Harold Bennett Tries Rain Making

Harold Bennett was successful in his first attempt at rain making by dropping dry ice on cumulous clouds here Monday afternoon although his Hercoupe would not climb to a high enough altitude for him to sprinkle the ice in the center of the cloud.

After seeding low sections of the cloud bank with dry ice he dived under the cloud to watch the demonstration. Sufficient rain fell to cloud the windshield of the plane.

Bennett and Swift Ingram plan to try the experiment again with a plane capable of climbing to an altitude of 20,000 feet which they believe will give them an opportunity to induce rain whenever the cumulous clouds make their appearance in this section.

Californian Injured In Freak Accident

A Californian, identified only as a brother-in-law of Roy Smith, was released from Loretta Hospital Wednesday, where he was taken in a paralyzed condition after being thrown from a run-away tractor.

According to available details the Californian had come to Stratford to drive home Smith's tractor. He became confused and drove west on U. S. Highway 54 instead of taking the southern route on U. S. Highway 287. He followed his instructions and took the first graded road to his left. As he neared the field in which Robert Bolster was plowing, he lost control of the tractor when it passed over a rough cattle guard. As the tractor crossed a deep bar pit, the Californian was thrown about 25 feet ahead of the tractor which made a bee-line across the plowed field to where Bolster's new car was parked, striking the car in the center of the side, and pushing it sideways across the plowed ground until the engine was killed.

The Californian had gained use of his body except for difficulty in using his left hand at the time of his discharge from the hospital. Smith made agreeable settlement with Bolster for damage to the car.

City Council To Ask For Bids On Paving

Sufficient citizens having pledged financial support to pave most of Main Street to the school house from the present segment of paving and the paving of Grande Avenue from one-half block west of Highway U. S. 287, to beyond the Courthouse, the City Council is preparing to advertise for bids for construction of the project.

Residents living along these streets have pledged \$7.00 a linear foot for the construction of 70-foot paving, curb and gutter for these streets.

The council has also been authorized by the trustees of the Stratford Rural High School District to include paving of the grounds in front of the school building in the contract with the construction company.

A provision will be made in the contract which will permit citizens in the residential section who wish the 40 foot streets in front of their homes paved to include the paving at the contract price. The outside estimate for paving and gutter for the 40 foot streets was \$5.00 a linear foot.

Church Membership Gains

Substantial gains in religious bodies in the United States were found in a survey conducted by the Christian Herald. The survey shows 47 major Protestant denominations reporting a total gain of 1,534,787 for last year. The Roman Catholic church gained 434,453 members, according to the report. The figures, according to the article, were obtained from statisticians officially appointed by the various religious groups. Only those denominations with memberships of 50,000 or more are included, but the 54 religious bodies covered in the survey represent "well over 80 per cent of the total membership." The total membership of the 54 groups is 73,673,182, against 71,700,142 last year. Besides the Protestant denomination and the Roman Catholic church, the list includes Greek and Russian Orthodox, Jewish, Polish National Catholic, Buddhist and Spiritualist groups.

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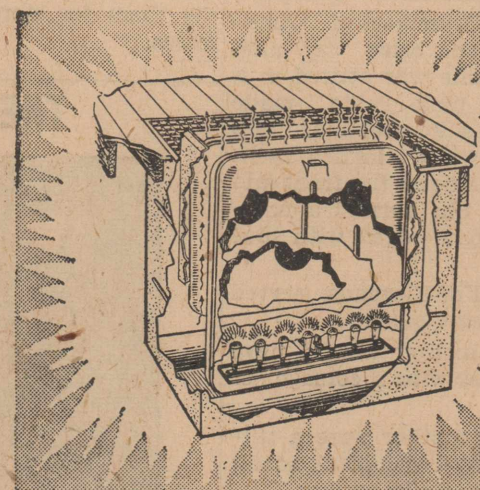

Daughter, Beats
Her With Strap**

**Hated Pleasure and Saw to It
Girl Didn't Have Any by
Belt Lashings.**

KNOXVILLE, TENN. — So she would be safe from worldly associations on her 16th birthday anniversary, a pleasure-hating, part-time preacher chained his daughter to a bedstead augmenting his usual weekly belt-lashing of the blonde girl, police said.

The sobbing girl was released by authorities. She bore welts on her body from the repeated lashings. The police took the father, William Massengill, to jail and held the stepmother for questioning.

Massengill was described as an itinerant minister who took paper-hanging jobs to supplement his meager income from the collection plate at camp meetings and other temporary pulpits.

Geraldine (Jerry) Massengill, the small, slight daughter, owed her escape to her own ingenuity. As her 16th birthday anniversary dawned, she said, Massengill came in her room and padlocked a big iron chain around her ankle. He padlocked the other end of the chain to the bedstead in her dingy room.

The chain gave her enough freedom of movement to get to the window to toss a note to Edward Johnson, 8, playing outside.

Friend Notified.

It was addressed to Barbara Jean Rutherford, a neighborhood girl of Jerry's age.

"Daddy has chained me to the bed, please call the police," the note said.

Edward took the card to Barbara and she called police.

Capt. C. V. Christenberry and Patrolman Henry Grady arrived within an hour. When Christenberry saw the chained, bruised child he called Police Chief Joe Kimsey so he could see it for himself.

As the police struggled with the locks and chain, Massengill came in and gave them the keys.

He readily admitted chaining her to the bed and said, "I guess I am ashamed of this, but it was the only way I could keep her home so she wouldn't get into trouble."

"You won't believe me, but I loved her," he continued.

When police questioned him about the red welts on the girl's hips and legs, he admitted that he was in the habit of whipping her.

"At least every week," broke in the weeping girl.

Massengill produced a collection of belts that he said he used in the beatings.

Described as Quiet.

Mrs. Delbert Johnson, mother of the boy who delivered the note, said Geraldine was a quiet child who stayed at home virtually all of the time.

Geraldine said she had never been to a movie, gone swimming or attended a party because of her father's harsh rules. Her brother, Edward, 18, ran away from home almost a year ago because of the severe beatings he received from his father, the girl added.

Jerry will be placed in a juvenile home where she can receive proper care, officers said, and when they told her she tearfully exclaimed: "Thank goodness!"

Police were so touched by the girl's plight that they took up a collection to buy her a complete new outfit of clothing.

Formal charges had not been placed against Massengill or his wife. Jerry and Edward's mother died some years ago and Massengill's first wife had also died.

**Owner on Foot Race Blasts
Thieves From Bus Motor Car**

PHILADELPHIA. — Magistrate Victor F. Girard dismissed Anthony Jistarrri on charges of reckless use of his .32 caliber revolver and violation of the firearms act after Jistarrri explained:

1. He had to run a footrace against his own automobile for a mile.

2. He punctuated the race with four revolver shots.

3. He watched his automobile wrecked against a pole, "crumpled like an accordion."

**Winter Dusk Hazardous
Time for Highway Travel**

During the fall and early winter months, 100 pedestrians are killed in the three hours immediately after sunset for every 24 killed in the three hours just before sunset, according to records of the National Safety Council.

Early evening is not only a period of heavy automobile traffic, but it is also the time when motorists have the greatest difficulty in seeing. Motorists should not be expected to assume the whole responsibility for safety of pedestrians walking along highways and other roads.

Walk to the extreme left side of the road facing oncoming traffic, pedestrians are warned. Walk on the shoulder of the road if there is adequate room. Be alert for cars coming in either direction and look carefully for approaching traffic before starting to cross the highway. When walking along the road at night, wear something white or carry a light so that you can be seen easily. If it is necessary to travel along the highway in a wagon at night, be sure to display a light that is plainly visible from both directions.

Repairing Rugs

Frayed edges, worn hems or fringe—such damages as these are often among the first to develop in rugs. They can be repaired by sewing on new carpet binding. Starting where the damage is deepest, cut off the worn edge of the floor covering. Large shears or, if you're careful a single-edge razor blade or knife may be used, and cutting should be done from the wrong side, following a crosswise or lengthwise yarn as the case may be. Overcast the raw edge. To sew on the binding, lay its right side against the right side of the carpet, edges even. Using a heavy darning needle and carpet thread and working from the wrong side of the carpet, sew them together with slanting stitches. The needle should come out through the binding about one-eighth inch from the edge. Fold the binding to the underside, and sew the loose edge to the carpet back, catching only a few yarns of the carpet; or you may fasten the binding with household cement.

Reaction to Powder Charge

Makes Gun Kick, Says Expert

"That which goes up is bound to come down" is an old statement of a recognized fact, but this doesn't mean that "all that goes out has to come back."

However, when a firearm is fired a certain amount of "come back" is bound to happen. This, in shooting parlance, is known as recoil, more commonly called "kick." To understand it, all that is necessary is a little knowledge of elementary physics.

"To every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. This is one of the so-called laws of motion and is the basic cause of recoil," says Dr. C. S. Cummings, ballistics expert for Remington Arms company.

The gases generated by the burning of the powder in a shotshell exert a force which pushes the shot charge and wads out of the barrel, Cummings said. In so doing an equal force is exerted in the opposite direction against the breech-block. If the gun is free to move then the above law of motion tells us that the weight of "charge" (shot, wads, and one-half the powder) times its velocity equals the weight of the gun times its velocity. Thus the speed with which the gun recoils is inversely proportional to the ratio of the gun and charge weights, i. e., the heavier the gun, the slower it recoils, the heavier the charge, the faster the gun recoils.

Pork Liver Helps in

Regulating Person's Nerves

Pork liver, often neglected by the housewife, is worth almost its weight in gold in food value, according to nutritionists. Lean meat and liver of pork contain the B-complex vitamins — riboflavin, niacin and thiamine — which are essential in keeping the nerves on an even keel. So necessary are these regulating substances that even a slight deficiency may result in "nerves." Other sources of supply are milk, cheese, whole grains and meat.

When the family's nerves begin to get on edge, serve them a good meal of well-cooked pork liver, baked potato, green beans, whole wheat bread and milk, nutritionists advise. One serving, or a fourth pound of liver, whether it is fried, baked, canned or boiled, provides an excellent supply of the B-complex vitamins. Although brining and smoking destroy some of these nerve regulators, cured ham still is a good source of them. Pound for pound, spareribs supply lesser amounts than do ham or shoulder cuts because of the greater proportion of bone.

Only the lean meat and the liver of the hog, or about one-fourth its total weight, supply these nutrients. The remainder of the carcass has no value as far as B-complex vitamins are concerned.

Fireproofing Precautions

For fireproofing Christmas trees and greens, weigh your tree or greens. For every four pounds of tree or other Christmas greens use one pound of ammonium sulfamate or calcium chloride. Put the chemical in a large vessel and dissolve it, using one quart of water to each pound of chemical. Stir until thoroughly dissolved. Stand the tree or greens in the solution in a cool place and let it absorb the chemical solution. Many dangerous burns may be prevented by fireproofing children's cotton clothes and other very inflammable cotton garments such as cotton flannel or other fleecy garments. To fireproof cotton articles, dissolve seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water. Stir until liquid is clear. Dip dry articles in solution until thoroughly saturated. Hang up to dry. They may be pressed with a warm iron when nearly dry. When garments are washed they should be dipped again.

V.D. Bars Marriage

Illinois anti-V.D. laws barred 1,000 couples from marriage out of more than 25,000 given premarital blood tests in Chicago in 1945, a city health department report disclosed. The Council of State Governments reports that anti-V.D. marriage laws are now effective in 30 states. The Illinois premarital examination law requires tests be made to detect not only syphilis but other venereal diseases. This is true also in 11 other states. The remaining 18 states of the 30 total require examination for syphilis only. In all cases, marriage is prohibited at least as long as the disease is in the communicable state, or until properly treated.

Transplanting Evergreen

If you plan on landscaping your yard with evergreen trees, these trees can be moved during any season of the year, although October to May is best. Evergreens, however, require some special handling. Their roots, which contain a substance known as resin, must not be left exposed to the air because the resin will harden. This prevents the tree from taking needed moisture and nourishment from the soil because water will not dissolve the hardened resin, and even though the evergreen may appear to be in good shape, it will die during that same season or at the beginning of the next growing season.

Searched in Vain

Searches rivaling those for the Fountain of Youth and the Seven Cities of Cibola in North America furnished a pretext for extension of Spain's empire in South America where exploring parties hunted the fabulous empire of the Caesars of Patagonia. The legend told of a mysterious European city deep in Patagonia whose residents, known as "Caesars," were extremely wealthy and long-lived. Spanish gov-

ernors equipped many expeditions during the early 17th century to search for the city and sporadic quests continued until the close of the 18th century. Although such searches were naturally fruitless, they provided early geographic and ethnic information concerning South America and in opening the way for future settlement of the region.

Summer months are the time of

sudden electrical storms, warns the National Conservation Bureau in its efforts to prevent accidents. Over 400 persons are killed every year when struck by lightning. If you're caught in a storm, stay out of open boats, don't stand under tall trees.

Control of Insects Vital in Gardening

New Insecticides and Combinations Effective

Good gardeners and vegetable growers have learned that insect control is as important as good seed, weed control and water.

New insecticides, new combinations and better "sticking" agents have made vegetable and garden dusting more popular and effective.

The duster should be able to reach the under side of the leaves in most crops. Many insects feed on



Type of hand duster effective in most gardens.

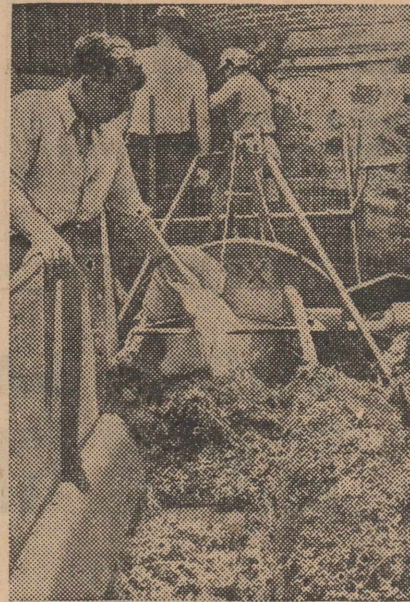
the under side. In the control of blights and other plant diseases complete coverage is important.

For the average garden, a hand plunger duster is adequate. This duster should have a long discharge tube with upturned end for under-leaf dusting. Larger gardeners and commercial acreages are more efficiently dusted with crank or knapsack dusters. Good dusting equipment is more efficient and effective in control of insects and plant diseases than make-shifts.

Potato yields have been increased 40 to 60 per cent in University of Wisconsin tests by spraying or dusting DDT at 10-day intervals. Leaf hoppers, flea beetles and potato beetles were controlled. Bean beetles, cabbage worms and most common insects are controlled by dusting.

Whey as Preservative

Dried cheese whey is added as a preservative in a grass silage demonstration, using a temporary silo, on the farm of Emerson Grebel, Beaver Dam, Wis. The grass, mixed legumes, was chopped in the

field. Whey powder, about 30 pounds to the ton, was added to the chopped grass as it was fed to the blower. FFA members are following through to study quality of silage as it is fed out, and effect on milk production.

Sulfathiazole Used Against Calf Scours

Calf scours treatment with vitamin pills or tablets does no good. That's the latest word on the subject from Cornell university. Those in charge of the Cornell work say: "Studies involving approximately 60 heifer calves of various dairy breeds show that supplementing a normal diet with capsules or tablets containing vitamins A, D and E, ascorbic acid, and several of the B vitamins did not reduce the incidence or severity of scours."

Remove 2,4-D Residue From Spray Equipment

Injury to plants, such as stunted growth and reduced crop yields, may result when using spray for insecticides and fungicides which contain 2,4-D residue. The most effective means of eliminating 2,4-D spray residue is with hot water and household ammonia. Rinse the contaminated spray with hot water, then fill to capacity with water underboiling and ammonia, two teaspoonsful per quart of water.



Cultivating Good Will

IT IS true that the Christian life gives offense on occasion. When a controversy exists between men and God, the Christian has no other course of action than to align himself on God's side. As he takes his stand in such cases, he should do it in love, but nevertheless with firmness.

The Bible nowhere commends a critical spirit or a perverse attitude. It rather emphasizes the necessity of firmness in the course of right, a firmness that loses nothing of its intensity through being tempered in the fires of love.

The Christian beyond all others should give himself to a life manifesting sympathy, kindness and charitableness. Thus he will open avenues of opportunity, of witness, and of service in which the Lord may be greatly magnified.

I. Contributing Factors to the Making of Good Will (Prov. 3:30, 31; 22:24, 25; 25:18; 26:20, 21).

VARIANCE and strife mar good will (Prov. 3:30, 31). Notice that this strife is unoccasional. When we strive with men to no purpose; when men have not harmed us, and with bitterness of spirit we turn upon them, we of course forfeit every opportunity to influence them for good.

The man of variance similarly should be passed by. We are not to emulate him; we are not to envy him; we are to choose none of his ways.

A wrathful spirit also mars good will (Prov. 22:24, 25). A man of anger is not to be followed by the child of God. This passage enjoins us to have no friendship with such that we shall learn their ways and their ways will then be a snare to our souls.

Another way in which we mar good will is to be the purveyors of untruth (Prov. 25:18). The false witness is characterized as a large hammer or a sword or a sharp arrow, for he wounds his neighbor, often grievously.

The man or the woman who in gossip has maliciously wounded another loses all opportunity to influence him for God. The cultivation of good will involves the speaking of truth.

Let us with all diligence, with the help of God, banish from our hearts and minds all of these attitudes which hurt and mar.

II. Contributing Factors to the Making of Good Will.

IN THE first place, the soft answer of the controlled spirit will establish good will (Prov. 15:1, 18). The soft answer does turn away wrath. The man who is slow to anger appeases strife.

Let us not confuse a soft answer with an unconvincing one, or with that mealy-mouthed procedure that we commonly call double talk. Happy is that man who knows how to present the truth convincingly, who can make men, despite his opposing standards, understand that he has their good at heart. Of course, there is one absolute requisite to such a testimony, and that is a life wholly lived for God.

Another factor in making good will is the act of kindness (Prov. 25:21, 22). This passage, you will remember, is quoted in Romans 12. Here is the opportunity for us, in all matters of personal injury, to place our case in the hands of God rather than to seek revenge. By such acts of kindness, as we trust God, we shall be obeying the Lord; and who knows but that our enemies may thus be turned to him.

A third contributing factor in making good will is that of making peace (Matt. 5:9). So often this business of attempting to make peace is a thankless task, but that thanklessness is only from human sources. So far as God is concerned, he has placed his seal of approval upon every child of his who seeks to lead men into peace with God and to make peace between men.

God speaks of them as being "called" sons of God. It is one thing to be a son of God; it is another thing to be acknowledged as a son of God.

III. The Source of Good Will (James 3:17).

THAT wisdom will be characterized by purity, peaceableness, gentleness, approachableness, mercy, and will be without partiality and without hypocrisy. This wisdom which is from above is guaranteed to those who know him who has been made unto us wisdom (I Cor. 1:30).

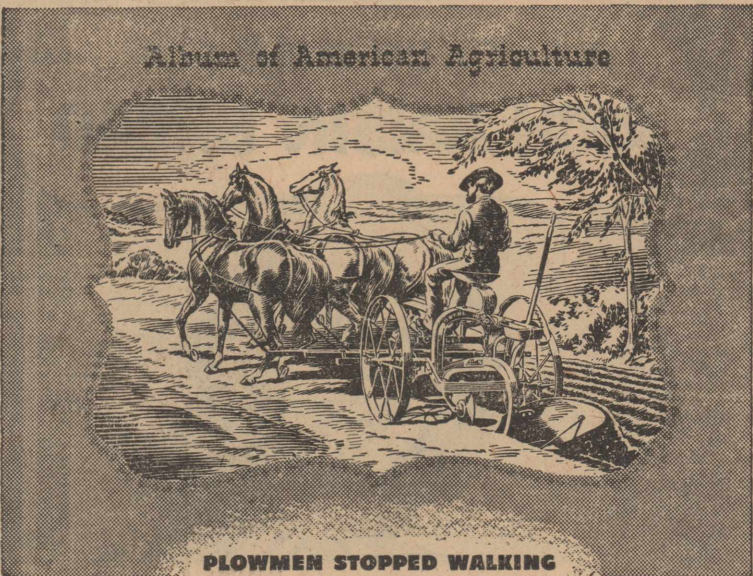

'Indurative' Headache Is

Latest Worry of Mankind

Not a new headache, but one with a new name, is the "indurative" headache. It has a hard name and is hard on the patient, but it has one good feature, it responds to simple treatments. Dr. Herman Chor reported to the American College of Physicians.

Few physicians are likely to recognize the name "indurative," but will recognize the malady under the name of tension headache. It seems to have been known under still another alias three centuries ago when it was called rheumatic headache.

In this kind of headache, the muscles of the scalp and neck are known to be involved. By feeling the head and neck carefully, the physician can find tender spots in the muscles and small even lumps like knots. Along with the headache many sufferers have a slight rise in temperature in the afternoon. For some reason this headache has been overlooked by many scientists who make a study of various kinds of headaches and their causes. Dr. Chor reported that injections of salt solution into the muscles will bring on pain in the head and scalp. The treatment recommended, fortunately, is satisfactory and simple. Massage and salicylates, best known to the layman as aspirin, give very good results. Many have been treating for this type of headache without knowing its name or the reason for the treatment.

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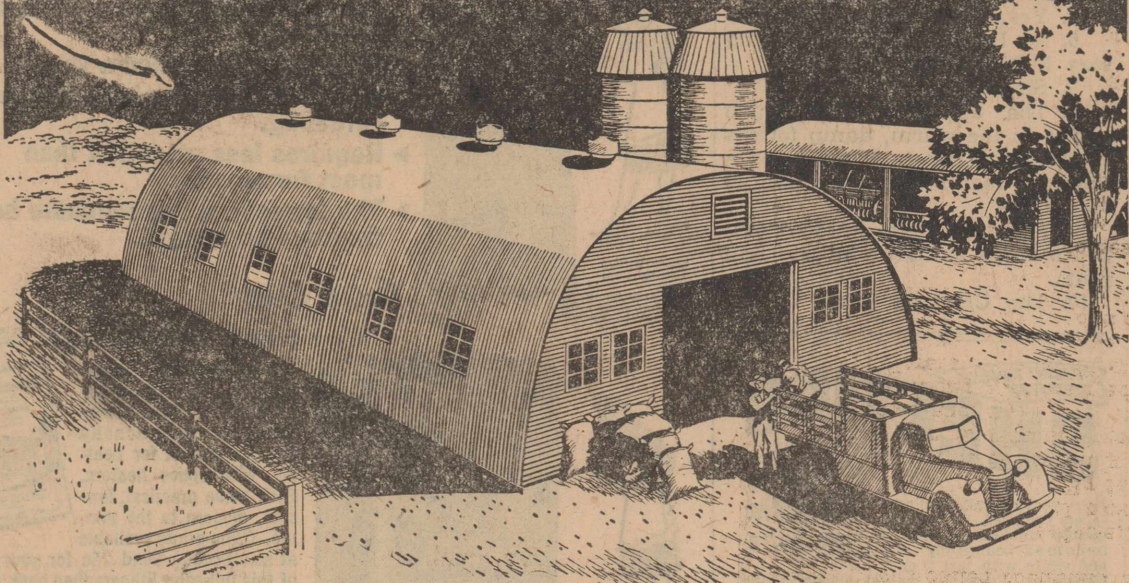
