## Clarify Truck Parking On Main Street

Cty Councilmen in session Thursday night amended Ordinance 116 which phohibits the parking of trucks on Main Street to incorporate a portion of a former ordinance allows 15-minute parking for the purpose of loading or unloading.

All of our imports of seven metals and minerals in 1944 originated in Latin America and European colonies in South America and the Caribbean area. Antimony, one of the seven, came principally from Mexico and to some degree from Bolivia. Others are arsenic oxide, with 79 per cent from Mexico and 21 per cent from Peru; bauxite, which came almost entirely from Surinam; bismuth imports from Peru; vanadium, of which 96.7 per cent of the imports came from Peru; quartz crystal, of which nearly all the imports came from Brazil; and crude oil, 81.9 per cent of which came from Venezuela.

Over hafl of these 20,000 fatal accidents take place in the home, Mrs. Johnson says, and most of them could be avoided.

Here are the principal causes of child accidents in the home: Burns, most of which are kitchien accidents: falls, due mostly to infants left unattended; poisoning, from eating household poisons or overdoses of medicines; wounds, often from knives, scissors and other dangerous articles left within reach of children; internal injuries caused to great extent from swallowing toy parts or lollipop sticks; injuries from foreign bodies, such as pins that the child swallows or sticks into his eyes or ears; electric shock, from playing around electric outlets and fixtures; suffocation, particularly among infants that become entangled in loose bed clothes; drowning, in the "old swimming hole" and even in the bathtub; and gunshot wounds, due to fire-arms left within reach of the child.

Mrs. Johnson offers the following points as good methods of preventing these accidents. Protect the child, she says, by making his environment free of accident hazards. Details of the International Harvester policy of making price reductions to save customers approximately \$20,000,000 a year have now been worked out.

Prices have been reduced on 163 models. These cover 12 basic models of farm tractors, 123 basic models of farm machines, 16 basic models of industrial tractors and engines, and 12 models of motor trucks, as well as certain motor truck attachments. 



There are two reasons that the smaller operators get more ACP assistance per acre of land:

The first is that in amending the AAA Act in 1938, the Congress provided for an increase in the amount of small payments, that is, those of less than \$200. Second, the Congress provided a maximum limit of \$10,000 on payments to large oper-

Generally speaking, however, assistance is distributed according to needs of the land. In the same area conservation needs of a large farm, acre by acre, are just about the same as for small farms. For example about the same amount of money is spent to carry out conservation measures on an area of 200 acres whether those acres are one farm, several farms, or part of a lar-

This general plan is in line with the declared policy of Congress to preserve and rebuild land resources in the national public interest.

#### Mountainous Spitsbergen Noted for Mineral Deposits

The majestic, coal-veined mountains that form the Norwegian islands of Spitsbergen rise from Arctic waters at the "top of the world," points out the National Geographic society. The group, officially known as Savalbard, is about 700 miles from the North Pole and 400 miles north of Norway. The northern part of Greenland is 280 miles to the

Despite their inhospitable location, the islands are one of the few Arctic regions that have supplied minerals to countries in the temperate zone. Deposits of iron ore, copper, and zinc are largely undeveloped, but the vast coal resources—estimated as high as eight billion tons—have been mined for half a century.

Coal mining is simplified by the fact that the veins often crop out on the mountainsides. The long summer hours of "midnight sun" also help production. Although mining continues throughout the year, the coal can be shipped abroad only from the harbors are ice free.



Face your fears and have it out. The world is filled with people running away from fears, but never quite escaping them. Face yours. Overcome them boldly. Balance fantasy in your life with

fact. Dream, for all normal beings

must, but balance your dreams with acts. Don't fall into the habit of dreaming your life away. Beware of alluring escapes from your troubles but face them realistically and work out a reasonable

answer. Exercise moderately in order that you may have physical as well as mental health.

Love wisely, for life without love is life without light. Don't worry.

Trust in time and be patient. There you have the ten rules for happiness. They seem almost too simple to be effective.

But they are the rules based upon eternal truths of human nature and psychology, and if you will adopt and follow them they will do some interesting things to your own life.

#### PRICE CUTS:

### Newburyport Plan Gains

Apparently in response to grow-ing consumer resistance and the urgings of President Truman, retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers are reducing prices on many articles. Wholesale prices on oils, soap, butter, pork and beef are lower, and the benefits are slowly being passed on to consumers. Retail prices of manufactured articles are coming down in some instances.

Following the lead of merchants in Newburyport, Mass., who have pledged themselves to a flat 10 per cent reduction, businessmen are announcing various plans to lower their prices. One large department store chain, Lincoln Stores, operating in New England, New York and Pennsylvania, has adopted the 10 per cent cut on all goods. A New England grocery chain, Clover Farms, is lowering prices by 30 per cent on 150 items.

In Virginia, Minn., 100 businessmen intend to drop prices at least 10 per cent on everything they sell. In the wholesale and manufacturing field, reductions on various articles and materials have been announced by General Cable company, Penn-sylvania Salt Manufacturing company and Continental Record company among others.

In what contractors call a "general buyers' strike against high prices' thousands of new small homes are remaining unsold in the New York area. Similar reports have been coming in from other

### **AUTO WORKERS:**

### Settle for 15 Cents

In an unexpected move, United Auto Workers accepted the offer of General Motors corporation of a wage increase amounting to 15 cents per hour. The agreement covers 220,000 production employees of the huge automobile concern. It is believed that the new wage formula will set a pattern for settlements in other automobile companies, whose employees frequently follow the lead of General Motors.

The new contract, to run to April 28, 1948, provides for an immediate raise of 111/2 cents per hour, and 31/2 cents additional for six holidays, thus working out to a flat increase of 15 cents per hour. A liberalized vacation plan is another feature of the pact. Louis Seaton, director of labor relations for General Motors, and Walter Reuther, president of U.A.W. and head of General Motors locals, announced the settlement jointly

A union spokesman predicted that Chrysler corporation workers would sign up on practically the same terms. He added that negotiations between the union and the company were going well.

### FRANCE:

### Shortage of Flour

French people, especially the Parisians, have been trying to buy up all the bread and flour they can lately. Bakeries have been virtually stormed in the capital. The daily bread ration of 13 1-3 ounces was reduced by one third, to nine ounces, on May 1. Bread is a large item in the French diet, probably the largest in many cases.

Before the war French farmers produced all the wheat necessary for the country, but because of price controls, they have been turning to other and more profitable crops. Wheat acreage has declined from the prewar figure of around 11 million acres to six million.

### **Driving More Expensive**

It costs 53 per cent more to operate a passenger car now than it did in 1939. In the country, the expense increase averages 43 per cent. Higher prices of gasoline, tires, oil and repairs account for the rise, as well as the greater original cost of automobiles and the consequently larger depreciation allowance. Insurance also is higher, and in many cases license fees have increased. These figures are based on a re-

# MOSCOW CONFERENCE:

Little Accomplished

After seven weeks of wrangling, devoted to his cause. the foreign ministers' conference at Results of the parley were exsmall. It had been hoped that a treaty for Austria would be worked out, but even preliminary agreements could not be reached. The

man treaty suffered the same fate, as expected. Secretary of State Marshall bluntly blamed the Russians for obstructing the negotiations. He charged that the Soviet delegation had "widened rather than narrowed

our differences." Principal points of controversy were the definition of German and Austrian assets which the Russians want as reparations and the disarmament and demilitarization plan, known as the "four nation treaty."

Almost the only proposition accepted was one, introduced by Russian Foreign Minister Molotov, that all German prisoners of war in Allied hands be returned to Germany by December 31, 1948.

Failure to complete the Austrian treaty means that occupation troops of the four powers will remain in Austria for several more months.

### NO RENT BOOST: House Kills 10% Plan

The house banking committee, reversing its previous stand, voted down a proposal for a 10 per cent blanket increase in rents. It approved and sent on for action a bill continuing controls until December 31. The senate banking committee already has voted unanimously against any raise, and the senate's bill would continue control until March 1, 1948.

The vote in the house committee was 14 to 10. As outlined by Representative Wolcott, chairman, the house bill provides:

Continuance of rent control just about as it is now until December 31, with the President having authorin effect until next March 1 if he deems it necessary.

A new provision whereby tenants and landlords may voluntarily enter lease contracts for up to 15 per cent leases do not expire before December 31, 1948.

Unless extended by legislation, all rent controls would expire on June

#### BEING LOYAL TO TRUE RELIGION

LESSON TEXT—I Kings 18:20, 21, 30-39.
MEMORY SELECTION—Hear me, O
Lord, hear me, that this people may know
that thou art the Lord God, and that thou hast turned their heart back again.—I Kings 18: 37.

God meets the challenge of unbelief and sin through the ages in its different forms. In the days of Elijah it was the awful power of the false religion of Baal which threw its pall of heathenish immorality over the people.

The prophet was God's man of courage in a day of unbelief and sin. To be courageous means to steadily meet perils of which one is deenly conscious, doing so because of the call of duty. Courage holds a deeper and nobler meaning than bravery, carrying with it the idea of moral strength and, in the case of the Christian, faith in God as one

The account of the conflict with Moscow ended in a state banquet. the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel is a dramatic and instructremely disappointing, even to tive story. It shows that when God's those whose expectations had been man meets God's enemy there is an man meets God's enemy there is an open, above-board, honest victory.

I. Nothing Hidden (vv. 20-21, 30). The appeal to Israel cut no corners and made no compromises. more important matter of the Ger-They must choose between the true God and the false Baal. They could not hold to both or halt between two opinions. The same is true today of our relationship to Jesus Christ.

The direct challenge at Mount Carmel follows the same pattern of out-in-the-open dealing with the problem.

Men whose deeds are evil love darkness rather than light. God does not have to work in the dark. All of his workings are in the open sunlight. Everyone is welcome to "come near" and see what is done.

Elijah knew God and he acted like God's man. What a tragedy it is that not all of God's servants have followed his example. If we had the open and above-board dealings of Elijah in the affairs of our churches, we might see more of the fire and power of his ministry.

Certain it is that the administration of church affairs which has to be carried out in hidden corners by whispered conversations and by secret manipulations behind the scenes is not God's work at all, it is the work of man.

II. No Favors Asked (vv. 33-35). Elijah rebuilt the altar himself. He asked no help of the unbelieving ets of Baal or of apostate Israel. How old-fashioned he seems in this day when so much stress is laid on a false unity of the faiths, and there is so much solicitation and acceptance by the church of the help of unbelievers in financing the supposed work of God. Note also that Elijah invited his

enemies to make the answer to his prayer more difficult by pouring water on the sacrifice. This was not an act of bravado; it was for the purpose of demonstrating that there was no fraud. He was willing that the enemies of the truth should make the demonstration more difficult if that would be to God's glory.

There is a delightful old-fashioned flavor about that act, too, in these days when men are frequently willing to compromise with unbelief and even with sin, in order that the work of the church may be carried on without too much difficulty. Here again we have an explanation of the lack of spiritual power in our times.

The victory which came was a glorious testimony to the living reality and the infinite power of God. It left

III. No Glory to Man (vv. 30b-32, 36-39).

A man of bravery usually wants recognition for himself, while the courageous man asks only that the cause for which he fights shall be successful.

Elijah had long since demonstrated that he was absolutely fearity by proclamation to keep ceilings less, and sought no favor or glory (read the entire story). Now in the tenseness of this moment, he carefully rebuilds the altar of the true God (v. 30), makes it a testimony of unity to a divided Israel (v. 31), increases in rent, provided these and he does it all in the name of the Lord (v. 32).

His prayer (vv. 36, 37) is a profoundly simple expression of a complete faith in the true God and his power, on the part of a man who recognized himself as being only the divine servant. He made no plea that God would vindicate him or his ministry, but he did plead that the name of the Lord should be honored in the midst of an unbelieving people.

"The fire of the Lord fell." The lying prophets of heathendom were routed. Many recognized Jehovah as the true God. While Israel did not long remember the lesson learned here, the story has continued as a testimony that will strengthen the people of God as long as time continues.
