## Drug Administration Okays Vaccine Against Pneumonia

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Food and Drus Administra-
tion on Monday appoved a vacine that scientists say can
prevent most cases of pneumococcal pneumonia, which kills prevent most cases of pneumococ
thousands of Americans each year The vaccine. called dneeumovax, will be available Feb. 1.
The FDA authorized the manufacturer, Merck Sharp Dohme, to recommend the vaccine for all persons 50 or old-
er: anyone with a chronic er: anyone with a chronic illness; anyone living in a nursing
home or other chronic care facility where pneumonia could spread easily, and anyone convalescing from serious illiness.
