be filed, waiting for developments in a particular case. Each day the police reporter checks with the Lub-
bock Police Department, the Sheriff's Patrol, the Department of Public Safety, the Fire Department, the Drug Enforcement Agency (federal), the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board and other city, county, state and federal offices, either in person or on the phone Sometimes these check-ins result in a news story; oth-
er times they are merely kep-in-touch visits with
sources. sources.
AFTER VERIFYING information through official and other channels, the reporter must then write a
clear, informative story, making sure his facts are reported accurately and his story adheres to rules of newspaper style. He is often working under the pres-
sure of a deadline, which adds a note of urgency to the need for accuracy.
While the need to be exact is essential to any reporter. the police reporter must cope with additional re-
strictions on what information can be reported and on the terminology he can use in telling a storyy the use of an even slightly pejorative term or the disclosure of re-
stricted material may affect the disposition of a case or might even result in a lawsuit.
What information can be released in a case, and

when, have been specified by the state attorney gener
on the part of the reporter covering police matters. Consideration of the overall picture of a developing
case is often difficult for the police reporter who may ace is often difficult for the poilce reporter, who may
find himself sitting around halls or stairways waiting for information, tramping through watery ashes to
cover a fire story, standin in snow or trekking over cover a fire story, standjum in snow or trekking over
unpaved roads. THE OVERALL picture is ance to the fine arts writer.

reviews for current movies, the fine arts writer is something of a captive audience: while the average movie-goer can get up and leave if the feature film is less than captivating, the movie reviewer is bound by

Much of his time, like that of most reporters, is spent
in the telephone, gathering background information, verifying that information, setting up appointments or interviews and taking calls from advance publicity agents and area publicity chairmen about forthcoming
events. Trying to keep abreast of current events and future features is a more than full time job for the fine arts
writer, who must also routinely touch base with writer, who must also routinely touch base with Los
Angeles and New York publicity offices. Public relations releases must be rewritten before being used, with details verified for accuracy and information about the local aspects (when a film will appear in
Lubbock, at what theater) added.
