a public address sytem a pubic adaress sytem. ${ }^{\text {For erample, Kutsch said, a salesman in need of inventory information from }}$ his home office could call in to a computer and a talking terminal could ver-
bally bally transmit the data over the phone.
Kutsch did point out that while MOUTH talks, it does not listen; it recognires only commands typed in at the terminal keyboard. But it is fairly easy to get MoUTr to talk to you, Kutsch said. "Assuming
you know how to use a computer terminal you need no special tnowiedge to get speech output" from the talking terminal. get speech output" from the taiking terminal.
When asked if he thought talking terminals would have a place in American

lier had Arkansas coach Lou Holtz worried, as his Razor lier hack prepared to battle the Raiders Thanskgiving Day. "You always hate to play a good team after they vile been
beaten like that," Holtz said. "They re liable to really come back strong."
