Well-organized columns of farm venicles poured into the city from every major highway once more early today as striking farmers Sidked off "National Tractorcade Day."
Before daybreak, farmess from arcoss the South Plains began rumbling toward the
city in tractors, pickups and large trucks to commence American Agriculture's Phase city in tractors, pickups and large trucks to commence American Agriculture's Phas Three protest of low farm prices.
By 11. a.m. the farmers' dream Loop 299 was almost a reality.
One Lawman Estimates 1,200 Tractors On Loop
One lawmen said 1,200 tractors were circling the city at one point, while reports Public Safety helicopter monitoring the activity Amarillo strike leaeder Mike Mccathern said farmers were "bumper-t-bumper"
along the 27 miles of highway except for a half-mile stretch, and farmers were ryying to close that gap before lunch today.
More tractors in outlying areas were being monitored by the Department of Public Salety as they proceeded toard Luobeck.
Strike leaders indicated the farmers would continue their encirclement of the city until just before noon. At 11: 30 a.m., some tractors left the loop for Mackenzie Park where leaders planned another rally. However, the proposed rally did not oceur. In
stead, the farmers "picknicked" in small groups and once they finished their lunch stead, the farmers "picknicked" in smal grous.
they mounted tractors for a return to the loop.
Later this afternoon, about 60 cropdusting planes were scheduled to fly over the
city in support of the farmers' strike.
