## Prior Approvals Required For AAA Payments

Operators desiring to comply with the 1947 farm program should secure prior approvals from the Sherman County AAA office before beginning spring work in order to be eligible for benefit payments. A payment of 50 cents an acre is paid for summer fallow work.

The practice of chiseling land has been adopted for local practice payment in Sherman County this year. This practice however, is not applicable to irrigated land or land that slopes more than 3 percent. The chisel furrows must be run back and forth diagonally across the field and not in the direction in which it is normally plowed. The furrows must be not less than 12 inches apart, nor more than 4 feet, and at least 6 inches deep. Chiseling within 30 days prior to seeding will not qualify for payment.

**The American Way**  
**FANATICAL EISENHOWER**

(By George Peck)

Please don't let the title mislead you. This article is not a censure of General Eisenhower. On the contrary, if you will read on, you will find it a paen of the highest praise.

On December 3, 1946, the

Churchman magazine made its Eighth Annual Award by presenting a bronze plaque to General Dwight D. Eisenhower, for his promotion of good will and better understanding among all people. The General richly deserved this recognition. The Churchman did well in making this award to the Chief of Staff of Uncle Sam's Army.

It has been charged in some

quarters that the Churchman is rather leftish in its editorial policy; others allege that it leans far over to the left. General Ike, however, in his speech accepting the plaque, left no doubt as to how he stands on sound Americanism. In fact, his remarks would indicate that he was well aware of the leftist accusations leveled at the Churchman, and deliberately went "all out" to dispel any suspicion he was tarred with any "pinkish" brush.

The General described himself as a fanatic, "a fanatical devotee of the American system of democracy." He said he believed there were two fundamental bases of this system: (1) A deep and abiding religious faith, and (2) that is a system of freedom, of rights and liberties of the individual, described as free enterprise.

Without these two fundamentals, he declared there could be no democracy. Then he voiced his conviction that no individual, including even himself, can be trusted with absolute power, by stating: "I am certain that if you entrust all your affairs and your property and your liberties to a bureaucrat in Washington, Such As I Am, you would not have democracy as we know it now."

There may still be some doubt about the sound Americanism of the Churchman, but General Eisenhower has left none regarding his.

It was also most refreshing to learn that our greatest General named "a deep and abiding religious faith" as the first of two bases of our American Way. It was especially timely because all too many ministers of the Gospel have been bitten by the "socialist bug." This statement of General Ike's should cause all such seriously to consider a return to preaching religious faith as the one and only thing that can regenerate mankind.

By way of contrast, let me quote Kary Marx, the arch apostle of communism: "The democratic concept of man is false, because it is Christian. The democratic concept holds that — each man has a value as a sovereign being. This is

the illusion, dream and postulate of Christianity, that man has a sovereign soul." And then as a further warning to our "Men of the Cloth," who seemingly have given up on God as the savior of mankind, please read what Earl Browder, our leading American-born disciple of Marx, has to say. Browder brazenly boasts of how his communist party has invaded church groups in America. Writes Browder:

"It is significant that the communist party, more than any other


group, has been able to achieve successful united fronts with church groups on the most impor-

tant issues of the day. This is not due to any compromise on our part (Continued on Page 5)

As I was scanning through my son's history book the other evening, I ran across a very interesting article. It described one of the first loaves of bread . . . made centuries ago in the Swiss lake-dwellings of the Stone Age. Actually the bread resembled our modern biscuits, and as I read the article, I marveled at the stamina of the women in those days. Why, it took at least a whole day to make bread! Acorns were boiled, then dried and crushed into powder. From this the dough was prepared, laid on flat heated stones and covered with hot ashes for baking.

It certainly makes one thankful for modern house-keeping conveniences, doesn't it? Think of our delicious, flavorful bread coming to us fresh from the ovens. No hot ashes are used to cover our bread! Instead, each loaf is automatically wrapped in waxed paper to insure its freshness and keep it sanitary.

As for biscuits — well, I use a ready mixed flour. I just add water and the dough is set for kneading and cutting. It takes just a few minutes. I always keep several packages on hand.

Incidentally, I just learned that ready-mixed preparations were almost taken off the market. When first introduced, the shortening in the mixture penetrated the carton and gave a greasy appearance to the package. Then manufacturers began using waxed paper inner linings, and the products immediately gained popularity. Waxed paper kept the carton clean and the contents fresh and sanitary.

You know, it's really fun to keep house and prepare meals, today — but we'd be actually lost without all our modern time-savers, wouldn't we?

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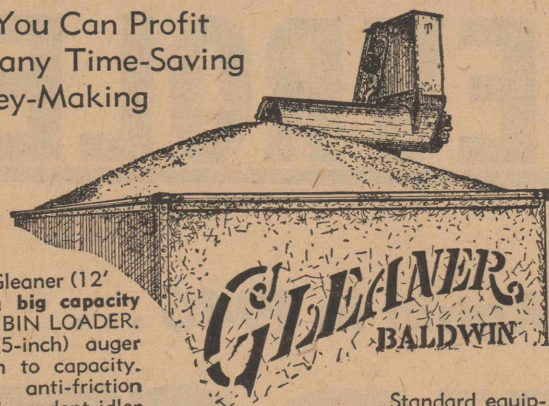
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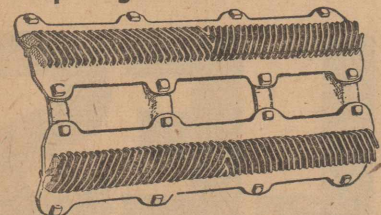
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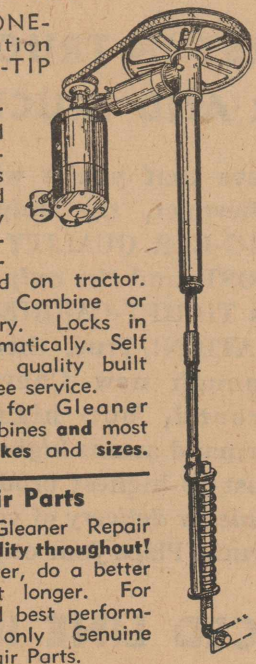
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## Win Texas 4-H Championships

Duane Boenig, 16, of Converse, receives a 17-jewel gold watch provided by Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago, for having the highest rating state record in the 1946 National 4-H Meat Animal award program. His six-year record in 4-H work shows that he handled 283 hogs and 575 fowl. He won many placings on his meat animal exhibits, including \$819.63 in cash prizes, which brought his estimated income from all 4-H projects to \$17,530.06. At the 1946 Houston Fat Stock Show, he showed the grand champion litter, grand champion pen of three barrows, champion Duroc pen of three barrows and received other major awards. He sold 19 of the 24 pigs exhibited for \$2,136.00.

Floyd Terrell, 17, of Plainview, wins state honors in the 1946 National 4-H Home Grounds Activity. His reward is a 17-jewel gold watch provided by Mrs. Charles R. Walgreen, Chicago. Among his home-landscaping achievements during nine years of club work are removing old unnecessary fences and repairing others, helping remove dead trees, leveling off two big holes in the yard, filling in an old cellar and planting grass over the area. Floyd also helped in planning and building the family's new 12-room modern home.

All of these activities were conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

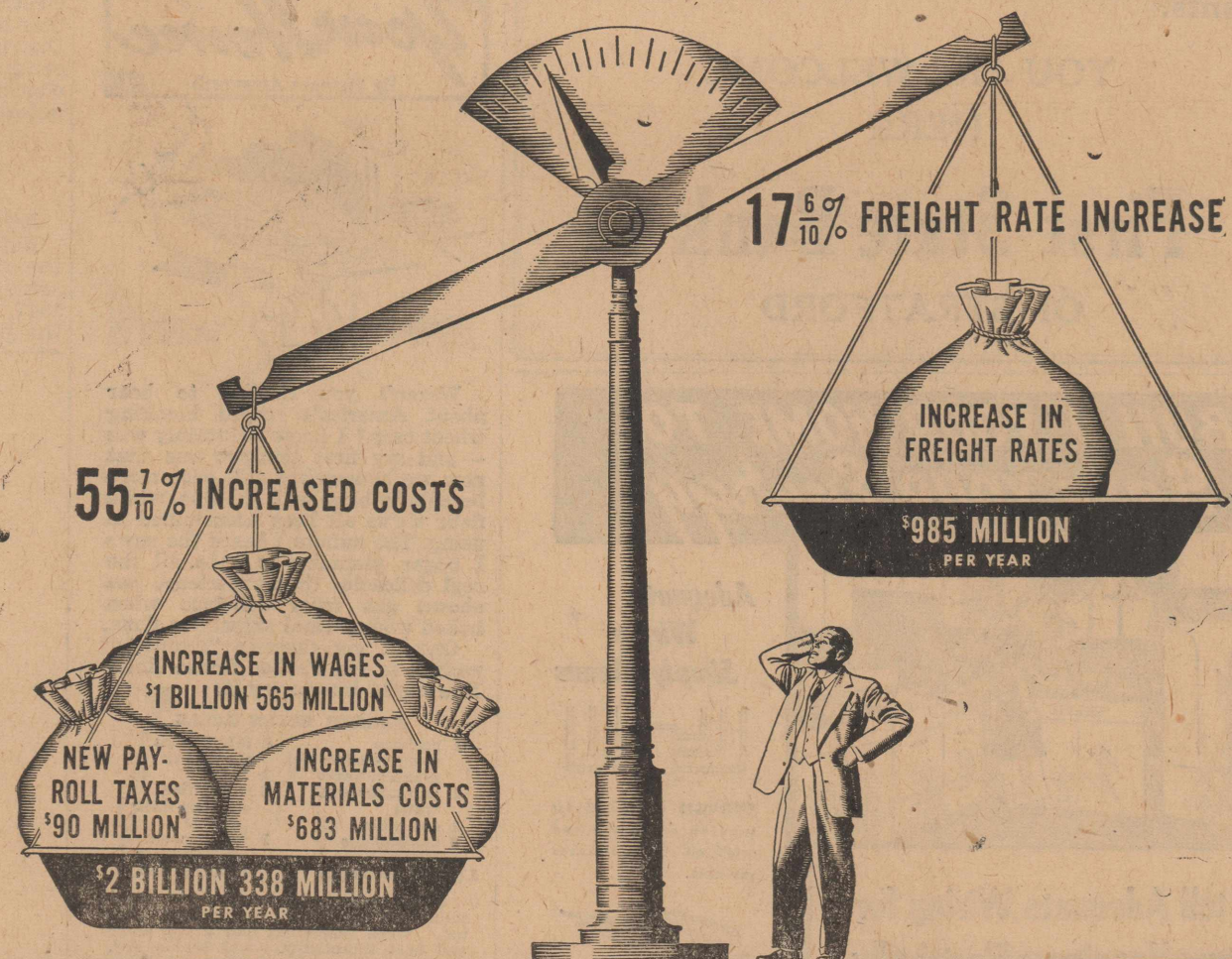

I know I certainly was - and my first thought was that now we housewives will once more be able to bake with the fine, white flour we've all been accustomed to using. The minute I heard the news I began planning to bake all the real delicacies that experience has shown are truly delicious when baked with normal extraction flour.

One of my favorite "company" recipes is for Parker House Rolls. You might like to try it:

- PARKER HOUSE ROLLS**
- 1 package compressed or granular yeast
  - 1 cup lukewarm water
  - 1 cup milk
  - 6 tablespoons sugar
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
  - 6 tablespoons shortening
  - 1 egg
  - 6 cups sifted enriched flour (about)
  - 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk and add sugar, salt and shortening. When lukewarm, add 1 cup flour and beat thoroughly. Add beaten egg, yeast and beat well. Add enough flour to make soft dough. Turn out on board and knead until smooth and satiny. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk. Punch down. Roll out 1/4 inch thick, brush with melted butter or margarine. Cut with 3 inch biscuit cutter. Fold each round in half and seal edges. Place rolls 1 inch apart on greased baking sheet. Brush with melted butter or margarine and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven (425 degrees F) 15 to 20 minutes. Yield: 3 1/2 dozen rolls.

Serve these rolls at your next "company" dinner or luncheon. I'm sure your guests—as mine always have—will beg you to give them each a copy of your recipe!

**Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?**  
A. A picnic shoulder of pork. The one shown here is a smoked picnic shoulder; the same cut is also sold as fresh pork.  
**Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?**  
A. The picnic shoulder comes from the lower half of the pork shoulder. It is a rather squarish, chunky cut, including the fore shank. It contains the arm and shank bones. The cut may vary from about 4 to 9 pounds in weight.  
**Q. How should this cut be prepared?**  
A. The smoked picnic is usually prepared like a smoked ham; it may be either baked (roasted) or simmered in water. If roasted, it is cooked in a slow oven (300° F.) for about 35 minutes per pound. The cooked meat is very good sliced cold, or may be used instead of ham in a variety of "made" dishes.

**GREEK SITUATION SERIOUS**

WASHINGTON.—Impartial diplomats returning from the Near East report that the American dilemma in Greece is even more serious than the long-faced story which General Marshall gave to congress.

They report:

1. That the Greek countryside is now almost wholly in the hands of Greek guerrillas, a situation almost as bad as when the Germans held the towns and the Greek guerrillas ruled the countryside.
2. That half a million extra people have fled to Athens to escape guerrilla fighting.
3. As a result of the veritable civil war and the influx into the cities, the fields have not been cultivated nor crops collected.
4. If British troops were withdrawn, the government of King George II would fall almost overnight.

Unquestionably Communist agents from Yugoslavia and Albania have been pouring men into Macedonia and to some extent into Greece proper; so that if the British army were withdrawn, the risk of a Communist government in Greece is considerable.

However, it also remains a basic fact that the overwhelming majority of the Greek people—probably 70 per cent—are conservative, home-loving farmers who want to be left alone by both extremes. Essentially they are individualists and democrats—bitter enemies of Communism.

Furthermore one out of every eight Greeks has been in the United States or has relatives here. Their real ties are much more with the United States than with Russia or England.

**VETS' HOUSING CRACKDOWN**

Home builders who have been defying federal regulations on veterans' housing had better start consulting their lawyers.

Certain builders in the Denver and Cleveland areas are being haled into court to show why they have failed to file sales reports on housing begun before controls were lifted last December 24. This housing, numbering more than 350,000 units, still is affected by price controls and veterans' priorities.

Furthermore, the Denver and Cleveland cases are only curtain raisers to a nationwide crackdown on builders. OPA compliance officers have evidence that there have been widespread violations, with the result that many vets have been gypped.

**FREIGHT CAR SHORTAGE**

The current tragic tie-up of the nation's economy because of the freight car shortage might have been saved if the railroads had taken the advice of Washington experts. It was never published at the time, but two years before the war J. Leonard Replogle, former Republican national committeeman from Florida and expert on the Baruch board during the last war, gave the railroads a blunt prediction of things to come.

Testifying before the Stettinius board on national resources necessary for the impending war, Replogle warned that the country would need 400,000 new freight cars to handle wartime economy. He told the board that many of the cars now in use were old and would not bear under the wear and tear of war. He urged a government loan to finance 400,000 new cars.

This brought loud and vigorous protests from the American Railway association. Their spokesman, the late J. J. Pelley, replied that the railroads were in good shape and needed no new cars. Nothing was done. Result: Critical steel had to be diverted from building freight cars during the war.

**TRUMAN MEETS BUREAUCRATS**

There has been no official announcement about it, but President Truman has quietly started a unique practice. He has been visiting different government departments to meet their staffs and discuss various problems with the personnel. He is the first president in many years to do this.

Truman started the idea when he told Secretary of the Interior "Cap" Krug that he would like to come to lunch at the interior department. Delighted, Krug arranged a small, informal lunch with 15 key interior department officials present. Many of them had been in government service 20 years, but never had seen, much less talked to, a president. They are the men who keep the wheels of government running no matter who is elected.

**CAPITAL STAFF**

Harold Stassen is expecting big things from his present two-month globe-girdling tour. He hopes to get enough ammunition from talks with Stalin, Attlee and other European leaders to make plenty of political hay for his next fall's speaking tour when the GOP '48 sweepstakes hit the home stretch. . . . Col. Jay Cooke, Philadelphia banker and former GOP chairman who is accompanying Stassen to Europe, wants to be secretary of the treasury if and when Stassen is elected.



**WE HAVE** been reading lately, from something like a dozen spring training camps, about the number of amazing rookies that have come along.

This happens every spring. It has been going on for some 50 years. It is only natural that it should be this way, for the rookie is usually young, keen, ambitious and thinks only in terms of today. The veteran has to think in terms of next summer, as he nurses his waning arm and none too certain legs.

**TY COBB** Spring is the rookie's happy hunting ground. It would be a wonderful thing for the game if they all could make good, but as one veteran manager told me lately—"All I can ask for is one, or maybe two. That would be a big average."

So far the Dodgers and the Giants seem to have discovered the leading rookie phenoms. But if either team can start the new season with two rookies who are good enough to win a job away from some regular, they will be two lucky ball clubs.

Now and then you hear about "another Cobb" or "another Ruth." Suppose we check back on these two famous names.

Cobb reported to Augusta in the Sally league in 1904, where he batted .237 in 37 games.

I was working in Atlanta that year and I heard no great uproar about Cobb being "another Wagner." Ty's best press agent was Ty.

Ty joined the Tigers in 1905 where he batted .240 in 41 games that season and there was no overwhelming chorus about coming greatness. He jumped to .320 in 1906—and from then on it was something else again—.377 in 1909, .385 in 1910, .420 in 1911 and .410 in 1912.

**Ruth Known as Pitcher**

In 1914, Babe Ruth's fame belonged to pitching. No one had anything to say about his hitting. In 46 games with Baltimore and Providence, that 1914 season, the Babe batted .231. My record book shows that he hit one home run that year. In his first five years as a pitcher with the Red Sox, the Babe averaged slightly over .300 with no great home run record. That came later.

Frank Frisch was no terror when he broke into Giant ranks, right out of Fordham in 1919. In 54 games that season with the Giants he hit only .226. Not so hot for a rookie, even one just out of college. But McGraw still had full faith in him and the Fordham Flash moved up to .280. A year later, in 1921, he was up to .341, winding up as one of the great second basemen of all time. / Maybe not the greatest—but up among the best.

Hank Greenberg batted only .214 with Hartford in 1930. He moved up to .290 with Beaumont in 1932. But he reached .301 with Detroit in 1933.

The greatest pitching rookie that I recall was Grover Cleveland Alexander. Reporting from Syracuse to the lowly Phillies in 1911, Alex won 28 games his first year. He was a rookie you dream about.

Among the all-time rookies I find that Chuck Klein of the Phillies, Lou Gehrig of the Yankees and Jimmy Foxx of the Athletics were around the top—possibly the best. They began tearing down fences shortly after arrival. The year 1946 had its full share of exceptional rookies, including Del Ennis of the Phillies, Furillo, Whitman and Edward of the Dodgers.

"The second year is the big test," Frank Frisch tells me. "That's the test for the hot rookie and the young fellow moving up. Good rookies often fold up after a good first year. They take too much for granted. Some slower starters can press them a mile in the second season. Smarter fellows with more hustle."

This new season may be packed with exceptional rookies, facing G.I. veterans who were not too hot last year. It will be an interesting study to see how they come along.

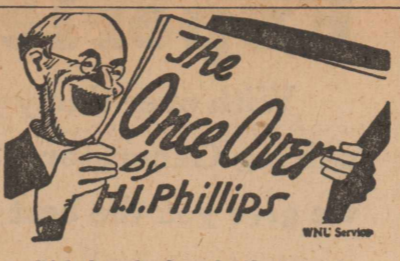
**The Top for 1947**

My vote for 1946 would go to Stan Musial, the best all-around baseball player—Glenn Davis, the best all-around football player—Assault, the best horse, and Ben Hogan, the best golfer.

It takes the high mark of competition to make a top performer and Musial, Davis, Assault and Hogan took the lead.

**Arabian Was First With 24-Equal-Hour Day Plan**

There are 24 hours in a day as a matter of convenience. The old day-points of sunrise, midday, and sunset were too indefinite, and the ancient Greeks and Egyptians divided daylight—the time between sunrise and sunset—into twelve "hours." Daylight, however, varies with the season of the year, and consequently the length of these "hours" varied also.

### PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN BROTHERHOOD

LESSON TEXT—John 17:1-11, 20-23. MEMORY SELECTION—And now I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep through thine own name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be one, as we are.—John 17:11.

The voice of the Son of God lifted in audible prayer! What could be more sacred and more blessed? He who had by act and example taught his disciples loving service (John 13), and had spoken to them words of comfort and assurance (John 14-16), now prayed for himself, for them, and for us.

While he spoke most intimately with the Father as his only begotten Son, he prayed aloud that his disciples might hear his prayer and join with him in it.

This prayer is often called the high-priestly prayer of Christ, and rightly so, for here the "one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (I Tim. 2:5) spoke as "the High Priest of mankind who begins his sacrifice by offering himself to God with all his people" (Godel).

First we find that he prayed for himself as he spoke of

I. Salvation Finished—Then Glory with the Father (vv. 1-5).  
He looked up and said, "Father," that was all. No struggling, no pleading, just the recognition of his own divinity, his intimate and unique Sonship to God. Throughout this entire prayer the same close relationship is found. It was not as he would pray "Our Father," but "Father."

Jesus was the Son of God. Yes, he was and is God. He and the Father are one in blessed eternal, infinite unity. But as he is in the Father, we who believe are in him. So the poet well says:

"Near, so very near to God,  
Nearer I cannot be,  
For in the person of his Son  
I am as near as he."

This divine Redeemer, who laid down his glory when he came to earth (Phil. 2:7, 8) to be a Saviour, was now ready to take up that glory again. He spoke of the work of salvation as completed—for in his obedient soul the death on the cross which was just ahead was already accomplished.

Now he was ready for the Father to glorify him even as he had glorified the name of the Father. That prayer was answered, and Christ now sits at the right hand of the Father in heaven. What a glorious Saviour we have!

His prayer was soon turned to those who had believed in him. They were precious to him, for they were given to him by the Father.

II. Out of the World—Then Kept by the Father (vv. 6-11).  
There is something powerfully assuring to the believer to read the words of Jesus which declare that these who had believed on him had been given to him by the Father. They belonged to the Father, and he gave them to the son. They kept the Word of God, and thus they knew the Son as the manifestation of the Father's name. What could be more certain for time and eternity!

Note that they were taken "out of the world"—that does not mean that they left this earth. They lived here as we live here, but they were delivered from that evil world power which opposes God.

Some professed Christians who find their greatest delight in fellowship with the Christ-rejecting world had better read carefully here, for it appears that the one who is truly in Christ is not "of the world."

These disciples had to remain in the world (though they were not of it) and they needed to be kept. Now that the earthly ministry of Jesus was to be brought to a close, he tenderly placed them anew in the Father's mighty hand. Again we say, what could be more blessedly secure than that!

We must note that our Lord had a special interest and prayer for his own. Verse 9 obviously does not mean that he is not interested in all mankind. He died for them (John 3:16). But here his prayer was for his own, and in that prayer the world was left out. That makes us feel still more assured in him. He, the blessed Son of God and only Saviour, prayed for me, for you!

The closing words of verse 11 reach out into the third petition of our Lord, as he prayed for their

III. Unity in Christ—Then Testimony to the World (vv. 20-23).  
The verses between the foregoing division and this one (vv. 12-19) are important. Our Lord was concerned about the hatred of the world for those who had received the Word of the Father, and yet he would not have them taken out of the world. They were to be his witnesses—even as we are to be in our day. They must remain in the world; but being one in Christ and sanctified through the truth, they were to be kept for God and used by him.



## Farm Topics

### Twenty Million Acres May Be Unprofitable Salt Proving Ruin to Much Irrigated Land

Accumulation of salt is proving a continuing hazard to crop production on much of the 20 million acres of irrigated land in the Western states.

Losses from reduction in yield and quality of crops may occur on lands containing some salt but not enough to throw them out of production. It has been estimated by the U. S. regional salinity laboratory, which is

working on this problem, that in many cases such losses amount to 10 to 25 per cent of the yield.

Many saline and alkali soils are low in available phosphorus and will give better crop yields if phosphate fertilizers are used. Superphosphate, treble superphosphate and ammonium phosphate are among those generally recommended.

During reclamation of saline soil, caused by accumulation of salt due to irrigation, many farmers find it helpful to apply several tons of gypsum per acre, flood the land inside the levees for a week or more, dry out the soil in the basins and then flood again. When a high water table exists, the upward movement of saline ground water results in a continuing accumulation of salt in the surface soil.

Herds and Flocks  
Teach early pigs to eat grain and protein by providing a feeder in a creep—where they can go and eat while still nursing the sow. This way the pigs won't quit gaining when weaned from the sow.

If you neglected to keep a record of farrowing dates, you can come pretty close to telling when pigs will arrive by examining the sow's

udder. Most sows farrow about 24 hours after milk starts filling the udder.

Poultry disease is less of a problem when young chicks are kept apart from older birds. Selling off all old hens and raising a new batch of pullets each year is a paying practice. An all-pullet laying flock, the poultry experts call it.

Trim wool from around the ewe's udder before lambing time. A newborn lamb will sometimes suck a lock of wool instead of a teat. Result, starvation.

Newborn calves should have the cow's first milk (colostrum) because it is richer in vitamin A than milk produced some time after freshening.

Knock on Henhouse Door Pleases 'Girls'  
Ladies are sticklers for etiquette and hens are no exception, according to Arthur Gannon, poultryman of the Georgia extension service.

Etiquette demands a knock on the door before entering an occupied room, he points out, and this is a good point to observe when visiting the poultry house.

When the poultry house door is opened suddenly, hens flutter around and scamper for the back of the shed in the excitement. As a result, egg production drops.

On the other hand, if the poultryman raps gently on the door of the house and then waits for a moment or two before entering, the hens become ready for the entrance of the visitor. There is no excitement and no drop in egg production, he says.

Filling Up Cracks In Chicken Gizzard  
Cracks or crater-like holes in the gizzard linings of chickens are caused by too little anti-gizzard-erosion material in the feed.

This condition does not seem to slow growth or cause death. However it is common in chicks that have been mismanaged, and is, therefore, often blamed for poor growth and death. Good sources of anti-gizzard-erosion are alfalfa products, mill run, bran and greens.

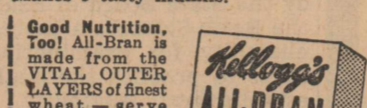

mentioned in this Act to levy, assess, and collect the same rate, or not to exceed the rate heretofore authorized by any act or acts or election of said districts or by any Act of the Legislature, making certain exemption; providing a saving clause; and declaring an emergency."

Senate Bill No. 34, A Bill to be entitled "An Act to amend House Bill No. 956, Chapter 7, page 133, Acts of the Forty-sixth Legislature, Regular Session, being Article 1322, Chapter 3, Title 32 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, relating to the execution of deeds by corporations, by including trust officers, in the enumeration of corporate officers authorized to execute conveyances of lands; and declaring an emergency."
