

Texas Tax Committee Asks \$300 Donation

Tax Committees are being formed in each state for the purpose of keeping a representation in Washington to study and attempt to promote legislation which will right some of the frauds in current tax laws. Sherman County has been allotted a fee of \$250 or \$300 as it's share of the financial burden in this fight to correct injurious taxation.

G. L. Taylor has been the first to send in a donation of \$100.

Tax paying citizens who after reading this article wish to place donations to the county's share of the tax fight may mail their checks made out to R. E. Harding, president of the Fort Worth National Bank, to the Star and they will be forwarded to the state committee.

Why Tax Committee Was Formed

In Texas, and other Community Property States, substantially all property and income acquired during marriage is owned equally by the husband and wife. Until 1942 this fair and enlightened marital property system was recognized in the imposition of Federal Income, Gift and Estate Taxes.

Congress, in 1942, amended the Revenue Law to override this system of determining tax liability by ownership, insofar as estate and gift taxes are concerned. The amendments, in substance, provide that all gifts of community property should be treated as gifts by the husband alone, although the wife was an equal donor with him; and all community property, with unimportant exceptions, should be included in the gross estate of the first spouse to die, with the surviving spouse's share to be taxed again at the second death.

Since the constitutionality of the estate tax amendments has been upheld by the United States Supreme Court, the only method of obtaining relief from the inequities produced by the 1942 Amendments is by legislation. Indeed, legislative activity is the only method by which the citizens of Texas, and other community property states, can preserve their rights with respect to income taxes on community income, for there is now in progress a definite movement to take away from the citizens of Community Property states their rights with respect to income taxation. This movement will be vigorously pressed in the next Congress, and will succeed unless more vigorously opposed.

The inequalities, inequities and burdens of the 1942 "Community Property" amendments are staggering, even when the estates and gifts are comparatively modest. A few illustrations will prove this:

Prior to the 1942 Amendments, a single gift of community property valued at \$66,000 to one donee produced no gift tax liability, now the gift tax would be approximately \$2,665. Such a gift of \$100,000 formerly produced a tax of \$1,905, now the gift tax would be \$8,595.

Without the 1942 Estate Tax Amendment, if a spouse died, owning in community with the survivor an estate of \$120,000, there would be no estate tax; now the estate tax would be, in most cases, about \$9,500. If the community estate were \$500,000, the estate tax would have been \$47,700; now it will be \$126,500, and when the surviving spouse dies there will be another estate tax of \$47,700 assuming the survivor's share of the community property neither increases nor decreases. There are other equally startling inequalities.

If community income tax rights are taken away, it will cost married persons in Texas each year:

If their community income was \$12,000, about \$598.50 additional tax.

The Texas Tax Committee is being formed of interested Texas citizens to combat all efforts further to deprive Texas citizens of their rights with respect to Federal income, estate and gift taxation, and to restore, insofar as possible, the rights of which those citizens have already been deprived. You are asked to support these activities because you are vitally interested in the results for which the Committee will exclusively devote its efforts and funds. If the Committee does no more than obtain one of many possible amendments to the Estate Tax Law, it will repay many times for contribution.

This Committee should be a permanent, well financed, adequately staffed organization, with permanent representation in Washington, capable of cooperating continuously with similar groups from other Community Property States. It will substitute for the sporadic, unorganized efforts heretofore made to protect community property rights. These efforts will be directed primarily to the accomplishment of the following objectives:

1. Abandonment of the field of Estate and Gift taxation by the Federal Government and the return of these fields to the several States.
 2. Repeal of the 1942 Estate and Gift Tax amendments relating to community property; or
 3. To secure further amendments to the Revenue Laws correcting the gross inequalities caused by the hasty adoption of the 1942 Community Property Amendments.
 4. Preservation of existing community property income tax rights.
 5. The maintenance of constant contact with the Treasury Department to prevent further ill-advised rulings with respect to the taxation of community property.
 6. To secure such amendments to Texas law as may aid Texas citizens from the standpoint of Federal income, estate and gift taxes.

What's Wrong With My Snapshots?

(By Earl Bond)

Everyone who ever clicked a shutter on a Brownie has asked themselves this question at one time or another. From my experience in developing your rolls, and hundreds of other rolls, I find a host of answers to that question. Photography is a very complex profession or hobby, and I have no intention of going into technical details here which few of you would understand or remember, but I can give you some suggestions for getting better results out of that old battered out box that has been floating around in the family for years.

Regardless of its appearance, that old camera is capable of making some fine pictures if still in good working order, and properly used. Unless it leaks or the shutter sticks, it should still be O. K. If your camera leaks, either locate the leak and fix it, or throw it away. Many leaks can be repaired with adhesive tape, or a touch of black paint. You are wasting money, precious film, and your film processors good disposition to keep trying to take pictures with a leaky camera. About one-third of your snapshots are unprintable because of leaks, or all-over fogging due to improper loading and handling of the film.

Next in the ailment of your snapshots comes camera movement. At least a third of the snapshots made show evidence of camera movement. The shutters on inexpensive cameras are necessarily very slow, about 1-25 of a second for a new camera, and the shutter on an old one may have slowed down to half that speed. Even with high speed shutters, professional photographers make a veritable tripod of their body when shooting. Grip the camera firmly, press the camera firmly against your body, hold the arms firmly against your sides, hold your breath, and press the shutter with a smooth motion. Better still if you can set the camera on a solid object or hold against a post or tree, do so. You will notice a decided improvement in your pictures.

Young Buckles gave an interesting discussion on the ancient like customs he found in Germany where he had occupation duty with the army. He described the paving as that of cobble stone structure. Most of the German people are housed in apartment houses while only the most wealthy own homes of their own. Germans under the age of 30 seem to realize the advantage of a democratic form of government while the older citizens still speak of what they will do when the Americans leave. Buckles described Germany's principal cities as a mass of debris. Work of cleaning the streets had just begun when the cold winter brought this improvement in condition to a virtual stand still.

Displaced persons who have no country cause the greatest problems for the occupation forces. These people secure their food from garbage wastes, while Germans proper have sufficient food to maintain health.

Russians consider it a privilege to wander through the American zone of occupied Germany but Americans who have become lost and wandered into the Russian zone often just disappear.

Buckles described Hitler's retreat and the tunnelled fortifications capable of housing 3,000 men, which has been destroyed.

German citizens whenever possible continue to leave the Russian zone to make their home in the American zone where freedom is much more prevalent.

Ancient water powered mountain side cable trolleys of Switzerland were described. Barrels at intervals on the cable are filled with water at the top of the trolley from a nearby stream to furnish sufficient weight for pulling power to furnish transportation. At the foot of the line the water is emptied from the barrels, allowing them to climb empty with the passenger load.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED,

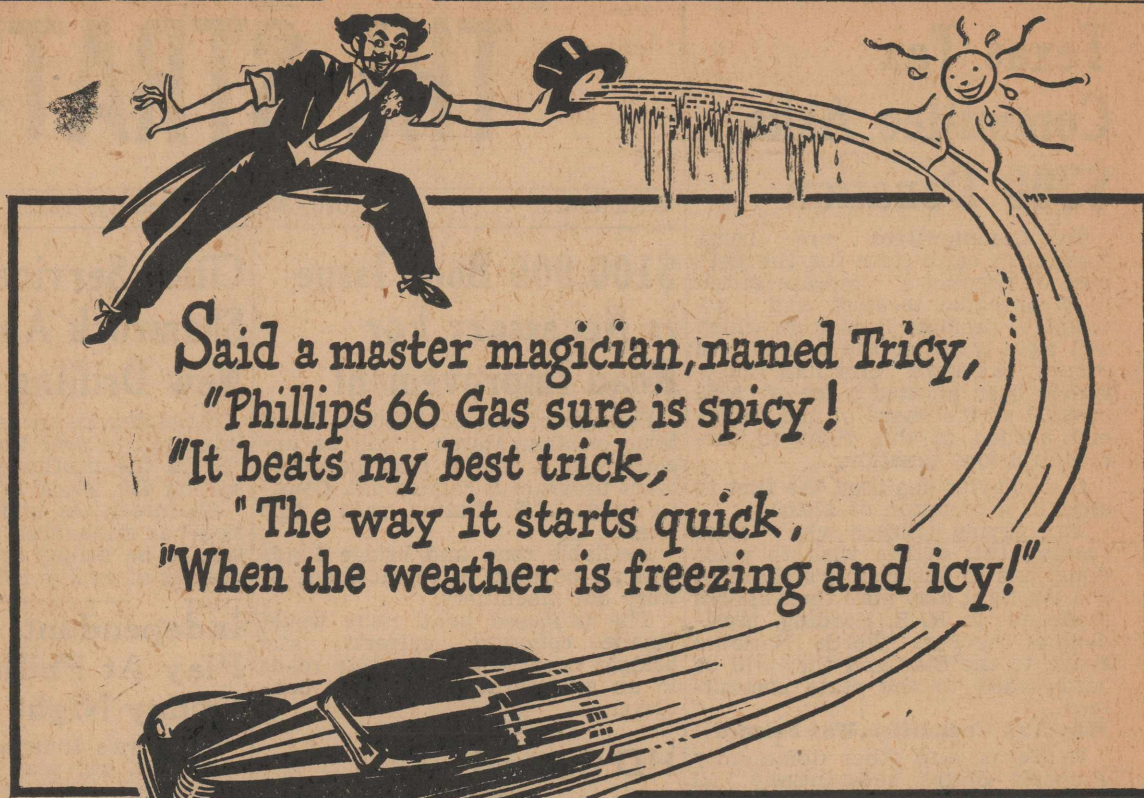

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

FEEDING THE FIVE THOUSAND LESSON TEXT—John 6:25-35, 56-58. MEMORY SELECTION—I am that bread of life—John 6:48.

Bread! The cry of the hungry peoples of the world for bread has reminded us anew that it is the simple and elemental things of life which are of most importance.

Our lesson does not deal with the feeding of the five thousand, but the story of that miracle of our Lord is the background for the discourse or the bread of life which is assigned for our study.

The story of how our Lord multiplied the loaves and fishes of a small boy's lunch and fed the multitude presents him as the Creator and Sustainer of all things. The people having been fed, wanted to take Jesus and make him their King (John 6:15), so he went over the Sea of Galilee to Capernaum.

I. The Bread of Earth and the Bread of Heaven (vv. 25-27).

They sought Jesus not that they might receive spiritual blessings, but that their stomachs might be filled (v. 26). It was not a high motive, but an understandable one.

Yet it was a low motive and one which caused them to entirely miss the greatest and most blessed provision of God for their every need. The bread of this earth, bearing the imprint of a human maker, would soon leave them hungry again, and eventually they would die.

II. The Work of Men and the Work of God (vv. 28-33).

Entangled as they were in earthly things and desires, they seemed for a moment to reach out toward the things of God. Jesus had been talking about everlasting life and the bread of heaven; they wanted to know what they could do to merit and receive it.

It is quite typical of man even to this day that he thinks there must be some way that he can come through to eternal blessedness by way of his own works.

The only work that man can do to meet God's first demands and inherit eternal life is to believe in Christ (v. 29). Men want to add up works of penance, works of charity, deeds of righteousness, character development, the observance of religious traditions and ceremonies, the offering of prayers, and so on without end.

Works is not the answer to any spiritual need, but faith in Christ. We must trust God and believe in the One whom he has sent; and we are ready to go out and do his will!

III. The Way of Death and the Way of Life (vv. 34, 35, 56-58).

One could wish that the request made in verse 34 could be taken at face value, but the fact that they later turned away and left the Lord indicates that this was again a desire for physical bread.

There is here a bold contrast between the things of this earth, which, as we use them, perish (and, alas, we perish with them), and the things of God which are of eternal value and power.

Which shall it be, reader, for you? Are you willing to go on day after day on the way of death, or will you today take Christ, who is the way of life?
