Turkeys Explained Proper Slaughtering And Bleeding Required

Before killing turkeys, as well as other fowl, see that they have access to water but no feed during the 12 to 18 hours prior to slaughtering. When the turkey shows feed in the crop it will not be graded as quality.

To kill a turkey for market, sus-pend them by shackles, leaving the wings free. Insert the blade of the killing knife in the turkey's mouth




Proper method of killing a turkey as well as other fowl. -Drawing, Cornell university.

and make one clean cut across the upper part of the throat just back of the junction of the head and neck, as shown in drawing.

Hold the turkey head down, with the beak open, until the blood is well started. With the left hand grasp the head in front of where the cut has been made to prevent the pressure of the fingers from checking the flow of blood. Poor bleeding is indicated by visible blood in the veins and by the dark red appear-

ance of the carcass after picking. When the blood is flowing freely, thrust the knife blade straight back on a line between the eyes and ears, through the cleft in the roof of the mouth and into the lower lobe of the brain. Give the knife a quarter turn. This kills the bird and loosens the feathers.

On January 9, 1941, about a year before he went into the army, Graziano was arraigned on a complaint of the Children's society charged with a crime against a girl 15 years old. Corroboration is required in such cases, and for lack of corroboration Rocky was dismissed. When you break it down it isn't so bad, but when you put it together, it

doesn't bespeak the sort of character that responsible journalists should defend at the expense of a decent, conscientious and diligent public servant. Nevertheless, last winter, when Frank S. Hogan found out that Graziano had been offered \$100,000 to throw a fight-this was before he won the middleweight title-you might have thought from the holler in the sport pages that Hogan was a criminal.

'PRIMER OF THE CLEAN LIFE.' The indignation against Hogan ran high and it was by no means the illiterate righteousness that you hear from the guttersnipes of the gambling house beat in defense of the likes of George Raft, Sinatra and Luciano. The sport side essayists are educated stock who, with their college learning, ought to know that a citizen's duty is on the side of the law, not the underworld. Moreover, there is a sort of theory, perhaps one of our foibles, that the sport page is a primer in the good, clean life for Young America. On that assumption, Tom Clark, the attorney general of the glorious old United States of America, called a conference of sports writers in Washington. D. C., last winter soon after the football bribery job. The conference was to lay plans. I guess it did.

Graziano is a dese, dose and dem guy, and a fine figure of a low-brow for the fight racket of song and story. If we had no boxing law, and if we would only let nature take her course and realize that prizefighting is low and rough, the harm done might be negligible.


After the other war, however, we legalized and attempted to regulate and discipline the racket and adopted certain laws and rules. Of course, it is a rogue sport, or racket, and incorrigible, but when under government you encourage and protect an activity, then government takes some responsibility.





tween the American public's views on Russia and the state department's so-called "tough" policy toward the Soviets.

That conclusion was brought out in a recent Gallup poll which indi-cated that, actually, the predomi-nant mood of public opinion today favors an even tougher policy than the state department is following. Answers to the question, "Do you

think that in dealing with Russia and other countries the U.S. is insisting too much on having its own way?" were: Yes, 12 per cent; No, 78 per cent; No opinion, 10 per cent. Further, 62 per cent of the American people believe that the U.S. is being too soft in its policy toward Russia. Only 6 per cent think it is being too tough, and 24 per cent say our official attitude toward the Soviets is about right.

PLAGUE:

Egypt Stricken

Cholera, the dreaded black plague is spreading so swiftly in Egypt that a total of 6,000 dead has been predicted by year's end.

With many stricken villages iso lated by troops, other small communities are ringed with bonfires day and night in the belief that fire will keep out the disease.

Meanwhile, neighboring nations were taking steps to prevent the spread of cholera from the upper Nile valley. Greece, Italy and Palestine have discontinued international traffic, while private shipping lines will bypass Egyptian ports and air travel is diverted away from Egypt. Outside help in combatting the disease is at a minimum in Egypt. Swiss scientists alone were said to be helping local health officers. There is a desperate shortage of vaccines, DDT and medical specialists.

LOW EBB:

Russian Trade

Two years after World War II, trade between the U. S. and Russia, wartime allies, has dwindled to the extent that shipment of U.S. goods to the Soviets is expected to reach the lowest point in 10 years before the end of 1947.
