ANGELS CAMP: Calif. (UPI) - The folks in Angels Camp are mighty riled

In fact, they claim, charges by the Wash In fact, they claim, charges by the Washington-based Fund for Animals that
the frogs are mistreated and even pan-fried in the parking lot are just a way for he group to get publicity. The 50 h annual contest, immortalized in Mark Twain's short story "The Cele-
brated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County," will be held this weekend, and the ponsors are determined they won't be the victims of a bum rap. "Why don't they protest French restaurants, biological laboratories and every
high school in the United States?" said Paul ambert, a iubile official The Fund for Animals, wtich lists such officers as Mary Tyler Moore. Princess Grace of Monaco and author Cleveland Amory on its letterhead, charged ${ }^{\text {at }}$ "During the contests the frogs are jumped at, kicked at and yelled at to make them jump farther," the fund said "Frogs sometimes die during the four days of the event from the heat, not being kept wet and the trauma of the contest."'
A local officer of the Fund even charged that the croakers are pan-fried and A local officer of the Fund even charged that the croakers are pan-fried and
eaten in the parking lots, thrown dead into bushes and crippled by callous or careless chilidren.
"The townspeople think the statement is totally craxy," said Gary Blake, a
sokesman for the spokesman tor the Calaveras County Fair and Jumping Frog Jubilee. .We think
the charge is pretty malicious in the sense they didn t call us to get any informa tion. The Angets Booster Club takes care of the frogs, waters them, feeds them
live food and keeps a close watch on the frogs. The fund s charges are irresponsible, and the geroup is joust seeking pubbicity.' Blake said the club also makes sure the frogs are "wet down twice a day," and
handlers sadd the frogs are kept in cool, damp buckets so they will perform bet ter in the contest.
Some 40.000 visiters are expected to crowd into the old gold mining town of
Angeis Camp in the Sierra foothills for the contest this weekend "Nobody eats frogs legs up here." Blake said. "The residents and rancher really care about the environment. They are very careful of whatat they do to the froges:"
Blake said that after the contest, frogs are set loose or returned home with
their handiers.

"I had already been down there quite a bit and knew the road pretty good, and I was determined to get in on the race," Gray recalled.
Oldsmobile then was the "hot" car - one driven by Herschel McGrif was the winner of the stock car division that first year - and Gray persuaded the late Bob Womble, then a Lubbock Olds dealer, to sponsor him in the race.
