work on a new round of military base closings and reductions which they calculate will
stave up to $\$ 300$ million a year, news services

Out of a total budget that is expected to jump by $\$ 9$ billion or so to the neighborhood
of $\$ 125$ billion next year, that "savings" would be more window dressing than real.
While we are 1,000 per cent for saving

by the facts, we'd feel a lot more confidence in the Pentagon if it would look in places where there is real fat to trim.
