6,000 Killed In Cyclone, Tidal Wave

NEW DELHI, India — India's national news agency Monday reported more than 6,000 persons were killed by a cyclone and tidal wave that smashed the southern Indian state of Andhra Pradesh, washing entire villages out to sea.

CAIRO (AP) — President Anwar Sadat returned home to a hero's welcome Monday after opening a new chapter in Middle East history by telling the Israeli people in their own capital, "No more war." Hundreds of thousands of Egyptians cheered their president at the airport and along the motorcade route into Cairo.

Let every girl, every woman, every mother, here and in my country, know that we shall solve all our problems through negotiations around the table rather than start wars. Israel's Prime Minister Menahem Begin echoed the theme at the farewell ceremony at Ben-Gurion Airport:

"Ladies and gentlemen, citizens of Israel and Egypt, we have reached understanding that there will be no more wars between our nations. "We shall make peace," he added as Sadat's Egyptian jetliner lifted off Israeli soil. "I am sure, I am sure." "We can say that hostilities of the past 30 years have been ended in 30 hours," the spokesman said according to the official Middle East news agency. It said the spokesman was a member of Sadat's delegation on the trip to Jerusalem. Treaty Signing Rejected The news agency quoted him as saying Israeli leaders tried to persuade Sadat to settle their differences and sign a peace treaty but Sadat refused, telling them the aim of his visit was not to conclude a separate peace but to prepare carefully for reconvening the Geneva conference.

"Israeli leaders showed understanding and real interest in peace," the spokesman told the news agency. Sadat, addressing the Israelis before leaving for Cairo, said, "We've had enough — four wars in 30 years."

Strife-Scarred Women's Parley Drags To Close

HOUSTON (AP) — The first National Women's Conference ended Monday in much the same manner as it began — with a feud between the feminist majority and a minority who claimed the forum misrepresented the views of most American women.

Mrs. Gubbins, claiming her supporters' views were stifled by the presiding officer's parliamentary tactics and acceptance of long-winded speeches, demanded that a minority report be included in the recommendations to the president. "The American women are seeing this. They know rigging when they see it," she said of the overwhelming passage of resolutions embracing views abhorrent to her conference minority. "They know a railroad when they see it."

And the four-day conference — funded by a \$5 million federal grant but marred by repeated verbal clashes between the participants — adjourned before its agenda was finished. The final day's session began late and dragged on listlessly while many of the 2,000 delegates fretted about missing flights back home. Proposal Rejected After rejecting a proposal to create a federal women's department to advance the equality of women, the conference concluded without the delegates considering proposals for implementing women's rights goals.

And, in a repetition of factional strife that characterized earlier conference sessions, leaders of the minority claimed their positions were given short-shrift treatment by the conference's presiding officers. Bella Abzug, the conference chairman and former congresswoman from New York, didn't see it that way. The conference will serve as "a galvanizing influence" for women and encourage more activism, she said. Feminist Goals Adopted Minority delegates had been on the losing side when the conference adopted resolutions embracing many of the goals of the feminist movement, including ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment and equal rights for women homosexuals.

Released Documents Bare 'Dirty Tricks' By FBI

WASHINGTON (AP) — The FBI once considered installing its own imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan to get itself an informant at the top, according to documents released Monday. The scheme involved deposing Imperial Wizard Robert M. Shelton by conducting what the FBI memos called bluntly "a smear campaign" against him. The documents also disclosed that the Internal Revenue Service conducted what it called a sensitive investigation to determine whether Shelton was misusing Ku Klux Klan funds. The documents were among 53,000 pages of material released by the FBI on the disbanded activities, known by the code name of Conintelpro, and gave details for the first time of its activities against the KKK. The activities involved efforts to revoke KKK charters and to harass Klan members. The harassment included anonymous letters sent by the FBI to Klan members threatening to expose their sex and drinking habits and in other cases mailing postcards to let Klan members know someone knew of their Klan membership. The proposal for the FBI to replace Shelton with its own Imperial wizard was finally rejected by Washington in 1967 with the explanation that the FBI already had an adequate network of informants in the Klan.

An earlier memorandum describing the effort said bluntly at one point "the bureau presently is giving consideration to a smear campaign against Robert M. Shelton." It said the purpose of the smear campaign would be to spread the word that Shelton was afraid to call a national klonvocation of the United Klans of America for fear it would vote him out office. The plan, according to the memorandum, was that Shelton would be goaded into calling the klonvocation where agents would in fact arrange to have him removed as imperial wizard. "Our objective," said the memorandum scrapping the plan, "would have been the establishment of an informant or a subject controlled by a bureau informant as UKA imperial wizard." The documents disclosed several mailings were made to Klan members simply to show them someone knew of their membership. But a memorandum from former director J. Edgar Hoover rejected a proposal to send every Klan member a copy of a bumper sticker saying "support mental illness-join the Ku Klux Klan." Hoover's memo said the slogan "might well be construed by the ignorant Klan sympathizers and members to mean that the Klan is actually supporting a charitable need, mental illness."

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EMS To Get Rent-Free Housing From Hospital

THE LUBBOCK County Hospital District Monday accepted a West Texas Hospital offer of rent-free housing for an Emergency Medical Services (EMS) station.

Stuart Haggard, coordinator for the hospital district's EMS system, said the station change will not affect current policy of distributing emergency medical cases to all hospitals with emergency rooms.

The hospital district board also okayed a \$22,000 addition to the county teaching hospital computer system, pending review of an equipment hookup fee.

The board also approved a \$22,000 admissions-monitoring addition to the teaching hospital computer system, although some board members questioned an additional \$5,000 equipment installation fee.

The West Texas Hospital offer passed quickly once board members were assured there were "no strings attached" to the offer which includes shelter for EMS vehicles and technicians.

The computer addition would allow immediate recording of patient admissions and would permit more efficient long-range scheduling of admissions.

Other offers to house the EMS station reportedly involved rental fees of \$300 to \$850. The West Texas Hospital offer followed a request by Lubbock County Commissioners that the present county-owned EMS Station No. 1 at 10th Street and Avenue G be vacated by Jan. 1.

In other board business, LCHD executive director Gerald Bosworth reported that the hospital district now has 58 employees. Bosworth said the hospital district has screened 23 nurses and has received 40 additional nursing applications.

Mart Slows Trade Pace

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market overcame some light early selling pressure Monday to finish just about where it started. Trading eased off a bit from its recent active pace. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, off more than 3 points at mid-day, closed with a token advance of .35 to 836.11.

Gainers held a very small edge on losers in the daily count on the New York Stock Exchange. But the NYSE's composite common-stock index was off .02 at 52.49.

Volume on the Big Board totaled 20.11 million shares, down from 23.93 million Friday.

Brokers said the market drew some modest encouragement from news of a strong 5.4 per cent increase in new orders received by manufacturers of durable goods last month.

But they also pointed out that the rise stemmed largely from a few big orders for "defense capital goods" such as military aircraft and shipbuilding.

In the over-the-counter market, the NASDAQ composite index rose 13 to 102.35 and turnover amounted to 7.56 million shares.

Women Seek Help From Vance

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) — A group of women broke through police security Monday to ask U.S. Secretary Cyrus Vance for news of their missing relatives as the American diplomat was on his way to meet with Argentine President Jorge Videla.

Vance nodded to the women and proceeded to his limousine. Three of the women reached the car and banged on the windows as they shouted "Help us find our children."

Vance was expected to ask Videla about some 7,500 persons who allegedly are jailed or missing for political reasons.

The incident occurred after Vance placed a wreath on a monument outside the Foreign Ministry. The group of about 50 women had gathered on the other side of the street, calling Vance's name and

waving white handkerchiefs, before they broke through police barricades to approach him.

Human rights and arms proliferation, particularly U.S. concern over the possible spread of nuclear weapons to South America, are the principal topics on the agenda for Vance's talks with the Argentinian military government.

Early Tuesday, the Secretary of State is scheduled to depart for Brazil for similar discussions with President Ernesto Geisel. The last stop on Vance's three-nation South American tour is Venezuela, where he is expected to discuss oil policy with President Carlos Andres Perez.

"They leaped three fences and after the third fence, the one guy who had the purse dropped it because I was gaining on them."

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
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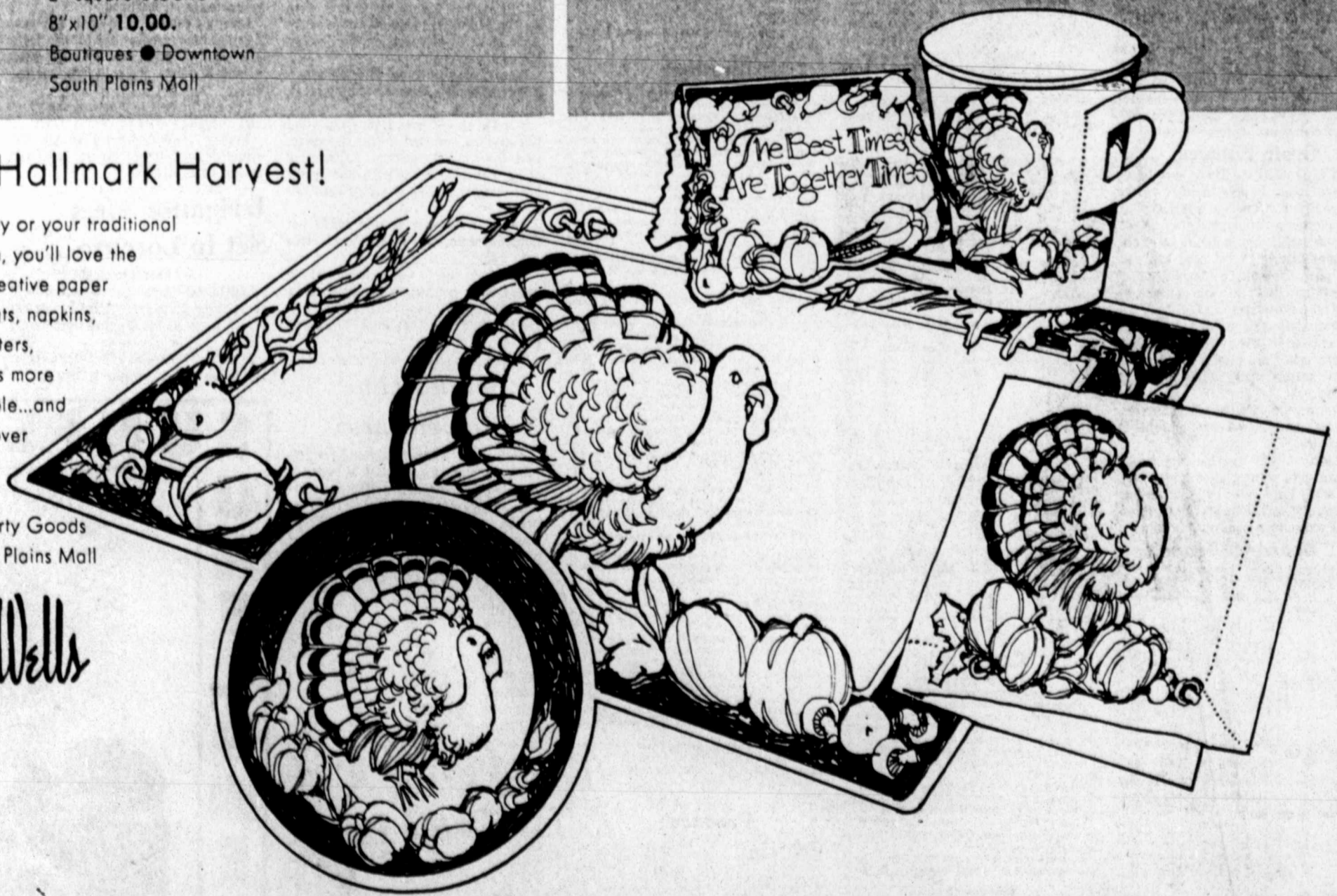
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Administration Insists On Gas Price Ceilings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Secretary James R. Schlesinger said Monday the administration will not back off from its insistence on extending natural gas price regulation nationwide, including sales within producing states.

Holding a news conference while a House-Senate conference committee on energy legislation was in recess, Schlesinger said, "I don't think there is any ground for retreat on that issue."

But he hinted that the Carter administration might be willing to swallow a somewhat higher regulated gas price ceiling than the \$1.75 per thousand cubic feet it has proposed.

And Schlesinger also hinted that it might offer the oil industry a back-door form of price increase to gain its support for Carter's plan of taxing U.S. crude oil up to the equivalent of the world market price, instead of letting the industry itself charge that price.

The issues of natural gas regulation and crude oil pricing and taxes are the most controversial of Carter's proposals that were adopted by the House but rejected by the Senate.

The conference committee was just beginning to seek some reconciliation between the conflicting versions of the energy bill when it recessed for a 10-day Thanksgiving holiday.

Schlesinger was questioned about prospects of getting a complete energy bill out of the committee by the end of December, and the compromises which the administration might accept.

Natural gas sold across state lines is regulated by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, formerly the Federal Power Commission, at the most recent ceiling price of \$1.42 per thousand feet at the wellhead. But gas sold "intrastate," that is, within the same state where it is produced, is not federally regulated and has been commanding prices, in that market, close to \$2.00 per thousand cubic feet.

The Carter administration proposed to correct this imbalance by extending fed-

eral regulation into the producing-state market, while raising the national price ceiling to about \$1.75.

Explaining why the administration would not abandon its move to extend regulation, Schlesinger said, "If we are going to have market forces working for us, then we've got to have a national market."

Carter also has opposed early removal of federal price controls from domestic crude oil, and proposed instead a federal tax on crude oil at the wellhead to encourage fuel saving, coupled with a rebate of the money to the public to avoid serious economic impact.

Schlesinger said this tax, plus an extra

tax on oil and gas designed to induce powerplants and factories to shift to coal, are also "necessary" parts of Carter's plan.

Asked about "incentives" for industry to support Carter's program, Schlesinger mentioned the offering of world oil prices to the newest oil production, then added: "There may have to be some adjustment of the decline rates of upper tier-old oil."

Translated, that means the administration may allow producers to write off more rapidly than before the portion of their annual production which is now limited to a ceiling price of \$11.28 per barrel, plus inflation.

Presidential Praise Risky With 106-Year-Old Woman

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter learned the risk of trying to flatter a 106-year-old woman Monday.

The object of his praise, Annie Dutscher, wisecracked: "Now he's spreading it."

Mrs. Dutscher, a native of Baltimore who lives in Glen Burnie, Md., fulfilled a nearly lifelong ambition when she shook the president's hand, after unsuccessful attempts to meet Richard M. Nixon and Gerald R. Ford while they lived in the White House.

"How old are you?" the president asked during a five-minute Oval Office get-together.

"I'm 106," said Mrs. Dutscher, sounding incredulous that the president didn't know.

"You look so young and vigorous..." Carter said, prompting Mrs. Dutscher's wisecrack.

Mrs. Dutscher remarked that the president, who stands 5-foot, 10-inches tall, was taller than she had expected.

"I was taller before I got to be president," Carter told her.

When Mrs. Dutscher was born on Sept. 13, 1871, the daughter of a German immigrant, Ulysses S. Grant was in his first White House term.

When she was 13 years old, she attended the inauguration of Grover Cleveland. But when she stuck out her hand to

shake Cleveland's, her father told her she couldn't because, as she recalls it, he told her: "We're little poor people and we have no right to."

"I've always had it in my mind," she said recently, asking: "Am I going to go to the grave without shaking the president's hand?"

She was halfway through the chat with the president before someone suggested that she shouldn't forget the handshake.

"I'm very proud to have you here," Carter told her. "I'm grateful," Mrs. Dutscher said.

"It's an honor for me," the president replied.

"I'll never forget you," Mrs. Dutscher said. "I feel in my heart you'll be the last president that I ever vote for. The day of the election I had a terrible cold. I was supposed to stay in bed. But I said, 'I've got to go and vote for Jimmy Carter even if they carry me out.'"

Mrs. Dutscher, dressed in a blue print frock, wore a necklace with a medallion featuring Carter's portrait.

A widow for more than 40 years, she lives with her 74-year-old son, Elmer, and his family. She was accompanied by her son, his wife, a niece, and Maryland's two U.S. senators, Charles Mathias, a Republican, and Paul Sarbanes, a Democrat.

Drug Industry 'Economics' Hinder Rare Disease Cure Development

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economics of the drug industry has discouraged the development and distribution of medical products that may relieve or cure rare diseases, President Carter's health issues expert said Monday.

Dr. Peter G. Bourne urged the industry to join the government in a joint search for ways to keep such drugs from languishing in research laboratories or in the notebooks of scientists.

Bourne suggested thought be given to creating an "entity separate from the Food and Drug Administration" that would be responsible for "stimulating further research on limited use products which industry has discovered, but cannot justify developing."

In an address to a meeting sponsored by the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, he noted that drug research is "geared toward the major killers and

cripplers." And Bourne said there is "little priority on developing new treatment for diseases which affect only a minuscule portion of our population."

As a consequence, said the British-born psychiatrist, "thousands of people suffer from little-known diseases and we can offer little hope to ease their suffering."

The situation is made worse, Bourne contended, because of increased federal regulation aimed at insuring the safety and effectiveness of new drugs.

"It has become increasingly difficult for the industry to justify continued research on products which cannot be expected to provide a return on investment," he said, adding:

"Consequently, many products which may potentially provide relief or even cure for these low incidence diseases, remain on the laboratory shelves of industry, or in a researcher's notebook. The

time has come to reverse that trend."

In suggesting a new effort to "alleviate the pain of untold thousands of Americans suffering from rare diseases," Bourne said to the industry representatives, meeting in suburban Arlington, Va.:

"Your scientific, intellectual resources are probably greater than those of all the governments of the world combined — and as a result, the leadership role is yours."

A White House aide said Bourne, in effect, was soliciting specific suggestions from industry and pledging federal cooperation in devising a new approach.

Bourne, a special assistant to President Carter, noted that the Agriculture Department has a "minimum use pesticide" program, and suggested something similar might be considered in the area of human pharmaceuticals.

He said specific diseases or drugs could be earmarked for "special consideration ... in terms of expediting government regulatory clearance or even direct subsidization by the federal government in order to stimulate research and development in the private sector."

Singing Sand Dune Fascinates Nevada Woman

FRENCHMAN, Nev. (AP) — For most of her 69 years, Peggy Wheat has had a love affair with a mountain of sand that sings to her.

"It sounds like rolling thunder," Mrs. Wheat says. "It's absolutely quiet out

there and then you can hear it clear down at the highway more than a mile away." Sand Mountain does indeed sing. Or roar. Or thunder. It all depends on who's doing the listening. A recent scientific study said the dune emits a sound that is strikingly similar in frequency to a repeated note on a bass violin.

"The Indians had a feeling that this was almost a living creature because it roared," Mrs. Wheat of nearby Fallon said. "Paiutes gave Sand Mountain a wide berth when they went to the eastern mountains to gather pine nuts. They would even get up and leave at night if it was making a noise."

Sand Mountain is a "booming" sand dune that lies just off U.S. Highway 50 southeast of Fallon in West-Central Ne-

vada. It's located just west of Frenchman, a tiny tavern-motel-gas station town. The dune lies on the northeastern end of a large salt pan.

It is one of only three "singing sand dunes" in North America. The other two are Crescent Dune near Tonopah, Nev. and Kelso Dune in the Mojave Desert of California.

"It makes a rumbling sound," said Dennis Trexler, a geologist with the Nevada Bureau of Mines who has studied sand dunes. "It's like a tuba. You can stand ankle deep on it and you can feel the vibrations coming through the sand. You can feel it as well as hear it."

Trexler and other geologists who have studied singing dunes say the noise is caused by "internal shearing of sand grains during an avalanche."

THE DISOBEDIENT CHILDREN

Administration Cools Toward Uniform Secrecy Requirement

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's aides say they probably will scrap a proposal to develop a standard secrecy agreement that agencies could use to require employees to promise never to reveal classified information.

The proposal, included in the initial draft of an executive order being written for the president, has come under sharp criticism from such groups as the American Civil Liberties Union, which says it would have a chilling effect on open government.

The draft calls for development of a uniform pledge that any agency with authority to classify documents could require of its employees as "a precondition of access to classified information."

Chairman Richardson Preyer of the House government information subcommittee has called such a pledge "singularly objectionable" because it would have "a distinctly chilling effect on potential whistle blowers, and (it) seems particularly inappropriate in an executive order whose objective is greater openness."

A "whistle blower," in bureaucratic jargon, is someone who reveals wrongdoing despite attempts to keep it a secret. Officials say provisions for a standard secrecy agreement probably will be eliminated from the second draft of Carter's executive order on new classification regulations. The Carter order would replace classification rules written by former President Richard M. Nixon.

The order is aimed at redeeming Carter's campaign pledge to run an open administration.

"I wouldn't be surprised if we booted the secrecy agreement," said one official, who asked not to be named. "That seems to be the drift of what the staff recommendations seem to be," said another informant. "The sense of the staff would be to recommend dropping any reference to any kind of secrecy agreement."

However, the officials say removing provisions for a uniform secrecy agreement still would permit agencies to impose individual secrecy agreements of their own.

The second draft of Carter's order also

Some agencies, including the CIA, presently require such pledges from prospective employees.

The Supreme Court said two years ago that secrecy agreements give the CIA the right to censor the writings of former employees.

Because of the agreements, the court rejected First Amendment freedom-of-the-press claims by Victor Marchetti and John D. Marks, who said they should be permitted to publish "The CIA and the Cult of Intelligence," a critical account of the agency, without prior censorship.

The censorship resulted in a number of deletions.

The CIA also is citing a secrecy agreement in seeking legal action against a former agency analyst, Frank Snepp, who wrote "Decent Interval." He says in the book that the U.S. evacuation of Saigon was an "institutional disgrace" because of major intelligence failures.

Snepp wrote the book in secret to avoid censorship.

CIA Director Stansfield Turner has charged Snepp with "violating his signed secrecy agreement." Turner has turned his accusation over to the Justice Department, and Attorney General Griffin Bell has referred the matter to the Civil Division.

The second draft of Carter's order also

is likely to include provisions for the inspection of agency files to insure compliance. The inspections would be made by a new Security Information Oversight Office.

"We're trying to find a way to get this group into agency files," one official said. "That could mean just dropping in like the Strategic Air Command, or making arrangements ahead of time to come out, say next week, and check."

Visits from the oversight office, at least at first, would be aimed at helping the agencies understand what is required under the new executive order. "We'll be wearing white hats as well as black hats," the official said.

Writing the second draft of Carter's order will mean the president probably won't get anything to consider for his signature much before Christmas.

"Our objective is to have the order signed before the end of the year or early in January," said one official.

10.7 Percent Property Tax Rise Noted

WASHINGTON (AP) — State and local governments increased their property tax revenues last year by 10.7 percent, the largest amount in four years, the Commerce Department said Monday.

Government took in \$57 billion from property taxes in fiscal 1976, an increase from \$51.5 billion the year before. That was the largest jump since an 11.5 percent rise from 1971 to 1972.

Despite the increase, property taxes provided only 18.7 percent of state and local revenues, a decrease from 19.7 percent the year before.

The report did not conclude why property taxes had increased, but these changes took place in fiscal 1976:

— Assessed valuations rose by 10 percent because of inflation and reassessments.

— Less money became available from federal revenue-sharing programs, putting more pressure on governments.

— New York City increased its property tax \$300 million, while Alaska placed a \$300 million levy on oil and gas lands.

— The nation's largest 48 cities raised their property taxes by 13 percent as welfare and education costs increased.

— County property taxes rose by 12 percent, reflecting welfare, hospital and inflation costs.

Local property tax dollars accounted for 30.8 percent of local government revenue from all sources and 81.2 percent of local government tax revenue. They accounted for 1.1 percent of state revenue.

Property subject to local property taxation in 1976 was assessed officially at \$1.200 billion, but \$38.7 billion was exempt.

The report shows that single-family houses made up 49.5 percent of total gross assessed value and 55.3 percent of total taxable properties.

MADISONVILLE, La. (UPI) — A teen-aged burglar happened to be at the wrong place at the wrong time, police said.

Police Chief Leon Tyrney Monday said he was called out of bed during the weekend to investigate a one-car accident near his home.

When he arrived at the crash, he noticed his coat, briefcase and shotgun inside Ricky Rogers' car. Tyrney said Rogers apparently broke into his patrol car during the night and was returning for the emergency flashing lights and the police car decals.

Rogers, 18, of Bush, La., was charged with burglary.

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) — Lady Bird Johnson and her daughter, Lynda Robb, registered Monday at the Mayo Clinic for routine medical checkups, a clinic spokesman said.

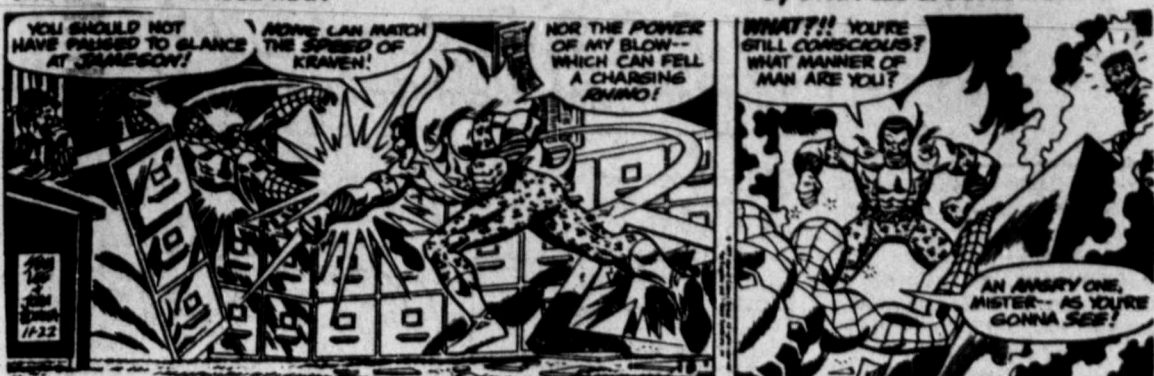

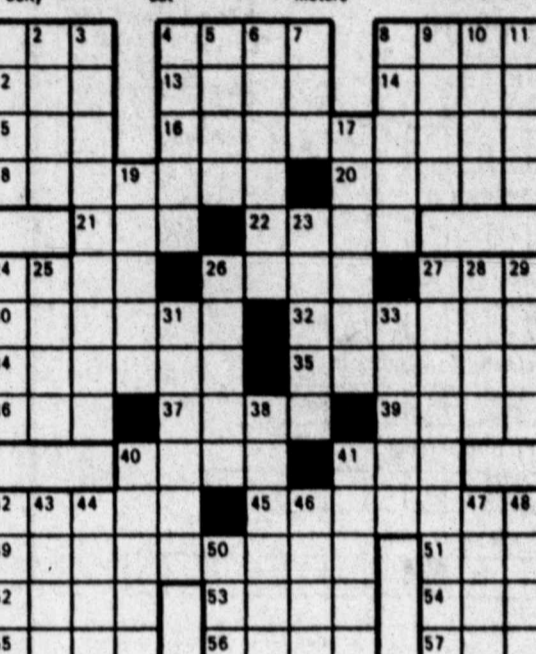

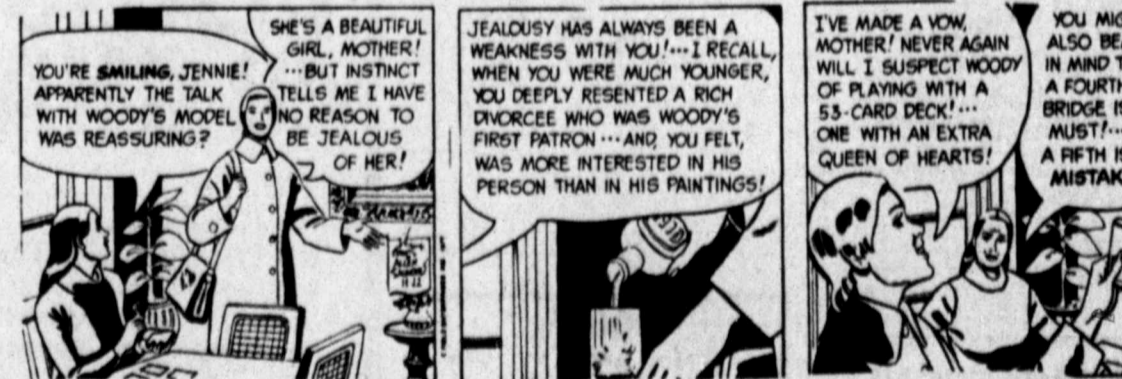
