scoured a weedy canyon area near Slaton for what they feared would be the body of missing Johnny Turner Jr., the Criminal District Attorney's office today filed aggravated kidnapping charges against a 28-year-old Slaton man in connection with the near week-old disappearance.

Charged with kidnapping the 6-year-old child was Philip Carey Brasfield, a man who earlier this year had been indicted with aggravated sexual abuse of a child in connection with an alleged incident involving a 9-year-old Lubbock boy.

Brasfield, a carpenter who reportedly is married, was to be arraigned before Justice of the Peace Charles Smith at 2

The DA's office recommended a bond of \$100,000 on the aggravated kidnapping

charge against Brasfield. Brasfield was arrested at his Slaton home about 6 p.m. Monday and was questioned extensively by Lubbock police late last night.

Although investigators then would not specify what information they had that led them to arrest Brasfield, early today they indicated he was one of a number of persons being considered possible suspects because of earlier child-connected charges filed against them.

They said the 5-foot-11 man also fits the description of a person whom a witness had reported seeing with the Turner child about the time he disappeared .

The boy's mother, Mrs. Florence Turner, had told police she had seen him playing in front of their 1028 E. 29th St. apartment about 6:20 p.m. Wednesday. She said that a few minutes later when

she went to call him, he was gone. A witness told police the boy had been

seen at a service station in a light-colored pickup truck driven by a white man. Police this weekend released two composite drawings of a white man with sandy hair, a beard and mustache.

Following Brasfield's Monday night arrest, police went to the Yellowhouse Canvon area near Slaton to search that weedchoked scrub-brush area. Because of darkness, however, and the

fact they then said they had no specific information where to look, they abandoned the search about midnight.

This morning, after an early strategy session at the police station, they left

at a site on FM 400 near Slaton.

Dozens of searchers on foot wei. joined by a helicopter and began scouring the canyon about noon. They were hampered by high winds

DALLAS (AP) - Trick-or-treaters were out in small force in the Dallas area this Halloween, but apparently there were enough to bring out the infamous

candy saboteurs responsible for the decline in the nocturnal rounds. Dallas police said things were "nowhere near as bad" as some years in the past, but in the suburb of Irving parents reported finding needles and toothpicks in their children's candy.

No one apparently was injured, but police appealed to parents in the area to turn in their children's spoils for inspection.

Irving Police Lt. John Neely said investigators have a possible lead, but nothing definite. Parents living in the Spanish Oaks Apartments told police they discovered the needles and toothpicks in candy their children brought home after trick-or-treating in the Pioneer Drive area.

Most of the trick-or-treaters who did decide to make the traditional neighborhood trek were forced home by 8 p.m., when heavy rain and some hail began to

Police reported only 46 Halloween-related calls, most of them involving vandalism. A few callers reported harassment of trick-or-treaters, but no injuries,

Though rain and precautions against malicious treat donors may have kept a lot of children off the streets and Halloween incidents down, some 200 to 300 witches in the Dallas area were unaffected and traditional ceremonies took place as planned.

"I'm having a few friends in for a candle wax reading," one witch reported. The procedure involves pouring hot wax into cold water, after which participants read the forms the wax takes.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pentagon experts believe development of the Cruise missile has largely nullified the Soviet Union's \$100 billion air defense system, and claim that Moscow-would have to launch a crash program to catch up.

Defense officials said Monday that even with a \$50 billion crash program, the Soviets would trail the United States if the Pentagon continues to improve the sophistication of the new U.S. weapon.

Cruise missile improvements now being developed can be made operational faster than the Russians can update their air defense system, American military of-

The officials, rebutting a published re-

port questioning the weapon's capabilities, said they are confident the present Cruise missile can penetrate current Soviet air defenses.

President Carter has decided to step up development of the cruise missile, choosing it over the proposed B-1 bomber as the nation's next major strategic weapon.

But it faces a Soviet defense system described by the Pentagon as the most extensive in the world, involving 500,000 persons, more than 12,000 surface-to-air anti-aircraft missiles stationed at 1,000 sites, and 2,600 aircraft.

The Cruise missile, a technology in which the United States is believed to

lead the Russians by at least five years. essentially is a small, pilotless jet plane which can carry either nuclear or conventional warheads.

About 14 feet long and 2 feet in diameter, it flies at about 650 miles an hour as low as 30 feet above the surface, presenting what U.S. planners hope would be a nightmare for defensive radar.

Defense officials said the weapon would be launched in a saturation cloud of 3,000 Cruise missiles at the same time 200 bombers attacked the target, further complicating air defense problems.

Pentagon officials discussed the Cruise missile's capability following a published report that secret computer studies

showed the weapon "would not have a chance" of penetrating the Soviet defense system:

The report, by columnists Rowland Evans and Robert Novak, said the computer study was based on a study of the Cruise versus the U.S. Hawk air defense system.

According to the report, the study showed that Hawk radar would locate the Cruise and that a surface-to-air Hawk missile would shoot it down.

Defense officials said two studies were conducted last summer, one to determine the vulnerability of the present Cruise to an improved Soviet air defense system, and the other to test Cruise against Soviet defenses of the 1980s.

Supermarket shoppers in Lubbock will find their grocery bills higher this month on 16 commonly purchased items surveyed today by The Avalanche-Journal. Prices totaled \$17.88 for the items, compared to \$17.54 on Oct. 1, representing a two percent increase. Leading the 34-cent price climb are po-

tatoes and round steak. A 10-pound bag of potatoes leaped from 89 cents to \$1.09. but cost of this product has fluctuated from 89 cents in December of last year to \$1.29 during July and August of this year. Also varying in price has been round steak. It has dipped from \$1.39 per pound in January to \$1.09 in October, before

jumping 20 cents this month to \$1.29. The comfort to consumers this month is the price tag on coffee, now at \$3.49 per pound, down from \$3.59 last month. But this month's coffee tab is \$1.27 more a pound than this time last year. Coffee percolated at \$3.49 a pound from May to September.

Eggs were tagged this morning with a special price of 55 cents for a dozen of the edium variety, down six cents from October. At the end of October, however, eggs shot up to 63 cents a dozen.

Hospital District Costs Higher Than Anticipated

The Lubbock County Hospital District found Monday that many items - from stretchers to X-ray equipment - for the county's new Health Sciences Center Hospital will cost more than anticipated.

The biggest overrun was on patient monitoring equipment, for which the district had budgeted \$403,170. Though some of the bids were in that neighborhood, the brand recommended by the hospital district and Texas Tech University School of Medicine staffs carried a pricetag of \$584,984.

By deleting several items in that package, the district managed to whittle the price down to \$473,815. And on Monday, the district's board of managers approved that purchase and 11 others.

Bids were awarded on recovery room stretchers, transport stretchers and have a son? wheelchairs an embosser and imprinters, portable X-ray equipment, operat- Dr. Werner Maser, 55, a respected histoing room tables, blood-pressure monitors, secretarial furniture and equipment and several other items.

All told, the district has spent about approximately \$25,000 under the amount

the quantities of some items purchased. Also Monday, the district board agreed to proceed with construction of parking lots costing \$728,000, about \$270,000 more than originally estimated.

Board members had been looking for a way to cut the cost of the project. Though unable to trim the pricetag, they did succeed in increasing the number of parking spaces from 790 to 898 at the same total cost.

Labor To Seek Restrictions On Imports

WASHINGTON (AP) - AFL-CIO President George Meany says organized labor will seek federal action next year to restrict imports and save American jobs.

If this results in retaliation against American products, the United States would win the fight because it has "the greatest market," said Meany. He made the announcement in expressing support for the 500,000-member Amalgamated Clothing and Textile Workers Union.

The union wants federal penalties on apparel and textile imports from eight South American and Far Eastern countries. It claims "tens of thousands" of jobs are at stake because foreign firms pay low wages and receive export subsi-

'This isn't competition. It's a stacked deck, stacked against American workers." Meany said of the foreign competi-

The Carter administration opposes trade restrictions, but there is congressional sentiment for legislation such as import quotas. Foreign competition also has had an adverse effect on the U.S. steel and shoe industries



The National Park Service and Bureau of Land Management came up with an 'adopt-a-burro" plan after citizens and humane society groups protested the government's efforts to thin herds by shooting the animals.

Similar to an "adopt-a-horse" plan instituted to help control the number of wild horses in the West, the newest effort is aimed at the estimated 8,000 to 10,000 pony-sized burros roaming the deserts of California, Nevada, Arizona and New

The animals - once the allies of prospectors, then replaced by motorized vehicles and set free by their owners have thrived in the desert. But they chomp on and tromp fragile vegetation. causing erosion and destroying the food supplies of other creatures, including deer and bighorn sheep, said Terral King of the land management bureau.

'The 'adopt-a-burro' program seems to be a working solution as long as we have enough people willing to take the animals," said Bob Springer, head of the agency's range division in Washington.

There is no charge for the burros, but the government insists that prospective owners pick up and transport the animals to adequate lots or fields. One person who did so is Phil Hill, 32.



defrauding the taxpayers through the Medicare and Medicaid programs has just been signed by President Carter-and not a moment too soon. "As much as \$3 billion a year may be spent

on fraudulent or, at least, questionable payments," according to testimony before a Senate committee earlier this year, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen recalls.

That would be 10 per cent of the \$30 billion annual cost of Medicare and Medicaid programs, making it an entirely believable figure in the light of the usual waste and inefficiency in multi-billion-dollar federal outlays.

FELONY PENALTIES of up to five years in prison and a \$25,000 fine are provided for in the new bill if a person is found guilty of fraud.

The law is aimed at physicians and other health care providers and also would penalize them by barring them from providing medical services in the future.

Recipients of fraudulent Medicare and Medicaid transactions would be subject, upon conviction, to misdemeanor penalties of up to one year in jail and a \$10,000 fine.

A LAW PUTTING teeth into penalties for "The overwhelming majority of doctors and (medical care) administrators are honest, patriotic and deeply dedicated," Carter said in signing the bill, but he said the Medicaid program is nonetheless "shot through with fraud."

"I think one of the greatest problems we have is distrust in government and its ability to administer programs in an honest way," the President added.

SENATE INVESTIGATORS. Bentsen recalled, "selected 20 bills at random that had been presented by a Chicago medical lab on behalf of a physician in that city.

"In 12 of the 20 cases, the doctor had never seen the patient. Medicaid paid a total of \$885 for the 20 bills but the doctor's records show that he had ordered only \$119 worth of

In Illinois, he added by way of another example, it costs a medical lab about 25 cents to conduct a urinalysis. A private patient is charged \$3 for the work-but the government pays \$10 for a Medicaid patient.

It is, indeed, past time that such abuses be brought to an end-and the perpetrators be brought to justice:

Gas Controls Are A Rip-Off

WASHINGTON-The more the Senate works on it, the more President Carter's National Energy Plan (NEP) resembles Victor, England's illfated, much publicized giraffe who died after doing the splits in an unsuccessful attempt to

Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., a senior member of the Senate Finance Committee, says Carter's NEP is "in shambles" and "should go back to the drawing boards.

No change the Senate has made in Carter's NEP has caused more gnashing of teeth than the vote to deregulate the wellhead price of new natural gas.

The President has called this action "an injustice to the working people of this country.

Sen. Don Riegle, D-Mich., says that what has been done is "the greatest unarmed robbery in the history of the country.

In "The 1978 Budget: Setting National Priorities," published by the liberal-leaning think-tank, The Brookings Institution, he writes:

"On the supply side, deregulation would prompt new exploration and more intensive development of known reservoirs.

"At a higher price, the amount of gas marketed for cocktails to discuss it.

wasted, used in the field, or used for producing petroleum, would fall owing to its higher value.

"ON THE DEMAND side," Russell continues, the gradually higher price resulting from deregulation would increase the value produced by the gas actually brought to the market.

Substitution of other fuels for gas would be encouraged, thus freeing gas for use where its special characteristics were most valuable.

Such opportunities are greatest in currently uncontrolled intrastate markets, where most of the industrial consumption of gas takes place. Natural gas prices in those markets are nearly in equilibrium with those of other fuels, and hence a relatively small rise in the gas price will result in voluntary fuel switching, especially in uses such as petroleum refining and electric genera-

"Only if all gas prices rise will new patterns of use and investment in conservation be encouraged for all consumers, even those who cannot switch to other fuels.

DESPITE THE harmful effects on some consumers, economist Russell believes that deregulation would reduce the cost of energy to the econ-

omy, not increase it. This point is dramaically illustrated by some

Erickson estimates that by 1990, under deregulation, the amount of additional natural gas reserves that would become available is about 49.5 trillion cubic feet at a cost of \$147.7 billion.

Without deregulation, the BTU-equivalency cost of alternative fuels needed to replace lower natural gas supplies, which would occur under continued controls, would cost the consumer about \$271 billion

Thus, decontrol would result in a net savings to the economy of approximately \$123.3 billion over the next 12 years.

ERICKSON OBSERVES: "The great weakness in the administration's cost-impact assumptions and other studies which seemingly support them is that they all fail to calculate the replacementcost factor. Yet this is an extremely critical factor to the economy and the consumer.'

Furthermore, if price controls on natural gas are extended to the intrastate market, as the Carter plan advocates, the expected future price of gas to non-industrial consumers will be reduced and consevation will be discouraged.

"In short," says Russell, Carter's NEP proposals "will not eliminate the gas shortage; they will partially disguise it and extend it to the markets that are now uncontrolled.

In addition, they will remove the market test for supplemental gas supplies and encourage investment in uneconomic facilities and process-

In other words, it is President Carter's proposal to continue natural gas price controls that constitute "an injustice to the working people of this country," not the proposal to lift these controls.

The so-called amenities will vary among airlines, but if you find yourself hung up in a waiting room for more than four hours here are some services you might expect:

One long distance call of three minutes or a 15-word telegram to any point in mainland United States to alert persons awaiting your arrival. Or to rearrange your schedule.

A free meal if you would have received a meal on the flight delayed or cancelled, especially if the delay extends beyond normal meal

· Paid overnight lodging, if you are stranded at a point other than a stopover or your point of ori-

gin during the evening · Limited ground transportatrion-such as between the airport and your hotel-if the delay is expected to exceed four hours.

MANY AIRLINE AGENTS, although meaning well, may not be fully aware of the rules because of their complexity, so if you are not offered

these services, ask for them If your request is refused, note your expenses, keep your receipts and write to the airline to in-

quire about reimbursement. Also write to the Office of the Consumer Advo-

Senators Walk To Chamber After Elevator Balks

By DONALD M. ROTHBERG

WASHINGTON (AP) - This is the story of an elevator dubbed Lyndon's Revenge and how four senators learned of its unpredictable ups and downs.

The elevator, one in a bank of six just inside the entrance to the Senate wing of the Capitol, was installed when Lyndon B. Johnson was majority leader of the Senate. It is reserved for members of the press and Senate staff aides.

An automatic elevator, it earned its nickname by occasionally skipping floors, sometimes going down when riders Cop," a four-hour movie for NBC. Gospushed buttons they thought would send it up, and on a few frightening occasions, it has plunged three floors to the Capitol

Next to it is a far more reliable elevator reserved for senators. It always is manned by an operator.

The newsman pushed the button for the second floor, where the Senate chamber is located. The elevator went to the

The elevator headed up. It reached the second floor. It didn't stop. On up to the third floor where it halted and the doors

Plans Made To Defend Pentagon

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Defense Department is circulating a two-page directive of instructions on what its employees should do in event of a terrorist attack on the Pentagon.

The FBI will have primary responsibility for dealing with hostage takers, it says. It calls for security guards to cordon off immediately an area where terrorists and hostages are located, evacuate surrounding offices and set up a command post nearby

The Pentagon commandant, an Army colonel who is administrative chief of the building, is delegated to negotiate with the terrorists until the FBI arrives.

Once the FBI gets there, Pentagon security forces will take a "secondary support role," the directive says.

Such details as assembling military explosive experts, medical personnel and a counterintelligence team at the command post also are covered.

The directive was dated Sept. 20, and officials said the plan has been in formulation stages since last summer.

The directive indicated concern about absence of policy guidance in the past, saying. "Lack of proper planning and preparation for such contingencies may result in uncoordinated, impulsive actions and unnecessarily endanger human lives.

Pig Snared By Chicago Dog Pound

CHICAGO (UPI) - Pigs are not exactly common in the nation's second-largest city, but animal control officers have one

The 200-pound pig was captured in a residential neighborhood on the north side. Animal control officials said they will keep the pig at the pound a few days to see if its owner claims it. If not, they will try to find it a good home.

It is only the second stray pig the pound has housed in more than 20 years.

"I figured it would be a little one like Arnold on the television show 'Green Acres," animal control officer Jeanne Johnson said. "But when we got there, we saw this big 200-pound pig wandering around someone's back yard eating

Miss Johnson, who began the job last Wednesday, and her partner, George Musielak, had just started work Friday morning when the radio blared, "Pig on the loose at 4600 N. Kostner Ave.

Neighbors gathered around and cheered as Miss Johnson, 5-9, 130 pounds, chased the pig around the yard to tire it out. When the pig's trot slowed, Musielak snared it with his dog catcher's pole and rope.

Was that a thin wisp of smoke, rising from the cigar, contrary to Senate rules which forbid smoking on the floor?



DETROIT (AP) - All Plymouth Volares, Dodge Aspens, Chrysler Lebarons and Dodge Diplomats built before Sept. 23 - some 1.2 million cars - are being recalled by Chrysler Corp. to correct potential brake defects.

The nation's third largest auto maker said this week there were no injuries or accidents in 20 reported incidents in which cars lost their front brakes.

Chrysler said one defect involves acid leaking from the battery and eating through the brake tubes, causing a loss of brake fluid.

The company said its dealers will replace the brake tubes if necessary and install a protective shield between the tubes and the battery cover at no charge.

In a second problem, Chrysler said front brake hoses which run from the tubes to the front wheel brakes may become brittle and crack in prolonged cold weather.

If trouble develops in the front brakes, the rear brakes will be enough to stop the



Bladder Infections

By LAWRENCE LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB: Is there any hope for women who are plagued with constant bladder infections? It's like a chronic disease, once you get it, it's always there. Since I've reached 40 I seem to get it four or five times a year and it lasts at least six to eight weeks. I am very discouraged with all the expense of pills and doctor bills and having this pesky infection.

My doctor says to avoid spicy foods, others say avoid coffee and tea, tomatoes and oranges or acid foods.

I drink about 10 cups of coffee (usually, decaffeinated) or tea daily and at least five glasses of water. Is my addiction to coffee making the infection harder to clear up? I've read that a phosphorous deficiency is the cause

of bladder infections. Is that true? DEAR READER: This is a fairly common problem for women. It creates a need to urinate frequently. burning during urination and is a drag on a woman's energy and feeling of well being. If the infection involves the kidney as well, and it may, then fever and other symptoms occur.

A woman who is having recurrent bladder infections should have a complete examination to find out if there is any structural abnormality present. The urethra can be constricted or it may be in the wrong position or there may be a stone present. If the bladder is not emptying adequately that will set the stage for repeated infections. Any such abnormalities should be cor-

Sexual relations may aggravate cystitis. When a young woman begins an active sex life she may start having these problems. That is why it is sometimes called honeymoon cystitis. There are some things a woman can do to help in this regard. Among these is to empty the bladder immediately after relations and drink some extra fluids to ensure a good flushing of the bladder. That goes along with my general recommendations to women to be sure to drink plenty of fluids and then be sure to empty the bladder frequently. Office workers sometimes do not go to the bathroom often enough and the full bladder simply makes

matters worse. Some doctors recommend that a woman take an antibiotic after relations, usually Pencillin G or Macrodantin. This might result in taking lots of medicine, though, in a young active couple on their honeymoon. It is worth asking your doctor about. Tub baths should probably be avoided; showers are preferable.

The important thing about your food and fluids is to drink enough fluids to maintain a good urinary flow With some medicines (such as Mande lamine) it is necessary to acidify the urine. In that case orange juice, fruits and vegetables (but not cranberries, plums and prunes) may have the opposite effect. If an acid urine is necessary your doctor can recommend test tapes that enable you to test your urine and find out if it is in the desired range of acidity or not. This may not be necessary if the medicines you are taking act whether the urine is acid or

Dow Jones Drops To 809.94

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market headed steeply lower today in what analysts saw as fear over rising interest rates and inflation prospects.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials fell 8.41 to 809.94 by mid-day. There were four times as many losing issues as gainers among all NYSE-listed issues.

Analysts said moves by the Federal Reserve Board Monday to tighten credit by putting pressure on key federal fund rates helped renew investor worries over rising interest rates.

The Federal Reserve has been trying to keep growth in the nation's money supply in check as part of its anti-inflation policy, but rates have remained above the Fed's stated targets.

In addition to fears that money supply growth may show another increase when figures are released Thursday, analysts said investors also were concerned over a possible increase in wholesale prices. when the government releases its latest index this week.

"The market is going back to the idea that it's got serious problems unfolding this week," said Bud Simon of Weeden & Co.

Oil Hikes Supported

STOCKHOLM (AP) - Ali M. Djaidah, secretary general of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) today said he favors sharp oil price increases to reduce world oil consumption.

In a speech at the "Energy 77" conference, Djaidah said he considers it a "waste of resources and money" to use oil for heating pur-

He said oil should be reserved mainly for transportion and for the petrochemical industry and that the best way to accomplish this would be to raise crude oil prices to at least the same level as those of alternative energy sources. Djaidah also said it is essential to

preserve oil reserves as long as possible to give OPEC countries enough time to invest oil revenue in various development and industrial projects.

Djaidah urged oil-consuming countries to adopt more radical energy-saving policies and said OPEC is determined to accelerate such a development by regulating prices and productivity according-

Djaidah also said large quantities of natural gas are burned to no use at oil fields. He said OPEC countries are considering an extensive program for production and export of these energy reserves.

Jurors Get Case In **Bolles Trial**

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) - The trial of two men accused in the car bomb slaying of investigative reporter Don Bolles headed for a jury after being told by the trial judge that the word of an alleged accomplice would not be enough to convict the defendants.

The eight-man, four-woman jury wasadmonished by Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Howard Thompson on Monday night not to return a guilty verdict solely on the basis of testimony given by confessed killer John Harvey Adamson. The jury was to begin deliberations today.

"The testimony of an accomplice should be viewed with caution," Thompson said, adding that other evidence must indicate the defendants committed the crime for a guilty verdict to be returned.

James Robison, 55, a suburban Chandler plumber, and Max Dunlap, 48, a Phoenix contractor, are charged with first-degree murder and conspiracy in the June 1976 car-bomb murder of Bolles, an Arizona Republic reporter.

They were implicated last January when Adamson, 33, a former tow truck operator and dog breeder, confessed to second-degree murder, accepting a 20year prison term in return for his testimony.
Trial began last July 11 and the jury has

been sequestered since testimony got under way Aug. 28. The panel heard 91 witnesses in the case. Thompson dismissed the four alter-

Soviet Jet U.S. To Withdraw Initiates From Labor Group Service WASHINGTON (AP) - President

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union's supersonic Tu-144 jetliner began its first scheduled passenger service with a twohour flight to Soviet Central Asia today. 21 months behind its Western rival, the Anglo-French Concorde.

The slim white plane emblazoned with the red hammer-and-sickle flag of the Soviet Union roared into the overcast Moscow sky just after dawn, carrying reporters, Soviet officials and Alexei A. Tupolev. the plane's 52-year-old designer.

The 140-seat jet landed exactly two hours later in Alma Ata, 1992 miles to the

By the fastest conventional Soviet airliner, the run takes four hours and 20 minutes - more than twice the time of today's flight.

Aeroflot, the Soviet airline, announced that the Tu-144 would carry passengers on the Moscow-Alma Ata run once a week. The plane began freight and mail service between the two cities in Decem-

Reporters on the flight today said the plane made a sharp climb out of Moscow. but soon leveled into a smooth flight, and the hostesses served caviar, wine and co-

Trouble with an airport boarding ramp forced pilot Boris F. Kuznetsov to delay takeoff from Moscow's Domodedovo airport about 10 minutes. The delay appeared to anger Civil Aviation Minister Boris P. Bugaev, who was on the runway for a brief takeoff ceremony

Only the British and French national airlines have bought Concordes so far. and those nations have decided-to stop production at the 16 already authorized. The Soviet government made early attempts to get foreign buyers without any indications of orders, and it is expected to resume the sales campaign now that the plane is in service.

Aeroflot also hopes to expand supersonic service eventually to international routes to compete with the Concorde.

The Tu-144 made its first prototype flight Dec. 31, 1968. It was the first flight by a supersonic passenger liner anywhere in the world. But the plane was plagued for years afterward by technical problems, including high fuel consumption

One prototype crashed at the Paris air show in June 1973, killing 13 people including six crew members as 30,000 spec-

The Concorde, which began passenger service in January 1976, carries 100 to 128 passengers. That is 22 to 40 fewer than the Tu-144, which at 2151/2 feet long and 9512 feet wide is a bit larger both ways. The two planes have nearly equal cruising speeds of about 1,400 miles per hour - nearly twice the speed of sound - and ranges of 4,000 miles

But a one-way Moscow-Alma Ata ticket will cost the equivalent of \$111 at the official dollar-ruble rate of exchange, or about 512 cents a mile, while the one-way Concorde fare from Britain to the United States costs 231/4 cents a mile

But Marshall and the AFL-CIO favored pulling out on grounds the ILO no longer serves its original purpose of improving the lot of the industrial worker.

Meany said organized labor leaders had agreed with the Ford administration's action in 1975 that began the withdrawal process with the warning that the ILO would have to change its ways or the United States would withdraw.

Two years ago the Ford administration filed notice of withdrawal Henry A. Kissinger, then secretary of state, said there had been "disregard of due process," in ILO proceedings, a "selective concern for human rights." and an "erosion of triparthied representation

The government, labor and employer representatives from each country were supposed to be independent when the ILO was formed in 1919 under the League of Nations. But the Communists and some Third World states had blurred this distinction.

Last spring a report by independent jurists condemning human rights violations in eight countries, including the Soviet Union and Uganda, was shelved. In 1974. Israel was condemned on racism charges. and in 1975 the Palestine Liberation Organization was granted observer status

The AFL-CIO walked out and said it would boycott the ILO even if the U.S. government remained. Carter invited AFL-CIO President George Meany and Lane Kirkland, the union's secretarytreasurer, to the White House to explain his decision

Meanwhile the U.S. Chamber of Commerce also was committed to U.S. withdrawal. It warned Carter in a letter Oct. 3 against any attempt to try to go it alone in the ILO

With a \$20 million contribution, the United States has paid about one-fourth of the ILO budget. Carter's diplomatic advisers were con-

cerned that exit from the ILO could weaken the whole United Nations structure and leave the Kremlin in charge with West Europeans on the defensive.

Zbigniew Brzezinski, the president's national security adviser also recommended that the deadline for withdrawal be delayed a year.

The ILO has been the main source of information on worldwide labor practices, including working hours, pay and safety. In recent years, it set up technical training courses in former colonial areas of Africa and Asia. It received the Nobel peace prize on its 50th anniversary in

MY ANSWER By BILLY GRAHAM



DEAR DR GRAHAM. We try to set a good example for our two young children, but they always seem to be fighting and quarreling. What is wrong with children today?-Mrs. A. A. M.

DEAR MRS. M. I'm not sure there is anything new about brothers and sisters quarreling, although in some situations it may be worse than in others. The Bible gives many examples-Cain and Abel, Esau and Jacob. Joseph and his brothers, to name a few. Of course, such quarreling is not right or good, but don't feel you are the first parents to put up with it!

You say you try to give your children a Christian example: that is very important. If children do not see love in their parents, it will be that much harder for them later in life. But two other things are necessary. First, you need to instruct your children-you need to talk with them and pray with them in order to make the truth of God plain to them. Unless your example is backed up by instruction, it may not be understood. The Bible says, "And these words ... thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when

thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up Deuteronomy 6 6-7). Also, you may need to discipline your children more carefully. Sometimes parents think it is unloving to discipline

children, but the opposite is true. Without discipline children will grow up with little knowledge of right and wrong. You should make it clear what is expected of your children, not just in their personal relationships but in other areas as well. Then stick to those guidelines. "He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth him betimes' (Proverbs 13:24)


Berkowitz Meets Natural Mother

Helms Awaiting Sentence

ment says national security and concern for a "distinguished career" were factors in allowing former CIA Director Richard M. Helms to plead no contest to charges of failing to testify fully about CIA activities in Chile.

The Justice Department, with President Carter's concurrence, cited Helms' "outstanding services" Monday in asking a federal judge to impose the minimum \$200 fine and suspend any jail sentence on two misdemeanor charges

stemming from 1973 testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which was holding hearings on his nomination to be U.S. ambassador to Ir-

The nomination by then-President Richard M. Nixon was subsequently confirmed by the Senate

Assistant Attorney General Benjamin R. Civiletti said he expected Helms to be sentenced soon, perhaps as early as to-

The plea bargaining arrangement drew an immediate protest from Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, who presided over a Senate subcommittee investigation into, clandestine U.S. involvement in Chilean domestic politics.

"I thought there was to be an end to the double standard of justice for the big shots." Church said. "Apparently, Helms was just too hot to handle

The government said, however, it agreed to the no-contest plea because 'trial of this case would involve tremen-

dous costs to the United States and might jeopardize national secrets.

Attorney General Griffin Bell said later that Carter had been told of the plea bargaining before the court session, but was not involved in the particulars.

A White House statement said the president was aware of Justice Department strategy in the case and had approved the final decision Monday.

We think it is a decision which uphelds the authority of the law and the Congress, while at the same time protecting the national security interest of this country," a White House statement said.

During the hearings, Helms was questioned about clandestine U.S. attempts to prevent the election of Marxist Salvador Allende as president of Chile in 1970.

Helms told the committee that the CIA did not in any way attempt to influence the Chilean vote. Allende, who won the efection, was killed in a military coup in September 1973.

But the Justice Department said " Helms failed to answer those questions fully and completely as required by law."

No reporters were present when Helms entered his plea in U.S. District Court, Under the law, a no-contest plea means a person does not admit guilt but says he will offer no defense. He is subject to the same penalty as if he pleaded guilty.

Helms told Judge Barrington D. Parker that "I found myself in a position of conflict." when he testified before the Senate committee in 1973 that the CIA made no attempt to influence the Chilean elec-

"I had sworn by my oath to preserve certain secrets," Helms said. "I had put up my hand and sworn. I didn't want to lie. I didn't want to mislead the Senate. I was simply trying to find my way through a very difficult situation in which I found

Courtroom observers said Helms told Parker he understood "there is to be no jail sentence and I will be able to continue to get my pension from the U.S. gov-

But the judge replied: "This court does not consider itself bound by that understanding." Parker said he would retain his discretion in the sentencing.

Helms could face a maximum sentence of one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine for each of the two counts. Even the minimum one month jail term and \$100 fine could be suspended. The last prominent individual to face

the same charge was former Attorney General Richard B. Kleindienst, who received a suspended 30-day jail sentence and \$100 fine for his part in the Watergate scandal.

Helms has been a professional spy most of his life. He began his intelligence career during World War II, and was assigned to the Office of Strategic Services after the war. He moved to the CIA when it supplanted the OSS in 1947

Helms took over all clandestine activities in the early 1950s. He became the first CIA career officer named director, holding the position from 1966 to 1973.

Helms served as U.S. ambassador to Iran from 1973 to 1976, but during that time he lived under a cloud of criminal investigations into CIA mail openings and a 1971 break-in at a photographer's studio.

- Early last year, the Justice Department said it would not prosecute the break-in because it could not make the case stick.

The Gazette, in response to a letter from a farmer complaining about depressed wheat prices, recently offered to exchange a year's subscription to the newspaper for 91/4 bushels of wheat.

The offer closed Sunday as the Gazette entered 100 subscriptions and hauled away 2,000 bushels of wheat from a streetside loading area where farmers piled their wheat around parking meters.

Now Professor Maurice C. Taylor, who says he agrees that wheat farmers are not as bad off as they say they are, wants to exchange a lecture in economics for a

subscription. "I feel the Gazette has much more need for a lecture in economics than it does for 91/4 bushels of wheat," Taylor said in a letter the newspaper published


Sunday. Taylor acknowledged a possible problem with his proposal.

To these people, there is very little difference between proposals to discourage oil and gas consumption by increasing taxes or to encourage exploration for new oil and gas supplies by raising prices. Either way, they figure, the public is going to be gouged.

Government cannot succeed in this country without public understanding and support. When the issues involved are great, the support must be overwhelming.

Energy is such an issue. But so far the leadership of this country - in and out of government - has failed to define it for the mass of the public and to offer solutions that seem both fair and practical. Unless that happens, it is a good bet that confusion and cynicism will equal stale-



Group Says Aid To Third World Will Benefit U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A bipartisan group says it is in the self-interest of the United States to play a more active role in the Third World through increased economic aid, investment and trade.

The Washington-based Atlantic Council suggested strongly that a commitment to improve economic and social conditions, rather than political considerations, "should be the sole allocation criteria" for aid.

The Atlantic Council, a private bipartisan group concerned with the formulation of foreign policy, made the recommendation in a 150-page report on "The United States and the Developing Countries."

The Atlantic Council has at least two State Department officials on its board of directors (assistant secretaries Richard Cooper and Hodding Carter III) and such former high-ranking-department officials as Henry Kissinger, Joseph Sisco, Kenneth Rush and Martin Hillenbrand.

"In a chaotic world situation, closer relations with the Communist countries might in fact prove to be attractive alternatives to some of our present friends" in the developing Third World nations, the report said.

"The issue thus comes back to what the United States and its friends should do, both by what specific means and in terms of how big an effort."

"If this analysis is correct," the Council said, "it is in the interest of the United States to play an active intellectual and material role among the developed countries in seeking a basis for cooperation among all countries" on global issues.

The report proposed three principal ways for the United States to help developing countries: concessional aid, including technical assistance; non-concessional public and private investments; and

improved trading opportunities.

To illustrate the U.S. dependence on raw materials from developing nations, the report said that in 1975 the United States had to import the following percentages of its consumption of these products:



Teen Dies At Church Carnival

HOUSTON (AP) - Michael Anthony Carter, 14, was selected Monday night to play the part of a hanged man in the spook house" during a Halloween carnival at a Houston area church.

Shortly after the party began, a church official found Michael hanging with a rope around his neck. He was pronounced dead on arrival at a local hospital.

Authorities said the boy was found by Brian David Runnels, 20, the church's youth director, just after the first group of seven costumed children had shuddered their way through the spook house.

"It was totally an accident," said the Rev. J.B. Grimes, pastor of the church, who was in one of the carnival booths in the church, packed with more than 350 children, at the time.

"The boy was told to keep the rope around his chest, and he took it upon himself to move it to his neck," the Rev. Grimes said. "He also decided to tie a knot in the rope - something he wasn't

"But even then, the rope was long enough so that he wouldn't have been hurt if he jumped down onto his feet. He either fell or got pushed off the sawhorse and landed wrong. His knees buckled and the rope caught him. There was quite a bit of noise, and we didn't hear anything until somebody found him and velled."

Police said the rope was attached to a bolt screwed into the ceiling of the church building.

The Rev Grimes said the old bantistery where the children and members of the church youth group put on the spook show was "dark" and hard to see in and up three flights of stairs.

Each child going through the spook

house carried a lighted candle.

Rosendo Lopez, 26, said he saw smoke coming from behind the curtains near where Michael was stationed and pulled the curtains apart.

"I went in to check and saw that Brian (Runnels) was holding the young man up and asked me to help." Lopez said. He said he then untied the rope and removed it from the boy's neck.

'It couldn't have been two minutes from the time the boy was last seen alive to the time the accident occurred," he said. "It is such a sad thing for us to try to give the children of the neighborhood a happy and safe time and for this to hap-

It was the second Houston area Hallow een tragedy in three years.

In 1974, Timothy Marc O'Bryan, 8, died of cyanide poisoning after eating trick or Clark O'Brien, was convicted of murder in the boy's death and received the death penalty. He is on death row at Huntsville.

The state claimed 0'Brien put the poison in the candy in hopes of collecting on a \$30,000 insurance policy.

Panel Planning First Hearing On Migrants

AUSTIN (AP) - The Joint Committee on Migrant Farmworkers agreed Monday to conduct its first hearing sometime during the first two weeks of December in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Rep. Forrest Green, D-Corsicana, told the committee at its organizational meeting that it should take advantage of studies that have already cost millions of taxpayers' dollars.

The committee, appointed by Speaker Bill Clayton from members of four committees, is charged with studying the working conditions, pay scales, health problems, educational opportunities and housing conditions of migrant farmworkers.

Besides Green, others attending the meeting were: Reps. A.C. "Tony" Garcia, D-Pharr, chairman; Charles Evans, D-Hurst: Elmer Martin, D-Colorado City: Joe Hubenak, D-Rosenberg; and Frank Madla, D-San Antonio.

Evans asked what green card workers were and several other questions about how Mexican nationals are allowed into this country.

"I don't know anything about it at all," Evans said. Five minutes later, he left

the meeting. Garcia said the committee would have to look into the problem of illegal aliens because that affects migrant farmwork-

There should be two hearings in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, one in the middle Valley area, one in the Panhandle and one in Martin's Central West Texas

district, Garcia said. The Texas Farm Workers have invited the committee to meet at its headquarters in the lower Valley.

'We'd be happy to hear what they have to say," Green said. "I don't think we ought to meet in a union hall, but we'd be happy to hear what they have to say."

One thing that ought to be investigated, Green said, is the charge by some farmers that they provide a haven for migrants and then when they begin to 'function" they leave for better paying jobs in the cities.

Inmate Prefers Stay In Mexico

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - Lance English says he'd rather sit in his Mexican jail cell than spend Dec. 25 with his family in Austin, if the U.S. government is going to give him two and a half years of federal probation for a Christmas pre-

"I only have 11 more months to go over here with the time I get off for good behaviour," said English. "It'd be stupid for me to go back to the States if I've got to be on probation for two and a half years and have a record

English has spent the last four months in the Mexican jail just across the Rio Grande from this border city. He is one of 26 American prisoners serving time in the Matamoros jail awaiting implementation of the prisoner exchange treaty.

The 29-year-old English received a 5vear, 9-month sentence for marijuana

Mexican officials Monday initially refused to allow newsmen to interview an American prisoner. Only after English's physical well-being was questioned did prison officials allow him to come to the telephone for an interview

"The U.S. officials have told us that we would probably be home for Christmas and that may sound good but there are still a hell of a lot of unanswered questions," said English. "Nobody's told us whether we'd have a record in the States. If that's the case, I'd be better off staying

The U.S. magistrate in Brownsville, William M. Mallet, said Monday, "As I understand it, the prisoner will have no record in the United States unless he already has one. The Mexican convictions will not be added to their record."

Mallet added he has been notified to attend a meeting of magistrates and public defenders scheduled in San Antonio on Nov. 8 "to get the details of the ex-

He also said he is scheduled to go to the Matamoros jail on Dec. 12 and 13 and preside over hearings at the Monterrey brought before a magistrate and be given the opportunity of legal counsel and verbally agree with the provisions of the treaty before an exchange can be imple-

One provison disallows any appeal of a prisoner's sentence in U.S. courts. A prisoner must appeal in the country where he was sentenced under the treaty guide-

English, however, said other American prisoners in the Matamoros jail have also talked about avoiding the prisoner ex-

The guys they brought in here from the Nuevo Laredo prison said you could get a cell that looked like an apartment for \$5,000 in that prison," said English. 'They would provide you with good meals, a bottle every now and then and allow your wife or girlfriend to stay with you for a weekend or a week. They even had TVs in the cells. You don't get that in the States.

English followed that statement with a request for someone to contact his father ustin and tell him to se

'Tell him the money's already on the responded Terrell English, Lance's father, who added: "It's cost the family about \$10,000 since Lance was put in jail over there. If he can come home by Christmas, that's fine but if he can stay and not have a record, then that's even better. I'm sure he'll do what he thinks is

"I don't have any problem getting in and out of the jail to see him," continued the elder English when told of the Mexican officials' refusal to allow newsmen to interview American prisoners

'They all know me by now and I drop a couple of bucks on them every now and then and that helps. That's what they understand."

What makes us really mad is that we know we couldn't have been convicted in the United States on the charges they've got us on," said Lance. "And if we'd had the money to pay the Mexican cops off that arrested us, we'd be free today."

The pending merger of local municipal and county jails probably won't necessitate an increase in the size or cost of Lubbock County's proposed new detention complex, county architect Arnold Maeker said Monday.
In an interview, Maeker said the pro-

posed 330-inmate facility has been designed large enough to hold prisoners ar-rested by both the Lubbock Police Department and the Lubbock County Sheriff's Department.

Meanwhile, County Judge Rod Shaw said a committee of county officials will meet with Lubbock City Council members Alan Henry and Bill McAlister hopefully within the next week or two to iron out financial arrangements. "I don't anticipate any problems," Shaw said. "We all realize that having a

single jail serve both the police department and the sheriff would be more efficient and more economical." He said he has not appointed a committee to discuss the matter with Henry and McAlister, the council's designates for the merger negotiations. However, Commissioners Alton Brazell and Edgar

are supervising the new jail plans, Shaw Shaw said the consolidation talks may be "more study than negotiation." He said the city and county must determine

Last week, a city-county ad hoc committee recommended that if the county takes on the responsibility of operating Lubbock's only jail, then "all arrests made by the City of Lubbock police (should) be filed in the appropriate Justice of the Peace court.

In that way, the panel said, the county could make some extra money - per-haps enough to offset the additional jail

Shaw declined to speculate whether the county may ask the city for compensation in the merger. Though the city seems to be getting the best of the bargain, he said fines from city-arrested persons may be enough to defray the county's additional

City officials and some county commis-

sioners feel the county probably cannot require the city to pay for county jail accommodations, since most city arrests in-volve alleged violation of state laws.

However, some commissioners say privately the city may have a "moral obligation" to help finance the jail if the additional costs are not offset by extra revenues generated by fines from city-arrest-

They said the city may be persuaded to chip in a small portion of the county jail's operating budget or a contribution toward new construction costs.

However, the problem with such proposals is that commissioners have vowed to be consistent in their treatment of the City of Lubbock and the county's smaller municipalities. If the City of Lubbock is asked to pitch in for the county jail, the implications for such municipalities as Slaton and Shallowater may cause trou-

Instead of seeking compensation from the City of Lubbock, some commissioners said the county might better use the jail merger proposal for leverage or a "trade-off" in getting the city's help on some other program, such as back-up rural fire protection

If the county takes over Lubbock's total jail responsibilities, commissioners plan to establish some rules - for all local cities and arresting agencies - to help minimize the county's costs.

For example, if immediate medical at-

Briscoe Criticizes Health Guidelines

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe says the proposed national guidelines for health planning are nothing but unnecessary federal meddling and interference.

Briscoe urged President Carter in a letter Monday to see that the proposed guidelines "will be modified to reflect suggestions by the federal government to compliment local planning efforts instead of dictating arbitrary and ill conceived formulas specifying local health care needs.

A copy of Briscoe's letter went to Secretary Joseph Califano of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which drew up the proposed new regula-

Briscoe said "the imposition of arbitrary, rigid formulas for determining the appropriate availability of health services and facilities for the citizens of Texas is highly offensive and will in the long run result in rationed health care. When fully implemented these guidelines will further aggravate the problems that the citi-

zens of rural Texas face in providing adequate health care facilities and in attracting and retaining physicians and other health care professionals.

The Texas governor said the state has 12 health system agencies, a series of state health agencies, a large number of interested consumer and professional groups and "hundreds of highly capable local and state elected and appointed officials who are quite capable of determining the health care needs of the citizens of this state without unnecessary federal meddling and interference.

Christmas Time Credit, Layaway Tips Given

NEW YORK (WNS) - Looks like a hectic Christmas seson ahead. Stores already are promoting the predictable Six Million Dollar Man. Bionic Woman and other toys with TV tieups.

There's even a toy called Slime this year, with a miniature oozing garbage can. Whatever happened to Snow White. Tinker Bell and Tiny Tears?

Christmas is one of the biggest borrowing and installment-buying periods, and stores already are offering extended billing plans. Under these plans purchases made through December 24 won't be billed to you until your regular billing date in January.

With other lenders charging annual percentage rates of 11 to 36 a year, the extended billing plans are one way to get credit at no extra cost and to take advantage of early-Autumn sales of clothing and other gift-type goods

LAYAWAY SAFEGUARDS: Layaway agreements are another way to get partially free credit. In these plans, often used for Christmas purchases, the goods are set aside, or are supposed to be, until you

complete your payments. But problems may arise. Sometimes inadequate records are kept or the goods aren't set aside. In fact, at least two states have enacted laws recently to protect consumers making layaway agree-

A Maryland law requires that consumers receive a written contract listing all the contract terms, including the right to cancel and get at least a 90 per cent reof the Montgomery County, Md., Office of Consumer Affairs

A new Rhode Island law requires that the buyer can get a 100 per cent refund in the first 10 days; at least 90 per cent after

Even without local law, consumers using layaway plans can insist on similar written agreements embodying such provisions.

What about refund and exchange policies? These are important to know, especially for Christmas shopping. Unless the seller notifies shoppers otherwise through posted signs, or notices on sales slips or merchandise labels - consumers should be able to assume that the seller's policy is to give cash refunds for cash purchases, cash or credit for credit purchases; and at least merchandise ex-

changes, if not cash or credit, for gift pur-

Gregg advises that it's also wise to find out if a seller's usual refund or exchange policies don't apply to certain items such as food, perishables, custom-made or altered goods.

COSMETICS MYSTERIES RE-VEALED: As required by a new law, labels of most toiletries and cosmetics now arriving at stores, although not the older stock, list their ingredients in descending order of content.

The new lists can be a particular help to people with allergies. They or their doctors now have a chance to see which ingredients may post a problem, especially the often troublesome colorings.

But to make the best use of the new labeling rule. Arthur Perlin, a pharmaceutical expert, advises that when consumers buy cosmetics and toiletries, they now hold onto the package for future refer-

In many cases the new ingredients lists are on the packaging only, and by the time an allergy erupts, often the package has been discarded. That makes it harder to determine the responsible ingredient.

An incidental benefit is that you now have a better chance to compare ingredients among different brands. The law says all manufacturers must use the same names for the same ingredients

For example, you may be able to see whether moderate-price and higher-cost skin creams and conditioners may not have much the same emollients such as mineral oil, beeswax, hydrogenated vegetable oil, isopropyl stearate, other common ingredients.

You also can compare the humectants (water attractants for making skin moist), such as glycerin, propylene glycol, sorbitol and animal protein deriva-

You can get a free copy of "Avon's Guide to Cosmetic Ingredients" from Avon's Consumer Information Center, 9 West 57th St., New York, N.Y. 10019. Cause for alarm? No. according to Julius M. Coon of the Committee on Food Protection of the National Research

"Concentrations of toxic substances in any commonly accepted food are so low that grossly exaggerated quantities must be consumed before the toxidity of any substance becomes a hazard," he explains. "The human organism can readily tolerate small amounts of many different chemicical substances taken simultane-

Coon's statement is good news for dieters, non-dieters and just plain snackers, since many of the most wholesome foods contain potentially dangerous chemicals.

Vegetables, for example, often contain minute quantities of arsenic and nickel and of oxalates, substances often used in

bleaching and dyeing processes. Howev-

take 1,000 times the normal daily intake of leafy green vegetables to reach toxic

The same is true for fruits and common spices. Although 5,000 milligrams of nutmeg, so popular for Christmas eggnogs, is a toxic narcotic, heavily seasoned eightounce portions contain only 175 milligrams of the chemical.

For sheer chemical complexity, for example. George J. Levinskas, Director of Toxicology for Monsanto Company. points out that the common potato, no matter what its size, contains no fewer than 150 different chemicals - none of which is any more dangerous to health than the butter and sour cream so often used for garnishing spuds.

Should we give up eating entirely to avoid these chemicals? According to Frank M. Strong, also of the National Research Council, food chemicals, whether natural or artificial, should not be feared. He says, "this is a perfectly normal situation that mankind has always faced and inevitably always will.

MINDEN, Neb. (AP) - Harold Warp wanted only to rescue a youthful memory when he bought an old, one-room schoolhouse back in 1948. He didn't know he'd end up owning a turn-of-the-century vil-

Today, more than 1,000 visitors a day view "the evolution of our nation's history" at Pioneer Village, where an antiquefilled general store, pioneer homes and steam-powered merry-go-round share space with the school, church, livery barn and steam locomotive.

"The idea was not spontaneous," said Warp, a Minden native. "I bought the schoolhouse just to save it. Some guy was going to use it for a chickenhouse. Since then, Warp says he and his rela-

tives have traveled more than 200,000 miles in the United States, Canada and Mexico in search of collection pieces. Warp describes the village as a

"chronological view of our country in every aspect." More than 30,000 items of another era, most in working order, fill the museum's 24 buildings.

"We've tried to get everything in running order and like new, when our proud parents owned them. When somebody says, 'That's not so old,' I know they've missed the whole point and wasted their money." said Warp, who describes himself as "age 73, going on 32."

Shiny new steeds carry young and old riders on the village's 1879 Armitage-Herschel merry-go-round, which Warp calls America's oldest steam-powered carousel. The old animals are displayed else-

where in the village. The kids were scared of the lions and tigers (the old animals) and would sooner ride on a pony," said Warp.

Warp said he once returned to Minden

from his Chicago residence to find that relatives managing the village had raised the cost of a merry-go-round ride from five cents to a dime. He promptly returned the price to a nickel. "We found that people would spend just as much money at a nickel a ride as they would for a dime," he said.

Newer buildings house the history of transportation - including an 1822 oxcart; peddlers' wagons containing everything from mustard to ladies' shoes; horsedrawn streetcars; carriages; boats; motor homes; 15 planes, and over 300

Visitors flock to Warp with questions and compliments as he walks past displays showing mechanical coin banks, slot machines, one of the first contact lerses, and a photo printer that uses bird albumen and zinc oxide.

Warp researched the history of every collection piece, writing notes in longhand. Touring the museum, he remembers that early Fords were always black,

while Chevrolets came in different colors: that shoes weren't made specifically for the right and left foot until after the Civil War; and that wealthy people "never bothered (to decorate) the kitchen because they had servants, but they fixed up the rest of the house.

Some parts of the village evoke more personal memories for Warp.

We used to carve things on the underneath side of the desk, so the teacher didn't catch us." he said as he sat at a desk in the school he attended until 1913 Horatio Alger books, readers, arithmetic books and others displayed in the school were used in Warp's classes.

A sod house contains "our kitchen ta-

ble and my father's ledgers. And at the German Lutheran Church. where services are still held weekly in summer, a display shows a beaded christening costume brought from Norway in 1878 by Warp's mother. Weddings are still held at the old church "every once in a while," he said

Researchers Examine Facts, Myths About Sugar

Questions Most Frequently Asked About Sugar

1. Is there a difference between sugar refined from sugar beets and sugar refined from sugarcane?

There is no difference in the sugar refined

from either cane or beet. Sugarcane and sugar beets are plants that are able to make sugar in larger quantity than any other plants. Sugarcane, a giant grass, thrives in moist climate, storing sugar in its stalk? The sugar beet grows best in a tem perate climate and stores its sugar in its silver-white root. Chemically, sugar from both sources is the same.

2. What is raw sugar?

Raw sugar is a tan to brown, coarse granu-lated solid obtained on evaporation of sugar cane juice. Raw sugar is processed from the cane at a sugar mill and then shipped to a refinery. It is about 96% sucrose. Although it is sweet to the taste and pleasant smelling it contains such contaminants as soil, fibers, molds, yeast, bacteria, lint and waxes. Moisture content is about one-half per cent.

3. Is raw sugar sold to consumers?

No. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration notes raw sugar is "unfit for direct use as food or as a food ingredient because of the impurities it ordinarily contains."

What is turbinado sugar?

Raw sugar may be partially refined by washng in a centrifuge under sanitary conditions process. Mineral matter, other solid matte and invert sugar are also present in turbinade sugar crystals. In total sugar content turbi nado is closer to refined sugar than raw sugar.

Most sugar refiners produce brown sugar by boiling a special syrup containing the neces sary flavor and color ingredients to a mass o crystals and syrup in a vacuum pan. Thi mass is spun in a centrifuge, but not washed so the sugar crystals still retain some of the syrup with its brown sugar flavor and color Some refiners make brown sugar by adding syrup to a refined white sugar in a mixe Brown sugar produced either way is much

8. How can brown sugar be stored to prevent lumps?

Brown sugar is marketed in some areas in polyethylene plastic bags which can be moisture. Brown sugar purchased in card board cartons should be stored in a cool moist place. If you lack an ideal storage place, empty the sugar into a rust-proof con ainer or heavy, moisture-proof plastic bag and keep tightly closed.

When brown sugar dries out and hardens empty it into a rust-proof container. Place a piece of plastic wrap or foil on top of the sugar. Dampen a wad of paper towel (no dripping wet); place on the plastic wrap of foil, and cover container tightly. The sugar will absorb the moisture and become soft in 8 to 12 hours. Then remove the paper towe

and keep the container tightly closed. To soften brown sugar quickly, heat it in soon as it is soft measure the amount you need. When the sugar cools it will become hard again and should he softened using the wet wad of paper method described above

9. Can brown sugar be substituted

for granulated sugar in a recipe?
Yes, if the flavor of the sugar does not influ ence the recipe results. Pack the brown suga when measuring or you'll be using less sugar

10. What is the difference between confectioners' sugar and powdered

sugar? The two terms refer to the same product. In the East the term confectioners' sugar i more commonly heard, whereas in the West powdered sugar is the more common term Years ago in New England the term "pow dered sugar" was used to refer to a fine gran-ulated sugar, similar to superfine granulated sugar sold today. Much confusion resulted

11. How can powdered (or confectioners') sugar be stored to prevent lumps? Powdered sugar should be stored in air tight containers to keep the moisture out once the box has been opened. When powdered sugar absorbs dampness and then dries, lumps form. This is why about three per cent corn starch is added to prevent caking. (Brown sugar is the opposite because you want to retain the moisture.) Sift powdered sugar if lumps have formed or if the sugar has been

12. What is superfine or ultra-fine

It is a very fine-grained granulated sugar. Regular granulated sugar is used for normal-baking, canning and table use, while super-fine granulated is ideal for extra fine-tex tured cakes and meringues, sweetening fruits

13. Are sugar cubes available in more Yes, there are small cubes equal to-one-half

teaspoon sugar and larger cubes containing approximately one teaspoon sugar per cube.

14. What nutrients are present in sugar?

The nutrient in sugar and most other sweeteners is limited almost entirely to carbohydrate. These nutritive sweeteners are an important part of the body's total food energy supply. They also have an important role in making many foods taste more palatable Vitamins and minerals are sometimes present in minimal amounts. That is why sweeteners are impractical as a source for adequate daily intake of necessary nutrients.

15. What is honey?

Honey is essentially an invert sugar. It is formed by an enzyme, honey invertase, from nectar gathered by bees. Honey varies in composition and flavor, depending on the source of the nectar (clover, orange blosse sage, etc.). A typical analysis of honey ould show texclusive of undetermined sub stances): 38% fructose., 31% glucose, 1% sucrose, 9% other sugars, 17% water and

16. Is honey more nutritious than granulated, powdered or brown sugar?

A tablespoon of honey has more calories and carbohydrate content than granulated, powphosphorus and iron than brown sugar. Honey contains minimal amounts of thiamin, riboflavin and ascorbic acid. These small amounts of vitamins and minerals in honey make it no more practical than sugar as a source for adequate daily intake of necessary

Does sugar make us fat? Does sugar make teeth decay? Is sugar responsible for diabetes? How about hypoglycemia (low blood

Not according to an investigating team.

But one writer says sugar is "probably a major factor in the deaths of hundreds of millions of people" another writes: "If only a small fraction of what is known about the effects of sugar were to be-revealed in relation to any other material that material would promptly be

In contrast, Dr. Thaddeus Danowski and two colleagues who teach medicine at the University of Pittsburgh reviewed the evidence about sugar making one fat, and conclude it does not.

It is widely accepted that table sugar is the cause of tooth decay. Dr. Sidney Finn and Dr. Robert Glass, after a five year study done in Sweden, concluded there is not a one-to-one relationship between total sugar consumption and decay. Drs. Finn and Glass describe decay as an infectious disease. Mouth bacteria, which flourishes on carbohydrates, produce an acid waste that eats into tooth enamel. And diabetes?

In 1971 the American Diabetes Association surprised many with the statement that: "There no longer appears to be any need to restrict disporportionately the intake of carbohydrates in the diet of most diabetic natients

In explanation of this statement Dr. Edwin Bierman (who chaired the committee that wrote it) notes that patients rarely die of the direct effect of diabetes.

Newer statements of studies indicate that carbohydrates seem to stimulate the body to produce insulin. Experiments using diets up to 80 per cent sugar actually improved the blood sugar tolerance of both normal people and diabetics. However, regulating the diabetic's diet is still important. It must be adjusted to medication and to calorie needs. And sudden surges of blood sugar must still be avoid-

There is no evidence that excessive consumption of sugar causes diabetes." the researchers concluded.

Hypoglycemia appears to be a new way to explain discomforts. "We may find it easier," say the experts who studied the data on low blood sugar, "to say, 'my blood is low,' rather than, 'I can't cope.'

Contrary to popular belief, low blood sugars are not, as some claim, the result of too much carbohydrate (especially sugar) in the diet Low blood sugar is simply a sign that one should be checked to discover the cause of a possibly serious underlying disease.

Many other human ills have been charged to sugar, everything from heart disease to madness to epilepsy. But in these data evidence is either non-existent or so slight that the scientific reviewers saw no need for further study. In general they conclude that sugar, like any other food, is harmless when eaten in reasona-

Dr. Fredrick Stare of Harvard points out that energy can come from any of three food sources - proteins, fats or carbohydrates. Protein is expensive and scarce; and excess fats may offer health hazards, so the bulk of our energy must come from carbohydrates. Many people are now aware that virtually all carbohy drates in our food are either sugars, or as

in the case of starches, chains of sugars. Sucrose, the scientific name for table sugar is one of the most common sugars found in plant foods. Dr. Stare concludes that in the absence of a compact carbohydrate energy source, such as sugar, it would be hard to give youngsters enough calories without giving an unhealthful ex-

Considering all that science has learned of sugar, Dr. Stare sums up: "There being no valid evidence to the contrary, an intake of 10 and 30 per cent of total calories, with the average at 15 to 20 per cent taken as sugar may be considered

Discussing the conclusions of the investigating team Dr. Stare states "At these levels sugar contributes to good nutrition, to the enjoyment of our meals: and

Well, just what is sugar?

Chemists recognize over a hundred sweet substances that are described as 'sugars." But only one of these is, by common usage, called "sugar.

It is the natural sweetener, sucrose usually obtained commercially in crystalline form from sugarcane or sugar beets. (Sucrose is technically defined as a disaccharide of the carbohydrate family.) All carbohydrates are formed originally by photosynthesis: the energy of sunlight transformed into chemical energy by the chlorophyll in green plants, acts on water and atmospheric carbon dioxide to form plant sugars. That's sugar.

New data seem to place the origin of sugarcane in the South Pacific about 8,-000 years ago. Sugar was specifically mentioned for the first time in 325 B.C. by an officer of Alexander's invading army in India where it may have been growing for several centuries previously Sugarcane cultivation spread east to China about 100 B.C. but reached Mediterranean Europe relatively late, probably as a result of the Arab conquests after 636 A D.

A scarce European luxury, sugar was brought into the western world in the 13th century and in 1300. Venice was the sugar capital of the world. Then, Portugese colonization brought sugar to the west coast of Africa and then to Brazil.

The Spaniards introduced sugar cultivation in the Canary Islands and Columbus brought cane to the Caribbean on his second voyage. By 1550 sugar had become one of the most valuable products in the world and a pirate's prize. England and France established their own refineries in the 1600's to handle sugar from the

Beets, cultivated for food and fodder, were known to the ancient world, but it wasn't until 1744 a German chemist established that sugar from the white beet was the same as sugar from cane. Practical methods of extracting sugar from the beet resulted in sugar factories that spread from Prussia to Russia.

These developments came to the attention of Napoleon, whose struggle with England had led to the cutting off of all shipments of sugar from the Caribbean. Soon he issued a decree supporting a vast increase in beet sugar production in France and within two years 35,000 tons of sugar had been produced.

Since then, sugar beet cultivation and processing have become a major agricultural activity in most European countries. Sugar from beets now accounts for about 44 per cent of the world's sugar. A factory built in Massachusetts in the 1880's was followed by 14 more during the next 30 years, including an effort by the Mormons to introduce sugar beets in Utah and to set up a factory. Machinery was brought to Salt Lake City by ox-carts but the factory was abandoned after a

couple of years. The first successful beet sugar processing plant in the nation was built in 1870 at

Alvarado, Calif. Today sugar beets are raised in 25 states, and the United States is the second largest producer of beet sugar in the

Expert Winter Boat Storage Tips Given

United Press International Storing a boat for the winter can be a

difficult and sometimes an expensive The cheapest and often the safest place is your garage or your backyard on your own trailer, but that presupposes the boat is small enough to be easily trailable and there's somebody at home most of the time. Its awful easy for thieves to back a car into the yard and haul off a boat that's already conveniently mounted on a trailer. A strong chain and padlock

on the trailer wheels can help, of course. Keeping the boat on a trailer or on a cradle in the backyard will cost \$5 to \$10 a foot for the winter but generally is safe. ale store boats that are too big to be readily trailered on cradles at home and have them trucked to and from the water in spring and fall. But building a strong cradle that will support a large boat properly calls for some expertise.If the boat is blown down in a storm or the cradle falls, the damage is sure to be ex-

tensive and serious. Unfortunately, many boatvard crews don't set boats up properly ashore for the winter so that both ends and the midship section are properly supported and the boat can't shift or wobble

The owner should check on this himself

and insist on a proper job Wood boats need an overall canvas winter cover, tied down tightly with plenty of ventilation holes to prevent wood rot. Fiberglass boats don't really need cover-

The boat should be stored in such a way that all rain water will drain out from

drain holes at the lowest part of the bilge. It is best to store many small boats, whether on trailer or cradle, with the bow lifted a little so water will run out the transom drain hole.

Insurance policies in the northern states commonly require that a boat be hauled for the winter by Nov. 1. If you want to leave it in the water longer, you must make special arrangements with the insurance company. Traditionally, even large boats are hauled out and stored ashore for the winter because of the peril from winter gales and ice damage. But that's far from ideal and can lead to hull distortion and other problems. A big boat's natural element is in the water, so the ideal arrangement is to pull her up briefly in spring to clean and paint the bottom and make any needed

underwater repairs. Trouble is the only sure protection against ice damage is a submerged automatic electric air bubbling system that will keep ice from forming within a foot of the hull or the pilings holding your mooring lines, and that costs. The ice peril is bad enough in fresh water, but in tidal areas the ice forms at low tide, then the tide comes in and lifts the ice, boats. pilings and docks, causing huge waves of damage. The only alternative to the electric air bubbler is for the marina to have a husky crew to get out on the ice and break it up with axes twice each 24 hours once during the dark of night — in bit-

ter weather. A boat left in the water for the winter also must have its mooring lines strongly posed metal and brightly varnished or painted woodwork should be protected by covers or greasing. Unless the yacht is going to be used much of the winter, the engines, batteries and fuel tanks should be carefully winterized in accordance



Terrorist Coverage Criticized

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A majority of the police chiefs and television news directors in 30 large U.S. cities oppose live coverage of terrorist events "except" in the most compelling circumstances," a university survey shows.

Results of the survey, completed by more than half the police chiefs and 35 percent of the news directors in the target cities, were released by the Project on Television. Coverage of Terrorism at California State University-Northridge.

Project director Michael Sommer said the survey focused on terrorist-coverage guidelines set up by CBS News, the first of four news organizations to adopt such

The survey showed that 73 to 94 percent of the police chiefs and news directors agreed with the seven guidelines, Sommer said.

But what remains to be seen is whether; despite their favoring the guidelines, television news organizations would ac tually adopt them: Sommer added There appears to be some sentiment to adopt them, especially in view of the frequency of terrorist acts now being reported by the nation's media.

The CBS guidelines include these

-Unless terrorist demands are succinctly stated and free of propaganda. they be paraphrased rather than presented verbatim

-Terrorist acts receive no live cover-

-Reporters should find out whether their use of the telephone lines will interfere with the authorities' needs to communicate with the terrorists





And almost one-third of 117 jurors who participated in the study said they would have voted for conviction after the trial's opening remarks - before hearing any

Joseph Barbeau, 22, conducted the study in 1976 as part of his honors thesis in political science. The study involved 117 jurors, all of whom had served in criminal trials in Hennepin County.

Barbeau used a short test he titled the 'Legal Attitudes Questionaire." Based on test results he said jurors could be divided into three general categories: authoritarians, anti-authoritarians and a group he dubbed "equalitarians."







Study Says Petroleum Firms Exaggerating Profit Claims

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new economic study sponsored by a conservative research organization suggests the petroleum industry is exaggerating claims that it needs higher profits.

The study, commissioned by the American Enterprise Institute, says the apparent low profits of oil companies in past years were actually higher than average for the amount of investor risk involved.

The petroleum industry's money-making record thus seemed good enough to attract investment money, said the study released Monday.

That conclusion seems to challenge one of the oil industry's chief arguments for deregulation of oil and natural gas prices. The industry has contended that controlled prices make profits too low to attract investors, thus hampering exploration and development of new energy

Washington-based institute by Shyam Sunder, assistant professor of accounting at the Graduate School of Business of the University of Chicago

Sunder first figured out the profits of the oil industry over the past 15 years by the usual measurements, such as return on net worth, or return on assets. He concluded, as others have found, that the industry's profits lagged behind U.S. industry in general until the steep price increases associated with the Arab oil embargo of 1973-74

Sunder said recent profits only made up for the lower profits of earlier years and may not represent a future trend. But in his analysis, Sunder noted that

standard profit measurements fail to take into account an investor's risk. To include the risk factor, he did a series of unusual and complicated calcula-

First, Sunder figured out how much oil The analysis was prepared for the industry profits fluctuate compared with

all other industries - a measure of uncertainty or risk known to stock analysts as a "beta coefficient"

From that, Sunder figured a normal range of profits and calculated how much the oil industry's earnings deviated from the norm for the years 1961 through 1975. On that "risk-adjusted" basis, Sunder concluded that oil industry profitability was actually a bit higher than the average for all other industries

The reason for the contradiction, he suggested, is that investors face less risk when they put their money into the oil industry. He said the investors' rate of return is good for the risk they are taking

Backing up this conclusion, Sunder said, is "the fact that relatively low rates of return persisting over more than a decade do not seem to have driven capital investment away.

Instead, these were years of healthy growth for the industry," he said

Sunder concluded that "the market has evaluated the performance and prospects of the industry as quite healthy and prof-

A spokesman for the American Petroleum Institute, the industry's trade organization, said late Monday that its own experts had not yet read Sunder's analysis. However, an institute economist. Nick Gal, complimented Sunder as "no mean analyst" and agreed that the oil industry has had "a remarkable record" of paying dividends and interest on debts over the

'There's no question that capital was coming into the industry, but the question is whether it was adequate." Gal

That question has become a central focus of the debate over U.S. energy policy. While the industry says it needs uncontrolled prices and higher profits to finance the development of new oil and gas. President Carter has charged that uncontrolled profits would be "the biggest ripoff in history

Sunder's study did not suggest whether past and present oil industry profits were high enough, too high, or too low

But his departure from the standard "return on net worth" measurement of profitability, and his conclusion that oil is really a relatively low-risk business offering its investors relatively high profits contrary to the industry's main line of argument

Sunder was overseas when the analysis was issued and was not immediately available to comment on its implications for energy policy

Medical Group Puts Mandell On Probation

SACRAMENTO (AP) - The former psychiatrist for the San Diego Chargers, who prescribed amphetamines for football players, has been placed on medical probation for five years and his authority to prescribe drugs has been severely lim-

The Division of Medical Quality of the state's Medical Quality Assurance Board approved the proposed decision of an administrative law judge in the case of Dr. Arnold J. Mandell.

Mandell, reached for comment Monday, said he has achieved his goal despite the decision. He said he feels he has 'made a contribution to the awareness of the amphetamine problem through professional football.

Mandell said he has not yet decided whether to appeal Friday's ruling. He said he now wants to turn his energy to reaching and writing. He is co-chairman of the psychiatry department at the University of California at San Diego.

In her ruling, Judge Marguerite C. Geftakys found there were grounds to revoke or suspend Mandell's license to practice medicine because he is "guilty clearly of excessive prescribing of drugs.

Staubach

DALLAS (AP) - Roger Staubach, 35, the "old man" of the Dallas Cowboys, believes the National Football League's only unbeaten team "could potentially be the best I have played on."

The Cowboy quarterback, who has been on three Super Bowl teams, underscores "could" and "potentially.

Teams have really been getting after us but we have found a way to win even when we had an off day like our (16-10) victory over Philadelphia," said Staubach Monday. "However, realistically right now we are no better or no worse than some eight other NFL teams."

Dallas, displaying a sound running game, a bristling defense and Staubach's passing, is off to its best start in the club's 17-year history.

"The young guys on defense like (middle linebacker) Bob Breunig, (linebacker) Thomas Henderson, and (tackle) Randy White are playing great," said Staubach. "Our defense is one I wouldn't want to play against in the league. I work against them every day and they are tough.

Staubach also praised the Cowboy running game particularly with the addition of rookie Tony Dorsett, the Heisman Trophy winner from Pittsburgh who has given Dallas its first legitimate breakawav threat.

"Our running game will keep us in the thick of it." said Staubach, who threw three touchdown passes Sunday in a 37-0 rout of Detroit as Dallas remained the only unblemished club in the National Football League.

'Last year we couldn't run the ball and we were doing such things as passing on third down and two against Los Angeles in the playoffs," said Staubach. We won't have to do that any more.'

Staubach said, "Dorsett hits the hole faster than anybody I've ever seen. He hits the crease quick and then he's gone.

'He also is starting to run good routes which really helps our passing. Both Tony and Preston Pearson are out there now when we go into the spread and that really creates problems for the de-

Fullback Robert Newhouse, backed by Scott Laidlaw and fast-blooming rookie Larry Brinson of Florida, who scored his first professional touchdown against the Lions, also were cited by Staubach as performing well. "I can see the difference on play ac-

tion passes this year," said Staubach. 'The other teams are more conscious of the run. It opens up our passes, particularly on first down. Staubach said "Dorsett is really a

strong inside runner. He may be better inside than he is outside. When he breaks into the secondary, he really has the moves.


Last spring he reportedly demanded a long-term contract for \$3 million, including a bonus. Kingman denied the figure



But Paul Wiggin, an acknowledged "nice guy" who was fired Monday, still believes it can be done.

Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt called a news conference Monday to announce that "in the best interests of the Kansas City Chiefs," Wiggin had been fired and Tom Bettis, a veteran Chiefs' defensive backfield coach, named to replace him on an interim basis.

Wiggin indicated earlier that he had talked his successor out of resigning in a show of loyalty.

"Tom is a very loyal guy," Wiggin said. "I said, 'Tom, let's talk about a team and a staff and some people we both care for. Let's forget about Paul Wiggin."

Bettis, flanked by Hunt and Chiefs President Jack Steadman at the news conference, was asked about Wiggin's re-

"Any time you get a shock like this, there's bound to be a lot of wild thoughts going through your head," he said. "Paul and I had a long conversation."

Wiggin, 44, was an obscure assistant coach for the San Francisco 49ers when the Chiefs hired him in January, 1975 to head their much-advertised rebuilding campaign. He was 5-9 in each of two full seasons after replacing Hank Stram, who was fired after a 5-9 mark in 1974.

The Chiefs, a powerhouse in the old AFL and the Super Bowl champions of 1970, staggered to a 1-6 mark the first seven weeks of this season and were mauled 44-7 last Sunday by the Cleveland Browns, the team Wiggin served for 11 years as a defensive end.

The dismissal of the popular Wiggin triggered a quick, hostile reaction from fans, writers and players.

Several players emerged from Wiggin's office openly weeping after they learned of the dismissal and Wiggin was wiping tears from his eyes when he met with re-

"I don't have any bitterness," said Wiggin, whose coaching philosophy was founded on dedication, emotion and compassion. "And I still believe it's possible for a nice guy to win in the NFL. I did it my way, and it didn't work."

In a written statement, the players said they were "shocked and saddened with what has happened here today.

Every man on this football team feels a deep sense of guilt for the actions that were taken. It is our fault that we lost a fine man and a great individual, Paul to have someone else suffer the consequences of your own actions. We feel this is the case today.

The Kansas City Star said calls were running almost 10-1 in favor of the ousted

'We decided it was in the best interests of the Kansas City Chiefs to make a coaching change," Hunt said. "Paul Wiggin is a very fine man. He gave the Chiefs credibility and he helped us through a difficult period. But in the opinion of the team management, we had not been making the progress we felt we needed to

"We are dedicated to seeing the Kansas City Chiefs become competitive with the best in the National Football League and we felt we were no longer making progress toward that goal."

Wiggin, 44, said he had no idea he was being dismissed when called to a meeting with Hunt and Chiefs President Jack Steadman at 10:30 a.m. Monday.

"I was just told that I wasn't getting the job done and that I was out," he said. "There was no happy Halloween, no nothing. I just got fired. That's it.

Wiggin defended the Chiefs' long-range plan of rebuilding slowly through the draft but hinted that Hunt and Steadman had been short of patience.



Mandell's reputation is partly based on his research into the psychological effects and uses of drugs, particularly amphe-

If Mandell meets the conditions of his probation for the five years, his license will be restored at that time.

The law judge noted that all 11 Chargers players for whom Mandell prescribed drugs had been using amphetamines, and in many cases, other drugs before the psychiatrist began to work with the team.

Mandell was asked by then-Chargers head coach Harland Svare in 1972 to study the team to see why performance varied so much.

Mandell studied players during training and the 1972 regular season and concluded many players were using a combination of drugs in social life and football.

In an article and a book, Mandell wrote about the use of drugs he discovered among players. The writings led to legal proceedings against him in 1976.



Texans To Aid In Writing Energy Compromise

By ROBERT B. CULLEN

WASHINGTON (AP) - It would be difficult to find three practicing Texas politicians with more disparate energy views than Reps. Bob Eckhardt, Charles Wilson, and James Collins.

But this trio has made its way into the limelight by securing positions, along with Rep. William Archer, on the House-Senate conference committee that will write whatever comprehensive energy legislation Congress passes this year. Eckhardt, 64, wears rumpled, vested suits, a gold pocket watch and bow ties. He rides a bicycle to the Capitol.

He also is one of the only members of the Texas delegation (the other is fellow Houston Democrat Barbara Jordan) to vote regularly against the interests of the oil and gas industry.

Analysis

Eckhardt pays a price for his liberalism and independent positions. Every two

years, someone backed by the energy industry runs against him. "I've never had an easy time being re-elected," Eckhardt says. "Not even when I was in the legislature."

Collins and Archer, both Republicans and both doctrinaire conservatives, are at the opposite end of the spectrum. Collins is the more widely known of the two, probably because he is more flamboyant.

Thin and grey-haired at 61, he is the heir of a Dallas insurance fortune. As a member of the House Commerce Committee, Collins has been a prominent voice in the chorus calling for an end to regulation of natural gas prices.

Somewhere in the middle is Wilson, 44. He is an East Texas Democrat, tall and lean, with styled hair, flared pants, and lots of pretty women on his office

It is Wilson and Eckhardt who are likely to play the most influential roles on the committee, not that Collins and Archer are not trying. But, as Republicans,

Because of the distance he places between himself and the energy industry, Eckhardt is an influential voice among liberal Democrats. He is a past chairman of the Democratic Study Group and is perceived as a Texan who knows a great deal about the energy industry, but can be counted on not to automatically

Wilson is the most intuitive politician among the group and, as a protege of House Majority Leader Jim Wright of Fort Worth, the man most likely to be involved in the compromises and deals that likely will make up the final package. Perhaps the only thing they agree on is that the energy bill will have a vital impact on more Texans than any piece of legislation that has come from Wash-

that. We favor complete deregulation. Wilson favors deregulation, but he thinks that's academic now. The House is not going to accept it. "I'd like to see the price set at a level that would ap-

proach the market price - \$2.10 to \$2.25. I can take that.' Eckhardt says the consumers in Texas would suffer inordinately from deregulation, and he opposes it. The reason, he said, is that Texans have no base supply of low-priced gas under long-term contracts. Interstate pipelines could bid the price of gas up to \$2.50 or \$3, he said, and mix small amounts of the highpriced gas with the gas they have under contract at prices as low as 50 cents. Texas companies could not, he said. They would be paying the higher price

for all their gas. So would their consumers.

— On preserving a separate intrastate market: Collins says "It is absolutely essential that intrastate gas not fall under the jurisdiction of a Washington energy board." He fears it would lead to rules forcing Texans, who have built their supply by paying high prices, to share their gas with states that have benefited from low, controlled prices which did not stim

late exploration Wilson is looking not at what he's likely to get, but to what it may be possible to get. He thinks Texas will have to accept federal authority to take intrastate gas in times of severe shortage and send it to homeowners in states with shor-

But he has vowed to fight any effort to make Texas share its industrial supply with industries in other states.

'There would be a filibuster against it in the Senate, and maybe here in the House, also," Wilson says.

Eckhardt is supporting the Carter plan, which would abolish the pricing distinction between intrastate and interstate gas, controlling both at \$1.75. It also would give the President emergency authority to allocate intrastate supplies to

— On what to do with the proceeds of the proposed tax to equalize the prices of domestic and imported crude oil:

Collins is a firm believer in a "plowback" provision that would rebate the taxes "to anyone who'll produce more oil. Usually, that would be independent producers," he said.

Wilson favors a compromise. He would take the proceeds from the tax and use it to subsidize research and development of other forms of energy, like solar energy, and to repair railbeds and improve mass transit.

Eckhardt favors the original Carter proposal to rebate the tax to citizens on an equal basis. Those who used less energy than the national average would come out ahead. Those who used more would be hurt by the tax.

"Without that, the program becomes a gun aimed directly at my district," he

The chances are that none of the three will be entirely pleased with the package that emerges.

'The situation is very fluid. There's likely to be a compromise worked out at the last minute," Wilson says.

County Spends \$59,665 Of Utility Aid Funds

Because "time ran out," only \$59,665 of an allotted \$62,000 in federal funds will be spent in Lubbock County to help the poor pay their utility bills.

Community Services Director Archie Bottoms' said that although his department supervisors "worked frantically " for six weeks to certify applicants, they could not meet the Aug. 31 deadline set

His department was not told of the Special Emergency Energy Crisis Intervention Program until July, Bottoms said, explaining why some of the money was

"There wasn't anything we could do about it," he added.

The \$59,665 that was obligated will be divided among 590 households, he said. About 700 people applied for assistance, he added

About half of the 590 households will receive the maximum assistance of \$250. Bottoms said. And, he added, about 80 percent of those helped are elderly.

Bottoms said that 30 percent of the households will be assisted with past due bills, 25 percent with both past due and future bills and 45 percent with utility bills up to April 1, 1978.

The federal government set up the \$200 million program to help the elderly and poor combat increasing energy costs and severe winter weather. According to federal guidelines, top priority was to go to the elderly poor whose utility accounts

Judge Says Minority Law Unconstitutional

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A federal judge has declared unconstitutional a 1977 Public Works Act provision that requires 10 percent of the work it finances to be done by minority-owned busi-

But U.S. District Judge A. Andrew Hauk on Monday declined to prohibit any contractors from using funds from the \$4 billion Public Works Act.

"I think I have to keep in mind the tre mendous harm I could cause if I tried to enjoin \$4 billion already granted," said Hauk, who noted that it was the intent of the act to pump construction money into the economy immediately.

While declining to bar the use of funds from the current allocation, the judge issued a permanent injunction against future allocations of federal construction

However, Deborah Seymour, a Justice Department lawyer, claimed the two cases are different because the public works minority provision is an act of Congress, while the UC-Davis admissions policy is voluntary.

Drop In Coffee Prices Offsets Grocery Increases

Coffee prices took another drop last month, offsetting increases for other items and helping cut overall grocery bills slightly, an Associated Press marketbasket survey shows.

The latest decreases left the cost of a pound of ground coffee in most areas at \$3.50 or less — well above the price at the start of the year, but \$1 and more below the record levels of last spring.

The AP drew up a random list of 15 commonly purchased food and nonfood items, checked the price at one supermarket in each of 13 cities on March 1, 1973, and has rechecked on or about the start of each succeeding month.

The latest survey showed that the marketbasket bill increased during Octoberat the checklist store in six cities - up an average 1.9 percent. The bill decreased at the checklist store in seven cities - down an average 2 percent. On an overall basis, the marketbasket bill was about a tenth

of 1 percent less at the start of November than it was a month earlier.

During September, the marketbasket bill decreased at the checklist store in 10 cities and increased in only three, for an overall drop of eight-tenths of 1 percent.

Comparing current prices with those at the start of the year, the AP found that the marketbasket bill had increased at the checklist store in every city, up an average of 8 percent. When coffee was removed from the list, however, the increase over the 10-month period was only

A report in the October issue of "Agricultural Outlook," published by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said: "Generally stable retail food prices are in prospect through the remainder of 1977. Large supplies and generally lower farm product prices are expected to offset further increases in marketing costs for U.S. farm foods.

The report also noted that prices for

expected to remain fairly steady during the rest of the year.

The latest AP survey showed that the price of a pound of coffee decreased at the checklist store in 10 cities, with the drops ranging from 3 to 10 percent. The survey also found decreases in the cost of eggs, which dropped in price at the checklist store in seven cities. Pork chops and butter increased, however. The price of a pound of pork chops went up in six cities and butter increased at the checklist store in seven cities.

Consumers with a sweet tooth are in for some bad news. The AP found that the 1412-ounce bag of Nabisco Chips Ahoy chocolate chip cookies is being replaced by a 13-ounce bag, with no price drop expected

A spokesman for Nabisco blamed soaring cocoa prices for the move. He said the company was faced with three alter-

> As of the end of October, the checklist stores in all the AP survey cities except Chicago still had the 1412-ounce size. In Chicago, the larger bag had been replaced by the smaller one. The price remained the same - 99 cents. The price per ounce was about 12 percent higher. The equivalent price of a 1412-ounce bag would be \$1.10.

Note: Cookies are not the only item affected by this type of price increase. Check sizes carefully when you shop so vou can compare price per ounce, pound,

The day of the week on which the check was made varied depending on the month. Standard brands and sizes were used when available. If the requested size and brand was not available on March 1, 1973, a comparable substitute was selected. Items temporarily out of stock on one of the survey dates being compared were not included in the over-all total.

The AP did not attempt to compare actual prices from city to city - to say, for example, that coffee cost more in one area than another. The only comparisons were made in terms of percentages of increase or decrease - saying a particular item went up 10 percent in one city and 6 percent in another

The USDA marketbasket issued each month is based on a complex set of statistics. It includes 65 retail items of U.S. farm-produced foods in amounts that theoretically could supply a household of 3.2 persons for one year. The department, which draws on information from 1.500 supermarkets in compiling its report, says the figures do not correspond to actual family food spending and are

used mainly to illustrate changes in costs. The items on the AP checklist were:

chopped chuck, center cut pork chops, frozen orange juice concentrate, coffee, paper towels, butter, Grade-A medium white eggs, creamy peanut butter, laundry detergent, fabric softener, tomato sauce, chocolate chip cookies, milk, frankfurters and granulated sugar

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A new Swiss-American study suggests there may be a link between chemicals in automobile exhaust and an excess of cancer deaths among people who lived near a highway in a small mountain town in Switzerland.

This finding suggested that some kind of environmental cancer causers were responsible. In an effort to see what might be responsible for the excess cancer, the scientists examined the soil near the highway and in other areas of town.

They found relatively high levels of compounds called polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons in soil near the highway. Many of these compounds are known to be capable of causing cancer in animals. and they are the type of compounds produced during combustion in car engines.

The scientists found 85 to 300 milligrams of the polycyclic hydrocarbon compounds per kilogram of soil near the highway. An outlying section of town with light traffic had 21 mg of the compounds. A nearby Alpine meadow had

The chemical nature of the compounds showed they were not products of the asphalt used on the road, nor of lubricants. Hydrocarbon compounds found in the soot from a chimney of a house heated by fuel oil were of a very different nature. As a result of this work, the report said

many additional components of exhaust must be considered as possible factors involved in cancer. 'The demonstrated correlation be-

tween highway traffic and the production of carcinogens strengthens indirectly also the correlation between highway traffic and the observed mortality from cancer." the report said.

The report, published in the November issue of the American Chemical Society journal. Environmental Science and Technology, was written by the late Dr. Max Blumer of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, Dr. Walter Blumer of Nestal. Switzerland, and Theodore Reich of the University of Zurich.


