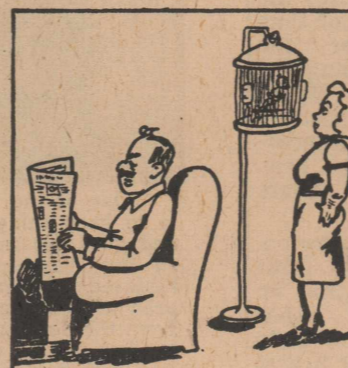

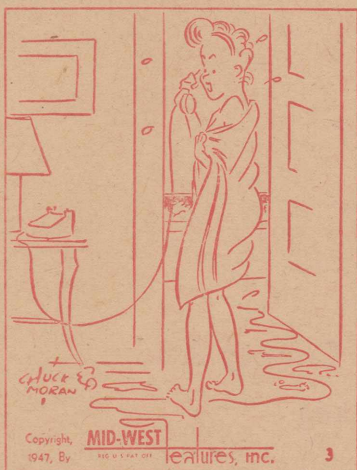

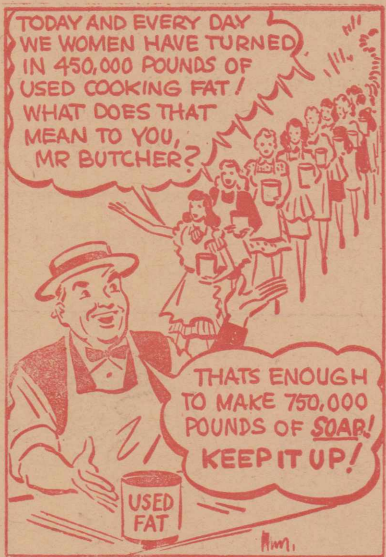
This week the Board of Directors have had their secretary to mail each farmer a letter requesting them to return their 1948 dues before the 23rd of October.

**Rocket to Protect Crews
Against Atomic Bomb**

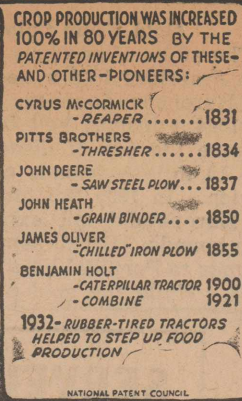
If present plans of navy scientists and engineers are successful, the United States soon will be producing a rocket weapon far more powerful than the famous German V-2. This rocket, together with new ship designs, will guard navy crews against atomic bomb attacks.

The new rocket, which has been named the Neptune, will be 45 feet long, will carry a 100 pound warhead 235 miles high, and will be suitable for launching from a ship, the navy said. The Neptune will rise twice the height attained by the German V-2—which has exceeded 100 mile altitudes in tests at White Sands, N. M.

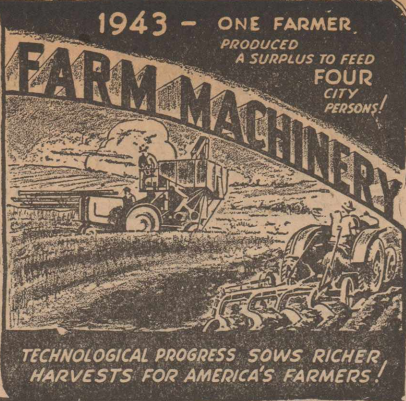
The navy said it has ordered 10 Neptunes from the Glenn L. Martin corp., Baltimore, for \$1,850,000.

TECHNOLOGICAL PROGRESS SOWS RICHER HARVESTS FOR AMERICA'S FARMERS.

The rockets are to be delivered between 1948 and 1951. The first one should be ready by next February and tested in actual flight by June, 1948, the navy said. The tests will probably be held at White Sands and Point Mugu, Calif.

The Neptune is the largest rocket which could conveniently be fired from a ship, the navy said. It explained that the supply of German V-2 rockets is nearly exhausted and new rockets of improved design are needed for further guided missile research.

W. John Kenney, assistant navy secretary, said the navy was revising its ship designs according to knowledge gained in the Bikini atomic bomb tests and in the arctic and cold weather expeditions. Future ships may enter combat with no one exposed at battle stations on the deck. Personnel and instruments will be shielded against attack.

**Flag-Pole Sitting Was
Popular in Ancient Days**

While the popularity of flag-pole sitting has declined in recent years, if it runs true to form it will return for another season of novelty stunts.

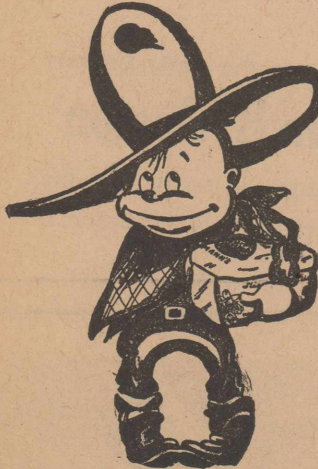
The originator of the custom was said to be a shepherd boy of Syria who entered a monastery when 13 years of age. The rigorous abstinence of the life, however, was not severe enough for the youngster, and he retired to a mountain near Antioch, where he sat enclosed in a circle of stones. This did not satisfy him as being of sufficient torture.

The Syrian lad then took up his fight for torture on the top of a high pillar and spent the rest of his life within the bounds of a four foot square platform on the pillar. Wearing only the skins of animals with an iron collar, he spent his time in talking to the people who gathered to see him, and went through his regular routine of devotional postures. After 30 years of kneeling, preaching and praying, the Syrian lad, Simeon Stylites, died and was buried at Antioch with the honor of a saint in the year of 459. His name in the Greek language meant pillar, and was applied to his followers who followed his mode of life.

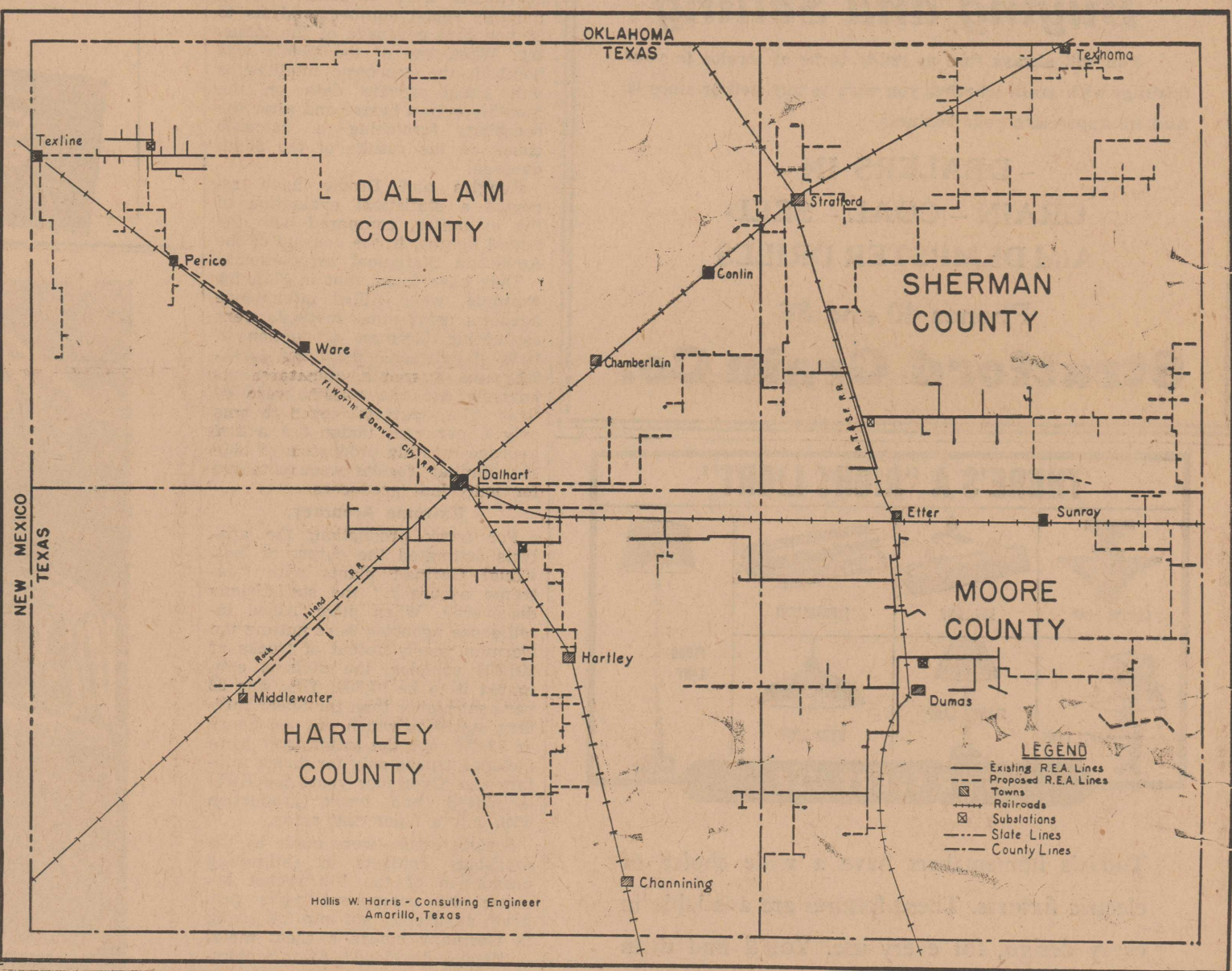

Nazi War Yield Easily Figured

Markings on Equipment Taken From Foe Aid To Statisticians.

CAMBRIDGE, MASS.—Why they had to spend so much time and effort recording carefully the serial numbers and other markings on captured enemy equipment, reporting the data to headquarters, was one of the mysteries of the war to most G.I.s and many of their officers.

The mystery is now cleared up. From these field reports, gathered together at a centralized intelligence agency, the economic warfare division of the American em-

bassy in London, analysts lent by the office of strategic services, the foreign economic administration and the state department were able to estimate German production of tires, vehicles, tanks, guns, flying bombs, rockets and other equipment.

Since end of the war, Richard Ruggles of Harvard university and Henry Brodie of the state department have been comparing the economic intelligence reports of the economic warfare division with official statistics on German production captured in the victory.

They have found that a markings analysis based on objective scientific statistical techniques estimated German war production with what, relatively, was uncanny accuracy and gave Allied intelligence officers "a wealth of information about German industry."

Tire Production.

By breaking two tire-marking codes, the analysts were able to establish that five manufacturers



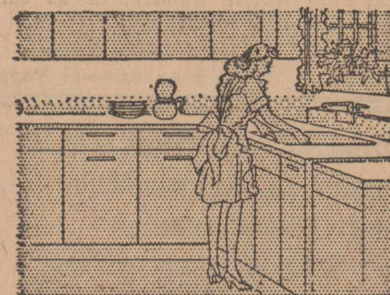
FIXING UP the HOME

LIGHTING THE KITCHEN

THE kitchen is the workroom of the home. The average homemaker spends from five to seven hours a day in the kitchen. Yet kitchen lighting has been altered little in the past decade. Tests made in factories during the war proved that light is the greatest single factor in combating fatigue.

It is true that most kitchen planners nowadays locate the sink beneath a window, yet in actual practice not all kitchens lend themselves to this arrangement. In too



many cases the housewife stands in her own light when she prepares foods and is consequently tired and nervous without realizing the cause of the trouble.

An inexpensive light fixture above the sink will pay dividends in convenience and increased efficiency far beyond the cost and trouble of installation. This is true even when the sink has a window above it, for at least a portion of all kitchen tasks must be performed after sun-down.

Fluorescent tubes recessed in the wall above the sink give excellent light and a look of streamlined modernism, but ordinary incandescent bulbs, properly shaded, are equally satisfactory. Well-insulated, shock-proof fixtures are a wise choice.

produced 70 per cent of the total German tire output. Systematic collection of tire markings was ordered and by July, 1944, 11,000 observations were obtained, raising monthly serial number analysis to 98 per cent coverage of the industry. When one of the plants was bombed, the economic intelligence unit could provide data on the monthly output before and after the bombing, furnishing a valuable check on the results of the bomb damage.

Ruggles and Brodie have reported a statistical evaluation of the estimates, compared with the actual figures, in the Journal of the American Statistical association.

They have found that in 1943, for example, when Allied intelligence agencies using other methods were estimating German production of tires at between 900,000 and 1,200,000 tires a month, the markings analysts set the total at 175,500 tires. The analysts' estimate was only 6 per cent under the actual average monthly production of 186,100. Similar results were obtained for individual producers.

Extreme Accuracy.

For truck production, the analysts estimated the output of individual German plants with "extreme accuracy," the statisticians discovered. When other Allied intelligence agencies were putting the German yearly output of trucks at 200,000 vehicles, the division estimated it to be 97,300. This was 22 per cent higher than the Speer military statistics which put the figure at 79,827, but the latter may have included trucks only for direct military use. Over four years the EWD estimated half-track production with only a 7 per cent error.

Serious errors were made by the markings analysts in estimating production of the V-2 rocket because the component parts program apparently got into full swing in Germany before a sheet metal bottleneck developed. After September 15, 1944, however, the error in estimating was reduced to a maximum of 17 per cent. And by November 24, 1944, the error was reduced to zero and for two periods thereafter the estimates were completely accurate.

Markings analysis was undertaken, it was explained, because "during the early phases of the war Allied economic intelligence proved inadequate for the many needs it had to serve."

Gold From Colonies

The afflux of precious metals from the Americas had a decisive effect on European finances. From 1493 to 1544 Portugal had been able to finance the era of discoveries with the 15 million pounds of gold from Africa. In 1500 the total gold coin in Europe did not exceed 50 million pounds. Brazil sent 194 million pounds to Portugal between 1500 and 1803. While the gold production of

Brazilian mines was declining, new discoveries were being made in North America, Australia, Russia and South Africa. Meanwhile, the American continent had sent 1 billion 300 million pounds worth of gold and silver to Spain and Portugal. And this represented nine-tenths of all the precious metals sent to Europe between 1493 and 1803. The total amount of gold sent from the Spanish and Portuguese

colonies during that period was 300 million pounds, of which 64 per cent, or one thousand tons, had been sent from Brazil, a considerable amount for that time. Since then, other sources have been exploited, so that the gold contribution of Brazil has lessened, and now represents only about 4 per cent of world production.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Americans Exhorted to Conserve Food as 'Waste Less' Push Opens; Yalta Talks Recalled in U. N. Row

DIATETICS:

Waste Less

Lips that sincerely frame the words "food conservation" will not touch such sturdy edibles as meat, poultry and eggs quite so often hereafter.

Charles Luckman, head of President Truman's citizens food committee, opened the widely heralded "waste less" campaign by calling on the American people to cut their consumption of those three items, thereby effecting a conservation of grain for Europe.

At the same time, it was disclosed that stop-gap aid for Europe this winter may run as much as 800 million dollars—220 million more than Mr. Truman had estimated earlier.

The appeal for Americans to cut down on the amount of foods requiring grain feeding was couched in a five-point program which, if followed, will eliminate the traditional race for the last chop on the platter—it won't be there.

Those five diatetic commandments were: 1) Buy cheaper meat cuts; 2) Don't serve too much; 3) Don't overcook meat; 4) Use leftovers; 5) Save wheat in all other possible ways.

In the future was the possibility that a voluntary program of meatless days and a reduction in the size of bread loaves would be put into effect.

Rationing?

President Truman's voluntary food conservation program has assumed new weight and significance because behind it suddenly loomed the specter of nationwide rationing, threatening to become an unpleasant reality if the conservation campaign fails to meet the export requirements for hungry peoples abroad.

Possibility of a return to rationing was hinted by Secretary of Labor Lewis Schwellenbach, who observed that if the "waste less" program is successful "more drastic action" will not be necessary. Predicted Schwellenbach expansively, "But I am confident that the people of this country would overwhelmingly support more drastic action, even rationing of essentials . . . to meet the need of starving people abroad."

Meanwhile, key congressional committees were preparing to meet to consider what steps which might be taken to solve what Sen. Arthur Vandenberg (Rep., Mich.) called "the immediate question . . . of elemental human survival in a free society."

For the time being, prospects of a special session of congress remained vague.

NEW FIGHT: Recalls Yalta

In the U. N. another scarehead of possible failure and collapse of that organization arose as the U. S. and Russia plunged into a new skirmish.

The issue: Which nation shall succeed pro-Russian Poland on the security council. Poland has represented eastern Europe and the Slav bloc for two years. Russia wants the Ukraine, which, although an integral part of the Soviet Union, have a separate U. N. delegation. U. S. contention is that the Ukraine is not a sovereign nation, therefore does not rate a separate status.

In the background of the affair was the Stalin-Roosevelt Yalta agreement which gave the Soviet Union three votes in the United Nations. Russia proper, the Ukraine and White Russia each has one.

How the U.S.S.R. came to get three votes probably happened something like this: Both the Ukraine and White Russia, intensely nationalistic, did not like to lose their identities by being merged with greater Russia. The Communist politburo, therefore, as a sop to their nationalism, granted the two territories a sort of nominal independence.

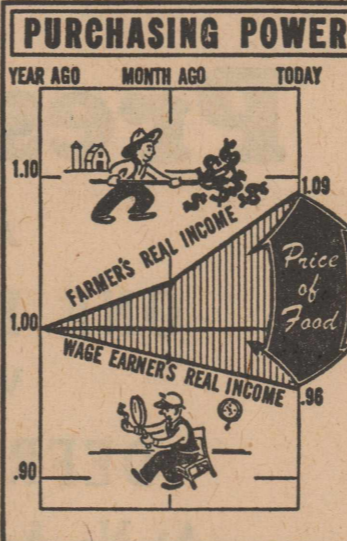
At Yalta, then, Stalin told Roosevelt that he wanted the Ukraine and White Russia to be represented in the U. N. for "internal reasons." F.D.R., being an old politician and sympathetic with "internal" difficulties, agreed.

Thus, the stage was set for one of the most serious battles yet to develop within the United Nations.

Income Disparities

"Real income" of wage and salary earners continues to drop, while farmers' income still is rising, it has been revealed by a monthly Investors Syndicate survey of purchasing power. "Real income" is the relationship of revenue to living costs.

Wage and salary earners now have only about 96 cents of buying power for each dollar a year ago, while farmers have about \$1.09.



KOREA: Suggestion

Problem of Korea, subject of the most bitter wrangling between the U. S. and Russia, may be on the road to settlement.

United States officials in the U. N. revealed that they would ask the general assembly to set a date for withdrawal of both Russian and American troops from Korea and to create a special commission to supervise the evacuation.

Korea has been an outstanding example of the "personal" differences between nations which have been interjected into United Nations proceedings to the detriment of the U. N. Settlement of that problem, and other similar ones, would go a long way toward improving operation and efficiency of the United Nations.

The American proposal was considered an answer to Russia's recent challenge to the United States to withdraw all foreign occupation forces from Korea by the end of the year.

It was indicated also that the U. S. would suggest that the U. N. special Korean commission supervise early elections as the first step towards Korean independence, thus abandoning former plans to place Korea under trusteeship.

The plan bears a marked similarity to the U. S. proposal for a U. N. commission to patrol and keep peace in the Balkans to insure the functioning of democratic processes. Russia opposed the Balkan scheme; how she would react to the same plan applied to Korea was an open question.

GOP IN '48: Says Taft

Still junketing out west, Sen. Robert Taft (Rep., Ohio) went out on what could be a limb with a prediction that the Republicans will win full control of the government in 1948 because the people are tired of "regulation."

Bringing his guns to bear on the opposition, Taft labeled the Democrats as "an unnatural party" and scathingly referred to what he termed the "totalitarian aspects" of the Truman administration.

Although the Ohio senator obviously is bidding for western support in next year's GOP presidential nomination, so far in his tour he has refrained admirably from mentioning the name of Taft and the office of president in the same sentence.

Explaining the "totalitarian" aspects of the present administration, Taft said, "The philosophy of totalitarianism is still more taxes levied by the government, more spending by the government and more regulation by the government." Those, he said, are three reasons why Republicans will win in 1948.

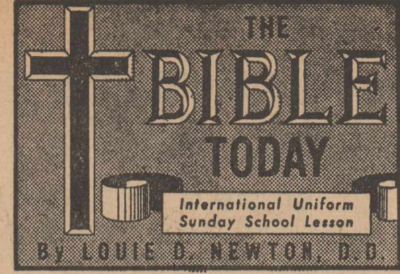

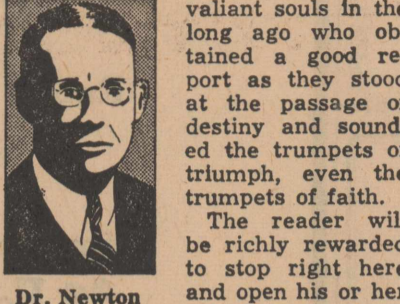

THIS lesson takes us to the Westminster Abbey of the Bible—Hebrews, eleventh through the thirteenth chapters—to meditate for a season upon the



Dr. Newton these three chapters. Your attention will be riveted to the word, faith. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a good report. Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of 'things which do appear.'" Hebrews 11:1-3.

A Journey to a New Land

I WANT the boys and girls to look at the passage which describes how Abraham, "when he was called to go out into a place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went."

How could Abraham leave his pleasant situation in Ur? Through faith in God, and that alone. A memory verse is here suggested: "I will trust, and will not be afraid," Isaiah 12:2. Abraham might well have been afraid of unknown enemies, of disease, of poverty. Men do become afraid of these things, unless their faith is in God. But Abraham believed in God—had faith in God. And he went forth, holding the hand of God.

There is creative power in such a faith. Abraham discovered that every step he took was accompanied by God. He built altars. He talked with God, and God talked with him. Such will be the experience of every boy and girl who stakes his or her all upon implicit faith in God. . . .

What Faith Can Do

INTERMEDIATES are considering what they will do with their lives. It is the vitally important period when they are wistfully considering a life career. This lesson would seem to clearly indicate that God has a purpose and plan for each life. He will reveal that plan to those who trust him for guidance. Faith in God at this point is absolutely essential if we are to live victoriously.

Read again the eleventh chapter of Hebrews and see how these heroes of faith in the long ago cast themselves wholly into the will of God for their lives. We can have no doubt about their ultimate success.

Parents and teachers are here reminded of their solemn responsibility in pointing intermediate boys and girls to the truth of Sunday's lesson. Life is too valuable, too fleeting, to be frittered away in purposeless drifting.

Faith is the bright shaft of God's presence and power to guide young people into his will. It is the unflinching light to direct their steps daily. It is the creative power to sustain them each step of the way.

This Power at Work

TAKE any one of the characters portrayed in these three chapters of Hebrews and see how faith in God produced men and women who changed the course of history. Young people are interested in biography. I would commend to you the lives of the great men and women of modern times, who lived in the creative power of faith in God.

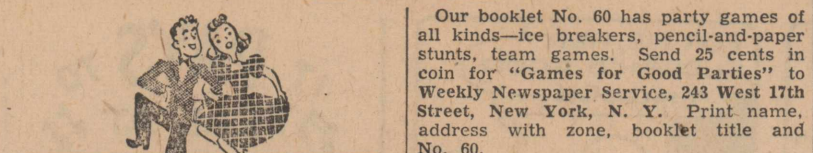
John Wesley, for example. There was a man whose life, when strangely warmed by the spirit of God, lifted England from the depths of secularism and set her feet once more on the highway of worthy achievement.

Martha Berry is another splendid example. Miss Berry devoted her life to God's will and purpose to open doors of opportunity to the underprivileged boys and girls of the southern mountain areas. Today, at Mt. Berry, stands a school with the largest campus in the world—a school which reveals what one life can accomplish when that life is built by the creative power of faith in the Living God.

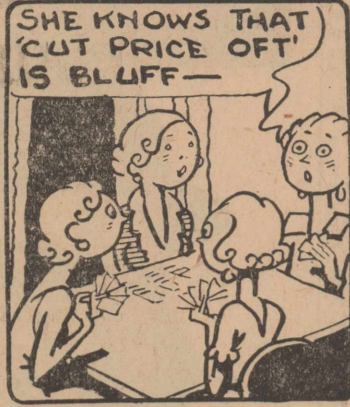

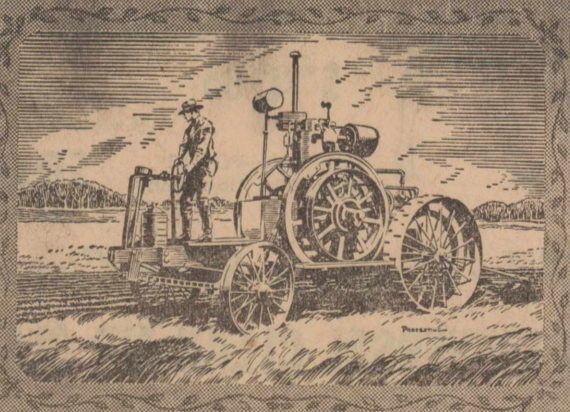

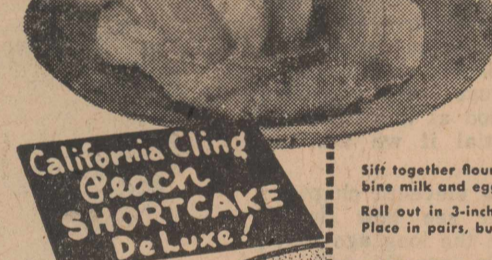
