BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) - A man who hid tor half his life fearing pun-
isthment for pro-Nazi wartime activity says he used to cry when he heard happy voices outside, and dared not show himself even at his mother's funeral. Janez Rus was a 32 -year-old shoemaker when he went into hiding at his sis
ter's farmhouse in June 1945, he told the Belgrade newspaper Politika in an in terview published Sunday.
Now 64 Rus sus sas discovered last week after his sister bought a large supply of
bread in the nearby village of Zalna, in the northwestern Slovenia region, and a suspicious resident alerted police.
Rus learned then that no charge ever had been filed against him and that he was Iree to resume normal life, Poititua said.
