# Carter Budget Tops \$500 Billion Mark

Carter today sent Congress the first complete budget of his administration, describing it as "lean and tight" but sufficient to meet the country's needs.

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The president's proposed 1979 budget calls for outlays of just over \$500 billion, making it the first half-trillion-dollar budget in the nation's history. Spending in the current fiscal year is projected at will be a near-record. Carter disclosed last week it would be almost as high as the \$62 billion deficit in fiscal 1978, which would make it the third highest ever.

The record deficit for any single year

was \$66.4 billion in fiscal 1976. The 1979 fiscal year begins Oct. 1. The proposed budget includes Carter's

plan to cut taxes by \$25 billion beginning on Oct. 1, with \$17 billion in tax cuts for

Carter's proposed budget reduces the federal share of the nation's gross national product from 22.6 percent in 1978 to 22 percent next year. Carter said his goal is to reduce the fed-

eral share of GNP to 21 percent eventual-

50,000 jobs as part of Carter's overall welfare revision proposal sent to Congress

- A \$400 million appropriation to create jobs in the private sector for poor and disadvantaged persons, especially youths.

The huge deficit proposed for 1979 moves Carter further away from his campaign commitment to balance the budget fiscal 1981. And Carter acknowledged in his economic report to Congress last Friday that it is increasingly unlikely this goal can be met.

About one-third of the deficit, between \$15 billion and \$20 billion, is the direct result of his tax cut proposals, Carter said, which will reduce federal revenues during 1979 if Congress approves them.

# Reese AFB Pilot Killed In Crash

A 23-year-old student pilot at Reese Air Force Base was killed this morning when his T-38 jet trainer slammed into the ground about three miles north of the

base's far west runway.

Killed in the crash was 2nd Lt. Glenn A. Mathis of 502 Slide Road, No. 17-H, the sole occupant of the craft.

The victim's wife, Jeanne, had given birth to a baby girl, Krista, just a month

Officials had no cause for the crash which was reported shortly before 9 a.m. The victim apparently was killed immediately upon impact. Debris from the plane, said to have cost about \$756,000, was strewn over a 100-yard area in a plowed field owned by George Parsley.

About 30 rescue workers and Reese AFB personnel, including the base commander, Col. Joseph Brotherson, arrived at the scene about 10 minutes after the craft was reported down.

Sgt. David Galloway, who was one of the first at the scene, said there were no eyewitnesses to the mishap. However, base officials would not say whether Mathis had radioed to the base that he was having trouble

The second lieutenant, whose body was not removed from the site until about 11 a.m., had been attending flying school at the base since his arrival last February.

A base information officer, Capt. John Hennigan, said Mathis was in the last stages of instruction and was due to graduate in a couple of months.

Upon graduation from the school, Hennigan said Mathis, an Olney, Md., native, would have been stationed at the Mary-

land Air National Guard in Baltimore. Galloway said there was little fire caused by the crash. Plane parts were scattered through the red dirt and the only recognizable portions were parts of the fuselage and the craft's two engines.

The crash site is almost directly in line with the runway, with jets flying over the special investigation team while they searched for the many parts of the plane. The last two crashes at Reese involved the T-38 training jets.

In mid-December of 1976 an Air Force second lieutenant was killed in a mid-air collision involving the two training jets. Second Lieutenant Donald G. Taylor was killed in August 1976 while on a solo a cotton field about three miles north-

# County Ups EMS Rates

A \$10 increase in emergency medical services (EMS) rates and a "support services" agreement for the new Health Sciences Center Hospital were approved to-day by the Lubbock County Commission-

The contract between Lubbock County Hospital District and the Texas Tech University School of Medicine for operation of the county hospital culminated years of negotiations between the two institu-- and just in time.

The 245-bed Health Sciences Center Hospital will begin admitting patients Feb. 1. The agreement approved by commissioners spells out the areas of responsibility for the district and university, partners in the project.

The years-old debate over "shared services" - a concept by which one entity would produce services and sell them to the other as needed - has been "wrestled to death and we've done away with it," J.C. Rickman, chairman of LCHD board of managers told commissioners.

Instead, he said, under today's "um-brella agreement" the hospital district will staff and manage the revenue producing services - X-ray labs, the pharmacy, food services, etc. - even though they are located in the university's part of the huge hospital-medical school com-plex at 4th Street and Indiana Avenue.

The university, Rickman said, will run security, communications and other services that will not produce revenues, as well as outpatient clinics.

Each entity will keep "close tabs" on

the management costs of the various services. Then the hospital district will reimburse the medical school for the costs of university-operated services going to hospital patients, while the medical school will pay the district for its share of management costs on services going to outpatients, Rickman said.

With commissioners approval today, the support services agreement will be sent to university regents for their consideration Feb. 3, Rickman said.

Also today, commissioners ratified the hospital district's proposal to increase rates for EMS transportation to local hospitals from \$35 to \$45.

That hike still must be approved by the Lubbock City Council, Rickman said.

Before adjourning for a noon recess, the commissioners court also voted to change the name of the county welfare department to the Lubbock County General Assistance Agency.

In other policy chages for the assistance program, commissioners:

- Adopted new income criteria to enable more families to qualify for assist-- Reduced residency requirements

from one year in the state and six months in the county to six months in the state and 30 days in the county.

- Increased the housing assistance allowance for families who qualify from a maximum of \$65 to \$125.

This change will make it easier for eligible applicants to find temporary shelter while receiving benefits under the pro-

# Snow, Cold **Aim Blast** At Plains

Another wintry front is heading toward West Texas, putting snow and lower temperatures back into the Lubbock forecast again. The National Weather Service gives the area a 20 percent chance of the white stuff tonight and a 50 percent chance Tuesday.

Traveler's advisories have been issued for the New Mexico mountains as the new winter storm moves eastward.

On the South Plains, today's high temperatures nearing 60 degrees - following an extended period of subfreezing temperatures lasting from last Tuesday evening until noon Sunday - will be a brief respite the front arrives tonight.

Highs Tuesday are forecast in the upper 30s and lows tonight in mid-20s, with gusty northerly winds from 15 to 25 mph. The recent extended cold period was

the longest spell of wintry weather since the first week of January in 1973, the National Weather Service reports.

A Pacific cold front which was over the Rockies at noon will cross this area tonight, bringing with it lowered temperatures and a threat of precipitation.

Snowfall early today ranged from 2 to 5 inches across southern Wyoming and Utah. In the mountains of southwestern Colorado, 2 to 6 inches of new snow was reported overnight.

A chance exists for snowfall amounts up to 3 inches over northern areas of Texas tonight and Tuesday

The weather outlook later in the week calls for only widely scattered snow flurries Thursday, otherwise partly cloudy with a slight warming trend. Heavy snow was falling across New

Mexico's west central mountains this morning, causing hazardous driving conditions and resulting in warnings to trav-Snow storms are expected to fan out over central and southwestern parts of

New Mexico late today and over the eastern plains Tuesday. Fog abounded over the eastern half of

Texas this morning, along with light rain and drizzle falling along the coast. The adverse weather conditions subsided before noon.

Elsewhere in the nation, a cold air Elsewhere in the nation, a cold air mass still covered the eastern half of the country. Below zero temperatures were reported in parts of Ohio, Indiana and New Hampshire. Freezing temperatures were recorded as far south as northern Louisiana and Georgia.

Temperatures early today ranged from 65 in southern Florida to 5-below zero in Columbus Ohio.

# Murder Victim's **Body Exhumed**

In an effort to get a final, all-important piece of evidence in a bizarre Christmas Eve killing, lawmen today exhumed the body of a 28-year-old murder victim.

William Drew Young III was found in the trunk of his burning car .8 of a mile south of FM 85 and Avenue P about 10 p.m. Dec. 24. Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy, who ruled homicide at the scene, said Young died from either a beating, stabbing or suffocation.

However, because of a continuing controversy concerning autopsies here, LeCroy refused to grant a request by lawmen to have the procedure performed on the body. Friday, the Criminal District Attorney's Office issued an order to exhume Young's body - a move city, county and state lawmen have been awaiting for three weeks.

According to investigators, arrest of two suspects may be forthcoming when the final autopsy results are made known. However, sources at the Lubbock County Sheriff's Department and the Lubbock Police Department have indicated the continuing probe into Young's death has involved several other persons.

Investigators would not confirm the possibility that money exchanged hands as a result of Young's death. However, those who have been working on the case since its beginning say the murder apparently stemmed from an incident just two days before he was killed.

South African Editors Honored

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) - South African editors Percy Qoboza and Donald Woods have been awarded the "Golden Pen of Freedom" award from the executive committee of the International Federation of Newspaper Pub-

The editor of the Daily Dispatch of East London, Woods was placed on restrictive banning orders last October for criticizing South Africa's white-minority government. He fled the country on New Year's Eve with his family.



# Spacecraft Delivers Supplies

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet government has made another advance toward prolonged manned space missions by delivering supplies in an unmanned spacecraft to two cosmonauts orbiting more than 150 miles above the earth.

"Transportation of supplies by automatic transport ships will make it possible to considerably prolong the functioning and increase the effective use of manned orbital complexes,"said Tass, the official news agency.

Tass said Progress 1, the unmanned supply ship launched Friday, docked Sunday at the Salyut 6 space station, bringing cosmonauts Yuri Romanenko and Georgi Grechko fuel and "materials for ensuring the life of the crew and for conducting scientific research."

Romanenko and Grechko were launched on Dec. 10 in Soyuz 26 and linked up with Salyut 6 the next day. They have now been in space for 44 days, increasing expectations that they will try break the Soviet space endurance record of 61 days and the U.S. record of 84 days.

The weekend supply mission was preceded by another Soviet space first on Jan. 11, when two cosmonauts docked the spaceship Soyuz 27 to Salyut 6. This first linkup of three spacecraft demonstrated the feasibility of landing supplies at an orbiting station while it was also host to the spaceship used to tansport the

The crew that took Soyuz 27 up returned to the earth five days later in Soyuz 26. leaving Soyuz 27 for Romanenko and Grechko to travel home in.

Progress 1 is a stripped-down version of the Soyuz capsules, Tass said. It said after its cargo was transferred to the space station, it will be released to burn up in the earth's atmosphere.

### President Bans Newspapers In Indonesia

JAKARTA. Indonesia (AP) — President Suharto's military regime banned a seventh newspaper. Pos Sore, today, and confirmed that more than 100 students were arrested over the weekend in a crackdown on critics of Suharto.

Adm. Sudomo, chief of the security command, said the students were suspected of "committing acts of subversion." Many of those arrested in Jakarta and elsewhere on the central Indonesian island of Java were released after questioning, but sources said 26 members of the Jakarta council of university students were still in jail.

Sudomo said the newspapers were closed "to maintain general tranquility and prevent the dissemination of news that may mislead the public." He said the ban was temporary but gave no indication when it would be lifted.

Other government leaders indicated the papers were silenced for giving full coverage of the students' anti-government campaign, including publication of a statement last week that "blood will flow" if Suharto runs for re-election this year.

The students claim the government is riddled with corruption and privilege. Suharto, a general who crushed an at-

Suharto, a general who crushed an attempted Communist coup in 1965, became acting president in 1967, replacing leftist President Sukarno, a founder of the Indonesian republic. The legislature elected Suharto to five-year terms in 1968 and 1973 and is considered certain to reelect him again in March.

#### Gunmen Kill Paolo Violi In Montreal

MONTREAL (AP) — Two hooded men shot and killed alleged crime kingpin Paolo Violi Sunday night at a snack bar adjoining his ice-cream parlor in north Montreal, a police spokesman an-

nounced.

He said the killers may have used a shotgun but gave no further details. Unconfirmed reports said they drove up in a blue Camaro and escaped on foot.


Violi, 44, was identified at the government inquiry into organized crime in Quebec province as a leading member of the Montreal underworld with ties to Mafia figures in New York. Police witnesses at the inquiry produced photographs of Violi with other alleged Mafiosi at his innocuous looking refreshment

shop, the Gelateria Violi.

Violi's younger brother Francesco, 38, was shot and killed in the office of his importing business in north Montreal last February. The killers escaped, but police said the murder was a "settling of ac-

The Violis' father, Dominico Violi, has been deported twice from Canada and was not allowed to return for the funeral. He now lives in Parma, Ohio.

Paolo Violi refused to testify at the crime inquiry in October 1976 and was sentenced to a year in jail for contempt of court

# South African Blacks Urge School Boycott

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI)

— About 1,500 blacks shouting nationalist slogans held a rare public meeting in Soweto township Sunday, urging students to continue a five-month boycott of schools.

They also strongly rejected a government plan for elections to community councils in the restive black township of 1.5 million persons on the southwestern outskirts of Johannesburg.

The meeting called by the Soweto Action Committee and the Black Priests Solidarity group at the St. Francis of Assisi Anglican church was watched by about 25 policemen, who did not interfere.

But at the end of the meeting, five white foreign journalists, including UP-ITN cameraman Etore Botta, and three local black newsmen covering the session were ordered by armed police to the township's police station.

The whites were released after a security policeman took down their names but the three blacks were kept in custody.

Since the government cracked down on black consciousness groups Oct. 18 and banned about 50 persons for their outspoken views. Soweto residents have held few public meetings to discuss the latest developments affecting their township.

The boycott of Soweto schools began in August and September and attendance at many schools was almost non-existent by the time schools closed for the Christmas vacations in November.

More than 300 black teachers also resigned in protest against the Bantu education system which they said was inferior to the white system — a claim the government denied.

Last week Soweto's junior schools reopened and attendance were reported between 40 percent and 80 percent. High schools are scheduled to reopen Feb. 1.

Several speakers, cheered on by chants of "Amandhla (power)" and the response "Ngawethu (is ours)" called on Soweto citizens to reject the community councils.

Ishmael Mkhabela, vice chairman of the Soweto committee, said the community councils "and those who wish to take part therein must understand that they will be regarded as the most treacherous people ever to mislead the African people."

# Chinese Officials Blamed For Not Reporting Flu

ATLANTA (UPI) — If Chinese officials had acted sooner in reporting outbreaks of the Russian flu in their country, the United States might have been better prepared for the strain's expected arrival here, says a federal health expert.

But Dr. Walter Dowdle, of the national Center for Disease Control, said Saturday he was encouraged by the fact the Chinese even bothered to tell world health officials about the flu outbreaks on the mainland last spring and summer.

"It's not so much that they didn't cooperate but rather that they finally did," said Dowdle, chief of the CDC's virology bracch.

He called the Chinese government's decision to inform the world of the outbreaks "a positive event," but added it was "unfortunate" the Chinese did not act sooner.

The world medical community found out about the strain from the Russians — about six months after it affected the Chinese.

On Jan. 11, the Chinese Academy of Medical Sciences reported to the World Health Organization that late last May several influenza A-H1N1 (AUSSR) viruses were isolated from children in Tientsin and two provinces.

The Chinese said the infection was seen most often in children and adolescents from 8-20 and it spread southward throughout China from July to October. The illness usually lasted from two to three days.

The same flu strain has swept across Russia, affecting an estimated 30 million Soviet citizens. It has also been reported in Hong Kong, the Philippines, Taiwan and Great Britain.

American health official believe the potentially dangerous Russian flu, similiar to the type that caused worldwide epidemics from 1947-57, probably will hit the United States this winter or next fall.

The tardiness of the Chinese in alerting WHO to the advent of the flu strain precluded timely development of a vaccine

the epidemic, Dowdle said.

Prompt notification also probably could have put the United States far ahead in developing a vaccine before the Russian flu hits this country, he said.

People between the ages of 25-51 have been found to have antibodies against the Russian flu, but young people and those in older age groups whose immunity has waned are susceptible.

#### Thai Bus Attacked By Cambodian Army

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — Cambodian troops striking two miles into Thailand ambushed a bus and killed seven Thai civilians in a weekend attack, police sources said today.

The victims were four women, two children and a man, the sources said.

The attack took place in southeastern Chantaburi province 180 miles from Bangkok where there have been frequent border clashes between Thai and Cambodian forces in the past year.

#### Winter Fruit Grown In Northern Russia

MOSCOW (AP) — Horticulturists in Petrozavodsk, in northern Russia, are growing winter pomegranates no bigger that hens' eggs, the trade union newspaper Trud reports.

Tropical fruit is highly prized during the long Russian winters, and pomegranates are especially prized for their medicinal qualities. They are eaten for blood disorders and their skins are dried and taken for diarrhea.



# Loan To Somalia Angers Ethiopian Government

BONN, West Germany (AP) — The West German ambassador to Ethiopia was expected home tonight to report on his expulsion because his government said Somalia could use a \$12 million German loan to buy arms to use against the Ethiopians.

A spokesman for the West German Foreign Ministry said the government would not expel the Ethiopian ambassador in retaliation for the ouster of Ambassador Johann Christian Lankes from Addis Ababa.

The Ethiopian government gave Lankes 24 hours to leave after Marie Schlei, the West German minister for economic cooperation, announced the loan to Somalia and said in a radio interview she could not rule out the possibility of its use for weapons purchases.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman later told The Associated Press that Somalia, which is supporting the Somali rebels in the Ogaden region of southeast Ethiopia, could spend the money "freely." Asked if arms purchases were allowed, he replied, "That is correct."

The government changed its story after the expulsion order. Mrs. Schlei issued a statement late Sunday saying the German-Somali agreement "stipulates in writing that the loan will be used for economic and social development in Somal-

Ethiopia and Somalia are in a state of undeclared war over the Ogaden, most of which has been seized by ethnic Somali rebels backed by Somalia. Although the Soviet Union has been pouring arms into Ethiopia, and Soviet and Cuban advisers are there, the United States and its European allies rebuffed Somali appeals for arms from them. But there has been speculation West Germany would supply the arms because Somalia last fall allowed German commandos to recapture a hijacked Lufthansa jetliner at the Mo-

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gadishu airport.

Representatives of the United States,
West Germany, Britain, France and Italy
met in Washington Saturday to discuss
the fighting in Ethiopia. A State Department spokeswoman said they believed
the region's problems could not be set-

An Ethiopian government spokesman said if the five Western powers "were genuine and peace-loving, they would have called for an immediate withdrawal of Somalia's invading forces from Ethiopian territory."

"Any call for a negotiated settlement without the condemnation of Mogadi-

shu's actions is condoning aggression," the spokesman said.

The leading newspaper in Kenya, the southern neighbor of Ethiopia and Somalia, also protested the West German loan. The Nairobi Daily Nation said a loan without restrictions to Somalia was like "putting a loaded gun in the hands of

a power-hungry, crazed person."
Kenya also fears Somali territorial ambitions. Although they have soft-pedaled such talk recently, the Somalis in the past have talked about creating a Greater Somalia that would include the Ogaden, northeastern Kenya and Djibouti, all of which are inhabited by Somali tribesmen.

# Phnom Penh Changed From City To Town

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — Cambodia's Communist rulers have transformed Phnom Penh, a city of 3 million people in 1975, into a town of not more than 15,000 persons living among empty shops and streets converted to gardens, a Danish diplomat

Kjeld Mortensen, Denmark's ambassador to China, Vietnam and Cambodia, told a Radio Denmark correspondent in Peking about the twoweek visit to Cambodia from which he and envoys of Sweden, Finland, Tanzania and Iraq returned last week. The interview was broadcast Sunday.

Mortensen said no older people were to be seen in Phnom Penh and children, some as young as 10, made up the labor force. He said Cambodian officials described them as "active

participants in the revolution."

He reported the side streets of the capital had been converted into vegetable plots, grazing ground for sheep or runs for rabbits and chickens.

The ambassador said he was told most of the city's population had been sent into the countryside to live in collective farm villages of 500 to 600 families each. He said a request to visit one of the villages was refused.

Very few Westerners have been admitted to Cambodia since Communists took over the country in 1975. Refugees reaching Thailand have reported many thousands of their countrymen died of starvation, disease and exhaustion after the Communists drove them from the cities and towns to convert the country into a completely agricultural society.

# Why Here, You Ask?

ONE WEEK AGO last night, Bruce Darrell Kelley's future became a thing of the past.

He was gunned down and left to die behind the counter of a west Lubbock drive-in grocery because \$97.28 was more important to somebody than was young Kelley's life.

From all accounts, the 19-year-old Lubbock Christian College student was the type any community needs. He was working his way through school, supporting a wife, serving as organist in his church, planning a career in religious music.

He was interested in others, ambitious, outgoing. But, four days after taking his nighttime job at the rural grocery, he was dead.

A FEW DAYS EARLIER, a young Lubbock mother's car stalled in the heart of town. A "Good Samaritan" who took her home, ac-

cording to police reports, stayed long enough to rape her. The fact that there was no public outcry of shock and outrage over either of these crimes is rooted in the fact that they have become almost

commonplace here. As a community, Lubbock seems to have reached the point where we merely cluck-cluck over crimes of sex and violence.

These real-life tragedies sometimes stir up no more conversation or apparent concern than a weekly episode on a blood-and-guts TV show or the latest R-rated movie.

IT IS MY BELIEF that a city gets about as much crime as it is willing to tolerate.

For the last few years, Lubbock has been tolerating more of it than any self-respecting town Maybe we became too sensitive to the sneers

ONE MAN'S OPINION

that "Lubbock is the buckle on the Bible belt." Perhaps it became too easy to shrug off the rising crime rate as "a sign of the times" or as the

inevitable consequences of becoming a city. Or maybe the belt became unbuckled and the gap widened between the kind of community we like to think Lubbock is and the kind of morality that actually exists.

Whatever the reasons, crime is rampant and the majority is silent. The situation won't change before public attitudes toward it change.

BLAMING POLICE for not catching more crooks, prosecutors for not prosecuting more diligently, judges for granting bail too easily, jurors for assessing light sentences and prison officials for granting parole too easily is well and good.

Much of the criticism of those who are responsible for catching and punishing criminals is justified, although not all of it is.

But I think you have to look a little deeper than that. We need to look into the breeding grounds of crime-and I'm not talking about the shopworn phrases of poverty or neighborhood environment or discrimination.

It's not that simple. Bruce Darrell Kelley, after all, was a young Negro who never had life handed to him on a silver platter-but he was the victim, not the perpetrator, of a vicious crime.

I WONDER WHAT we'd learn if we made a study of those who are arrested and convicted here of crimes such as armed robbery, rape, burglary and murder.

Where do they spend their time? What do they

do for recreation? Do they work, or would they if they had the chance?

What I'm suggesting is that Lubbock may have become a pleasant place to live for those who

prey on innocent victims. Certainly, I doubt if the person or persons who killed Kelley spend their spare time, as he did, in church or in school productions or other whole-

some activities. Many of us blast the police when they "stake out" a gamblers' den or arrest a nude dancer. asking "why aren't they out catching real crimi-

But, I wonder if maybe letting such places flourish makes Lubbock an inviting playground for those with criminal instincts where their hearts ought to be?

I DON'T KNOW what such a study would prove, but I suspect it would at least indicate that Lubbock offers plenty of diversions to entertain those who rob, rape and steal.

If so, then interrupting those patterns of diversion and making the city less fun for the criminal element might be the most effective way to reduce the crime rate.

Cities, everywhere, build and maintain a reputation. Some become known as citadels of crime, others as a "nice place to raise a family.

The difference is in the public's attitude and in the kind of atmosphere it creates, the degree of tolerance it has toward criminals and criminal activities, the kind of people it makes feel wel-



# Mutual Funds Do Well In 1977

NEW YORK (AP) - If they gave out comeback-of-year awards in the investment business, the mutual fund industry would be a prime contender for the 1977

In terms of both investment performance and attracting new money during the year, mutual funds on balance turned in their brightest showing in a long time.

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"Performance-wise, 1977 was the best year for mutual funds in at least the past decade, despite a generally declining stock market," reported Paul A. Johnston, editor of the Wiesenberger Investment Companies Service, a firm which keeps tabs on the industry.

Standard Poor's Corp. reached a similar conclusion, finding that 95 percent of the 379 funds it monitors outperformed

the SP composite index of 500 stocks, which declined 11.5 percent during the

Some 106 funds, or 29 percent of the total, chalked up increases in net asset val-

"It should be pointed out that many of these funds invest in bonds and preferred stocks, and thus their showings are not directly comparable to a common-stock price index," SP said. "Nevertheless, last year's showing by the industry - still dominated by growth-oriented funds was quite impressive.

Apparently helping the funds limit declines in per-share asset value (and in some cases score gains) was greater emphasis on portfolio diversification, partly the result of the heightened prudent man

standard of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974.

'Whereas holdings formerly may have been concentrated in big-capitalization blue chip and growth stocks, which were among the poorest-performing issues in 1977, they now probably include a greater number of secondary stocks, which gen-

erally acted well last year." In addition, SP said, "there are indications that even the growth-oriented funds have adopted more defensive investment strategies, increasing their cash positions and their holdings of less volatile, highdividend-paying stocks."

The firm noted that the industry held 7.7 percent of its assets in cash and short term interest-bearing securities at Nov. 30, against 5.7 percent at the end of 1976. Figures from the Investment Company Institute, the industry trade group showed that its members took in \$5.84 billion in new money from investors in the first 11 months of 1977, while redeeming \$5.46 billion worth of shares.

That works out to \$379 million in net sales, after a six-year span of net redemptions which steadily drained money out

# Kleindienst Explains Guilty Plea

WASHINGTON (AP) - Former Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst said today he doesn't feel he was guilty of the misdemeanor charge that he pleaded guilty to in 1974 during the Watergate

"I do not feel guilty of anything, felony or perjury," he said in a telephone inter-He said he decided to plead guilty only

because he was under intense physical and emotional stress during "the supercharged atmosphere of Watergate."

Newly disclosed documents from the Watergate special prosecution force, brought to light in a freedom of information lawsuit, show the prosecutor's staff originally wanted to indict Kleindienst on 13 felony counts of perjury and obstruction of justice.

However, Leon Jaworski, the special prosecutor, decided to allow Kleindienst to plead guilty instead to a single misde

Jaworski based his decision in pon the fact that Kleindienst had vol arily provided information to Jawors s predecessor, Archibald Cox. after Cox promised that his cooperation would be considered when the prosecutors decided what to do about Kleindienst's own case.

Kleindienst received a suspended sentence after pleading guilty to a charge of failing to testify fully and accurately during Senate hearings when he denied there was White House pressure on the Justice Department to settle a government antitrust lawsuit against the International Telephone Telegraph Co.

White House tapes later revealed that President Richard M. Nixon once called Kleindienst and ordered him to drop the ITT case. Kleindienst said today that at the Senate hearings on his nomination to be attorney general, he was asked only about White House pressure to settle the ITT case. He said Nixon's call came before settlement negotiations were begun. He said that if the Senate had asked him about White House pressure to drop the case, he would have asked Nixon either to allow him to tell about the telephone call or to withdraw his nomination to be attorney general.

#### Author Reveals KidnapStrategy OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) - The chief

investigator in the Chowchilla, Calif., bus-kidnap case says the three convicted abductors "cased" various grammar schools before deciding on their target.

Jack Baugh, chief of the criminal division of the Alameda County Sheriff's Department, says in an upcoming book that in late 1975 and early 1976 the three men drove hundreds of miles, scouting possible targets. By March, he says, they decided on Chowchilla Frederick Woods, 26, James Schoen-



#### **Thomas Case Jury Gets** Information

Prosecutors today introduced more documents in their effort to prove John Thomas or his companies actually controlled joint venture farming lease operations in Gaines County in 1972 and 1973.

Thomas, 44, a former Brownfield businessman who recently moved his corporate headquarters to Houston, is standing trial in U.S. District Court here, charged with converting Commodity Credit Corporation funds to his own use and with supplying false information to the government agency.

The government charges Thomas converted property to his use in 1972 and 1973 by causing cotton price support payments of around \$2.5 million to be allotted to individuals who allegedly had no substantive interest in land they leased from Jon-T Farms, Inc., a Thomas com-

Under terms of the Upland Cotton Program then in effect, there was a \$55,000 ceiling on government price supports to individual farmers.

The government feels Thomas evaded the price ceiling through joint venture arrangements in which individuals borrowed sums of around \$50,000 to lease acreage, then assigned their government subsidy checks to banks as collateral for

Asst. U.S. Atty. Roger L. McRoberts today introduced records indicating that checks on two joint-venture accounts were used to pay a bill owed by the Thomas Feedlot

The feedlot, according to the records. owed money to a gin which handled cotton for the two joint ventures. The lot, testimony has indicated, be-

longed to Jon-T Farms, and was not joint venture-leased property. "Now, Mr. Thomas, can you explain

why the joint ventures paid the bill?" McRoberts asked H.C. Thomas, brother of the defendant. The witness said he could not explain

why the joint ventures had paid the bill of more than \$7,000.

Testimony in the federal trial was to continue this afternoon.



# Yarbrough Gives Plea In Trial

AUSTIN (UPI) - Former Texas Supreme Court Associate Justice Donald B. Yarbrough today pleaded innocent to a perjury charge, and a Travis County district judge scheduled jury selection in his trial to begin at 2 p.m.

Yarbrough, who refused to respond to reporters' questions as 'he walked into the courthouse with attorneys Waggoner Carr and Tom McCorkle, responded, Not guilty," when asked by District Judge Mace B. Thurman how he would plead.

Yarbrough also faces a forgery charge in connection with alterations to an automobile title. Thurman denied Yarbrough's motion

to dismiss the indictments, and motions to individually examine prospective jurors and keep the jury sequestered for the length of the trial. This is a case which everyone recog-

nizes has had intense publicity, probably more than any in modern times," said Carr in arguing for the individual examination of jurors. "We would like the opportunity to examine each juror outside the presence of the others concerning the effect the news media publicity might have had on them.

Assistant District Attorney Phil Nelson argued individual examination of the jurors would unnecessarily prolong the

Thurman granted Yarbrough's request to have the jury determine his punishment if he is convicted on the perjury charge. He could receive a prison sentence of 2-10 years, and a fine of up to \$5. 000 upon conviction.

Yarbrough, 36, resigned from the Supreme Court in the face of legislative efforts to remove him from office, and resigned his license to practice law rather than go through disbarment proceedings. Proscutors say they will concentrate on the perjury allegation, contending Yar-

tions against him. He resigned July 15, 1977, as the Legislature began consideration of a resolution to oust him

Two months later, on Sept. 2, he volun-

tarily surrendered his law license rather than face disbarment proceedings in Defense Attorney Waggoner Carr said

Yarbrough planned to fight the perjury "I think the fellow has suffered enough." Carr said. "I hope enough others agree with me

Carr said Yarbrough is in debt and unable to pay his legal fees. A second defense attorney, Charles M. Hineman of Austin. resigned from the case because he had not been paid.

# Tree Vandals Denounced

EUREKA, Calif. (UPI) - Conservationists and loggers alike are denouncing a recent wave of unexplained vandalism against majestic redwoods - some more than 1,000 years old

The two groups have been on opposite

sides of the fence over a proposal to expand the Redwood National Park by adding 48,000 acres of heavily timbered mountain land. Conservationists say the addition is needed to save the trees from the lumber companies. But the loggers say the addition would result in wholesale unemploy-

ment for an area already beset with job problems The latest acts of vandalism were discovered Friday. Four redwoods were chain-sawed and damaged on the Avenue of the Giants in Humboldt Redwood State Park.

They brought to 16 the number of giant redwoods ruined since Jan. 3.

The Associated California Loggers and the California State Park Rangers Association have each posted \$1,000 rewards for information leading to the vandals.

Eureka Mayor Sam Sacco, who spent last week in Washington, D.C., lobbying against the park expansion, called the damaging of the trees "a detestable act.

# **Agricultural Leaders Leave List Of Demands At Capital**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Most of the protesting farmers were gone from the capital today, but they left behind a clear list of demands for government action to

help them out of their financial troubles. Winding up their latest demonstration Sunday, leaders of the nationwide farm strike movement urged President Carter to order an immediate moratorium on farm loan foreclosures.

Spokesmen for the American Agriculture movement said quick action is needed because some farm loans may be foreclosed around the first of next month.

#### Only 30 States Honor Lincoln

CHICAGO (AP) - Abraham Lincoln, the 16th president, who is credited with having proved to the world that democracy can be a lasting form of government, is not unanimously honored within that same category.

Only about 30 states in the United States observe Lincoln's Birthday as a legal holiday, according to The World Book Encyclopedia. Most of those states do so on his actual birthday, Feb. 12, but a few celebrate it on the first or third Monday of February.

The first observance of "Honest Abe's" birthday was in 1866, the year after his assassination.

Israel's cabinet has acknowledged that the Scnai Peninsula legitimately belongs to Egypt, and it has agreed in principle that as part of a peace settlement Israelis will be withdrawn from the whole of the territory. Why, then, in this acutely sensitive moment of Middle East history, is Israel suddenly rushing to increase its development of settlements along the northeastern Sinai coast, and encouraging Israelis to go live in this alien desert?

From the beginning, Israel's policy of planting settlements in occupied territories - on the West Bank and the Golan Heights of Syria as well as in the Sinai has been keyed to perceived security needs. The small communities were chiefly intended to provide early warning against military attack and, perhaps, serve as outposts to delay armed advances. Whatever one thinks of the political merit or tactical efficacy of that policy, the move to augment it now in the Sinai makes no sense.

A peace settlement between Egypt and Israel will undoubtedly be chock-full of provisions and guarantees intended to safeguard Israel against attack from Egypt. A few thousand Israeli civilians squatting on Egyptian land southwest of the Gaza Strip can hardly be considered necessary to bolster such guarantees. Israeli planning now ought to be devoted to withdrawing these settlers, not adding to

At the very least, Israel appears to have introduced a new, unnecessary and irritating complication in its relations with Egypt on the eve of substantive negotiations in Jerusalem and Cairo. That it has done so without any plausible explanation of its intent only adds to the prob-

MEXICO CITY (UPI) - John Fulton, Spain's only American bullfighter, is the kind of man you would expect to read about in an Ernest Hemingway novel. The 45-year-old former Philadelphian

also is an artist, children's book illustrator, clothes designer and author of a history of bullfighting.

Fulton, in Mexico City to present an exhibit of matadors' suits he designed, said

making it to the top in his profession wasn't easy. "For an American to become a fullfledged bullfighter in Spain is like Mu-

hammad Ali becoming mayor of Birmingham, Ala.," Fulton said in an inter-"It's traditionally Spanish and foreign-

ers are looked down upon." Fulton, a tall, athletic man who runs 21/2 miles and trains each day to keep in shape, said the Tyrone Power movie, "Blood and Sand," which he saw when he was 13 made him want to become a

Bullfighters are the last of the gladia-

tors," is the way he puts it. He left Philadelphia in 1955 for San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, to study painting at an art school - and his career as a matador was launched. He killed his first bull in the picturesque tourist town when he was 20, after studying under Pepe Ortiz, one of Mexico's leading bull-

fighters in the early 1930s. When he was drafted and stationed at Fort Sam Houston, near San Antonio, he slipped across the border to fight bulls in Mexico on his weekend passes.

He went to Spain, where he has an art studio in Sevilla, and became a fullfledged matador in 1963.

"One career helps another," Fulton said. "I support myself with my painting and my fame as a bullfighter helps my

Fulton said the designs for the Mexican matador suit collection took him three

The exhibit, called Aztec Gold, features motifs taken from ancient Aztec and Mayan sculptures.

"The idea was to give Mexican matadors something all their own," Fulten

To come up with the designs, Fulton went to Mexico City's famed Museum of Anthropology and History and studied

One purple matador's cape in the collection is emblazoned with the Aztec sun calendar sewn in gold. Other motifs on the richly embroidered suits of lights feature designs found on Mayan temples at Uxmal, Mixtec jewelry found at Monte Alban, ancient drawings of Montezuma, the last of the Aztec emperors, and sculptures of the god Quetzalcoatl. The suits were sewn by Madrid's famous matador eamstress, Maestra Nati.

Fulton said that each suit of lights sells for about \$700.

**ABC Plans** Sequel To 'Roots'

LOS ANGELES (AP) - "Roots" got record ratings and a lot of hype last year. Now, ABC plans a sequel. It's priming the publicity pump tonight with a one-hour show called "Roots: One Year Lat-

Narrated by Emmy-winning Rootsman Louis Gossett Jr., it purports to examine what ABC calls "the far-reaching irnpact" of the 12-hour, eight-part miniseries based on Alex Haley's best-selling The impact has been amply reported.

But I don't believe anyone said the show's story of African roots and American slavery and freedom "literally blazed across this nation's screens. Nor was it "epochal." These are what

NBC's Edwin Newman calls "blurb words," and they're uttered at the start of tonight's anniversary hour by Gossett from a script by Robert Guenette. This is a blurb show, full of lavish praise for "Roots." But you must understand it comes from David L. Wolper,

who made the original and will start film-

ing the sequel next April. The program, using "Roots" clips to illustrate various points, tells the oft-told tale of how Haley traveled 500,000 miles and three continents in 12 years to research his book.

It also shows him, in a scene re-created

citing the old historian, wrote that Haley's tracing of his enslaved ancestor, Kunta Kinte, was full of inaccuracies. (Haley, in this week's TV Guide, recalls the flap and says the old historian declared the Englishman's article distort-

Producer Wolper holds forth on "Roots," then we are treated to "the actual screen test" of Levar Burton, the fine young actor who beat out 150 others for the coveted Kunta Kinte role.

As do other actors on display tonight, he reverentially discusses the meaning of "Roots." Later, he's sighted with Haley in a Virginia graveyard, looking for the grave of Kunta Kinte.

We also hear from Gossett that when the show aired, "the country went 'Roots' crazy. Concerts were canceled, restaurant business dropped, bars had to close... Las Vegas and movie theaters also reported their income sharply re-

No examples are cited. Much faith is expected for this, likewise the claim that after "Roots," "ancestor-hunting, or geneology, is now the third most-popular hobby in the United States."

"Roots"appeared in 32 countries, but no one says how much it earned. Too crass, I guess. It's praised for promoting racial understanding, but any gripes are dismissed in one sentence:

"It has received its share of criticism, but it remained for the public all over the world to accept it as the social phenomenon and entertainment event of the

Glad to see humility lives. I wish Haley, a good writer, had avoided this caper. He doesn't need blurb shows. He should just take the money and run - right back to the typewriter.

# French Way Of Life Still **Big Part Of Ivory Coast**

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YAMOUSSOUKRO, Ivory Coast (AP)

The French president, Valery Giscard d'Estaing, called the country "deepest Africa" on his visit earlier this month and turned up in an open-necked tropical shirt to listen to the drum-breating at a giant feast held in his honor.

But before the tribal dances began, French-trained waiters in French-style white jackets served chilled French champagne to the some 5,000 guests half of them French - while a Frenchuniformed orchestra played French tunes as background to the French-lan-

The outdoor kermesse (feast) dramatized in an unusual way the extent to which France remains a part of the Ivory Coast and, to a lesser extent, the rest of its former colonies in West Africa in a lecade where European influence elsethere on the continent has declined seadily.

The imprint is everywhere, much of it of from the more than half a century deing which this nation was a French posession. But much also flows from the colunued presence of some 50,000 Frachmen who still work here, providing percent of the executive-level labor

Sole 3,500 are here as "cooperants." rough similar to U.S. Peace Corps volunteg, teaching in Ivory Coast schools and ulversities and giving technical help Recommunications, commerce

There are so many Frenchmen at the Planning Ministry (Ministere du Plan) that it's jokingly referred to as the White Ministry (Ministere du Blanc).

French influence in education -French language exclusively beginning in kindergarten - is so strong that more than two-thirds of the seven millions inhabitants understand French. Only about a fifth could get along in the colonial language at independance in 1960.

"Some of my children don't even know their own dialect," said an Ivoirian mother in flawless French. "French is all we

Even the Ivoirian national anthem reflects the country's attachment to France: it's the "Abidjanaise," named after the capital, Abidjan, as France's 'Marseillaise" is named after the southern French city of Marseille.

Abidjan belles follow Paris fashions and leave baggy African robes to their grandmothers or village cousins. A black American girl sporting a puffy Afro hairdo in a downtown Abidjan cafe drew stares one recent day from her African contemporaries who were having a French-style lunch in sleek French-style

President Felix Houphouet-Boigny, a French-trained physician who in colonial days served as minister of state for health in the French government, has pledged to dilute French presence over the years. But it is widely understood that this will

be a gradual process and Frenchmen feel assured of their place here for years to

"I leave to others the ambition or illusion of utopic constructions," Hou-phouet-Boigny told Giscard d'Estaing during the French leader's five-day visit. "I believe that it's with concrete realities, such as the relations of very great confidence between France and Ivory Coast, that it is possible to move ahead. for our own benefit and that of everyone

Ivory coast has indeed benefitted from its relations with France. Independent economists agree that France's pervasive role in the economy largely accounts for the 7 percent annual growth rate here, the highest in a major black African country.

France also gets its share. French companies are the largest single source of imports, providing 38 percent of Ivory Coast purchases ranging from heavy machinery to French provincial cheeses for a total of more than \$400 million a year.


"I'm here for the bucks, let's face it."

some form of voluntary restraints instead of plunging into wage and price controls? The Carter program would anticipate pressures for increases and seek with in-

ation is in the industry, the outlook for material prices, how much inflation is locked in," said Schultze The job is enormous, even though

Schultze said he thought it could be done without an enlargement of the government payroll. But because the problems are "all over the place," priorities would be set.

What are some of the priorities? Schultze said he would be looking at industries where competition is less than in others, where pricing action affects the entire economy, where capacity limitations exist.

It's a program based on a good deal of hope, but as Schultze said, there are several things you can do about inflation, including what he said were the unacceptable options of controls or doing nothing.



# Soup Hot, Inexpensive Winter Meal

Women's News Service If the year-end holidaying took a toll on your house-hold budget, and if those icy winter winds have cut down on your getup-and-go in the kitchen, there's a simple solution: soup. It's hot, nourishing, satisfying and cheap. What more can you demand of a dish than that its ingredients jump in the kettle under their own pow-

This shortcut adaptation of a German specialty fits all the criteria.

LIVERWURST DUMPLING SOUP: For dumplings, mash one-half pound liverwurst, then add one cup breadcrumbs; two beaten eggs, and two tablespoons melted butter or margarine. Add two tablespoons chopped parsley, one-half teaspoon salt and one-quarter teaspoon pepper, stirring until combined. Shape mixture into 36 one-inch balls.

For a broth, bring six cups beef broth to a boil in a large heavy pot or Dutch oven. Add two packages (10 ounces each) frozen mixed vegetables and bring to a boil again. Add liverdumplings and simmer 10 to 15 minutes. Yields six servings. Note: If dissolved beef bouillon cubes are used for broth, taste before adding additional salt.

Complementary to the soup is hearty dark rye bread; salad consisting of every fresh vegetable that's reasonable at the market this week, and fresh fruit cup

Stir in one-half cup each, chopped green pepper and chopped scallions then add more flour (a total of 2 and one-half to three cups enriched all-purpose flour) to make a soft dough. Cover and let rise in a warm, draft-free place (80 to 85 degrees) till doubled in bulk, about one hour. Punch down dough.

Place in two greased one-quart casserole dishes or two 7 and three-eighths by 3 and five-eights-inch bread pans. Let rise in warm place till doubled in bulk again about 35 minutes. Bake 30 to 35 minutes in preheated 375 degree oven. Cover if necessary the last 10 minutes to prevent excess browning. Cool 10 minutes in the pan before removing. And cool com-

Accept Menopause

NEW YORK (NEA) -Everyone knows
what menopause is: hot flashes, weight
gain, irritability; wrinkles, hair loss
where you want hair, or hair growth where you don't want it; and cassation of childbearing ability.

In short, you can expect to beome a sexless, useless, undesirable old hag.

To which Rosetta Reitz says balder-dash. True, menstrutation and childbearing cease, but sex certainly needn't. Nor a woman's attractiveness. And just as no two women experience menopause at the same age (the median is 50.2 years), no two get exactly the same symptoms with exactly the same intensity.

St. broker decided it was time to research the subject; to read everything she could, to talk to women of all ages. After three years' research and contact

with perhaps 1,000 women, she has written, "Menopause, A Positive Approach," published by Chilton. "I wrote the book," she says, "because

I wanted to know what menopause was

myself. When you know what to expect, you don't fear it. She learned, for example, that hot flashes are harmless dilations of the blood vessels. If and when you experi-

ence one, not to worry. It will pass. All you need do is make yourself as comfortable as possible until it does.

"You must learn to love yourself, em-

brace your aging and don't fight yourself.
You are what you are and there's nothing
wrong with that. I never was a Barbi doll type and I'm never going to be. I want to be related to for myself, as this person I

am," she says.

Too bad if society doesn't give a damn about you; make sure you do. Nurture yourself. Reach for a salad and yogurt for lunch instead of a hamburger and soda. "Among the 1,000 women I've observed and talked to, those who watch what they eat and exercise have an easier time during measurement.

And look for natural cures for comfortable symptoms. Do you feel bloated? Go for a long, brisk walk, and eat naturally diuretic foods such as cucumbers and cel-

Give yourself an herbal bath; use a loofah sponge; but don't overlook your

When you're depressed — which, she says, can also simply occur from hitting middle age in a society that hates it — talk about it, to other women. Even to family, reluctant though they may be to listen.


"If the family doesn't want to hear, it's too bad," she snaps. "How many times did I wash their dirty diapers and wipe the banana off their face? You can't let people turn you off. If you're feeling bad-ly and hurting, talk about it. It's the sup-pression of those feelings that makes us sick."

Finally, make sure you're using the time left to you precisely as you want to. "By middle age, it's no longer a question of what will I do when I'm grown up, you know. I'm already there. If you're not doing what you want, why not? It took me to the age of 50 to write this book and work with women because I had to sup-port three daughters, but now I really sa-vor what I'm doing."

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# Court Limits Fee Recovery

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled unanimously today that de-fendants who successfully fight civil rights suits may get the other side to pay their legal costs when the suit was "frivolous, unreasonable or without founda-

The court's opinion, written by Justice Potter Stewart, appeared to fashion a middle-of-the-road approach to a legal question answered differently by various lower federal courts in the past

The justices rejected two more extreme legal views — that successful civil rights defendants could collect legal fees from the losing side only when the suit was filed "in bad faith" and that all such defendants are entitled to have their attorney costs reimbursed. In other matters today, the Supreme

- Agreed, in a Minnesota case involving pension eligibility, to decide whether a state has the power to override a work

- Let stand the 1976 conviction of two Philadelphia men who had been accused of illegally shipping munitions to the Provisional Irish Republican Army in Northern Ireland.

- Left intact a \$14.4-million patent infringement award, the largest ever against the federal government, won by shareholders of a defunct helicopter

that both sides in a dispute pay their own legal costs. But Congress has altered that rule in trying to make it easier for persons to protect their civil rights. Recent laws allow federal trial judges to use their discretion in awarding attorneys fees to the winning side. The question that the nation's highest court faced was how and when should the discretion be used.

"In sum," Stewart's opinion said, "a district court may in its discretion award attorneys fees to a prevailing defendant .. upon finding that the plaintiff's action was frivolous, unreasonable or without foundation, even though not brought in subjective bad faith.'

Stewart stressed that district judges should not think, after a dispute is settled, that just because the defendant wins the suit was unreasonable or without foundation.

"This kind of hindsight logic could discourage all but the most airtight claims,"

The test case before the court began in 1968 when Rosa Helm, a factory worker in Christiansburg, Va., filed a complaint against her boss, the Christiansburg Garment Co.

After being laid off, she charged the company with discriminating against her because she is black.

After two years of unsuccessfully seeking conciliation, the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission told Mrs. Helm she could sue her boss, an option she did not take.

Two years later, the EEOC unsuccesfully sued Christiansburg Garment on behalf of Mrs. Helm. After winning in a federal trial court, Christiansburg Garment sought to recover its legal fees

Two lower courts ruled that it could not, and the Supreme Court's ruling today upheld those decisions. The vote was 8-0. Justice Harry A. Blackmun, who was undergoing surgery when arguments were heard in the case, took no part in deciding it.

In the Minnesota pension eligibility case, the Supreme Court agreed today to decide whether a state has the power to override a work contract between a company and its employees.

The court granted a hearing to the Allied Structural Steel Co., which operated an office in Minnesota with 30 employees until it closed in 1974.

The firm's non-contributory pension plan provided that an employee must work at least 25 years to have his pension vested if he retired at age 55. If he were older than 55, the contract provided pension eligibility if the worker's age plus his years of employment by the company totaled at least 75. In 1974, Minnesota enacted a law that

granted pension eligibility to workers with only 10 years of service or more who were laid off because of a plant closing. It was estimated by a court-appointed expert that the state law would cost the

steel company from \$114,171 to \$185,751 more in pension benefits. A three-judge federal district court ruled in 1976 that the state law was con-

stitutional even though it impaired the contract between the company and its

The Supreme Court agreed to review the case in a brief order without com-

five workers were being treated for possible radioactive contamination, said Don Bower, Weld County sheriff. The Colorado State Patrol and the sher-

Bower said the cloud of radiation was moving away from the plant in a southwesterly direction toward Denver, 35 miles away.

The Egyptian president told his parliament Saturday he would not retreat from those demands, nor would he allow the Jewish settlements to remain in Sinai.

# Bee Invasion 'Not Likely'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Agriculture Department had a comforting word today for anyone fearing an invasion of the so-called killer bees. Two words, in fact: "Don't worry."

Department spokesmen said the insects ctured as monsters in some movies and other media - are fictional. The real Africanized hybrid bees that

inspired the fiction may be scarier and their stings may hurt more, but they are no more dangerous than any other bees, the department said. The spokesmen said the killer bees

"are not that ferocious, and they've not been seen closer than 2,500 miles from the U.S. border.

The strain is a hybrid of imported African and native Latin American bees bred to produce more honey. It is far more aggressive than ordinary bees, the department said, stings longer and chases intruders farther.

'The attack of an Africanized swarm is definitely more frightening and painful — but not more deadly," officials said.

Spokesmen said it may take 10 to 15 years for the hybrids to reach the United States by normal migration. Federal inspectors are keeping watch to prevent the bees from "hitchhiking" into the country prematurely on planes or ships.

DETROIT (UPI) - The Detroit News reported today that White House aides and Defense Secretary Harold Brown are looking for a face-saving way to fire Adm. Stansfield Turner as CIA director.

The newspaper said President Carter has agreed with advisors to move his former U.S. Naval Academy classmate out of the job because of fading morale within the agency, coupled by dissatisfaction with the director's "style and compet-

The drive against Turner reportedly is being headed by Brown and national security advisor Zbigniew Brzezinski, with tacit support from Secretary of State Cyrus Vance.

The News said Turner has agreed to leave the job, but only if he is moved to another high position in the Pentagon.



ment, but by the sureness and swiftness of it," Cannon stated. Cannon pointed out that 45 years could be considered a severe penalty, and noted the murder occurred less than three

months ago. "Under the circumstances and for the reasons stated, the court accepts the recommendation of the state." Wright said. Moore, 17, of 813 David Ave. and Toler, 18, of 809 David Ave., both took the witness stand to admit they are guilty of

# ManBlamed In Slayings Recovering

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP) - A Marine accused of killing two patients and injuring a security guard with scissors will be hospitalized for a month to recover from gunshot wounds that ended the stabbing spree, authorities say.

Lance Cpl. Armando C. Vasquez, 20, of El Paso, was listed in stable condition Sunday after being shot twice in his upper torso by a military policeman. Vasquez would not be charged until he recovered from his injuries, said Cpl. Joe Pestell, a base spokesman.

Vasquez had been admitted to the Naval Regional Medical Center after a traffic accident Friday that killed one Marine and left seven others injured.

The lance corporal was the driver of a three-ton truck that tumbled down a tenfoot drainage ditch, and he may have Woman Now been upset over the accident, which killed Pvt. Henry Martinez, 21, of Los Angeles, said another base spokesman, Lt. Charles Owen.

It was the second time this month that a Camp Pendleton Marine reportedly went on a killing spree at the base, officials added. Sgt. Earl J. Holley, 24, was taken into custody by military police Jan. 3 following a shooting and knifing incident that left two non-commissioned officers dead and four others wounded.

Owen said that in the most recent incident, Vasquez became unruly at the hospital and allegedly charged a security guard who tried to subdue him with tear gas. The guard - Navy Hospitalman Second Class Ivan Blake, 35, of Chattanooga, Tenn. - was reported in satisfactory condition with scissor wounds in the back, the face, both arms and a leg.

Vasquez then purportedly entered the rooms of retired Chief Warrant Officer John J. Connolly, 63, and Janet S, Merriman, 62, widow of a retired army man, authorities said. The two Oceanside, Calif., residents were attacked and died

from multiple scissors wounds. A military policeman called by hospital personnel confronted Vasquez in a vacant room and shot him shot from a distance of about 20 feet with a 45-caliber automatic pistol. Owen said.

Of the seven other Marines injured in the truck accident, two have been released and the rest were reported in stable condition with a variety of fractures, Pestell said.

"No one is advocating not compensating someone forheir injuries. But when it reaches the point where excessively high jury awards are rendered en it hurts every person who pays insurance prem-

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



# Dealing With Depression

By LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - I am 39 years old, have a wife and three children, and I am in good health as far as I know. I am a settled person and I do not drink or smoke. My problem is depression.

My wife and I have been married for 19 years, and she has bee diagnosed as "chronic undifferentiated schizophrenia." She has spent more than a year in the last five years confined for treatment. Coping with the situation always has been difficult and has been particularly hard these last few years. I have tried in vain to condition myself and not let it affect me, but I have finally decided there simply is no way to live with the problems it causes.

During the last two or three years I have experienced what I feel is rather serious depression - in that I actually have dispaired of life several times. I can't remember when I've really enjoyed anything and several people I've talked to about the matter the matter - clergyman, physician and others - have listened patiently, but don't really seem to un-derstand. Life has been just a long series of dead end streets while constantly trying to adjust.

I feel I have reached the danger point with respect to my nerves and the depression. I would be very grateful for any advice you might of-

DEAR READER - You need professional help. Try to get some help from a psychiatrist. You feel that you are trapped in a situation that is unpleasant and you do not see a way out of it or when it will change for the better. In such a situation, it is not surprising that you would have a depressive reaction.

Your "actually dispairing of life" and assessment of your situation suggest that you need more than just a friend. You need someone to assess whether or not you may be dangerous to yourself. A trained psychiatrist can give you some medicines that have greatly improved the outlook for severe depressive reaction.


I am sending you The Health Letter number 10-10, Depression: The Ups

and Downs of Life, to give you a better picture of depression. Everyone has mood changes and many have depressive reactions when life doesn't seem very rewarding. Sometimes a person can gradually work out of these, but others require professional help. With your wife's history, you should know how to get in touch with a psychiatrist. If not, your family doctor or even your minister should be able to help you locate one you can see. Don't fail to do this; it could make you feel a lot better.

As Thoreau once said, most men "lead lives of quiet desperation." Some lives seem to have more desperation in them than others, and it is not always quiet because it does take its toll.

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
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# Carter Recommends Record High Defense Budget

By FRED S. HOFFMAN

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Carter reversed direction from a major election campaign promise today and recommended a record high \$115.2-billion defense spending budget.

Carter, who pledged as a presidential candidate to cut defense spending by \$5 billion to \$7 billion a year, told Congress that next year's outlays should increase by \$9.9 billion over 1978.

The president said his program would rovide for "prudent growth," especially in the fighting and staying power of U.S. ground and air forces assigned to help defend western Europe

He said the Soviet Union has been increasing its defense spending by about 3 percent a year and implied that the United States should keep pace to "preserve an overall military balance ... at least as favorable as the present balance."

Although Carter did not mention his campaign pledge directly, he seemed to be trying to head off critics by claiming his defense budget proposals "are considerably more moderate" than the \$121.3 billion the Ford administration indicated it would have recommended for fiscal

That would seem to represent about \$6.1 billion in "cost avoidance." But the president claimed an \$8-billion saving by using a figure that represents budget au-

Defense Secretary Harold Brown said the new budget "is austere but adequate to maintain a strong national security posture

thority spanning more than one fiscal

He said the proposals would yield about 3.3 percent of "real growth" in military strength after anticipated inflation takes its bite

Brown said the new budget - the Carter administration's first from the ground up — represents a "significant reordering of military priorities.

"The budget provides substantial resources for modernizing our conventional forces and improving their capabilities within the NATO alliance." he said in a statement. "Initiatives include a wide range of measures to improve the readiness of our early deploying forces."

Under this heading, the administration sought \$6.6 billion to buy more, and more modern, Army anti-tank ammunition; to start production of the new XM-1 tank and to stockpile additional combat-ready gear in Europe for use by reinforcements flown from the United States in an emer-

It also proposed the first production money for a new wide-bodied jet cargo transport that also could serve as an aerial tanker for fighter planes. This plane would help overcome an estimated 50 percent shortage in heavy airlift capabili-

A major boost in elements of tactical airpower also won Carter's blessing. His budget proposed building 145 of the Air Force's new F-16 air combat fighter, 162 heavily armed A10 warplanes that would hit tank columns and other ground targets with missiles and bombs and the first five of the Navy's new F-18 multipurpose fighter.

Carter also earmarked proposed funds for an additional 78 of the Air Force's F- 15 fighter, which Carter said is "designed to be the world's most effective air supe-

riority fighter. Offsetting these gains in fighting power were what Brown spoke of as "restraints" in some key and costly programs, particularly the Navy's everymore-costly shipbuilding plans.

"The Navy shipbuilding program has been restrained pending completion of studies on how best to carry out the sea control, power projection and peacetime presence functions of the Navy," Brown

At the heart of these studies is the question of the future of the aircraft carrier. For the time being at least, Carter withheld any funding request for a new medium-size, 60,000-ton, conventionally powered carrier that could handle vertical takeoff planes of the future as well as traditional catapault-launched aircraft.

Overall, Carter trimmed the Navy's shipbuilding plans by five ships, including a nuclear-powered cruiser to be armed with the advanced Aegis system for defending the fleet against attacking planes and missiles. That left 14 proposed new ships in the program for fiscal 1979.

Although the president asked for one additional. Trident submarine next year, he slowed the rate of production for the nuclear-tipped missiles it will carry. This was done, Brown indicated, because the first of 13 planned Trident subs is about a year behind schedule

Also cut were the Navy's plans for buying more F-14 fighters. Carter asked for 24 more F-14s rather than the 36 the Navy sought. And the Air Force lost its hoped-for new medium jet transport plane, which would have replaced the workhorse C-130. High cost was believed the problem.

The nation's strategic strike force would remain constant, with no change in the numbers of submarine-launched and land-based missiles as well as bombers pending the outcome of the strategic arms limitation talks with the Soviet Un-

Meanwhile, the administration intends to push ahead with priority development work on the new cruise missile, which would be fired from B-52 bombers. It would substitute for the B-1 bomber, a project Carter canceled last summer except for some further research work.

But Carter and Brown have decided to slow down development of the advanced MX intercontinental ballistic missile, which might be mounted on moving platforms inside tunnels to elude a possible Soviet surprise strike in the mid-1980s or

The administration is not yet sure that the mobile concept is workable or worth its estimated eventual cost of \$30 billion to \$35 billion. Also bearing on the MX's future is the outcome of the SALT talks.

The Pentagon's manpower and womannower would remain relatively stable under the 1979 budget.

Uniformed strength would be trimmed by 20,000 to a level of 2,049,000. Civilian employment would be pared by 13,000 to 1,008,000. The personnel savings would be achieved by headquarters reductions and other streamlining actions.





WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department says it will spend about \$4.9 billion less in the 1979 fiscal year if the budget proposals President Carter sent to Congress today are carried out. Total department spending for the year

beginning Oct. 1 was estimated by agency officials at \$17.7 billion, compared with about \$22.6 billion for the current year. Department budget director Jerome A.

Miles said farm programs are expected to cost about \$5.4 billion, a drop of almost \$3.7 billion from this fiscal year's esti-Food programs, which include school

lunches and food stamps, are estimated at more than \$9 billion and will make up roughly half of the department's total budget.

Costs for other programs such as Food for Peace, community and regional development and natural resources and environment account for the rest.

Nearly \$3.02 billion of the planned reduction will be in the government's price-support programs for farm crops. Those costs are estimated at about \$44.3 billion next year, compared with more than ral payments are authorized to make up the difference between the market prices farmers actually receive and a goal or "target price" set for certain


Other expenses involved include net losses for operating loan programs for various commodities. In addition, there are dairy price-support costs, payments to wool producers and interest on operating capital charged to the Agriculture Department's budget.

As an example of the planned reduction, total costs for operating the feed grains program are estimated at \$1.57 billion next year, compared with more than \$2.03 billion for 1977-78, a saving of \$461.6

Wheat-program costs were projected in the new budget at \$485.7 million, a drop of nearly \$ 1.44 billion from this year's estimate of \$1.92 billion. Department budget experts said factors

in the projected reduced costs include an assumption that market prices of wheat and other grains will rise from their low marks of last year and thus reduce the federal target-price payments.

# **Administration Proposes Cut** In Number Of FBI Personnel

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Carter administration is proposing a personnel cutback at the FBI while stepping up the agency's fight against white-collar crime, public corruption and organized crime. The Justice Department budget sent to

Congress today calls for eliminating 497 positions at the FBI, leaving the bureau with 19,695 employees. Despite the over-all cutbacks, in unspecified areas, the FBI would increase

manpower in some areas. A budget document proposes that FBI staff working against organized crime be increased by 21 percent and that staff

dealing with white collar crime and public corruption be increased by 10 percent. Some of the increased staff presumably will come from other areas where the agency is reducing its efforts. For example, the administration said it

plans to cut back on funds for fighting bank robberies, which it feels can be handled just as well by state and local police. The department also proposed reducing its program for locating military desert-

In another major area, Attorney General Griffin Bell proposed a \$102- million cutback in funds for the Law Enforce-



# ACLU Director To Avoid Courts

By JANE SEE WHITE NEW YORK (AP) — Six months after he was named legal director of the American Civil Liberties Union, Bruce Ennis has set for himself one important professional goal: keep ACLU cases out of the Supreme Court.

Ennis terms the court conservative and believes that its rulings are unlikely to harmonize with the views of the ACLU.

"What I'm trying to do," he says, "is cut our losses. It's essentially a defensive posture.

Last year, the ACLU, which Ennis calls "the nation's largest private law firm," was involved in 95 Supreme Court cases. The lean, bushy-haired, bespectacled young attorney did not say how many rulings went against the ACLU but said he made "a very conscious decision" to reduce the number of cases, and thus reduce the risk of what he calls "bad deci-

In the years since he finished the University of Chicago law school, Ennis has been the lawyer behind a remarkable number of tradition-shaking, precedentsetting cases.

In 1969 a suit successfully challenged the right of McSorley's - a venerable local saloon - to ban women; Ennis was one of the attorneys who initiated the action. He was in on a suit that gained entry for girls in New York Public School classes in woodworking and shop.

But now he has resigned himself to the "defensive" strategy, he says, and he is trying to impress it on the 5,000 attorneys around the country who volunteer their

services each year to the ACLU.

He is urging attorneys to argue cases on the grounds of state law in state courts because "if you win on state grounds, it insulates the case from Supreme Court

When he cannot avoid taking an ACLU case before the high court, he tries to narrow the issues - prefacing his briefs with a list of issues he urges the justices not to ponder, matters he argues the case does not raise.

Ennis says he resents having to take on the new tactic.

"Here I am, 37 years old, I'm a constitutional litigator and I face the prospect for the best part of my life of litigating

before an unsympathetic court. "It's not so much subject matter, it's cases that would require the court to break new ground in civil liberties issues when there's not an overwhelming sympathetic fact situation," he says.

In October, 1977, for instance, Ennis decided to go to the high court with the case of a teacher who was fired after his homosexually became known

"He'd been a teacher for 13 years, no one knew he was gay, then suddenly he was fired. It had a good fact record," Enis says. The court declined to consider the case, however.

The ACLU's membership has declined by about 5,000 to around 220,000 members during the last several months, En-

# Mail On Broadcasts Stacks Up At FCC

WASHINGTON (AP) - Nobody scrutinizes about 8,500 of the letters that come into the Federal Communications Commission each day, and the FCC doesn't even try to answer them.

The mail clerks just toss them in a pile, let them lie around for 30 days and have

them hauled out to fatten a dirt fill. The mail room staff knows at a glance what the letters say: Don't kick religious broadcasts off radio and televison.

The message has been pouring into the FCC in an unprecedented daily flood for nearly three years, despite the commission's repeated explanations that it isn't considering any such thing. Since April 1975 when the first letters

# Report Lists Military Pay As Favorable

WASHINGTON (UPI) - America's military personnel complain they have been shortchanged by cutbacks in their pay and fringe benefits, but a Library of Congress study concludes they receive favorable compensation.
"What happened to military pay and

benefits during the last decade was neither all positive nor all negative, but the sense of our findings is that military personnel have received favorable compensation treatment," said the report. Military personnel, from recruits to four-star officers, for the past 10 years

have complained that Congress was eroding their structure of fringe benefits that include free medical care, low-cost groceries, housing or a housing allowance, and early retirement with good pay. But the study said military pay rose 30

percent per person between 1968 and 1976, while the value of fringe benefits rose 90 percent after allowing for the effects of inflation. The total pay and benefits package rose 43 percent per capita, it

Moreover, the 62-page study said although military pay and benefits have ris-en more slowly since 1972, the military suffered less than civilians from reces

It also said Congress may not have cor-rectly assessed the extent of improvefrients given service personnel in that time. The amounts that Congress cited during its debates on the improvements turned out to be only one-third of the true costs, the study said.

# Bureau Reports Population Shift

WASHINGTON (AP) - Many Americans no longer are just dreaming about a carefree life in the sun or the mountains. They're going there at ever increasing rates, says the U.S. Census Bureau.

In addition to rapid growth in the "Sunbelt" states, the government agency said Sunday in an interim report, there has been significant population shifts into the western mountains and the more rural northern states of New England. "We were surprised at the very strong growth of the mountain states," said Donald Starsinic, of the Census Bureau's population division.

Starsinic, whose office compiled the 1977 statistics, said the romanticism of the slow paced lifestyle in the western mountains probably has had much to do

And he noted that Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire - which have the same attractions - also showed population increases, although the other New England states are losing people.

'These states are not tremendously built up. There's plenty of room for expansion, more pleasant living, perhaps cheaper living," Starsinic said in an in-

The Census Bureau said the population of the nation as a whole grew 6.4 percent between 1970 and 1977, to 214,669,000.

The growth in the Sunbelt and corresponding population decline in the industrial belt of the Northeast and North Central regions has for some time been apparent. The new figures confirm the trend.

The statistics said California had the largest increase in population, with 1.9 million more people than in 1970, a 9.6 percent boost. Florida and Texas were close behind, with 1.6 million new residents each.

But Starsinic said the latest figures show the desirable regions "are spread around a lot more" than had been expected.

While Florida had a 22 percent increase in the number of people coming into the state, its rate of growth declined by one-third during the past two years, the

At the same time, a string of mountainous states stretching from Montana to Arizona and New Mexico showed an overall population increase of 21 percent, 11.9 percent of that attributed to people coming from other parts of the country. Increasingly, said Starsinic, states such as Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, Arizona and Nevada in the West and Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire in New England have become more popular. Alaska had the highest increase, 34.6 percent,

but much of that was attributed to the oil pipeline boom, the bureau said. In contrast, each of 10 industrial states of the Northeast and North Central regions has less people today than seven years ago or showed only slight increases well below the national average

The population of New York state dropped 1.7 percent. Rhode Island fell 1.6 percent, and Pennsylvania dropped 0.1 percent. At the same time, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Jersey, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan had increases well below the national average.

Bucking the trend in New England, Maine showed an increase of 9.2 percent, New Hampshire 15 percent and Vermont 8.7 percent. In the West, Idaho increased 20.3 percent, Wyoming 22.2 percent, Colorado 18.5 percent, New Mexico 17 percent, Arizona 29.3 percent, Utah 19.7 percent and Nevada 29.6 percent. The Census Bureau said the shift in population - if it holds up until the offi-

cial census in 1980 - would mean a change in congressional district lines, with nine seats in the House of Representatives shifting to the Sunbelt states. Following current trends, said Starsinic, Florida and Texas would each gain

two seats, and Arizona, California, Oregon, Tennessee and Utah would each gain one. New York would lose three seats, Ohio would lose two, and Illinois, Michigan, Pennsylvania and South Dakota each would lose one

Consumers who did their Christmas shopping with credit cards are beginning to get the bills, and some may find themselves paying more than they expected.

You have to shop just as carefully for redit as you do for the items you buy with it. Such things as the type of charge card you use and the way in which the lender calculates interest can affect how much you pay.

Be wary of advertisements for "free" credit. The bank cards are "free" only if you pay your bill in full every month. And the so-called travel and entertainment cards like American Express and Diners Club charge an annual member-

Credit purchases have become a way of life in the United States. Industry officials estimate that there were more than one billion credit card transactions in 1977, more than double the number five vears earlier.

They also say that five out of every seven Americans who are eligible for a card have one. At the start of the final quarter of last year, consumers owed more than \$207 billion in installment debts. That works out to almost \$1,000 for every man. woman and child.

There are two basic types of credit. With closed-end credit, a specific amount of money is borrowed for and repaid in a specific time period. Car loans are a common example of closed-end credit.

Open-end credit, also called revolving credit, is more complicated. You can pay your bill at once or you can spread out the payments. If you pay at once, there is no interest charge; if you choose to "revolve," as most customers do, you pay a penalty

An exception to this rule is Citibank. the nation's second largest commercial bank, which charges a service fee to Master Charge holders who pay their bills in full before the end of the billing period.

The percentage of interest that is charged varies from place to place and generally depends on state usury laws. All banks and stores in a given state generally charge the same RATE of interest on a particular type of credit. They may, however, use any one of three methods to

calculate the AMOUNT of interest. Here is a look at the three methods and an explanation of what they can mean to

your pocketbook ADJUSTED BALANCE: This is the simplest method and least costly method for consumers. The finance charge is applied against the unpaid balance at the end of the previous month minus any credits and payments made in the current month. Suppose, for example, you had an outstanding balance of \$200 at the end of December and paid \$100 during

charged interest on \$100. At a typical interest rate of 1.5 percent a month, the finance charge would be \$1.50.

AVERAGE DAILY BALANCE: This method is more complicated and more costly. It takes into account when you pay as well as how much you pay. The finance charge is applied to the average daily balance outstanding on your account over the current 30-day billing period. Again, suppose you had an outstanding balance of \$200 at the end of December. You paid \$100 on January 15. For 15 days of the billing period you owed \$200; for the remaining 15, you owed \$100. Your average daily balance was \$150. At a 1.5 percent-per-month interest rate, the finance charge is \$2.25.

PREVIOUS BALANCE: This is the most expensive method of all. If your account is not cleared completely when the bill is due, you must pay a finance charge on the original amount, even if you make

your \$200 balance at the end of December, you would have a finance charge of \$3 at the end of January - even if you paid part of your bill

It also is important to find out whether the creditor adds a purchase to your account at the time of the transaction or at the end of the billing period. If the purchase is added at the time of the transaction, you will pay more interest than you would if the creditor waited until the end of the billing period to enter the new

When you do get your bill, be sure to read it carefully. According to Consumers Union, "The statements of some banks (and other creditors as well) focus attention on the minimum amount due rather than the total owed. Of course the more you leave unpaid, the more interest you owe. If you plan to pay the complete bill, scrutinize your statement carefully for the total amount owed."

"I've never won out here, and we play a awful lot of golf in California," Floyd said after he and Tom Watson had emerged from a mad scramble over the last few holes in a tie for the lead Sunday after three rounds of the rain-delayed \$225,000 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am **Golf Tournament** 

"I've come close. I lost a playoff to Jack Nicklaus here. I lost a playoff to Arnold Palmer in the Bob Hope (Desert Classic). And I lost a playoff to J.C. Snead in San Diego. But I've never won in California.'

And, Floyd-said, a victory in California "is imperative if a player is looking for an outstanding season. By that I mean a season as leading money winner or something like that. You check the record, you'll see the man that comes out of California as the leading money-winner often finishes the season as leading money-win-

Last year that man was Tom Watson. And, going into today's final round - the entire tournament schedule was set back one day when Thursday's play was rained out - the 1977 Player of the Year, defending champion here and winner of the 1978 Tucson Open is the leading money-

winner again. And, although 13 players were locked within three strokes of each other at the top, Watson shared the lead and ranked as the man Floyd must beat. They had 211 totals, five under par after one round on each of three Monterey Peninsula courses. Floyd had a wildly erratic round of par 72 and Watson struggled to a 71 at Pebble Beach Sunday. That's the site for the final round, too.

"I'm playing well enough to win," said Floyd, who noted that "18 holes over Pebble Beach is a lot of golf."

NOW THAT THE DALLAS COWBOYS have wrapped up their second Super Bowl title, fans are talking about a record fifth trip to the Big One next January. Those same optimistic folks are hoping for a tax cut, a balanced budget, an early spring and peace in the Middle East. As long as you are wishing, wish big!

Actually, those dreams of Super Bowl XIII do not appear unreasonable. Even Coach Tom Landry, fully aware of all the pitfalls awaiting the defending champs, says the 'Pokes could - and perhaps should - be back. He qualifies

that statement by saying the team must avoid crippling injuries and that the young players must continue to improve. Still, just the admission that anoth-

er SB trip is possible is quite a change for the cautious Landry, who keeps a raincoat handy even when there isn't a cloud in the sky.

The Cowboys have a lot going for them, no doubt about that. Their defense was one of the best in the National Football League in 1977, even with four new starters. Randy White, Bob Breunig, Thomas Henderson and Aaron Kyle will be better

after a year of on-the-job training. There is a possibility that tackle Jethro Pugh will retire, but veterans Larry Cole and Bill Gregory are ready to step into the position. With all due respect to Jethro, Larry and Bill are very capable replacements. Another great old veteran, corner-

LARRY COLE back Mel Renfro, probably has played his last down for the 'Pokes. Mel saw only limited action last season behind Benny Barnes, Mark Washington and Kyle,

The other defensive stalwarts are in their prime. There are no better safeties than Cliff Harris and Charlie Waters, and that rush-line is something else. Harvey Martin, Ed Jones and White are great, and getting better all the time.

THE OFFENSIVE SITUATION is not that rosy, but still promising. Roger Staubach and his pals carried their share of the load in the trek to the title, despite a patched-up, makeshift offensive line. How the Cowboys were able to overcome the loss of All-Pros Rayfield Wright and Blaine Nye remains the mys-

The forward wall didn't destroy opponents, but it produced a little daylight for Tony Dorsett and Robert Newhouse and gave Staubach good protection on passing downs. That ain't bad.

The offensive line is the only area where significant changes are probable next summer when the 'Pokes go to training camp. Assistant coach Jim Myers, who tutors the big guys up front, plans to do some shuffling in an attempt to put more punch into the ground attack.

Tackle Ralph Neely has announced his retirement, so that will force some shifts. If Wright returns at full speed, Myers says that young Pat Donovan probably will be moved from right to left tackle to fill the gap. Pat is rated as the top offensive lineman now, in talent and speed, and figures to improve rapidly in a

TWO OTHER YOUNG offensive linemen also are very much in the picture. Andy Frederick, the rangy tackle out of New Mexico, showed promise as a rookie and looms as a challenger if he can put on some weight. He reported to the Cowboys last summer at 6-6 and 228, then added 20 pounds under a stren-

"If we can get Fredericks up to 260 pounds, he'll be a factor," Myers says. Another promising young offensive lineman is Jim Eidson, a second-round draft choice out of Mississippi State in 1976. Eidson impressed the coaches as a rookie, but tore up a knee last summer and surgery sidelined him for the sea-

If he returns in top shape, Eidson definitely will be a contender. Myers says he can play either tackle or guard.

That could be very important, because Myers is not all that happy about the middle of his offensive line. Young Tom Rafferty, just two years out of Penn State, did a fine job filling in for Nye and also subbed for the oft-injured John Fitzgerald at center. Rafferty earned nothing but praise from the mentors.

But Burton Lawless must be tagged as a disappointment, after three inconsistent seasons, and Herb Scott lacks the size and speed to be great. Eidson or rookie Jim Cooper could battle into the starting lineup here. Myers hints that Rafferty could challenge Fitzgerald for the starting job at

center, but that move depends on the development of the other young players. There will be changes in the forward wall, for sure.

PERHAPS THE MOST critical factor of all in the Cowboys' bid for another Super Bowl crown will be the performance of the older veterans on the roster. Staubach, Preston Pearson, Wright, Cole and D.D. Lewis still are key men for

Staubach is the heart of the Cowboy offense, and so much depends on him. Landry says, hopefully, that Roger can play another three years if he avoids serious injury. That is a big "if." Preston Pearson, disappointed at being replaced as a starter by Dorsett, remains a valuable member of the offensive unit. His retirement would be a blow

to the Cowboys, and Landry undoubtedly will urge him to return. Harris and Waters are nearing the 30 mark in age, but there is little danger that they will hang 'em up for a few more seasons. They are in their prime right now and, as Harris says, the best days still are ahead for this Dallas team. Cliff and Charlie don't want to miss out on the fun.

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP) - The \$250,-000 Grand Slam of Tennis doesn't have the tradition of Wimbledon or Forest Hills, but it does its bit to answer the question of who is the world's best male tennis player. For the moment, it appears to be Bjorn Borg.

The stoic Swede turned aggressive Sunday and whipped Jimmy Connors 7-6, 3-6, 6-1 on clay in a three-hour match that left 8,000 spectators and a national television audience applauding the numerous clean winners and crisp rallies.

"It's just the best tennis you'll ever see, win or lose," is the way Connors modest-

ly assessed the clash. Borg collected \$125,000 for two days' work in the four-man event. Borg collected \$125,000 for two days' work in the four-man event. Connors earned \$60,000. Brian Gottfried won \$40,000 by beating Vitas Gerulaitas 6-3, 6-3 in the consolation round earlier Sunday. Gerulaitas pocketed \$25,000.

Borg credited a new game plan for his victory in the fast-paced final.

"Before the match, I said to myself, 'I'm going to play a little bit different," he said. "I said I was going to hit the ball hard and make him run after the ball "Before I have been pushing the ball more and slicing more. I kept him back and I kept him on the baseline. That's very important against Jimmy. This is probably the way I should always play gainst him."

But Connors disagreed, blaming the loss on his own aggressiveness.

"He wasn't forcing me at all. All he was doing gwgagsg gpglgagygignggg g hitting a lot of topspins," he said. " I did most anything I wanted to, but I just missed the ball a few inches a couple of times.

"I'm not perfect - pretty close, but not perfect.'

It wasn't easy. A check was made at all four of the city's hotels. Ruth was registered in all, answered calls in none. During the odyssey the schoolboy reporter ran into McCarthy, holding fort on the mezzanine of the Noel Hotel. 'So you're looking for the Babe," he said. "He's around.

He's a busy man. But he'll see you.' McCarthy was an imposing man. Thick-necked, his stocky frame undisguised by a loose fitting black suit and vest, a gold chain dangling across his chest. His dark hair was slicked down with Brilliantine.

He was a gruff, square-jawed Irishman they called "Marsh Joe." He talked in a fast, booming voice. "I'll tell you what, I'll give you five minutes," he said. "Got to be fast, though. I've got a lot of things to do. To save time, I'll ask and answer the questions. Got a pad? Okay, just write down what I say." McCarthy planted himself on a sofa. He never once broke verbal stride.

# TV Director Eagerly Accepts Chance To Do 'Jaws' Sequel

By VERNON SCOTT HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - How does a director follow "Jaws" with a sequel?

Answer: prayerfully. "Jaws," the all-time international boxoffice champion, has, so far, scooped up \$400 million around the world. "Star Wars" eventually may surpass the record, but until then "Jaws" is No. 1.

The original "Jaws" was directed by Steven Spielberg who established himself as something of a genius and was one of many directors sought to helm "Jaws 2." Eventually, John Hancock was given the directorial reins and production began on location in Martha's Vineyard, Mass., last

Less than a month later Hancock withdrew, leaving "Jaws 2" high and dry. Producers Richard Zanuck and David

Brown, along with Universal, were in a jam. The picture closed down. They needed a good director. Fast.

Veteran directors agreed to take over providing they were given six months' preparation for the enormously complicated production.

Because Universal already was contractually committed to putting the movie in theaters in June 1978, further delay was

Happily for all, the studio found an ambitious television director who agreed to jump into the breech immediately

He is Jeannot Szwarc, 39-year-old Polish Jew reared and educated in France,

who had directed only one movie in his life, a potboiler titled "Bug. Szwarc had considerable experience in

episodic television and a few TV movies

to his credit. But it appeared almost quixotic on the part of Zanuck-Brown and Universal to entrust Szwarc with \$15 million and a sequel to the greatest financial success in film history.

Apparently they chose the right man. Szwarc is nothing if not self-confident.

"I had three weeks preparation instead of the usual seven months,"-he said, back in his office after five months of harrowing location shooting in Navarre Beach,

I accepted the job July 9 and began shooting Aug. 1. I scrapped about 90 percent of what already had been filmed and did some recasting. Of course they gave me the job because I could gear up and start quickly

"I read the script and met with the producers. We all agreed that the action sequences needed restructuring. I simplified, condensed and streamlined as much

as I could.' Szwarc, in addition to his actors - including Roy Schieder, Lorraine Gary and Murray Hamilton from the original cast was confronted with the overwhelming task of working with three mechani-

cal sharks. He was given the largest crew in movie memory, 344 technicians, stagehands and craftsmen, and an armada of 75 boats and barges with which to work.

Most of the first 'Jaws' was filmed on land, "Szwarc said, "We spent 90 percent of our time on the water to shoot 65 percent of the film. That kind of work is terribly time-consuming.

Szwarc is ever aware that he is a man on the spot. Inevitably "Jaws 2" will be

itably. Szwarc's work will be compared with Spielberg's. He is not in an enviable position On the other hand, it is the opportunity

of a lifetime for Szwarc, who came to the United States 14 years ago and has spent most of that time on the outside looking

"It feels terrific to be on the spot," he said, grinning. "What greater challenge could a man have than to direct a sequel to the No. 1 picture? That's a very exciting prospect.

"I don't feel bad about comparisons. It's the same with any sequel. In terms of suspense, entertainment values and creating fear, I think we will deliver the same excitement that 'Jaws' did.

"Sequel may not be the right word. 'Jaws 2' is a continuation of the first story. It takes place four years later - about the same difference in time between the two films - in the eastern town of Amity which suffers a second shark attack on the beaches.

We assume everyone who sees this film will have seen the first one or heard enough about the original to know the details. But from the beginning we decided people who never saw the first picture would enjoy this one on its own.

"There are no flashbacks in 'Jaws 2.' I would say my picture is similar but different from the first one

"Audiences expect more from a sequel, so it would be wrong to give them the same things they saw in the first place. Ours is a very different story and I think it will stand the comparisons well."

# **Educator Believes TV** Can Be Teaching Aid

NEW YORK (UPI) - Teachers are learning that television need not be the enemy of instruction - it even can help children read if properly used.

There was a time when prophets of intellectual doom warned that television would do everything from ruin the eyesight to atrophy the brain.

Now no less un authority than the president of the National Council of Teachers of English insists that television can help children learn to read and write. Dr. Marjorie Farmer, who also is the

executive director of English and reading curriculum for the 200,000-pupil Philadelphia public school system, said in an interview:

"Among English teachers, we don't get the reaction we used to so often - that television was the enemy of instruction. Now the reaction is not necessarily negain how to use television as a resource and many are uneasy with it because it was not within the scope of their training.

'I believe television is a major mode for the reception of information and the enhancement of experience. People just have to learn how to control it. After all, until you make use of the library, it just looks like stacks of books and people scurrying around.

'Our whole notion in Philadelphia of our educational job is to give learners more and more control of the world around them. Either it controls them or they manage its access to their lives and their use of it.

Projects in the schools involving television can be as simple as teaching the children to use the television listings in their daily newspaper - at the same time familiarizing children with the newspa-

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
