

## Farm Bureau Convention Saturday

Sherman County Farm Bureau members courthouse in Stratford Saturday to elect officers for 1948 and take action on resolutions which were brought before the state convention in Amarillo this week.

R. C. Buckles was re-elected president of the organization without opposition.

C. A. Weatherford and Sam Wohlford were nominees for vice-president, Wohlford being elected by a majority vote.

K. L. Eller was elected secretary-treasurer by acclamation upon motion of Kenneth Kendrick.

Kenneth Kendrick and Mrs. Bill Lowe were added to the Board of Directors. They will handle Blue Cross insurance which was formerly taken care of by Mrs. O. R. Blankenship, who now resides in Amarillo.

Sam Wohlford presented the request for wheat for the Friendship Train to members present, and 1,090 bushels and 20 pounds of wheat were donated by: R. C. Buckles, Sam Wohlford, Pronger Bros., W. F. Wiginton, Herbert Folsom, Cline Gilbert, Jack Browder, Mr. and Mrs. Emil Blanck, Kenneth Kendrick, K. L. Eller, W. G. O'Brien, Bill Crabtree, H. T. Jackson, Meritt Sweny, Conde Donelson, and Arthur Milton.

Donors whose names are not available made donations through churches and direct through the Stratford Grain Company to fill a car with 1,550 bushels of wheat which was shipped from the Stratford Grain Company Tuesday to join the friendship train.

The wheat will be made into low cost breakfast cereal for European relief.

The delegation voted unanimously in favor of the Cooley bill, a bipartisan bill sponsored by the Farm Bureau Federation to come before the next session of Congress. The bill would consolidate federal agencies, dispose of regional offices, and give more control to the state agencies. It would place some of the technical service offered by the Soil Conservation Service under the Extension Service instead of under the federal soil conservation service as now set up.

A resolution was passed by unanimous vote opposing the Jensen bill. This bill to come before the next session of congress among other things would transfer the conservation payments under present AAA set-up and all conservation work under the Extension Service at present, over to the Soil Conservation Service. It does not provide for consolidation of federal agencies, as is proposed in the Cooley bill.

Mrs. Emil Blanck, Arthur Milton and Sam Wohlford were elected voting delegates to the state convention in Amarillo.

In distribution of attendance prizes, Arthur Cartrite received the tire donated by Garrison Motor Co.; Mrs. Arthur Milton received the chicken fryer given by Lovelace Motor & Equipment; Earl Bond received a tire tube from an unknown donor; Tom Lavake received an electric clock given by W. T. Martin; Meritt Sweny received a gallon of paint given by Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Co.; and A. E. Pronger received a waste paper basket from an unknown donor.

The delegation favored a natural resource tax on products shipped out of the state to replace the defunct state ad valorem tax, and opposed a two cent gasoline tax proposed for road construction.

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## High Percentage 1948 Taxes Paid In October

Better than three-fourths of state, county, and common school district taxes were paid during October with citizens taking advantage of the three percent discount allowed on early collections. Sherman County tax payers saved an aggregate sum of \$3,672.21 through the three percent discount.

The City tax on which no discount is allowed, lagged with a little more than half of the taxes paid during October.

According to the tax collector's audit, the following percentages of taxes were collected: state, 79.76 percent; county, 78.87 percent; school, 79.61 percent, and city, 54.84 percent.

## .78 Inch Of Moisture Brings Relief To Wheat

.78 inch of moisture falling in showers since Thursday of last week in the amounts of .25, .09, .25, .05, and .14, has at least temporarily given relief to Sherman County wheat producer's fear that perhaps 1948 would produce a very low yield of wheat. Falling slowly, all of the moisture penetrated the soil and gave the average person the impression that considerable more moisture had fallen during the rainy season.

As the skies cleared Thursday, the barometer continued to indicate unsettled weather and possible moisture.

After treatment with 8,500 gallons of acid, the well produced 6.7 million cubic feet of gas with a rock pressure of 423 pounds.

## PH Anniversary To Be Legion Neighbor Day

INDIANAPOLIS. — National Commander James F. O'Neil has asked the 3,270,000 members of The American Legion to observe Pearl Harbor Day on Sunday, December 7, as a Good Neighbor Day to make the American handclasp a stronger tie in every community and a firmer link in national unity.

In a front page appeal in the November 1947 issue of The National Legionnaire, Commander O'Neil urged every member of The American Legion to make good will calls on his neighbors on Pearl Harbor Day. He asked that all Legionnaires send him a written pledge they would make December 7th "visiting day." A blank pledge for this purpose was printed in The National Legionnaire.

Pointing out that the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor overnight united all Americans as never before in the defense of America, Commander O'Neil said: "That unity was essential to winning the war. We need to re-establish that unity to win the peace."

Commander O'Neil urged particularly that Legionnaires search out unaffiliated veterans in their communities in making their Good Neighbor Day calls.

"The American Legion is the logical organization to strengthen the bonds of national unity," he stated. "It is an all-inclusive organization. It makes no distinction of race, color, birth, class, religious creed or political belief. It requires only tested love of country. It is the ideal vehicle through which community ties can be strengthened to make firmer the bonds of national unity."

"The war veteran is the common denominator between the populace and The American Legion. The American Legion is his heritage and his great opportunity for high service. All Legionnaires should acquaint all veterans with this patriotic mission of The American Legion. It is in making the handclaps stronger between neighbors and between veterans that the best hope lies for a better America and a better world. In this endeavor every veteran should do his part."

## Pioneers of World Air Routes



Representing a fifth of a century of progress in international air service, and over 7,000,000 passengers carried overseas, Pan American World Airways this year celebrated its 20th Anniversary. Captain Basil Rowe, above, one of the 129 of the airline's pilots who have flown over 1,000,000 miles, has logged over 3,500,000 miles and the equivalent of almost three consecutive years in the air since his introduction to flying in 1917.

The 1927 crossing of the 90 miles of open water between Key West, Florida, and Havana, Cuba, in a wooden-winged, three motored Fokker (shown right above) flying at 85 M.P.H. and carrying only 8 passengers is a far cry from today's globe-circling in luxurious Constellation, D-C-4 and Boeing Stratocruiser type Clippers. This route was only the first for Captain Rowe and other Pan American pilots as they stretched their pioneer services to South America, China, the Central Pacific, the North Atlantic and Africa.

Today's establishment of round-the-world service is the line's latest first. Soon it is to be joined by the first domestic route to fly high-speed, long-haul, non-stop express flights within the U.S., linking their coastal terminals if a program now pending before the Civil Aeronautics Board is approved.

Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, famous Navy Polar explorer, traveled around the world alone at the age of 12.

There were about 250,000 more people working on farms the first of October this year than a year ago.

**Girl, Unable to Swim, Saves Life of Friend With Horse**

HYRUM, UTAH.—Jerry Nielsen, 16, and Dean Baxter, 17, were horseback riding along the edge of Hyrum dam when the bank gave way, plunging Baxter and his horse into the water. Miss Nielsen, unable to swim, rode her horse into the water. The animal swam to where Baxter was struggling in heavy riding clothes. The girl pulled Baxter out of the water. He had gone down the second time. Her horse carried both safely to shore.

**Baby Stricken, Then Twin Has 'Sympathy' Illness**

BOSTON.—An unusual occurrence in the field of medicine resulted in a pair of 18-month-old identical twins being taken to Beth Israel hospital at Boston in comatose conditions—one of which was real and the other "sympathetic." Little David Renda of Revere lapsed into a coma while suffering from a rare disease—blood dyscrasia or lack of coagulation properties. His identical twin, Daniel, otherwise in good health, lapsed into a coma at the same time. The infants' physician, Dr. Milton Levine, explained that while only David actually was ill, Daniel went into the coma from what is known as a "sympathy reaction by an identical twin."

**Son Loses Grip on Mother; Fall Fatal**

He Held Her From Apartment Window Near White House.

WASHINGTON.—The 45-year-old wife of a Maryland farm owner slipped from the grasp of her son after a struggle and fell eight floors to her death from the window of an apartment building a few blocks from the White House.

The woman was Mrs. Helen P. Berlage. She and her husband and son lived in two apartments on the top floor of the Jefferson apartments here.

The son, 23-year-old Thomas N. Berlage Jr., said his mother went to the window without warning shortly after 10 a. m., and climbed out. He rushed after her and grabbed her wrists just as she was about to let go.

For three minutes, while he screamed for help out the window overlooking 16th street, the son struggled to pull his mother back to safety.

Finally, his grip loosened and she slipped to an awning which covered a window on the floor below. The son started out the window after her, but her body edged off the awning and plunged to the sidewalk. Police said she lived only a few minutes.

They said her husband, Thomas N. Berlage Sr., owner of an Olney, Md., farm, told them his wife had undergone a serious operation about Easter and had been depressed since. The couple had two other children.

Witnesses on the street tried to improvise a net below the woman as she dangled from the window, but did not succeed.

**Monroe Farmer Gets 8 Crops On One Farm**

Jack R. West, farmer near Monroe, Lubbock county, sounds like he might be one-man competition for the Rio Grande Valley.

West owns 550 acres of irrigated land, with six wells. He has eight crops on the land, some already harvested, some to be harvested.

Potatoes were put in 162 acres, and produced up to 200 sacks per acre. The 140 acres in cotton harvested out to one and a fourth bales per acre.

Crops yet to be harvested are sugar beets, 70 acres; 22 acres of tomatoes; 40 acres of peas, to be combined; 29 acres of onions and 3 acres of bell peppers.

The surprise crop from the farm was lettuce. Some ten specialized irrigation farmers around Monroe planted a total of 230 acres of head lettuce, and West's 25 acres harvest-

ed to the tune of 300 crates per acre. County Agent D. W. Sherrill says that the cool fall weather in that irrigated area is ideal for lettuce and the crop grossed about \$300 per acre.

**Furniture-Making Reached Peak in Eighteenth Century**

The 18th century is regarded as the period when the furniture-making reached its highest point of achievement in England, France and America. In England the chief cabinet makers of the period were Chippendale, Adam, Hepplewhite and Sheraton, and furniture of this time often is described with the names of these designers. It also

is called Georgian because the different kings of England during this period were all named George. In other words 18th century English furniture and Georgian furniture are the same thing.

In America fine furniture of the 18th century is called both Colonial and Federal. The best was made in New England and in Philadelphia, with the names of McIntyre and Savery as leading cabinet makers. This furniture followed the general

designs of English furniture of the period. Thus the terms Federal and Colonial also may refer to 18th century American furniture though the term Colonial also applies to some furniture made before the 18th century and the term Federal sometimes applies to furniture made after the 18th century.

In France the furniture of the 18th century usually is known by the names of the monarchs of this time, Louis XV and Louis XVI. It is divided into two types, the very royal furniture made for the court, which was elegant, formal, gilded, and the furniture made for everyday people—called French Provincial. This followed the same graceful lines as the court furniture but was in natural wood and used simple practical fabrics. Thus, both Louis XV and Louis XVI furniture is 18th century French, as is much French Provincial furniture. On the other hand, the term French Provincial also may be applied to everyday domestic furniture of other centuries in France.

**First Use of Cosmetics**

**Is Shrouded in Antiquity**

The men make a lot of remarks about modern women and their cosmetic fripperies. But there's nothing modern about cosmetics—they were part of Cleopatra's bag of tricks. Many of the oldest relics we have of early civilizations are small cosmetic jars and boxes made by people who have left us little else to judge them by.

Cleopatra used mascara, eye shadow, colored nail polish and a beauty mask made of crushed water lilies. The origin of face powder is obscured in antiquity, but a long way back we have records of Chinese women who enameled their faces to a smooth fair texture, while Nero's wife, Poppaea, concocted a mixture of white lead and chalk to whiten her skin.

Our very genteel American pioneer ancestresses made a mixture of starch and chalk to dab surreptitiously on their faces. These same prim and proper pioneer women used fresh cut beetroot for rouge, but they had plenty of historical precedents for helping along nature's bloom—Jezebel and Cleopatra painted their faces and the aboriginal Indians were real connoisseurs of face and body paint.

**12 of Crew Die As Vessel Hits Rock and Sinks**

**Worst Disaster on the Great Lakes in Five Years; Probe Ordered.**

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—Twelve members of the crew, including three women, perished when the fog-beset Canadian freighter Emperor rammed into Lake Superior rocks and sank in the worst disaster on the Great Lakes in five years.

Twenty-one survivors were plucked from overturned and sinking lifeboats or from the cold rocks off lonely Isle Royale, a United States national park jutting up in bleak Lake Superior 48 miles from the tip of northern Michigan.

The vessel, one of about 75 operated by Canada Steamship Lines, normally carried a crew of 35, but two men remained behind when the ship left Port Arthur, Ont.

The body of a woman cook, Mrs. Edna Schultz, of Owen Sound, Ont., was recovered before coast guard ships and planes launched a search for the other 11 victims.

**Describes Scene.**

Capt. Eldon Walkinshaw of Collingwood, Ont., 61-year-old veteran of 38 years on the lakes, was among those drowned. His first mate and second engineer went down with him.

An unestimated number of the victims were sucked down into the raging vortex of the sinking 7,000-ton Emperor, which overturned one of two lifeboats attempting to clear the stricken vessel.

An 18-year-old coal passer, Ernest Albrecht, youngest of the survivors, described the scene.

"The ship gave a lunge and water came gushing over like a waterfall," he said from his hospital bed. "The port lifeboat was thrown against a bulkhead, with several persons in it.

"I thought my time had come . . . "The next thing I knew I was in the water, floating with the (life) jacket. I couldn't swim in that water, it was so cold, so I drifted to an overturned lifeboat and hung on until I saw the coast guard cutter coming."

**Probe Is Ordered.**

The 525-foot Emperor, built in Collingwood in 1910, went down in about 50 feet of water.

Survivors were brought 25 miles to Fort William by the coast guard cutter Kimball, after her routine mission to Isle Royale was interrupted by a distress signal crackling through the crisp air at approximately 4:15 a. m.

The Kimball picked up four men clinging to an overturned lifeboat and 10 others who huddled in a second boat, half-filled with water. The remaining seven were taken off Canoe Rock, one and one-half miles off the northeastern tip of Isle Royale.

Not since 1942, when 25 persons

drowned in the sinking of a launch in Georgian bay, 14 in a tug disaster and 18 in a Lake Erie barge, had the Great Lakes exacted such a toll. It was the first loss of life on Lake Superior since the steamer Arlington foundered in a gale in 1940 with one death.

Cause of the collision was not immediately determined. The attorney general of Ontario directed the Fort William coroner to investigate.

**Sash Weight Kills Woman, Drops From Plant Building**

SOUTH BEND, IND. — A five-pound sash weight hurtled through the air near a Studebaker corporation building and fatally injured a woman employee.

Police said the 18-inch bar struck Miss Pauline Allen, 47, as she and a companion, Miss Margaret Karczan, 24, were walking along the side of a four-story building.

The weight either fell or was tossed from the building, striking Miss Allen and fracturing her skull. She died en route to a hospital. The weight also struck Miss Karczan on the foot, breaking a toe.

The girls waded waist deep into the swift current when the doll moved its arms. It was Lois' two-year-old brother, Billy.

An inhalator crew revived Billy in half an hour. Hospital authorities listed his condition as "good."

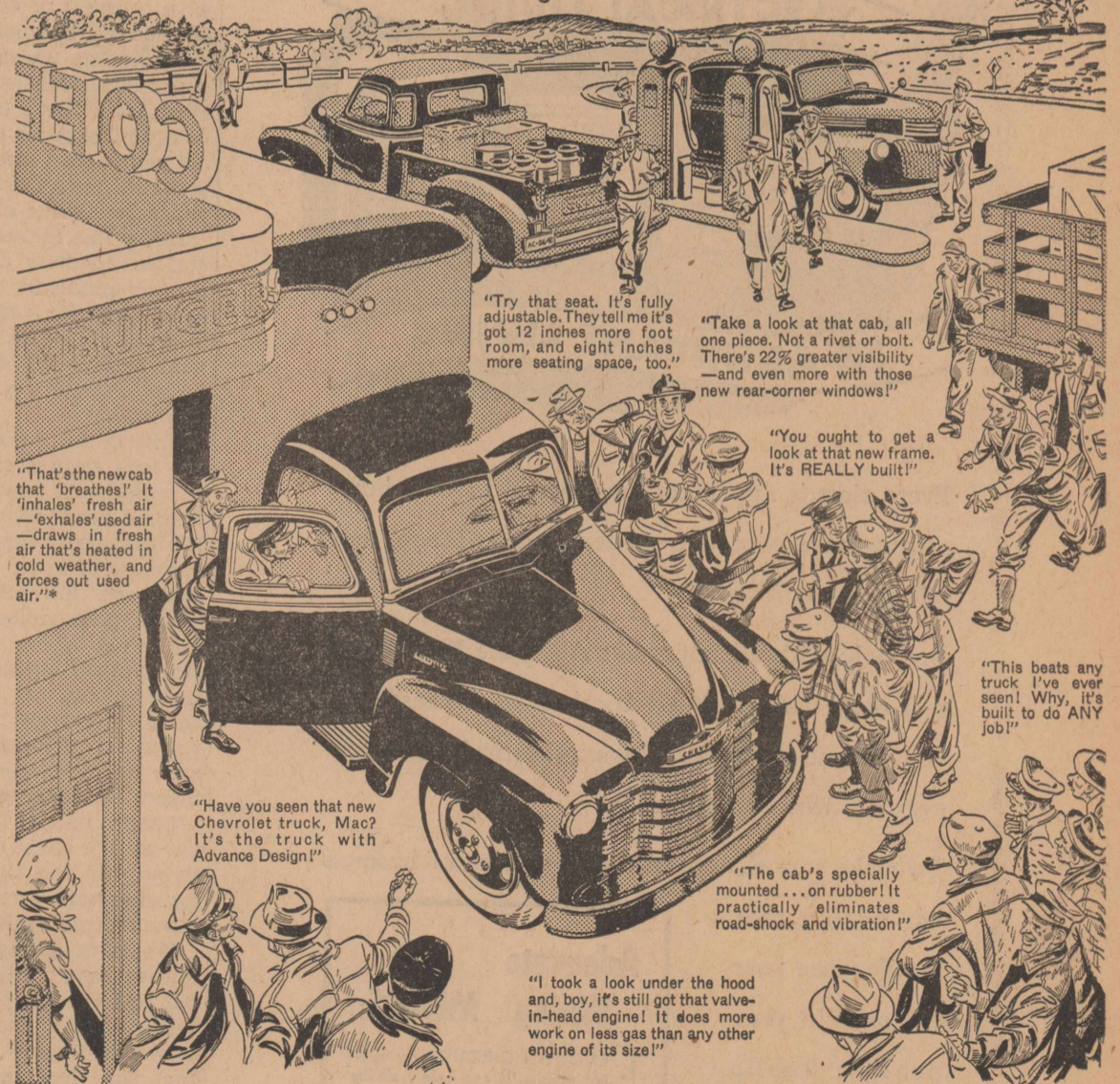

### Trade-In Cheating Game of Auto Gyps

#### New Car Dealers Swindling the Public With Tricks.

PHILADELPHIA.—Unscrupulous new car dealers, already cheating the public through under-the-table bonuses for 1947 automobiles, are making huge added profits by offering ridiculously low prices for vehicles they accept as trade-ins.

In addition, these same new car dealers quickly amass even more money from these deals by "wholesaling" the used cars for prices far in advance of trade-in appraisals. In single deals, the chain of profits has netted dealers far more than \$1,000.

As complaints about gyp practices in the industry continued to pour in, trade sources indicated they were aware of the "multiple profits practice," particularly among dealers who cut down the number of used vehicles offered for resale to the public.

A North Philadelphia man, an innocent witness to one of the deals, reported in detail their workings. His friend, the victim of an unscrupulous dealer, was given \$35 as trade-in allowance for a 1941 automobile, valued on the open market at about \$1,050.

But, the witness said, the buyer was willing to take the ridiculous trade-in allowance because he wanted a new car.

In turn, the dealer who gave the

\$35 sold the 1941 automobile at wholesale to a used-car dealer for \$700. The used-car dealer was ready and willing to accept the car at that price "with no questions asked." The buyer was gyped.

Besides these practices, complainants said that new gyp angles are cropping up among dealers, particularly where they offer a 30 to 90-day warranty or guarantee with the sale of a used automobile. Where the warranty is offered, the dealer pledges to pay half the cost of any repairs within the prescribed period.

But, informants reported, when they take their cars back to such dealers several days after they have been purchased and complain of engine, spring or other troubles, the dealers' service shops report that such parts are not in stock.

The "run-around" is given the unsuspecting buyer until his guarantee or warranty has expired. Then, the parts appear in stock. But, the buyer has to pay the full price for repairs.

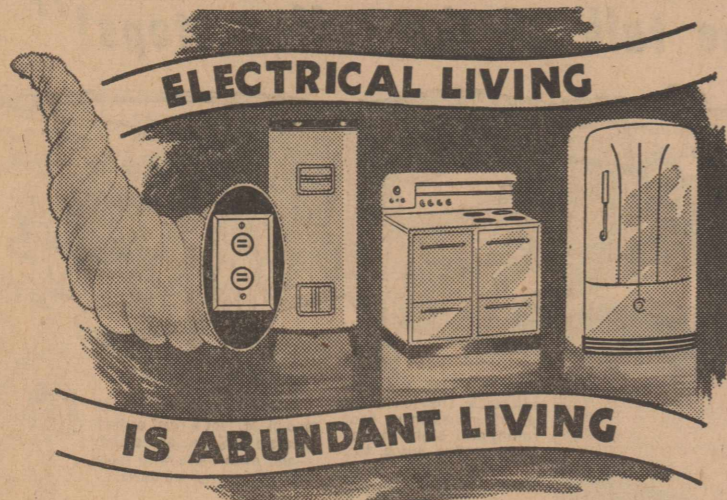

#### Cashiered Army Officer

##### Gets High French Award

NEW YORK.—Capt. Tod H. Cohen of Binghamton, N. Y., convicted by a court-martial of attempting to establish a France-to-North Africa smuggling ring, received France's highest decoration, the Legion of Honor award.

Captain Cohen, now assigned to army air forces' Mitchell field on Long Island pending review of his case by the judge advocate general, received the red ribbon award at the French embassy in Washington in recognition of his World War II services in the air forces.

He was convicted last December 28 in Paris on charges of conspiring to set up a smuggling route for goods from southern France to North Africa and sentenced to dismissal from the army, six months confinement and forfeiture of pay and allowances, army authorities said.

#### National Guard Reports

##### Drive Brings in 85,909

WASHINGTON.—The National Guard has enrolled 85,909 officers and men toward a goal of 682,000 by January 1, 1951.

Maj. Gen. Butler B. Miltonberger, chief of the national guard bureau, reported that figure to show what progress has been made since recruiting began about a year ago. The guard was reorganized then with a planned strength almost three times the prewar figure of 284,000.

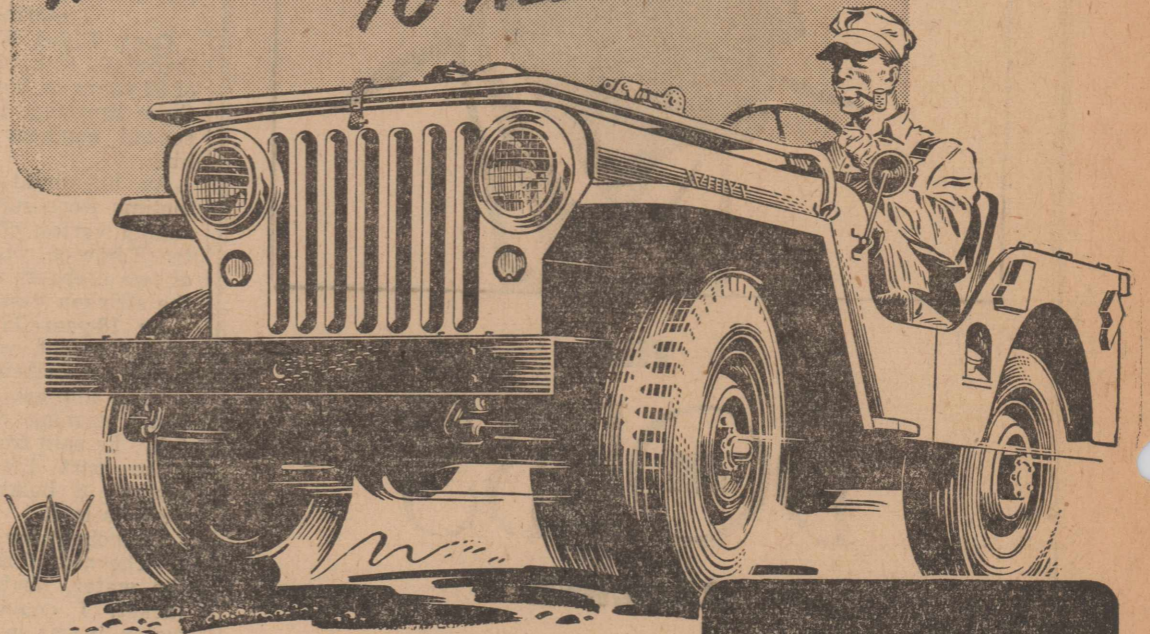

#### Self-Taught 'Doctor,' 23, Accused After Operation

DETROIT.—A 23-year-old high school student who "learned about medicine by reading" was accused of performing an emergency appendicitis operation in a Detroit hospital for \$125.

Police also charged Theodore Cole Jr., junior at Cass technical high school, with prescribing medicines and drugs and practicing without a license.

Edward J. McDonnell, board of health officer, said Cole assisted in an operation on Mrs. Agnes Brown in Wayne Diagnostic hospital last September 21 and received \$125 for his efforts.

McDonnell said Cole signed hospital charts ordering that Mrs. Brown be given sulfa drugs and that penicillin treatments be discontinued.

The prosecutor's office reported that Mrs. Brown recovered fully from the operation. Cole passed as a doctor by showing printed letterheads and listing his name with the title of "Dr." in the telephone directory, McDonnell said.

Cole's name also was listed in a directory of physicians prepared from telephone book listings and distributed to hospitals.

#### Fiancee Plunges 1,000 Feet To Death From Skyscraper

NEW YORK.—A young woman who doubted her ability to make her fiance a good wife plunged 1,000 feet to her death from the Empire State building, world's tallest structure.

The woman, tentatively identified as Miss Evelyn McHale, 25, of Baldwin, N. Y., plunged from the 86th-floor observatory. Her body smashed through the steel top of a parked car.

Police said she had left a note in which she told of her betrothal but said, "I don't think I would make a good wife for anyone."

#### Runs Spear Through Body and Enjoys It

#### 'Miracle Man' Stuns Doctors With Gruesome Acts.

ZURICH.—The medical staff of Zurich university clinic was stunned at the sight of a man who calls himself a "miracle" running around with a thin spear through his body, piercing vital organs.

"I am always invulnerable, because I am subconsciously convinced I do not exist at all," said Arnold Gerrit Johannes Henskes, the self-styled miracle man.

Henskes, a Dutch advertising man, had an assistant run him through with a long, thin needlelike spear which pierced his liver and one kidney. He didn't blink an eye. While Prof. Alfred Brunner and his staff stared, Henskes ran up and down a flight of steps the spear point sticking out of his back.

X-ray pictures showed the needle actually had pierced Henskes' organs, but Dr. Brunner remained skeptical.

"It is certainly an uncommon phenomenon, but no miracle," he said. "I believe the apparent invulnerability of this man is due to the fact that the instrument is something like a big needle—round, very sharp and extremely thin."

"Such an instrument could perhaps pierce the liver, lungs or kidneys without lethal effect. There is hardly any danger of infection, as any bacteria clinging to the smooth surface of the weapon would be brushed off when it enters the body."

Henskes, however, was jubilant with the experiment. He said he had made it many times before, but never in the presence of medical men. He appeared in good shape. When the spear was drawn, he lost only a few drops of blood.

"I just don't exist," he said happily.

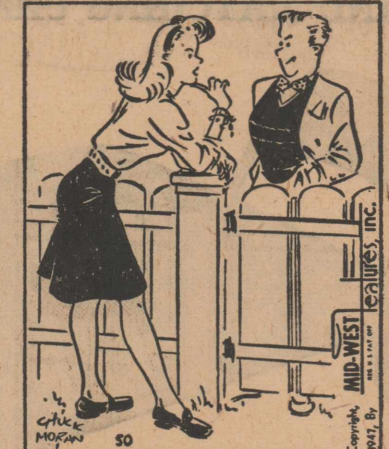

Coffee Industry Started By French Naval Officer

In the year 1720, a French naval officer, Monsieur Gabriel Mathieu de Clieu, sailed for the Caribbean island of Martinique with three small coffee bushes he had obtained from the Paris botanical gardens. The voyage was a hard one. Supplies ran short and it was necessary for M. de Clieu to share his water ration with his precious plants in order to keep them alive. Only one bush survived the voyage. It was planted in Martinique and began the coffee industry in the New World. Sixteen years later the first coffee bush was taken to Puerto Rico. Seeds from Martinique had been taken to Santo Domingo and from there to Puerto Rico.

In the fertile clayish soil of the Puerto Rican mountains, warmed by the tropical sun and cooled by the ever present trade winds, these first coffee bushes found an ideal environment. They thrived and multiplied. By 1758, coffee was an export product of great importance.

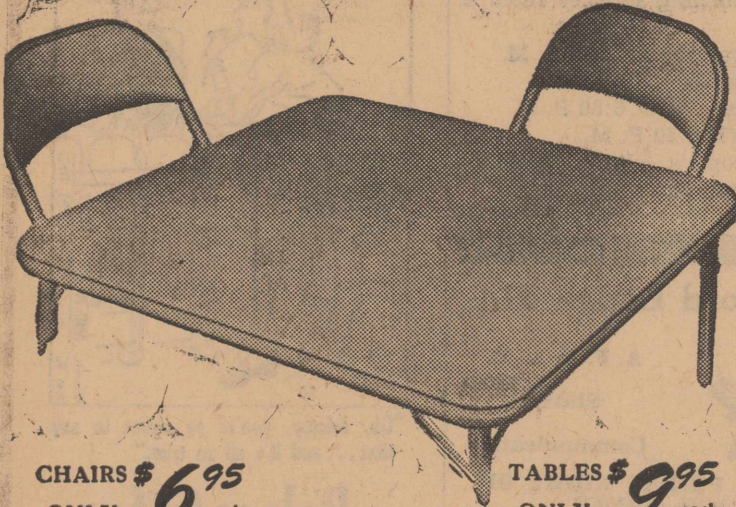

Firemen completed the resuscitation process.

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. — James McFarland, an elevator operator, admitted that for the life of him he couldn't resist his tailor.

McFarland, 56, who owns 32 tailor-made suits ranging in price from \$88 to \$150, explains: "When my tailor says, 'Mac, look at this material, I'm a goner.'"

McFarland, who speaks with a brogue as Irish as his name, commented that only 22 of his 32 suits are up to par for a clothes horse like himself. He admitted, however, that the other 10 probably would make an ordinary dresser feel like he was decked out like a prince.

In the department store where Mac currently lifts shoppers from floor to floor, the girls in each department have their favorite suit. To keep them all happy, he changes clothes two and three times a day, he says.

He also goes in a big way for \$20 hats, \$22 shoes, \$15 monogrammed shirts and gaudy neckwear. In his lapel, he daily sticks a fresh red rose.

Mac admitted he couldn't even begin to foot the bill for his wardrobe on his operator's salary. An income from the estate of his late father, land steward to the duke of Abercorn in Ulster, keeps the sheriff away.

He operates an elevator, Mac explained, because he can't do without crowds. His yen, he said, comes from five years spent as a dynamite blaster for a railroad in the lonely Canadian north woods after coming to America from Ulster.

**Uses Meat Chopper on Mate Because of a Love Affair**

SHANGHAI.—Love does strange things to people and because of this mystic power a Chinese laborer was in a critical condition after being hacked six times by his wife with a meat chopper—"because she loved him."

The 23-year-old unnamed victim, a petroleum installation worker, became overjoyed when his wife arrived from Hupeh for a visit. But she brought sad news.

Before she left Hupeh, an astrologer told her that her husband would be the cause of her death—and cause the death of six subsequent wives.

The only remedy for this alleged Bluebeard situation, according to the mystic, would be to inflict 100 blows on her husband's body with the back of a meat chopper.

Accordingly, the couple crept into the fields and concealed themselves under a neighbor's cucumber scaffold at the recommendation of the soothsayer.

The "Lady Macbeth" wife told police later at the hospital that the operation proceeded as planned until the wrong end of the chopper came in contact with the superstitious husband's body.

The ever loving wife attributed the accident to sleepiness. Skeptical police, however, booked her on charges of attempted murder.

**Adrift at Sea, Fisherman Rows 25 Miles to Safety**

BOSTON.—Lost 75 miles out in the Atlantic when fog shut down between his dory and its mother vessel, a Connecticut fisherman rowed 25 miles to Nantucket lightship and safety—and weathered the experience with only blistered palms.

A message to the coast guard from the lightship identified him as Emile Cote of Mystic, Conn., a member of the crew of the fishing vessel Black Hawk, out of Mystic.

The coast guard said it understood the Black Hawk, outward bound again, would pick up Cote and take him fishing again.

**Speed Turpentine Mill**

A new continuous-process still for converting pine gum to turpentine and rosin, now in operation at Lake City, Fla., represents the fulfillment of long-cherished hopes of naval stores operators. For 150 years or more, turpentine and rosin have been produced in batch stills, and continuous operation was only a dream. The new still, of small commercial size, is the result of three years of intensive research by naval stores scientists of the bureau of agricultural and industrial chemistry. It is both faster and cheaper than batch stills, one of which is being operated side by side with the new continuous still for the purpose of comparing results. The new type uses less than two-thirds as much steam as the conventional still and requires only half as much labor to operate. The rosin produced is as good, if not better, and of more uniform quality.

**Agricultural Revolution Dooms Old-Fashioned General Farm**

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles on current problems by Louis Bromfield. One of America's leading writers, Bromfield is author of "The Green Bay Tree," the Pulitzer prize-winning "Earl Autumn," "The Rains Came," "Pleasant Valley" and numerous other books.)

Lately there has arisen in the mind of the writer doubts concerning two patterns of American life in which all of us have taken great pride in the past. These are unwelcome doubts but observation and study of the patterns in relation to the highly integrated industrialized world in which we live make them unavoidable. They are:

1. That the old-fashioned pioneer pattern of self-sufficient general farm is doomed.
2. That our present complicated, complex economic civilization cannot afford countless small enterprises save under very exceptional circumstances.

Both doubts are certain to arouse protest and even abuse, but both deserve the consideration of every thoughtful citizen.

The general farm, producing a little of everything, is an American pattern growing out of life upon isolated frontiers and no longer fits into a highly complex national economy. A few acres of corn or oats or wheat or hay cannot support a corn picker, a combine or a hay baler. Therefore the general farmer is at once at a great disadvantage, in competing with the corn farmer, the wheat farmer or the fruit farmer, all of whom are doing efficient jobs along specialist lines with the high degree of mechanization which any specialist enterprise can support.

Because the general farm cannot support a high degree of mechanization, the general farmer must work long hours, do things in an old-fashioned, slow and inefficient way.

zation, the general farmer must work long hours, do things in an old-fashioned, slow and inefficient way. His gross income is almost certain to be only a fraction of that of the specialist in dairying, grass farming, corn and hogs, fruit, potatoes or any other undertaking where a man is doing one or two things efficiently and well, instead of 10 or 15 things inefficiently, slowly and painfully.

I know of one specialist farm of 160 acres, raising apples, raspberries and hybrid seed corn which last year grossed \$33,000. It is highly mechanized. Alfalfa is grown not to feed cattle but to mulch orchards and raspberries. The labor schedule is balanced the year round with no peaks and no slack periods. All attention is focused upon the three specialties and high production yields per acre rather than gambling upon high prices to survive is the basis of all operations. The income is high and the hours short because the farmer is operating efficiently.

The same acreage, operating as a general farm with a few chickens, a few cows, a few hogs, a few acres of wheat, oats, corn or hay, could have produced a maximum gross income, even in these times of high prices, of only about \$6,000 or \$7,000, with a net of not more than \$3,000.

The farmer would be at the mercy of a custom bailer, corn picker, combine or haybaler, and would be forced to do things the hard, old-fashioned way and frequently suffer losses because the machinery was not available when his crops were ready. Bad weather or sudden decline in prices can ruin him or reduce him to subsistence level.

I suspect that in another generation the old-fashioned general farm will have become a curiosity except in poor agricultural areas where a few farms cling to the old ways. Anyone with an observant eye driving through agricultural country can see for himself the waning of the old pattern.

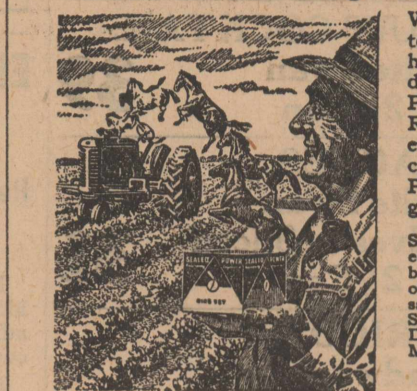

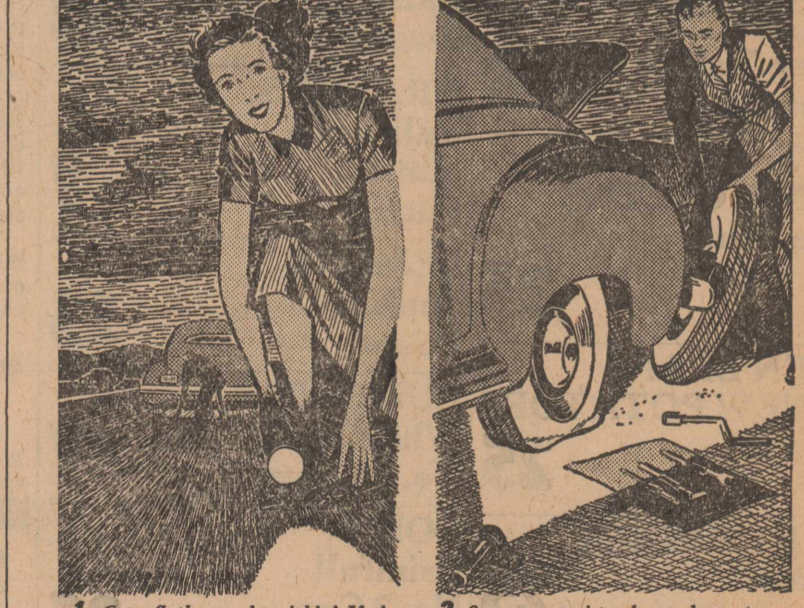

### The Way of Love Lesson for November 23, 1947

SUNDAY'S lesson is based on the writings of John, I John 1-3, and John 21:15-22. The devotional reading is First Corinthians 13.

Travelling on a plane at night a little while ago, I talked at length with a group of business men. The conversation turned at last to the Bible. I asked the group for their favorite passages in the Bible. They named several passages, but the majority said they loved most the writings of John.

### The Happy Way of Life

LOVE is the happy way of life. It is the only happy way of life. Children are happy to the degree that they are loved. Find me a home where children are truly loved, and I will have no difficulty in identifying that as a happy home. Little children yearn for love, and they respond in love. That is one reason why they like dogs. Dogs love little children, unless they are the wrong sort of dogs. And little children love dogs.  
If a dog can bring happiness to a little child by loving to the limit of its brute nature, how much more can parents, made in the image of God, bring happiness to little children by loving them.

### Love Begets Love

JOHN declares, "This commandment have we from him, that he who loveth God love his brother also," I John 4:21.  
We cannot hate people if we see them through eyes of love. The Bible somewhere speaks of the eyes of the heart, and it is of such eyes that I am now thinking.

A friend of mine complained that some strangers had bought the house next door to his. They had a strange name, they talked strangely, they looked strange. He was tempted to sell his beautiful home and move to another community. He frowned when I smiled at him. I asked him if he would do what I proposed as a solution to his difficulty. He hesitated. ### Follow After Love

HERE you will need to read I John 2:7-11. We need not pass resolutions about better relations within nations and between nations unless we are willing to follow after love in the everyday relationships of life.

Just across the fence, just across the hedge, just across the desk, just across the hall, just across the way, narrow or wide it may be, is a human being who yearns for love. It is generally safe to assume that the people you see every day are lonely people. You may not understand why, but they are lonely.

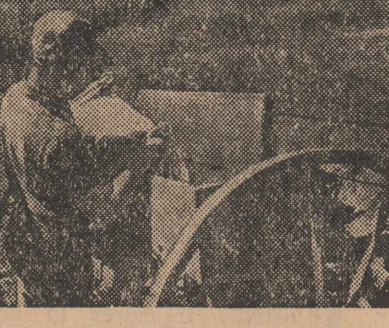
### Organic Matter Rids Cropland of Bacteria

### Viruses Prevent Plant Diseases From Spreading

By R. C. THOMAS Ohio State College.

Few disease-causing bacteria will survive in soil whose organic matter supply has been built up by the use of green manure crops and the return of crop residues and manure. Those that do live are so changed that they are no longer a menace to crops.

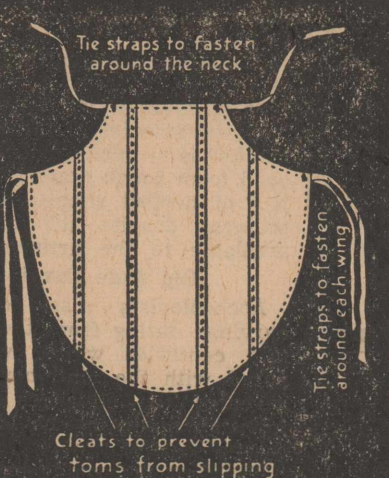
Extracts from soil rich in organic matter contain viruses that depend for their existence upon living bacteria. These viruses are especially numerous in organic matter added



Fighting bacteria with application of organic matter.

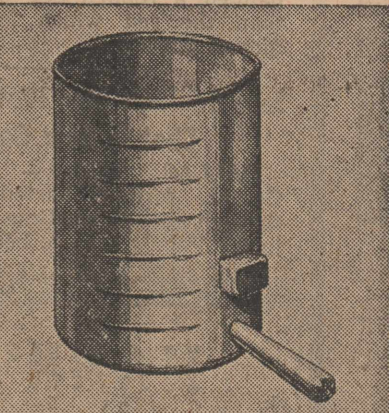
to the soil through residues from grasses, legumes and grain crops. When these viruses come in contact with plant disease forming bacteria they have a profound influence on them, changing the form of these bacteria and making them harmless so far as plants are concerned.

The intensity of competition for food materials and life itself, among organisms inhabiting soil particles, are indicated by the fact that a single ounce of soil has an estimated living population of 50 million bacterial cells, besides many forms of fungi. Added to these are five million protozoa as well as other forms of organisms. Beneficial bacteria thrive best in soil well-stocked with organic matter and tend to crowd out the disease-causing kinds.

### Metal Nipple Bucket



The metal nipple bucket was proven satisfactory for feeding young calves by Montana agricultural experiment station. The bucket is six inches in diameter, seven inches high, and is graduated in pints by indentations in the metal one inch apart which serve as a guide to the feeder in determining the amount of milk to feed. The nipple is 2 1/2 inches long, made of 1/2 inch copper tubing, soldered securely into the bucket as shown. It is rounded at the end with solder.

### Precautions Advised To Prevent Hog Flu

To keep flu from getting started, Iowa State college recommends that hogs be brought in at night from hogged-down cornfields to keep them from getting chilled. Overcrowding should be avoided. Quarters should be planned so that sufficient space and adequate equipment will be available during bad weather, but the buildings should not be shut tight, making hogs too warm.

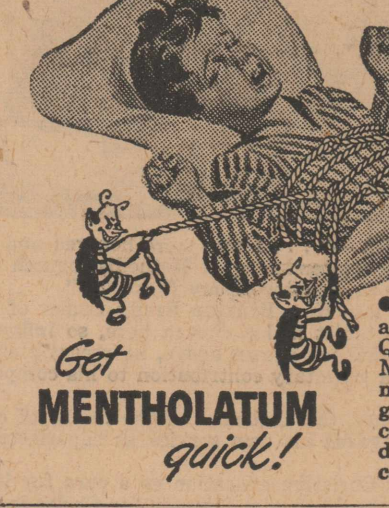

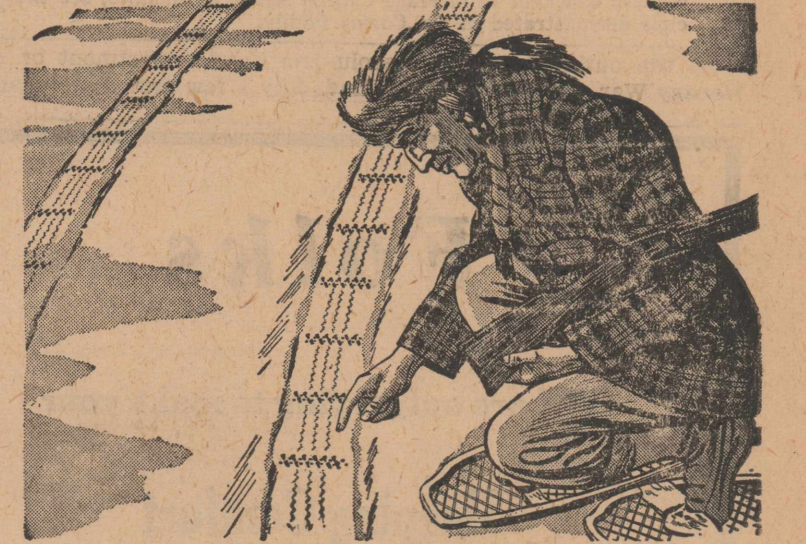

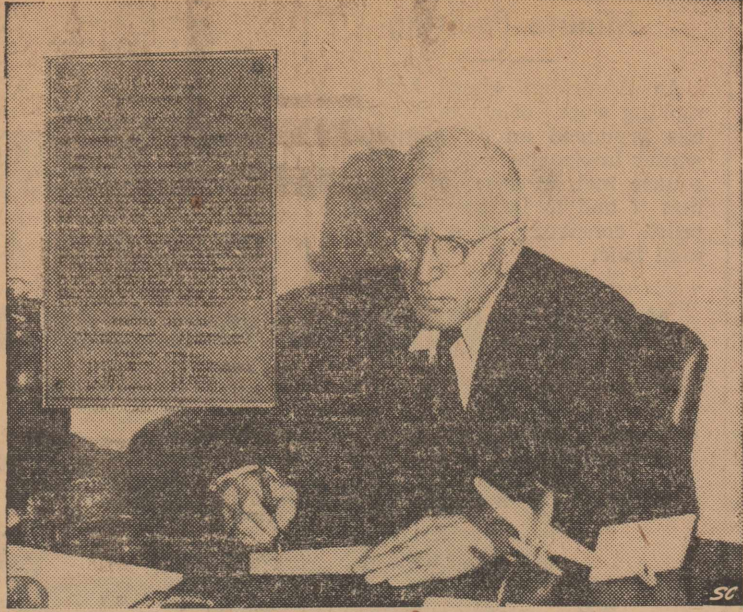

Maya Art Trove Is Discovered In Guatemala

Ancient Burial Ground in Highlands Yields Fine Examples of Jade.

WASHINGTON.—Discovery of artistic treasures in an ancient Mayan burial ground in the little known highlands of Guatemala was announced by Carnegie institute.

They represent craftsmanship spanning seven or eight centuries and contribute new knowledge of the skill and customs of the Mayas.

These Indians were the most brilliant exponents of higher aboriginal culture in the Western world in the days before Columbus.

Along with art objects unearthed from the mound—including “the finest single example of Mayan jade carving yet brought to light”—the Carnegie archeologists also found graves dating from the fourth or fifth to the twelfth century of the Christian era.

Valuable Plaque.

Most valued finding among scores of art objects and relics is a plaque or breastplate of jadeite—dating from about the ninth century. Characteristic of the greatest period of Mayan art, the plaque reveals the finesse of the ancient craftsmen who had no metal tools with which to work.

Another is a pottery figurine, fashioned to form a whistle—the type of ritual whistles used in religious ceremonies of the Maya. Still another is an alabaster vase, developed from rough material to an object of perfect shape and delicate thinness despite the crude tools available to the artisans.

Old Jade Carvings.

Archeologists also found jade carvings dating from the fourth or fifth centuries which, when compared with the ninth-century jade, revealed the advances in craftsmanship made by the Mayas with the passage of time.

The first find made by the excavators as they dug into the mound was a large circular stone altar slab about eight inches thick, much resembling a millstone.

Underneath it were 12 skulls, one upside down in the center, with a number of jades piled on it and the other 11, right side up, arranged in a ring around it.

Researchers found several tombs in the mound. The floor of one was painted a robin's egg blue rather than the red which is usual in Mayan burials.

DALLAS, TEX.—Peter M. Gomez, former bartender, lived through enough wartime close calls in the Pacific area to become a na-

tional legend, only to stop a bullet in a beer garden.

As a private first-class in the 32d infantry regiment, Gomez was orderly to the commanding officer, Col. John M. Finn of Los Angeles. Their hair-breadth exploits were related in an article in a nationally circulated magazine.

As Gomez was leaving a “Little Mexico” tavern with his former wife, a man called him into the garden. The shooting followed.

Elmo Estrada surrendered to police and a charge of murder was filed against him. He declined to discuss the shooting.

Gomez served 28 months overseas, most of it with the 7th division. A machine-gun bullet in his left arm earned him the Purple Heart on Attu in the Aleutians, and he received the Bronze Star for wiping out a Japanese machine-gun nest and two snipers on Kwajalein.

One of the most famous fighters in the Pacific, Gomez had many a close shave. Once, when 200 Japanese were threatening 20 American soldiers, he and his “pal,” Col. “Mickey” Finn, covered the American retreat and then leaped 40 feet off a cliff to escape the Japanese. Bushes broke their fall and hid their flight.

Seeks Fortune, Luck Bad, Finally Lands in Hospital

CHICAGO.—A 16-year-old run-away boy who wandered for more than a day with a fractured skull after being robbed and beaten, was

in the County hospital.

The youth, Arthur Collier of Washington, was discovered semi-conscious aboard a streetcar.

He told police he ran away from home last year, hoping to make his fortune as a jockey. After working as an exercise boy at various tracks, he headed for Arlington park.

He said he was kidnaped by four men. After beating him and robbing him of his last \$14, they threw him from their car.

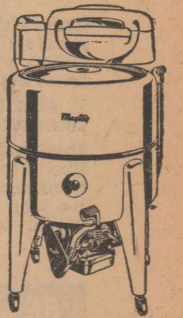

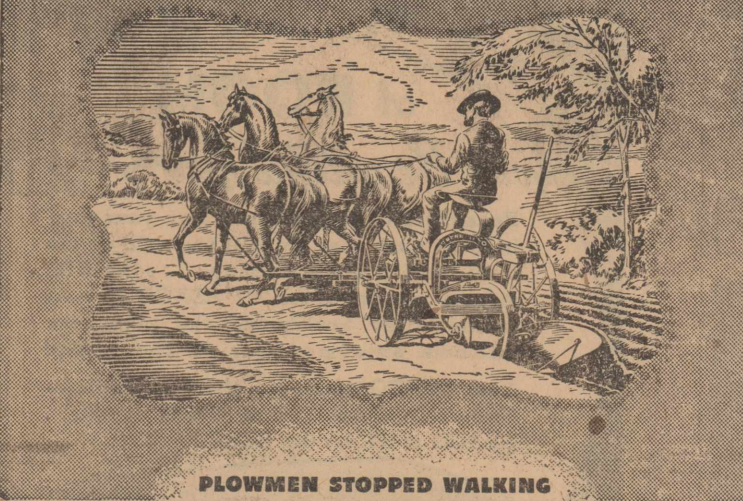
