Major Jump In Earnings Cited During 1977 By T.I.M.E.-D C

Hugh C. Shurtleff, president of T.I.M.E.-DC Inc. has announced that the company last year experienced the best earnings since 1973.

Revenues for the full year of 1977 were \$154,448,000, compared to \$148,015,000 for 1976, representing a 4.4 percent increase. Net income for 1977 was \$2,440,000, equal to 73 cents per share, compared to net income of \$509,000, equal to one cent per share loss, after deducting preferred dividends, for the year 1976.

Fourth quarter revenues were \$39,401,000, which represented an increase of 5.1 percent over the \$37,478,000 reported in the same period in 1976. Net income for the fourth quarter was \$532,000, equal to 16 cents per share, compared with a net income of \$202,000 and two cents per share, after deducting preferred dividends, for the same period in the previous year.

Gain on sale of equipment and properties after tax effect amounted to \$257,000 for the quarter and \$1,032,000 for the year 1977, compared to \$90,000 for the fourth quarter and \$365,000 for the year 1976.

The company's financial position is strong, Shurtleff said. Cash and temporary investments totaled \$10,002,000 at Dec. 31, 1977, which compared with \$8,186,000 at Dec. 31, 1976.

During the fourth quarter of 1977, the company placed an order for 225 new linehaul diesel tractors at a cost of more than \$8 million. These new units are now being delivered, and will replace older units throughout the system and should result in a sizeable reduction in maintenance costs in the current year.

Twelve quarterly preferred dividends were paid during 1977, which resulted in all preferred dividends being on a current

basis at year end. In addition, a five-cent quarterly dividend was declared and paid on common stock during the fourth quarter.



Biologist Considers Feeding Of Wildlife

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Normally, the Department of Natural Resources discourages feeding Hoosier wildlife, but "the last two winters haven't been normal," a state biologist said Tuesday.

Severe winter wind, bitterly cold temperatures and deep, drifting snow have hit Indiana for the second year in a row, creating a critical situation for many small wildlife species, especially songbirds and quail.

And a helping human hand "may make the difference getting them through," says Jim Savery, biologist for the department's Fish and Wildlife Division.

The division is conducting a statewide survey of the effects of last week's paralyzing blizzard. Field biologists will assess the wildlife situation in their areas, including any significant drop in populations, and whether the animals are adequately fed and sheltered.

Results of the survey will be compiled over the next two weeks.

"The conditions this year and last year have been really bad," Savery said in an interview. "For small wildlife, especially songbirds and quail, it's really critical. Last year we suffered losses due to the snow and winds and this year doesn't look too good, either."

"We had relatively mild winters the last 10 years, but now if we're going to be returning to hard winters, it's really going to be hard on the wildlife."

Savery noted that Indiana's quail population, which has a normal average life span of only eight months, dropped 50 percent last year from the year before.

"This year, percentagewise, it probably won't be near that, because we don't have anywhere near the number of birds. Now, we're dealing with a much smaller population."

"The birds that survived last year are those that settled into a real good habitat... thick areas, with real good cover and food accessibility," he said.

"We've done specific experiments. Due to natural mortality factors, each year we lose 80 percent of the quail population whether we hunt or not. That's one way we can justify hunting with some of the anti-hunting groups, instead of letting the birds just die."

"It could be an issue because a lot of people want to stock quail. That is a stop-gap measure we do not advocate."

"We would rather put our money into sound education and habitat programs," Savery said. "This is generally hard to get

over to the public because it is an intangible thing. If you release several hundred game birds, this is something tangible they can see."

"One state, Kentucky, released some birds as a matter of public relations. But that goes against a lot of our biological principles. This year, however, we are proposing that as far as feeding quail during this critical period, if a farmer has a covey...he could haul some corn out to feed them."

"We don't advocate feeding wildlife, but the last two years have been the worst in (Indiana) history."

The sensational upsurge of born again celebrities who have made such a media impact on North America should not distort the authenticity of such a revelation. Jesus said to that powerful, middle-aged Jerusalem leader, Nicodemus, "Unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

Spiritual truth comes only through spiritual awareness. Wesley, Calvin and Luther all pointed to the born again happening as the turning point in their religious development. Calvin would say four centuries ago, "God by a sudden conversion tamed and made teachable my mind." It would be well stated that the most vivid change of heart happens to those most empty of soul and most hungry of spirit.

In that popular television series, "Scenes From A Marriage," Liv Ullman and Erland Josephson portray a couple going through divorce. Their family divides, their household separates, yet they continue to see each other from time to time. On one occasion, Erland, with great candor says:

"We're taught everything about the body and about agriculture in Madagascar.

And about the square root of pi or whatever the hell it's called — But not a word about the soul.

We're left without a chance, ignorant and remorseful among the ruins of our ambitions."

Born again believers like Colson and Cleaver and Jimmy Carter would say that you enter the love of God through the kingdom of the heart. And when that happens, life is fresh and hopeful, indeed.

Hillside Strangler Blames Deaths On Mother's Commands

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A man claiming to be the Hillside Strangler said in a letter made public Tuesday that he killed a dozen "evil ladies" because his mother told him to.

Police, stressing that they did not know whether the letter was authentic, said the writer gave them "another week or so" to meet his call for help in turning himself in safely, and threatened "something serious" if authorities failed to respond.

Assistant Police Chief Daryl F. Gates read reporters the first page of the pencil-printed, six-page letter mailed last month to Mayor Tom Bradley. The lined school notebook page said:

"Dear Mr. Mayor.
"PLEASE listen to me. I am very sick, but I do not want to go back to that place. I hate that place. My mother told me to kill those evil ladies. It's not my fault... Mother makes my head hurt. That's why I kill her. But I can't get her out of my head. She keeps coming back. That's why I hate her."
Gates said the writer claimed to have a particular item that would prove he is the

strangler. Gates refused to identify the item but said if the writer did have it police would be inclined to believe he is really the killer.

"There's nothing in the letter that authenticates it," Gates said. "There are some things in it that give it an air of urgency... some things pique the interest of myself and investigators."

Police attribute 12 killings of girls and young women since early September to the Hillside Strangler. All the victims were found nude, and several of them raped, in hillside areas of the northern suburbs. The most recent victim was killed Dec. 13.

Bradley said at a news conference Monday that whoever wrote the letter post-

marked Jan. 19 "indicates he is the strangler and wishes to surrender himself and a friend to the mayor's office. He also indicated he would forward a certain item after he received assurances for his safety from the mayor."

Bradley said he "will take all the necessary precautions to ensure the complete safety of the actually involved individuals."

Bradley, who read a statement and then declined questions, asked the writer to mail the undisclosed item to his office and "to address the envelope exactly as the original envelope was addressed."

Borger Girl Remains In Coma

AMARILLO (AP) — Laurie Goforth, the 18-year-old Borger girl who gave birth last month to a daughter while in a coma, remains unconscious in a hospital here unaware that hundreds of persons throughout the country have offered to help her family financially.

"There were nearly 50 letters yesterday and we've gotten telephone calls from as far away as Canada... everyone of them either sending us money for Laurie or offering their prayers for her recovery," said her mother, Louise Butcher.

Laurie and her husband, Ricky, 21, were awaiting the birth of their first child last Dec. 18, when Laurie went into cardiac arrest at their home in Borger. She suffered another arrest before an ambulance could rush her to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, 60 miles away.

Doctors say it is too soon to tell if she can recover from the brain damage she suffered from the attack. However, earlier this week doctors decided she could be moved from intensive care to a regular room.

Meanwhile, her husband has taken an apartment a few blocks from the hospital where he and Mrs. Butcher care for the infant, Susan Michelle.

He has taken a leave of absence from his job in Borger and is working at an aerosol plant in Amarillo to be near his wife.

"After people read the story about Laurie last week we started getting both letters and phone calls. One woman called me from Scarborough, Ontario, Canada, and a man called from Houston, offering Ricky a job."

"We've had mail from everywhere. I'm amazed that people can hear about what has happened to Laurie and without knowing her or us, they've offered us anything they can. Some of them have sent money and others have sent words of encouragement. Just knowing people care makes a lot of difference," said Mrs. Butcher.

"People around here have been just as kind. There have been dances and suppers and other events in Amarillo, Borger and Pampa that have raised more than \$600," she added.

Thus far, nearly \$3,000 has been deposited into banks in Amarillo and Borger, but that is only a fraction of what Laurie's hospital will be.

"The last time I checked the bill was up to \$15,000 and it has to be close to \$20,000 by now. There is no way to tell what it will be in the end," she said.

What makes it even more difficult for Laurie's young husband is that he does not know if an insurance policy he bought for his wife eight days before her illness is going to pay.

Carter To Announce College Student Financial Aid Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Carter will announce a major program today to provide at least \$700 million to college students from middle income families because he fears a 71 percent jump in college costs has put their chances for higher education in jeopardy.

Hoping to stave off a move in Congress to give a \$250 tax credit to the parents of all college students, Carter will propose a combination of grants and loans using \$700 million he set aside in his fiscal 1979 budget, said White House Press Secretary Jody Powell.

Powell said the program, to be announced personally by the president and explained in detail by Joseph A. Califano, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, will be targeted mostly at the middle class.

The press secretary did not specify what families Carter would include in the middle class. Under the government's current \$2.2 billion program, most basic grants go to students from families earning less than \$10,000.

The grants drop to a minimum of \$50 as income and assets increase. The cutoff point for a family of four with one child in college is roughly \$17,500 in income.

At present, some 2.4 million students attending college next fall are expected to receive basic grants averaging just under \$900 apiece.

For fiscal 1979, Carter has proposed \$4 billion for existing programs to help college students and has proposed raising the maximum grant from \$1,600 to \$1,800. He also has proposed making more students eligible.

Between 1967 and 1975, Powell said, college costs have increased by about 71 percent, putting the average cost of tuition, room and board for each student attending private school at more than \$4,000 a year.

For each student attending a public college or university, the cost has climbed to about \$2,000 a year, Powell said.

"For lower and middle income families," the press secretary declared, "the ability to send their children to college is in jeopardy."

He called Carter's program a "response to the president's concern and concern expressed in Congress that middle-income families are not in a position to receive aid under existing programs."

In addition to the \$4 billion for existing aid programs, Carter set aside \$700 million in his fiscal 1979 budget as an "allowance for contingencies." Powell said this money would be used for the president's new program.

Powell also indicated more than the \$700 million might be included. Referring to the "contingency" funds, he declared, "I don't know if they cover every penny of the program at this point."

Democratic congressional leaders, who learned about the upcoming announcement during breakfast with Carter at the White House told reporters the program would be substantial.

Rep. John Brademas of Indiana, the Democratic whip, called the president's proposal "a major student national assistance program."

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill said it would be a new financial assistance program that "hits the middle-income group of Americans." He said other programs have been aimed at the poor or the wealthy.

In his effort to counter a bill including the \$250 tax credits, which has gained strong support in the Senate, Califano has said in the past that it would benefit high-income taxpayers as well as others.



Researchers Seek Ways To Assist Erring Motorists

WASHINGTON — The Federal Highway Administration has been telling citizens to get lost.

In a study designed to find out how to make the nation's highways and byways easier to navigate, the agency paid about 120 volunteer drivers, many of them college students, to get lost on the freeway. Then, as an agency researcher watched from the back seat, the drivers tried to get themselves out of their predicament.

One aim of the study was to find out if drivers need better navigation instruments.

"Right now all the motorist has is a map," said Dr. Truman Mast, a research psychologist who came up with the idea for the experiment. "But many people are map illiterates; they can't or won't use a map."

Lost drivers make up a significant part of the trillion miles driven yearly

in the United States. Dr. Mast believes.

"We're certain there's tremendous waste by lost drivers in terms of miles driven and fuel consumed," he told the National Geographic Society. Misguided motorists also pose a safety hazard, he said, because they are prone to driving erratically.

Watching lost drivers in action has proved to be the best way to understand their behavior, says Ernest Lareau Jr., the research assistant who looked over each driver's shoulder during the test.

"Everyone will tell you they get lost, but they won't tell you they drove through the same interchange eight times," he said.

So, one by one, at the wheel of a specially equipped car that averaged eight miles to a gallon of gas, volunteer drivers headed for the freeway with Lareau in the back seat.

Each driver, told to pretend he had

been daydreaming and missed his turnoff, was asked to find his way to a point about seven miles away. The destination was given a fictitious name, rendering highway signs useless.

Instead, drivers got road information from signs projected on a small screen suspended on the car's windshield.

The mission was easier for some drivers than for others: one-fourth of them had no maps or directions, and another fourth had only a general map of the area.

A third group of drivers, however, were directed by the windshield signs to off-the-road phone booths where they could call on a special line for directions. The fourth group was guided to simulated computer stations that provided customized maps with step-by-step direction to their destination.

As might be expected, the drivers

who had the computer maps did best at finding their way; most only strayed about a mile before turning the car around. Those who got directions by phone did almost as well. But drivers in the first group, those with no help, drove an average eight miles out of the way before finding the right road.

"One driver went 31 miles out of his way, which wasn't easy just going back and fourth between two freeway exits," Lareau said.

Lareau didn't have much time for back-seat driving. He was busy overseeing a computer next to him that was monitoring the drivers' heartbeat and breathing to find out whether body processes change when drivers get nervous. So far, the results of those tests are murky, he said.

Dr. Mast said that if the computer stations prove valuable in future tests he will urge that they be concentrated near busy freeway interchanges — but well away from the road.

Wind-Blown Debris Blacks Out Boston

BOSTON (AP) — A piece of tar paper roofing blown by hurricane-force winds into generating wires was blamed for a power failure that blacked out much of Boston for several hours Tuesday, leaving thousands cold and helpless in the midst of a blizzard.

"This is the worst we've had it in an awful long time," said James Lydon, vice president of Boston Edison Co., which lost power to 75,000 of its 200,000 customers in the metropolitan area. There was no estimate of the number of individuals affected.

The power started to fail shortly before 1:30 a.m. Tuesday. By dawn, with the storm still lashing at the city, Bostonians awoke in chilly, powerless homes.

Lydon blamed the outage on a piece of tar paper roofing that was blown like a bowling ball into the latticework of wires at the city's largest generating station.

"It was burned and scorched, so we don't know how large it was," Lydon said of the roofing. He said it ripped into what the company calls its "L Street New Boston Generating Plant," which faces Boston Harbor on the South Boston waterfront.

Gusting winds tossed frozen salt spray

onto the damage, and Lydon said this triggered the blackouts, first in neighborhoods stretching from the downtown area to Brighton, then in Government Center, the North End, in South Boston, Dorchester and Roxbury.

Before dawn, with stinging snow swirling through the streets, Boston looked like a ghost town. Except for an occasional police car parked with its blue lights flashing, the city was stilled.

Police Commissioner Joseph M. Jordan ordered all off-duty police officers to report to their divisions with full riot gear later in the day after at least 10 persons were arrested in the Roxbury and Dorchester areas for looting. Police Department spokesman Al Knupis said the windows of two supermarkets were smashed and at least a half-dozen other stores were broken into.

Boston Edison began restoring power at 8 a.m. But by midday, about 20,000 customers in the Back Bay and along the Charles River to Kenmore Square still were without electricity.

The Boston subway system, operating on an emergency power system, maintained abbreviated service.



Hull Advises Jump To NHL's Rangers

TORONTO (AP) — If the Winnipeg Jets' two Swedish stars, Ulf Nilsson and Anders Hedberg, ask linemate Bobby Hull for his advice, the veteran winger would recommend they take their chances with New York Rangers of the National Hockey League.

The Swedes, along with Hull, have been terrorizing World Hockey Association goaltenders for several years. Their contracts running out with the Jets, they've been wooed by several NHL teams.

The Rangers, with a package offer of a reported \$1.8 million over two years for the WHA superstars, are said to have the inside track in negotiations with the two players.

A number of NHL teams, however, backed off in the bidding wars, claiming neither Nilsson nor Hedberg is worth that much. Hedberg scored 70 goals and Nilsson contributed 85 assists during the 1976-77 season.

"I don't agree with the claim that the Rangers' offer to the Swedes is so far out of line," Hull told Toronto Star columnist Milt Dunneil. "Let us say Guy Lafleur (the Montreal Canadiens' star 'winger) were for sale. Imagine what the Rangers would have to pay for him.

"Okay, in this case the Rangers are not giving that big purchase price to another owner. They are giving it to the players themselves. As far as salary goes, my guess is these guys would play for \$150,000 a season.

"They know they are two of the better players in hockey today. I'm confident they can play anywhere. Some of the Winnipeg fans may feel let down. It was the Jets who gave these two guys an opportunity to play. I accept that, but I also say they have discharged whatever obligation they had."

There are persistent whispers that the Jets gambled and lost — that they could have tied up the Swedes for the next three years by raising their stipends to \$200,000 each a year last September.

American, English Villages 'Flip' Over Pancake Rivalry

LIBERAL, Kan. (AP) — Stephanie Wagner, an 18-year-old college student, won the annual Pancake Race here Tuesday with a time of 59.5 seconds over an icy 415-yard course.

The time bettered by 4½ seconds that of the top competitor in Olney, England, where the race has been run every Shrove Tuesday since 1445. Olney's winner this year, housewife June Statham, 24, won the English race with a time of 64 seconds.

A freezing mist and 16-degree tempera-

tures put a damper on the Liberal festivities, with workers clearing ice from the race course just 15 minutes before the noon running.

This year's victory gave the Liberal women an 18-11 edge over their counterparts in Olney since the two communities began their competition in 1950.

Miss Wagner is a member of the women's basketball team at Seward County Community College.

The race record was set by Liberal's Sheila Turner in 1975 with a time of 58.5 seconds.

The transatlantic link was formed after World War II by U.S. servicemen stationed in Britain.

Competitors are required to carry frying pans or griddles, and flip a pancake three times during the race without dropping it, including a flip at the start and another at the finish.

Legend has it that the race began in the 15th century after a local housewife, late for Shrove Tuesday church service, raced to church with skillet in hand, forgetting to remove her apron.







Mart Rolls Up Big Gain

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market rolled up its best gain in nearly three months Tuesday, underpinned by a snowstorm that delayed the start of trading in New York.

Analysts said the rally was inspired by favorable reports from several leading companies and hopes that a compromise agreement might be looming in Washington on energy legislation.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials jumped 10.23 to 778.85 for its sharpest advance since last Nov. 10, when it climbed 14.12.

Gainers outpaced losers by better than a 2-1 margin among New York Stock Exchange-listed issues. The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks rose .44 to 50.08.

Volume on the Big Board came to 14.73 million shares against 11.63 million the day before.

The NYSE and the American Stock Exchange, both of which closed two hours early Monday after the snowstorm hit New York City, began trading Tuesday at 11 a.m. EST, an hour later than usual.

The American Stock Exchange market value index chimed in with a 74 rise to 123.66.

In the over-the-counter market, the NASDAQ composite index closed at 102.75, up .48.

Minnesota Inn Offers Hot Bricks For Feet, Cat To Lull Sleepers

WABASHA, Minn. (UPI) — A delicious meal, a toast or two, hot bricks for your bed on a cold Minnesota night and a house cat to purr you to sleep. If that sounds more appealing than the way you spent New Year's Eve, you should have spent the evening in Wabasha at the Anderson House.

It is the oldest operating hotel in Minnesota, having opened in 1856. Its roots can be traced to Pennsylvania's lush Lancaster Valley where the Amish know how to feed and house a weary body.

Operating as a country inn, the Anderson House clings to Victorian customs and traditions, wrapping them around each visitor and allowing him to depart the bustle of the 1970s.

Grandma Ida Anderson began running the red brick inn in 1901 after learning her cooking skills in Lancaster, Pa. She quickly became famous for her superb taste treats, which continue today under the auspices of her great-grandson John Hall.

In February, for example, when the inn is full of skiers, guests might get scrapple and fastnachts, the morning meat dish, and plump doughnuts familiar to the fortunates raised in Pennsylvania. Shoo-fly pie also may appear on the menu.

But the food is not all Pennsylvania "plain." It can reach the elegant heights of any big city restaurant.

And after the food, guests can retire to one of the 52 rooms recently remodeled by Hall. All are decorated in bright wallpapers with matching quilted spreads made by two senior citizens in a Wabasha nursing home.

If you reserve it, you might get the Mayo Suite, which includes a bedroom, sitting

room and bath. Otherwise, plan on using the bath down the hall in the tradition of an inn.

The inn is furnished with antiques, many sumptuous, particularly the Norwegian bridal bed in the Bridal Suite.

Leave your shoes outside the door when you retire. In the morning they'll be freshly shined. And if your feet are very cold, ask for the hot bricks.

If you've been out cross country skiing and caught a cold, there are mustard plasters to heat your chest.

Cat lovers can order up one of six cats for a bedside companion.

In the summer some of the inn's rooms are used as a youth hostel and, for visitors from another country, there is no charge.

Jeanne Hall, John's mother, worked for a large hotel chain for a period during which the Anderson House had another owner. She grew weary of the "plastic world" and yearned to return to the Anderson to practice her creativity.

The family managed to repurchase the inn last year for five times what they sold it for in 1964.

Mrs. Hall now has freedom for her creative urges and reigns over the inn with a smile.

For visitors staying more than a night, "we insist our employees know the people by their names," she said. That little amenity will get them every time.

The Anderson House is one of only three inns in Minnesota.
