Robert Yeary and H. B. Barker, two farmers on the school board, cast the opposing votes.

Jan. 31 is the last date to pay school taxes without penalty, said Helen Combs of the school administrative offices.

Morton farmers also were planning to apply for free lunches for their school children later today. The free lunches are available to children from low-income

Many businesses in town voluntarily closed this morning and all were expected to be shut down by early this afternoon, spokesmen said.

The striking farmers were to participate in a 1 p.m. caravan around the city and then end their day's activities.

Charles Palmer of the Cochran County Farm Bureau noted that Bureau members support the strike.

About 30 farmers from the county which also includes Whiteface and Bledsoe, are making preparations to travel to Washington, D.C., next week for the National Parity-Cade.

They will leave Monday and return Saturday morning. The cost of participation in the Washington demonstration will be about \$500 per farmer.

More farm protest activity is expected soon on the South Plains, with meetings to plan demonstrations scheduled tonight in Olton and Muleshoe

Elsewhere in the state, striking farmers blocked the gates of the Campbell Soup Co. plant in Paris this morning and threatened to keep employees from passing if demands are not met.

Farmers asked the plant management to close for 24 hours as part of the protest against the plant's use of Mexican vegetables and Argentine beef.

Owners of a Laredo cold storage plant resorted to knocking down a portion of the plant's rear wall Monday to allow three trucks carrying 180,000 pounds of Mexican beef inside. Tractors were blocking both entrances.

Strike organizers met Monday night in the Rio Grande Valley city of Mercedes and promised they will "crucify" Gov. Dolph Briscoe if he doesn't listen to their complaints.

Oren Watson of Tulia told about 130 persons that Briscoe will be warned, "It hooves you to listen. If you don't, we'll crucify you."

Leaders of the American Agriculture Movement were to meet with Briscoe today to discuss their demands for increased prices for their products.

Frigid Blast **Brings Snow Threat Here**

Lubbock temperatures this morning dropped to the lowest January 10 reading in 47 years as a biting arctic air mass threatened to drop snow over the Panhandle and South Plains.

The mercury plummeted to 9 degrees here about 7 a.m. today, the coldest reading for the date since a -10 was recorded

Floydada residents shivered in 5-degree weather, the lowest temperature reported on the South Plains early today.

Weather conditions were much worse in many other sections of the nation, however, as blizzard conditions stranded thousands of travelers in the Midwest and brought an increasing threat of pow-

The probability of snow in Northwest Texas was a surprise, since earlier forecasts for the area had called for continued cold weather but no precipitation.

Weathermen later placed a 60 percent chance for less than one inch of snow to cover the South Plains tonight and Wednesday.

The National Weather Service has set a 20 percent chance for the slippery weather to hit Lubbock this afternoon, and reports indicate snowfall will continue

Temperatures are expected to drop to the upper teens tonight and rise only into' the upper 30s on Wednesday.

With afternoon wind speeds of 15-20 mph and temperatures in the 20s, the area's wind-chill factor could reach the -4 to -1 degree range today.

A National Weather Service forecast for the area was amended at mid-morning, placing the high temperature for the day in the 20s instead of the 30s. By that time, clouds had begun to move

into the Lubbock area, where temperatures were reported to be only 13 degrees, one degree warmer than Monday's overnight low.

The National Weather Service said no travelers advisories had been posted for

City Crime **Up Sharply** During '77

Avalanche-Journal Staff All categories of major crimes except theft showed significant increases in Lubbock during the past year, according to figures released by the Lubbock Police

Department. The most dramatic increase in violent crime was represented by homicides, which rose from 23 in 1976 to 33 this past year. Each year ended with all but two of

the incidents being cleared. In 1977, there were 78 forcible rapes reported to police here, 52 of which ultimately were cleared. The previous year recorded 56 such reports, with 40 cleared. Reported robberies in the city increased from 218 in 1976 to 282 last year. The number of alleged crimes cleared were

117 and 133, respectively. Assaults, both aggravated and simple, were reported to police 1,021 times in 1977; 813 subsequently were cleared. In 1976, 684 of 823 such reports were

cleared. It was a good year for burglars, but not for police who investigated the reported crimes. There were more such incidents reported and fewer cleared in 1977 than in the previous year.

Of 4,412 burglary offenses in 1977, police cleared 793. The previous year saw 3,-715 such reports, of which 898 were cleared. Police originally investigated 4,-519 burglary reports last year; however, they said 107 of those ultimately were determined to be false or baseless com-

Motor vehicle thefts increased from 582 in 1976 to 685 last year. The number of clearances also went up, from 61 to 167.

Other thefts represented the only decrease in major crime for the year in Lubbock. In 1976, police investigated 7,-898 such offenses, and cleared 2,188. Last year, they investigated 7,269 and cleared

In addition to the major violent and property crimes, police also investigated 2,812 reports of criminal mischief in 1977.

Incomplete LPD figures, tallied only for the past 10 months, indicate \$350,906 worth of property was damaged during See CITY CRIME Page 12

Striking farmers blockaded a livestock exchange in Michigan and a cold storage plant in Texas today, but most of the nation's boycotting farmers were preparing for next week's demonstration in Wash-

"Everybody's concentrating on our Washington trip," said Mike McCathern, an American Agriculture spokesman in Laredo. "That's going to be where we're going to be concentrating our efforts.'

Farmers in South Carolina agreed to oin a nationwide motorcade of pickup trucks to Washington, D.C., Jan. 17, according to organizer Robert Connelly Sr. of Allendale, S.C., while strike leaders in

Illinois said farmers would meet at the statehouse today in Springfield for a

show of support for higher farm prices. Julian Stipp of Sydney, Ill., said organizers expect as many as 1,000 tractors and 3,000 people to gather at the state fairgrounds, parade through Springfield and meet with Illinois Gov. James Thomp-

In Laredo, farmers parked six tractors across entrances to a cold storage plant Monday to protest imports of cheap Mexican beef. The strikers were successful in blocking many trucks from unloading the

Michigan farmers braving cold temper-

stock exchange for several hours in Cas-

American Agriculture spokesman Louis Saunders at Coldwater, Mich., said farmers planned similar demonstrations each day this week. He said the blockades were aimed at halting livestock sales

in southwestern Michigan.
Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland said Monday President Carter told a Cabinet meeting he would do what he could to improve farm prices, but was not specific about what measures could be tak-

But Bergland told reporters in Houston government guarantee of 100 percent parity pricing for striking American

farmers would require a "Soviet" system of bureaucracy which "no one is prepared to accept

He also said the 100 percent parity program demanded by strikers "would drive already high farm land prices to astronomical heights and virtually eliminate farm family agriculture itself.

It was Bergland's bluntest rebuttal yet to the demand of striking farmers for parity pricing that would give them the same relative purchasing power they had from 1910 to 1914.

In an earlier speech to the convention, Bergland drew applause when he said, "We do not think that the government's role is to assume the responsibility of

guaranteeing full parity income to all farmers and to assume all the risks.

He said he sympathizes with the difficulties that many farm families are suffering and believes they have a right to a fair profit.

"I think those that have been involved in the demonstrations have generally done American agriculture a service in focusing public attention," Bergland

But he warned against violence — "it would fail and should" —and suggested farmers who do not plant in the spring will have nothing to bargain with in the

Tony Toon, the singer's assistant, told Britain's domestic news agency, Press Association, that all claims and counter-claims for damages between Stewart and Miss Ekland. an actress, have been dismissed "to all the parties' satisfac-

The Evening Standard quoted Stewart, who turns 33 today, as saying "a settlement has been made but no money is involved.

Miss Ekland filed suit claiming about \$15 million in damages against Stewart last August shortly after he moved out of the Hollywood mansion the couple had shared for nearly

She claimed damages for helping to promote Stewart's career, for alleged fraud and deceit, and punitive relief because Stewart had, she claimed, acted with "oppression, fraud and malice.

Cartoonist Recuperating

MONTEREY, Calif. (AP) - Hank Ketcham, creator of the Dennis the Menace cartoon, is recuperating from abdominal surgery for an aneurism.

The 57-year-old cartoonist, who lives in nearby Pebble Beach, was reported "in good-spirits" Monday at Community Hospital of the Monterey Peninsula.

An aneurism is local enlargement of a weakened wall of an artery caused by disease or injury. He entered the hospital a week ago.

Jackie's Cousin Starts Career

NEW YORK (AP) - Edith Bouvier Beale, Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis' cousin, is opening at a Greenwich Village nightclub as a singer.

Miss Beale, who for 25 years centered her life on her mother and their decrenit mansion "Grey Gardens" in well-to-do East Hampton, was to open tonight at Reno Sweeney's

"I'm finally beginning to live," she said in a recent interview with the New York Times. Her mother died in February at age 81

She will appear at the club for six days with an act that includes seven songs, including such standards as "Tea for Two" and "As Time Goes By," and a question-and-answer session with the audience.

Miss Beale, who admits to being "over 60" and says she has never had any professional training as a singer, scoffed at the idea of being exploited. "At my age, I'm lucky to get any kind of work. Besides, this is my dream.

Carter Aide, Wife Plan To Separate

By MAUREEN SANTINI WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter's top political aide and his wife are separating after seven years of mar-

Hamilton and Nancy Jordan announced their separation Monday, but gave no reason for the decision.

'We have decided to separate," said a three-line statement released by White House press secretary Jody Powell. "We know that our families and our friends will understand and respect our mutual

The Jordans met while attending the University of Georgia, where they dated briefly. They met again while working for Carter before he ran for president.

They were married in 1970 and have no children

Nancy Jordan, 32, a White House volunteer worker on special projects for the first lady, said Carter and his wife, Rosalynn, were informed of the separation Sunday when the Jordans visited the White House.

"It was just a nice friendly talk," she said, describing the Carters as sympathetic but declining to say whether they offered any advice.

She said she intended to continue working at the White House, adding "I love working in politics." Jordan also was at the White House on

Monday, but a secretary said he was at a meeting and would have no comment on

Jordan, one of Carter's closest advisers, is assistant to the president for political affairs.

One friend of Jordan's, who did not wish to be identified, said the separation was on the horizon "for some time." This friend said he did not believe anything sudden or dramatic led to the breakup. "But I think he and Nancy felt a clean break was the best way to deal with it."

While Carter's reaction to the Jordan's separation was unknown, his general feelings about marriage and divorce are well known.

Last June, the president said he believes political life in Washington puts a special strain on marriages.

"I think in Washington there is a partic ular conflict between ambition and the desire to do a good job ... and the obligations to hold your own families together. " Carter said then. "I don't think the

two are necessarily incompatible." Carter also said that he occasionally invites staff members having marital difficulties to come over "and let us show them that you can have an aggressive, dynamic, competitive political career and at the same time maintain your allegiances and your obligations to your own

family duties. Carter's son, Chip, moved out of the White House last year amid reports of marital difficulties with his wife. Caron After speculation about their future, the couple moved together to Carter's hometown of Plains, Ga.

Nursing Group To File Suit Against Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) -- The Arkansas Nursing Home Association says it will file a lawsuit to stop the state from using new medicaid payment rates which the association claims would break the

Charles A. Stewart, association executive secretary, also said the association was considering trying to get the legislature to call a special session to deal with the problem. On several occasions in the past, the

legislators have been sympathetic to the wishes of the nursing home industry Gov. David Pryor does not want a special legislative session any time soon

Stewart obviously was peeved when he announced the association's intentions at a news conference after he had been in an hour-long meeting with Pryor and other state officials

David B. Ray, head of the state department which administers the program, tried to "garbage up" the facts at the meeting to have his way, no matter what it cost the homes, Stewart said.

Stewart said Ray wanted to run private industry out of the business and to replace it with government-owned and operated homes

He said the rates limit the nursing homes' profit potential to about \$1.50 per patient per day. Many won't make anything, he said, and most won't make enough to pay their obligations.

Ray denied Stewart's charge about making a push for the state to own and operate all nursing homes

The new rate system, implemented this month, tailors the payment by the state more to the individual operating costs of each nursing home, rather than paying all in a given class the same basic rate



Alcohol Strains Heart

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - Would you please say something about mixing tranquilizers and alcohol?

My husband, age 57, is recovering from a coronary and the doctor has prescribed Librium, three a day. The doctor also told him a drink before meals is permissable. However, my husband sometimes has three drinks and the combination of drugs and alcohol has me worried.

He also has angina and has medication for this as well.

DEAR READER - It makes a difference what tranquilizer a person is taking with alcohol. Librium is sometimes used in treating the anxiety that alcoholics have when they stop drinking, particularly during withdrawal. I think your husband should not use alcohol at all - not even one drink be-

fore dinner. Why? Because alcohol increases the work of the heart and increases the chances that he will have inadequate blood flow to his already damaged heart muscle. There was a good study reported last year by doctors at the University of California at Irvine, which showed that alcohol actually increases the work the heart must do. That will decrease the amount of

physical work your husband can do. In the study I mentioned, patients with a angina pain from heart disease developed electrocardiographic changes of inadequate circulation sooner during exertion after alcohol than without al-

That is not all. The alcohol acts like an anesthetic and the usual warning of chest pain to tell a patient he is overoverdoing it may not occur. Besides these immediate dangers of alcohol in people who have heart pain, there is the problem of calorie control. Alcohol has nearly as man calories as fat, and after drinking a person in not likely to stick to a diet. Modern evidence shows that alcohol has no value in heart disease of any kind and can be harmful.

DEAR READER - No, a second vasectomy would not impose any more risk than the first and it will not cause impotence. It might be harder to reverse it a second time because of additional scar tissue, and from your letter plus others, it seems to me there are a lot of people who do change their minds. A new marriage, loss of a child or any number of things happen in life that cause people to want another child even when they think they are absolutely sure they

So my advice to you, with your track record, would be to use a temporary method of birth control until you are absolutely, perfectly sure and resigned, no matter what, remarriage or loss of all your children, that you would not want any more pregnancies. Not all operative reversals of sterilizations in either men or women are successful by a long shot. It should always be undertaken as a permanent form of birth control.

Treasure Chest Theory Confirmed By Discovery

WASHINGTON (AP) - A scientist's activities in Antarctica, said the rocks discovery of 21 meteorites within two hours of setting up camp in Antarctica seems to confirm his theory that old ice patches are treasure chests of the objects from outer space, the National Science Foundation says.

The foundation announced Thursday that Dr. William A. Cassidy, a University of Pittsburgh geologist, reported the discovery in a brief radio message relayed from the icy wastes.

Dr. Mort D. Turner of the foundation's Division of Polar Programs said this was the first time anyone has successfully predicted where meteorites would be found without actually seeing one fall in that area.

Meteorites are hunks of stony or metallic material that come in from space and survive the searing trip through earth's atmosphere to strike the surface. They are of interest to scientists studying extraterrestrial material for clues to the origins of earth and the solar system.

Last year, Cassidy led a scientific team that found 11 meteorites in the general area of the new discovery, a region of the Transantarctic Mountains in Victoria Land about 120 miles north of McMurdo Station, the principal U.S. scientific out-

After the last expedition, Cassidy theorized that meteorites - which fall constantly over the earth - might be preserved in quantity and quality within Ant arctica's deep ice. The cold and ice protect against erosion and chemical reactions that destroy the space rocks else-

where. Cassidy said meteorites buried for thousands of years could be exposed eventually as wind blew away snow cover and evaporated the ice. So, his team concentrated its efforts in areas of snow-bare

Cassidy reported that most of the newly-found meteorites are relatively small, with the largest weighing about 17 pounds. One of those found last year weighed 898 pounds, making it one of the largest ever uncovered on earth.

Dr. Cyril Ponnamperuma of the University of Maryland, a noted meteorite expert, termed Cassidy's latest work a "rare and fantastic find.

There are only a few thousand meteorites in the world's collection "and to find 21 at one time is truly exciting," Ponnamperuma said.

Without the need for going to the moon, we now have the opportunity of collecting extraterrestrial materials that have been preserved in excellent condition by the extreme cold conditions in Antarctica," he added.

The newly found meteorites were picked up with special gloves, placed in sterile bags and put in metal boxes designed to hold lunar samples. The equipment is on loan from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The National Science Foundation, which funds and manages U.S. research



ots will soon get new black underwear made of a material that might have ended up in kitchen curtains instead.

The U.S. Defense Department has ordered 27,500 sets of the British-made one-piece underwear, which is made of a very fine charcoal and was specially designed to keep out the cold and protect the airmen from wartime hazards of poison gas, germs and radioactive fallout.

The material for the zippered "undercoveralls," as they are officially called, was developed at the top-secret Portor Down gas and germ warfare research acility in western England. They cost about \$20 apiece.

The charcoal material acts as a nearperfect filter. When it first was developed, one suggested use for the cloth was as kitchen curtains because it would filter out cooking odors.

No Dole Like Old Dole

tually all the Monday morning quarterbacks agreed that Sen. Robert Dole was a major liability to the Republican ticket. But Dole himself apparently was heart-

ened by his experience because he's beginning to display all the telltale symptoms of White House fever

Initially hurt and angered by the critical reviews he received as Gerald Ford's running mate, Dole now shrugs off the slings and arrows with characteristically sardonic wit. To wit:

"FORD WAS IN the Rose Garden. I was in the briar patch. If we'd won, my role would have been forgotten. Since we lost, it was my fault.'

Dole seems to have adopted the classic rationalization of every politician with a bad press: Never mind what they say about you so long as they spell your name right.

The losing vice presidential campaign, Dole said, greatly increased his "visibility" nationwide. "It gave me," he said, "exposure, experience and contacts."

He is quietly seeking to capitalize on all

AFTER THE '76 presidential election, vir-AT THE END of Jimmy Carter's first hundred days as President, it was Bob Dole (not the GOP National Chairman, Senate or House Minority Leader) who issued a scathing assessment that the new administration was stressing "style over substance."

But the prevailing view seems to be that Dole had his chance at national politics, and blew it. Even some of the Ford people are openly scornful of his prospects.

"Anybody who would go around insisting that World War II was 'a Democrat war' is not likely to get very far in presidential politics," one top Ford campaign operative sug-

MAYBE NOT. But Dole is easy to understimate. Midway through his last senatorial campaign in Kansas, he was pronounced dead by all the so-called experts.

And just look who wound up getting reelected: Bob Dole.

Politics is a peculiar business. In an era when the line between fame and notoriety has all but disappeared, all bets are off,

As Dole himself says, "who knows what can happen between now and 1980?"

WASHINGTON-A new republic was born last month in southern Africa. This is a handicapped child, unloved and unwanted, viewed by most of the world as the ugly offspring of a heartless

The newborn nation is BophuthaTswana, With a name like that who would want it?

The two h's are silent and the upper-case T tends to get swallowed in the Sotho tongue. It's pronounced Bo-puto-swana, the second tribal bantustan to achieve independence under South Africa's widely scorned program of creating

The Transkei got its independence 15 months ago, though no one seems to care.

It would be a pleasant and a civilized act, it seems to me, if Western critics would suspend judgment for a time.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska (AP) — As the santle of gray embraced Fairbanks, Pole Chief Richard Wolfe shook his head ad said, "You almost have to experi-ace it to get a full understanding of it." The deep cold of an Interior Alaska inter means it is time again for ice fog. phenomenon of extremely low temperures which leaves pedestrians and mo-







Needs Of West To Be Heard

President Walter F. Mondale says the Carter administration will be sensitive to the needs of the West as it seeks solutions to the problems of energy development, water resources and other issues

"We want to develop the understanding, the trust and communication that permit us to serve the citizens of these states effectively," the vice president said as he began a seven-state western

Mondale said he would be listening to problems and seeking suggestions today in meetings with Indians, businessmen, politicians and community leaders in stops here, in Utah and in Colorado.

The administration has been widely criticized in the West for policies that critics say show a lack of understanding of the region.

Arriving at Kirtland Air Force Base here Monday night, Mondale brushed aside any suggestion that the West is hostile territory for the administration.

'We don't sense hostility, but a common sense of concern about solving this country's problems," he said at a brief news conference.

Earlier in the day, on a flight from Washington, Mondale told reporters his five-day trip would focus on seeking suggestions to the problems of water, timber, coal leasing, cattle grazing, farming and energy development in the re-

In reaching decisions on these issues,

a way that is fair and responsive to the citizens of this area.'

He said that "we do not come locked in on a series of policies," but gave no indication of any change in previously announced decisions.

Some of the harshest criticism has focused on administrative decisions involving water, such as President Carter's proposal to cut off federal funds for some water projects and proposed regulations to enforce a 1902 law limiting the size of farms eligible to receive water from fed-. eral irrigation projects.

Mondale said some of the criticism is the result of the western drought "that created a lot of anxiety that would have been directed against any administra-

Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus, traveling with Mondale, said the administration also is the victim of some misconceptions in the West. He said one example is a persistent and incorrect rumor that the administration is trying to engineer a federal takeover of state water rights.

After meetings today here and in Salt Lake City, plus an address to the Utah legislature, Mondale flies to Colorado to prepare for a tour Wednesday of the energy boomtown of Craig, about 200 miles



Handwriting Expert Says 'Mormon Will' Genuine

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) - A second European handwriting expert has testi-fied that the strange "Mormon Will" is the genuine last testament of Howard Hughes.

Pierre Faideau of Paris told the Mor-mon Will trial Monday that he first thought the document was a forgery, but as he examined it in detail he became convinced that Hughes did write it.

Testifying through an interpreter borrowed from the United Nations — the first time simultaneous translation has ever been employed in a Nevada court -Faideau declared:

"In my heart and conscience, I can say that this document is authentic.

He was the second European handwriting expert put on the witness stand by attorney Harold Rhoden, who is trying to establish the authenticity of the "will," three pages of handwriting, on dime store paper with a cheap ball-point pen. found on a desk in Mormon Church headquarters in Salt Lake City.

Dutch handwriting analyst Arnold Et-

was that of the reclusive Hughes.

Faideai testified he first saw copies of the "will," accompanied by samples known to be Hughes' writing, in 1976, when he was contacted in Paris by an attorney, working with Rhoden, who told him he regarded the "will" as a forgery.

"My initial impression was that he was right, but first I wanted to compare it to all of the exemplars," he said. "I had a

very bad impression." He noted the argument of the anti-will force - an alliance of Hughes' relatives and former top business associates, who are trying to prove no valid Hughes will exists - that a forger could have copied the billionaire's handwriting from photos of notes published in Life magazine.

The Life photos show that Hughes made "pigtails" on the bottoms of the letter "S," he said, and it would have been the "natural and appealing thing" for a forger to presume that Hughes made such strokes on the letter "X," which is similar.

Two reasons prompted the change. There were so many confusing options in determining the standard deductions last year that 10.2 percent of all those who filed Form 1040 returns made mistakes On form 1040A — the simplest of all tax forms to complete - the error rate was a horrendous 13.7 per-

Perhaps the errors were an idictment against the typical American's skill in mathematics. But there is just as good a chance they resulted from too many options and complicated instructions.

To refresh your memory, here is how married persons filing joint returns determined their standard deduction last year: They multiplied adjusted gross income by 16 percent. If that produced an amount smaller than \$2,100, they were permitted to claim the minimum standard of \$2,800, they were restricted to \$2,800, then called the maximum standard. If it fell some-

FDA Reports Findings On **Tranquilizers**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Long-term use of only tranquilizers to calm anxiety may be ineffective and unwise, according to the Food and Drug Administration which is trying to see that doctors who prescribe such drugs get the message.

The FDA is publishing in today's Federal Register an order requiring manufacturers of such drugs to include a new paragraph on labels for physicians to

It tells the physicians to reassess prescribed use periodically because an FDA study concluded long-term use of the drugs - including the popular Valium and Librium - had not shown them to be

FDA spokesman Wayne Pines said Monday the order is effective immediately, and manufacturers have 60 days in which to comply.

Valium is the most prescribed drug in the nation, Pines said. All drugs to arrest anxiety, including meprobamate, are included under the action.

The special paragraph on the labeling

'The effectiveness of (name of drug) in long-term use, that is, more than four months, has not been assessed by systematic clinical studies. The physician should periodically reassess the usefulness of the drug for the individual patient."

Pines said the order follows a review of the drugs, begun in 1976, by the FDA Psychopharmacological Agency Advisory

He developed the theory of the icy comet model and has done research on meteors, planetary nebulae, the stellar and solar system evolution as well as tracking of artifical earth satellites.



Pawn Shop Trade Reflects Condition Of Economy

Avalanche-Journal Staff People who anxiously scan the paper for the Dow Jones average or who feverishly spin their radio dials for the latest market news from New York could be surprised to learn of another reflection of trade.

While pawn shops are not always a reliable mirror of the economic state, the idea is not so far-fetched. When people need money, they pawn or take a loan. If things are going pretty well, they come in and buy.

In Lubbock, the pawn shops reflect a relatively stable economy. Business for the most part remains constant throughout the year.

"I guess over a long period of time it could reflect a trend," Harold Stuart of Acme Pawn Shop said. "It doesn't show much on a day-to-day basis."

'After Christmas and before is pretty good," he said. "There are a lot of loans

after Christmas until April, because of income tax." "I think there's going to be a slowdown in building," Scott Elmore of Arrow Pawn said. "We've been taking in a lot of carpenter's tools."

drivers and nail guns, saying that he could "pretty well predict" what sort of businesses are thriving and what sort are not.

"When the farmers are hurt, everybody's hurt," he said, adding that the best periods are after the farmers have a good crop.

But business is generally pretty steady. There is a steady stream of pawns and loans, but not any huge jumps.

'There's always somebody who needs money," Elmore said. Gene Huber doesn't think a pawn shop is an economic indicator.

'That's not true anymore," the owner of Huber's Western Wear and pawn shop, said. "It's just like any other business. We pawn more when business is good, because people can come back and get their goods. We loan more when business is good because people can pay back the loans," he said.

"We get more sales during Christmas, just like all stores," he said. Huber didn't think a pawn shop is any more an economic indicator than, say, a textile firm or a clothing business. "When business is good, it's good for everyBob H. Smith of Swat Smith Loans, which is also a pawn shop, had smott view on pawn shop business.

view on pawn shop business.

"Those easy payment plans get everybody," he said.

Smith said he was not able to see much of a pattern, but added that he is seeing some new faces among the regular pawn customers.

All the pawn shop owners interviewed said that about three out of four customers, or about 75 percent, pick up items they've pawned.

So the majority of people who pawn items are in need of ready cash, and pawn as a short-term loan — not selling the items for the money but with the full intention of getting the merchandise back.

None of the people interviewed said their businesses had a real upswing over the last few years. They have peaks and valleys like any other business, but overall, the business is stable.

Lubbock economy is stable, pawn shop business is stable. But this correlation doesn't necessarily prove anything.

Are pawn shops a reflection of the economy?

Maybe.





Blast Set Off At Well Fire

second powerful explosion at a natural gas well fire in an attempt to blast away surface structures near the raging flame.

World-renowned firefighter Red Adair told the Avalanche-Journal the blasts were to clear off debris so his two-man crew, Raymond Henry and Paul Sauliner, along with about 50 other men, could get closer to the flame.

Monday morning, a 500-pound charge was dropped into the wellhead knocking out the fire. However, the well had to be reignited to burn off escaping gas.

A similar blast was set off about 9:30 a.m. (10:30 a.mm CST), Eddy County Sheriff's deputy Jim Brice said, "to blow off enough surface structure so that a straight flame would come from the

Brice said he did not know if the charge today was powerful enough to douse the flame. However, a woman at the Loving City Hall 2 1/2 miles away said she could feel the blast.

Adair's Houston-based office said Adair, who is known throughout the word for his feats of extinguishing well fires under difficult odds, was en route to

> Delta Executive Vice President James Wible said Monday the mud walls containing the gas apparently gave way to the pressure. He said he did not know for sure why the well ignited Wednesday morning, but a rock flying off the ground could have hit a piece of equipment, causing a spark.

Wible said the well would have been ignited intentionally, however, because the raging flame is much safer than great clouds of flammable gas escaping the site. Pat Darcy, a local policeman who is in close contact with the firefighters said, "They're trying to blow it (the well structure) all the way to the ground.'

The goal, Darcy said, is to cause a straight flame to spew from the ground rather than the "umbrella" formation the flame had at first.

There have been no reported injuries at the well, but workers had to put up barricades around the well to keep the curious from getting too close, Darcy said.

Wible estimated gas escaping from the well at about 9 to 10 million cubic feet daily, and said the mishap would cost his company at least \$400,000.

Diplomat Dies

NEW YORK (UPI) - Former Ambassador Robert D. Murphy, a pre-eminent diplomat whose career spanned more than four decades, died Monday night at his Park Avenue home. He was 83.

Murphy was one of Franklin Roosevelt's top aides during World War II, and is generally credited with devising the successful Allied strategy in the North Africa campaig

After the war, he served as ambassador to Belgium from 1949 to 1952, then as am-bassador to Japan from 1952 to 1953. In 1953, he was named assistant Secre-

tary of State, then served as deputy under-secretary of State briefly, and, in 1950, was named under-secretary of When he retired from the State Depart-

ment in 1960, Murphy became chairman of the board of Corning Glass Works, a post he held until his retirement. During the Nixon and Ford administra-tions, Murphy ventured out of retirement for special assignments. He headed the nission on the Organization of the ment for the Conduct of Foreign Policy in 1973, and was a member of the Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board un-der Ford in 1976.

Murphy also authored his memoirs, Diplomat Among Warriors," He is survived by two daughters.



Stock Trader **Makes Million**

HARTFORD (AP) — Harry J. Gray, chairman of United Technologies Corp., made a \$1 million pretax profit by buying and selling 60,-000 shares of the company's stock last year, the firm says.

is more than double the number was die in homes, the government says, despite the image of nursing homes as places where people spend their last days.

A new report by the National Center for Health Statistics also found the rate at which nursing home patients get out alive has increased steadily in the last 15

years.

The center's figures contrast sharply with a 1974 report of the Senate Special Committee on Aging which said, "Most patients entering a nursing home will die there."

That report, entitled "Nursing Home Care in the United States: A Failure in Public Policy," cited studies indicating that up to 87 percent of patients died in their nursing homes.

"The more conservative figures indicate that 50 percent of nursing home patients die in nursing homes, 21 percent are returned to hospitals, 19 percent are sent home or to relatives' homes and 10

are returned to hospitals, 19 percent are sent home or to relatives' homes and 10 percent are placed in other accommodations," the Senate report noted.

No comparable breakdown on discharges was available in the health statistics center's survey, which was based on data collected from August 1973 to April 1974, the most recent data available.

But it found that 70 percent of the one million people discharged from nursing homes in 1972 were still alive, compared with only 59 percent a decade earlier.

Officials at the center, which is part of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, said the trend appears to be continuing, although the latest statistics have not yet been analyzed.

The report on nursing home use said the overwhelming majority of nursing home residents were admitted for physical reasons, while one in 10 was admitted for disruptive behavior or mental deterioration and one in 20 for "social reasons," such as lack of a family member willing to provide care.

The survey found that 72 percent of the nation's 15,700 nursing homes had waiting lists of people asking to be admitted, and once admitted, most patients stayed more than a year.

Nearly 75 percent of the nation's one million nursing home residents were 75 years old or older, the report noted, and about 70 percent of them were women.

The monthly charge for nursing home care during the survey period ranged from nothing to more than \$1,000 and averaged \$479, a figure that officials say probably has increased substantially since the data was collected due to inflation throughout the economy and espe-cially in the health care industry.

An advance team of 20 Egyptian officials arrived in Israel today and a group of 28 Israelis went to Cairo to prepare for

A key committee of Israel's Knesset, or parliament, approved a plan to set up the new settlements over the next three possibly American protests.

Israel contends its settlements in occupied areas must remain under a peace settlement, Egypt says they must be withdrawn and Washington has called such outposts a hindrance to peace.

Prime Minister's Menahem Begin's government tentatively approved the new outposts at last Sunday's cabinet meeting here, but a dissenting faction in the ruling-coalition appealed the decision to the Knesset Foreign Affairs and Security Committee.

the plan to build three new outposts and retroactively approved a fourth settlement that went up in recent weeks.

There are now about 90 Israeli settlements in the occupied territories, including some 45 in the West Bank, 25 in the Syrian Golan Heights and 21 in the Sinai and Gaza Strip.

The Egyptians who arrived in Jerusalem today will do the advance work for the meeting of foreign ministers Jan. 16, while the Israelis lay the groundwork for a defense ministers' meeting in Cairo be-

The Egyptians will be greeted with far less fanfare than the group which preceded President Anwar Sadat's historic trip to Jerusalem in November.

No flags deck the streets, and Israelis who were stunned by the sight of Egyptians in their capital two months ago are taking the new conference in stride.

The Jerusalem meeting will be held in the Hilton Hotel and could go on for months. The United States and the United Nations will participate.

Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance arrives Sunday. Officials said he probably will leave three days later, but may stay longer if his mediation is required.

Vance is expected to urge Israel not to establish new settlements in Sinai, and spokesman Hodding Carter said in Washington: "Quite frankly, we think this issue can be resolved in the discussions.'

The Cairo and Jerusalem conferences, arranged during the Christmas meeting of Sadat and Prime Minister Menahem Begin in Ismailia, Egypt, were originally divided into military and political com-

Officials now say the committees will handle regional problems, with the Cairo conference dealing with the Sinai Peninsula and the Jerusalem delegations handling the West Bank and Palestinian

Egypt's semi-official newspaper Al Ahram said the Cairo meeting would discuss deployment of U.N. troops in Sinai positions to be evacuated by the Israelis, the size of Israeli and Egyptian forces and the status of the Jewish settlements and Israeli installations in areas to be evacu-

The newspaper said the Egyptian plan calls for the dismantling of Jewish settlements after the total Israeli withdrawal from the Sinai within a short, but undisclosed, period.

An Egyptian government spokesman said Egypt will insist that a "joint declaration of principles" be issued stipulating Israeli withdrawal from occupied Arab lands and self-determination for the Palestinians.

Egyptian Prime Minister Mamdouh Salem told the semi-official Middle East News Agency his government will demand that Israel pay \$2.1 billion.compensation for oil pumped from the Sinai fields during the Israeli occupation, plus unspecified additional compensation.

Meanwhile, Shah Mohammed Reza

Pahlavi of Iran met with Sadat at Aswan

and called on Israel to respond to the Egyptian leader's peace initiative. Egypt has opened her hand in a very dignified manner, and the ball is now on the other side," said the Iranian mon-

Power Shortage Faces Midwest

(From Page One) ville reported a balmy 55 degrees.

Monday night skies were generally clear in the state, but high clouds were already building over the west and northwest sections of the state. Low clouds carried Gulf moisture northward from near Del Rio to Junction, to Waco and then back to the Gulf Coast.

Early reports today indicated light rain or drizzle might move northward from South Texas. Predictions noted a chance for "a few" thunderstorms in eastern regions of Texas today.

Lubbock area minimum temperatures reported during the 24-hour period ending at 8:45 a.m. today included 15 degrees at Snyder; 13 at Seminole; 11 at Lockettville and Norton; 10 at Crosbyton, Friona, Jayton, Levelland, Muleshoe, Paducah, Post and Tahoka; 9 degrees at Hereford, Littlefield, Lubbock, Plains and Spur; 8 degrees at Abernathy, Dimmitt, Plainview and Tulia; 7 at Matador and Silverton; and 5 at Floydada.

Meanwhile, near-blizzard snows stranded thousands of motorists and air travelers in the Midwest and Northeast today, and utility companies appealed for sharp cutbacks in power usage to combat arctic cold reminiscent of the harsh winter of

Blowing, drifting snow swept parts of Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania and upstate New York, clogging hundreds of roads and highways with fender-high drifts and abandoned vehicles. The bitter cold posed a serious threat

to life. Two Cleveland men died of heart attacks while shoveling snow. A 2-yearold girl, dressed only in nightclothes, wandered outside her farm home near Humboldt, Ill., and froze to death. "Exposed flesh may freeze within one

minute," a National Weather Service official in Erie, Pa., warned. He cautioned people to "dress as though their lives dependd on it.

About 1,200 air travelers were stranded at Cleveland Hopkins Airport, where more than 100 flights were canceled. The

Red Cross sent cots and blankets for makeshift sleeping accommodations. Ohio Gov. James A. Rhoades activated 140 National Guardsmen to rescue marooned motorists, while other travelers throughout the Great Lakes states found refuge in community recreation centers,

National Guard armories, schools and

Energy shortages spread. Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric Co. and Toledo Edison reported a "critical" power shor-

Columbus and Southern Ohio asked all customers to immediately curtail usage by 50 percent because coal stockpiles were frozen. Toledo Edison asked for voluntary cutbacks. Dayton Power & Light Co. instituted a 5 percent reduc-

"We are in a very bad, very critical situation," said Jack Dyer, a spokesman for Toledo Edison. He said if voluntary cutbacks don't do the job, the company will begin selective load-shutting to conserve

Earlier the Tennessee Valley Authority declared a power emergency and cut voltage to its overtaxed power system, and Consumers Power Co. in Jackson, Mich., invoked a 5 per cent brownout on the 1.2 million homes, businesses and factories it

Throughout northern Ohio, National Guardsmen, state patrolmen and sheriff's officers - many using four-wheeldrive vehicles — plucked shivering families from cars and carried them to safety.

"There are cars all over the place," Police Chief Marvin Grossman of Warrensville Heights said. "We can't even get tow trucks in to move them.

The driver and passengers of a North Star bus spent the night in roadside homes after their vehicle was stranded in drifts and near-blizzard conditions near Buckley, Mich. More than 100 motorists stayed overnight in the Paw Paw, Mich., high school

Many roads in western New York were reported impassable. Squall areas along the eastern end of Lake Erie braced for up to a foot of snow

Residents of South Bend, Ind., waded through 21 inches of snow and mammoth drifts. The mercury hit 34 below zero in Thorhult, Minn., and a record 28 below in Aberdeen, S.D. Chicago had a 5-below reading and a wind chill of 48 below at 9

Sub-zero readings extended from the northern and central Plains to the Ohio Valley, and even the southern half of thhe Florida Peninsula had temperatures in the 30s.

A brisk wind moderated the cold in Florida and kept oranges from turning into frozen concentrate right on the trees.

Declared By Appeals Court

CINCINNATI (UPI) - A federal appeals court says it is unconstitutionally discriminatory not to consider black for service as grand jury foremen or fore-

The 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals issued the decision Monday in reversing the murder convictions of two men indicted by a grand jury in a Tennessee county that is 32 percent black, but where a black has never served as a grand jury head.

The appellate court chided the Tennessee trial judge in the case for saying he 'never really gave any thought" to appointing blacks as foremen and women.

The court said the judge was "discriminating just as surely as were the jury commissioners who never selected blacks because their names never 'were dis-

"Officials who select grand jurors have

a duty to learn who is qualified to fill the position of grand juror and to consider qualified individuals from all segments of society," the court ruled. "Failure to perform that duty, result-

ing in the exclusion of a qualified segment of society, is unconstitutional discrimination."

The court reversed the convictions of James E. Mitchell and James Nichols, Jr., who had been indicted on first degree murder charges by the Tipton County, Tenn., grand jury Nov. 6, 1972, and found guilty March 22, 1973, after a jury

The court said if the two are to be reindicted, it must occur within 60 days or they are to be released from custody.

Even though Tipton County officials said "some" blacks have served as grand jury members, the appellate court pointed out that was not the same as occupying the "vitally important" role of fore-

"It seems clear that the potential for prejudice, given the position of authority and influence the foreman or forewoman holds, is considerable," the court said.



ROME (AP) - Police reinforcements were deployed in Rome today against political violence as pressure mounted on the Christian Democrats to take the Communists into the government.

After a weekend of mob attacks by young right-wingers retaliating for the asassination of two of their comrades, some 1,700 additional police were assigned to roadblocks, security checkpoints and guard posts at political party offices and in middle class and wealthy districts considered likely targets for left-

Nine extremists from both right and left have been slain in ambushes in the past year. The killers have not been caught or identified, but police assume the motive for the killings was political.

Two neo-fascists were shot and killed Saturday. The killings touched off a rightist rampage in which another rightwinger was fatally wounded. Offices of politial parties were firebombed, and passersby were attacked and injured during the weekend rioting. Police arrested 29 per-

Premier Giulio Andreotti and other leaders of the Christian Democratic Party met for two hours to discuss demands that the Communists be admitted to the government to strengthen it and help restore stability

Although the Christian Democrats do not have a majority in parliament, Andreotti's cabinet has been able to stay in office since 1976 because he has had the support of the Communists. Now pressure is mounting for their inclusion in the government for the first time since 1947.

The Christian Democrats have said they would rather face early elections than sit in the same cabinet with the Communists. However, some observers believe they might be willing to give them more influence over government policy without admitting them to the cab-

U.S. Ambassador Richard Gardner flew to Washington today to report on the political situation, sparking leftist charges that the Carter administration was preparing to meddle in Italy's poli-

"It must be clear that the Italians must be the ones who decide on the Italian government," said an editorial in Unita, the Communist Party newspaper.

Two years ago, just before the last parliamentary elections, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger threatened to cut off American aid to Italy if the Communists entered the government. The Christian Democrats got 38.7 percent of the vote

and the Communists got 34.4 percent. The Carter administration has had nothing to say so far about the situation in Italy. But the president was accused of meddling in neighboring France Friday when he warned the French Socialist leader François Mitterrand against renewing his alliance with the French Communist Party for the March election

World Labor Movement Wants U.S.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) -Moves are being made to bring the United States back into the world labor movement, the president of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions said Tuesday

The ICFTU head, P.P. Narayanan, said the Americans pulled out of the International Federation of Trade Unions in 1939, the ICFTU eight years ago, and the International Labor Organization last

He said the American labor movement can get along very well in isolation and the international labor movement can get along without the Americans.

"But I believe the Americans are farsighted, idealistic and practical enough to realize that this is one world and they are part of it."

Narayanan, who declined to elaborate on current contacts with U.S. labor, said he was optimistic that American unions would return to the fold of international labor organizations.

He said labor movements everywhere are facing the same problems, such as

galloping inflation and unemployment. And he added that unions of the free world are responding to the increased

strength of multinationals by increasing

international trade union action.

Settlement Near On Liquor Suit

WASHINTON UPI - The Lubbock County Beverage Association and four liquor retailers have agreed to a proposed court decree to settle civil allegations of illegal price-fixing.

The Justice Department said Monday the proposed decree would forbid pricefixing agreements or exchanges of price information before it is announced publicly, and would forbid the association to hold meetings or conduct business for

price-fixing purposes.

The decree, which will become final after 60 days if approved by the U.S. District Court at Lubbock, would settle a 1976 civil suit charging the trade association and the dealers with illegal

price-fixing. They were charged in the suit with conspiring to fix retail prices of alcoholic beverages sold in the county.

The dealers named in the suit were Cecil's Inc., Crossed Keys Package Store Inc. and the All Star Company, all of Lubbock, and Pinkie's Inc., of Odessa.

Need For Pact Changes Denied

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite pressure from Senate Republicans and signs of flexibility among Panamanian leaders, the Carter administration is standing firm on its position the Panama Canal treaty needs no changes.

State Department officials say it's clear the United States would have fully adequate defense rights after the canal is turned over to Panama in the year 2000.

"Between the treaties and the memorandum of understanding, it is clear what our obligations and our rights are under the treaty," department spokesman Hodding Carter said Monday.

He referred to a joint statement issued by President Carter and Panama's Gen. Omar Torrijos last October spelling out that the United States would have priority passage in time of war and could use military force to protect the canal.

Foreign Minister Nicolas Gonzalez Revilla said Torrijos was keeping "an open mind" on the possible changes, but declared that any initiative to revise the treaty would have to come from the United States. The State Department's announcement Monday, taken at face value, suggested that was unlikely.

any agreement to modify the treaty would backfire politically and might require a second national referendum. Voters approved the treaty by a 2-1 margin in a plebiscite last fall.

Meanwhile, several thousand pro-gov ernment students marched into the U.S.controlled Canal Zone in a peaceful demonstration marking the 14th anniversary of anti-U.S. riots in 1964.

They held a memorial service for 21 Panamanians who died in that violence. and student leader Mario Panther denounced the demands of Baker and other U.S. lawmakers to revise the treaty as "a scandalous intervention" in Panamanian

Panther said the rally was "a repudiation of those senators who wish to impose their will on Panama.

In Washington, Secretary of State Cyrus Vance prepared for a three-day series of appearances to promote the treaty, and a conservative coalition outlined its plans for a six-day, seven-state "truth squad blitz" aimed at building public opinion against Senate ratification

The Committee to Save the Panama Canal, said its 16,739-mile tour will begin next Monday in Tennessee, where Baker is running for re-election this year.

Alluding to the widespread belief that Baker may seek the presidency in 1980, the coalition chairman, Sen. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev., said in reply to a question, "No Republican senator who supports the treaty in its present form would have a chance of securing the nomination."

Baker has said he could not endorse the treaty as written, but he is said to have indicated privately he could back a treaty containing the right number and type of modifications.

charged with cruelty after a malnourished Shetland pony with 15-inch hooves was found in her barn has herself become a victim of cruelty in the form of hate letters, says the local police chief.

Barbara Reed, 58, said that she was not the owner of "King," whose plight drew sympathy from around the world, when the pony was found. She said her life has

been ruined by the incident. And a veterinarian who treated the pony said its condition was not nearly as serious as had been thought.

Plaistow Police Chief Alexander Brown Jr. said hate mail sent to Mrs. Reed has replaced the letters of sympathy for the pony. Friends and neighbors ignore her, he said.

We got hate mail from Europe, from Hawaii from every state in the union," he said. "People wanted to hang that woman. They wanted to lock her up in that barn and throw away the key.

The pony, now in the care of an unnamed owner in Rockingham County, was found by an agent for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. It was standing on a pile of manure in a nailed-shut stall. Its hooves had grown to such a length that they turned up like

SPCA officials estimated King had been shut in the stall for four years.

Mrs. Reed said King was in the stall only about 14 months and that she did not own the pony when it was found. Her daughter had traded it to someone else for a stereo set months earlier, she said. But Mrs. Reed would not reveal the

"I've been through hell. Why should he have to go through what I've been through? I'm not ruining his life," she said.

Mrs. Reed said her work hours had prevented her from visiting the pony, which was kept in her barn for the new owner. But she said she had noticed its hooves were growing and asked the owner to call a blacksmith.

Neither the owner nor Mrs. Reed contacted the blacksmith

SPCA investigator Peter Saunders, who found the pony, first described King's hooves as "enormous, about a foot and a half long and curved back until they almost touched his knees.

But Dr. Walton Hilton, who treated King, said the pony's condition was not as bad as had earlier been thought.

When you come right down to it. those hooves were the only thing wrong with King," he said.

Fire Destroys Canyon Record

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) - A year-long fire in a Grand Canyon cave destroyed the better portion of a prehistoric record embedded in the undecayed dung of the ground sloth, an animal that lived 11,000 years ago, a University of Arizona team

reports. The university researchers returned to Ramparts Cave, in the western end of Grand Canyon, in December to evaluate the damage to what was believed to be the biggest and best deposit of ground sloth dung in the world.

Paul S. Martin, a geosciences professor who has spent a major part of his career studying the droppings of the sloth, said the fire caused extensive damage to a pile of material where scientists stood their best chance of finding bones, hair and. other organic material.

I regard this as one of the biggest losses to the natural sciences," said Martin. Martin said that because of the damage he has no immediate plans to resume his study there and is "looking for new



LAWRENCE, Kan. (UPI) - The "lone survivor" of the Battle of the Little Big Horn, a stuffed horse which was the source of Indian protests in the past, now represents a victory for Indians seeking to tell their viewpoint of American histo-

The survivor was Comanche, a horse ridden by Captain Myles Keogh of the 7th Cavalry. The bay colt that now stands in an enclosed glass case at the natural history museum at the University of Kansas was the center of Indian protests in the early 1970s.

The protesters said designating Comanche the only survivor overlooked the Indians who won the battle, known in American folklore as Gen. George Custer's "Last Stand."

The colt, left for dead by the Indians, was discovered two days after the June 25, 1876, battle in which all members of five companies of the 7th Cavalry were

He was taken to Fort Lincoln and nursed back to health. Comanche died in November 1891 and was stuffed at the request of officers of the 7th Cavalry.

The horse was displayed in the Chicago Exposition in 1893. Visitors plucked his hair and once back in Kansas dry weather took its toll, causing the horse's skin to

In 1971, Indians objected to the wording on the placard of the museum exhibit in which Comanche is displayed: "Comanche was the sole survivor of the Custer Massacre at the Battle of Little Big Horn on June 25, 1876.

The objections caused the display to be closed for two months while a new sign was written: "Comanche stands here as a symbol of the conflict between the United States Army and the Indian Tribes of the Great Plains that resulted from the government's policy of confinement of Indians on reservations and extermination of those Indians who refused to be confined

has a great significance to Indians. He said the horse is a symbol of the past and Indian victory.

Kitchkommie said more recent Indian victories, such as court rulings honoring land grant treaties, were just as important. He said the Indian viewpoint of history has not been written until recently.

"But, the important thing is that it is slowly coming out," he said.

Kathy Dwiggins, a museum specialist, said Comanche is a drawing card to the estimated 100,000 visitors to the museum each year. Several groups have asked for the horse since the battle, but university officials said Comanche will remain at the museum.

"He's probably had more battles fought over him than he was in," said Tom Swearingen, director of exhibits.

French Left Making Bids For Votes

PARIS (AP) - The French Communists are out to make as strong a showing as possible in first-round voting for the National Assembly March 12 so they can force the Socialists to make policy concessions before the decisive second round balloting a week later.

The strategy was outlined Sunday by Communist Party chief Georges Marchais who said the left's only hope of taking power from the right-center coalition lies in a strong Communist showing in the first round

Under the French system, if no candidate wins an absolute majority in the first round, two candidates fight a runoff. But other candidates can stay in the race to siphon off votes, and one party can also throw its support to another







The findings by the Office for Civil Rights are unrelated - indeed, school officials said, in some ways contrary - to the U.S. Justice Department's push for a systemwide desegregation plan for Lub-bock public schools.

The office conducted a review of Lubbock and about 330 other school districts in 26 states for compliance with the U.S. Supreme Court's 1974 decision in Lau vs. Nichols. In that case, involving students of Chinese descent in San Francisco, the court ruled that a school system's failure to provide special assistance to pupils not proficient in English constitutes a violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of

The information for Herrera's review of Lubbock was collected in 1975. For that reason, many of his observations are obsolete - if in fact they ever were true, according to Stokes and Mary Gryder, the district's bilingual education special-

In his letter, Herrera noted that recipients of federal funds, including Lubbock schools, which annually get millions of dollars from the federal government, "are obligated to provide equal educational opportunities to national origin minority group children deficient in English language skills."

He went on to say Lubbock has been found "in violation" of that requirement. 'We have concluded that your district's

efforts to identify and assess the linguistic needs of national origin minority students deficient in English skills and to provide appropriate language services to such students are inadequate," Herrera said in a letter to Superintendent Ed

The alleged violations cover three

First, the district "has not properly identified on an individual basis those students who have limited English-speaking abilities."

When Lubbock applied for 1975-76 federal bilingual monies, the district reported it had 8,488 "non-English dominant"

in a statement to the Texas Educati

Agency shortly thereafter, the district reported having only 1,239 youngsters who were "predominant speakers of Spanish" enrolled in formal bilingual programs.

The discrepancy between these two figures suggests many students may be going unserved, Herrera said. He said the district's methods for identifying all. district's methods for identifying students of English language deficits appear "inaccurate and invalid."

The second area of non-compliance, Herrera said, is that "the district has failed to categorize (the identified) students...in order to determine the extent to which such students need bilingual

Only in the first grade has the district used a bilingual test to determine how limited in English skills the identified students are, he said.

The third area of non-compliance, Herrera said, is that the district's bilingual program is limited to too few schools

In 1975, he noted, the district told the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare that about 2,500 students here were "receiving instruction in English as a second language, or in a language other than English."

But when the civil rights team visited Lubbock, Herrera said, only 1,635 students - of whom 1,344 were Mexican-

Subdivision Rule To Require ciations to work for his election **Developers To Pave Streets**

Criminal District Attorney Alton Griffin has revised Lubbock County's subdivision regulations to require developers to pave streets before they are turned over to the county for maintenance.

But Griffin said Monday there is no way to close a loophole that allows some developers to circumvent the standards.

The regulations govern the filing of plats, or detailed plans, for future subdivisions in unincorporated areas of Lubbock County. To get the approval of the commissioners court, the plats must meet certain standards on such things as the proposed layout, widths and construction quality of residential streets.

Griffin revised the county regulations, as commissioners had requested, to require paved streets as a condition for plat approval.

The revised rules were presented to commissioners Monday. They apparently will be approved later this month. However, as Griffin and commission-

ers noted, there is another way, besides filing a plat, to subdivide property. Some developers simply chop their

Making developers pave streets, he said, will ensure that county taxpayers aren't stuck with the bill.

The revised subdivision rules also stress that developments within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of any city must meet the standards of that city before approval from the commissioners court can be obtained

Also Monday, Griffin was asked to study the validity of a petition signed by 189 county employees, including a few elected officials, seeking a hearing before the county's salary grievance com-

The employees are asking a 10 percent pay hike and want the committee's support in that effort. However, County Judge Rod Shaw - non-voting chairman of the grievance panel - said he can't find "anything in the (state) statute that permits employees to petition" for a committee hearing.

Shaw said, as he reads the law, the salary grievance procedure is open to "any elected county or precinct officer" but does not apply to rank-and-file workers. Shaw asked Griffin to determine whether that interpretation is correct.

Shaw said he wants to treat the employees' petition "with all courtesy," and that he realizes many county workers are underpaid.

But he doubts whether the grievance committee could hear the appeal of the non-elected workers. And he doesn't believe a grievance by the two elected officials, a justice of the peace and a constable, who signed the petition, could be expanded to include all county employ-

The grievance committee has the power to recommend salary increases to the commissioners court. Also Monday, commissioners appoint-

Dealing in options can be as rewarding at the bridge table as in the stock market. Consider this hand.

The auction was a matter of simple arithmetic. North added his 17 points to the minimum 16 announced by his partner, and came up with enough for a small slam, but not enough for a grand slam even if South was maximum. He didn't bother to use Stayman to check on a possible heart fit because his hand contained no ruffing

Since he did not wish to lead from one of his honors, West selected the nine of spades as his opening salvo. When dummy came down, declarer could count ten tricks in top cards-three spades, three hearts, a diamond and a club. The eleventh trick could be set up in clubs regardless of which defender held the king, and if hearts broke 3.2 that suit would furnish the twelfth trick.

Declarer won the first

trick in dummy and immediately led a club to the queen and king. West simply exited with a spade, and the critical point of the hand had been reached.

South correctly led a low heart toward the two honors in dummy, and had West routinely followed with a low heart declarer would surely have made his slam. When East also follows with a low heart, declarer can guard against West having started with four hearts to the jack by returning a heart to the ace, and then taking the marked finesse if East shows out. He cannot protect against East having been dealt four hearts because he is missing the nine of hearts

Unfortunately for declarer. West produced the nine of hearts when the suit was first led toward dummy! Now declarer had an option - he could play either defender for an original holding of four to the jack. Since the nine seemed more likely to be a singleton than a falsecard, declarer continued by cashing dummy's second high heart. Suddenly West's jack of hearts had become a sure trick and the contract was defeated.



Americans Attending Top Paris Sewing School

PARIS (UPI) — In the classroom two students struggled through an examination on how to iron a seam. The professor hurried about with pins to correct waistlines of dresses the students had draped on dummy mannequins.

This is the world's most prestigious sewing school, operated by the organiza-tion of Paris high fashion designers, the exclusive Chambre Shndicale of the Haute Couture. Hopeful designers, cut-

ters and tailors enroll from all over the

The classroom was a study in hurried hands, respectful silence and serious-faced students when an unmistakably New York accent was heard:

"This is a dream," squealed a tall girl, long hair flying, wetlook lipstick gleaming, eyeglasses held with long chains. It was Sue Ekahn of the New York City suburb of Merrick, Long Island.

"Yeah, shoot for the top," she gasped.

"Oh, I can't believe I'm here... This changes my whole life."

Since 1930 the designers' association has operated the school in central Paris. The current enrollment of 127 pupils from 22 countries includes this year for the first time five scholarship winners from America.

Jacques Mouclier, head of the Association to Promote French Fashion, said Americans were singled out "because the United States is the biggest market for Paris fashion. The winners were chosen by a panel of

Franco-American fashion experts after compting in their own U.S. designing The \$5,000 scholarships were granted

by the salons of Christian Dior, Gres, Lanvin, Pierre Cardin and Yves Saint The five young women will attend classes for eight months and then possi-

bly work for a while as apprentices in the As Carmela Inzucchi of New York and

the other winners pinned practice fabric on the dummies, Suzan Hagen of Los Angeles said, "The school is very slow and precise. If you can reach their standards it's amazing. I'm learning how to discip-line myself. It's much more structured than the designing schools at home.

"So much time just to drape this cloth on the dummy mannequin," said Miss Hagen, wearing Saint Laurent clothes in honor of her sponsor. "Everything has to hang a certain way. You learn pressing by spending hours pressing the dress. And nobody ever gets a perfect grade."

In a corner, Rosanne Stamvpoulos of Melbourne, N.J., patiently ironed a sleeve. Although other designing schools furnish steam irons, in the high fashion school "everything has to be done by hand. You can control it that way. Nothing is done for you," she said.

"You have to use an ordinary iron and wet pressing cloth and then steam out the sleeve seam in order to fit it proprly into

"Then there are fittings on top of fittings. Adjust things over and over before they're right. It's very time consuming. It's best to learn the couture way, but you have to forget everything you learned be-

Mychelle Gray of Woodbridge, Va., said, "Soon they're giving us a speed test, to see how much we can do on a dress in a certain amount of time." In other rooms students sketched fashion designs while a live mannequin posed beneath a

The students also learn style technology, paper pattern and fabric cutting and design sketching.

Tests include such things as designing a hunting outfit or an evening gown. The scholarship winners have been treated to fashion shows at the salons and have vis-



New Breed Millionaires On Horizon

NEW YORK (UPI) - Not long ago, the Internal Revenue Service predicted the next two years will produce 100,000 new millionaires in the United States.

And now Robert Schwartz, who runs a school for entrepreneurs at Tarrytown House a few miles up the Hudson from New York, is predicting that 10,000 of them will be "counterculture millionaires." Schwartz said this in a piece he wrote for Executive, publication of the Cornell University graduate business

school There already are a number of counterculture millionaires. Schwartz named Stewart Brand who made a fortune out of 'The Whole Earth Catalogue," Robert M. Pirsig who wrote "Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance," and Tim Galwey, author of "The Inner Game of Ten-

Half a dozen others, he said, founded counterculture food companies such as Erewhon in Boston and Celestial Seasonings in Colorado.

Such bodily exercise movements as poand the Alexander technique also have made millionaires out of some of their promoters

He also listed Werner Ehrhardt, Stewart Emory and other prophets of personal growth and self-discipline philosophies. He said movements such as transcendental meditation have produced sales running from tens of millions to hundreds of millions of dollars and made counterculture millionaires of a number of their leaders and promoters.

Various religious movements such as Hare Krishna, scientology and the Rev. Sun Myung Moon's Unification Church have produced vast revenues. Schwurtz didn't mention these, however, and it is plain the only connection they would have with his counterculture movements would lie in their appeal on spiritual

grounds. Schwartz defined the counterculture that he expects to produce the 10,000 new millionaires as one "seeking a more ecologically oriented world in which a humane and holistic and personal growth ethic melds into economic and political systems that deal more kindly with men and women and the earth." Holism is the view that an organic or integrated whole has a reality independent of and greater

than the sum of its components. Schwartz said these counterculture entrepreneurs "have discovered that millions of customers yearn for goods and services that could make their lives more personally rewarding" and he predicted that there will be a mushrooming explosion of this kind of demand in the next two years.

But he emphasized his view that many of the counterculture entrepreneurs will become millionaires unintentionally and some may actually be chagrined at accumulating so much money.

"What motivates them is primarily an interest in achievement," he said, "such an entrepreneur is first of all a missionary with a zeal about a new vision."

And he quoted the late Harvard economist Joseph Schumpeter as saying the true modern entrepreneur must be a whole man, able to set his own goals and be unafraid of posturing officialdom.

Book's Author Likens Parton To Streisand

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - The author of a book about women country music singers compares Dolly Parton to Barbra Streisand.

Joan Dew, author of "Singers and Sweethearts," says both Miss Parton and Miss Streisand "have an uncanny sense of what is right for them.

"Streisand came to Hollywood and practically directed her first movie,' said Mrs. Dew, who has written several magazine articles about Hollywood stars. "She stepped on a lot of toes.

When Dolly wanted to renegotiate her contract, she got on a plane and flew to New York and made the deal herself. She is like a horse with blinders on. Music is her life; her career is everything.

Both have achieved individuality through ways that might have been drawbacks, she said. "Dolly has outrageous clothes and

wigs," she said. "Anyone else who tried to do that would look like a fake. "Streisand would have had her nose

fixed, but she's made it work for her. Mrs. Dew's book, published by Doubleday-Dolphin and the Country Music Magazine Press, has chapters on Loretta Lynn, Tammy Wynette, June Carter Cash and Tanva Tucker besides Miss Parton.

Her observations about them: 'Dolly is the most fascinating personality. She has a quality of mystery about her and is one of the most complex women I've interviewed. I spent 15 years in Hollywood and I've met 90 percent of the celebrities and Dolly is among the three or four most fascinating.

"Dolly has this secret higher calling that all this is leading to something bigger. Her career is planned out: I think she'll cross over into other things like Streisand.

"Loretta is the unhappiest and loneliest; she lives in the back of her bus because she's on the road 20 days a month; she doesn't have the confidence or wherewithal - the sense of herself - to go to her husband or manager and say she wants to change her life. She has to be told what to do. She's never had to make a decision. I don't think she knows how to check into a hotel. "Loretta basically doesn't have a lot of

confidence. She feels self-conscious with strangers. She's sort of naive; she always believes the best about things. "But she has an uncanny street knowl-

Kennedy Sees Modernization For Chinese

HONG KONG (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy says a two-week visit to China convinced him that it will become "a modern industrialized state ... if it can avoid the social and political upheavals that have threatened it in recent years."

"I am struck by the strong commitment of the Chinese people to modernization," the Massachusetts Democrat told a news conference after his arrival today with his wife, son and other members of his family.

However, he added that "China remains a developing country, one with immense economic challenges before it. It remains very much a closed societ, with strictly limited freedom of expression.

The senator had long talks with Vice Premier Teng Hsiao-ping and Foreign Minister Huang Hua in Peking. He said he suggested that the United States supply advanced petroleum technology to China in exchange for a share of Chinese oil production. He said the Chinese leaders opposed joint ventures but indicated some other arrangements could be made. He did not elaborate.

Kennedy said his visit also made him more committed to normalization of relations between the United States and

The key obstacle, he continued, is the future of the 16 million people of Taiwan. He said although he cannot report progess on this issue, he believes the Chinese leaders have a better understanding of the view prevailing in the United States that Taiwan should "enjoy a peaceful and prosperous future. He described the lack of formal diplo-

matic relations between the United States and China as "one of the great anomalies of our foreign policy." After all, he said, China is a power of global proportions with effective control over 900 million people.

Kennedy said he asked the Chinese leaders to give favorable consideration to requests from Chinese living abroad for their relatives in China to join them. He said he delivered such requests from 22 Chinese families, most of them in Massachusets, and Chinese officials told him they would consider the cases.

Kennedy mentioned one case in particular, that of 47-year-old Johnny Foo in Shanghai, who has been trying to join his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Y. C. Foo of Stoneham, Mass., for five years.

Kennedy said he visited Foo in Shanghai and found that he has been suffering from a heart ailment for 20 years and is being supported by his wife and son. He said the parents are in their 80s and in poor health.

The senator said he discussed the Foo case with Teng and other officials but did not get a definite reply.

Legion Leader Raps Treaties


LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - The national commander of the American Legion says ratification of the Panama Canal treaties would harm America's economy and its military security.

You And Your Federal Income Tax

QUESTION: I have some Series E bonds that I have been purchasing during the year through a payroll account deduction. Do I pay income tax on this when

ANSWER: The amount you paid for the bonds is included in your W-2 Form as wages and therefore you will pay income tax on the purchase price of the bonds in the year the withholding takes place. These bonds are issued on a discount basis and the value of the bond increases from the purchase date of redemption or maturity.

This increase in value is taxable interest income. If you use the cash method of reporting income, you may defer reporting the interest income until the year

you cash the bonds, or the year they mature, whichever is earlier. You may also elect to report the increase in redemption value as interest each year In either case, you report only the increase in what you paid for the bond over

what you redeemed the bond for, not the total you receive.

QUESTION: I run a car pool in the morning and receive about \$50.00 a month from my riders. Is that money taxable?

ANSWER: Amounts received from passengers in a car pool may not be included in gross income. These amounts are considered reimbursements for transportation expenses incurred. Since these amounts are not income, the related costs of repairs, gasoline, and similar items in connection with operating an automobile used in a car pool to and from work are personal expenses and

Further instruction concerning filing your 1977 tax return can be obtained by attending the "You and Your Federal Income Tax" program, a public service course jointly sponsored by the Lubbock Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants, the Internal Revenue Service and the Avalanche-Journal. proving regulation of the eyeglass industry is to appoint laymen to state boards controlling optometrists, opticians and opthamologists, according to a New York congressman.

Rep. Mario Biaggi, D-N.Y., and Rep. Bob Eckhardt, DTex., Monday held a joint congressional hearing to explore consumer and industry reaction to recent Federal Trade Commission developments, particularly in regard to industry practices toward the elderly

Biaggi said one result of the hearings will probably be a recommendation that state boards regulating the \$4 billion retail eyeglass industry be made up partially of laymen.

'These boards should contain non-professional members because they are selfserving devices. Rather than supervise, they protect members of their profession," Biaggi said.

The New York congressman also said some regulation at the federal level may be needed to prevent duping and exploitation of consumers.

Since the subcommittee's first hearing six weeks ago, Biaggi said, the FTC has preempted all existing state laws banning

"If price escalation is to be controlled, competiton must be fostered in the eye care industry," he said. "We believe that steps should be taken either by legislation or regulation to eliminate the restrictive laws and regulations which have hampered competition in the field of op-

Herrera said there is "no evidence that the 1,344 Hispanic students...included all of the students that had been identified as limited English-speaking.

He noted that Lubbock's official bilingual program is "restricted to selected schools and, in some cases, specific grades at these schools."

There is "no educational justification for limiting participation in bilingual programs to only 17 campuses of the 36 elementary schools" in Lubbock, Herrera said. (Actually, school officials pointed out, the program is limited to 16 campuses, of a total 37 elementaries.)

Herrera said the "17 schools" are "insufficient to meet the linguistic needs" of all limited English-speaking students. He found "no evidence to indicate that the district has initiated any effort" to provide services for students at other elementaries and at-secondary schools.

Herrera said the district has until March 4 to propose a "specific plan" to rectify the alleged violations. That plan, he said, should include proposals and target dates for "identifying all students who use another language more frequently than English," assessing the needs of such students and designing programs for them, and hiring more bilingual teachers.

Stokes and Mrs. Gryder said the criticisms simply are not valid.

Noted Attorney To Speak Here

Noted defense attorney Leonard Weinglass will speak Jan. 19 at Texas Tech on "The Politics of Crime.

Weinglass, who during the past 15 years has become known as defense attorney for such figures as Jane Fonda, Russell Means (American Indian Movement), Emily Harris (the SLA trial), the Chicago Seven and Angela Davis, will discuss the new police/intelligence/ military apparatus and its threat to American civil libeties.

Tickets to his speech are on sale at the University Center Ticket booth for \$2 for Texas Tech students and \$3 for the general public. Tickets also will be available at the door the night of the speech.

Weinglass currently is a lecturer at the University of Southern California Law Center. He recently was awarded the first annual Clarence Darrow Foundation award for his work exemplifying the ideals of fair trial for which Darrow fought so hard.

In addition to his lecture, Weinglass will meet with Tech students Jan. 18-20 before leaving Lubbock.

True, they said, the district has "official" bilingual programs at only 16 elementary schools - but only because those schools are where the needs are

greatest Besides the 92 bilingual teachers in the formal bilingual programs, they said, there are hundreds of other teachers scattered throughout the other elementaries and all secondary schools capable of giving bilingual help to students who need it.

"All students who need extra help in English language skills are getting it," Mrs. Gryder said.

"We may not call it a formal bilingual program, we don't necessarily sit the child down and say, 'This is bilingual education,' but we are providing the special services these students need.

The formal bilingual programs which are funded with federal, state and local monies - enroll the 1,600 or so students Herrera refers to, Stokes said. The 2,500-pupil figure is the number served by "informal" programs, at the secondary level, for instance, he said.

Stokes said the comment on "8,488 non-English dominant" students refers to the district's total of Spanish-surnamed youngsters in 1975 - not necessarily to pupils of limited English-speak-

In fact, Mrs. Gryder said, only a portion of Spanish-surnamed students actually need extra help in English Stokes said the Office for Civil Rights

must realize that formal bilingual instruction is not the only way to meet the needs of students limited in English. Other informal ways, and instruction in English as a second language, can be just as effective, he said. He also said that instead of administer-

ing language tests, Lubbock screens students for extra help in English or enrollment in bilingual programs on the basis of observation and conversation with teachers, parents and students - methods the district feels are more accurate than tests.

And, Stokes said, the district doesn't officially categorize students by language deficits because instruction is "individualized to each student's needs.

Texan Says Sentence **Beats Death**

TEL AVIV. Israel (UPI) - A young Texas woman sentenced to five years in an Israeli prison on charges of spying for Arab guerrillas is taking her fate "remarkably well." her mother says.

Terry Fleener, 23, of San Antonio, a former employee of Kuwait Airlines, was sentenced in Tel Aviv district court Monday following a two-day secret trial and later met her mother in the Nevei Tirza prison between Tel Aviv and Jerusalem.

"I asked her what she thought of five years," said Mrs. Mary Boetcher, mother of the defendant. "She laughed a little and said, well, it beats the death penal-

Mrs. Boetcher of Enon, Ohio, who came to Israel New Year's Day but was not permitted to witness the closed-door trial, said her daughter is retaining her sense of humor.

"She's taking it better than I am. She's doing quite well, remarkably well," Mrs. Boetcher said.

Although Israeli authorities imposed a near-total blackout on details of the case. attorney Felicia Langer said her client confessed in court to conveying information to the enemy, conspiracy to convey such information and rendering service to an unlawful organization. The attorney said the "exaggerated and cruel" sentence would be appealed.

Israel radio quoted U.S. diplomats as saying Miss Fleener was suspected of taking pictures of secret installations and conveying them to Arab guerrilla groups. She was arrested on her arrival at Ben Gurion airport last Oct. 25, her second trip to Israel

We're disappointed the sentence was so harsh." Mrs. Boetcher said. 'We had not dared to hope we would get an expulsion from the country, but we did hope for a lighter sentence.

She said her daughter had a Lebanese Christian boyfriend whom she followed from San Antonio to Beirut but "I have no personal knowlege" of contact with Palestinian guerrilla groups. "I do not see Terry as any sort of ter-

rorist," she said.

Mrs. Boetcher said her daughter began work for Kuwait Airways as a stewardess in 1975 after paperwork problems prevented her from starting her sophomore year at the American University in Bei-

Ford, GM Oppose **Gloomy Forecast** mistic of the auto firms in its year-end

DETROIT (UPI) - Two of the "Big Three" auto companies have taken exception to the government's gloomy forecast of a downturn in U.S. cars sales in 1978 that could force the layoffs of 10,000

General Motors Corp. and Ford Motor Co. officials Monday reaffirmed their year-end predictions that domestic auto sales and production will equal or surpass last year's near-record figures and that any short-term production slowdowns will not cause significant layoffs. Chrysler Corp. officials, who last Sep-

tember predicted rising sales for both the company and the industry in 1978, were silent on the government's forecast contained in the Commerce Department's annual industrial outlook. American Motors Corp., which last

week announced the layoff of 2,700 workers at its Kenosha and Milwaukee. Wis., assembly plants due to rising inventories, also declined comment.

The government report, released in Washington during the weekend, predicted sales increases averaging 12 percent in all of the nation's top 10 manufacturing industries except autos. It said car sales would be down 1 percent and trucks and chassis off 4 percent in 1978

The decline would follow sales of 15 million vehicles in 1977, the highest industry-wide figure since 1973. The report said a record share of personal income spent on motor vehicles last year probably cannot be maintained in 1978. A spokesman for GM, the most optipredictions for 1978 production and sales. said the No. 1 automaker is standing by its forecast that the industry "will set new sales records" this year approaching the 15.5 million mark. 

Q. I've read that the California Angels tried several times to get Gene Mauch away from the Twins to manage their team. That I can understand. But one story I saw said they also tried to get Walter Alston and I am trying to figure out why. He must be 70 and the Podgers put him out to pasture. So what could he do for the Angels?

- Lyle Turgoff, St. Paul

A. The Angels, who have had one contending team in 17 seasons, are hurting for media attention in Los Angeles. Alston's return as manager of the "other" team in Southern California would have assured them big headlines. Casey Stengel was 72 he took over the Mets. Alston turned 66 on December 1.

But Alston turned down the job because the Dodgers are paying him \$35,000 a year to play golf. He retired reluctantly, because Peter O'Malley didn't want to lose Tom Lasorda, who rewarded the boss' faith by delivering a runaway pennant. Alston hasn't missed managing as much as he thought he would; he has also turned down the San Diego job. The Angels still feel they need a bigger name than Dave Garcia in an area that dotes on the star system.

Q. I'm a fan of Ken "The Snake" Stabler. A while back there was a quote going around that he got from Jack London, the writer-adventurer who once lived in Oakland. Can you find it for me?

- Ralph Frames, San Antonio

A. It wasn't Stabler who was doing the quoting. A magazine writer recited a passage from Jack London's work to the Oakland quarterback, which included these words: "I would rather be ashes than dust! The proper function of man is to live, not to exist. I shall not waste my days in trying to prolong them. I shall use my time.

Then Stabler was asked what that meant to him. "Throw deep," he said.

Q. All season long I hage seen NFL teams on TV trying to come fron behind in the final minutes, the quarterback dropping back to pass and getting sacked, time after time. Why is Dallas the only team that puts Staubach in the shotgun when everyone knows they have to throw? Why don't the other clubs try it? - Arnold Jagoda, Seattle

A. The shotgun requires more practice, and entails more risk, than the other teams apparently feel is worthwhile. The usual argument you hear is that you can't run off it, except for the draw or on the shuttle pass. But a better reason is the fact that it isn't easy to find a center who can block and lob the ball back without looking. With the three-man front now so common, a center has to keep his head up.

Q. Why is Joe Frazier talking about making a comeback? Does he need the money?

- Philip Brisker, Tampa

A. Smokin' Joe manages Duane Bobick, the eight-ranked heavyweight contender. It occurred to him that he is the only manager in the business who can knock out his own fighter. Why shouldn't he make a comeback?





If the order looks vaguely familiar, it's because the top seven teams-actually the top eight on AP's -combined for an undefeated week and

And for the third consecutive week, No. 1 Kentucky was a unanimous choice for the AP's top seat and the Wildcats drew 39 of UPI's 43 first-place votes. Kentucky improved its record to 11-0 with easy wins over Vanderbilt, Florida and Auburn, collecting all AP 46 firstplace votes for 920 points and amassed 417 points from UPI's Board of Coaches.

Runner-up North Carolina, 12-1, won twice but had a scare before beating Clemson in overtime. The Tar Heels accumulated 737 points in the AP balloting and 336 from UPI.

Third-ranked Arkansas, 13-0, remained unbeaten by crushing Hofstra, Houston and Missouri-St. Louis and picking up 693 AP points and 279 from UPI, including two firt-place nods. Defending NCAA champion Marquette, 10-1, won three times and solidified its hold on the No. 4 spot with 594 AP points and 273 UPI.

Notre Dame remained No. 5 on AP with 522 points and No. 6 on UPI with 187 despite being idle. Indians Indiana State, 10-0, stayed No. 6 on AP with 480 points and No. 7 on UPI with 154 and the other first place vote

UCLA remained No. 5 on UPI with 211 points and No. 7 on AP with 463.

Eighth-ranked Syracuse completed the undefeated week by AP's top eight with a 94-84 win over North Texas State. The Orangemen are now 11-1 and received 342 points, but fell one notch to ninth on AP.

Louisville jumped a notch on both polls, to No. 8 on UPI with 139 points and to No. 9 on AP with 325 points, ending Cincinnati's 69-game home court winning streak in the process. The Cardinals shocked the Bearcats 78-75 at the River-

Kansas broke into the AP Top Ten, climbing from their No. 14 position a week ago. The Jaywhawks jumped over Nevada-Las Vegas, Indiana, Cincinnati and Virginia, all of whom went down to defeat last week.

Six coaches from each of the seven geographical areas of the nation comprise the UPI ratings board. Each week they vote on their top 10 and points are awarded on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-43-2-1 basis for votes from first through 10th.



Drastic 1965 Decision Paid Off For 'Pokes

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - They were the first to take a chance on basketball players and track stars. They pioneered talent searches at non-football factories like Elizabeth City State, Fort Valley State and Kutztown State.

They did all this because it was 1965 and the Dallas Cowboys were sick and tired of being 18-46-5 and the laughing stock of the National Football League. Patiently the ragged expansion team of 1960 which went 0-11-1 had climbed to 5-8-1. Using draft choices like blue chips at Las Vegas, the Cowboys gambled on talent and hit the jackpot most of the time.

The faith Coach Tom Landry, owner Clint Murchison, club President Tex Schramm and talent scout Gil Brandt had in the draft and aggressive scouting bore its first break-even season in 1965. Dallas was 7-7 and lost to Baltimore 35-3 in something called the "Playoff

Bowl." The Cowboys won their first divisional title the next season and since have

missed the playoffs only once, in 1974.

The team that faces the American Football Conference champion Denver Broncos Sunday was forged and fashioned through the draft. Only runningback Preston Pearson was bought at the NFL's trading marts-from Pittsburgh-for the \$100 waiver price as a free agent.

"We live and die by the draft and our alert scouting," said Cowboys special assistant Ermal Allen. "Consider this-we have three free agents who are All-Pro. Drew Pearson, Cliff Harris and Efren Herrera.'

The Dallas offense that faces Denver's "Orange Crush" defense Sundy includes a quarterback who was drafted in the 10th round in 1964 and couldn't even play for four years. Roger Staubach, the Heisman winner from Navy, had to serve out his military obligation before he could join the Cowboys

Rookie running back Tony Dorsett was drafted No. 1 when Dallas gave Seattle a first-round pick and three in the second round. Fullback Robert Newhouse was a second-round choice in 1972.

Other Cowboys on offense and the rounds they were taken include wide receiver Golden Richards (No. 2), tight end Billy Joe DuPree (No. 1), tackles Ralph Neely (No. 1) and Pat Donovan (No. 4), guards Herb Scott (No. 13) and Tom Raffery (No. 4) and center John Fitzgerald (No. 4).

Dallas' Doomsday Defense is a sprinkling of high draft choices except for left tackle Jethro Pugh (No. 11), Harris, outside linebacker D.D. Lewis (No. 6), and cornerback Benny Barnes, yet another free agent.

First round picks include left end Ed "Too Tall" Jones, right tackle Randy White, left linebacker Thomas Henderson and right cornerback Aaron Kyle.

Harvey Martin, the AP's NFL Defensive Player of the Year, was a thirdround choice as was strong safety Charlie Waters.

'The banner year was 1975 when we got White, Henderson, Lawless, Breunig, Donovan and Scott." said Allen.

The Cowboys also drafted reserves Randy Hughes, Mike Hegman and Scott Laidlaw that bountiful year and made it to the Super Bowl with their "Dirty Dozen" rookies

Dallas was the first to make use of a track star, Bob Hayes, as a deadly football talent.

Cornell Green, seven times All-Pro at defensive back and now a Cowboy scout, was the first basketball player to hit it big. The Cowboys have had their busts-like Dennis Homan, Tody Smith, Bill Thomas, and Sonny Gibbs, all who were drafted high and proved major disap-

But for everytime the Cowboys have been wrong in the draft they've had a Harvey Martin or a Cliff Harris or a Drew Pearson on the right side.

Early Denver Play Inept

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - Few teams suffered more in the 1960s bidding war between the fledgling American Football League and the established National Football League than the Denver Bron-

In their first 10 seasons, the Broncos managed to sign only one of their firstround draft choices - Floyd Little in

Other quality draftees who were signed, such as Curley Culp, were subsequently traded away in ill-advised

Denver's play during those years was as nept as its system of acquiring players.

Then came the merger in 1970, and the Broncos' fortunes soared. Suddenly, the team was not only signing its high draft picks, but selecting future All-Pros as

The 1977 Denver team which meets Dallas in the Super Bowl next Sunday was put together largely in the past seven years by a series of exceptional drafts and some shrewd trading. Much of the credit for that turnaround has to go to John Ralston, whose five-year tenure as head coach and general manager ended last January when he resigned in the face of the bitter player revolt.

Four straight No. 1 picks - tight end Riley Odoms, runningback Otis Armstrong, linebacker Randy Gradishar and cornerback Louis Wright - became either All-Pros or Pro-Bowlers or both.

So did defensive end Lyle Alzado, a ton College in South Dakota, and linebacker Tom Jackson, a fourth-round

choice in 1973 from Louisville

Rick Upchurch, the standout kick returner and wide receiver, was still another fourth-round selection, in 1975.

Rule Change Kicked Around

ATLANTA (AP) - The nation's college football coaches recommended Monday that colleges adopt the professional rule and turn the ball over at the line of scrimmage following a missed field goal from outside the 20-yard line. At present, such a miss is an automatic touchback with the ball going over to

the other team at its 20. Dave Nelson, athletic director at the University of Delaware and secretary of

the Rules Committee, said the recommendation was "a mandate from the coaches that something be done about long field goals." Nelson's group will meet next week to act on the recommendation, along with

"I can't make book on whether we'll adopt it," he said, "but I don't think

we'd even consider it if the coaches hadn't supported it." The membership of the American Football Coaches Association voted 155-148

 — with 10 undecided — in favor of a new rule on missed long-range field goals. The AFCA Rules Committee then voted 11-5 and sent it on to the NCAA, which has the final say

At the same time, the AFCA Rules Committee voted 12-2 against a proposal to institute a tie-breaker, even though the membership favored it by an overwhelming vote of 178-21-15. However, Nelson said his NCAA committee would consider both sides at next week's meeting.

Nelson said the coaches turned down a number of alternatives before settling on the pro rule for a missed field goal. They voted overwhelmingly against narrowing the goal posts from the present 23 feet, 4 inches to the 18-6 distance which was in effect until 1959.

Another recommendation from the coaches to the NCAA included making a new or unused football mandatory. Some long-range field goal kickers found they got better distance with a used or scuffed-up ball.

However, Cliff Speegle, commissioner of the Southwest Conference, which had exceptional kickers in Arkansas' Steve Little, Tony Franklin of Texas AM and Russell Erxleben of Texas, said balls used in SWC games met all the NCAA specifications.

The AFCA voted against recommending that kickoffs be made from the 35 instead of the 40. In addition, the AFCA membership voted 194-97-33 that all motion must be away from the neutral zone at the snap, but the Rules Committee voted 16-0 against it. Again, the NCAA will consider both sides.

At present, motion may be parallel to the line of scrimmage at the snap but forward motion is prohibited.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Agriculture Department Monday estimated the 1977 cotton crop on the basis of Jan. 1 conditions at 14.5 million bales, up 1 percent from a December forecast and up 37 percent from last year's crop of 10,580,-

The jump from last year's harvest was produced by a combination of strong prices early in 1977 and unusually favorable growing weather.

The big American crop, coupled with increased production abroad, has sent prices down sharply. With the harvest clearly big enough to produce a substantial increase in reserve carryover stocks, mid-December prices were down to 48.8 cents a pound compared with 63.1 cents a year earlier.

Monday's report estimated production of ordinary upland cotton, which makes up most of the crop, at 14,399,700 bales compared with 10,516,600 bales last year. Production of extra-long staple American-Pima cotton was estimated at 96,300 bales compared with 64,000 bales last

The Crop Reporting Board said farmers expect to harvest 13,259,000 acres for the 1977 crop compared with 10,913,500 acres last year. The average per-acre yield was put at 525 pounds compared with 465 pounds for 1976.

The board said that growers in Texas and Oklahoma expect to harvest 5.9 mil-

Hill Says Firm To Pay \$25,000

AUSTIN (AP) - An animal slaughtering, packing and rendering operation in Pampa has agreed to pay \$25,000 in civil penalties for alleged violations of the Texas Clean Air Act, says Attorney General John Hill.

Hill said the agreement with Packerland Packing Co. of Texas, Inc., was reached in state district court in Wheeler County after the case was moved from

Gray County on a change of venue. The case already had been set for trial,

Assistant Attorney General Paul Gosselink said Hill filed the odor emission case against Packerland after he received a petition signed by 533 Pampa residents, urging action against the slaughterhouse.

According to a statement from Hill's office, the residents complained that the smell from the operation was so bad that they could not leave their homes without becoming nauseated.

Hill said Judge Grainger McIlhany permanently enjoined Packerland from emitting noxious odors and required the company to make structural changes that will permit the proper operation of its air pollution abatement scrubber.

Panel Member Named At Tech

Dr. Dwane G. Miller, chairman of the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences, has been appointed to succeed agricultural sciences dean Anson R. Bertrand as the Texas Tech University representative on the Texas State Seed and Plant Board.

The board is an advisory council reporting directly to Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan V. Brown. Its purpose is to maintain high quality in seeds sold for planting purposes in the state.

The board works directly with the seed certification program of the state in setting standards for seed certification. The six-member panel meets two to four times per year.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government payments to wheat farmers are lagging behind the Agriculture Department's original timetable but are expected to be completed within about a month.

Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland said Monday that about \$773.5 million was paid to wheat farmers by Jan. 5, slightly less than two-thirds of the \$1.2 billion growers are expected to receive.

These payments will help "relieve the tight credit crunch facing farmers and rural lending institutions," Bergland said in a statement. The money is due wheat farmers as

"deficiency payments" under farm law for their 1977 wheat crop because market prices fell below a target price of \$2.90 a bushel last year. Under the program, if the average mar-

ket price of wheat in June, July, August, September and October is less than the target, payments are made to make up the difference between the target price and the market price - or the loan rate, whichever is higher. The five-month average was \$2.10 a

bushel. Thus, the payments are based on the loan rate - \$2.25 a bushel - which is the amount farmers can borrow from the government by using their grain as collateral. The deficiency payment, therefore, is 65 cents a bushel.

A spokesman, who asked not to be identified, said it was initially hoped that nearly all the payments could be made by the end of 1977


About 2 million wheat producers are eligible for the 1977 payments. The \$773.5 million paid as of Jan. 5 went to about 1.3 million persons.
