West Coast Gets Rain

Rain continued today in western states, but there was no promise from weathermen that the drought on the Pacific Coast was over.

"So far this year precipitation is normal, but we don't know what the rest of the year really is going to do," said National Weather Service forecaster Ray Williams

Three storms have dumped rain and snow on California since Thanksgiving Rain spread today from the coastline to Utah and Arizona. Snow fell at higher elevations. The precipitation was to contin-

ue through Wednesday. Since Sunday, as much as 2 inches of rain has fallen in the Los Angeles basin, weathermen said.

Heavy snow and high winds along Lake Erie Monday stranded motorists and closed a section of Interstate 90 in Pennsylvania. The New York State Thruway remained closed from Lackawana near Buffalo, N.Y., to the Pennsylvania state

Travel advisories for heavy snow squalls remained in effect today across much of upstate New York

In Buffalo, where as much as 2 feet of new snow was reported, 6 more inches were expected today. Scores of businesses and factories in the area closed, giving workers an unexpectedly long weekend. Snow was reported in the Dakotas, near the Great Lakes and in the mid-Ohio

The overnight low reading was 27 below at International Falls, Minn. Monday's high reading was 74 at Presidio, good that any precipitation the area might get would be in the form of light

At 10:35 a.m. scattered light snow was falling from the southern Panhandle southward to near Lubbock. However, observers said little of the precipitation was reaching the ground.

Any area of light rain and snow also was reported east and northeast of Lubbock, but moisture from it was likewise remaining mostly aloft.

But chilly temperatures - with or without rainfall - were expected to dominate the Lubbock area through

Today's high should reach the mid-40s, dropping to the upper 20s and low 30s tonight. Forecasts indicate Wednesday's maximum temperatures will reach the

By the week's end, however, those temperature ranges should increase by about 10 degrees, and rain likely will drop out of forecasts

Lubbock's early-morning freezing temperatures were no exception to the state-

wide weather picture. Temperatures ranged from the low 20s in the Panhandle to the 40s in the lower

Colby Opposes New CIA Rules

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former CIA Director William E. Colby testified today that he agrees with new restrictions on the agency's use of journalists abroad, but opposes additional limits.

Appearing before the House Intelligence Committee, Colby said, "I strongly recommend that we not establish a blanket prohibition against any relationship whatsoever between American journalists and intelligence services."

New regulations, established by CIA Director Stansfield Turner, prohibit the agency from initiating relationships with journalists in most cases, but Colby said they still allow newsmen to volunteer information about what is going on in a for-

Asked if he agreed with the regulations, Colby said he did. But he added that one danger with the rules is that other groups might also "clamor to be included in this charmed circle" which cannot be approached by the CIA. He did not specify which groups might seek such status.

Colby was asked by Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., who presided at the committee hearing, whether he thought the regulations had "gone about as far as they can go." Again, Colby said he did.

Colby also said he did not think the use of foreign journalists by the CIA should be prohibited. He said other nations make use of them in the United States and added, "I don't believe in unilateral disarmament

Colby conceded that in a few instances false stories had been planted in the foreign press, but said that in some cases such a story eventually "becomes a real fact."

He gave as an example stories exaggerating the strength of a small resistance group, which then becomes stronger and is able to carry out a successful coup. "In other words, if you do the job well,

it becomes true?" Aspin asked. 'Yes," Colby answered. "I am not sure that is what we want to

have happen," Aspin said. About 15 men and women wearing red, white and blue eyeglasses and identifying themselves as "Yippees" sat or stood in the hearing room during Colby's testimo-Some of them held signs, reading Beware of War Criminal" and "There is Blood on that Witness.'

Colby testified that intelligence agents doubling as journalists, before such activity was ruled out, were not told by the CIA how to write their news reports.

The former director, who headed the agency from 1973 to 1976, said he handled "CIA employes on intelligence missions abroad who served as real or pretended journalists

However, Colby did not mention the names of any journalists who cooperated with the CIA or agents who posed as re-

'My agents and I had a clear understanding that they did their intelligence work for me, but that the news reports they wrote were a matter between themselves and their editors, and were not given prior clearance or direction by me,"

He acknowledged that this understanding "may not have been followed in some isolated instances," but contended that a serious study would "put to rest any myth that CIA dominated our media out-

Colby, who is now a lawyer in private practice in Washington, said "intelligence officers cannot be effective in hostile areas of the world if they wear the initials CIA on their hatbands.

The problem of providing cover, he said, is one of the agency's "greatest areas of frustration and difficulty.

During the last 10 years, he said, more and more possible sources of cover for agents have been ruled out of bounds, including the Peace Corps, Fulbright schol-

arships, the U.S. Information Agency, the U.S. Agency for International Development and now the news media.

In many countries, he continued, "the remaining areas of cover are few and ... many CIA officers are all to easy to iden-

The melting ice floe of adequate cover has already led to the tragic death of one of our officers and the frustration of the work of a number of others," Colby said, See COLBY RAPS Page 14

Farm Protesters Prepare Phase

A more militant phase of the national farm strike entering its third week should get under way around the first of the year, a spokesman for American Agriculture said today.

'It'll be sometime just prior to or just after Jan. 1," said Mike McCathern of the Colorado-based group's state strike office at Hereford.

In Oklahoma, striking farmers picketed and planned meetings around the state today and said they were considering a more drastic measure - plowing up

some of their wheat crop. At Grand Island, Neb., farmers began picketing the Swift meat-packing plant

McCathern said last week Phase 3 of the farmer protest for higher agriculture prices would be more militant than the tractorcades and pickets of food distribution centers.

The farmers, believing their demands are going unheeded, have threatened bigger demonstrations unless the government gives them 100 percent parity to provide them with break-even prices for their commodities

President Carter met during the Christmas holiday with representatives of the angry farmers, but McCathern said they hadn't expected much out of the meet-

Auto Registration Plan To Bring Hassle

Avalanche-Journal Staff After next year, Texans may no longer have to endure long lines to register their cars. But first, they must survive the confusion in early 1978 of a new license plate renewal program, says Russell Hardin,

Lubbock County tax assessor-collector. "No doubt about it, this is going to be a hassle in the beginning. It's going to require a lot of patience and understanding on the part of motor vehicle owners and my staff," Hardin said.

But once we complete the switchover

to a year-round vehicle registration sys-

tem, things should be easier on every-

body. We won't have that rush of people

lining up at the courthouse every March

Traditionally, vehicle registrations in Texas - including Lubbock County's 170,000 cars and trucks - expire March 31 each year. That single expiration date for the state's vehicle owners has caused last-minute sieges and other massive problems for such offices as Hardin's,

whose staff handles registration renewal. So, under a new law passed by the state legislature, Texas is converting to a staggered registration program for passenger cars and light trucks, such as pickups .-

The goal is to spread out the renewal dates as equally as possible over the 12 months of the year, rather than have them all expire at one time," Hardin explained. This should eliminate long lines

at the county tax office and make the registration process easier on car owners and the tax office staff, he said.

The motor vehicle division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation studied several possibilities - using, for example, owners' birth dates and alphabetical placement of their last names - in deciding how to assign vehicle registration dates.

State officials settled on using the current license plate number of each vehicle as the key in fixing the month of registration renewal in the future, Hardin said.

The staggered system, he said, is based on the second-to-last digit (the "tens" column) on your present license plate. For instance, if your license plate is ABC-

168, the "6" is the key under the new sys-

"That number tells you how far from the current registration month (March) that your personal registration month will be," Hardin said.

Under the above example, in which the next-to-last digit is a 6, "your regular registration month from now on would be September," he said.

Hardin calculated that by taking the current expiration month of March which now is the same for all vehicles in Texas - and counting forward six

months, to September. "Getting everyone on this same system will be difficult for the first year because people will be registering their cars for different periods of time," he said.


Hardin explained some car owners on the first go-around might be registering their vehicles for only a few months, while others will be registering - and paying for - a much longer time frame. Even more confusing is that some vehi-

cle owners will have an option on how long to register their cars. For instance, Hardin said, in the above example, "you would have the option of registering your car for just six months and having to renew it again in Septem-

'Mr. Yuk' Proposed As Warning Symbol

CHICAGO (AP) - A child who sees a crossbones symbol has lost much of its skull and crossbones on a container of significance and reported that some poison may think pirate food is inside, say researchers who want to replace the traditional warning symbol with "Mr.

Mr. Yuk has a scowling green face, with his eyes scrunched closed and his tongue sticking out. He was born in 1971 in Pittsburgh, where pirate symbols are associated with the city's professional baseball team.

"In the last five years, there have been no deaths in Allegheny County (Pittsburgh) from accidental ingestions," said a spokesman for the National Poison Center Network, which is based at Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh.

The network estimates that between 1,-000 and 5,000 children under 5 years of age die each year of accidental poisonings nationwide

Many of these deaths could be prevented by the use of new warning symbols like Mr. Yuk, according to a study by Kenneth C. Schneider, an assistant professor of marketing at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota, Schneider's research was published in the University of Illinois' Journal of Consumer Research. Schneider concluded that the skull and program

children believe the once-frightening symbol designates "pirate-food."

He also found that children seem to be more attracted to white containers than black or red ones, to square containers and to those with an odor - even those with unpleasant or antiseptic odors.

Mr. Yuk is used in about 20 Eastern cities now, the poison center said.

In Illinois, the state is experimenting with a different symbol to replace the skull and crossbones. It is a green snake with fangs bared and was chosen after interviews indicated the character was the one with which children would be most afraid to play.

The federal Consumer Product Safety Commission has given the state a grant to test the program in Springfield. An educational packet, including snake stickers, poison antidote charts and classroom lesson plans using puppets and familiar products, has been distributed to schools and day-care centers.

If the pilot project works, it may become part of the state Department of Health's statewide poison prevention

Squad Seeks Explosives

BREWER, Maine (UPI) - Forrest Peavey, a 38-year-old recluse killed in a Christmas night shoot-out with police. had filled his home with explosives and ammunition - much of it rigged to kill anyone who tried to storm the house, authorities say

Bomb squad experts were called in Monday to dismantle the booby traps which fired shotgun shells - in the unheated, two-story house. Dozens of state and local police and firemen stood by in case of an accident.

"There's still more in there and they'll be going back in tomorrow (Tuesday) to get the rest," a Brewer police spokesman said Monday night when the search was stopped for the night.

As a precaution, police evacuated at least 25 neighbors from their homes and ordered electronic communications held to a minimum to prevent the accidental remote-control activation of the explo-

Sunday's shootout was sparked by a neighbor's call to police about 7 p.m. to report a man with a rifle outside his home. Police said officer Albert Parlee and two other policemen were sent to Peavey's house and tried to talk him into

surrendering a rifle and pistol Police said Peavey shot Parlee in the shoulder and an hour-long sheotout followed. Peavey was killed by a bullet to the chest. Parlee was hospitaized in good

Police said the door through which

Peavey fired on police for an hour Sunday night appeared to be the only clear entry to the house. If officers had tried to rush him from another entrance, they may have tripped a fatal booby-trap, police said.

Nearly every window and door in the house was rigged with a steel contraption designed to fire shotgun shells at an in-

truder, police said. Police said they had no immediate information about Peavey's background in explosives and weapons.

Court Drops Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Superior Court in the District of Columbia has dropped charges lodged against comedian Dick Gregory and four other people arrested for protesting at the South African embassy.

A court spokesman said Monday that federal prosecutors decided against pressing charges against Gregory, his wife, Lillian, Allan Jackson of Salisbury, N.C., and Michael S. Matthews and Eric J. Burit of Washington.

The five were arrested Christmas Day on charges of violating a local law prohibiting demonstrations within 500 feet of a foreign embassy.

Similar charges against the Gregorys and Massachusetts State Sen. William Owens were dropped last week. They had been arrested on Thanksgiving Day at the same place for the same thing.

Gregory said Sunday he was demonstrating to protest South Africa's segregationist racial policies and objecting to U.S. corporate involvement with the apartheid regime in

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) - Russian immigrants in the United States, Europe, Australia and Japan have answered exiled Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn's plea for recollections of their native Russia,

Solzhenitsyn's interpreter says. Solzhenitsyn, a Nobel Prize-winning writer now living in Cavendish, recently asked his countrymen to write their recollections for use in his Russian Memorial Library.

Solzhenitsyn's family spokesman, Irene Alberti, said Monday that no material has arrived from the Soviet Union although Solzhenitsyn's request went there by radio.

"They wouldn't be able to send it by mail. We hope to eventually get some from there," she said in a telephone

Postal Official Says Proposal Not Helpful

WASHINGTON (AP) - A bill to remove some of the Postai Service's independence would not, if passed, make the agency's financial problems disappear, Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar

In fact, the agency is in its best financial condition since it was reorganized in 1971, Bailar said in an interview. Its \$700 million 1977 deficit compares to a \$1 billion loss in each of the two previous

A bill introduced by Reps. James M. Hanley D-N.Y. and Charles H. Wilson, D-Calif, would allow Congress to veto postal rate increases, restore presidential power to appoint the postmaster general and abolish the Postal Service board of

Currently, the president appoints the governors, who appoint the postmaster.

"Making changes in the structure of the Postal Service is not going to make the problems disappear," Bailar said. "You can't wish away all of the rising costs and other economic trends. You can't wish that it didn't cost \$16 billion a year to run the Postal Service.

Bailar said he opposes a \$2 billion annual mail subsidy contained in the legislation, because it would place an unfair burden on individual taxpayers. The current annual subsidy is \$920 million.

Unwanted Sect Stranded In Bangladesh

DACCA, Bangladesh (UPI) - When the Indian subcontinent was partitioned in 1947, a million Moslems migrated here to escape the bloody communal riots in Hindu-dominated India.

Now, 30 years later, they find themselves in almost the same situation of being unwanted by the society where they live

But this time, some 400,000 of them cannot get out.

Often called the Biharis because many of them came from the Indian state of Bi har, they are non-Bengali speaking Moslems who staunchly supported the Pakistani army in the last days of East Pakistan - now the independent state of Bangladesh.

That was more than enough to incur the wrath of the native Bangladeshis, who consider every non-Bengali speaker an agent of Pakistan and an enemy of 'liberation' from that country.

During the Indo-Pakistani War that led to the birth of Bangladesh in 1971, the Biharis and the Bengalis were killing each

When the war ended, some 107,000 Biharis were exchanged in a huge airlift for 171,000 Bengalis - including 28,000 soldiers - stranded in West Pakistan.

Another 18,000 Biharis, uncertain about their fate in a newborn country hostile to them, fled secretly to Pakistan.

But some 400,000 Biharis were still in Bangladesh when the airlift came to a stop after the last Bengali stepped off the plane from Pakistan.

The reason given at the time for ending the airlfit was a lack of funds. But it is generally believed now that Pakistan was reluctant to take more Biharis.

The majority of the Biharis who chose to go to Pakistan, but failed to get there, were herded into 11 refugee camps with tumbledown huts and filthy surround-

Fearing resentment from the local population, the Bangladesh government has discouraged publicity about conditions in the camps. Authorities fear such publicity would evoke mass pressure for the immediate "repatriation" of the Biharis to Pakistan.

Similarly, under the government of ousted Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, Pakistan also tried to suppress information on the issue for the same reason.

Pakistan at first refused to take any more Biharis because it feared a political blacklash at home. But under international pressure and on humanitarian grounds, Pakistan recently said it will

The Soviets won't say how much they earn from sales of icons. But Western estimates of profits run into the millions of

Wolfgang Maier-Preusker, an art dealer in Bonn, said the icon boom has led some dealers to inflate prices.

"Icons I offer for about \$2,000 are priced at about \$6,000 by another dealer," Maier-Preusker said.

There are other sources of icons in the West. Some come from family collections brought by Russians who fled the Revolution 60 years ago.

Heinz Skrobucha, curator of the Icon Museum in Recklinghausen, said most of sold by the Soviet government between 1925 and 1938 during currency-raising expeditions into Western Europe.

"There is no longer any legal way to take out icons older than the 18th century," said Skrobucha, who presides over a collection of 400 Russian icons dating to the 14th century.

The remaining treasures - many of the best icons in the world - have been put into museums in Moscow, Kiev and Leningrad as well as in restored churches around the country.

TODAY'S EDITORIAL:

A Bad Law Vs People

WHAT MIGHT be called the "Lawyers' Get-Rich Act" has been proposed by the Carter administration.

The Justice Department, which delights in interfering in everyone's everyday affairs, wants a law which would permit private lawyers to go and do likewise at the public's

It would permit environmentalists, civil rights activists, consumer protectionists and others to recover attorneys' fees "if he prevailed in substantial measure...and if he acted in the public interest or his opponent acted frivolously or in bad faith.'

It would be a bad law.

"FINANCIAL BARRIERS" now discourage many individuals and groups from filing suit over what they consider to be their rights, the Justice Department contends.

One look at overcrowded court dockets shows that this assessment is a bit over-stated. The facts notwithstanding, though, Justice Department lawyer Peter Rient says "the major innovation (of the proposed law) would be in public interest legislation."

fee when you win," he says, pointing to an existing federal law which permits the award of legal fees under limited circumst-

Rient points out that environmentalists who sued to block construction of the Alaska pipeline won a court-ordered change in the line's route but the Supreme Court refused to let them collect attorneys' fees.

THE PROPOSED bill also provides that the government could recover attorneys' fees-but only if it "prevailed completely, or as to all but an insignificant portion of the matter in controversy, and the opposing party acted frivously or in bad faith.

In effect, this violates the Constitution because it denies the public generally the "equal protection" of the law: A dissident group can recover lawyers' fees if it prevails in "substantial measure" but the public has to prevail "completely.

The net effect would be to encourage lawyers to press complaints, collect their fat fees, and clog the courts even more than already is the case.

Reformed Or Rearranged?

WASHINGTON-The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), which has been about as helpful to American business as the Lilliputians were to Gulliver, is cleaning up its act,

or so it says. Dr. Eula Bingham, the head of OSHA, has announced that her agency is doing away with 1,100 'nit-picking" and "picayune" regulations which have virtually nothing to do with protecting the safety or health of workers.

Well, this is terrific. Obviously, the less red tape the better. But the fact remains that the main thing wrong with OSHA still exists, and that is the agency's unconstitutional assertion that it has the right to inspect private businesses, unannounced, without a search warrant.

When I asked Dr. Bingham why she thought it was reasonable to search a business without a warrant-a business which had been accused of no violation of the law-she replied

"IT HAS BEEN traditional in public health that agencies have been allowed, without warrants-actually, you know, when you have these high-hazard industries, one has a very strong suspicion that a problem does exist."

True, such a procedure may be "traditional." However, the consensus of federal and state courts has been that such warrantless searches are unconstitutional, violating the Fourth

In a 1967 case involving an alleged violation of the San Francisco Housing Code, where a homeowner refused to allow a warrantless inspection of his home, the Supreme Court found for the de-

In this case, Camara vs. Municipal Court, the high court declared, in part:

One governing principle, justified by history and by current experience, has consistently been followed

"Except in certain carefully defined classes of cases, a search of private property without proper consent is 'unreasonable' unless it has been authorized by valid search warrant."

FURTHERMORE, IT IS disingenuous, to put it mildly, to imply, as Dr. Bingham has, that OS-HA's right to conduct warrantless searches is limited to only "high-hazard" businesses.

The truth is that, under the OSHA law, a compliance officer is allowed to enter any factory, plant, establishement, construction site, or any other area, workplace or environment to inspect any such place and all pertinent conditions, structures, machines, apparatus, devices, equipment and materials therein, and may question privately any employer, owner, operator, agent or em-

REP. OBEY SAYS the purpose of warrantless inspections is to avoid tipping of a business, in

advance that it is being investigated. When I point out that a business would not know if a court-approved warrant was being re-

quested, he is silent on this point. Obey says warrantless inspections are necessary because a business may or may not be violating the law and the only way to find out is to inspect.

When I ask him if he'd support the right of the police to search private property without a warrant, with no more than a similar suspicion, he says no, that this is "very different."

When I press the congressman on this point, asking how OSHA and the police are different, he walks away, terminating our interview.

The fact that OSHA is moving to reduce its number of unnecessary rules and regulations is a

But the main thing that's wrong with the agency is not its "nit-picking" rules. The most outrageous thing about OSHA is its

continued blatantly unconstitutional belief that it can search private businesses without a warrant. Until this implied presumption of guilt on the part of all American business is done away with, OSHA cannot be said to be truly reformed.



Taxpayers Holding Bag For Tuition Loan Abuse



THE U.S. OFFICE of Education is cracking down on former students who have defaulted on their federally guaranteed student loans-and a key reason is that federal law prohibits the government from bringing suit against debtors

whose loans are six years old or older. Right now, almost 27,000 defaulters owing \$34.6 million of loans already are or soon will be in the six-year-or over category-thus, perhaps beyond the point where the government can take legal

action to try to collect. At stake altogether are debts totaling about a half-billion dollars to the U.S., with a huge 344,-000 borrowers-or 12.2 per cent of those receiving loans-in default

How troublesome could the cut-off date turn

"THE STATUTE of limitations is a fuzzy mess," admits Carolyn Betts, acting head of the

Office of Education's operation division. We've no precedent within the Guaranteed Student Loan Program, so we don't know for

sure when the six years begins to run. "Does it start when a borrower misses a payment or when the government takes over the

loan from the original lender?" Legal counsel for the Office of Education, Sheldon Repp, points out that while it would be to the government's advantage to have the six-year period kick in as late as possible, he believes it

would begin when a borrower first defaults. He adds, though, that the time period would start all over again if a borrower makes another payment or even acknowledges the debt.

He says, too, that the statute of limitations, under federal rules, is an "affirmative defense"-it could be ignored unless the borrower raises it on his own behalf.

STILL, THE TICKING clock is a major incentive for the OE to track down defaulters and refer older cases to local U.S. attorneys for collection action

The referral program is well underway and is producing results. Many regions are reporting the highest collection rates in their history and while most of the payments have been voluntary, officials believe publicity about the referral program and possible legal action have spurred defaulters

Default judgements have been obtained on many cases that reached the courts. The OE turned over one claim for \$6,200 owed, it turned out, by an employe of the district attorney, earning more than \$12,000 and about to sell his house at a profit.

The U.S. attorney filed a lien on the debtor's escrow account for the sale of the house. Within two weeks, he had collected the entire amount

In another case, the OE was unable to collect \$3,500, plus interest, owed by a defaulter who was a professional basketball player, earning

about \$85,000 a year The case was given to a regional U.S. attorney who took legal steps to attach the man's wages. Repayments began last February Other aspects of OE's crackdown on defaulters

State Takes Look At Job Sharing


ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) - The Minnesota governor's office is looking at the idea of allowing two employees to share a single state job, in certain cases.





is the ingredients. "Most of the domestic beers have adjuncts like corn and rice instead of the pure ingredients we use: hops, yeast,

malt and water," Miss Stern says. She called domestic beer "a national disgrace," saying it contains "chemicals, stabilizers and all sorts of things" which hide the true, natural flavor of the brew. On the other hand, New Albion is "very flavorful and full-bodied. You can really taste the balance between the hops and the malt.

New Albion's ingredients may be pure and simple, but the brewing process is long and complex. A mash of flaked barley, malt and water is mixed in a tub and sits for three hours before it is 'sparged," or rinsed.

It flows into a brew kettle where it is boiled with fragrant hops for two hours and the mixture, called wort, is cooled. Then yeast is added, forming a frothy fluid which is left in a cool fermenting cellar for about 10 days. Commercial brews are fermented at lower temperatures to speed up the process, but the result is that carbonated taste," Miss Stern says.

The three work 12-hour days, brewing, bottling, cleaning and bookkeeping. New Albion turns out about 45-50 cases a week and sells them to Bay Area retailers at \$14.16 a case.



Officials Agree To Kill Birds

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Federal and state officials have reached agreement on a plan to kill thousands of blackbirds beginning their annual descent on western Kentucky and Tennessee.

Fish and Wildlife Service officials say the roosts of about 80 million red-wigned blackbirds, starlings, and other birds have begun to infringe on areas used for livestock, farming or housing.

In addition to crop losses, the birds are believed to present a health hazard because a fungus which thrives on their droppings causes a disease called histo-"While their population has not grown

since 1969, the birds are more concentrated, probably due to urbanization, loss of old habitat or climatic factors affecting their range," said the National Wildlife

Plans call for the spraying of the birds with a detergent called PA-14 which removes insulating oil from their feathers. William Spalsbury of the Fish and Wildlife Service's animal damage control section said the solution will be used on birds congregating in "critical" roosts.

The agency would have advocated consumer viewpoints before federal regulators, who now frequently hear only from the industry regulated. Another effort is expected in 1978 to pass the bill.



Neiman, a native of St. Paul, Minn., has been artist in residence for the New York Jets, recorded the Olympics, and the Ali-Frazier fights, and painted the stars of basketball, tennis and racing.

Neiman said the painting of Kentucky's team likely would focus on action around

Neiman declined to say how much Ashland Oil was paying him for the painting.



ax Officials Storm Carter With Protest Letters

WASHINGTON (AP) — Angry state tax officials are writing President Carter to protest a trade treaty with Great Britain that could deprive states of hundreds of millions of tax dollars from multinational

At issue is a treaty provision that would prohibit state auditors from considering the costs and profits of foreign subsidiaries in determining a company's taxes.

W.C. Strickland, Georgia state revenue commissioner, said this would allow multinationals to avoid state income tax payments by shifting profits to overseas affil-

The treaty, negotiated by the Treasury Department and now pending in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, would apply to British-based multinationals operating in this country. But state officials say that if British firms are granted the tax break, it soon will apply to all multin-

Most states now use some form of the so-called "unitary business doctrine," which considers all operations

But Treasury Department officials say the unitary doctrine is unfair to corporations because most taxing jurisdictions around the world use the "arms length" approach, in which a company reports only the income and costs that the firm considers relevant to its local operations. State officials argue that many corporations habitually underreport their tax liabilities under the arms-length system.

The unitary method has increased corporate tax liabilities wherever it has been used, indicating significant disagreement between tax officials and corporate officers as to what is taxable at a state level. State officials concede that the current unitary method needs refinement

But "any valid disagreement between the states and the multinationals must be resolved with compromise from both sides, not a total federal cave in to the desires of the multinationals." Strickland argued in a letter to Carter signed by officials from 12 states

The state officials are not the only ones lobbying on the issue. The multinationals are working for approval of the treaty and have mounted a campaign in California to repeal the unitary approach there.

In his letter, Strickland told the president that, "There is a movement afoot in your administration which will effectively tie the states' hands in coping with taxation of multinational corporations. 'This proposal is inconsistent with

your administration's stated goals for tax reform, especially when major beneficiaries would be multinational oil compa-

California, Oregon and Alaska rely heavily on the unitary approach, and the Western Governors Conference says the treaty would cost these three states an estimated \$150 million a year. Added Strickland, "One of our major

struggles as state tax officials is to enforce our laws as vigorously against the mighty as we do against the weak. The United Kingdom Treaty would set these efforts back 20 years.

His letter carried signatures from tax or revenue officers from Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Maryland, Montana, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon,

Additional letters to Carter were sent by officials from California, Minnesota, Washington and West Virginia, and from the governors of New Hampshire and

South Dakota.

The foreign relations committeee is an odd place for a tax controversy, and state officials are particularly upset that the federal government is working in this arena to limit their taxing authority, though some agree that the federal government should assume a role in creating a nationwide taxing system applying to firms in interstate and multinational commerce.

The Treasury Department has been recommending that a ban on the unitary approach be included in President Carter's tax revision package, which is being readied for Congress. The ban would be controversial, but not so controversial as

'This unprecedented action by the treaty negotiators to intrude upon the constitutionally separate tax systems of the states is the basic issue," says Fred E. Anderson of Colorado, the president of the National Conference of State Leg-

islatures. The conference voted unanimously to urge Senate rejection of the treaty provi-

Jonathan Rowe of the Multistate Tax Commission, a group representing 21 states, says approval of the treaty provision would mean "open season on the treaty process for the multinationals to resolve all their problems with the

Rowe's group favors use of the unitary method in every state to assure that corporations do not avoid tax liabilities.

Figures Show Increased Share Of Food Dollar For Middlemen

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government figures show that middlemen have increased their share of the consumer food dollar, particularly for such staple items as beef, pork and poultry.

The Agriculture Department says that in November the so-called farm-to-retail spread of prices for selected market basket food increased 1.7 percent from Octo-Put another way, farmers in November

received 38.5 cents of each \$1 spent for food in retail stores, while middlemen got 61.5 cents. In October, farmers got 39 cents and middlemen 61 cents.

The figures are based on a 65-item list of food items which originate on U.S. farms. Seafood, imported products and meals eaten away from home are not included in the analysis.

One of the long-time complaints of farmers is that consumers fail to understand fully that middlemen who transport, process and sell food after it leaves their farms accounts for most of the average family's grocery bill.

When the middleman price spread is measured another way, the gap between tarmers and consumers is even larger

This year, according to department fig-

ures, consumers will spend an estimated \$180 billion on farm-produced food. Of that, farmers are expected to get \$56 billion and middlemen \$124 billion

The expenditures are for all food purchased in 1977, including items bought in retail grocery stores and meals eaten away from home

Thus, if a hypothetical basket of food could be put together and sold for \$18 to reflect the total food spending of consumers this year, the farmers' share would be \$5.60 and middlemen would get \$12.40 On that basis, farmers this year are get-

ting 31.1 cents of each \$1 consumers spend on all food this year and middlemen 68.9 cents, compared to the 39 cents and 61 cents farmers and middlemen got respectively in November for the 65-item list of marketbasket groceries.

Officials said that the difference is due primarily to the added costs of serving od eaten in restaurants.

Meanwhile, the department's regular analysis of the 65-item marketbasket food list showed that retail beef prices edged higher last month to an average of almost \$1.42 a pound, measured on an all-cut basis. That was up four-tenths of a cent from October.

But the farm value of retail beef

dropped to 83.4 cents a pound from 84.4 in October. That meant that the middleman's share increased during the month to 58.5 cents from 57.1 cents in October, STORE

according to the report Farm value is not what farmers get for live cattle since it takes nearly 2.3 pounds of choice-grade steer to make one pound of supermarket beef. It is, however, the producer's share of what consumers pay for beef at store counters.

The retail price of pork also rose to more than \$1.27 a pound, a gain of sixtenths of a cent from October. The farm value was 70.3 cents, down from 72.7 in October, and the middleman share rose to 57.2 cents from 54.2 cents

Bergland Expects Hit At Import Restraints

WASHINGTON (AP) - Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland says the United States probably will be asked to ease some of its import restrictions on foreign goods if it wants to gain larger access for American farm products in the world

One item which is expected to come up when multinational trade talks enter a crucial phase in Geneva, Switzerland next months involves the possibility of more European dairy products entering

Electric Co-Op Says Sales Up WASHINGTON (AP) - The National

Rural Electric Cooperative Association says the crunch on world oil and gas reserves "has ominous implications" for agriculture and the ability of farmers to produce enough food in the future.

Robert D. Partridge, general manager of the association, said in the current issue of the organization's magazine that there is a clear trend toward higher electricity use by American farmers.

Natural gas, coal and other sources are used to generate electricity.

Power sales by member rural electric systems last year grew 9 percent, compared with an annual growth rate of about 6 percent for the electric utility industry as a whole, he said.

Thus, Partridge said, there should be 'a national energy priorities policy in fuel selection for electric generation" so that power output can be allocated "to assure the nation its essential needs will

Bergland told reporters recently that while specific demands of the European Community have not been spelled out, he thinks that those will be included in negotiations on dairy products.

They have more than a million tons of non-fat dry milk accumulated in the community. They have cheese and butter in substantial amounts," Bergland said. "In fact, they are putting \$3 billion community funding into the export subsidy on dairy products this year alone.

Thus, Bergland said, the Europeans "will want to talk with us about market access" for dairy products, particularly

This "becomes sensitive and difficult here in the United States because we too have an abundance of non-fat dry milk and some classes of cheese and butter," Bergland said.

But we could talk with them seriously about increased imports of certain of their specialty cheeses that are not produced in the United States. They are competitive in a rough way, but not directly," he said.

An 18-year-old Lubbock Independent School District employee remains in city iail today in connection with the Christmas Day slaying of a Lubbock man.

The suspect, who had not been formally charged by late this morning, was arrested minutes after police found Clifton Ray Casbeer, 21, of 3214 23rd St. slumped across his car steering wheel about 11:45 p.m. Sunday near the University Avenue-4th Street intersection.

Justice of the Peace L.J. Blalack pronounced Casbeer dead at the scene from a single gunshot wound under the left armpit. Blalack ruled Casbeer's death homicide, the 32nd of the year.

Police said the death is believed to be the result of a fight between Casbeer and several Mexican-American men in the 2500-block of 4th Street minutes before the fatal shooting.

The fight began, witnesses reportedly told police, just after Casbeer's car was seen driving through a predominantly Mexican-American neighborhood

Casbeer reportedly was chased to the site of the fight. A witness told police he drove by the area in time to watch the scuffle. He said he honked his horn in an attempt to chase the men away, but upon seeing the men were not leaving, he turned the car around and began going

Before he arrived, he said, he saw the men get back into their yellow Chevrolet Nova and take off. Seconds later, Casbeer reportedly climbed back into his auto and began driving west on 4th Street.

The victim had driven only half a block. the witness said, before his car went out of control, swerved to the left, drove through a fence and across a median before landing in the eastbound lane of

Blalack said the shot was fired just before the two cars began leaving the scene of the fight.

The suspect in custody and seven other persons were stopped minutes later at the intersection of Avenue Q and 4th Street. However, the seven other persons were released after being questioned, police said.

Services for the Lubbock native will be at 1 p.m. Wednesday in the Franklin-Bartley Funeral Home Chapel, with the Rev. J.R. Anderson, pastor of the Full Gospel Church here, officiating,

Burial will be in the City of Lubbock Cemetery under direction of Franklin-Bartley Funeral Home.

Casbeer was a 1975 graduate of Lubbock High School and a member of the Plains Christian Church in Eagle Pass. Survivors include his parents. Mr. and

Brutal Murder Of Lubbockite Still Mystery

man who was found Saturday stabbed and stuffed in the trunk of his car south of Lubbock remains a mystery to county

Sheriff's deputies said the body of William Drew Young III of 6305 Knoxville Drive was discovered about 10:20 p.m. after two boys called Department of Public Safety troopers to report a car on fire eight-tenths of a mile south of FM 1585 on Avenue P

Firemen were called to the scene, and DPS troopers notified sheriff's office

Young's body was discovered in the trunk of the vehicle soon after the flames were doused, but officials said the flames succesfully obstructed attempts to determine exactly when or how the man was killed.

Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy, who ruled Young's death homicide, said the man was struck or possibly stabbed three times in the head with a large metal object much like a crowbar or a tire

LeCroy said the man may have died from the beating, the stab wounds, from suffocation in the fire's smoke or from burns suffered in the blaze

Sir Charles - who died in his sleep Christmas Day at the age of 88 surrounded by his wife, Oona, seven of their eight children and a son by a previous marriage - had always insisted he wanted no

Lady Oona carried out his wish by planning a private ceremony in the tiny cemetery of Corsier overlooking Lake Geneva and not far from the 20-room mansion where they have lived since 1952.

Swiss police said Lady Oona - Chaplin was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II in 1975 - asked them to keep out everyone except the immediate family, the Chaplins' doctor and household mem-

The eighth of their children, actress Geraldine, was away filming a movie in Madrid. In all, Chaplin had 10 children and four wives.

News of Chaplin's death from old age brought worldwide tributes and eulogies for the "Little Tramp," the baggyclothed character with a button mustache, windmill cane and waddle

Peking's official New China News Agency praised Chaplin as a "famous film star." whose "progressive activities in the cultural field made him a victim of the McCarthy witch hunt period."

Vatican Radio said Chaplin had "attained unsurpassable heights as an artist, creator and director," and news of his death was plastered across the front pages of nearly every European newspa-

In Vietnam HONG KONG (UPI) - A top Vietnam

official has conceded that the nation has misused its labor force and said an extra 780,000 people will be put to work in 1978 to repair the faltering economy and speed up production.

The biggest increase in the work force will be in the agricultural field, where 600,000 people will be put to work producing more food, said Vice Premier Le Thanh Nghi, Vietnam's chief economic supervisor.

Nghi outlined the changes in a lengthy report to the current session of the Vietnamese National Assembly meeting in Hanoi. It was broadcast today by Hanoi Nghi said misuse of manpower was one

of the reasons Vietnam had to call for emergency aid from China, the Soviet Union and other communist countries to make up for food shortages in 1977.

"We must quickly, satisfactorily and fully use the social labor force so the state can vigorously and directly encourage production and mobilize great quantities of goods." Nghi said.

"In 1978, we must actively assign manpower to various economic sectors and satisfactorily use the labor force with a higher norm of working time than at pre-Nghi said the agricultural labor force in

Vietnam, a nation of 50 million people, will be increased from 11.5 million in 1977 to 11.8 million in 1978 - most of them in the field of animal husbandry. Another 310,000 workers will be added to the industrial and handicrafts sectors,

130,000 to the forestry sector and 40,000 to the fishery sector, Nghi said. Nghi warned that the manpower plan will be monitored carefully, saying,

"State inspection and guidance must be strengthened and deviations in implementing the plan must be promptly cor-In another broadcast, Hanoi radio said all draft-age males in Saigon must regis-

ter for possible military conscription by Jan. 4. Recent travelers from Vietnam have said males aged 16 through 45 are eligible for the draft.

Honda Reports Recall Plan

TOKYO (AP) - Honda Motor Co. of Japan said today it will recall more than 2 million motorcycles with defective fuel tank caps and 830,000 passenger cars with a defective exhaust gas control switch.

Honda officials said the motorcycles included "Honda Dream" and "Honda Benly" models produced between March 1969 and July 1977. Of the total, 1,390,000 motorcycles were exported to the United States and 520,000 others were exported mainly to Europe, Canada and Australia, the officials said.

The defect is a fuel tank cap which might open when a motorcycle falls, resulting in fire, the officials said. They said the defective part will be re-

placed starting next March. The officials said the defective passenger cars included "Honda Civic" and 'Honda Accord' models produced between December 1973 and August 1977.







Sadat Dampens Peace Talk

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat was quoted today as saying that Israel, under the leadership of Prime Minister Mena-hem Begin, has not yet made the tough decisions or concessions needed to bring about a Middle East peace.

The two leaders held a Christmas summit in Ismailia, Egypt, and came away still divided over the future of Palestinian Arabs living on the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River and Gaza

"No, Israel has not yet taken the difficult decision," Sadat was quoted by Egyptian newspapers as saying. "Mr. Begin may be of the view that he has made

concessions, but I see that he has not." West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt arrived in Cairo today for talks with Sadat and a briefing on the Ismailia summit, becoming the first foreign leader to personally hear the Egyptian's lead-

Begin proposed self-rule for the 1.1 mil-

Bank and Gaza Strip with continued Israeli military presence. Sadat held out for creation of an independent Palestinian state and complete Israeli withdrawal.

The semi-official Egyptian newspaper Al Ahram reported that the summit talks did produce agreement on Israeli withdrawal from the occupied Sinai Peninsula. Israeli troops still control more than 80 per cent of the 20,000 square mile Egyptian desert peninsula.

The newspaper said Israel wanted to announce the Egyptian-Israeli accord publicly but Sadat refused, saying their summit talks were aimed not at reaching a private agreement but a comprehensive

In Moscow, the Communist Party newspaper Pravda called the Sadat-Begin summit a failure and said that the only way to achieve an overall settlement is for all parties and their "allies" to coop-The newspaper claimed the Israeli

prime minister presented warmed-over peace proposals. "All gestures by Cairo were viewed in Tel Aviv as a sign of weakness and readiness to make considerable concessions

Israeli newspapers were split on the success of the Ismailia talks and Arabic language newspapers in Cairo stressed their positive aspects.

The Israeli afternoon daily Yediot Ahranot said the meeting was unsuccessful and claimed "Sadat didn't move despite far-reaching Israeli concessions." Maariv called the summit a success "just byvirtue of having taken place.

While some motorists will be registering their cars for as much as 18 months, others will be registering for only seven (or even less if they exercise their option to register for, say, only one or two months).

"The price of registering your car has not gone up. It's still the same as it was last year - on an annual basis," said Dixie Jean Thompson, Hardin's deputy in charge of vehicle registration.

People will be paying the same amount per month as they did last year. But in this transition phase, some people will be registering for more than a full year and others for less than a full year, she said.

Hardin said his office will begin processing vehicle registration renewals in January, a month earlier than usual.

He urged Lubbock County car owners to bring their renewal notices to the tax office, located on the first floor of the Lubbock County Courthouse, 904 Broadway, as soon as they are received through the mail.

Hardin said persons owning more than one vehicle probably will not be able to have the same registration date for their cars. Even under the same ownership, some cars will have to be renewed in different months than others

iff Randy Howard reported. The sheriff said Cochran, 30, and the other inmate, tentatively identified as Michael Proctor, sawed the lock to their cell door and ran out of the jail about

7:45 a.m. Initial reports said they escaped in an automobile, but sheriff's officers said they were searching nearby woods where they were believed to be hiding.

The sheriff said that Cochran's wife, Mary Sue, who had visited the jail Monday, was taken into custody at a bus station in Americus shortly after the break. Howard said Mrs. Cochran was being held for questioning and had not been

charged. Cochran, from Americus, was convicted Oct. 25 of eight counts of aggravated assault in the July 2 incident which injured 32 persons, many of them reporters

covering the KKK rally. The trial was highlighted by testimony from Carter's mother, Lillian, who said she was watching part of the rally from a distance but left when trouble broke out.

Cochran was sentenced on Nov. 17 to 12 years in prison and 8 additional years on probation

His attorney argued during the trial that Cochran suffered from temporary insanity and he was given a psychiatric examination. However, the test results said that Cochran suffered no mental disorders and that he was "functioning in a normal range of intelligence function-

"At some point in the future, the Soviets could relatively quickly provide themselves with greater capabilities against the United States by upgrading SS-20 deployment to the SS-16," Brown said then. The United States is developing a possi-

Mostly confined to the eastern part of the country, the unusual cold stretched from the extreme South to the North. A hard freeze damaged much of Florida's citrus crop, with some growers even witnessing snow on their trees.

In the North, the upstate New York city of Buffalo was paralyzed. On Jan. 28, a 17-hour blizzard added four inches of snow to the 37 inches already on the ground. Thirteen people died there that weekend

Particularly hard hit were poor people in central cities, who shivered in freezing homes, their deliveries of fuel oil blocked by weather and their inability to pay.

When it was all over, the typical U.S. household had spent \$139 more for heat than in a normal winter.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Carter's top aides have upset Washington's social arbiters. It seems they don't socialize enough.

It also appears the Georgia "mafia' is too casual in dress and language for the Capital's socially elite, who like to adorn their parties with those in power.

Part of the criticism rises from the refusal of some Carter aides to play the game of who you know and who you are seen talking to. Old political and diplomatic pros of years in Washington say they should get out and hobnob with influential outsiders.





Other victims included several teenagers, a pedestrian and a motorcycle



West used the power of suggestion to deflect declarer from the winning path, with the result that a seemingly impregnable no trump game went down to

Despite his good fivecard suit, we approve of South's decision to rebid two no trump rather than two hearts. It is far more descriptive. However, as the cards lie, a contract of four hearts would have proved easier than three no trump.

West made his normal lead of the fourth best of his longest and strongest suit. Declarer correctly held up the ace until the third round, discarding a club from dummy. There were eight tricks on top, and the ninth could come from either minor. However, West had to be kept off lead, for if he regained the lead. he could probably cash enough spades to defeat the contract. Therefore, declarer decided that it was better to play for split diamond honors, for by taking two diamond finesses he could keep the lead in the East hand

At trick four declarer led a low diamond. Against routine defense, declarer would coast home. When West follows with a low diamond, the finesse of the ten loses to the king. The best East can do is shift to a club, but declarer rises with the ace,

repeats the diamond finesse and ends up with ten tricks. Unfortunately for de-

clarer, West came up with a brilliant counter-maneuver. He followed to the first diamond lead with the queen!

This gave declarer the impression that West held both missing diamond honors. So, taking a different tack, declarer won the ace of diamonds in dummy and ran the queen of clubs. A grateful West gathered in the king of clubs, cashed his two spade tricks and then led a diamond to his partner's king for a two-trick set.

"You can't blame all illness on old age," said Dr. J.J. Cohen, the center's assistant director who is approaching 70 himself. "Too noony things have been brushed under the rug with the comment, 'You're old, what do you expect?'

To fight senility - the disease of old age which strikes one of every five persons over 65 - the center obtained a \$200,000 grant for a pioneering three-year study to examine the best way to treat America's growing senior citizen population, which today numbers 22 million persons over 65.

NEW YORK (WNS) - In sub-freezing weather, whipped by wind, they wait in a long line - for what? A hit play? A hit movie? No. They are inching toward the Museum of Modern Art (MOMA) and its record-toppling exhibition, "Cezanne:

more than 100 Cezanne oils and watercolors, dating from 1895 to his death in 1906, are luminously assembled here. The oils are valued at more than a million dollars each.

tempted," said John Rewald, an authority on Paul Cezanne. "Never before has one taken this segment of Cezanne's production, the last 10 years, the most important period of his life, when he made his most decisive contribution."

The unparelleled nature of the event, plus the glowing reviews, have drawn crowds, which at times, engulf the museum. Not since MOMA opened in 1929 has an exhibit been seen by as many, an

In pursuit of significant works, John Rewald was dispatched to the Soviet Un-

"I was turned down cold on the one picture I wanted in Moscow. They said it couldn't leave the country, but they're sending it to Paris.

"At the Hermitage in Leningrad we got four pictures we wanted. And I met the woman who translated two of my books into Russian.

Rewald has a retreat, a medieval fortress, not far from Cezanne's birthplace at Aix-en-Provence. Cezanne had his first one-man exhibition in Paris at the age of

"Cezanne's early exhibitions were ridiculed, the majority of the press derided him," he said. "He had some means so he could live. If he'd had to live on what he earned, he would have starved. He was a difficult, shy, withdrawn man. He had been hurt and he often compensated by an abrupt aggressiveness.

Country Admits Border Dispute

HONG KONG (UPI) - Cambodia today admitted border problems with Vietnam at the site of a former U.S. Marine Corps base in the region known as the "Parrot's Beak" during the Indochinese

Reports from the U.S. State Department said there have been border clashes between the two communist countries in the Neak Luong area, 100 miles east of Phnom Penh and about 50 miles from

Recent travelers from Vietnam have reported that clashes in the disputed region have claimed more than 2,500 casualties on both sides.

Official Phnom Penh broadcasts monitored in Hong Kong said Cambodian army "combatants stationed in Neak Luong... guard and patrol the borders land and water — with a lofty sense of sacrifice and revolutionary heroism..." The only other military forces that have

access to the area are the Vietnamese. But Radio Phnom Penh did not mention the Vietnamese by name in the broad-

During the U.S. intervention into Cambodia in 1970, the U.S. Marines set up a temporary base at Neak Luong, a sand spit on the Mekong River. The base was subsequently turned over to the anticommunist South Vietnamese

southwest of Saigon have been evacuated because of shellings from across the Cambodian frontier.

Referring to the border difficulties and obviously the Vietnamese, Radio Phnom Penh said "enemies of all stripes still nurture strategic designs to topple our Cambodian revolution and worker-peasant revolutionary administration and to make Cambodia their new colony forev-

Cambodia claims that the war-ravaged area has recovered from the Indochina battles and said it has made the once abandoned fields once there among the most productive in what is now officially 'Democratic Cambodia.'

"Along with these noble main tasks, our revolutionary army combatants in the Neak Luong sector also have joined in the effort to transform the appearance of the sector and strived to support themselves and contribute to building the country with a lofty sense of sacrifice and revolutionary heroism," the broadcasts

The Cambodians along the Vietnamese frontier are working "to contribute to building and making the country strong and prosperous with a great leap for-ward," the broadcast concluded.

Group Notes Gains In Civil Freedom

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Only a third of the world's nations are free even though political and civil freedom increased in 1977 for a quarter of the human race, according to a survey by Freedom House, a private group concerned

Major gains in political and civil freedom were made in India and Spain, the group said, but personal freedom declined in nine countries with a population of 123.8 million people. "The significant gains coincided with President Carter's human rights initia-tives," said John Richardson Jr., Free-

dom House president. "While only some expanded rights are directly due to U.S. policies, the great attention paid human rights by American

leaders provided an unusually favorable environment for freedom." Freedom House Executive Director Leonard Sussman singled out press freedom as a particularly critical issue and said despite the generally improved climate for personal liberty, "press free-dom faced growing threats."

Conditions were said to have improved for the news media in India, Spain, Egypt, Ghana, Kuwait, Panama, Senegal, Sri Lanka and Taiwan.

Elections in India, which restored pol-

itical rights to 622 million people, were responsible for much of the increase in freedom reported by the surey.

The survey also found improved situations in Spain and said 40.4 million people in Ghana, Kuwait, Madagascar, Nepal and Syria all moved from "not free" to "partly free." It said personal freedom declined in

two countries listed as free, Malta and Jamaica, and one listed as partly free, South Africa. Freedom declined further in six countries already listed as not free - Angola, Argentina, Burma, Congo, Equatorial Guinea, and Ethiopia.

The survey said that a year ago only 19.6 percent of the world's people were regarded as free.

Freedom House listed 44 nations as free: Australia, Austria, Bahamas, Barbados, Belgium, Botswana, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, Djibouti, Fiji, Finland, France, Gambia, West Germany, Greece, Grenada, India, Ireland, Iceland, Israel, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Luxembourg, Malta, Mauritius, Nauru, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Papua-New Guinea, Portugal, Spain, Sri Lanka, Surinam, Sweden, Switzerland, Trinidad & Tobago, Turkey, United Kingdom, United States and Ven-

Japan To Resume Talks On Trade With U.S.

By MASASHI KURAMITSU

TOKYO (UPI) — Japan decided today to resume talks with the United States this week to settle bilateral trade difficulties, government sources said.

The sources said the decision was reached at a meeting between Prime Minister Takeo Fukuda and five key cabinet ministers.

The focal point of discussions will be how much Japan can yield to U.S. demands for increasing imports of American dairy and farm products. The current trade difficulties between

the two nations stemmed from Japan's swollen trade surplus with the United States that is estimated to have reached \$10 billion this year. The Japanese government hopes to straighten out the trade dispute as soon

as possible to avoid a rupture in overall

U.S. Japanese relations, the sources said. They said Japan plans to offer additional concessions to the United States on issues involving Japanese imports of highgrade beef, oranges and citrus juice.

Agriculture-Korestry Minister Ichiro Nakagawa told newsmen after the meeting that preliminary talks would be resumed in a few days through diplomatic

Naakagawa said Japan hopes to settle the issue by the end of this year to pave the way for a visit to Japan by President Carter's special trade negotiator, Robert Strauss, early next month. Strauss said earlier he would not come

to Japan unless his trip would help settle the trade dispute. The United States was not satisfied

with a Japanese concession package tak-en to Washington this month by Nobuhiko Ushiba, former Japanese ambassador to the United States who was named minister in charge of external trade affairs in a cabinet reshuffle Nov. 28 The package of measures called for the

removal or lowering of import tariffs on certain industrial products and expansion of import quotas for farm goods. A representative of the ruling Liberal-

Grain Harvest Stable In China By CHARLES R. SMITH

HONG KONG (UPI) - China today re-

ported its grain production did not rise in 1977, only a year after a grain shortage forced the world's most populous nation to go on one of the biggest grain-buying sprees in history A report by the official New China

News Agency blamed the worst weather since the Communist takeover in 1949 droughts, cold weather and floods - for the poor crop of rice, wheat and other grains. It was the first time in recent years that China reported no growth in its grain harvest, and economist specializing in

Chinese affairs said it would probably

lead to large-scale wheat purchases abroad. China's 1976 grain output was 290 million tons, 2 percent higher than 1975. But during the last two harvests, China's population of about 800 million people grew

by an estimated 35 million. Since November of 1976, China has been buying foreign wheat in record quantities - about 11 million tons, mostly from Canada and Australia. This wheat was for delivery up to mid-summer of 1978.

"China reaped a fairly good harvest this year," the news agency said. "Annual grain output reached last year's lev-

el, and output of such industrial crops as cotton, jute, ambary hemp, cured tobacco and tea went up.

As usual, the Chinese gave no detailed statistics. The drought covered much of the most important grain-producing areas. Hard-

est hit was Honan, the biggest producer of wheat in the country, where there was "no rain or snow for over 200 days," the agency said. Drought was so severe in seven north China provinces that special anti-drought headquarters were established and 140

regiments of the Chinese army "took

part in the mammoth battle against the

prolonged dry spell." "At the height of the battle, government offices, schools and enterprises in many towns closed their doors to join in the fight in the daytime and carried on their routine work in the evenings," the report said.

Show Takes New Look At Aliens

By JOAN HANAUER NEW YORK (UPI) - Los Angeles was Mexican for almost 200 years and it is becoming increasingly Mexican again - in large degree because of the illegal aliens who have crossed the border to find

The aliens - or undocumented people, as they also are called - are the subject of Bill Moyers' latest "CBS Reports: The Aliens," to be broadcast tonight at 7 p.m.

Moyers' attitude is frankly sympathetic and his aim obviously is to remove what he considers misconceptions about illegal

Moyers doesn't attempt to give the big picture, but instead focuses his camera crews on Los Angeles and the Mexicans who come there hoping to find work. And that in itself is a change from the old picture of "wetbacks" coming into the United States as migrant agricultural work-

"Historically, they came to work Cali-fornia farms," Moyers says. "But now more and more are coming to Los Angeles, making it the world's third largest Mexican city.

"They are Mexico's best; her potential middle class: poor, but ambitious and willing to take risks. They would prefer to stay home, but their country has no future for them. Mexico is producing poor people at the world's highest rate. And human beings have become her cheap ex-

In one Los Angeles neighborhood alone, of 200,000 residents, perhaps 100,-000 are "undocumenteds."

Why do they come? Moyers talked to three brothers who are illegal immigrants from San Juan de los Lagos in north central Mexico. Their father was a migrant worker on California farms but. as Moyers says, "his children are neither farm workers nor migrants. The three brothers in Los Angeles have come to stay." One of them told of his early life in Mexico, then said:

"But I like the United States, too, because if you work, if you like your work, you can have everything you want. That's a good reason to me. In Mexico, you can work as hard as you want; if you don't have a business for yourself, you don't have nothing."

As Moyers explains, the "undocumenteds" often are too afraid of deportation to apply for welfare - they even are too frightened to ask for unemployment compensation when they are entitled to it. They do occupy jobs that might be held by unemployed Americans — except few Americans would take such jobs. Would the employers then pay more or transfer manufacturing operations to

foreign countries where labor is cheap? The aliens' children, if born here, are American citizens. The parents may try to keep their Mexican identity but, Moyers notes in describing one family, the children are becoming "irreversibly American.

Pinup Calendars Still Good Business

NEW YORK (UPI) - Pinup calendars of pretty girls in bikinis still are wonderful sellers of a wide variety of products and some millions of them have been distributed in recent weeks.

They're not quite as populur as they were 20 years ago, according to the Advertising Specialties Association of Chicago, trade association for the calendar industry. But Karl Keck, advertising manager of Ridge Tool Co. of Elyria, Ohio, member of the Emerson Electric Co. group, swears by them.

Keck distributes about 650,000 two-year pinup calendars every other year at a cost of half a million dollars and he says they are by far Ridge's best promotional tool.

However, pinups no longer are the biggest part of the wall calendar business, which is expected to run about \$345 million next year, up 15 percent from 1977. Seascapes, landscapes, Currier & Ives' prints and other art work, exceed them in popularity

The association spokesman said he believes the ubiquitous presence of pinup girls in Playboy, Penthouse and other popular magazines, including those that are openly pornographic, had hurt the legitimate pinup calendar sales.

Nevertheless, Keck said, for something like hand tools and small power tools, you just can't beat a pinup calendar. It gets attention and it keeps Ridge's company name right where the mechanics will see it every day all year round. The twelve pages for the months also serve as handsomely illustrated catalogue of Ridge products.

Which brings up the possibly surprising fact that photos of the pinup girls, handsomely done as they are, normally represent about the smallest part of the calendar's cost, less than a tenth of the total cost, sometimes less than the postage to mail them.



Secretary General Kurt Waldheim took the first step toward international action against terrorism in 1972 following the massacre of the Israeli Olympic team in Munich. Waldheim requested the General Assembly urgently discuss what could be done to prevent similar acts in the fu-

The United States followed up by drafting an international agreement to curb terrorism and submitting it in the Assem-

But all efforts ran into an ever-recurring, stubborn obstacle: the Third World demand that national liberation movements and their activities be exempted from all measures against criminal ter-

The same obstacle still is holding up real progress in the United Nations toward measures that would pull the rug from under any potential terrorist by threatening him with punishment wherever he may seek a haven.

In its past session the Assembly decided to continue two special committees which have been trying to determine a possible course of action.

The first committee, established five years ago, is formed by 35 nations and devoted to all forms of international terrorism. Its official mandate is to "study the underlying causes of terrorism and then recommend practical measures to combat terrorism.

The committee is not expected to come up in the foreseeable future with a generally acceptable draft agreement that could stop international terrorism in its

More hopeful work is being done by the second special committee, which is drafting an international convention against hostage taking, particularly aerial hijack-

West Germany proposed this special approach last year under the impact of new hijackings and the capture by terrorists of ministerial delegates to the conference of the Organization of Petroleum **Exporting Countries.**

With substantial support also from some Third World countries, the Germans submitted an international draft convention against the taking of hostages. It promptly ran into the old de-mand: national liberation movements must be exempted.

The 34-nation committee will concentrate in the coming year on refining the draft article by article to adapt it to Third World wishes without drastically weak-ening its punch. The Germans feel they will have a generally acceptable treaty within a few years.

Perhaps the most effective action against terrorism by the Assembly was a spur-of-the-moment appeal Nov. 3 to all nations to unite and end the threat of air

hijackings. It came in the wake of the hijacking of a West German Lufthansa airliner, the killing of its pilot by the terrorists and its recapture by German commandos in Mo-

gadishu, Somalia. The appeal resulted in the strengthen-ing of airport security measures in many countries. It also induced the international airline pilots association to cancel a 48hour global protest strike. But the resolution will have no lasting effect.



Act Grant Access To Credit Files Provisions

Associated Press Writer If you've ever taken out a loan, used a charge card or bought something on the installment plan, at least one of the 2,000 credit bureaus in the country probably has a file on you.

And if you ever want to take out another loan, use another charge card or make purchase on the installment plan, the information in that file may determine whether you are allowed to.

Credit bureaus are agencies which collect information on you and your credit history. They do not rate you as satisfactory or unsatisfactory. That is a decision to be made by the potential credit gran-

ter — the bank, department store, etc. The bureaus get their information from you - on forms you fill out when applying for credit - and from credit granters the file with you and tell you where the

you have dealt with in the past.

Your chances of getting credit are better if you have always paid bills promptly, but other factors may be taken into account. The credit granter may, for instance, think you already owe as much money as you can afford, even if you are not delinquent in payments.

Until recently, credit bureau files remained pretty much of a mystery to consumers. Now, however, you have the right to know what is in your file and to have it corrected if there is an error.

Provisions of the Fair Credit Reporting Act require any lender who turns you down for credit to tell you why. If the rejection is based on information in your credit file, the lender must provide the name and address of the bureau holding the file. The bureau, in turn, must review

Credit files should not be confused with investigative reports prepared for insurance companies and others, including potential employers. The investigative reports often include interviews with neighbors and others on such things as moral character. Credit bureaus do not provide that kind of information.

According to Associated Credit Bureaus. Inc., a trade association representing most of the nation's major credit bureaus, your credit record will include your name, your address and your employer, job and salary. If you are applying for a joint account, the file may include information on jobs and salaries of both

The payment record lists the kind of business involved, the date the account was opened, the date of the last sale, the date the transaction was reported your credit limit, the amount owed, the amount past due and the terms of saie

and usual manner of payment The first and last items are listed in a

file, tell the credit bureau which will look kind of code which is explained on the back of the form. Under "kind of business," for example, you might find "C-359." The letter refers to the fact that the credit was granted by a clothing store; the number indicates a particular store; you will have to ask the bureau for the

Under terms of sale and usual manner of payment you might find something like "R-\$10-1." This translates making regular payments of \$10 and has paid the account within 30 days of billing or as otherwise agreed.

Most credit bureaus use a rating of from one to nine to indicate how promptly bills are paid; the lower the number, the better. A "nine" usually means the bill has been listed as a bad debt and placed in the hands of a collection agency. A law taking effect in March 1978 imposes new restrictions on debt collectors to prevent them from harassing consum-

Information on a bad debt does not have to haunt you for the rest of your life, however. The law limits reporting of adverse information to seven years with the exception of bankruptcies which may be included for a period of up to 14 years. And the credit bureaus association says most firms base their credit decisions on your record over the last three to five



Woman In

SALEM, Mass. (UPI) - Mrs. Esther Piotrowicz, terminally ill and in a coma for nearly two years, was reported in stable condition today after doctors disconnected her life-sustaining equipment.

Mrs. Piotrowicz, 55, who weighs only 75 pounds and suffers from a degenerative disease of the nervous system, was connected to a respirator at Salem Hospital 10 days ago because she suffered cardiac arrest

At the request of Walter Piotrowicz, her husband, Essex County Probate Court Henry Mayor Friday ruled that the system may be shut off at Piotrowicz' discretion. Family lawyer Philip Roy said the system was disconnected at 9 a.m. Monday, but said Mrs. Piotrowicz continued breathing.

She is still the same. Her condition is stable," a hospital spokeswoman said shortly after midnight, 15 hours later.

Mrs. Piotrowicz was stricken with Huntington's Chorea, a disease of the nervous system, seven years ago. She was hospitalized in 1973.

Roy said there is little chance of a remission once the disease sets in, a fact that doctors related in court Friday when Mayor rendered his decision.



"We have got the game breaker we have needed," said Dallas quarterback Roger Staubach, who froze Chicago with play action fakes to Dorsett to post 134 yards passing, including a 28-yard touch-down pass to tight end Billy Joe DuPree.

Dorsett, the All-American from Pittburgh who gained 1,008 yards in his initial NFL campaign, was swarmed by the media in the Cowboy dressing room after the one-sided game.

"The playoffs are really a different sea-. the atmosphere in the locker room is really different," said Dorsett, a millionaire. "Of course, there's extra money involved."

Dorsett gained 85 yards on 17 carries, including touchdown gallops of 22 and 7 yards. The numbers for Payton were 60 yards on 19 tries, no touchdowns or dizzi-

"I have a lot of respect for Walter Pay-

sett. "He's a great runningback, there's no professional jealousy between us."

In the Bears locker room, Payton was trying to find his head. He had been gangtackled by three or four Cowboys on almost every down.

"I got hit in the head and I just don't remember nothing," said Payton. "I feel real bad. I wish you fellows would give me a break. Maybe then I could get

Chicago linebacker Doug Buffone said, "With Dorsett around you can't concentrate on any one thing . . . they come at you from every direction."

Charlie Waters intercepted Chicago's Bob Avellini three times as the Cowboys advanced to their sixth NFC champion-

Dorsett's influence was evident at the fullback position where Robert Newhouse tore through gaping holes for 80 yards as the Bears looked for last year's Heisman Trophy winner.

Dallas piled up a 17-0 halftime lead on Doug Dennison's 2-yard touchdown run, Staubach's pass to DuPree and a 21-yard chip shot, the first of three Efren Herrera field goals.

Dorsett's two TD runs and field goals of 31 and 27 yards by Herrera completed the Cowboys slaughter in the second half.

Chicago got a consolation touchdown late in the fourth quarter on Avellini's 34yard pass to Steve Schubert.

"This has to be our best game of the year," said Dallas Coach Tom Landry. Every phase of our game was excellent, from our offense to the defense and specialty teams. Newhouse was just exceptional . . . they may have been gearing too See COWBOYS Page 2

presidential election in 1980, either! Waters didn't need to worry about his disclosure of team secrets, though, because quarterback Roger Staubach came right out with it a

few minutes later. "Now we have to beat Los Angeles," said the scrambler to a horde of shocked newsmen. Roger obviously was relishing the thought of revenge against the Rams, even at the risk of giving the Vikings a choice clipping for their bulletin board this week.

TO UNDERSTAND the Cowboys' thirst for vengeance, one has to go back to that playoff game a year ago when the Rams edged out the 'Pokes 14-12 at Dallas. The Cowboys' great defense kept them in the game, despite the failure of the offense to produce points on the scoreboard.

Thanks to the Doomsday guys, though, the 'Pokes still had a chance late in the game after Waters blocked another Ram punt. Staubach passed to Butch Johnson in the end zone for what could have been the winner, but Butch couldn't get both feet down before going out of bounds.

Facing fourth down, Staubach passed to tight end Billy Joe DuPree at the sixyard line and it looked like more than enough for the first. But two Ram defenders picked DuPree up and slammed him down on the eight. An official came running in and marked the ball exactly where B.J. was sitting with the ball in his lap. No forward progress at all!

When the chain came out, Dallas was a foot short and there went the ol' ball game and a shot at the Super Bowl.

1T HAS BEEN a long wait for the Cowboys, but they won't get their chance for revenge after all. Those amazing Minnesota Vikings took care of that by upsetting the Rams 14-7 in the Mud Bowl at Los Angeles Coliseum, of all places.

The Vikes brought their own weather with them, apparently. It was like one of those old NFL films showing the Bears beating the Redskins 53-0 or something, with Red Grange or Ernie Nevers galloping through the goo. Mud covered the uniforms and players slipped and sprawled in the muck. Ballearriers risked death by drowning after being tackled in the middle of the field,

which resembled a giant chocolate pie. Not surprisingly, the Vikings showed a lot more savvy in the soup than did the Hollywood heroes. The Minnesota gridders, veterans of arctic winds and frozen fields, were not at all dismayed by a little slush.





An intriguing New Year's Day bill of fare, indeed, fitting subjects for Jimmy the Greek, psychologists and the millions of rocking chair buffs.

The Dallas Cowboys are the ice crushers in this bizarre scenario. Cold, seemingly bereft of emotion, they take large hunks of opponents and grind them up into small cubes - as in Monday's 37-7 rout of Walter Payton and the Chicago

They didn't emerge from a womb, as do mere mortals. They are products of IBM. From austere, unsmiling Coach

Tom Landry, striding the sidlines in his pork-pie hat, dapper suit and tie, to Roger Staubach, the methodical field general. Theirs is an excercise in expert execution and precision.

They disdain the old whoop 'em up college try. They are computerized. Touch a button and Staubach hits Drew Pearson in a seam for 15 yards. A little Houdini sleight of hand and Tony Dorsett and Robert Newhouse follow an open road for 20 more. There is a dynamite fuse at every position.

A thumbnail analysis; Main liability: Possible absence of fire. Chief asset: Talent and organization.

The one team able to match Dallas in experience and resourcefulness is the Minnesota Vikings, who proved it with a 14-7 upset victory over the Los Angeles Rams on a drenched

The Vikings have made the playoffs in nine of the last 10 years and are one step away from their fifth appearance in the Super Bowl, which they have never won. They inevitably have suffered from "big gameitis."

Now with back-up quarterback Bob Lee, filling in for the injured Fran Tarkenton, Chuck Foreman carrying the ball with his usual frenzy and the fabled "Purple People-Eaters" hungrier than ever, the Vikings are out to quell charges that they are chokers.

Main liability: Big game complex. Chief asset: Chuck Foreman. Whichever of the two survives - Cowboys or Vikings,

there is little to look forward to in the Jan. 15 Super Bowl at New Orleans

The defending champion Oakland Raiders, a wild flying wild-card qualifier, exemplify the trademark code of the American Football Conference - forget caution, storm the bastions, Heaven help the hindmost.

In another era, the Raiders would have been riverboat gamblers and barroom brawlers. They would have worn zoot suits with gold chains dangling to their kneecaps. The bearded maverick, Ken Stabler, and sure-handed Fred Biletnikoff can pick your pockets and you don't feel a thing.

It's a tough talented team that plays and lives with wild abandon.

Main liability: Looseness. Chief asset: Versatility. The Raiders face a different kind of challenge in the Denver Broncos, a team of retreads who found a magic potion in the rare chemistry of fierce team spirit and exuberant fan

Quarterback Craig Morton was cast off by the Cowboys and the New York Giants, place-kicker Jim Turner wasn't even wanted by the lowly New York Jets, Coach Red Miller, spurned by several teams spent 17 years as an assistant before getting the Bronco job. The now famed Orange-Crush Defense used to be Orange Sherbet.

Main liability: Lack of experience and depth. Chief asset:

Prediction: Dallas to extinguish the Vikings' new fire and Oakland banditry to fleece Denver's Orange. Then Dallas wins its second Super Bowl.

'I dreamed something like this might happen," said Bradley, the first TSU player ever named to the Associated Press NAIA All-America team. "I played


UCLA's Townsend Injured In Scuffle



Race Factor In NBA Violence

BUFFALO (AP) - A Buffalo professor who wrote a book on inner city children believes intimidating tactics learned on playground courts are behind increased violence in the National Basketball Asso-

NBA Commissioner Lawrence O'Brien said recently race was not a factor in recent fights that left two white players -Kent Benson of Milwaukee and Rudy Tomjanovich of Houston — with major injuries at the hands of two black players Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Kermit Washington of Los Angeles.

However, Dr. Herbert L. Foster, a professor of education at the University of Buffalo, disagrees.

"Race is a factor, and to deny that is wrong. How can you try to solve a problem when you won't admit what the problem is? Whether it is blatant, overt,

unconscious or institutional, race is a factor," Foster said. Foster, who authored a book after

teaching in the New York City school system for 11 years, said black players carry to the NBA "very aggressive and physical street corner-coping and survival techniques which are required for street-corner survival.

"We know that when we get into a crisis situation we revert to what worked for us earlier. According to what I read and see, some of these streetcorner tactics with a bit more finesse and sophistication are being played out on NBA basketball courts," Foster said.

Foster has sent a letter to Norm Drucker, the NBA's supervisor of officials, to offer his services as a consultant to a committee to study the violence prob-


Foster said many black players, and some white players, use "woofing" to scare their opponents. He describes woofing as loud, aggressive talking combined with menacing body motions and

"You know when Muhammad Ali came on the scene most people thought he was crazy with all of those threats and poems and outrageous speeches. The white sportswriters had no idea what he was

"But his black opponents, most of whom said, 'He can't scare me with that streetcorner jive,' knew what he was doing. Ali was woofing.



Study Indicates Few Influenced By Report

NEW YORK (UPI) - When a Rand Corp. report last year suggested some recovered alcoholics could safely resume moderate drinking, critics charged it could give a fatal green light to heavy users. But a new study indicates alcoholics aren't so easily tempted back to the days of wine and roses

Interviews with 244 alcoholics in treatment in the Boston area showed four had gone back to heavy drinking and only one relapse was attributed directly to the Rand report. But the researchers cautioned against generalizing from their re-

The survey, funded by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, was conducted by scientists from the Boston University School of Medicine. It was published in the current Journal of Studies on Alcohol.

The study was begun last January, six months after release of the Rand Corp. report, which said some alcoholics eventually could learn to handle small to moderate amounts of hard liquor, wine or

The report drew heated criticism from many involved in combating alcoholism. Dr. John Norris, Chairman of Board of Alcoholics Anonymous, charged, People are going to die as a result of this

But Dr. Mooris Chafetz, then director of the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, argued that the report might loosen some of the "rigid, stereotypic thinking about treating alco-

Recreation Market Maintains Growth

TOLEDO, Ohio (UPI) - One part of the economy to maintain consistent growth over the past decade was sports and recreation, according to Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corporation. Economists say Americans spent almost \$25 billion last year on such items as sail boats, motor homes and tennis racquets, up from \$9.6 billion in 1967.

The company, which makes fiber glass reinforcements, reports a leap in fiber glassreinforced plastics usage in boats, recreational vehicles and sports equipment. Consumption rose 37 percent last year to 472 million pounds, two and a half times that of a decade ago. In 1981, the company says, the figure may reach 770 million pounds.

Senator Wants Change In Recording Practice

WASHINGTON (AP) - Words, words, words. Is it possible that even such practiced talkers as the members of the U.S. House and Senate said so much the last day they were in session in 1977?

The Congressional Record for that single day runs three volumes, more than 600 pages, at a cost of \$322 a page, to record the words allegedly spoken on the floor of the two chambers.

Not even the best Senate filibusterer could read aloud that much material in less than 48 hours. Yet, the House was in session that day for six and one-half hours, the Senate for seven.

A lot of those words went unsaid. They were statements "submitted for the record" by members of Congress and inserted as though they were part of the de-

Some people want to change that prac-

tice. Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., has campaigned, without much success, to win approval of a measure to require that the record clearly show which material was spoken on the floor and which was merely inserted

There is a place in the record for statements. It's called "extensions of remarks" and appears at the end of each day's issue.

Every member of Congress is allowed to fill two pages a day in the extensions section, something which few do. If a member wants to insert material that runs more than two pages he must obtain permission on the floor, permission hich is routinely granted.

But he also must state publicly, for the record, that he intends to insert umpteen pages of material at a cost of \$322 a page. What sort of material is placed in ex-

Clearcutting Doubted As Cause Of Damage

SEATTLE (AP) - Did clearcutting contribute to flood damage earlier this month in the Pacific Northwest by increasing runoff or causing debris to block

rivers and streams? Probably not in most cases, according to forestry experts, hydrologists and others questioned in a recent survey, although most conceded that research to

date provides few if any certain answers. The survey of Oregon and Washington state officials, U.S. Forest Service experts, University of Washington and Oregon State University professors and a representative of the Sierra Club was conducted by the Seattle Post-Intelligen-

The survey report covered only general findings and did not quote any of those surveyed.

Although a living forest holds water, those questioned generally said clearcutting probably made little difference because, by the time the warm and heavy rains had started, even heavily forested lands were so wet they could hold little additional water.

In addition, according to the survey report, the melting of snow by rainfall on clearcut mountain slopes probably had ; no significant impact far downstream where major flooding occurred because major drainage basins include both logged and forested areas.

Proper logging practices minimize debris deposits in rivers and streams, but not all loggers take the necessary precautions, the report noted.

For example, debris from clearcut areas is almost certain to wind up in a river unless the loggers remove it from natural drainage channels and flood

However, the report noted that secondgrowth forests on former clearcuts frequently deposit less debris than oldgrowth forests in which decades of wind, disease and insect damage may leave numerous dead trees and fallen branches.

PARIS (UPI) - A large bomb ripped apart the Paris home of a high court judge early today in what may be the 17th politically motivated terrorist attack in France within a week.

Police said no one was injured in the blast that shattered windows and furniture in the third-floor apartment of Judge Louis Zollinger in a residential district of Paris while the judge was away.

They said no individual or group had claimed responsibility for the bombing. Zollinger, 56, has handled several drug cases in tme Mediterranean port city of

Marseille. The previous three bombs shattered the railroad station in suburban Villepinte early Monday and disrupted railroad traffic through a vast area north of Paris, but caused no personal injuries.

Minutes after the railroad blasts, an anonymous telephone caller told police the blast was the work of the 'Corsican Liberation Front." The French island of Corsica is on the Mediterranean 200 miles east of Marseille. Many Corsicans live in Marseille

The latest rash of bombings and shootings is causing serious concern and officials have voiced fears that political terrorism may go on rising as the crucial parliamentary elections March 12-19

The French Communist Party said a band of "fascist" attackers fired on the house of Communist leader Georges Marchais at Saint-Martin-surOreuse south of Paris Saturday night.

Marchais scared off the attackers with a warning shot the first time they tried to enter his house but later they returned and fired a volley of shots at the wooden door, piercing it in several places, the

The latest wave of attacks started with a bombing that gutted the famed Parisian delicatessen Fauchon a week ago.

Police said the same bombers apparently were resonsible for a blast Sunday at the Rasputin nightclub in Paris because the explosives used in the two attacks appeared identical.

Other attacks included the destruction of various homes and a cafe. Previously unknown groups such as "Struggle Against Society" and "AntiRacist Group" have taken responsibility for the

Cities Service Cuts Gas Rate

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Cities Service Gas Co. has announced a rate reduction for distributors that will save about \$12 a year for each of its residential customers in five states.

The pipeline company announced the decision over the weekend following federal approval of a settlement between Cities Service and its distributors.

The cut took effect last Friday, and the company will also make price refunds of about \$16 million to its distributors for the period Jan. 23, 1977, to Dec.

Both the reduced rates and refund go to the local distributors. The actions aftect 502 communities in Kansas, western Missouri, northeastern Oklahoma, southern Nebraska and the Texas Panhandle.

The rate reduction is the result of gas deliveries in 1977 that were larger than anticipated when a rate increase application was filed with the former Federal Power Commission in July 1976. The increase went into effect subject to refund in January 197 with the higher rate based on volumes of gas the company expected to deliver.

But Cities Service's deliveries were 21 billion cubic feet larger than projected. due in part to the company's efforts to increase gas supplies

The per unit cost of transporting gas is reduced when the number of units increases, resulting in lower pipeline


