## Lubbock Couple Dwells In Own Tipi <br> hat one person would find it comfortable but limited <br> We followed it step by step and it worked perfectly."

Jim Hamm led this writer to the main road about 25 miles southeast of Post. He waved good-by and yellci, I drove to higher ground to see a beautiful panorama of the Caprock. There, near the escarpment, and a small pond, and miles of surrounding mesquite, I could see the Indian tipi with Near the encampment Hamm's wife. Donna, worked on some beautiful and intricate bead work. A family
friend. friend. J. Christopher White, carved the rough form of a hawk from a large piece of mesquite. and Hamm re-
turned to continue his shaping of small pieces of flint for arrowheads.
They're city folk, but every spare moment is spent with their basic simple way ine. thought of the Harmake the best of everyday, living by their own philosophy/ everyone beneath the sun must find a way - and 1
have found the only one for me... Give me the simple Weeks earlier. Hamm had been told by his friend Bob (a primitive firearm hunter enthusiast) that I was interested in researching the construction of tipis. A few days later. Hamm called to say that his wife had con-
structed their own he invited me to spend the night in their conical tent.
Many of the nomadic Indian tribes found the conical Mrames of poles covered with buffalo hides to be habitats that could be easily assembid

Usually the hides were painted with pictures or symols that meant something personal to the owner. By emale inhabitant. The perfect poles for the tipi came from lodgepole
pines - like those seen by visitors to Grand Teton Nauonal Park in Wyoming.
Plains Indians usually
Plains Indians usually pitched their tents in an as-
signed area in a great circle. When the camp was signed area in a great circle. When the camp was
moved. the Indians tied their possessions on a wooden frame called a travois, which was constructed from
some of the tipi poles. The travois was draged by a some of the tipi poles. The travois was dragged by a
horse to the next encampment; this policy made it easy hor the tribes to follow the vast herds of buffalo. When the buffalo was wiped out by white men, the Indians
turned to canvas for the tipi covering. turned to canvas for the tipi covering.
For the Hamms' tipi, a 100 -yard roll of canvas was purchased by the Lubbock couple. "We sewed this on a Sears sewing machine," noted Mrs. Hamm. "Sometimes it sewed through four thicknesses of
waterproof canvas." "Donna says we should write a letter to Sears co mending them on their machine." laughed Hamm. Authentic in design and size, the Hamms' tipi has a diameter of 18 feet and is 18 feet high from the fire pit up
to where the tent poles cross. to where the tent poles cross.
From the outside the Indian tent gives the impression
 But inside the tent there is plenty of room for four people to sleep without feeling crowded. Also, the following morning we had company and seven of us enjoyed

"We got our plans from a book 'The Indian Tipi' by "We got our plans from a book '"he Indian Tipi' by making tipis. It includes a lot of different designs and plenty of detailed instruction. Poles for the Lubbock tipi came from Tyler and it
took about two weeks to peel and straighten the poles, plus three weeks to cut and sew the cloth. Work contin ued every day for about five weeks. But, it was really a work of love
"rdain never been camping till I married Jim," explained Mrs. Hamm. "When we got married we went est." "This has been a real challenge for Dent" husband, "because she was a home economics major in college." Mrs. Hamm smiled, "I'd rather do this than go out

w I'm evere in common than we thought we did. bead work is sewed to the bags that hold peace pipes. The Lubbock couple's tipi, now $21 / 2$ yearas old, has
seen some beautiful weather, but it also has weathered seen some beautiful weather, but it also has weathered
some rather bad storms. The Hamms once camped at the Canadian River when a "terrifying storm" came up and "the winds were screaming!', with wind gusts reaching 75 mph ; only the homemade tipi remained up-
right while other nearby tents were flatened by the storm. "We had to lean against the poles to keep them from breaking," admitted Hamm.

Lubbock resident also has an interest in tanning animal skins. Hamm produces the softest buckskin I have ever
