#### **Billion Bushel Wheat Crop** Forecast

Farmers may produce a billionbushel winter wheat crop this year, recent reports show. This would be about 17 percent more than the **Freezing** previous wheat record of 874 million bushels produced in 1946. The 1936-45 average is 654 million. Acreage remaining for harvest is the largest since 1919. Wheat came through the winter in unusually good condition, and other fall-sown crops have shown improvement if you freeze your own fruit. #### **Proper Fly Control Eliminates Disease**


#### **Proper Equipment and Application Important**

Many diseases and cases of contamination are traceable to flies. Spraying with DDT and other new chemicals presents the first truly effective means of controlling flies.

DDT is amazingly effective for

several weeks. Flies landing on treated surfaces die in a few minutes from a condition similar to delirium tremens. The main steps to a good fly control program are: First: Clean up the breeding places where flies lay their eggs.

Second: Spray DDT on all surfaces where flies gather. For this work a sprayer developing some pressure is needed. A garden type compressed air or larger sprayer will do the job efficiently. Around the home, spray the doors, windows,

and walls of barns, poultry houses and hog houses should be sprayed. Two or three sprayings a year will provide excellent control.

DDT is positive but slow in its action. Dairymen still are using hand sprayers for a quick knockdown of visiting flies at milking time. The hand sprayers also are convenient for spraying again those areas exposed to rain, where DDT may be washed off.



MAKING REFORMS SUCCEED

LESSON TEXT-II Kings 22:10, 11; 23:1-5, MEMORY SELECTION-Give me undertanding, and I shall keep thy law.—Psalm

God can bring blessing out of the most unpromising of circumstances. Yes, and men can make chaos out

of God's greatest gifts.

The good Josiah became king at eight years of age, and was sur-rounded by godly counselors who helped him become an outstanding ruler for God. When he was sixteen he had a real religious experience (II Chron. 34:3), and at twenty he began to purge Judah and Jerusalem of idols and wickedness.

I. A Book Found and Read (22:10, 11; 23:1, 2).

The Word of God had been negboomed forth lected for about sixty years. How while his free sad! Yes and how sad that in our homes the Bible is so often neglected—on a book shelf, or in a trunk, or gathering dust on a living room table. A lost Bible, and a people living in sin! How much we need to push aside the rubbish in our lives and bring out our "lost" Bibles.

Observe that they not only found the book, but they read it. That was true of the ones who found it as well as of those to whom they passed it on. What a good thought we have there: read the Bible, yes, but be sure to get someone else reading it too.

In Josiah's day it was thus first received

1. By the King.

The ruler or rulers of the people need to return to God's Word in our day. It is all too often neglected in the council chambers of the nations.

Josiah was moved by what he read to real repentance. He realized that the judgment of God must come. Inquiry at Jerusalem brought word from Huldah the prophetess that it would come, but not in Josiah's day.

The king was not content to keep this word to himself, and insisted that it be read

2. By the religious leaders. The priests and the prophets who were doubly guilty in neglecting it were now brought face to face with God's revelation.

Who will say that the great need in America is not just this, that its preachers and denominational leaders get back to the reading and teaching of God's Word. Book reviews, lectures in economics and politics, discussions of one world almost anything but the Bible. Such is the fare of many of our preachers. No wonder that they and their people are spiritually starved.

Josiah knew what was needed and the Word was now read

3. By the people. Applying that to our day, it is true that the Bible is our best seller, that it is available to every home, and that most decent households have not one but many Bibles. But are they being read? The answer is obviously no. Let's correct that dreadful situation. Read your Bible! II. A Book Believed and Prac-

ticed (23:3-5, 21). Josiah saw that it was not enough to read and rejoice over the Word of God. Something must be done

about it, and he did it. 1. The king made a covenant with

Standing in a prominent place before his people, he humbly and solemnly renewed his consecration to the Lord, and promised to abide by his Word with all his heart and soul (v. 3). Such a leader could not but inspire his people to do the

What a blessing it is to us when scolded and pleaded and begged but we hear of some man promi-Marjory was immovable. She must nent in the affairs of the nation or state who loves the Lord, and keeps his commandments. He is not only an inspiring example, but a real witness for God.

2. The priests cast out the idols

The king required this of them, and they proceeded thus to cleanse the places of worship and prepare the way for a true devotion to God. Here again we say that when religious leaders get back to their first devotion to God and put away the empty philosophies of this world, we shall see a revival.

What did the people do? Josiah saw that they needed some positive expression of their faith. It was not enough to tear down the idols; they must re-establish the true worship of God. So we find that

3. The people kept the Passover. This was the great feast of the Jews which spoke of redemption from bondage. It pointed forward to Christ the Redeemer from sin. He is our Passover (I Cor. 5:7).

In these dark and bewildering days people are looking to Christian leaders to prepare a feast of remembrance of the death of Christ and of his glorious redemption. Let the people gather round him and, cleansed by his precious blood, keep the feast with joy and purity of heart (I Cor. 5:8).



Baking Pan

Cookery scientists say that flouring the pan after greasing is added ance against sticking, but has the disadvantage of forming a slight extra crust which many cooks dislike. As for waxed or greased paper lining, used to protect against scorching or sticking to the pan, unless it is pulled off immediately after baking it may stick to the baked food. Greased pans with no flour or paper are recommended for quick breads and yeast breads. Heavy unglazed paper is suggested for rich mixtures like fruit cake which burn easily and need long, slow baking. For cake baking the bottom of the pan only should be prepared. The sides are left plain without greasing so that the batter can cling as it rises and thus help keep the cake light in texture. Sponge cakes and angel food are exceptions to this general rule. They are baked in plain pans-no greasing, no flouring and no paper.

Cleaning Mirrors

Special care must be taken in cleaning mirrors, not only to keep the glass clear but also to preserve the silver coating on the back. Home improvement specialists advise wiping the glass with a cloth moistened with water containing a little vinegar or ammonia, and then dry ing with a soft, clean, lint-free cloth Avoid soap because it streaks glass. Take care that no water runs down between the frame and the glass; or gets on the back of the mirror. Water damages the silver covering on the back. The wooden frame on a mirror may be cleaned by wiping it off with a soft cloth wrung out in mild soapsuds, then wiping it with a cloth dampened in clear water, and finally drying it with a clean,



#### WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS-

Telephone Strike Fully Settled; House Slashes Navy's Budget; World Relief Needs Surveyed

Secretary of State George C. Marshall, holding one of his last press conferences in the old state department building, told reporters that he could see no further need for appropriations such as the 400 million dollar outlay authorized in connection with President Truman's Greek-Turkish aid program. Secretary Marshall has moved his office to a newly constructed state department building.

#### LABOR PEACE:

#### Strikes Vanish

Peace descended on the national labor scene, at least temporarily, when the six-week strike of telephone workers ground to a com-plete stop as Western Electric company employees in 42 states returned to their jobs.

End of the phone strike marked the beginning of a honeymoon be-tween labor and management. For the time being, not a single major industrial strike was troubling the national economic waters. On the horizon, however, loomed the fig-ure of John L. Lewis, pondering whether or not to call a strike of his United Mine Workers in June.

Tapering off gradually in recent weeks as various union groups reached agreements with their employers, the telephone strike was fully settled when 20,000 members of the Association of Communication Equipment Workers, the last holdouts, accepted an 11½ cent-anhour average pay increase from Western Electric.

Telephone workers across the country walked away from their jobs at 6 a. m., April 7, demanding general pay boosts of \$12 a week. Average increase, when agreements finally were reached, was about \$3.50 or \$4.

#### **NAVY FUND:**

#### Big Cut Made

An economy - minded house of entatives forcibly passed a \$3,469,761,100 navy appropriations bill which represented an 11 per cent cut in President Truman's original request for navy depart-

ment funds. Shouting down cries that the reduced appropriation would shrink navy and marine corps manpower by 82,000, house Republicans, in a voice vote, approved the naval budget for the coming fiscal year at a figure about 377 million dollars below the administration's estimate of the amount necessary to maintain required strength.

Defending the budget cut, house members criticized the navy policy of maintaining a disproportionate number of high-ranking officers during peacetime.

"There are far too many men of high rank today," said Representative Ploeser (Rep., Mo.). "The navy can effect its own savings by a considerable reversion to prewar ranks among officers."

#### GRUMBLES OUT:

#### Germans Warned

Restless, protesting Germans have been warned by governors of five million pigs to market next both the American and British zones to stop striking and grumbling against the Allies and buckle down to face the present food crisis with "hard work and courage."

Sumner Sewall, American military government director in Wuerttemberg-Baden, said that protest strikes against the food shortage might cost the Germans relief supplies from the United States. He pointed out that the demonstrations are causing "increased resistance" among taxpayers in this country.

Sewall also demanded that Germans stamp out the black market which is dissipating a great amount of their food rations. He said that farmers who divert their produce into the black market are largely responsible for the crisis.

#### NET PROFITS:

#### Industries Gain

Top money maker in the United States in 1946 was the textile industry which, according to a Wall Street Journal survey, rode the seller's market harder than any other group to register a 219.9 per cent

increase in net profits over 1945. Fourteen textile corporations were reported to have net profits of \$109,435,562 in 1946, compared with \$34,206,787 the previous year.

#### WORLD AID: Survey Needs

Postwar needs of the world will be studied thoroughly in a global survey before the administration decides on further foreign aid programs such as the 400 million dollar Greek-Turkish measure, Secretary of State George C. Marshall has revealed.

First of its kind, the survey is being conducted by a newly organized policy group. Marshall said that with the exception of 78 million dollars scheduled to go to Korea he foresaw no further appropriations for foreign aid at present.

He added, however, that he was not prepared to say what may be required to help other nations in the future. The state department, he reported, currently is seeking some way to help China which could be fully justified to the American people and to congress.

The 78 million dollar fund for Korea will be used to rebuild roads, rails and industries in the United States zone, Marshall said.

#### SUB PROGRAM:

#### Navy Is Worried

In an effort to resolve its biggest worry—that of underwater warfare —the navy has proposed a five-year, 210 million dollar construction and conversion program which ultimately would produce a fleet of 100 super-fast submarines.

Included in the plans is a new type of submarine-hunting "killer ship," a high-speed vessel which would be able to track down and destroy enemy subs in any kind of weather.

High-ranking naval officers are reported to be concerned over the swift submarines developed by the Germans toward the close of the war and the fact that the Soviet navy is believed to be rushing to completion a fleet of undersea boats copied after the best German designs.

If the navy's proposal is adopted, the fast new submarines should be ready by 1951, according to Vice Admiral Robert B. Carney, logistics

#### PORK SUPPLY:

#### Seek More Pigs

Seeking to boost the nation's pork supply during the spring and summer of 1948, the department of agriculture has recommended a general 15 per cent increase in pig production this fall.

The increase, achievement of which would bring an additional spring and summer, is being sought because present prospects indicate that supplies of beef and veal will be shorter in 1948.

#### Fire Losses Zoom

Losses from fire in the United States followed the general trend of the times during the past year. They went

Summing up for the past year, the national board of fire underwriters reported the greatest fire loss for any 12month period in history of the nation. Total amount was \$616,408,000, making an increase of 22 per cent over the \$497,153,000, in fire losses for the preceding year. Losses during the first four months of this year were greater than those recorded in either 1935, 1937 or 1938.

#### To Export More Grain

Allocations of grain and grain products for export to shortage areas during the month of July have been increased about 9 million bushels over the June amount by the department of agriculture.

An estimated 1,407,000 long tons, or about 54,500,000 bushels will be exported in July as compared with the June total of 1,179,000 long tons. The increase will be largely wheat, supplies of which will be augmented by the harvest of the new crop.

#### SEAWAY:

#### Soon a Reality?

The combined seaway and electric power project, designed to bring vessels from the Atlantic ocean along a 2,300-mile waterway to Chicago, Detroit, Duluth and other cities, has been advocated by every president since Taft.

Sen. Arthur Vandenberg (Rep., Mich.) has introduced a bill which would make the vast project self-liquidating within 10 years by means of exacting toll charges from vessels passing through the route. Previous proposals entailed the spending of hundreds of millions of

dollars as a public works project.

If the bill is passed by both houses of congress and if American cooperation with Canada is authorized, real work on the seaway may be expected to begin within a year. Total cost of the project to the United States and Canada is estimated at about 500 million dollars.

#### BLACK DEATH:

Germ Warfare "Bacterial warfare is one of the most important hazards to humanity which could result from misuse

of science.' That is the opinion of Dr. Maurice Visscher, president of American Association of Scientific Workers, who visualizes a future war with planes spreading countless billions of deadly bacteria.

Listed as possible weapons are 33 diseases, among them forms of the great plague, "black death," anthrax, yellow fever, undulant fever and parrot fever.

The United States would be particularly vulnerable to such an attack because of its geographical isolation, Dr. Visscher said.

#### SURPLUS SUGAR:

#### Many Protests

Unless surplus sugar stocks are released to needy housewives, a congressional group will demand immediate repeal of sugar control, according to Senator McCarthy (Rep., Wis.) who is at the head of

the movement. Protests against the department of agriculture's sugar control program have been sent to congressmen from all parts of the country, McCarthy revealed.

"The department of agriculture is trying to make people believe there is a scarcity when there is a large surplus," he said, and added, "They are permitting industrial users to stock up, but are denying housewives the same privilege at the beginning of the canning season when it is needed most."

#### POSTAL RATES:

#### May Go Up

A measure embodying the first general revision of postal rates since 1879 which would add about 110 million dollars a year to post office revenues has been introduced in the house of representatives.

The bill provides for a 30 per cent increase in parcel post rates and would revise the air mail rate from five to six cents an ounce. In addition, the new plan would add about 30 per cent a year to present scales for second-class mailing of newspapers and periodicals sent outside the county in which they are published.

Another provision would maintain the current three-cent local and nonlocal rate for first class mail beyond the July 1 deadline when those rates were slated to revert to the former two-cent level.

The new rates would go into effect 60 days after the bill is passed and signed by the President.

#### AFL to Fight Laws

American Federation of Labor will wage a legal battle against what it terms anti-labor legislation adopted by 30 states, William Green, AFL president, has an-

nounced. He stated emphatically that "the AFL will fight the constitutionality of such measures with all the power of our 7,500,000 members." It is the labor organization's contention that the legislation by various states violates the 13th amendment, which prohibits involuntary servitude.

#### SEWING CIRCLE PATTERNS

Despite powerful opposition, the long-sought St. Lawrence-Great Lakes seaway which would make ocean ports of at least three large inland cities may become a reality in the near future.
