomat whose work took him and his family frequently to Polish missions in foreign lands. Brzezinski himself lived less than four years in the land of his birth. The family home in a fashionable part of Warsaw was razed by Hitler's troops who devastated 85 percent of the capital. Today workers' apartments stand where Tadeusz Brzezinski and his family once lived. Nowadays Brzezinski has an aunt and several cousins - on his mother Leonia's side of the family. 

just as Geneva would open, by a statement of position on each side," Javits said, adding:

"Now it is the task of statesmen and prophets of peace to arrive at the empirical elements of peace. It is a sacred duty for the parties, the United States, and for the rest of the world.

Sen. Lowell Wcicker (R-Conn.) said he believes the format for finding peace in the Mideast was changed by Sunday's events.

"The biggest hurdle of all has been crossed - the willingness of these men to go eyeball to eyeball - and that is probably the biggest news of the decade," Weicker said.



## **Ex-Boxing Champ Cleared In Shooting**

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Former world light heavweight boxing champion Bobby Foster, now a Bernalillo County deputy sheriff, has been cleared of any wrongdoing in the shooting of an Albuquerque man.

The sheriff's department internal affairs division, which investigates all shootings or complaints against deputies, ruled it was "a justifiable reaction" by Foster on Nov. 5 when he fired his shotgun at Vasily Macepura, 25, in front of Macepura's house.

A sheriff's spokesman said Monday that the division found Foster had reason to believe he was in danger when he fired. Macepura, who was wounded in the arm, was in stable condition Tuesday at the Veterans Administration hospital here. On Monday, he filed a \$350,000 civil suit against Foster.

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MILWAUKEE (AP) - The Milwaukee Brewers, after a massive weekend purge in which their general manager resigned and their manager and player development chief were fired, confirmed Sunday night they have hired Harry I. Dalton of he California Angels as general managet

Dalton has been general manager of the Angels since 1971 and developed an American League baseball dynasty while in a comparable position with the Baltimore Orioles in the late 1960s and early 1970s. He is to take over immediately and is to be introduced at a 1 p.m. CST news conference here today, the Brewers said. The Associated Press had confirmed Dalton's appointment before the Brewers announced it.


The Brewers, in a hastily prepared statement late Saturday night, confirmed the firings of Manager Alex Grammas and Director of Player Development Al Widmar. The club also said Jim Baumer had resigned as director of baseball operations - the club's description of the general managership.

Baumer has been offered another job in the area of scouting and player development for the Brewers. He said late Sunday details of the proposed job were vague, and that he would stay on only if his successor wanted him.

'I resigned late Friday night. I had been thinking about it the last couple of weeks," Baumer said.

He said he and Brewers' president Bud Selig had an emotional discussion.

'Bud and I are very good friends, Baumer said. "He's been tremendous to all of us. I'm sure it was one of the toughest decisions Bud ever had to make. He really is a very, very nice person, regard-

less of some of the things he's said or done at times.

Baumer said Selig had not told him who his successor will be, but that he understood it was "between one or two guys." He said he agreed with speculation that it will be Dalton.

Baumer's wife, Marcie, said she thought that under the circumstances, the Brewers had "handled the whole situation beautifully. 'Bud's daughter, Wendy, heard about

it yesterday, and she went in to see Jim and cried," Mrs. Baumer said. "We would love to stay in Milwaukee. It all depends on whether Harry (Dalton) would feel comfortable with Jim still around.

The purge was disclosed in an exclusive



story by Hank Stoddard, sports director of WTMJ-TV here, at 10 p.m. CST Saturday

Selig said Sunday that Baumer, Grammas and Widmar were informed of their fates prior to Stoddard's announcement. Selig said the decision capped "months of long and agonizing thought."

The AP learned that Baumer, Grammas and Widmar had been told of the house cleaning Friday, several hours after the Brewers had called a news conference to introduce Larry Hisle, former Minnesota Twins' outfielder. Hisle, one of the prized free agents in baseball's Nov. 4 re-entry draft, signed a six year, nearly \$3 million contract with the Brewers Thursday night.

Dalton, 48, is considered one of the shrewdest judges of talent in baseball. The farm system he developed produced the nucleus of the Orioles' championship teams of the late 1960s and early 1970s, and he supplemented that talent with trades for stars such as Frank Robinson, Mike Cuellar and Don Buford.

Dalton's first job with the Brewers will be to name a successor to Grammas as manager.

# **Cougars' Win Surprises Sloan, Crippled Raiders**

Avalanche-Journal Sports Staff Sunday afternoon, Steve Sloan took a brief break. He leaned

back in his chair, kicked his feet up on his desk and yawned. Well, I don't guess I have any startling revelations about Saturday night," he said.

It would be hard to find any. The final score, 45-7 in Houston's favor, explains matters pretty thoroughly.

"I don't have any idea of what happened, really," Sloan said. "It just doesn't figure. I think we were ready to play. The first half was pretty even, actually, but then we got those two turnovers at the start of the second half, and. . .

Houston recovered a fumble and intercepted a pass deep in Tech territory very early in the third quarter and converted the turnovers into touchdowns and a 28-7 advantage that, for all practical purposes, wrapped up the game.

The Cougars, after intercepting a pass at the goal line to kill a Tech threat and then driving for a go-ahead touchdown in the second quarter, dominated the game.

Houston rolled up 485 yards total offense, and it defense held Tech to 108 yards, the Raiders' lowest total since Sloan has been at Tech. The Cougars sacked Tech quarterbacks 10 times and limited the Raiders to minus-seven yards rushing, minus-54 in the second half.

"It was a disaster," Sloan said.

He likened the course of the game to that of the 1975 Tech-Texas A&M contest. In that one, the Aggies led by only 10-9 at halftime, but killed a Raider drive with an interception at the start of the second half and, two plays later, got a 94-yard touchdown run en route to a 38-9 triumph.

The Raiders had been assured earlier last week that they

would receive a bid to the Tangerine Bowl, regardless of the outcome of their game with Houston, so the defeat was embarassing from that standpoint, too.

Florida State, Tech's opponent in the Dec. 23 bowl, was soundly defeated Saturday night, also. San Diego State smashed the Seminoles 41-16. Tech is now 7-3 for the season, while FSU is 8-2. The teams had been rated 16th and 13th, respectively, in the nation

"I think it's like the Tangerine Bowl officials said Saturday night, though," Sloan said. "You don't get a bowl invitation on the basis of how you do in one game. It's the whole season that counts. We're 7-3, and there aren't a whole lot of teams in that category.


Sloan emphasized the importance of the Raiders putting the Houston debacle behind them. They face Arkansas Thursday in the final game of the regular season, and the Razorbacks are 9-1 and ranked in the Top Ten.

"We just have to look in another direction," Sloan said. "We can't dwell on the loss. I don't know exactly how the players will react mentally after the loss, but we've always played hard in the past, and I think we'll come back this time.

The shorter-than-usual period for preparation could cause

"It's tough because of the injuries we have," Sloan said. "In the offensive line, for example, we just don't know where to put anybody because we don't know who's going to be well and who isn't.

Sloan said quarterback Rodney Allison, still limited by the left leg that was broken Sept. 24, suffered a broken nose early in the Houston game.



## **Shotgun Dangers Require Checkups**

AUSTIN (Special) - A shotgun doesn't shoot very far, but at close range it can be one of the most terrible man-killers there is. With dove season in fall swing and waterfowl seasons just ahead, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department suggests this is a good time to think about the shotgun and some vital precautions in its use.

The man who hunts with a rifle, especially a deer hunter, usually hunts alone. He would, in fact, rather have a large tract of land for his exclusive use. The dove and duck hunter usually likes to hunt with a party; hunters are often standing shoulder to shoulder.

The blast of a 12-gauge at a few feet, regardless of the size of the shot involved, can be devastating. This alone should be enough reason never to close the action of a shotgun until you are ready to shoot.

Many shotguns explode every year because a careless hunter has fired the gun with some form of obstruction in the barrel. A tiny dab of mud in the muzzle or a cleaning patch left in the bore is enough to destroy a firearm.

It is the person standing near the shoot er who will receive the whistling fragments as the gun barrel explodes.

Many guns are destroyed and people hurt when the hunter shoots a 12-gauge and has some 16, 20, or 28-gauge shells mixed in with his 12s. One of these smaller shells will not remain in the chamber if it is accidentally loaded into the gun. It will slide on up into the barrel and when the correct ammunition is fired, an explosion usually results.

Tagged fish are worth \$1, \$5, \$10 or \$25, depending on the tag.



## **Borg Grabs Net Tourney**

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WEMBLEY, England (AP) - Bjorn Borg of Sweden defeated John Lloyd of Britain 6-4, 6-4, 6-3 in the finals of the Grand Prix Tennis Tournament Sunday and stretched his winning run to five tournaments and 28 matches - all in six weeks.

The dynamic 21-year-old Swede has not lost a match since a shoulder injury forced him to retire from a U.S. Open duel with Dick Stockton at Forest Hills, NY in September.

With the exception of that match, he has not lost in the Grand Prix since last March, when Brian Gottfried beat him. Borg's latest success earned him a first prize of \$26,000.

A crowd of 8,000 filled the Wembley Empire Pool, hoping to see Lloyd rise to the occasion and do a giant-killing act. The 23-year-old Englishman put up a strong fight and made all three sets close contests. But in the end he sank under the sheer weight of Borg's strokes.

The Swede slammed aces down the center line at regular intervals, and passed his opponent at the net with increasing power and accuracy as the match went on.

"His ground strokes are even better than they used to be," Lloyd said afterwards. "I have played Bjorn many times but I have never known him to pass me as well as he did today. In fact, I have never been passed like that by anybody.' Lloyd specialized in angled volleys, which brought him a lot of points plus excited roars from the partisan crowd. These crisp strokes helped him to break back after losing his service early in the first set, and he often threatened to do the same later. But he served at 75 percent of Borg's pace, and had difficulty winning his service games

Lloyd, two sets down, began the third set by leading 40-0 on his service. But that marked the beginning of a devastating spell by Borg, who won 10 points in a row. The spell was broken only when Lloyd won a lucky point on a net cord shot, but Borg continued his punishing form and went on to lead by 4 games to

Llovd then broke service twice, in the sixth and eighth games, helped by three rare double faults by the Swede. But Borg broke back again to finish the match off with characteristic forehands. The tourney is sponsored by Benson and Hedges

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
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
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
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# **Peruvian Treasures Exhibited In Museums**

NEW YORK (AP) - "Peru's Golden Treasures" is an exhibition of great riches - with the fabulous metal's face value only one among its precious quali-

The exhibition was designed by the American Museum of Natural History here, where it will be until the end of the year. Then it will be shown in Chicago, San Francisco and Detroit.

The show is a major art event - 225 of the finest examples of ancient Peruvian gold from the famous Museo Oro del Peru, in Lima, the largest display of Peruvian gold ever seen in this country.

But, says Dr. Craig Morris, assistant curator for South American archeology at the Museum, the goal of the exhibition is "to give the best and most accurate picture of early Peruvian cultures, above and beyond simply presenting their creations as great works of art."

The wonders it encompasses range from a gold spider you could hide in the palm of your hand to a showy poncho made of about 13,000 airy little gold plaques sewn together. There are designs showing fierce warriors or playful animals, as well as those based on geometric abstractions. There are elegantly simply shawl pins, and there are elaborately royal crowns.

Ironically, most of these items were made not to be used but to be buried, as funerary objects, yet they still say much about everyday life, about the customs and habits of the people of those little-known cultures, up to 2,000 years ago.

For example, beautiful, crescent-shaped tweezers, some decorative enough to have been worn as pendants, indicate the method of "shaving" used by lightlyhaired people. A ceramic included in the New York installation depicts a man using his tweezers to pluck hair from his chin and holding a polished stone mirror - there's one in the same case.

These exhibits have special meaning in other ways. They are extremely rare, a tiny sampling in existence today that can only hint at treasures that are lost forever. For when the Spanish conquistadors arrived in 1532 they took all the gold, primarily Inca, they could lay their hands on and melted it down for easier shipment out, without regard for beauty, craftsmanship or any value other than as wealth.

Most of the gold in the show is from pre-Inca times, gold which was overlooked because it was buried in tombs around the country. The Spanish rifled tombs, too, but they didn't find all the gold.

Another irony: although the Spanish so predominantly valued the gold in terms of money, the ancient Peruvians never made gold into money at all. They didn't use money, in fact, probably exchanging work for goods.

Gold to them was a symbol of power, of the sun god they worshipped, a substance of light and beauty, easy to work. Some of their gold objects were painted over, or covered with feathers, jewels or other metals: the fact that objects were gold gave them an instrinsic significance and the gold itself didn't always

Physically, the exhibition doesn't cover much ground. It's compact and easy to get around. Objects are simply and spaciously shown on backgrounds colorkeyed to the four main pre-Inca periods, covering a span of 2,000 years. While the show is in New York it includes some rare items from the Museum of Natural History's collections - ceramics, priceless embroideries and other contemporary items, and there's an appealing background of plaintive recorded music, played softly on copies of ancient Peruvian instruments.

A final section on technology confirms what one has already noted from the exhibition as a whole: the ancient Peruvians were very ingenious craftsmen. They didn't cast metal until near the end of their cultural tradition, the end which came when the Spanish arrived and the Inca empire crumbled. Their me-

which came when the spanish arrived and the Inca empire crumoled. Their me-talworkers created their pieces mostly from sheet gold, using parts made from sheets molded around wooden forms, then riveted or soldered together. They also used the "depletion method" of giving objects a gold surface: the alloy, usually gold with silver and copper, of which the object was made, was chemically treated to remove the other metals from the surface and to leave the pure gold.

In short, this is an exhibition that glitters magnificently but is approachable in scale, is infinitely precious not just because it consists of gold, and is an array of ceremonial objects that are disarmingly personal in their impact.

## **Alligators Making Comeback All Across American South**

## **Ex-Seaman**, Poet, Thinker **Guides Tourists In Mexico**

VILLA HERMOSA, Mexico (AP) -Sooner or later a visitor to this tropical capital of the state of Tabasco will come across Raul O. Mendoza.

Raul is a tourist guide who has been leading travelers and scholars in and out of Olmec and Mayan ruins in the nearby jungle for 22 years.

But Raul is more than a tourist guide. He is part Yaqui Indian, an orphan of the Sonora Desert in northern Mexico who

## **To React**

More Violently CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) -Southerners tend to react more violently than other Americans when their code of personal honor

is challenged, says geography of crime authority Keith Harries. The Oklahoma State University professor said at a recent crime analysis conference here that a

mix of cultural and economic factors helps explain why the South has the highest rate of homicides in the country.

He said there were 12.7 homicides per 100,000 population in the South, 7.6 in the Northeast, 8.1 in North-Central America, 9.0 in the West and 9.6 in the rest of the country.

Harries also noted that homicide rates for both whites and blacks in the South were above the national average.

Southerners have a set of attitudes that generally condone interpersonal violence and they tend to live by their own code of personal honor, he said.

Whereas homicides occur everywhere, quite often as spurof-the-moment acts between relatives and friends, robberies

has developed a personal, mystical view of life through his contact with jungle trails, ancient ruins and the archeologists who visit them.

Many of his ideas come from nightly meditation in view of the stars which shine down on his penthouse apartment atop the battered San Rafael Hotel in the center of town.

Raul is 56 years old, 6 feet tall, husky and bearded. When he smiles, his white teeth shine like the sun and he looks 20 years younger. He calls himself "the wandering man"

or "the child of the sun." He says local residents call him the "white witch" because he does good and no harm.

His philosophy is based on a belief that life is a never-ending source of energy which comes from the sun. He advocates 'love and peace for everyone.'

Raul believes in the power of colors to heal the sick and he often visits the local hospital to apply colored ribbons to the patients.

He has heard that the Yaqui Indians in northern Mexico also experiment with colors and see the light of life, but they use peyote and other drugs to practice witchcraft. "I think the drugs damage the brain. I would never use them," he says.

A visitor looking for a guide can usually find Raul at his hotel or at the La Venta Museum, an outdoor collection of ancient Olmec ruins, including a giant, 20ton stone head.

His tour of the museum is a mixture of scholarly information he acquired while attending a two-year guide school at the University of Mexico in Mexico City and Raul's personal interpretations.

He is an unorthodox guide, but enchanting. No one can spend a day with Raul and walk away unaffected by this original Mexican philosopher. Raul says he was born in the Sonora

Desert and is part Yaqui Indian. He doesn't remember his parents, was raised for a time by his grandmother.

One day he ran away, never to return. His wanderings took him to the sea, where he spent 14 years aboard a Norwegian freighter.

Raul has written many of his thoughts in free verse, both in Spanish and Eng-lish, which he learned on the ship.

He says he was inspired to write a poem once after spending several days in the ruins of the ancient Mayan city of Palenque back in the days when it was accessible only by trail. He calls the poem, "The Wandering Man."

It begins: "I have no name, I have no home, I am just like the breeze that

blows from place to place." And later it says, "I worship the sun, the moon and mother earth which gives me all the happiness I need ... I only wish that every man would feel the same as me. Then we would live in a paradise."



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JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) - The American alligator, the fierce-looking marshland giant that a few years ago was considered an endangered creature in some areas, has made a comeback due to protection and management programs, wildlife experts maintain.

The alligator, found in every Deep South state and sections of the Southwest, was placed under federal protection in 1973 and since then has multiplied rapidly, becoming so abundant in two states that wildlife officials are allowing harvesting of the reptile.

"The alligator has made a tremendous comeback and I believe the primary reason is the protection enjoyed under the Endangered Species Act," Bob Griffin of the Mississippi Game and Fish Commission said. "I think that was the original objective of the act and I believe it has worked.

Ken Chitwood of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Atlanta said management programs throughout the South and Southwest have also helped the alligator to thrive.

"Almost every Southern state has some type of management program and this has heped tremendously in protecting the alligator and ensuring its survival," Chitwood said.

The alligator, prized for its durable hide that has a variety of leather-good uses, now numbers more than one million in the United States, latest wildlife figures show

Florida, with more than 669,000 'gators, heads the list and Louisiana has an estimated population of 300,000. Other states, including Georgia, North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas and South Carolina, have fewer than 50,000 each. Oklahoma has the fewest alligators, figures indicating that fewer than 100 inhabit the state.

Mississippi, along with a number of other states, has started an alligator release program in an effort to increase the number of reptiles.

"We want to give the alligator every possible effort to make a comeback. Besides, it can help control populations of

aquatic animals, and thereby play an important part in nature," Griffin said. Under the release program, Mississippi purchases the alligators from overpopulated areas in Louisiana and places the reptiles in selected counties. More than

4,000 alligators have been transplanted to Mississippi since the program began in 1974

"We placed the 'gators only on request and surprisingly we have more requests than we can meet," Griffin said. "Most of the people who request the gators do so as a control agent for the beavers. There are so many beavers in the state and we believe the alligator can help con-

trol the population. Griffin said there have been few complaints from citizens since the program began and no instances of the alligators attacking humans.

In Florida, however, game and fish officials have not been so fortunate. At least 14 alligator attacks on humans have been reported recently, including one in which a Punta Gorda man was attacked while repairing a boat dock behind his house. A seven-foot alligator bit off the arm of the man who died a week later.

A female was later killed near the house and a nest of babies was found, indicating the mother was probably protecting her young. Other isolated attacks by alligators have been reported in Louisiana.

"In most cases the attacks are where the alligators are threatened or where the gator is being fed by humans," Griffin said. "The alligator is just not an aggressive animal. But, we do warn people about the dangers of alligators. The creature just has a tremendous facility for hurting people and the public should recognize this.

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

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LONDON - (NEA) - Darth Vader Dark Lord of the Sith, is hopping mad, almost angry enough to ignite another interplanetary cataclysm.

Or, to be more precise, it's 42-year-old Britisher Dave Prowse, the actor portraying the giant masked villain in "Star Wars," who is furning.

"Look at this," he seethes, waving a stack of fan mail in his suburban London home. "Letters from people all over the U.S. asking if it really was me in the Darth Vader costume who put my footprints in wet cement in the forecourt of Hollywood's Mann's Chinese Theater, or went on the U.S. TV talk show circuit. I haven't been near the States in years.

"It's a rip-off by Twentieth Century Fox. The company is so anxious to cashin on the film's popularity that they're dressing up armies of part-time actors in our 'Star Wars' suits and sending them all over the country pretending to be us.

"The film has already grossed more than \$150 million so far. It will break 'Jaws' record easily. You'd think the company would be a little more generous about giving the character actors, some of whom, like R2-D2 and C-3PO, virtually stole the show in many critics' eyes, the chance to pick up some badly needed personal appearance money, and the opportunity to get their faces in the papers

and on the air. In show business, there's only one chance in a lifetime like this. But no, we're left here to rot in England while Hollywood buddies of the Fox brass pick up the loot and the kudos we sweated to earn."

Prowse has a point. The top credits for "Star Wars" all belong to Americans -33-year-old director George Lucas (who will earn at least \$18 million for the film). stars Mark Hamill, Carrie Fisher and Harrison Ford. But the production team and most of the actors, including stars Alec Guinness and Peter Cushing, are British. A virtually all-UK team of 250 performers and EMI technicians shot most of the \$10-million space epic not in Hollywood but on soundstages at Elstree and Shepperton in London's suburbs.

Peter Mayhew, the seven-foot-two-inch Londoner who plays the Wookiee pilot Chewbacca (in a suit that is a combination of lion fur and monkey face), is another English performer who has pretty much been left bobbing far back in the wake. He earned about \$10,000 for his efforts in the film, but since the end of shooting has had to go back to working as a London hospital attendant to make ends meet

It isn't the personal appearance dollars which Prowse isn't earning which irritates him. The attractive, six-foot-five, former champion British weight-lifter does quite well for himself as a frequently featured TV and film character actor, as well as running the body-building salon in Harrods in London's fashionable Knightsbridge. 

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# **Standards Relaxed For Women Coed Army Training Causes Changes**

FORT JACKSON, S.C. (AP) - The stocky. gruff-voiced Army instructor constantly watched his terminology as he taught his audience of weary trainees how to fire their M16 rifles.

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The next thing we're gonna look at, men, uh, trainees, .

His confusion was understandable. Male and female recruits have been training together at Fort Jackson since October. The formerly all-female 5th Brigade has been disbanded, and women are now divided into platoons of about 50 and placed in a company with three male pla-

The men and women march together fire anti-tank guns together and toss hand grenades side by side. Fort Jackson is the Army's only base to

conduct coed basic training on such a large scale. Pvt. Jacqueline Landry, of Granby,

Mass., had just qualified as a rifle expert after taking the firing test for the second time: she failed the first time. But she wasn't fazed by having to take the same training and meet the same standards as her male counterparts.

"I like it. I'm having a pretty good time, really." she said during a break. 'It's easier than I thought it would be."

In the fall of 1976, the Army conducted a Basic Initial Entry Training program in which 875 men and 825 women underwent an eight-week training course under the same performance standards. The experiment was prompted after women in segregated training were found to be less qualified than the men

The results showed little difference in the relative performances of male and female groups. And Army officials decided to begin the coed basic training program on a full-scale basis this fall.

Each female platoon is housed in a building with three male platoons. Sleeping quarters are separate, although men and women recruits share common dining halls and classrooms.

The regimen is much the same as it was for men in the days of segregated companies, but modifications have been made to accommodate the women. Officers generally consider the changes minor, but some male recruits contend they have caused their training to deteriorate. 

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

## **Expelled** Soviets Leave For Aden

than 300 Russians, believed to be the last of the Soviet military and civilian advisers and their families expelled from Somalia, flew to South Yemen on Sunday.

Two Soviet ships also left the port at Mogadishu with an undisclosed number of expelled Russians and set sail for Aden, the Yemeni capital.

"After tonight, no more Russians," said an airport official. "They will all be gone from our country

This poor country on the Indian Ocean had been the Kremlin's staunchest ally in sub-Saharan Africa. But angered over Soviet-Cuban aid to Ethiopia, it broke diplomatic relations with Cuba Nov. 13 and ordered all Soviet advisers to leave within seven days. However, it stopped short of breaking diplomatic ties with the Soviet Union.

Somalia is backing separatist guerrillas in the Ogaden region of Ethiopia who want to join the territory to Somalia.

Hundreds of Russians have left Somalia daily since early last week as the Soviet Union conducted an evacuation by air and sea. About 1,600 have left Mogadishu by plane since Wednesday. Others have left from the northern port of Berbera, a Soviet base which has been closed.

The exact number of Soviet advisers is not known. But diplomatic observers said

## U.S. Will Owe \$30 Billion Abroad By Dec. 31

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. trade deficit, highlighted by continuing reliance on imported petroleum, will reach \$30 billion by the end of the year, a congressional panel said Sunday

A subcommittee of the Joint Economic Committee concluded the American trade ledger will remain in the red due mainly to continuing importation of fuel supplies

A trade deficit means the United States is spending more money than it is taking in through its transactions in the international marketplace.

The best that can be hoped for, the subcommittee said, is that the proportion of energy needs supplied by imports can be held down, even though energy demand will continue to rise with an expanding



In a report entitled "Living with the Trade Deficit." the panel said three factors primarily account for the excess of imports over exports, a deficit more than triple the \$9.3 billion 1976 figure.

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The factors cited were a \$10 billion increase in oil and gas imports; a \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion decline in the traditional U.S. surplus in agricultural trade, and an \$8 billion to \$10 billion decline in the surplus on trade in manufactured goods. The decrease in agricultural surpluses



was attributed to good harvests abroad and high coffee prices.

The subcommittee report said the United States must adopt an energy policy halting the growth of petroleum imports, now accounting for 45 percent of consumption "With luck, this percentage may decline by a point or so in 1978," it said. "But even under these circumstances, the absolute amount of energy im-

The report said the United States should urge other countries that have surpluses to expand their economies in a way that would "reduce these surpluses and thus ease the balance-of-payments fi-nancing burdens of weak industrial and developing nations.

If countries like Japan. Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland took such action, it said, the result would be of some help to the United States and of major help to weaker countries struggling with big payments to the oil producers.

The report said the United States should maintain economic growth while combatting inflation so that foreign innance the deficit, will continue To maintain its export opportunities, the report said, the United States should not yield to demands for protection against imports because such policies would lead to retaliation. Government, business and labor should search for techniques to make U.S. industry more competitive, it said.

The report opposed monetary policies simply designed to raise interest rates
