As a general rule, the Postal Service advises would-be givers to: <br> -Restrict donations to groups with which you are familiar. <br> -Ask for a financial statement before you give. <br> -Check with the Chamber of Commerce, the local Better Business Bureau or local or state consumer agencies for information about the organization. <br> The American Association of Fund-Raising Counsel Inc. says Americans gave a re- <br> cord $\$ 29.42$ billion to charities last year, up 9.4 per cent from 1975. The association <br> said that for the first time in three years, the increase in contributions exceeded the <br> e in inflation. Bicentennial-related contributions accounted for most of the increased giving. <br> The biggest chunk of the money - $\mathbf{\$ 1 2 . 8 4}$ billion or $\mathbf{4 3 . 6}$ per cent - went to reli- <br> gious organizations. Health and hospitals got $\$ 4.37$ billion or 14.9 per cent of the to- <br> tal; educational charities received $\$ 4.07$ billion or 13.8 per cent; social welfare groups got $\$ 2.67$ billion or 9.1 per cent; the arts and humanities got $\$ 2.08$ billion or <br> 71 per cent, civic and public associations got $\$ 970$ million or 3.3 per cent; and other <br> groups - including such temporary things as earthquake relief funds - got $\$ 2.42$ billion or 8.2 per cent. <br> Most of the money - $\$ 23.58$ billion or 80.1 per cent - came in the form of gifts from living individuals.
