

Women Debating Action On Abortion, Gay Rights

HOUSTON (AP) — The National Women's Conference faced two of the most divisive social issues — abortion and gay rights — as delegates worked Sunday on recommendations designed to eliminate sex discrimination in the United States. Those two issues were among 15 subjects on the agenda on the second full working day of the federally funded meeting. The delegates also faced decisions on homemakers' rights, international affairs, welfare and a federal women's department. Recommendations approved by the delegates will be forwarded to President Carter and Congress for consideration. The conference, which drew representatives of American women from every state and territory, is sponsored by the National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year.

Recommendations placed before the delegates were a compilation of proposals adopted in 56 state and territorial meetings which preceded the national conference. The IWY Commission added the women's department proposal. The draft recommendations are known as a "National Plan of Action." Another of the most controversial issues was cleared Saturday night when a majority of delegates endorsed the Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The endorsement caused an extended delay in the proceedings as delegates cheered and shouted their approval. They also backed recommendations on battered wives, child abuse, child care, and employment. The resolutions the conference passes are not expected to differ greatly from those in the draft plan of action. But

there is organized opposition to this plan. Indiana state Sen. Joan Dubbins claimed that about 20 percent of the delegates share her conservative viewpoints. They have drawn up an alternate set of resolutions. Some of Mrs. Dubbins' supporters have attempted to amend nearly every proposal put before the conference. But they have been unsuccessful. Mrs. Dubbins conceded she and her allies were unlikely to have any of their recommendations endorsed by the conference because of their numbers. Their chief points of opposition were to the ERA, to federally funded day-care centers, to provisions for gay rights, and to abortion in general, and especially to federal funding of poor women's abortions.

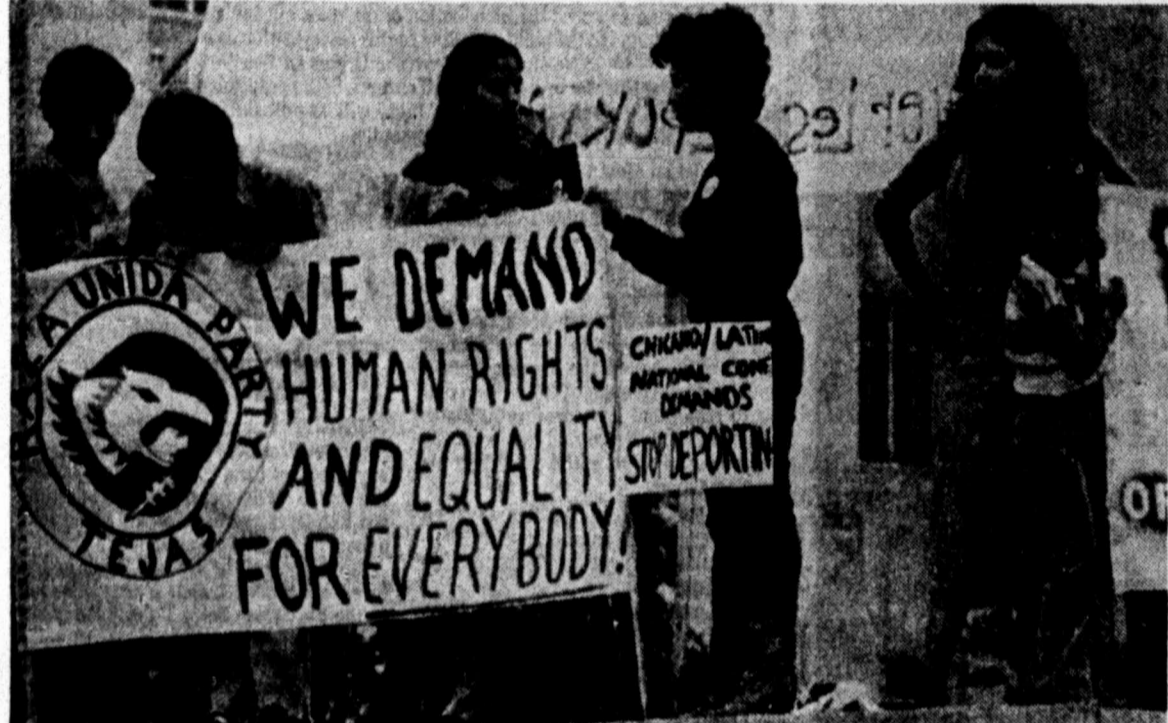

Schlafly Demands Accounting Of \$5 Million NWC Budget

HOUSTON (AP) — Phyllis Schlafly, who has been in the forefront of the fight against the Equal Rights Amendment, said the taxpayers of the nation "are entitled to know how much money was spent and how it was spent" for the National Women's Conference. She told a news conference Sunday that an audit should be conducted of the \$5 million appropriated by Congress for the conference, which she described as a meeting "controlled by ERA supporters" and a railroad job with no chance for the opposition to the resolutions to express their views. "A syndicated columnist and head of a conservative organization called Eagle Forum, Mrs. Schlafly said, "There was no

real debate on the ERA Saturday night. The vote was only playing to the script written earlier by those who control the conference. It probably will be the same with all of the resolutions." The conference already has approved a dozen or more of the 26 resolutions and all of the others are expected to win approval. She insisted that all funds used by her organization and the so-called "pro-family, pro-life coalition" come from individual contributions and "we don't have to pay salaries or expenses for office space as the does the women's conference."

resolutions is backed by such groups as the Ku Klux Klan. That is so laughable, it is not worthy of comment. I have never even met a member of the Ku Klux Klan. If there are any supporting us, I know nothing about it. The same holds true of their (IWY) other rumors, concerning the John Birch Society and other such organizations." Sue Ann Thomas of Houston, the publicity director for the Eagle Forum, said, "Bella Abzug is so paranoid she sees a Ku Klux Klansman under every sheet. "I often wondered why she wore those big hats and, now I think it may be because there is a hole in the head under the hat."

Gay Rights Leader Expects NWC Aid

HOUSTON (AP) — An official of the National Gay Task Force said Sunday the controversial sexual preference resolution would be passed by the National Women's Conference and that the issue had not caused a sharp division among the delegates. Jean O'Leary, co-executive director of the gay task force, told a news conference "we want this issue discussed and debated on the floor. Many people are misinformed about the resolution and are misinformed about lesbians." The sex preference resolution was scheduled for consideration late Sunday. O'Leary said, "clearly we have the momentum and the votes to show that wom-

en are sensitive to and ready to support the civil rights of all women."

Women's Leaders Contend ERA 'Momentum' Growing

HOUSTON (AP) — Three leaders of the Equal Rights Amendment ratification movement claimed Sunday that their side has the momentum to pass it in three additional states in order to add it to the Constitution. Liz Carpenter, co-chairwoman of ERAmerica, said the proposed amendment is being blocked by a few legislators in a few crucial states.

Mrs. Carpenter said a boycott by ERA supporters of convention cities and states that have not ratified it is expected to have a great impact. "I think that states that drag their feet... are not going to be considered very hospitable places to go," she said. Eleanor Smeal, president of the National Organization for Women, defended the move to extend the ERA ratification period from seven to 14 years. "It is not a change of rules in the middle of the game," she said. "The Constitution does not have a time limit." When Congress passed the ERA, it set a time of limit of seven years for its ratification by the states. That expires March 22, 1979.

states. But three of those states, Idaho, Tennessee and Nevada, have voted to rescind their ratifications. The Justice Department has said that rescissions are not permissible. The three women are all members of the National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year, which is sponsoring the conference. Margaret Mealy, immediate past president of the National Council of Catholic Women and IWY commissioner, voiced opposition to the ERA. Phyllis Schlafly, president of Stop ERA, claimed that the amendment "wouldn't have any good effect in terms of employment or education."

Lubbock Delegates Air Views

HOUSTON — Two Lubbock area delegates to the National Women's Conference Sunday refuted conservative charges that the three-day meeting is geared too strongly to a pro-feminist viewpoint.

Mrs. Schlafly also criticized the National Women's Conference and the IWY Commission in particular. She said Congress should not have approved \$5 million for the conference. "We think that it is a gross mispending of tax funds," she said. "I don't think the federal government should be giving money to a special interest group to pursue its goals."

Lubbock Homemaker Betty Anderson, president of the League of Women Voters of Texas, and former Lamb County Judge Ruth Forbiss Kirby said generally, the conference is going smoothly without the "railroading" of ultra-liberal ideas into the National Plan of Action to be drawn up by the conference for presentation to President Carter.

although the Equal Rights Amendment was approved overwhelmingly, delegates can expect more arguments over issues such as abortion and homosexual rights. "There are common chords here," she said, explaining the Texas delegation has remained generally united throughout the conference, although the 58 delegates did not vote unanimously on the Equal Rights Amendment. "It's not surprising to find some women against it," she said, adding the state delegation recorded "about a 53 to 5" vote for the ERA.

Most of the 28 points in the National Plan of Action drawn up before the convention will be approved with minimal debate, Kirby predicted. "I don't think (the plan) is being railroaded through procedurally — I think the votes are fair. I think the reason they (the proposals) are going through unscathed is that the majority of the delegations elected in the state meetings agree to the points in the plan," she noted. She also said state meetings to elect delegates to the national convention here gave conservative women a chance to be represented but many of them ignored the opportunity to attend. "I was in on every step of the planning and every detail of the execution of the conference in Austin," she said.

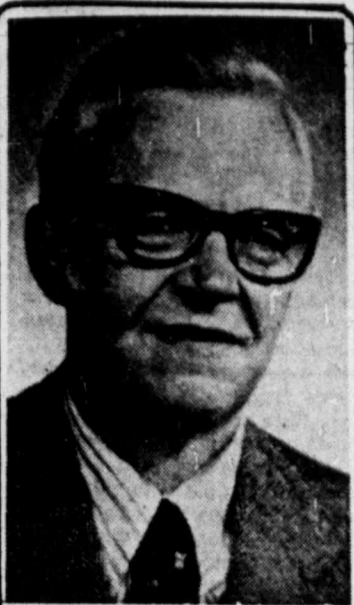

Houston Mayoral Runoff Set

Virginia Disallows 'Billy Beer' Sales

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston residents elect a new mayor on Tuesday, following a million-dollar campaign that had most voters yawning until recent days when it turned into a name-calling contest.

The candidates in the runoff election are Frank Briscoe, 51, a former district attorney, and Jim McConn, 49, a builder and former city councilman.

The election is nonpartisan, but both men are Democrats. The winner will succeed Mayor Fred Hofheinz, who did not seek a third two-year term.

Briscoe led McConn, 54,472 to 37,621, as the two survived a 12-person Nov. 8 general election which drew only 23.7 percent of registered voters, including only 18.4 percent of the normally powerful black vote.

Through last Tuesday, McConn had reported \$546,022 in campaign expenditures. Briscoe \$533,586.

Hofheinz and two black organizations ignited the runoff fireworks last Monday with blasts at Briscoe, Gov. Dolph Briscoe's cousin.

Hofheinz blamed Briscoe, his runoff opponent two years ago, for planting rumors about him that led to a grand jury investigation earlier this year.

The jury ended its investigation by saying no evidence could be found to support allegations a high elected official was arrested in a drug or vice raid and released after a top-level police official intervened. Hofheinz said he is considering filing a slander suit against Briscoe.

At about the same time, top officials of the two black groups, the Harris County Council of Organizations and the Black Organization for Leadership Development, accused Briscoe of being a racist.

Briscoe denied the allegations and charged that McConn had orchestrated

the accusations. McConn responded by calling Briscoe a "sick man."

As the name-calling heated up, residents quickly lost what interest they had in such issues as fiscal responsibility and mass transit.

The powerful Council of Organizations endorsed McConn for the runoff after issuing no endorsement in the Nov. 8 general election.

Observers believed the black turnout could be a major factor Tuesday. Compared to the 18.4 percent turnout two weeks ago, 45.6 percent of the registered blacks cast ballots two years ago and 97.5 percent of that vote went to Hofheinz.

Though he blamed Briscoe, Hofheinz did not endorse McConn. However, he said it was obvious for whom he plans to vote.

Hofheinz said his criticism of Briscoe was prompted by his presence in New Or-

leans when about 75 percent of voters turned out for that city's Nov. 12 mayoral runoff. He said something needed to be done to excite the people about the Houston runoff.

"It would be a great tragedy to have only a few people express opinions about who the next Houston mayor ought to be," said Hofheinz, a son of former Mayor Roy Hofheinz who conceived the idea for building the Astrodome.

PATENT PROCESS

WASHINGTON (AP) — The process of obtaining patents in more than one country will be eased next year by an agreement allowing various patent offices to act for one another. For example, you could apply for a patent in the United States and, at the same time, the application could be designated to apply to one or more other countries.

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — The Virginia Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission says it doesn't care whether he's the president's brother, "Billy Beer" can't be sold in Virginia.

Billy Carter has a financial arrangement with Falls City Brewing Co. of Louisville, Ky., which brews and markets the beer. The cans carry a picture of the president's beer-drinking brother from Plains, Ga.

And that's the problem. The commission has a regulation banning the sale of alcoholic beverages that carry any endorsement of any famous person on the label.

A brewery executive said he hoped the state officials will relax the policy in this case. Billy Carter was unavailable for comment Saturday.

Newport Set To Lecture At Wayland

PLAINVIEW (Special) — Dr. John Newport of the Rice University faculty will give an update on the sects and religious cults in modern America Nov. 28 on the Wayland Baptist College.

Newport's scholarly and religious credentials make him one of the nation's foremost authorities in the field. He will speak at 10 a.m. in Harral Memorial Auditorium. He will address a noon luncheon meeting at College Heights Baptist Church here, and will complete his presentations with a mid-afternoon lecture back on the Wayland campus. Each of the three lectures will be followed by a time of dialogue and discussion.

A noted authority on religious movements as well, Newport will have a new book on this subject published by Broadman Press in early 1978. He is an internationally known lecturer and the author of several books including "Demons, Demons, Demons," "Questions People Ask About a Christian Philosophy of Religion," and "A Guide to a Christian Philosophy of Religion." He has also authored a Buenos Aires publication entitled "Christianismo y Ocultismo: un Entrenamiento."

He is Rice's Chavanne professor for religious studies. During 1952-58 and 1959-76 he was professor of philosophy of religion at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth; during 1958-59, he served as a field work director with the Boston University School of Theology.

Young Says Peace Plan Still Alive

LONDON (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Andrew Young said Sunday the British-American proposals for black rule in Rhodesia "are very much alive" despite their reported rejection by Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith.

Rhodesian Radio quoted Smith as saying Friday that the peace plan — presented in September to Smith, two black Rhodesian guerrilla leaders and five African presidents — had failed and "the time is ripe for Rhodesians to take the initiative."

Young, arriving here to discuss the plan with British leaders, told reporters: "None of the African leaders have refused to talk. For this reason it is obvious to me that the Anglo-American peace proposals are very much alive."

"Mr. Smith is, I think, trying to boost the morale of his supporters and armed forces, who must agree to a peace plan for their own good."

The British-American plan calls for an end to the five-year-old guerrilla war conducted by black nationalists and the surrender of power by Smith's white-minority government to a British administrator.

This would be followed by a six-month transition period to set up elections based on the principle of one-man, one-vote. Such elections would effectively transfer power from Rhodesia's white minority, estimated at around 273,000, to the country's more than six million blacks.

"Mr. Smith doesn't have a better plan to solve Rhodesia's problems," Young said. "Our proposals insure an end to the bloodshed. Unless he can think of a better plan and tries to solve it internally he will probably have far more bloodshed than present."

Smith has said he favors an "internal settlement" which would move the country toward majority rule in two years through negotiations inside Rhodesia with moderate black leaders. These talks would exclude guerrilla leaders Joshua Nkomo and Robert Mugabe, whose forces are based in Zambia, Botswana and Mozambique.

Young, the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, said: "A peace settlement is a step-by-step process which will take some time. The process is going on and changing all the time. The Rhodesian problem is a very unpredictable one. This unpredictability may produce a chance for a settlement."

BALKAN WAR

'We Turn World Upside Down'

TV Supports Research For Cousteau

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The usual order of things is stood on its head by Jacques Cousteau's research ship Calypso.

It is, Cousteau says, the only research project in the world supported by a television series.

"This is a strange mixture," he said. "The scientific research is a byproduct of the television series, rather than the television being a byproduct of the scientific research. We turn the world upside down."

"For us, this is good. Because the other way, the cameramen become the intruders. We integrate the filming with the research and that way we get a better story."

He said a year's research by the crew of the Calypso in waters off Greece, in cooperation with Greek archaeologists, produced important discoveries.

"But our prime purpose was to bring back a film on the scientific discoveries," he said. "We use only the income from our television distribution in more than 100 countries and never accept scientific

money. It would tie our hands and we would have to come back and make a report to some committee."

Cousteau's latest film, one of four in "The Cousteau Odyssey" to be shown on the Public Broadcasting Service this season, airs Tuesday, Nov. 22. It is "Calypso's Search for the Britannic" and tells of finding the British hospital ship that was torpedoed and sunk in the Aegean Sea on Nov. 21, 1916.

He agreed that searching for the ship was a departure for the series, seen for 10 years on ABC and on PBS for the past year.

"We did explore sunken Japanese ships on the island of Truk, but here there are two major differences. First, the depth of 366 feet required elaborate techniques and sophisticated diving gear."

"And second, we were making an inquiry about why such an unsinkable ship had gone down so fast? Was it carrying war materiel? How was it that a single explosion sank a ship built to resist any damage in just a few minutes?"

The Britannic was a sister ship of the

Titanic, another unsinkable ship that sank after hitting an iceberg in 1912. The Britannic was constructed after the Titanic and was further reinforced against sinking.

Cousteau said that after 68 dives exploring every section of the ship, and more than 30 submarine dives, it was concluded that the damage was too extensive to have been caused by a single torpedo.

"By chance, we had a star, Mrs. Mitchell," said Cousteau. "We were looking for a survivor as a witness. But we had no idea we would find someone of such appeal to the public. She is an extraordinary lady."

Sheila Macbeth Mitchell, now 86, was a nurse aboard the Britannic at the time of its sinking. She viewed the ship from the Calypso's submarine.

Asked about the best-selling thriller soon to be a movie, "Raise the Titanic," Cousteau said finding the Titanic would be easy. "We know where it is. But it is so deep — 4,000 feet — that it would not make a good film. You could only view it

from a submarine at that depth."

Other shows in the series will be telecast in March.

The second also takes Cousteau to the wreckage of a ship, this one a Roman vessel that went down while taking plunder from the city of Pergamon, in what is now Turkey, in 88 B.C.

"Pergamon revolted against the Romans in 86 B.C. and two years later the Romans sent a punitive expedition to destroy the city," Cousteau said. "One of the ships bringing back the city's art treasures sank. We found the ship and were able to learn of the story thanks to the coins aboard. The artifacts are now at the University of Athens."

In the final shows, the Calypso searches for Atlantis, the legendary lost continent first told of by Plato.

"We explored in good faith and we tell our story in an unconventional way," he said. "The usual way to tell about Atlantis is by sensationalism, and we avoid that. We take the public by the hand and tell them how a legend is formed around a core of truth."

Some scientists have speculated that Plato's story was fashioned from the prehistoric destruction of the island of Santorini, near Crete.

Did the Calypso find anything? "I think so," Cousteau answered. "The public will judge. But I think it's quite convincing. We give space in our film to all ideas. We try to be fair."

Cousteau said he spends about four months a year in stretches of two or three weeks at a time aboard the Calypso, then spends about four months preparing the

four annual shows, which are seen on television in more than 100 countries. The remainder of the year he devotes to the Cousteau Society.

Prior to entering television in 1966, Cousteau produced 25 theatrical films, winning three Academy Awards. He said he could not begin to count the Emmy awards he has won.

Cousteau said in the past few years his television films have become more concerned with humans, rather than merely showing the ocean and marine life.

Deputy Shot From Fleeing Van

BEAUMONT (AP) — A Hardin County Sheriff's deputy was wounded Sunday as he attempted to stop a vehicle bearing concealed license plates, according to officials.

Deputy Charles Hill was shot in the thigh and taken to a local hospital where he was treated and released, authorities said.

Hill spotted a van with its license plate number covered by tape. When he tried to flag down the vehicle, its back door opened and the shot was fired, according to investigators. Hill fired twice at the van but officials said they are not sure if he hit anyone.

A sawed-off rifle, believed to be the weapon used to shoot Hill, was found near the scene.

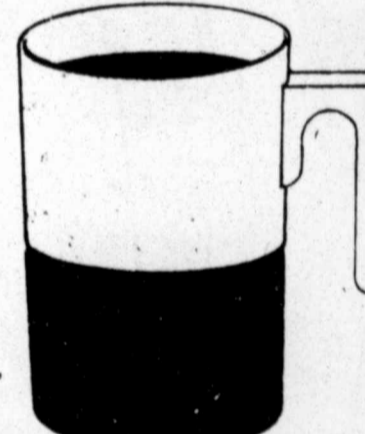

Town's Mayor-Owner Plans To Sell It At Public Auction

HURSTVILLE, Iowa (AP) — Laurel Summers has been mayor here since "back in '44." He says that in the 1977 election, like all the others, "There wasn't any argument about who won."

Summers, 70, owns Hurstville. But now the mayor wants to sell the eastern Iowa town that has always been sort of a family proposition.

Around 1870, Alfred Hurst got the town started.

He built a lime works and the town's 23 houses followed.

"It's been handed down since then. My late wife was the third generation," Summers said. "I got it from her, see."

Today, Summers said, renters occupy about 10 houses. Most have outdoor plumbing. The lime works shut down around 1920.

"I tell you, I don't like to sell it. But I just can't take care of it any more. It's been pretty rough down through the ages. The average person just don't know, see," Summers said.

"My health's going to heck. Old age. I ain't got nobody coming along to take it over. I got two girls, but it's too big an operation for them."

Hurstville's population was 88 "in that

last census," Summers said. "Course, I don't think there are that many here now."

What's for sale is the town with houses, plus an adjacent farm and its buildings. Something more than 600 acres in all.

"There's a lot of buildings," Summers said. "Farm buildings, too. They're big now. I ain't kidding you, see."

Besides fixing broken water mains and welding cracked pipes, Summers said the paperwork and government red tape have taken their toll.

"I got to do all that myself. I ain't got a secretary. The clerk won't do it — and you have to take who you can get here."

He said he didn't mind the work when he was younger, the work and the responsibility of running his own town.

And he expressed concern for the few "old-timers" who have lived in Hurstville since before the lime works closed.

"Got one old-timer, he's 92 now, used to be a fireman, the man who fired the lime kiln, see."

"I tell you, some of the old-timers are up in arms about it."

Sealed bids for Hurstville are due at the Jackson County Courthouse on Nov. 29. Summers said he hopes a new owner

will continue allowing residents to live in the town. As for himself, Summers said, "I'm going to live over at my dad's farm west of here."

But he does have some advice for anyone interested in becoming Hurstville's next owner.

"It's a big obligation. It'll keep you on your toes, see?"

Churchill Honored In New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A statue of Sir Winston Churchill has been placed in a small riverfront plaza in ceremonies attended by Churchill's daughter, Lady Soames.

The bronze statue depicts Britain's World War II leader in an overcoat lifting his left hand in a V-for-victory salute. Lady Soames, in unveiling the statue Saturday, said it symbolized her father's love for freedom.

British artist Ivor Roberts-Jones of Suffolk was commissioned to create the statue by the builders of a nearby hotel, who also donated the plaza.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH

BY
DR. GEORGE C. THOSTESON

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Whatever happened to the old-fashioned idea that you can catch cold or influenza from exposure to cold or wetness? Do doctors still believe this? If it's not true, can such exposure have any effect at all, direct or indirect, on the sickness? — D.B.

I was waiting for this perennial question.

You're right, it is an old-fashioned idea — and incorrect to boot. Yet believers far outnumber doubters despite all the evidence against it. Studies with human volunteers who exposed themselves to all sorts of drafts and coldness have shown you just cannot get a virus infection that way. The medical reasoning is sound. Colds and flu are caused by any one of dozens of viruses, and if the virus isn't around you can't get sick. Humidity is a more realistic factor, making membranes more prone to infection.

I can almost hear your next question: How does this square with the fact that many people report symptoms of a cold so suspiciously soon after exposure to elements? And I must frankly admit this has appeared to be true with myself and members of my family.

You just have to lay it to coincidence and some common sense factors. For example, colds and flu symptoms crop up at the time of year when we become most susceptible to virus exposure — in the fall and winter months. Children are exposed in close quarters at school, and we ourselves are indoors more and closer to children and others in the family. It's just a coincidence that all of this happens at the time of year when the weather becomes nasty in most parts of the country. But it's just that — a coincidence.

You ask if exposure to elements can make a cold worse. Again, I would have to say no, it won't. But I have to qualify that. No one denies that general comfort and rest are important for recovery in any ailment. For this reason, no one would suggest that you can expose yourself without any effect. The virus infection must run its course. For the fastest recovery, nutrition, rest, and lots of liquids play greater positive roles than the weather.

I have no good definition of "resistance," a term you hear often in connection with this subject. I suppose it means that if you are in good physical condition, you'll weather a virus infection better. I'll buy that.

Also, the disruption of blood supply to any pressure area must be guarded against. Cleanliness is important, and the patient should be rotated off his or her back when possible. Heels and ankles should be supported by cloth "doughnuts." If there are varicosities (sluggish veins) these must be watched as well.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have pernicious anemia and am taking vitamin B-12 shots for it. I am 73, very active, and have a great appetite. Can you tell me about pernicious anemia? How long will I need the shots? — M.R.

There are many kinds of anemia, which is the lack of red blood cells or lack of iron content. The causes range from poor nutrition to diseases of blood-forming organs. In pernicious anemia the problem is the lack of certain secretions in the stomach which make it possible to absorb vitamin B-12 in your system. No matter how much you eat, that situation won't change and you will still be deficient in that valuable blood-forming substance. It can result form an illness or

occur with age. You may need the vitamin injections for the rest of your life.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can heart palpitations be caused by not enough potassium in the body? — D.L.

Yes. Potassium is important for muscles, including the heart. It's not an uncommon symptom, particularly for those using strong diuretics (water pills or anything that causes increase in urination). Magnesium lack can cause it, too.

Hints from Heloise

Good Day!

I would like to pass along a delicious idea that will help you save money and add some unusual munchies to pantry food fair.

When buying broccoli I usually pay for it by the pound, and we all know that when it gets down to cutting it up and eating it, it's usually the very tips that everyone likes and are the best.

One evening I had put the broccoli in the steamer basket and it sure didn't look like much for the amount of money that I paid, and then I looked at all of the stalk and end that was left in the sink.

I do cut the broccoli and leave a few inches of stem on them and peel away as much of the little leaves as possible, but there is still a lot of big stalk left.

So I decided to try something. I saved the rest of the stalks and used them the next day. I cleaned them and cut off some of the bumpy knobs.

I used my big butcher knife and started slicing the stalk in very fine slices, kinda at a 45-degree angle—I used most-of-it-ex-

cept the really tough, very end part.

I placed these chips in the steamer basket and added enough water to just slightly cover them and I added a teaspoon of chicken bouillon.

Put the lid on and turned the burner to medium-high and let it "do-the-do." I wish I could tell you exactly how long I cooked this, but I can't.

As usual, I don't measure and very rarely time. I cook by the sniff, taste-and-see-method.

When the broccoli "snips" (my own innovation) are done, I put them in a jar, pour the leftover liquid from the pan in and seal tightly.

When cool, pop into the refrigerator and use as you desire. I like to nibble on them, add them to salads and they're great sliced finer for cruncy zesto in casseroles or an omelet.

The length of time you cook these depends on the degree of crunchiness (is that really a word?) you want. The longer

you steam them, the softer they get. Got it?

Give it a go and who know, you just might like this wacky-sounding hint. Bon appetit! — Heloise II

Dear Heloise:

For a juicier turkey, do not brown it. After stuffing and trussing, pour cooking oil and orange juice over the bird. Then wrap loosely with aluminum foil.

Place on rack in roasting pan. Put water in bottom of pan. Requires no basting.

Time and even temperature will vary according to size of bird, type oven, etc. — Evelyn Drucker

Evelyn is right, folks.

I tried this, and cooked an eight-pound turkey in two hours. That's 15 minutes per pound — 300 degree oven temperature.

LEAA Program Sends Career Crooks To Jail

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Spotting career criminals and giving them "special handling" is helping route repeat offenders to jail instead of back on the street, a federal agency said Sunday.

The payoff for the pilot projects financed in 59 American cities by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration was an increase in criminal convictions and a greater drop in crime rates than the national average.

The program helped achieve the goal of all prosecutors — swift conviction and certain punishment. Under the project, prosecutors had a 94.5 percent conviction rate involving 7,979 crimes. The career criminals received sentences averaging 14.3 years.

A unit in the Bronx County District Attorney's office in New York cut the average of 400 days from arrest to disposition of a case to just 97 days, the LEAA said.

For 22 cities which received a total of \$11 million for the pilot program, median time from arrest to disposition was 103 days, far shorter than in the past.

Projects in the other 37 cities were financed from LEAA block grants.

The LEAA analyzed the results of the program in 22 test cities between May 1975 to Aug. 1, 1977.

In 17 of the cities for which crime figures were available, the LEAA said robberies dropped 12.4 percent in the first quarter of 1977 from the first quarter of 1976, compared to an 8 percent reduction nationwide.

Burglaries were down 9.1 per cent in the 17 cities during the same period, compared to a national reduction of 7 percent, the LEAA said.

'Public Was Fed Up'

"The criminal justice system and the public were fed up with the revolving door syndrome involving many hardened professional criminals," Acting LEAA Administrator James Gregg said.

"The new programs can pinpoint the repeat offender, give him special handling and, if conviction follows, get him off the streets for a long time. In this way we can reduce serious crime and protect the public by setting an example for other repeaters."

The results were achieved in a number of ways. The cities set up special prosecution units handling half the case load a prosecutor normally faces. Courts cooperated to speed trials with clear benefits for prosecutors.

In Detroit, the number of cases that had to be dismissed because witnesses disappeared or refused to cooperate dropped from 49 percent to 17.4 percent for the career-criminal cases.

The pilot federal program prompted at least one state to launch its own comparable program. In September, California

cialist, and a hematologist, who specializes in the blood element.

Technologist Has Role

The county hospital also has a nurse coordinator who would play a big part in a transplant, he said.

Mike Rosson, a perfusion technologist who is responsible for preserving organs from living donors, was added to the hospital staff about a month ago.

About two months ago, an \$8,000 perfusion machine was donated to the hospital by the Telephone Pioneers of America. This means living organs can be received in Lubbock and shipped to various areas where transplants have been scheduled.

Marty Kollmar, a blood bank technologist trained in tissue typing, is also a part of the hospital staff, making it most capable of undertaking transplant operations, according to Dr. Lawton.

The hospital also has received a \$5,000 dialysis machine and will set up a center for persons having an acute kidney disease which, with treatment from the center, could be reversed. This facility, in part, would be used for patients who had received kidneys and need to be put on the dialysis machine to help the organ adapt to its new body.

Dr. Lawton said the dialysis center would cost about \$40,000 yearly to maintain.

The city now has a dialysis center at 1907 Ave. Q which is headed by Dr. Stanbaugh. Dr. Lawton said that facility is used by kidney patients whose diseases cannot be cured and are in need of transplants.

Media Battle Breakup Rule

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Newspapers and broadcasters are making a last stand in the Supreme Court against an order threatening breakup of up to 150 media combinations in 44 states.

Cross-ownership in Baltimore, Chicago, Dallas, St. Louis, Washington D.C., Shreveport, La., and New York could be affected by the outcome of the Supreme Court appeal.

The Federal Communications Commission issued rules barring future common ownership of newspapers and TV or radio stations in the same market. It decided to allow existing combinations to continue operating, with the exception of 16 cases where there was just one daily newspaper and one broadcast station in a city.

But the U.S. Court of Appeals ordered the FCC to apply the rule to current combinations as well as future ones, except where the public interest would be harmed by a breakup.

Sadat Delivers Peace Plea

"The time of the flight between Cairo and Jerusalem is short. But the distance between them was, until yesterday, quite large," he said.

"President Sadat passed this great distance with courage, heart-felt courage. We Jews know how to appreciate this courage of heart and we will know how to appreciate our visitor's courage."

Begin called for a peace agreement that would end the state of war between Israel and its Arab neighbors, leading to full relations and economic cooperation.

'All Can Be Negotiated'

"Everything must be negotiated and can be negotiated," he said. "We shall conduct these negotiations as equals — there are no victors or vanquished."

As negotiating partners he listed only Egypt, Syria, Jordan and Lebanon, and not the Palestinians.

That prompted two Communist members to interrupt and shout, "What about the Palestinians?" Begin did not reply.

From the Knesset, Begin and Sadat went to a working dinner. It was their third meeting since Sadat arrived Saturday night, and there was speculation substantive issues were being discussed.

In Washington, Vice President Walter F. Mondale declared that Sadat's visit had planted a "seed for peace" in the Middle East. He said he hoped the Begin-Sadat talks would lead to negotiations at Geneva, "where all parties can meet again as human beings, face-to-face, in another historic encounter."

Mixed Reactions

Sadat's speech drew mixed reactions from officials and ordinary people in the Arab world. Leaders of radical Arab states and Palestinians denounced it. Official sources in Jordan praised the speech, but other conservative Arab regimes like Saudi Arabia were silent.

In Cairo, Sadat's supporters prepared to give him a triumphant welcome home, but many Egyptians expressed disappointment that his mission had produced no public Israeli concessions.

"Sadat did his best," a student said. "He went to them, but apparently they (Israelis) are not interested in real peace."

In Jerusalem, many Israelis were disappointed with Sadat's speech. "Sadat's speech was aimed mainly at the Arab world," said an Israeli official who called the address "much tougher" than anticipated.

Sadat arrived at the Knesset after early morning worship at the Al-Aqsa mosque, a visit to the Christian Church of the Holy Sepulcher and a tour of Yad Vashem, the massive monument to Jewish victims of Nazi Germany.

Given Trumpet Fanfares

Sadat's unprecedented visit to a state with which he is still formally at war began Saturday night with his arrival at Ben-Gurion Airport to trumpet fanfares and a full-dress state welcome by the entire Israeli leadership. His 36-hour visit ends Monday.

Within three hours of his arrival, he held his first private meeting with Begin. They talked again Sunday morning.

After spending the night at the King David Hotel in Jerusalem's Jewish quarter, Sadat, a deeply religious man, rose early to celebrate the Moslem feast of Adha at the silver-domed Al-Aqsa mosque.

More than 5,000 worshippers crowded the mosque. The imam, or religious leader, appealed for Arab unity, quoting from the Koran: "Do not quarrel for your strength will dissipate."

From the mosque, surrounded by a thick cordon of security men, Sadat walked to the Mosque of Omar and on to Church of the Holy Sepulcher, revered by Christians as the site of Christ's burial.

to taking issue with parts of Sadat's speech before the Israeli parliament.

"We take issue with the parts admitting the existence of Israel and giving the Jewish state the right of coexistence in the Middle East," the radio, which carried brief excerpts from the speech, said.

Called 'Traitor'

The radio continued to refer to Sadat as a "traitor" in reporting his various activities during his first full day in Israel but did not offer any further official comment on the address.

Al Ba'ath, organ of the ruling Syrian party, appeared in a mourning format with its front page fringed in black. The Syrian press attacked the Sadat visit in banner headlines as a "black day" and a "journey of shame."

Beirut's pro-Libyan As Safir daily said Sadat had just "entered history as the personal enemy of every human being in the Arab lands" and that his name would henceforth be mentioned in the same breath as those of the founders of Israel.

"He has given us all a choice: us or him," As Safir said.

The newspaper reported that the Egyptian military had been on alert for the past 12 days following dismissal of some 130 officers opposed to the Sadat trip, but there was no immediate confirmation of this from Cairo.

The Damascus daily Tishrin, meanwhile, said "shining wrath" would soon confront Sadat, and that Syrian strength would "within hours or days make the Sadat visit nothing but a small memory." The newspaper did not elaborate.

Syria's radical neighbor Iraq said Sadat's Knesset speech meant that Sadat had "recognized the Zionist entity — that of the usurpers of Palestine."

In moderate Jordan, a group of professional societies including the bar association issued a statement expressing "great rage at President Sadat's visit to occupied Palestine, speaking in the Knesset under the Zionist emblem and visiting Al Aksa mosque under the protection of the bayonets of the Zionist occupation army."

Fleet's Visit To Egypt Said Normal

DAMASCUS, Syria (UPI) — Official Damascus radio said Sunday said the U.S. 6th Fleet had been ordered to proceed to the Egyptian port of Alexandria. A U.S. Navy spokesman in Naples said the fleet was making "usual port visits."

In Washington, a Pentagon spokesman denied the report, saying that one of the fleet's carrier task forces was in port and the other was at sea in the central Mediterranean, far away from Alexandria.

The Syrian bulletin announcement, interrupting normal newscasts, said an order had come from Washington for the fleet's port call in Alexandria but that there was no immediate explanation for the move.

A U.S. 6th Fleet spokesman in Naples said "fleet operations are continuing normally" when asked about the Damascus broadcast.

"The fleet is at sea at the moment and going through a schedule of the usual port visits," he said. "If any ships call at Egyptian ports in the next few days, these will be routine calls scheduled some time ago."

The spokesman pointed out that 6th Fleet warships have previously been in Egyptian waters, including the flagship USS Little Rock which was at the reopening of the Suez Canal in June 1975.

The Damascus report followed intense Syrian and other Arab criticism of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's visit to Israel.

Radio Damascus carried briefly after its 6th Fleet bulletin a report from Beirut's leftist newspaper As Safir that the Egyptian military had been on alert for the past 12 days after the purging of some 130 officers who opposed the Sadat visit to Israel.

But the radio did not suggest a link between the two reported moves.

Great Dangers Seen

The professional groups' statement said "great dangers are borne by this humiliating visit."

But Jordanian newspapers withheld direct criticism of the Sadat visit, in a rollback on earlier attacks that was apparently prompted by a government statement late Saturday equally critical of Sadat and of his Arab critics.

In Amman, Libya ran up a new solid green flag to replace the old red-white-black banner of the Federation of Arab Republics, the loosely-knit union of Libya, Egypt and Syria. Libya embassies around the world burned the old flag Saturday when Sadat arrived in Israel.

Poles Believe Carter Aide Understands Polish Politics

WARSAW (AP) — The man in the Polish Foreign Ministry kept quoting Zbigniew Brzezinski rather than Jimmy Carter on aspects of American policies in Europe.

"It takes a Pole, even an American-reared one, to understand the subtleties of politics in the Old World," he said. "The President will say 'yes' or 'no' on given issues but we assume he chose Zbig as his National Security adviser because their views are in tune."

The editor of a leading Communist Party journal recalled that in his book "America in a Hostile World" Brzezinski wrote: "America would be untrue to its own initial values if it adopted a cynical view regarding the Soviet relationship to those East European countries that either seek to enlarge or to protect their own national independence."

This journalist then commented: "I liked that. Brzezinski must have been thinking of Poland."

A Roman Catholic bishop asked: "Was it Brzezinski's idea that the President should choose Poland to be his first stop in East Europe?"

In fact, Jerrold Schechter, Brzezinski's press secretary in Washington, has said it was President Carter's own idea.

A certain pride seemed to shine through these and other comments by authorities here that a fellow Pole, even though he left the country as an infant, has climbed to the top echelon of U.S. policy-makers.

Plainly they have taken trouble to acquaint themselves with Brzezinski's published writings.

Vicarious or nationalistic, that pride seemed to be shared by many of the 165 Brzezinski families listed in the Warsaw telephone directory.

None of those contacted claimed a blood relationship with their famed Washington namesake who is due to accompany the president to Warsaw on a visit expected around the New Year.

But quite a few, when asked, said "unluckily, no." They had no direct or indirect family ties with the President's adviser.

Brzezinski was born in Warsaw 49 years ago. His father Tadeusz, now 81 and living in Montreal, was a career diplomat whose work took him and his family frequently to Polish missions in foreign lands. So it was that Brzezinski was only four months old when, in July 1928, the father transferred to France for three years.

After France the elder Brzezinski became Polish Consul in Leipzig, Germany. In 1935 the family returned to Warsaw but only for three years. Then Brzezinski senior became Polish Consul-General in Montreal. He quit the service in 1945 when Poland, under communist rule, joined the Soviet bloc.

Brzezinski himself lived less than four years in the land of his birth. The family home in a fashionable part of Warsaw was razed by Hitler's troops who devastated 85 percent of the capital. Today workers' apartments stand where Tadeusz Brzezinski and his family once lived.

Nowadays Brzezinski has an aunt and several cousins — on his mother Leonia's side of the family. Leonia's family name — Roman — is not uncommon. There are 43 of them in the Warsaw telephone book.

By the accounts of people here and in

Washington who know Brzezinski there is little contact between him and his relatives. Plainly neither side would wish to embarrass the other. The aunt, for instance, has not met senior U.S. Embassy officers since or even before her nephew assumed high office this year.

Even Tadeusz — forever the diplomat — has stayed discreetly silent. Brzezinski calls his father in Montreal regularly from Washington but neither asks for nor gets opinions on matters of foreign policy.

Brzezinski, reared as a Pole, speaks the language fluently. He became an American citizen at 30. Official assignments have taken him to Warsaw several times in the past 15 years when his talent for international affairs was spotted.

These visits have had to do with scientific, cultural and security matters — exactly the sort of subjects the president will be discussing with Polish Communist Party leader Edward Gierek when they eventually meet.

Romanian Hails Western Press

PARIS (AP) — Romanian dissident Paul Goma arrived Sunday with his wife and son on a "one year touristic visa," and said he wanted to pay homage to the Western press for its support of human rights causes in Eastern Europe.

Goma, one of Romania's leading authors, has been an outspoken supporter of the Charter 77 human rights group in Czechoslovakia.

He was detained for two weeks in April after he wrote letters to Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu backing human rights in Romania. He claimed that during his detention he was mistreated by Romanian authorities and later was harassed at his Bucharest apartment.

"I am very tired," Goma said, citing poor health as one of the motives for his temporary departure.

Romanian exiles in Paris believe the Romanian government wants to deport Goma permanently.

Broker Perceives Progress In Mart

BOSTON (AP) — Frederick S. Moseley III had graduated from Harvard and spent 1 1/2 years in Korea when he was hired by F.S. Moseley & Co., the brokerage house founded by his grandfather in 1879.

"When I got out (of the military) I started looking around. There was really no one in the family working there — nor had there been for some time," Moseley says. "I thought there would be an advantage to being in a firm with the same name."

Moseley took that job in 1955 after reaching an agreement with the managing partner.

"You can have a job here, but you'll be treated just like anybody else; and if either one of us thinks he would be better off elsewhere, we'll say so," Moseley quotes the managing partner as saying at the time.

After leading F.S. Moseley & Co. through four mergers, today, at 49, Moseley is chairman and chief executive officer of Moseley, Hallgarten & Estabrook Inc., one of the oldest brokerage firms in the Northeast.

"It was obvious to me that we were going to have to augment our capital and our talents — and the opportunity to merge came along," he says.

"The easiest thing in the world is to have my position, as long as you have intelligent people around you," Moseley says. "The person sitting here is responsible for the interrelationships of people within the organization. The ideas come up from below."

"The thing I like best is working with people who are intelligent and ambitious and who really want to work. The atmosphere is very stimulating."

Moseley has watched the family firm grow from nine offices and a net worth of \$5 million in 1955 to more than 30 branches, including international offices in London and Geneva, with capital of \$13 million.

What makes the firm successful?

"It's all a function of having the right person heading a department or talking to a customer. Customers are much more intelligent than in years gone by," he says.

The securities industry is in the midst of significant changes, with the Securities and Exchange Commission working on eliminating restrictive stock exchange regulations regarding trades of listed issues as well as developing a nationwide computerized market system.

"The industry has changed so much, really, that a five-year plan made two years ago is almost out of date," Moseley says.

Investor malaise relating to worries about inflation and the economy and declining stock prices has cut into trading volume and trimmed brokerage revenues. According to one analyst, revenues of NYSE firms doing public business are expected to fall 12 percent this year. But Moseley is optimistic about his firm's future.

"There are enough customers. The problem is to get them to realize who you are," Moseley says. "I think confidence will slowly return. The entire system depends on people coming back (to investing in the stock market)."

"If they don't — then we are in trouble," Moseley says.

Storm Kills Hundreds In India

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A cyclone (hurricane) that has battered eastern India for two days, and a resultant tidal wave, have killed at least 879 persons, officials said Sunday. More than 2,000 were reported injured.

The storm cut across the Bay of Bengal and hit Andhra Pradesh state Saturday with heavy rains and winds of up to 95 mph, causing wide devastation and isolating many districts, officials said.

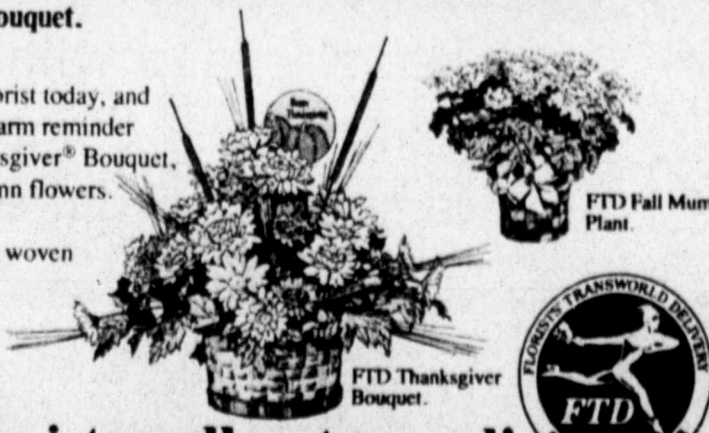

Carter Says Sadat-Begin Talks Can 'Break Barrier' To Peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter, after praying Sunday for successful talks between Anwar Sadat and Menachem Begin, described the Egyptian and Israeli leaders' speeches to the Israeli Knesset (parliament) as "a contribution to the cause of peace."

Carter called the televised speeches of the Egyptian president, the Israeli prime minister, and Shimon Peres, leader of the Israeli opposition Labor Party, "a moving occasion." He said the speeches were characterized by "candor and a spirit of conciliation."

"In that spirit we hope and believe it is possible to move toward lasting peace," the president said in a statement issued by the White House.

Earlier Sunday, Carter had said Sadat's visit "might very well break down the barrier to peace."

After participating in an early-morning prayer service at the First Baptist Church, he described the Sadat-Begin talks as "a major step forward" that would improve the likelihood of a Geneva peace conference. The president then rushed back to the White House to watch the speeches on television.

When the addresses concluded, Carter consulted with Vice President Walter F. Mondale and national security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski.

In his address, Sadat said he welcomed the Jewish state to live in peace and safety alongside Arabs in the Middle East.

Begin called on Arab leaders to follow Sadat's example by opening peace negotiations. He said he was personally prepared to go to Damascus, Amman or Beirut, the capitals of neighboring Syria, Jordan and Lebanon, in the search for peace.

White House press secretary Jody Powell reported that Carter was keeping in touch with the talks in Israel, but said: "We're not trying to be looking over their shoulders every minute."

In both his prayer and his comments outside the church, Carter suggested that opposition to the Sadat-Begin summit by some Mideast leaders was an obstacle to peace because they were not responding to the peaceful desires of their people.

"I think it is obvious that the people of the world want peace and pray for peace," he said. "President Sadat is trying to break down the barriers and go directly to the people."

Carter said he thought the Sadat visit was going well, despite objections in the Arab world.

The Syrians have been among the most strident in their opposition to Sadat's trip, the president conceded. But he noted that Syria was "in a most difficult position" because it is smaller than, and not as powerful as, Egypt and Israel.

Carter predicted Arab opposition would diminish when it was seen that Sadat was not seeking a separate peace.

Mondale said he thought Sadat's and Begin's performances were remarkable.

"The thought that a president of Egypt would come to Jerusalem and before the Israeli parliament welcome Israel as a permanent country and seek to talk directly with them is of tremendous significance," he said.

"I thought Sadat's very open and candid acceptance of Israel... was eloquent and unique testimony all of its own," the vice president said.

Meanwhile, a host of U.S. government officials and congressmen were offering their views on the Sadat mission and Sunday's speeches by Sadat and Begin before the Israeli parliament.

Philip Habib, undersecretary of state for political and economic affairs, said he viewed the Sadat-Begin talks "as a harbinger of the importance of negotiations between the confrontation states" in the Middle East.

But Habib, the No. 3 man at the State Department, said "instant analysis or instant interpretation is not my bag, and should not be anyone's bag."

He said he doubted that Sadat's initiative would diminish this country's middleman role in Mideast peace diplomacy.

The Carter administration "does not tread water in foreign policy," Habib said, adding that the United States remains vitally interested in the long-term objective of achieving a lasting peace in the Mideast.

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance, talking to reporters on a flight to Latin America for a four-nation tour, termed Sadat's address "an eloquent statement on the need for peace and the removal of the wall of mistrust that has existed between the Arab nations and Israel."

Vance said U.S. officials "hope that this historic event will dispel the mutual suspicions and mistrust that have been the principal barrier to fruitful negotiations."

Vance said Sadat's visit to Israel "can transform fundamentally the psychological atmosphere for Arab-Israeli peace negotiations. It can help to dispel the mutual suspicion and mistrust that has been a principal barrier to fruitful negotiations."

In New York, former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger said any serious bargaining between Sadat and Begin would have to take place in private sessions.

And Kissinger, analyzing the Knesset speeches for NBC News, said failure to make some progress at those meetings would leave the Mideast closer to war than when Sadat set out on his unprecedented mission.

He suggested the United States remain on the sidelines for the moment, allowing Israel and Egypt to seek their own terms for peace or further negotiations.

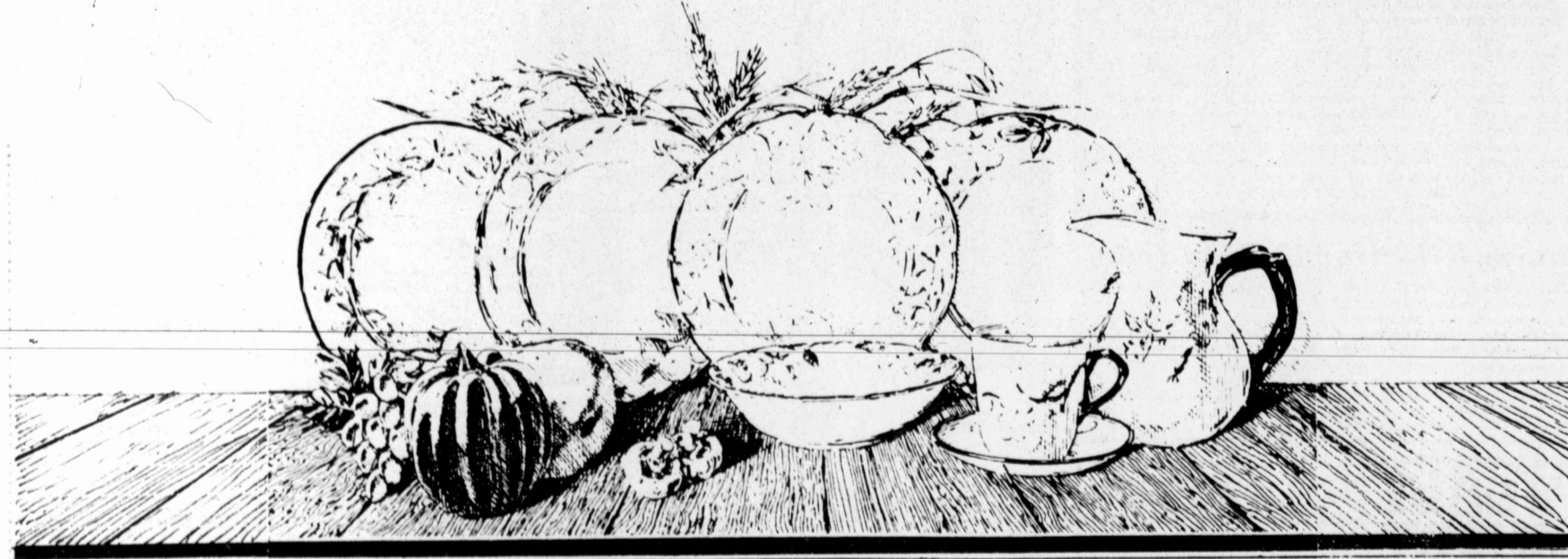
Anita Bryant Blasts Women's Conference

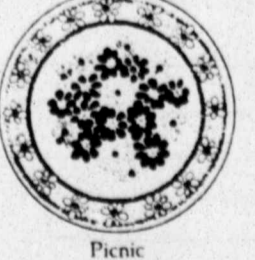

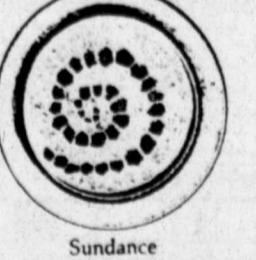

Fired-Up Franco Finds Daylight Against Dallas

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Night had fallen by the time the Pittsburgh Steelers finished off their 28-13 victory over the Dallas Cowboys Sunday, but Franco Harris saw the light.

"It's a brand new day. We're going after it now," the Steeler fullback said after he rushed for a career-high of 179 yards and scored two touchdowns, one on a 61-yard off-tackle breakaway.

"We played with a lot more aggressiveness and a lot more emotion than we've probably played with in a long time. We played like champions," Harris added.

The victory, also marked by a pair of touchdown passes by Steeler quarterback Terry Bradshaw, raised the Steelers' record to 6-4 and kept them tied with

Cleveland atop the American Conference Central Division.

"If we continue to play with lots of emotion, lots of defense and lots of desire, we won't lose," Bradshaw proclaimed.

It was the second straight loss for the Cowboys after eight victories in a row, and they had their lead cut to one game over St. Louis in the National Conference East.

"They whipped us this afternoon," said

Cowboy Coach Tom Landry.

"We got so far ahead, we lost the competitive instinct. We've got to get it and get going again."

The defeat also spoiled the homecoming and first NFL start for rookie Tony Dorsett, who rushed for 73 yards on 17 tries in his first game here since he led Pitt to the national collegiate title a season ago.

Harris, who piled up his rushing yardage on 29 carries, lost a fumble at his 37-

yard line late in the first quarter. Dorsett followed with a 13-yard touchdown run that gave Dallas a 6-0 lead after the extra-point kick was blocked.

On the first play of the second quarter, Harris took a handoff from Bradshaw, cut off left tackle, stepped away from a shoestring tackle try by Ed "Too Tall" Jones and raced untouched to the end zone on his 61-yard scoring play.

With 5:26 left before halftime, Roger Staubach gave Dallas a 13-7 lead with a 23-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jay Saldi.

But Bradshaw gave Pittsburgh a 14-13 lead 2:50 before halftime with a 9-yard scoring pass to Lynn Swann. And Pittsburgh added a pair of third-quarter touchdowns on a 28-yard pass from Bradshaw to John Stallworth and a 2-yard run by Harris, set up by 48-yard interception return by Steeler safety Jim Allen.

In the opening quarter, Harris was belted by Dallas safety Cliff Harris and fumbled, linebacker Tom Henderson recovering at the Pittsburgh 37-yard line.

Six plays later, Dorsett broke loose on the right side and raced 13 yards for his touchdown, lifting the ball in the air at the 5-yard line.

On his 61-yard touchdown run to open the second period, Harris cut off a block by center Mike Webster. It was the longest scoring run this season by Harris and the second longest of his career, surpassed only by a 75-yarder he had as a rookie against St. Louis.

The Dallas touchdown later in the second quarter came when Staubach faked a handoff to Dorsett, rolled away from linebacker Jack Ham and then threw a wobbly 23-yard pass to a wide-open Saldi, with Steeler cornerback J.T. Thomas in pursuit.

The Steelers' ensuing touchdown drive before halftime covered 53 yards and included a 21-yard pass to tight end Benny Cunningham, followed by the 9-yard scoring pass to Swann.

In the third quarter, Pittsburgh drove 62 yards for the touchdown that came on Bradshaw's 28-yard pass over the middle to Stallworth. The drive included a 17-yard run by Harris.

On the next Dallas series, Allen stole a pass intended for tight end Billy Joe Dupree and returned it 48 yards to the 2-yard line from where Harris scored.

Pastorini Lifts Houston 22-10

SEATTLE (AP) — Veteran quarterback Dan Pastorini, threading pass after pass through Seattle's young defense, found Ken Burrough with a 13-yard touchdown toss, and newcomer Tom Dempsey booted a pair of field goals leading the Houston Oilers to a 22-10 victory over the Seahawks Sunday.

The 6-foot-3 Pastorini completed 21 of 36 passes for 237 yards, including his TD pass to Burrough with 46 seconds left in the second period that gave Houston a 10-3 halftime lead.

Dempsey, a free agent signed by the Oilers last Friday to replace injured placekicker Toni Fritsch, kicked a 27-yard field goal that tied the game at 3-3 with 5:37 left in the second period. His 37-yard kick boosted Houston's lead to 13-3 midway in the third period. Both kicks followed Seattle turnovers.

Dempsey, a nine-year veteran who played out his option with Los Angeles last season and wasn't signed by anyone else, missed his first two attempts from 31 and 46 yards. Both were partially blocked.

Houston, now 5-5, got its other touchdown on Ronnie Coleman's 1-yard run. See OILERS Page 2

Paterno Stunned, Hogs Elated With Orange Bowl's Selection

MIAMI (AP) — Penn State Coach Joe Paterno responded to the bad news with an unemotional "Thank you." Arkansas fans reportedly reacted by buying every orange in Fayetteville.

Arkansas is going to the Orange Bowl. Penn State is not. The Orange Bowl Selection Committee made the decision on Saturday, picking the eighth-ranked Razorbacks to play the winner of Friday's Oklahoma-Nebraska game in the New Year's Day Classic.

The announcement capped decisions by two other Florida bowl committees to feature Florida State against Texas Tech in the Tangerine Bowl and Clemson against Pitt in the Gator Bowl. "I'm a little stunned," said Paterno, whose ninth-ranked team was considered a front runner for the bowl contest. "I told the squad in the middle of the week that the Orange Bowl was up for grabs. I also told them I couldn't understand why."

Officials with the selection committee said they were influenced by national rankings and the fact Penn has visited Miami in the past. "It was a tough decision to make," said Jim Billings, chairman of the Orange Bowl Committee. "We felt that Arkansas had the higher rating, they had never been here before and they wanted to come. We feel it was a good choice."

Bob Lafferty, chairman of the Orange Bowl selection committee, said the two schools reacted predictably to the news. "The call I had to make to Joe Paterno telling him of our decision may have been the toughest call I ever made in my life. But he accepted it very graciously," said Lafferty. "Joe gave me a very unemotional, 'Thank you.'"

Arkansas' Lou Holtz was ecstatic but not surprised. "We have a very fine football team," said Holtz, who is coaching his first season at Arkansas.

Lafferty said Razorback fans enjoying a 47-7 defeat over Southern Methodist took the news in a less subdued manner. "When I talked to Lou Holtz, he told me they had to stop their game four times to remove the oranges the fans had thrown onto the field," said Lafferty.

"He said you couldn't buy an orange for sale within 50 miles of the place." Florida State Coach Bobby Bowden said confirmation that his 13th-ranked squad will play 16th-ranked Texas Tech in the Dec. 23 Tangerine Bowl in Orlando helped take the sting out of a 41-16 loss to San Diego State Saturday.

The Gator Bowl game is between 10th-ranked Pitt and 15th-ranked Clemson.

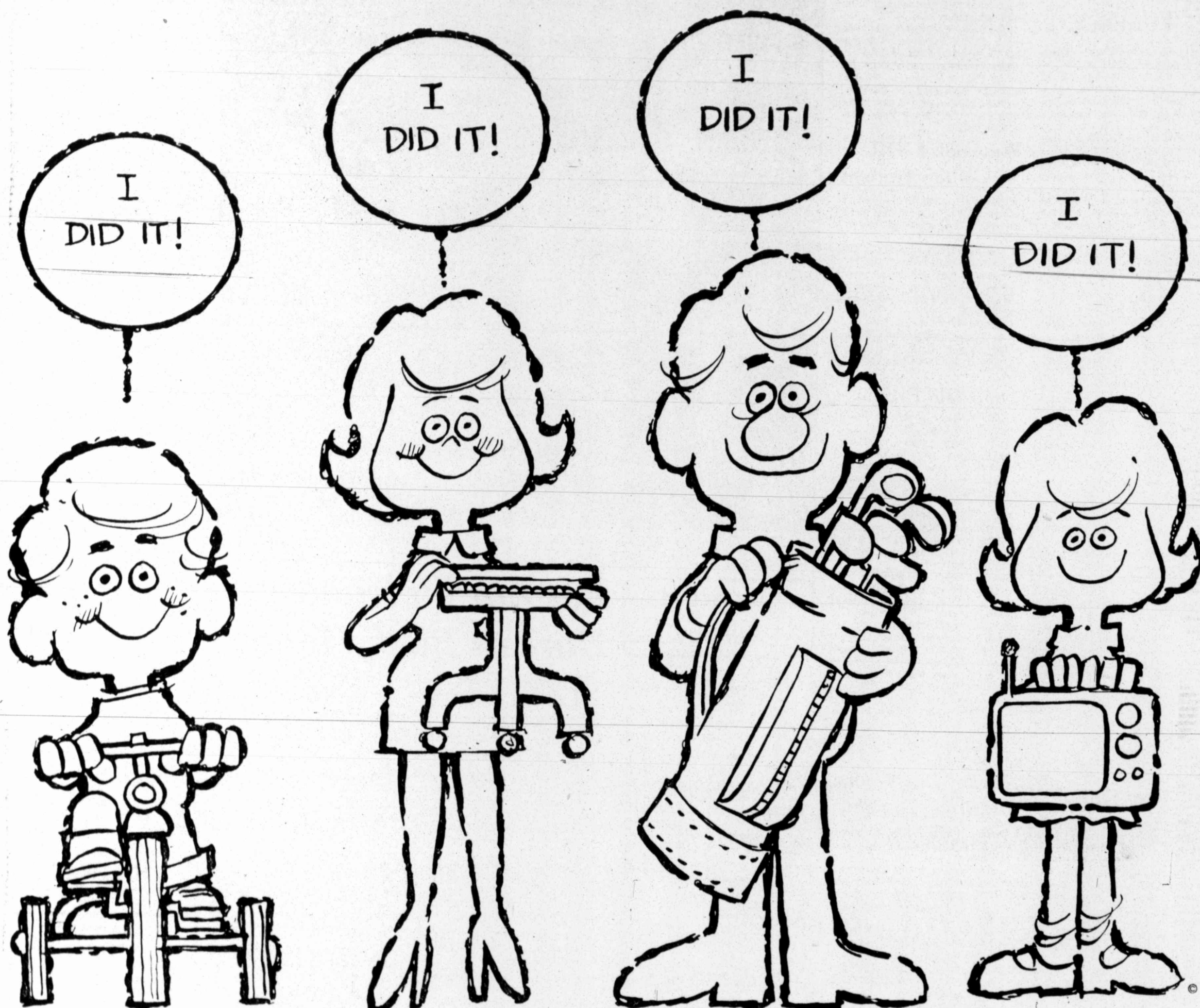

'Manhattan Transfer' Seeking 'Best Group In World' Status

Manhattan Transfer started as a nostalgia quartet but its founder-member Tim Hauser has broader and higher aspirations for it than that. He says, "We're not out to be a trendy nostalgia group. We're trying to be the best vocal group in the country, if not the world."

"We always wanted to be the best at what we do. In some ways I think we are now and some ways I don't think we are. I think at this point my goal is just to get into more and more things and do it well and successfully. I'd like us to become more popular than we are."

At first, as on the first of two albums on Atlantic, "The Manhattan Transfer," the group sang songs of the 1930s and '40s. On its second album, "Coming Out," issued last fall, some contemporary songs and arrangements are included.

"The group is very versatile," says Laurel Masse. "The second album is not so

much of a change as it is an extension of what we do."

In the spring of 1972, Hauser, who had had groups before, was driving a cab but looking for two girls to sing with. He met Miss Masse and Janis Siegel, who sang with him on a demonstration record with the short-lived Trust Me Band, which was playing in the pit of Broadway's "Grease."

Miss Masse says, "Then we decided to put together a group of two men and two women, much in the same format of groups Tim had been in before." Enter Alan Paul.

Hauser goes on, "I had had a group be-

fore called Manhattan Transfer, which broke up after two years. I wanted to fulfill what I had set out to do with it. That's why the names are the same."

"The first group was plagued with many problems. We did one album on Capitol, 'Jukin,' which was pretty good. Most of it was country rock. Some of it was old songs like 'Java Jive' and 'If You're a Viper.'"

'Brothers' Producers Say Film Not Angela Davis Documentary

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The new Warner Bros. film, "Brothers," concerns a radical young woman professor and a state prison inmate who struggles against the penal system and is killed in an escape attempt.

Sound familiar? In many ways "Brothers" parallels the cases of Angela Davis and George Jackson, plus his brother Jonathan, killed in the 1970 shootout at the Marin County Courthouse. But in other ways the film diverges from the real happenings, as reporters who covered the events can point out.

"But there was no attempt to follow the Soledad case," comments Bernie Casey, who stars as the prison leader, David Thomas.

"The underground letters which are circulated in the prison actually happened elsewhere. The arm bands that the escaping convicts wear in the climax were used at Attica. George Jackson was not at Marin, as the picture indicates."

"Brothers" is not a documentary. It is a dramatic motion picture, and it employs dramatic license to create drama.

The movie is coming into release this month, and producer-writer Edward Lewis has complained that bookings have been scarce in all-white neighborhoods.

"I suppose the film will disturb some whites," observed Casey, "but it shouldn't. It is not a black vs. white movie; it is people vs. injustice. I suspect that it will do well in black and 'crossover' (black and white) theaters, and it should be well received in college areas as well."

Bernie Casey is powerfully built at 37, a 6-foot-4 giant who played pro football with the San Francisco 49ers and the Los Angeles Rams. That wasn't mentioned in his studio biography. "It's like Orson

Welles, who is always referred to as the maker of 'Citizen Kane,' his first picture," he explains. "Welles complains that he has done many things since. So have I."

He is more conversant about his other careers. He is a poet, with three published volumes by Doubleday and another forthcoming. He is an artist whose "lyrical abstractions" have been shown in 15 one-man shows, another scheduled for the fall. And he continues to impress as an actor, his credits including "Box Car Bertha," "Maurie" (his favorite), "Black Gunn," "The Man Who Fell to Earth" and on television "Brian's Song"

and "Gargoyles." Casey said he fell naturally into acting.

Standards Relaxed For Women

Coed Army Training Causes Changes

FORT JACKSON, S.C. (AP) — The stocky, gruff-voiced Army instructor constantly watched his terminology as he taught his audience of weary trainees how to fire their M16 rifles.

"The next thing we're gonna look at, men, uh, trainees..."

His confusion was understandable. Male and female recruits have been training together at Fort Jackson since October. The formerly all-female 5th Brigade has been disbanded, and women are now divided into platoons of about 50 and placed in a company with three male platoons.

The men and women march together fire anti-tank guns together and toss hand grenades side by side.

Fort Jackson is the Army's only base to conduct coed basic training on such a large scale.

Pvt. Jacqueline Landry, of Granby, Mass., had just qualified as a rifle expert after taking the firing test for the second time; she failed the first time. But she wasn't fazed by having to take the same training and meet the same standards as her male counterparts.

"I like it. I'm having a pretty good time, really," she said during a break. "It's easier than I thought it would be."

In the fall of 1976, the Army conducted a Basic Initial Entry Training program in which 875 men and 825 women underwent an eight-week training course under the same performance standards. The experiment was prompted after women in segregated training were found to be less qualified than the men.

The results showed little difference in the relative performances of male and female groups. And Army officials decided to begin the coed basic training program on a full-scale basis this fall.

Each female platoon is housed in a building with three male platoons. Sleeping quarters are separate, although men and women recruits share common dining halls and classrooms.

The regimen is much the same as it was for men in the days of segregated companies, but modifications have been made to accommodate the women. Officers generally consider the changes minor, but some male recruits contend they have caused their training to deteriorate.

The changes are mainly in physical training. And Capt. David A. Georgi admits that the standards — upgraded for

women, but lightened for men — are not rigorous.

Before graduating from basic training, the recruits must do 22 pushups in two minutes, 22 situps in the same amount of time, and run a mile in nine minutes.

Georgi, commander of D Company in the 2nd Brigade's 7th Battalion, said three of six events in the physical training test have been eliminated to accommodate the women.

Cut out were the horizontal ladder, in which trainees move hand-over-hand the length of a ladder; the run, dodge and jump, an obstacle course in which the

are making up some of their background-related differences.

In rifle marksmanship all trainees in the female platoon have qualified, while none of the male platoons can boast of 100 percent qualification, Georgi said.

Sgt. Greta Brayboy, one of several female drill instructors, said the women know they don't have the athletic background many men do, which is an incentive.

"It's like being No. 2. They know they have to try harder to maintain."

Conversely, the coed program gives the "Joes" a reason to try harder, she adds. "The guys will egg one another on. They say, 'don't let the women pass you.'"

Georgi said that the biggest shocks for women are the lack of privacy and "getting yelled at." He said women are generally treated the same as men when they make errors, "but I won't deny there are times when you talk softer to a female."

Socially and sexually, the relations in coed training are low-key — partly because of Army rules restricting fraternization between the sexes, and partly because, after a day beginning at 5 a.m. and ending with lights out at 9 p.m., there isn't much time for socializing.

Male and female trainees are allowed to talk to each other only in groups — never in couples — and even then, the Army is the only condoned topic.

Pvt. Harry Dunn, of Detroit, voiced the men's frustrations: "Why put us together in the Army and then tell us not to speak to them (women)?" When fraternization rules are broken, Dunn added, the men are punished more severely.

Pvt. Landry said, "We're so tired when we get back to the barracks at night all we want to do is take a shower and get to bed." Other women admitted they weren't too weary to develop crushes on male trainees — and maybe a drill sergeant or two.

Robinson conceded that "when they screw up, some (women trainees) will try

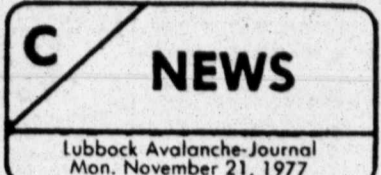

Expelled Soviets Leave For Aden

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) — More than 300 Russians, believed to be the last of the Soviet military and civilian advisers and their families expelled from Somalia, flew to South Yemen on Sunday.

Two Soviet ships also left the port at Mogadishu with an undisclosed number of expelled Russians and set sail for Aden, the Yemeni capital.

"After tonight, no more Russians," said an airport official. "They will all be gone from our country."

This poor country on the Indian Ocean had been the Kremlin's staunchest ally in sub-Saharan Africa. But angered over Soviet-Cuban aid to Ethiopia, it broke diplomatic relations with Cuba Nov. 13 and ordered all Soviet advisers to leave within seven days. However, it stopped short of breaking diplomatic ties with the Soviet Union.

Somalia is backing separatist guerrillas in the Ogaden region of Ethiopia who want to join the territory to Somalia.

Hundreds of Russians have left Somalia daily since early last week as the Soviet Union conducted an evacuation by air and sea. About 1,600 have left Mogadishu by plane since Wednesday. Others have left from the northern port of Berbera, a Soviet base which has been closed.

The exact number of Soviet advisers is not known. But diplomatic observers said

Mondale Hails Mideast Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Vice President Walter Mondale said Sunday that "a seed for peace" has been planted in the Middle East by Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's journey to Israel.

Mondale, speaking to a convention of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, said he hopes Sadat's talks with Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin "will be carried through to negotiations at Geneva where all parties can meet again as human beings, face-to-face, in another historic encounter."

Mondale repeated the Carter administration's belief that a lasting peace for the whole Middle East will be best achieved at Geneva, with representation by all the parties.

Speaking with reporters later, Mondale said there was some danger that too many expectations have been raised by the Sadat-Begin meetings.

"It has to be kept in balance. It's important in its own sense. But it also has to be understood... there is a long way between this meeting and total peace in the Middle East. There is so much yet that remains to be done."

The vice president spoke before the league in connection with the presentation of its human rights award, the Joseph Prizer, to Soviet dissidents Andrei Sakharov and Anatoly Shecharansky.

Expense Account Limit Draws New York Fire

NEW YORK (AP) - State Commerce Commissioner John S. Dyson Sunday urged New York's senators and congressmen to vote against President Carter's proposals that would limit expense account spending.

Such spending, he said, is vital to the state's tourist and entertainment industries especially because "New York gets such an enormous number of conventions. One spent \$25 million here in three days."

Such expenses are normally tax deductible, but such credits would be slashed if Carter has his way.

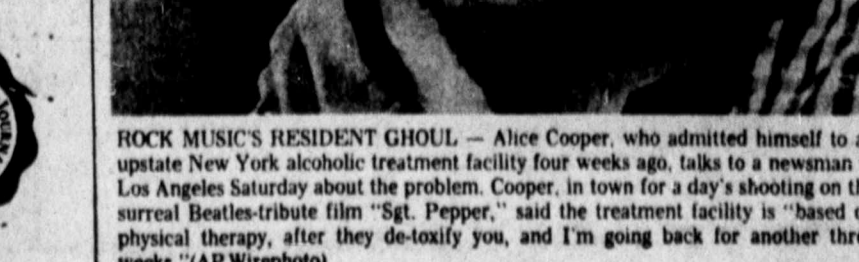
"That kind of proposal would hurt New York's economy," Dyson said. "Our senators and congressmen should vote for New York's interests and not for some ideological conviction."

The commissioner appeared on WABC's "Eyewitness News Conference" program.

He said that cutting taxes intelligently was the best way to keep business and business people in the state.

Dyson said he agreed with Chairman Charles Luce that Consolidated Edison's rates were the highest in the country because of excessive taxation.

"Twenty five per cent of your Con Ed bill consists of local taxes," he said. "If we had truth in taxation laws, the people in the City Council who passed those taxes would be in the can."

U.S. Will Owe \$30 Billion Abroad By Dec. 31

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit, highlighted by continuing reliance on imported petroleum, will reach \$30 billion by the end of the year, a congressional panel said Sunday.

A subcommittee of the Joint Economic Committee concluded the American trade ledger will remain in the red due mainly to continuing importation of fuel supplies.

A trade deficit means the United States is spending more money than it is taking in through its transactions in the international marketplace.

The best that can be hoped for, the subcommittee said, is that the proportion of energy needs supplied by imports can be held down, even though energy demand will continue to rise with an expanding economy.

In a report entitled "Living with the Trade Deficit," the panel said three factors primarily account for the excess of imports over exports, a deficit more than triple the \$9.3 billion 1976 figure.

The factors cited were a \$10 billion increase in oil and gas imports; a \$1.5 billion to \$2 billion decline in the traditional U.S. surplus in agricultural trade, and an \$8 billion to \$10 billion decline in the surplus on trade in manufactured goods.

The decrease in agricultural surpluses

was attributed to good harvests abroad and high coffee prices.

The subcommittee report said the United States must adopt an energy policy halting the growth of petroleum imports, now accounting for 45 percent of consumption. "With luck, this percentage may decline by a point or so in 1978," it said. "But even under these circumstances, the absolute amount of energy imports and payments for them will continue to grow ..."

The report said the United States should urge other countries that have surpluses to expand their economies in a way that would "reduce these surpluses and thus ease the balance-of-payments financing burdens of weak industrial and developing nations."

If countries like Japan, Germany, the Netherlands and Switzerland took such action, it said, the result would be of some help to the United States and of major help to weaker countries struggling with big payments to the oil producers.

The report said the United States should maintain economic growth while combatting inflation so that foreign investment in the country, which helps fi-

nance the deficit, will continue. To maintain its export opportunities, the report said, the United States should not yield to demands for protection against imports because such policies would lead to retaliation. Government, business and labor should search for techniques to make U.S. industry more competitive, it said.

The report opposed monetary policies simply designed to raise interest rates

and thus attract capital and excessive intervention by monetary authorities in international exchanges.
