

Paving Work Order For Main Street Signed At Council Meeting Monday

G. T. Morris, Dalhart, the low bidder on Stratford's proposed paving project, was issued a work order for paving Main Street from its current pavement to the school buildings by the City Council Monday night.

Morris' bid was accepted by the Council at the meeting October 6 when sealed bids were opened, but as the contractor's bids was so close to the estimate made by City Engineer Harvey Schmidt, the council ask Schmidt to re-check his figures to make certain that costs quoted to citizens would be sufficient for the paving project before a work order was issued.

Figures on paving costs as accepted by the council from Schmidt's figures place the paving cost of lots on 70-foot streets at \$200.00 a lot with curb and gutter. Installed curb and gutter paid for by citizens will be used at a reduction of \$42.00 a lot.

Paving of 41-foot streets with curb and gutter will cost \$157.50 per 30-foot lot. Paving of a 24-foot slab in the center of the streets without curb and gutter will cost the owner of each lot \$54.00 a lot.

F. B. Mullins has been secured by the council to collect and disburse paving funds.

In accepting the paving contract Morris stated that the basic figures would be in effect for paving costs only so long as residents contracted their paving while his equipment and crews were working on that segment of paving. Property owners who do not have the street in front of their property paved at the time the project is being carried out may still secure the paving of this segment in the street but at a 25 percent additional cost.

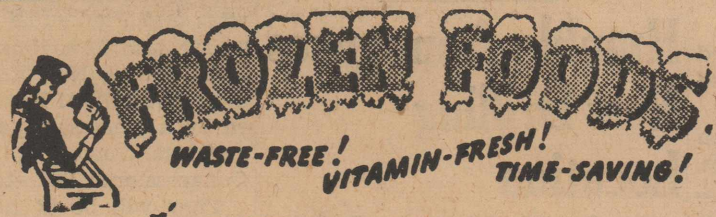

Named to Head March of Dimes



George D. Wilson

Appointment of George D. Wilson, Houston businessman and civic leader, as Texas State Chairman for the 1948 March of Dimes was announced today by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The 1948 campaign to be held Jan. 15-30, will mark the tenth anniversary of the National Foundation, established by Franklin D. Roosevelt to "lead, direct and unify" the fight against infantile paralysis. The March of Dimes each January is the sole support of the National Foundation.

Mr. Wilson formerly headed the trustees of the University of Houston, the Houston Board of Education and the Junior Chamber of Commerce. He has been active in the American Red Cross and served on the Presiding Bishop's Committee on Laymen's Work of the Protestant Episcopal Church. He was 1947 March of Dimes chairman for Texas.

In announcing that Mr. Wilson had accepted the state chairmanship, Mr. O'Connor revealed that since 1943 infantile paralysis has taken a tragic toll, with more than 72,000 Americans having been stricken.

"Thousands," he warned, "continue to face a long fight for recovery. This summer, fortunately, we had a 'breathing spell' as polio incidence nationally did not approach the awful total of 1946.

"The cost of the 1946 epidemic alone will run to some \$30,000,000, without taking into account the large sums necessary to care for those stricken this summer. We do not know what 1948 may bring, but we must be prepared."

There are about a million people in the United States who have no anxiety, no fears, no prejudices, no vices and no weaknesses, according to Dr. Earl D. Bond, professor of psychiatry of University of Pennsylvania. Like the few completely demented people at the other end of the line of 140 million people, these

"perfect ones" are not interesting and they do not seem human. Analyzing the possible effects of neurosis upon health and life expectancy, Dr. Bond declared that the majority of people in America — "about 133 million" — go about their work in industry or in family life with some unnecessary handicap of nervousness. They carry a burden of fear or prejudice, he said; they are over-conscientious,

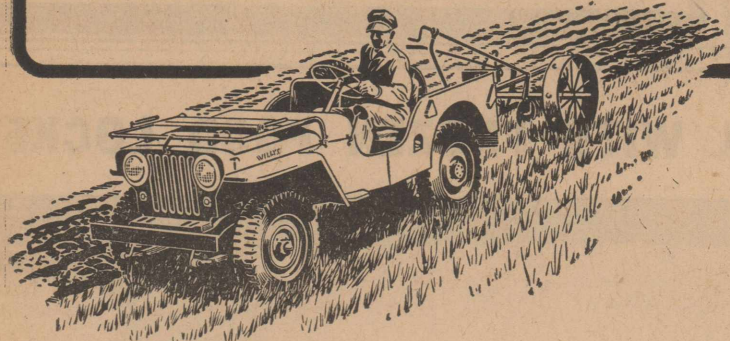

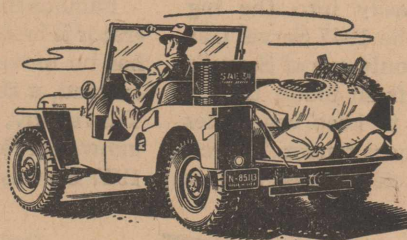

over-sensitive; they struggle with feelings of inferiority. "While it is by no means clear just how much nervous symptoms decrease life expectancy," Dr. Bond said, "it will be in line with scientific advance to take an interest in the compilation of records which include the emotional factors which create or modify physical disease."

"As we go up toward the normal," Dr. Bond said in his analysis of the nation's population, "we notice that next to the patterned neurosis come leaders, responsibility takers, chairmen of committees, ministers and a goodly number of physicians. The more tension in these fine people, the more they share in the slightly worse prognosis of the regular neurosis."

Canning Process Changed For Low-Acid Type Foods

Much unnecessary work and cost can be avoided in putting up fruits,

vegetables and meats by following a solid, scientific basis for home canning of low-acid foods, extension specialists point out.

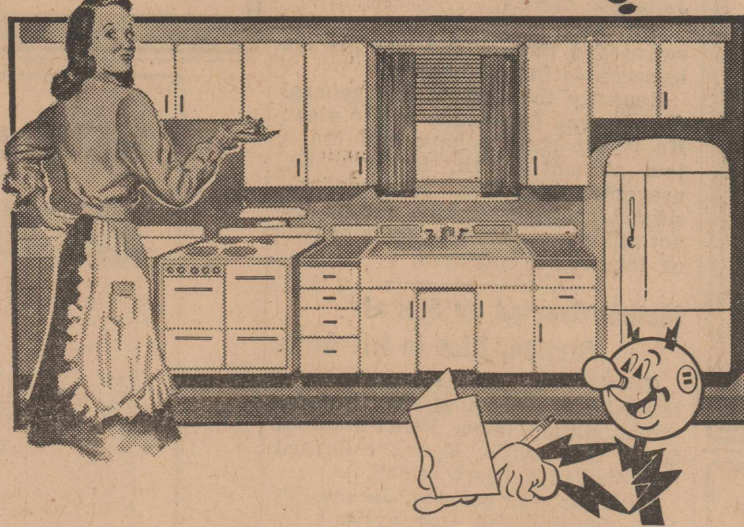
Processing times for food in pint jars can be safely reduced from 25 to 40 per cent below previous recommendations as proved by a long process of research in canning low-acid foods.

Let's take meat, for example. Processing temperature for meats is now set at 240 degrees instead of 250 degrees. Department of agriculture scientists have counted bacteria under microscopes before testing the amount of heat required to kill them, and thus determined the lowest heat needed to sterilize food.

Excessive processing makes low-acid foods unattractive and low in vitamins, although it is important that steam pressure be used in canning low-acid foods to safeguard against botulism—a serious form of food poisoning.

Since mineral oil is not a food, the council does not favor substitution of mineral oil for edible oils in the preparation of foods where the amount of oil represents a liberal proportion of the finished product.

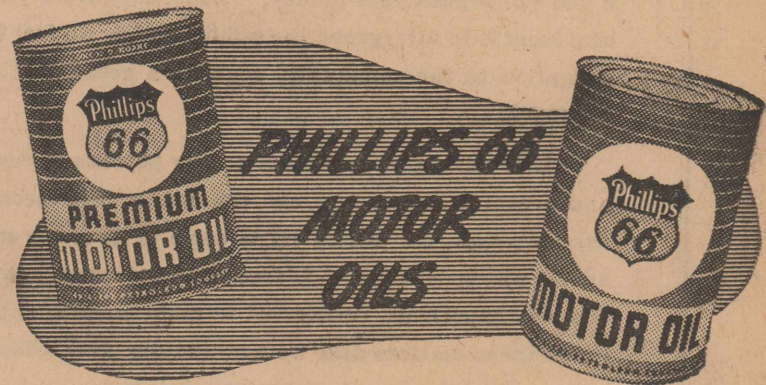

Jap General Is Noted Mystery Man of China

His Activities Shrouded in Dense Military Secrecy; Still Seems Busy.

NANKING, CHINA. — Lt. Gen. Okamura, former supreme Japanese commander in China, probably came nearest to knocking China out of the war. His activities have been the most closely guarded of China's military secrets.

Since September 9, 1945, when he surrendered all forces in China to his former classmate at the Imperial Japanese Military academy, Chinese Gen. Ho Ying-chin, Okamura has held the official position of "liaison officer assisting in repatriation of Japanese troops."

Actually, this task has long since been completed in China proper except for Japanese troops fighting on one side or the other in the civil war.

Still a Mystery.

Therefore, the reason for the continued presence of Okamura and his considerable staff in Nanking is a mystery. His activities are shrouded in dense military secrecy.

An official Chinese government spokesman, pressed for information, said Okamura still was engaged in his repatriation work. The Americans who handled the bulk of the actual repatriation have long since wound up the job.

Chinese Communists, clamoring for Okamura's arrest and trial as a top war criminal, charge that the government is using him as a military adviser to help plan civil war strategy.

Some other onlookers think they detect another reason for the friendly care lavished on Okamura.

His influence could play a part in the future control of a half-million Japanese rumored to be under Communist domination in Manchuria.

Okamura without doubt had greater success during the war against both Communists, and Chinese government forces than any other Japanese commander.

The Japanese star already was dimming, but Okamura launched a new campaign into South China which for a time threatened to knock the country right out of the war.

To Cut Out Allies.

He threw fast-moving forces into a drive aimed at severing China completely from her allies.

His men smashed into the American advance air base at Kweilin and also disrupted the late Gen. Joseph Stilwell's training program.

When Japan surrendered, Okamura maintained perfect discipline over his two million men while the slow process of disarming and repatriation went on. His handling of his men drew praise from high American officials.

For six months after the surrender, Okamura moved about with all the freedom of a powerful military figure. His big automobile was a common sight on Nanking's streets, sometimes with an escort of armed Japanese troops.

Okamura continued to wear his sword and medals and was always impeccable in full uniform.

Recently the remarkable general disappeared from such public view. He is reported to have suffered a jaw ailment which, for a while, prevented him from speaking and served as a convenient excuse for not talking to correspondents or other inquisitive outsiders.

Mother Greeted by Son at Station, Dies in His Arms

CHICAGO. — As she was embraced by her son at the La Salle street station, Mrs. Pearl Beattie, 50, of Somerville, Mass., collapsed and died of a heart attack.

With her younger son, James, 13, Mrs. Beattie had just arrived by train for a two-week vacation with another son, George Beattie, 25, an Evanston fireman, whom she had not seen for two years.

"Hello, mom!" Beattie cried as he hugged her happily. She collapsed in his arms.

A fire rescue squad was called immediately, but it was unable to revive her with an inhalator. A doctor pronounced her dead 30 minutes after her arrival.

Baby Is Found Alive After 18 Hours Locked in Ice Box

ALBANY, N. Y. — Marcello ("Butch") Basco, 4, was found alive in an old icebox at the rear of his home, where he had hidden from playmates.

The tired and hungry boy, shut in the box for 18 hours, was hospitalized for treatment of exhaustion and cuts and bruises suffered in attempts to free himself.

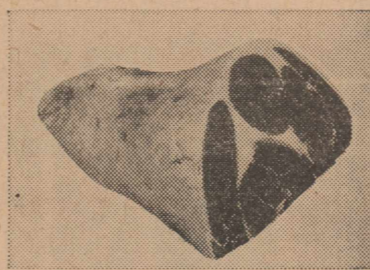
His father, John Basco, said he had looked into a compartment of the icebox, but that he thought the noise he heard "was rats."

MILAN, ITALY. — Leonardo da Vinci's mural, "The Last Supper," in the former monastery of Santa Maria Delle Grazie, will be air-conditioned to prevent further deterioration.

Specialists have ordered erection of an air-conditioned room around the painting with a glass partition through which visitors can view it.

MEAT CUT Quiz



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. This is the beef heel of round.

Q. Where does the cut come from, and how is it identified?

A. The heel of round is cut from above the hind shank. It is a triangular, boneless cut of meat weighing 4 to 6 pounds.

Q. How should this cut be prepared?

A. This cut is usually prepared as a pot-roast. The heel of round is one of the less-tender cuts of meat, and therefore is cooked by the moist-heat method of braising. It is first browned in hot lard or drippings, then a small amount of liquid (usually 1/4 cup) is added. The meat is covered closely and cooked slowly until tender, allowing 3 1/2 to 4 hours for cooking. Often this cut is cooked in liquid, either as a stew or with vegetables as a "boiled" dinner. When cooking in liquid, the heel of round is covered with water, vegetable juices or marinating liquids. Then the utensil is covered closely and the meat simmered until tender.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Food Program Off to Wobbly Start; Comintern Brings Jitters to U. S.; Railroads Get Freight Rate Boost

SIX MONTHS How Long No Meat?

Amid a certain amount of weeping and wailing and less gnashing of teeth than usual, President Truman's program involving meatless Tuesdays and eggless Thursdays lumbered tentatively through its first week.
Even the most ardent optimist could not call this phase of the food conservation drive to help Europe an instantaneous success; however, it might improve with time.
And it was in the handwriting on the wall that there would be considerable time, for administration experts predicted that the days of voluntary self-denial would last for at least six months.

President Truman himself has set the dates for the interim emergency aid to Europe campaign—from December 1 to March 31—although that time limit was imposed specifically for the raising of \$80 million dollars in cash. Regarding the food conservation aspect, Charles Luckman, head of the citizens food committee, said "Our only idea is to do the job until it is done. No time schedule has been set."

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson was a little more definite. He pointed out that conservation to save grain might be necessary until the winter wheat crop, now being planted, begins to come in next June and July. Then he offered a faint hope with a hollow ring:
"Meatless days are not in the picture indefinitely," he said.

The Eating Public

Public opinion, as developed, was far from united on a solid front behind the food conservation plan.
Restaurant operators said their customers were growling about meatless and eggless days.
Millions of Americans resented the suggestion of a voluntary meatless Tuesday since they already are going without meat four or five days a week because they can't afford to buy it oftener than that.
The poultry industry pointed out that if every one of the 140 million residents of the U. S. were to eat one less egg a week, the government would have to buy 600 million dozen eggs under the law requiring government support of parity prices; and the government already holds in storage several million cases of surplus eggs purchased to support farm prices.

SOIL RESOURCES: Depletion?

Hard cash isn't the only cost involved for American taxpayers in the government's program to export a half billion bushels of wheat and feed grains annually to Europe.
The invisible price which this nation is paying is the possible depletion of the soil resources on which our future food supply depends.
During the war years, only about half of the nitrogen taken from the soil was replaced, according to recent studies. Only about half of the phosphorus removed was put back, and less than one-thirtieth as much potassium was added in the form of commercial fertilizers as was removed by harvested crops.
Those facts denote a trend which ultimately might lead directly to untold acres of sterile soil incapable of producing the food in the amounts necessary for maintenance of the American standard of living.
Already, the heavy drain on the mineral supply in the earth has reached the point where yields on many soils depend on the fact that minerals are being replaced constantly.

Supersonic Flight

British engineers have produced a small, pilotless rocket plane which, on its first test run, attained a speed estimated at 900 miles an hour.
The plane was the first of a group to be used in experiments with supersonic speed, in an effort to determine what happens when a craft crashes the "supersonic barrier"—that is, travels at a rate of speed greater than the speed of sound in air.

SECURITY RISKS: No Peace of Mind

Communism, particularly since the revival of the Comintern in nine European countries, is taking its toll in the U. S. by undermining the American peace of mind.
That obvious fact has been given added significance by the state department's disclosure that summary dismissal faces state department employees who are "habitual or close" associates of persons even "believed to be" Communists.
In plain language, that is a reversal of a fundamental principle of Anglo-American law—that a man is judged innocent until he is proved guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.
In fact, the state department, in a "security principles" document recently made public, says specifically that if there is a "reasonable doubt" about a worker's loyalty the "department will be given the benefit of the doubt and the person will be deemed a security risk."
While idealists could quibble at length about abridgment of "constitutional rights," few would deny that the state department simply was playing it safe in the face of a manifest danger.

10 PER CENT: Freight Boost

Freight transportation costs quivered delicately and prepared to take off like big birds as the Interstate Commerce commission granted U. S. railroads an emergency 10 per cent increase in freight rates.
The boost, which applies to all commodities except coal, coke and iron ore, on which increases of 10 to 11 cents a ton were granted, was pretty much what the railroads wanted and will give them an additional 125 million dollars in revenue during the rest of 1947.
ICC authorized the 10 per cent raise as a kind of "stopgap aid" until the board can act on the railroad's major request for an overall boost of 27 per cent which has been pending since September 5.
The carriers said the increase was needed to offset higher wage and equipment costs. Principal U. S. railroads recently granted a 15 1/2 per cent wage boost to a million non-operating employees, and they are faced with similar demands by operating personnel.
Meantime, the consumer-public knew who would get the bill.

POISON: 'Internal Life'

Henry Wallace, who, unlike most politicians, has an opinion on every conceivable thing under the sun, came out with a new idea on the strained relations between the U. S. and Russia.
This mutual ill-feeling, he said, is a disease which is poisoning the "internal life" of both countries.
The former vice-president called the recently established Comintern the "most unmistakable symptom we have had yet of the split between the United States and Russia." That split is what he called a disease.
Wallace said as far as the poisoning of "the internal life" of the U. S. is concerned, Wallace asserted that it has reached a point here where "millions of people are afraid to speak their minds, even in private." That, he intimated, is a forewarning that "thought control" may be on its way "with alarming speed."

SOLD GOLD: Second Time

Badly bent economically, although not yet quite broke, Great Britain, in the latest phase of her desperate quest for dollars, has sold 120 million dollars worth of gold to the U. S. in exchange for an equal amount of ironmen.
It was the second such sale from Britain's now dwindling gold reserve. Early in September 80 million dollars worth of gold was sold to the U. S.

FIRST ATTEMPT: In Chile

First corrosive efforts of the new Communist international organization in the Western hemisphere were uncovered in Santiago, Chile, where two Yugoslav diplomats were accused by the Chilean government of instigating, under orders, a Communist campaign against the United States and hemispheric solidarity.
The two men, Andrej Cunjja, Yugoslav charge d'affaires, and Dalibor Jakasa, secretary of the Yugoslav legation in Buenos Aires, were expelled from the country.

They were, according to an official statement, acting for the Communist international headquarters in Belgrade and had received instructions to:
1. Intensify and co-ordinate a campaign against the U. S. in order to bring the greater democratic sectors over to join themselves to Soviet strategy against the western democracies.
2. Attack the policy of continental defense.
3. Develop a plan of sabotage of production, either by slowing work or causing strikes and conflicts in industries producing raw materials.

It was certain now that the Communists had begun their attack on the mutual defense agreement of the nations of the Western hemisphere had entered into last August at the Rio conference.

Conspirators?

ULTRASONIC: High Pitch

Scientists at Pennsylvania State college have revealed that they are able to generate sound, too high-pitched to be audible to humans, which carries enough energy to kill a mouse, start a fire or keep 20 marbles suspended in mid-air.
A small, lantern-shaped siren chops air, released from a compressor, into sound waves having a pitch of 30,000 cycles, far above the highest pitch which normally can be heard by the human ear.
Researchers found they could burn a wad of cotton in six seconds by holding it above the siren in open air. White mice placed in the sound field died in one minute. The sound also boiled coffee, popped popcorn and killed insects.

Modern Methuselahs

World's highest proportion of centenarians is claimed by the small Italian town of Barga in Tuscany province, where 21 of the 11,000 residents will never see their hundredth birthday anniversaries again.
These modern Methuselahs credit their longevity mainly to the intercession of St. Christopher, patron of travellers, who was a native of Barga. None of the 21 is interested in politics, which also helps.

Boy Helped Solve Problem Of Bridging Niagara Falls

When the first bridge over Niagara Falls was planned in 1848, the problem of getting a cable from the American to the Canadian side was solved by offering \$5 to the first person who could make a kite carry a string across the 800-foot chasm.
After this had been accomplished by a boy, the string was used to pull over a small steel cable which, for several years, enabled persons to go back and forth, two at a time, in a little wire basket.
The original steel suspension bridge thrown across the river just below the American falls had a span of 820 feet, and was long considered to be a feat of engineering.

Religion in Practice

Lesson for October 26, 1947

SUNDAY'S lesson takes us to one of the practical Christian preachers of the New Testament.

Please open your Bible to the Epistle of James, and read especially the first two chapters. James was a man of great faith, but he realized, as we must realize, that faith is best expressed in works.

Then read Matthew 25: 34-46, and for the devotional lesson, read Matthew 7: 15-27.

When you shall have read these passages, you will then be ready for the consideration of religion in everyday life.

A Cup of Cold Water

WHAT someone will be asking, can I do to show my desire to be of actual service, in the name of Jesus. Jesus tells us. He says that whoever shall give a cup of cold water in His name is doing the will of God.

We live in a world that poignantly waits for a cup of cold water. I have just returned from another trip through Europe. I was there in 1946, and I felt then that life in Europe had reached the last possible expression of need. But this past summer I was startled to witness a still greater need.

The question that immediately came to mind as I observed conditions in Germany and England and other countries this past summer was this, What can we do to meet such need? And the answer was ready at hand—give them what you have, in the name of Jesus.

Doers of the Word

JAMES makes much of practical religion in everyday life. He tells us that we are to be doers of the word and not mere sayers of the word, or hearers of the word. And here he means the Word of God—the will of God.

Is there a misunderstood boy in your class at school who suffers from some bitter criticism? This lesson would suggest to every Christian boy and girl to go in sympathetic understanding to such neighbors and help them to overcome these handicaps. Thus we become doers of the will of God.

Living Our Religion

WHAT we are determines what people think of our religion, not what we say about our religious life. James tells us in Sunday's lesson that faith without works is dead. It is that very truth that our generation so much needs to get hold upon.

We have many perplexing situations in our world. Racial differences, differences regarding capital and labor, and so forth and so on.

How are these problems to be solved? By resolutions? We know that many very pious resolutions have been adopted concerning these problems, but still the problems remain.

One Christian in any given community who applies the teaching of James to everyday life will start a train of events that will add up to the solution of any problem, social, economic or what not. We must translate our beliefs into action.

The More Excellent Way

JAMES goes on to assure us that when we undertake faithfully to live our religion, we may confidently claim the promise of God that if any man lack wisdom, let him ask of God who giveth liberally unto all men, and upbraideth not.

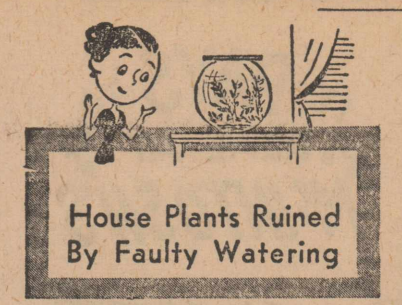
The conclusion of the whole matter, therefore, is to face life as we find it, taking into account the actual facts, and boldly and confidently tackling the job in the assurance that the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ is always sufficient for any and every situation.

The more excellent way of the Golden Rule is the answer to the whole matter. But the Golden rule is impotent until it is translated into action.

And the best of it all is that it actually works. When someone asked Morrison what Christianity was doing for China, he replied: "Christianity is changing China into a community of God." That is precisely what this lesson will do for your community, if you apply its teachings to life as you find it.

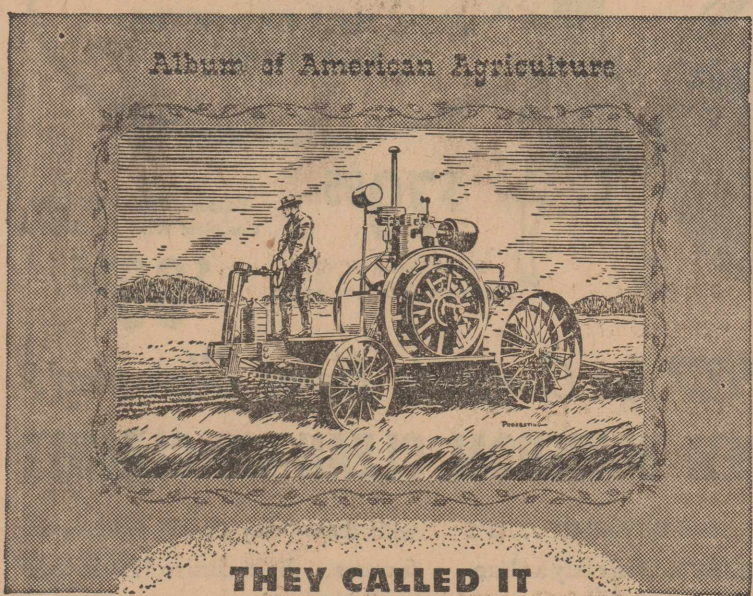
