



### Complete Final War Casualty Burial Plans

A pamphlet containing information about the government program for the return and final burial of World War II armed forces personnel who died overseas, has been prepared by the War Department, and now is available for distribution. Designed to answer the questions which most frequently are asked by next of kin and relatives of personnel killed outside the continental limits of the U. S., the pamphlet contains information on burial options, how next of kin are determined, the care with which remains are identified, and escorts. This pamphlet is available in either English or Spanish. Residents of this area may obtain one of the pamphlets by writing to American Graves Registration Service, San Antonio General Depot, San Antonio 8, Texas. To familiarize citizens of West Texas and the Panhandle with the program for the return and the reburial of the dead of World War II, officials of the American Graves Registration Division will conduct a series of interviews with next of kin and will conduct schools for service officers in key cities May 12 to 24. Lt. Col. H. G. McDougall, chief of the division announced. He will be accompanied by V. H. Torrance, public information man for the AGRD. The interviews will provide friends and relatives of the war dead opportunities to solve personal problems and to acquaint themselves with the general aspects of the project. While the schools are intended primarily to equip county service officers and veterans organization service officers with the authentic information necessary to assist relatives in executing forms and conducting correspondence, representatives of such institutions as the Red Cross, funeral directors associations, churches, and welfare groups are urged to attend. The itinerary of the AGRD officials is: San Angelo, May 12, 13; Sweetwater, May 14; Childress, May 15; Borger, May 16, 17; Amarillo, May 19, 20; Lubbock, May 21, 22; and Big Spring, May 23 and 24. Schools for service officers will be conducted beginning at 1 P. M. the first day in each city.

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**Mineral Imports**  
All of our imports of seven metals and minerals in 1944 originated in Latin America and European colonies in South America and the Caribbean area. Antimony, one of the seven, came principally from Mexico and to some degree from Bolivia. Others are arsenic oxide, with 79 per cent from Mexico and 21 per cent from Peru; bauxite, which came almost entirely from Surinam; bismuth imports from Peru; vanadium, of which 98.7 per cent of the imports came from Peru; quartz crystal, of which nearly all the imports came from Brazil; and crude oil, 81.9 per cent of which came from Venezuela.

### 10,000 Youths Die Annually In Home Accidents

Each year almost 20,000 boys and girls under 20 years of age die in the United States as a result of accidents.

That sad fact is brought to light by Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, family life education specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, in an effort to make Texas parents realize that something must

be done about it. Over half of these 20,000 fatal accidents take place in the home, Mrs. Johnson says, and most of them could be avoided.

Here are the principal causes of child accidents in the home: Burns, most of which are kitchen accidents; falls, due mostly to infants left unattended; poisoning, from eating household poisons or overdoses of medicines; wounds, often from knives, scissors and other dangerous articles left within reach of children; internal injuries caused to great extent from swallowing toy parts or lollipop sticks; injuries from foreign bodies, such as pins that the child swallows or sticks into his eyes or ears; electric shock, from playing around electric outlets and fixtures; suffocation, particularly among infants that become entangled in loose bed clothes; drowning, in the "old swimming hole" and even in the bathtub; and gunshot wounds, due to fire-arms left within reach of the child.

Mrs. Johnson offers the following points as good methods of preventing these accidents. Protect the child, she says, by making his environment free of accident hazards. And of course, he must be restrained in many cases; there are certain dangerous activities in which he simply should not engage. Also, provide the child with a chance to develop himself, to learn things by

Details of the International Harvester policy of making price reductions to save customers approximately \$20,000,000 a year have now been worked out.

Prices have been reduced on 163 models. These cover 12 basic models of farm tractors, 123 basic models of farm machines, 16 basic models of industrial tractors and engines, and 12 models of motor trucks, as well as certain motor truck attachments. The new lower prices are effective as of March 10, 1947.

These reductions were made not because of any decline in demand, but because the company believes nothing is more important than to lower the prices of the goods people buy.

While prices have not been changed on all products, reductions have been made wherever possible, in the amounts possible. Prices of many of the most popular products have been substantially lowered.

posing factions.

I am not aware of the men for or against this issue nor of all the promises they made or exacted. In view of the present situation it makes little difference, for those supporting and opposing the issue under former agreements will soon

be told their decisions were made in error.

At the time the arrangement for establishment of the Stratford Rural High School District was made, it would be hard to accuse men making the pledges they did of not using sound judgment upon records of past history.

Although Sherman County has never been publicised for its record of two decades which rival the decreed laws of many of the small populated islands of the south seas which require the death of an elder at the birth of a child in order to control the economic problems, the county's cold hard law of economics until recently made place for her young men and women only until they reached the age of graduation from the Stratford High School. From this point openings for about four to six members of the senior class were open annually for possible subsistence.

Homes established by these few provided the birth rate which defied economic laws for an increase in population recorded in federal census for a gain of four twice in two decades.

In looking backward, it is beyond question that men demanding and men promising that additional taxation would not be required for the education of the youth of this section, could be challenged for their desires and beliefs in pledges made.

Today however the scene has changed, and Sherman County has become a young man's frontier. Every available boy whether college bred or high school educated is greatly in demand in his native county and his earning power is controlled only by his endurance. This situation has brought about and still encourages the rapid establishment of homes. Homes, populated by those of younger years, have sky-rocketed the county's average birth rate. A rising birth rate which in turn increases the rapidly growing number of scholastics who in turn are entitled to the best training finances will provide, to better prepare them for life in a world which is ever requiring a more well developed highly skilled knowledge of whatever field they choose to enter whether it be agriculture, business or industry.

With older men retiring to the role of a guiding hand it has been

necessary for them to make daily concessions to the demands and beliefs of the younger generation. Soon they will be called on to concede a partial change from one of the oldest and most highly known phrase of the west, "a man's word is as good as his bond."

Funds available under the present tax rates are insufficient to maintain a properly conducted school system. Present school board members hope only to have sufficient funds to pay the teachers for the coming term providing no additional expense is required for the repair of the school system or in its operating expense. Maintenance of a meeting place for children without repairs or the maintenance of all-weather transportation without costly repair is beyond the fondest hopes of any of those who have experienced the venture.

In view of these facts, men of the old west, may well take opportunity to make further concession to the new west in admitting "a man's word is as good as his bond while conditions remain within his control." Otherwise, he must come forward from his retiring position with wisdom acquired through the years, to cope with a situation younger men see but one solution, additional funds.

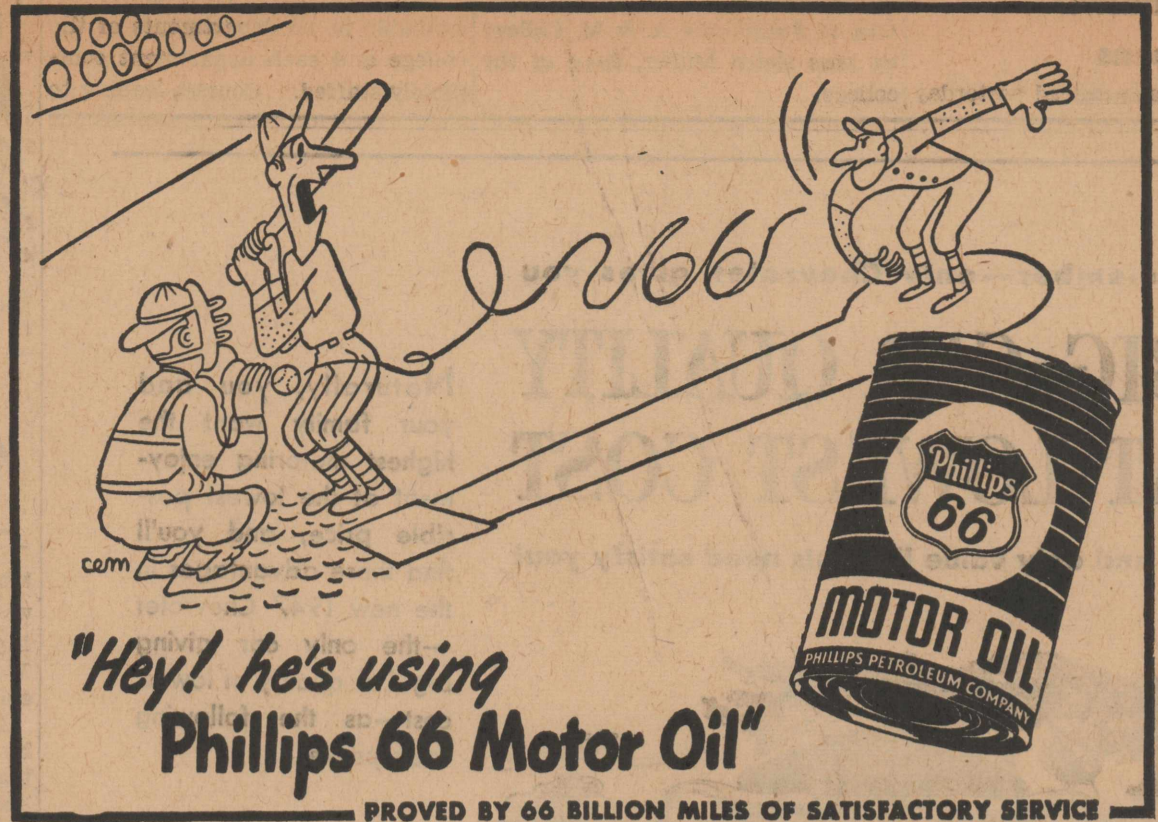
The modern era will hardly accept the reason currently given that promises were made by those who have no control over conditions as they have arisen, as basis for sacrificing the right to raise funds necessary for establishing and maintaining a necessary school system for the education of their children.

Most recent figures show that operators of small farms receive larger payments per acre under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) than operators of big farms. The 1945 farm census shows that a quarter of the nation's farms in-

cluded less than two percent of the country's total farmland. However, more than three percent of ACP payments in 1945 went to co-operators who operated farms of this size.

Half of the nation's farms included only eight percent of the nation's farmland. But 15 percent of ACP's payments went to co-operators who operated farms in this category.

On the other hand, the top quarter of the nation's census farms included three-quarters of the nation's farmland. But somewhat

less than three-quarters of ACP payments, 67 percent, went to co-operators who operated these large farms.

There are two reasons that the smaller operators get more ACP assistance per acre of land:

The first is that in amending the AAA Act in 1938, the Congress provided for an increase in the amount of small payments, that is, those of less than \$200. Second, the Congress provided a maximum limit of \$10,000 on payments to large operators.

Generally speaking, however, assistance is distributed according to needs of the land. In the same area conservation needs of a large farm, acre by acre, are just about the same as for small farms. For example about the same amount of money is spent to carry out conservation measures on an area of 200 acres whether those acres are one farm, several farms, or part of a larger farm.

This general plan is in line with the declared policy of Congress to preserve and rebuild land resources in the national public interest.

### Mountainous Spitsbergen Noted for Mineral Deposits

The majestic, coal-veined mountains that form the Norwegian islands of Spitsbergen rise from Arctic waters at the "top of the world," points out the National Geographic society. The group, officially known as Savalbard, is about 700 miles from the North Pole and 400 miles north of Norway. The northern part of Greenland is 280 miles to the west.

Despite their inhospitable location, the islands are one of the few Arctic regions that have supplied minerals to countries in the temperate zone. Deposits of iron ore, copper, and zinc are largely undeveloped, but the vast coal resources—estimated as high as eight billion tons—have been mined for half a century.

Coal mining is simplified by the fact that the veins often crop out on the mountainsides. The long summer hours of "midnight sun" also help production. Although mining continues throughout the year, the coal can be shipped abroad only from June or July until October, while the harbors are ice free.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Merchants Pledge to Cut Prices; Moscow Parley Ends in Failure; Auto Workers Accept 15c Raise

Retail stores in Newburyport, Mass., experienced brisk business after putting into effect a 10 per cent flat reduction in all prices.

PRICE CUTS: Newburyport Plan Gains

Apparently in response to growing consumer resistance and the urgings of President Truman, retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers are reducing prices on many articles.

In Virginia, Minn., 100 businessmen intend to drop prices at least 10 per cent on everything they sell. In the wholesale and manufacturing field, reductions on various articles and materials have been announced by General Cable company, Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing company and Continental Record company among others.

AUTO WORKERS: Settle for 15 Cents

In an unexpected move, United Auto Workers accepted the offer of General Motors corporation of a wage increase amounting to 15 cents per hour. The agreement covers 220,000 production employees of the huge automobile concern.

The new contract, to run to April 28, 1948, provides for an immediate raise of 1 1/2 cents per hour, and 3 1/2 cents additional for six holidays, thus working out to a flat increase of 15 cents per hour.

FRANCE: Shortage of Flour

French people, especially the Parisians, have been trying to buy up all the bread and flour they can lately. Bakeries have been virtually stormed in the capital. The daily bread ration of 13 1-3 ounces was reduced by one third, to nine ounces, on May 1. Bread is a large item in the French diet, probably the largest in many cases.

Driving More Expensive It costs 53 per cent more to operate a passenger car now than it did in 1939. In the country, the expense increase averages 43 per cent.

MOSCOW CONFERENCE: Little Accomplished

After seven weeks of wrangling, the foreign ministers' conference at Moscow ended in a state banquet. Results of the parley were extremely disappointing, even to those whose expectations had been small.

Secretary of State Marshall bluntly blamed the Russians for obstructing the negotiations. He charged that the Soviet delegation had "widened rather than narrowed our differences."

Obtains Divorce



Lovely Mrs. Maria Feliza Vanderbilt, 29, has divorced her socialist husband, Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., in Los Angeles. She is the daughter of the Mexican cattle baron, Rodolfo Pablos, and wealthy in her own right.

NO RENT BOOST: House Kills 10% Plan

The house banking committee, reversing its previous stand, voted down a proposal for a 10 per cent blanket increase in rents. It approved and sent on for action a bill continuing controls until December 31.

Continuance of rent control just about as it is now until December 31, with the President having authority by proclamation to keep ceilings in effect until next March 1 if he deems it necessary.

Fifty Stars in Flag?

A new design for a United States flag has 50 instead of 48 stars. The two added stars will represent Alaska and Hawaii which congressional leaders say will be admitted to the Union before the summer recess of congress.

BEING LOYAL TO TRUE RELIGION

LESSON TEXT—I Kings 18:20, 21, 30-39. MEMORY SELECTION—Hear me, O Lord, hear me, that this people may know that thou art the Lord God, and that thou hast turned their heart back again.—I Kings 18: 37.

God meets the challenge of unbelief and sin through the ages in its different forms. In the days of Elijah it was the awful power of the false religion of Baal which threw its pall of heathenish immorality over the people.

The prophet was God's man of courage in a day of unbelief and sin. To be courageous means to steadily meet perils of which one is keenly conscious, doing so because of the call of duty. Courage holds a deeper and nobler meaning than bravery, carrying with it the idea of moral strength and, in the case of the Christian, faith in God as one devoted to his cause.

The account of the conflict with the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel is a dramatic and instructive story. It shows that when God's man meets God's enemy there is an open, above-board, honest victory.

The appeal to Israel cut no corners and made no compromises. They must choose between the true God and the false Baal. They could not hold to both or halt between two opinions. The same is true today of our relationship to Jesus Christ.

The direct challenge at Mount Carmel follows the same pattern of out-in-the-open dealing with the problem.

Men whose deeds are evil love darkness rather than light. God does not have to work in the dark. All of his workings are in the open sunlight. Everyone is welcome to "come near" and see what is done.

Elijah knew God and he acted like God's man. What a tragedy it is that not all of God's servants have followed his example. If we had the open and above-board dealings of Elijah in the affairs of our churches, we might see more of the fire and power of his ministry.

Certain it is that the administration of church affairs which has to be carried out in hidden corners by whispered conversations and by secret manipulations behind the scenes is not God's work at all, it is the work of man.

Elijah rebuilt the altar himself. He asked no help of the unbelieving prophets of Baal or of apostate Israel. How old-fashioned he seems in this day when so much stress is laid on a false unity of the faiths, and there is so much solicitation and acceptance by the church of the help of unbelievers in financing the supposed work of God.

Note also that Elijah invited his enemies to make the answer to his prayer more difficult by pouring water on the sacrifice. This was not an act of bravado; it was for the purpose of demonstrating that there was no fraud. He was willing that the enemies of the truth should make the demonstration more difficult if that would be to God's glory.

There is a delightful old-fashioned flavor about that act, too, in these days when men are frequently willing to compromise with unbelief and even with sin, in order that the work of the church may be carried on without too much difficulty. Here again we have an explanation of the lack of spiritual power in our times.

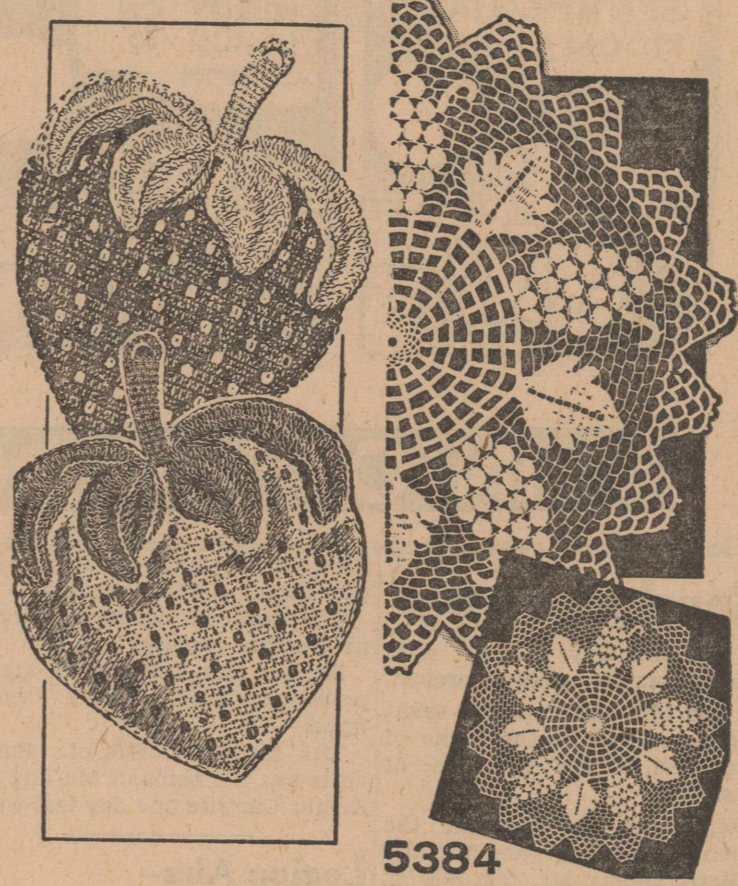
The victory which came was a glorious testimony to the living reality and the infinite power of God. It left

A man of bravery usually wants recognition for himself, while the courageous man asks only that the cause for which he fights shall be successful.

Elijah had long since demonstrated that he was absolutely fearless, and sought no favor or glory (read the entire story). Now in the tenseness of this moment, he carefully rebuilds the altar of the true God (v. 30), makes it a testimony of unity to a divided Israel (v. 31), and he does it all in the name of the Lord (v. 32).

His prayer (vv. 36, 37) is a profoundly simple expression of a complete faith in the true God and his power, on the part of a man who recognized himself as being only the divine servant. He made no plea that God would vindicate him or his ministry, but he did plead that the name of the Lord should be honored in the midst of an unbelieving people.

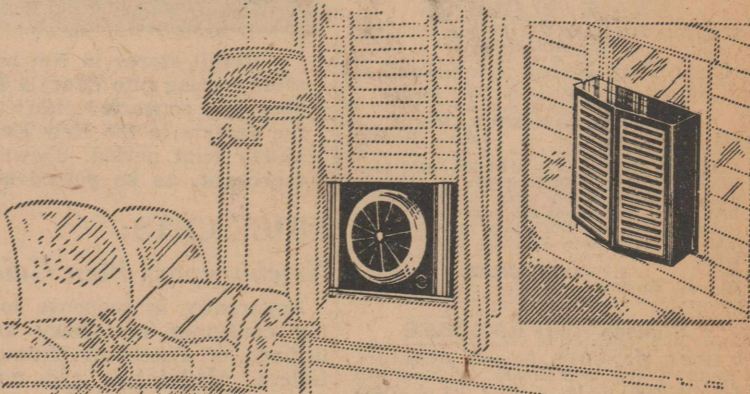
